City's caseload crosses 1k-mark

Bhubaneswar: Bhubaneswar's virus load Friday breached the 1,000-mark with the COVID-19 tally rising to 1,043, Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) said. Of the 124 new cases, 72 quarantined persons tested positive for the deadly virus and the remaining 52 were detected through contact tracing, the BMC said. The BMC said, as many as 54 patients have been cured of the infection on Friday, the BMC said. The number of recoveries in the state capital increased to 457 while the city now has 574 active cases. Eleven fatalities have been reported from the city so far, the BMC said.



The police official further informed that no one will be allowed to enter or go out of the two cities except for emergency cases, for which pass can be obtained through SMS by dialing 100.

Moreover, in a bid to ensure that people do not face issues in purchasing essential commodities during the lockdown period in Cuttack and Bhubaneswar, Sarangi Friday said that there will be no weekend shutdown in the two cities. Addressing a presser here, he said, "Shops selling essential commodities will remain open from 6am to 1pm in the two cities."

He also requested the media houses to supply a list of staff who will be mobilized during the lockdown period. He has asked the firms engaged in IT and ITes service to limit their staff to 10 percent only. Similarly, the banks have been asked to run through 25 percent staff.

As the commissioner has clearly mentioned about the stricter compliance of lockdown regulations this time, cops were found readying the iron wire barricades at important junctions of the city for the lockdown.

Sources in the police department claimed that around 30 platoons of police force will be deployed in the capital city for strict compliance of the lockdown rules

The denizens have also been advised to avoid using vehicles for marketing and instead go to the nearby shops on foot to fetch essential items. The Odisha government Thursday evening had announced that lockdown will be implemented in Ganjam, Khurda, and Cuttack and Jajpur districts and in Rourkela Municipal Corporation area considering that 66 per cent of the total COVID-19 cases in the state have originated from these places.

Pilot camp gets 4-day breather

Jaipur, July 17: In a breather for sacked Deputy Chief Minister Sachin Pilot and his loyal MLAs, the Raiasthan High Court Friday stopped the Assembly Speaker from taking any action for their disqualification till Tuesday.

The two-judge bench, hearing the amended plea filed by the Pilot camp, said that the hearing will continue Monday.

Advocate Anuj Bhandari, who was appearing for one of the lawmakers, said, "The hearing shall continue Monday and is expected to conclude Monday itself. Hence, the court stopped the Speaker to take any further action against the Pilot camp till Tuesday." The Pilot camp had chal-

lenged the validity and legality of the notice sent to them Tuesday by Speaker C.P. Joshi, asking them to explain why they should not be disqualified as Assembly members for defying the party whip.

The writ petition, filed by Prithviraj Meena and 18 other MLAs, argued that "free speech" cannot be labelled as "anti-party activity" and termed as "moti-

vated" the complaint filed on behalf of Congress Chief Whip Mahesh Joshi. They had argued that not

attending two meetings called by the Congress Legislature Party cannot fall within the purview of para (2) (a) or (2) (b) of the Constitution's Tenth Schedule, so as to render him/them fit for disqualification on ground of defection. Not attending party meetings as also voicing a difference of opinion outside the house are matters between the member and his party and do not fall within the Tenth Schedule, they argued.

They have also argued that they can't be served such notices when the Rajasthan Assembly is not in session. The Pilot camp had moved the court Thursday but then sought permission to amend their plea, which was granted. The court later accepted the amended plea filed by Pilot camp and referred to the

matter to a division bench.

down, state government departments will ordinarily adopt "work from home" protocol for their employees using the VPN facility to dispose official matters in OSWAS. The Issue and Receipt section of each department will function on a roster basis to ensure that dak received is scanned and uploaded on OSWAS and letters issued," General Administration department notification said.

However, the Health and Family Welfare department will continue to function with the full capacity. Departmental control rooms will also function as usual. State IT centre will render 24×7 support to ensure uninterrupted functioning of OSWAS and other IT and Telecom services, the order said.

All employees in the four districts and RMC have been instructed to remain present at headquarters to attend the office at short notice and were asked to be available over telephone all the time.

After 17 yrs, déjà vu moment over audio clips in politics

Bhubaneswar, July 17: The State government Friday announced plans to disburse monthly pensions to the families of anganwadi and ASHA workers who succumb to COVID-19 infection while working with the government in

managing the pandemic. In a notification issued by the Special Relief Commissioner (SRC), the state government said that the spouse of the deceased or the next of the kin of the person will be entitled for the government pensions until the date, the deceased would have attained

the age of 60 years if alive. "The spouse/next of kin of deceased anganwadi worker who succumbs to COVID 19 in line of duty under active deployment by the State authorities shall continue to receive ₹7500 per month till the date he/she would have attained the age of 60 years had he/she survived," said the notification issued by the SRC office

Friday. It also added that the family of deceased ASHA workers will also be entitled for ₹5,000 per month pension as per the pension plan of

the government. "The spouse/next of kin of deceased ASHA working under health department who succumbs to COVID-19 in line of duty under active deployment by the State authorities shall continue to receive ₹5000 per month till the date he/she would have attained the age of 60 vears head he/she survived," the notification said.

Bairangi Bhailaan received immense love from the audience and appreciation from the critics. The film went on to become one of the biggest blockbusters in the history of Indian cinema.





'Make it or break it' time for state

Bhubaneswar, July 17: A day after another lockdown was declared in four districts and Rourkela, unprecedented rush was witnessed at the market places in Capital city. Although shops selling vegetables, grocery and milk would remain open between 6am and 1pm during the lockdown from July 17 to 31, many stepped out of their homes and resorted to panic buying. Heavy rush and serpentine queues were also seen in front of liquor

several people supported the decision while many others expressed

concern over yet another lockdown which, they said. speaks volumes of the government's ability to arrest the spread of the killer virus.

Sambit Maharana, a resident of the city, said, "People get panic largely due to unplanned/unorganised lockdowns. Massive testing is the only option through which we can detect the chain of coronavirus. We are doing less number of testing. More we test more we get the pattern. By imposing lockdowns, we can't stop the virus, we are just delaying it."

Meanwhile, Jagannath Mohnaty a city-based lawyer, said, "During the last one week, over 500 Covid positive cases are coming up every day. There is no other way to curb the infection other than lockdown. If people haven't learnt after the last ockdown to plan ahead and follow social distancing then what can the government do?"

Before the lockdown, the government had also declared weekend shutdowns in 10 districts of the state. Also, the night curfew across Odisha has been eased by two hours and was effective from 9 pm to 5 am instead of 7 pm to 5 am earlier. The entire state has been divided into two zones to focus on areas

with more positive cases. Nevertheless, people are seen flocking to the markets in large numbers which becomes a major source of headache for enforcement agencies.

Satvabrata Panigrahi, a software engineer, said, "The shutdowns and lockdowns are not working because people still rush to crowded places to buy groceries, fish and meat etc. It is our collective responsibility to protect ourselves and others. We can keep blaming the government, but unless we don't do our part we can't stop the

Odisha among 8 most nCoV vulnerable states, says study

Odisha is the most vulnerable state in the country from housing and hygiene point of view

Bhubaneswar, July 17: A study published in an international journal on the levels of vulnerability of Indian states claimed that Odisha is among top eight Indian states to report highest vulnerabilities to

The article by the journal, Lancet, titled 'A vulnerability index for the management of and response to the COVID-19 epidemic in India: an ecological study' was published July 16. It measured the status of 36 Indian states and Union

The study claimed that Odisha and seven other states face more vulnerability as compared to other states. The study said, "A number of districts in nine large states— Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Telangana, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra, West Bengal, Odisha, and Guiarat—located in every region of the country except the northeast, were found to have high overall vulnerability (index value more than 0.75).'

It added, "These states also had high vulnerability according to most of the five domains. Although our intention was not to predict the risk of infection for a district or a state, we observed similarities between vulnerability and the

current concentration of COVID-19 cases at the state level. However, while, performed well on demothis relationship was not clear at

the district level.' While the report claimed MP, Bihar and Telangana are most vulnerable, it also highlighted the status of the states in terms of vulnerability of the global pandemic in terms of socio-economic, demography, housing and hygienic conditions, epidemiological and overall average vulnerability.

The study said that Odisha is most vulnerable from the housing and hygiene point of view in the country with the highest vulnerability index of 0.971. Only Madhya Pradesh has equivalent vulnerability index of that extent.

CRUT's Mo Bus which has been operating after resumption of services since lockdown on less than 10 routes is now set to suspend all its

services until lockdown is over. However, the CRUT said that to facilitate the movement of incoming passengers from airport and railway station, shuttle service of M Bus will be available during the period.

Notably, the state government has imposed complete lockdown in four districts of Ganiam, Khurda, Cuttack and Jajpur from July 17 -9 pm to July 31 midnight. These four districts constitute two-thirds of the active Covid-19 cases.

Actor Sabyasachi turns real hero for Ganjam family

Bhubaneswar, July 17: In yet another noble act from Odia cine star Sabyasachi, a family received the body of its member 16 days after his death in Dubai

Balaram Pradhan, 36, had left Khujapalli of Khallikote panchayat in Ganjam for Dubai in search of work. He had been

working there as a bonded labourer for one and a half years. The outbreak of coronavirus changed everything. The disease snatched the job away from him. He breathed his last due to extreme level of stress. His family members received the shocking news June 29.

After learning about the family's ordeal, Sabyasachi went out of his way and brought the body back and handed it over to the family members in just three days which otherwise would have taken nearly 30 days.

"Getting a body to an international airport is not an easy task. I contacted the Consulate General of India over there. With the help of the local police, the body was recovered. Before bringing it to the airport, a coronavirus test and then post-mortem were performed. To bring the body back to Odisha was a challenge for me," said Sabyasachi. After seeking help from DIG, Intelligence, Anup Sahu, he sought help from Customs inspector Malyavik Ghosh, Airport PS IIC Umakant Pradhan and Air India senior manager Jitendra Das.

searchers, the differently-abled students are now vulnerable to denial of access to education due to their limited access to digital interventions and availability of such methods to access online information.

"An underlying reality was that children from government schools belong to poor families, and most of them were not users or owners of smart phones which are being used for online education, said Sruti Mohapatra, CEO,

Swabhiman. The survey took views from different categories of differently-abled students from the state and took their feedback on their study levels during the global pandemic and closure of educational institutions.

The study said that 56.5 per cent of the differently-abled students are struggling yet at-

tending classes, but irregularly. "Around 77 per cent of students said they would not be able to cope and would fall behind in learning due to their inability to access distance learning methods while 71 per cent said they are finding it difficult to cope with the Covid-19 social and educational scenario," the study said.

"The parents of as many as 90 per cent of such kids said teachers are not giving them attention while 86 per cent said they don't know how to use the technology. As many as 76 per cent of mothers said they don't know how to help their wards as they themselves

do not understand technol-

ogy. A large proportion of teachers (81 per cent) said they do not have accessible educational material, suitable for online learning, with them," the study said.

The study claimed that around 71 per cent said even though smartphones are available at home, father is the only person who has a smartphone and was out of home most of the time for livelihood purposes, while 61 per cent of them said they would not be able to afford buying a new smartphone as it was expensive.

The researchers have advocated for a different approach for the students living with different forms of disabilities as per their needs to help them in their access to studies during the pandemic. Mohapatra said all children with disabilities cannot be clubbed as one group as they are persons with different disabilities and therefore different needs.

though the Centre has asked smart cities to push for more cyclingfriendly initiatives, the capital city's falling numbers in ridership of Mo Cycles post COVID-19 have raised doubts over enhancement of the existing infra-

On eve of the Smart City Dav. June 26, the Centre had directed states to promote more eco-friendly public vehicles and implement cycling-friendly initiatives that would encourage social distancing amid spread of COVID-19.

Sources said the Bhubaneswar Smart City Limited (BSCL), a Special Purpose Vehicle (SPV) for implementing smart projects, has directed the Central Region for Urban Transport (CRUT) to add 300 more bicycles to its existing fleet of Mo Cycles. Operated by Hexi and Yulu, CRUT's Mo Cycle has a fleet of 2,000 bicycles running in 400 routes in the city.

However, ever since CRUT decided to resume the service post COVID-enforced lockdown, Mo Cycles have been only able to operate with just 300 bicycles in mere 50 routes.

Moreover, since onset of coronavirus, an 83 per cent drop in rides has also been observed. While an average 600 daily riders were earlier registered, the ridership has now plummeted to only 100 per day. While the pandemic is said to be the primary cause behind the fall of demand, off-season cycling and poor riding environment are amongst others.

'Usually months between July and September are off season as this is monsoon. However, the drop in ridership is due to fear in spread of COVID19. While we promote cycling with all sections of society, youths in the city have a particular liking for it. Thus, most ridership was observed in KIIT to XIMB and AIMS to OUAT routes. However, with schools and colleges closed, the Mo Cycles are yet to see the usual demand," said a senior official at the CRUT.

Moreover, the state government's austerity measures which include a ban on purchase of vehicles by various departments has further put a curb on adding more bicycles to the existing fleet. "Although a cap on buying of vehicles is only limited to official purposes only, any expansion to the fleet will be planned after thoroughly involving concerned stake-

Furthermore, avid bicyclers and road safety organizations have claimed Bhubaneswar as 'not conducive for promoting cycling. Union Housing and Urban Affairs Minister Hardeep Puri, who had initiated the 'Cycles4change Challenge' on Smart City Day asked the SPVs to explore lowcost interventions such as popup cycle lanes, non-motorised zones and community-led cycle rental schemes.

"What good will be these initiatives if there are no designated roads for riders?" questioned Sameet Panda, an avid bicyclist here. "The state government during Hockey World Cup invested heavily to represent Bhubaneswar as best cycling city. However, little has been done in this regard as riders still find our cycle tracks clouded by street vendors and vehicles. There is no space for us to

Bhubaneswar, July 17: The state Health and Family Welfare department Friday issued an advisory to medical officers and private doctors to reduce chances of getting infected or prevent spread of infection in their clinics.

The state has asked the doctors to encourage use of PPE kits while at clinics and also they were asked to abide by the government norms of disinfection and sanitization of their working area The government said the guide-

lines should be strictly adhered to by medical practitioners who are pursue professional practice in their own chambers or in private setups like nursing homes, polyclinics and private clinics.

The government has asked private practioners to have separate fever

also asked them to ensure hand washing facilities, availability of hand sanitizer and masks are used by patients and hospital staff.

The doctors have also been asked to sterilize blood pressure instruments, stethoscope, thermometers and any other touch points after every single use.

Private clinic operators and nursing homes have been asked to direct patients of fever, respiratory disorders and persons coming from hotspot areas to nearest government hospital or private COVID Hospitals. The government has entrusted upon doctors to ensure use of masks and sanitization of patients up to the medical practitioners.

Doctors have been asked to encourage use of posters and other visual mediums to create awarenesson COVID 19. All doctors have been asked to maintain a register of entries of all patients in the clinic.

Teachers, parents differ on MHRD's online class norms

Bhubaneswar, July 17: Parents and teachers in the state have a different take on the guidelines for online classes issued by the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD).

According to the guidelines, online classes for pre-primary students should not be for more than 30 minutes. For Classes I to VIII, two online sessions of up to 45 minutes each while for Classes IX to XII, four sessions of 30-45 minutes duration have been recommended.

Priyanka Singh Deo, a parent said, "I am with the ministry of HRD. I agree that there should not be such lengthy classes for kids because the overall health comes before anything else. It is already a challenging situation for all of us and having such non-stop classes puts pressure on kids where children are not acquainted to sitting in front of screens for long hours.

Basudev Bhatt, a parent and a chairman of Odisha parents' association, said, "Regarding the guidelines, we disagree with the inclusion of

pre-nursery students and also kids from Class I to Class VIII. They can learn at present under the parents' guidance during this pandemic. We demand only Class IX to Class XII students to receive online classes opportunity adhering to COVID-19 guidelines.'

State's COVID-19 tally crosses 16,000-mark; death toll at 83


Bhubaneswar, July 17: The COVID-16,000-mark as 718 more persons tested positive for the viral infection while the death toll reached 83 with four patients succumbing to the disease Friday, an official of the health and family welfare department said.

With 718 new cases, the state's infection tally rose to 16,110, said the official. The H&FW department took to Twitter to say, "Regret to inform the demise of four COVID positive patients while they were under treatment in hospitals."

Two fatalities were reported from Ganjam district while one each was reported from Gajapati and Angul districts, taking the toll to 83, it added. Two deceased from Ganjam district—aged 56 and 60—had diabetes and kidney disease, while a 66-year-old man who died in Angul district was suffering from neuroendocrine tumour, the official said, adding that a 56-year-old COVID-19 patient who died in Gajapati district had diabetes and heart disease

Of the 83 fatalities, Ganjam district alone accounts for 50 deaths followed by Khurda (13), Cuttack (eight), two each from Angul, Gajapati and Puri, and one each from Bargarh, Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapara, Rayagada and

According to the official, two and are being discharged on 17.7.2020 ease Friday, the civic body said.



other COVID-19 patients also died in the state, but their death was due to other reasons.

Of the 718 new cases, 479 have been reported from different quarantine centres while the remaining 239 are local contacts. Contact tracing and follow-up action is underway, the H&FW department said.

Ganjam district reported a maximum of 231 cases followed by Khurda (150), Malkangiri (54), Cuttack (32), Keonihar (28), Koraput (27), Jharsuguda (24), Mayurbhanj (22), Gajapati (21), Rayagada (19), Nayagarh (134), Bhadrak and Sundargarh (10 each). Ten other districts reported new cases in single digits.

Meanwhile, 453 persons who had earlier tested positive for the infection recovered Friday, the H&FW department twitted. "Another 453 #COVID19 patients have recovered

(sic)..," the department said. The recoveries include 220 from

Ganjam, 41 from Sundargarh, 33 from Nabarangpur, 28 from Khurda and 26 from Bolangir. At present, there are 4,671 active

cases, while 11,330 patients have recovered from the disease so far. In the last 24 hours, 7,818 swab amples were tested for COVID-19.

City's tally crosses 1,000-mark

The state Capital's virus load Friday breached the 1,000-mark with Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) reporting 124 fresh COVID-19 cases, taking the total tally to 1,043.

Of the 124 cases, 72 were detected from quarantine centres while 52 were local contacts. BMC tweeted.

Open evaluation centres during shutdown: Govt

Bhubaneswar, July 17: The weekend shutdown has caused a huge delay in evaluation of Plus-II answer-sheets.

The School and Mass Education department has urged district Collectors to open evaluation centres during the shutdown period in order to expedite the evaluation process. S&ME principal secretary

Chithra Arumugam, in a letter addressed to all Collectors, SPs and DCPs of Bhubaneswar and Cuttack, wrote, "Even though evaluation of answer scripts of annual higher secondary examination 2020 has been started by the Council of Higher Secondary Education (CHSE), Odisha from June 1, the process of evaluation is yet to be finished due to weekly shutdown declared by different district administrations/local authorities Saturday and Sunday."

The delay in evaluation will lead to a delay in publication of results that would impede admission procedure of students into higher studies. For this, Arumugam requested the District Collectors to permit respective evaluation zones to remain open Saturdays & Sundays (the weekly shutdown period) to allow examiners, technical support staff and others associated with the evaluation process, movement between their residences and evaluation zones upon production of appointment letters or identity cards.

Doctor crunch ailing Hepatology, Endocrinology depts of SCBMCH

Cuttack, July 17: Shortage of doctors at the Hepatology and Endocrinology departments of the Sriram Chandra Bhanja Medical College and Hospital (SCBMCH) is likely to affect teaching as well as healthcare facility at the premium state-run institute.

Just a few days ago, the state government has allowed the SCBMCH to open four intensive care units (ICUs) at the Hepatology department. Moreover, the equipment required for the ICUs have already been procured by the hospital authorities, sources said.

Last year, the Medical Council of India (MCI) had permitted the Hepatology department of SCBMCH to start postgraduate teaching, sources added.

At present, the Hepatology de-

staff. The hospital authorities are yet to regularise the job of the AIIMS-pass out doctor. If the doctor concerned resigns from the post, then the department will face a lot of problem to manage the ICUs, postgraduate course and healthcare facility," added the source.

The Endocrinology department of SCB is now running with a lone assistant professor. A doctor who was heading the department had re-

tired from his service in June this year. Moreover, an associate professor of the department had opted for voluntary retirement last year. Now. a senior doctor from the nephrology department has been asked to look after the administrative affair of the Endocrinology department.

"The Endocrinology department has 20 beds and around 2,000 patients usually visit the department in a month. The indoor healthcare at the department has been stopped due to shortage of doctors," said a health staff on conditions of anonymity.

SCBMCH principal Datteswar Hota said they have raised the issue with the state government. "We are waiting for the state government's decision in this regard." he

Paradip, July 17: Fishing activities have resumed at Paradip harbour here. However, non-compliance of Covid-19 guidelines has become a worry for the authorities. Babu gets domicile certificate in J&K

The Jammu & Kashmir administration has started issuing domicile certificates, 10 months after the Indian government abrogated Article 370. The new rules allow non-locals to get domicile certificates. Navin Kumar Choudhary, a senior IAS officer from Bihar, has become the first bureaucrat to get domicile rights in the union territory. A 1994-batch J&K cadre officer, Choudhary is currently principal secretary in the J&K Agriculture Production Department.

Recently, J&K Lt Governor Girish Chandra Murmu launched an e-application to fast-track issuing of domicile certificates to both locals and nonlocals. Earlier this year, the Ministry of Home Affairs had ordered that domicile would be granted to anyone who has resided in Jammu & Kashmir for 15 years or has studied for seven years and appeared in Class X or Class XII examinations in an educational institution in J&K.

The move has raised concerns in the union territory about the Centre's intentions, with some viewing it as an attempt to change the demography and cultural identity of Kashmiris. According to sources, more than 30,000 people have received domicile certificates online in J&K since the Centre changed the laws.

Governor's outburst

West Bengal Governor Jagdeep Dhankhar and the Trinamool Congress (TMC) party government have been at loggerheads since July

last year when Dhankhar assumed office. The ongoing Covid crisis has only sharpened the mutual recrimination between the state government and the Governor.

However, we're focusing on this nth round of an interminable battle because it is focused on the babus this time. Recently, Dhankhar took to Twitter and addressed IAS and IPS officers of Bengal. He referred to All India Service (Conduct) Rules and expressed concern at what he termed as "rampant disregard and violations" of the rules in the state. He urged the officials to refrain from doing anything "which is or may be contrary to any law, rules, regulations and established practices; maintain discipline in the discharge of their duties; be ready to implement the lawful orders duly communicated to them; and perform and discharge their duties with the highest degree of professionalism and dedication to the best of their abilities.'

The Governor's outburst is been seen in the context of reports of alleged mishandling of the Covid crisis as well as irregularities in distribution of relief to those affected by the Amphan super cyclone by Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee and the state government. Some see in the Governor's mention of "neutrality" as a nod to the 2021 assembly elections in the state

That babus in the Modi sarkar are reluctant to serve at the Centre has been evident for some time now. The Centre periodically asks the states to spare more IAS officers of up to joint secretary level for Central deputation. The last such request was made in November last year, when the Centre sought officials under the central staffing scheme and for posts of chief vigilance officers. The response however was disappointing.

According to sources, the Department of Personnel and Training (DoPT) has expressed concern over the minimal number of nominations it has received from various cadres and services, especially at the director level. In an order sent to chief secretaries of state governments and secretaries of central government departments, the DoPT said the under-utilization of these posts can cause "serious gaps in cadre management."

Further, the order warns that this aspect will be kept in view while considering cadre review proposals received in the future. The cadres that have not forwarded sufficient number of nominations for Central deputation may have to settle for smaller number of additional senior posts.


Sugar daddy

he first known use of sugar daddy is in an episode of a surreal tale with the title Fat Anna's Future that appeared in the Syracuse Herald March 27, 1923. Coincidentally, its notorious introduction to the wider American public would come in the following day's newspapers. The story had actually begun two weeks before, when the body of Dorothy Keenan King was found in her New York apartment. "Dot" King was a former model and unsuccessful actress who had become what people then called a vamp, a woman who used her undoubted attractiveness to target men. She had been set up in the apartment and given lavish presents by a 50-year-old tycoon named John Kearsley Mitchell III. He used the pseudonym of Mr Marshall but was publicly unmasked in press reports on 28 March below a formal posed photograph: "John Kearsley Mitchell, son-in-law of K. T. Stotesbury, multimillionaire, of Philadelphia, has been revealed as the mysterious "Mr Marshall," who was the "heavy sugar daddy" of Dorothy Keenan King, New York model, who was chloroformed to death in her New York City apartment." Her murderer has never been found. Claims were made at the time that she had been killed because she refused to go along with a criminal group who wanted her to help blackmail Mitchell. Dot King's story became a cause celebre and was widely publicised, often mentioning her pet name for Mitchell, heavy sugar daddy. It gained instant public recognition and it has been in the language since, though heavy was soon lost. The term seems to have been a New York creation of the louche and criminal worlds linked to Broadway in Prohibition days. Sugar was a long-established slang term for money and heavy sugar was a lot of it. Sugar was also an endearment, which originated around this time in African-American slang and which reached a wider white audience via blues lyrics. Daddy was an obvious reference to an older man, but it may similarly have had a link to African-American slang of the time, in which a daddy was a lover with no implications of age.

THE TRADE-OFF **IS THAT BEFRIENDING THE US WILL GET US TECHNOLOGIES** WHILE **BEFRIENDING CHINA MAY GET US THE WORLD MARKETS**

ome two hundred years ago, the share of India in the world income was 25 per cent and China's was 33 per cent. That declined to 1 per cent and 2 per cent respectively in 1950 These have since increased to 4 per cent and 15 per cent today. Even this improved share is anomalous because India's population is 126 crore and China's is 136 crore. In comparison, the United States accounts for 25 per cent of the world income today while its population is merely 36 crore. Thus, one per cent share of the global income that accrues in India is shared by 31 crore persons; if it accrues in China, then it is shared by 9 crore persons; and if it accrues in the US, then it is shared by only 1.3 crore persons. The challenge before India is to secure a share of global income in proportion to our population.

We have to examine whether this will be facilitated if we befriend China against the US, or befriend the US against China.

Befriending the US will help us get advanced technologies. The US remains the leading technology innovator although China has surpassed it in the filing of patents before the World Intellectual Property Organization, The US filed 58,000 patent applications in 2019 while China filed 59,000 applications with India filing 30,000 applications. The US nevertheless remains in the forefront of technological innovations because of its large hoard of patented technologies innovated by that country in the past.

On the other hand, befriending China may not get us as much access to the advanced technologies because China is rather protective about them. The basic symbiosis between China and India is in China's strength in manufacturing and India's strength in services like software development, medical transcription, translations and typesetting. A combination of China's manufacturing with India's services can give us an edge over the US. The trade-off is that befriending the US will get us technologies while befriend-



If we befriend the US, we can get more advanced technologies but it is uncertain how long this will sustain; and we will have to tow the US line and sacrifice our economic interests

ing China may get us the world markets.

Another critical difference is that of debt. China has provided large amounts of loans to the US. It has purchased about 15 per cent of Treasury Bonds issued by the United States directly. It has also invested large amounts in other countries which, in turn, have provided loans to the US. Thus, China stands above the US in terms of debt just as the donor stands above a recipient. More importantly, the US debt is increasing rapidly. Thus the US is losing its lead in technologies and in financial prowess while China is gaining on both counts. The US is in the sunset phase while China is in the sunrise phase.

The main difficulty in befriending China is that country's occupation of Tibet and its 1962 war against India. But before we deal with this matter, we must examine the record of the two contenders The US has made following wars in the last 100-odd years excluding the two World Wars: the 1912 Nicaragua, 1915 Haiti, 1916 Dominican Republic, 1950 Korea, 1953 Laos, 1958 Lebanon, 1961 Cuba, 1965 Vietnam, 1965 Dominican Republic (again), 1967 Cambodia, 1983 Grenada, 1986 Libya, 1989 Panama, 1990 Kuwait, 1992 Somalia, 1992 Bosnia, 1994 Haiti, 1998 Kosovo, 2001 Afghanistan, 2003 Iraq, 2007 Somalia, 2011 Libya (again), 2011 Uganda, 2014 Syria, 2015 Yemen,

2015 Libya (again). In comparison China has made following wars: 1950 Tibet, 1950 Korea, 1959 Vietnam, 1962 India, 1969 Russia. 1979 Vietnam and 2020 India (again). The US had made about 26 wars away from its border except minor skirmishes with Mexico that were soon resolved. In contrast, China has only made wars near her borders and, to my knowledge, excepting Tibet, it has not captured land. An article of this length does not permit me to dwell on the merits of these wars. That said, I may assure the reader that I have spoken with a number of persons from Latin America and they consistently feel that the US has invaded their countries only to install puppet regimes favourable to it. It is clear that the US has launched large numbers of wars and always away from its own land. That said, we must appreciate the US' help to India.

British Prime Minister Winston Churchill had gone to meet US President Roosevelt to seek his help in the war against Germany. Roosevelt had agreed to help only if Britain committed to free the colonies including India after the war. Again, the US provided us with free grains under PL480 programme during the 1964 famine in India. The situation has changed dramatically now. India is having to buy expensive oil because she has sided with the US against Iran, for example.

A number of scholars main tain that Tibet was independent during the Chinese Ming Dynasty from 1368 to 1644, and was subordinate to the Qing dynasty from 1644 to 1912; and again independent from 1912 to 1950. The justification of China's conquest of Tibet rests on the nature of independence between 1912 and 1950. But it is clear that Tibet was not historically independent from China for about three centuries before 1912. I am not supporting China's occupation of Tibet but we must be aware of the facts before we make up our minds.

Now, coming to the 1962 war with India, Neville Maxwell has traced in detail in his book India's China War that the war was precipitated by Indian defense minister Krishna Menon's 'forward policy' under which India advanced into the undemarcated land.

Three points are clear. The challenge before us is to secure a share of global income in proportion to our share in the global population. Two, the US economy is in the sunset phase while that of China is in the sunrise phase. Three, the US has made about 26 wars in the last 100 years and stands against our economic interests today.

In regard to China, we should take lessons from Germany and France. Germany had occupied France during the Second World War but today they are close allies. If we befriend the US, we can get more advanced technologies but it is uncertain how long this will sustain; and we will have to tow the US line and sacrifice our economic interests.

On the other hand, if we befriend China, we can benefit from the symbiosis between China's manufacturing and India's services. The caveat is that friendship survives only between equals. Thus we must set our house in order; impose heavy import duties on Chinese goods; strengthen our own research capabilities and then make arm's-length friendship with China.

Protecting refugee children in Covid era

the Za'atari refugee camp in Jordan, had been regularly attending school before the Jordanian authorities introduced a necessary lockdown to combat the spread of Covid-19. "When the coronavirus appeared, they shut down all the classrooms and we didn't have teachers we could interact with anymore," Taima'a says. "I was starting to do charity work with (refugee) children with cancer, but that was put on hold."

Refugees like Taima'a have been hard hit by the pandemic. These children have long suffered multiple deprivations: they were forced to flee wars and emergencies, sometimes without family, and are struggling to survive with no familiar comforts. And now Covid-19 is exacerbating their hardships.

Even previously, only half of the world's refugee children of primary-school age were receiving formal education, and only 22 per cent of children of lower-secondary-school age were. Moreover, children living in extreme poverty are vulnerable to forced labour and trafficking, putting them at further risk of being out of school.

Lack of access to formal education is just one of the many

old Syrian refugee living in Healthcare and sanitation were already inadequate. And now, starvation is a far greater threat than the pandemic itself, as recent warnings and budget cuts by the UN World Food Programme (WFP) and the Food and Agriculture Organisation have stated. Today, 80 per cent of refugees live in countries that are not equipped to support them. Turkey is home to 3.7 million refugees, while Uganda, Pakistan, and Sudan together host almost four million. Jordan and Lebanon have long been home to refugees, who account for almost one-third of each country's population. Because over half of the world's 26 million refugees are children – some 300,000 of whom are unaccompanied - defending their rights is a vast challenge.

We are working on the ground with youth activists from the 100 Million Campaign for children's rights, who are continuing their efforts despite Covid-19. They include Seme Ludanga Faustino, a South Sudanese refugee who in 2017 co-founded the youth-led organisation I CAN South Sudan in the Bidibidi refugee camp in Uganda. home to the world's biggest concentration of unaccompanied minors. Faustino's organisation,

provide trauma relief to unaccompanied children, now distributes soap and is conducting home visits to teach them how to remain safe from Covid-19.

Against this background, rich nations are behaving shamefully. While spending trillions of dollars to mitigate the effects of Covid-19 on their economies, they are not helping countries with large refugee and displaced populations. In April, a funding shortfall led WFP to announce a 30 per cent cut in food rations it distributes to 1.4 million refugees in Uganda. Even a small fraction of the pandemic bailout funds so far made available in Europe and the US, if diverted, could save the lives of tens of thousands of refugees. We urge governments to fill the gaps in financing for refugees and displaced persons, and ensure that the most marginalised populations receive their fair share of the Covid-19 response. For this, a global social protection fund be set up, to be made available to every child who qualifies for support, including refugees. Canceling the debt owed in 2020 and 2021 by low-income countries that house refugee populations could also have a huge impact. Creditor countries are

> Yet, what next? We call on European leaders to ensure every refugee child on EU territory is guaranteed the rights enshrined in European legal frameworks. Since 2010, thousands of unaccompanied refugee children have gone missing from Europe, with many having likely fallen victim to trafficking. Every refugee child also must have access to quality education. Jordan, for example, has successfully provided refugee families with cash transfers to ensure that their children go to school. But more than 75 million children urgently need educational support. Governments must fill the current \$8.5 billion financing gap in this area so that children can enjoy their fundamental right to learn. It has never been more important for the world to stand behind refugees, especially refugee children.

New Delhi, July 17: A government-appointed commission promoting the rights of India's religious minorities said police failed to protect Muslims campaigning against a new citizenship law during violent riots in Delhi this year.

At least 53 people, mostly Muslims, were killed and more than 200 were injured in the worst communal violence in the Indian capital for decades.

The clashes erupted amid an outcry over a new federal law laying out the path to citizenship for six religious groups from neighbouring countries except Muslims. Critics said the law was discriminatory and flouted India's secular constitution.

The Delhi Minorities Commission (DMC) said Muslim homes, shops and vehicles were selectively targeted during the rioting that erupted in northeast Delhi in February when protests against the new Citizenship Amendment Act (CAA) broke out across the country.

In all, 11 mosques, five madrasas or religious schools, a Muslim shrine and a graveyard were attacked and damaged, a team from the commission said the report released Thursday.

Recommendations made in the commission's report to safeguard minority rights are not binding.

"Seemingly, to crush the protests, with support of the administration and police, a retaliatory plan of pro-CAA protesters was worked out to trigger violence at a large

The commission said police had charged Muslims for the violence even though they were the worst victims. Delhi police spokesman Anil Mittal rejected the allegation of bias and said the police had acted fairly. "We have filed 752 first information reports, over 200 chargesheets, arrested over 1400 people in connection with the riots. We have also formed three special investigation teams and are still open to receiving complaints,' Mittal said.

Critics of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) government say it has been promoting a Hindu-first India and that the citizenship law aimed to further marginalise the country's 170 million Muslims.

The BJP denies any bias but says it is opposed to the appeasement of

any community.

The report also alleged some senior BJP leaders like former member of Delhi legislative assembly Kapil Mishra of fuelling the February 23 violence, but the party spokesperson said there was no basis of such allegations.

"When Delhi Police has already stated in court that there is no role proved of Kapil Mishra, then on what grounds DMC is saying this," BJP spokesperson Harish Khurana said. The minorities commission said witness spoke of police failure to intervene in the rioting.

"Multiple testimonies collected by this Fact-Finding Committee recount reports of police inaction even as violence unfolded before them, or of police not arriving despite being called re-

'Lockdown no solution to control virus'

Bangalore, July 17: Karnataka Chief Minister BS Yediyurappa Friday said lockdown is not the solution for controlling COVID-19 and made it clear that there was no proposal before the government to extend it in Bangalore.

Bangalore urban and rural areas are currently under "complete lockdown" since 8 pm of July 14 and it will be effective till 5 am July 22.

With the spike in cases, speculations were rife that the current lockdown is likely to be extended for 15 days, as that much time is required to break the chain.

Lockdown is not the solution to control COVID. There is no proposal before the government to extend the lockdown," Yediyurappa was quoted as saying by his office in a release.

The Chief Minister Friday chaired a meeting with Ministers who have been made in-charge of eight zones in the city and officials regarding the COVID-19 situation in Bangalore.

Earlier too, July 13, the eve of the lockdown, Yediyurappa had said the government did not plan to extend it in Bangalore urban and rural districts, and had appealed to the people to cooperate by not paying heed to rumours.

Cybercriminals ramp up attacks on home routers

Bangalore, July 17: Increase in attacks targeting and leveraging routers will continue as cybercriminals are able to easily monetise these infections in secondary attacks, warns a new report by global cybersecurity company Trend Micro.

The research revealed an increase from October 2019 onwards routers, in which attackers use automated software to try common password combinations.

The number of attempts increased nearly tenfold, from around 23 million in September to nearly 249 million attempts in December 2019. As recently as March 2020. Trend Micro recorded almost 194 million brute force logins.

At its peak, in mid-March 2020, nearly 16,000 devices attempted to open telnet sessions with other IoT devices in a single week, said the report titled "Caught in the Crossfire: Defending Devices From Battling

This trend is concerning for several reasons. Cybercriminals are competing with each other to compromise as many routers as possile so they can be conscripted into botnets.

These are then sold on under ground sites either to launch Distributed Denial of Service (DDoS) attacks, or as a way to anonymise other attacks such as click fraud, data theft and account takeover, said the report.

To avoid such attacks, Trend Micro suggested several measures. It said that users should make sure the router is running the latest firmware.

Moreover, it is important to use a strong password and change it from time to time. The company urged users to check logs to find behaviour that does not make sense for the network. Users should only allow logins to the router from the local network, it said.

Recoveries 6 times higher than active cases in Delhi

New Delhi, July 17: With 1,462 new coronavirus cases and 26 deaths in the last 24 hours, the national capital recorded a total tally of 1,20,107 cases and 3,571 deaths as Friday. According to the Delhi

government's daily health bulletin, as many as 99,301 people have recovered, almost six times the number of active cases which stand at 17,235. A total of 1,608 patients recovered in the last 24 hours

June 23, the city had witnessed the highest single-day peak of 3,947 cases, but the number has come down steadily since then despite the number of tests increasing.

Testing numbers in the city have also gone up since the commencement of rapid antigen tests last

month. Over 6,270 RT-PCR, CB-NAAT and TrueNat tests and 14,194 rapid antigen Covid-19 tests were conducted Friday

Currently, 3,696 beds are occupied in the hospitals out of a total capacity of 15,474 beds, 2,304 in the dedicated Covid

Care Centres out of 9.284 beds and 178 in the dedicated Covid Health Centres as against the availability of 554 beds. A total of 9,595 people are under home iso-

lation.

The number of containment zones in the national capital stood at 668. Last week, the number of containment zones increased by more than 150 after the city government decided to break existing hotspots into smaller clusters for better surveillance.

New Delhi, July 17: The Delhi government's psychiatric tele-counselling service, 'Samarthan', for doctors, healthcare and frontline workers battling against the COVID-19 pandemic, is struggling hard to find takers just within a month of its launch. On an average, the number of people calling the helpline service for the counselling is less than one in a day.

In the last 30 days, only 20 people have availed the service. As per records, 12 doctors are volunteering to provide the tele-counselling. This means no counsellor has attended even two calls in the whole month. The officials stated that a number of factors were behind the inadequate response the helpline has received. The stigma attached to seeking mental help and insufficient publicity of the service are significant reasons restricting people from availing the service.

The service was launched June 17 in collaboration with the Institute of Human Behaviour and Allied



DOCTORS SUFFER AS VIRUS CASES HIT 1 MN

Greater Noida, July 17: In suffocating full protective gear inside an intensive care unit with no air conditioning, doctor Showkat Nazir Wani is risking his life battling brutal heat and treating coronavirus patients.

Almost 100 doctors in India have died since the pandemic began, working punishingly long hours in temperatures that can top 40 degrees Celsius. "Wearing this PPE kit at the temperature of 40 degrees, it's very difficult, I can say because you are drenched in sweat. Still, (we try) to do our best to save the lives of patients," Wani, a resident doctor at the private Sharda Hospital in Greater Noida outside New Delhi,

"It feels very hot and suffocating. But we have to wear it for our own safety," the 29-year-old said before rushing to attend to a patient battling a lung collapse. India Friday hit a million coronavirus cases, the third-highest total in the world, with no sign yet of the infection curve flattening as new cases emerge in rural areas. More than 25,000 people have died.

The country has some of the lowest per capita health care spend-

ing in the world and poorly paid staff working in dilapidated state hospitals is highly vulnerable. The Indian Medical Association, a voluntary group of doctors which says

99 physicians have died so far, this

week issued a "red alert".

"Doctors need to take charge of the situation and ensure the safety of themselves, their families, their colleagues and staff," it said in a statement. Sharda Hospital has been providing free treatment to COVID-19 patients under instructions from the state government, which means facilities are basic and many patients are poor.

Not all patients are in hospital gowns. One was on a bed wearing a bedraggled T-shirt with bloodstains. Because there is no air conditioning, doctors and nurses are quickly drenched in sweat. Since they are enveloped head-to-foot in plastic protective gear, the sweat

can't evaporate to cool them down.

And as going to the toilet means removing all the gear and then putting a new set, some staff skimp on drinking enough water. Nausea and dizziness can sometimes ensue, and in the long term the staff can risk serious problems including organ damage.

Abhishek Deshwal, who heads the hospital's intensive care unit, said working in such heat while wearing the body suits was "doubly stressful for the staff". "But we are trying to do our best, we don't have

any other option." Some staff have quit or gone on long leave, forcing the government to rope in medical students and even retired staff. The virus has also affected their relationships with families, and some have admitted being weighed down mentally.

Wani, for instance, has not seen his family based in Kashmir since the outbreak began in March. As a resident doctor, he is on "Covid call" 24/7, and has hardly had any time to socialise. New Delhi, July 17: Amid a spike in the number of novel coronavirus cases in Bihar, a delegation of opposition parties Friday approached the ECI and urged for "proactive approach" to priorities the health and well-being of Bihar's people as well as of the spirit of democracy.

The parties urged the Election Commission of India (ECI) to evolve a mechanism that "protects both the health of the democracy as well as of the people", as they sought to know how the panel planned to ensure a majority of voters exercised their franchise amid social distancing norms. These parties also urged the poll panel to review and reassess the situation in consultation with public health experts and other stakeholders. The elections for the 243-member Assembly will be due in October-November.

The opposition party leaders, including Congress' Shaktisinh Gohil, Rashtriya Janata Dal's (RJD) Manoj Kumar Jha, D. Raja of CPI, Dipankar Bhattacharya of CPI-M, Unendra Kushwaha of Rashtriya Lok Samata Party (RLSP), Dipak

Jvoti of Hindustani Awam Morcha (HAM), Arjun Raj of Loktantrik Janata Dal (LJD) and Rajiv Mishra of Vikasheel Insaan Party (VIP), met with Chief Election Commissioner Sunil Arora and submitted a memorandum on the issue.

In a memorandum to the poll panel, the parties said: "The people of Bihar are eagerly waiting for the elections to get rid of a government formed against the mandate as well as for the dismal failure on all fronts...." It said that there were questions on people's mind since out of a population of over 13 crore, 7.5 crore are voters.

"How does the Election Commission plan to ensure physical distancing of at least two feet recommended by the WHO and the ICMR and advocated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi?" it said. The memorandum also pointed out that people need clarity so that a wholesome participation of a majority of voters is not adversely impacted. "People also expect the commission to ensure and satisfy the people that the entire poll exercise does not become a super spreader (of coronavirus)," it said.

Varanasi's new holy offering

Varanasi, July 17: Everything is prohibited or curtailed during the ongoing corona pandemic as are congregations at religious places. However, masks as an offering to God at temples in the holy city of Kashi is the new normal.

It is believed that the way dupattas, clothes, etc are offered at the Devasthans with a pure mind, similarly the masks given as holy offerings at temples will protect the devotees against coronavirus. In Varanasi's Laksa Mangaleshwar Mahadev Missir Pokhara temple, social worker Chandresh Narayan Pandey offers masks as obeisance to God and distributes 100 masks to visitors every day.

Pandey said, "At present, the country is reeling under a pandemic. It is up to us to make people aware of the scourge until a cure is found. People revere the of-



ferings to God based on mythological beliefs. The more you offer the more you are rewarded. We have, therefore, started the auspicious work of distributing 100 masks every day at the temple in the holy month of Shrayan.'

Till the pandemic is over, he added, masks would be distributed to the needy every day after offering them to the temple. Those who pay obeisance to Lord Shiva in the temple are exhorted to wear masks. However, those who are not wearing a mask are provided one in the form of a holy offering.

Periyar statue desecrated in TN

Coimbatore/Chennai, July 17: A statue of social reformer Periyar E. V. Ramasamy was found daubed with saffron hued paint at Coimbatore Friday and a youth belonging to a fringe pro-Hindu outfit has surrendered in this connection, police said.

Chief Minister K Palaniswami, meanwhile assured of tough action. "Stringent action will be taken as per law. I have instructed the police to take appropriate action and bring the culprits to book," he said at Erode. After the incident came to light, workers of DMK, MDMK and VCK protested demanding action and parties, including AIADMK and DMK, strongly condemned the desecration. Police said a young man in his twenties, Arun Krishnan, who is the Coimbatore south district organiser of Bharat Sena, has surrendered.

GRANT OF REMISSION TO CONVICTS BY STATES

New Delhi, July 17: Can a state government frame a policy, irrespective of the gravity of the crime committed, for the release of a life-term convict prematurely before completing 14 years in jail? The Supreme Court Friday asked the Chief Justice to constitute a Constitution Bench to consider this issue.

Article 161 empowers the Governor to commute, remit and pardon the sentence of a convict. while Section 433A of the CrPC says there is no scope for any pardon or remission for a person, convicted of a crime which involves the death sentence as the maximum punishment.

Therefore, a larger bench will examine the issue whether before completing 14 years in jail, can a policy by a state government allow the release of a convict,



and also could this remission be granted in a blanket fashion.

A three-judge bench comprising Justices U U Lalit, Mohan M Shantanagoudar and Vineet Saran, framing the question, said "Whether in exercise of power conferred under Article 161 of the Constitution a policy can be framed, where under certain norms or postulates are laid down, on the satisfaction of which the benefit of remission can thereafter be granted by the Executive

"The modalities adopted in the present matter, however, unmistakably, show that the individual facts and circumstances of the case were not even placed before the Governor", noted the top court.

MP, Bihar, Telangana most vulnerable to Covid: Study

New Delhi, July 17: Districts in Madhya Pradesh may be the most vulnerable to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, followed by those in Bihar and Telangana, according to a study in The Lancet journal which assessed several key indicators like housing, hygiene, and the health system in these states.

According to scientists, including Rajib Acharya from the Population Council, New Delhi, vulnerability in the research means the risk of

large states -- Madhya Pradesh, Bihar and Telangana, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh, Maharashtra, West Bengal and Gujarat -- have high vulnerability to be impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

It rated the vulnerabilities of the states to the pandemic on a scale from zero to one, measured using 15 indicators across five domains -- socioeconomic, demographic, housing and hygiene, epidemiological, and health system.

"Our index aims to help planners and policy makers effectively

Lukung (Ladakh), July 17: On a visit to Ladakh, Defence Minister Rajnath Singh Friday hoped the ongoing talks would resolve the border standoff with China but said he cannot guarantee the extent of success, and asserted that no power in the world can touch even an inch of India's land.

Addressing the Army and ITBP jawans at a forward post in Lukung, Singh said if there is an attempt to hurt the self-respect of India, then it will not be tolerated and will be given a "befitting reply"

'Whatever progress has been made in the talks, there should be a resolution of the matter. But to what extent it will be resolved, I cannot guarantee. However, I would like to assure that no power in the world can touch even one inch of India's land, nobody can occupy it," the defence minister said at the post located on the banks of the Pangong Tso lake in eastern Ladakh.



Indian and Chinese troops are locked in a bitter standoff in multiple locations in eastern Ladakh for over eight weeks since May 5. The tension escalated manifold after the violent clashes in Galwan Valley.

Singh said the best thing would be for the matter to be resolved through talks and the process was underway at both the military and diplomatic level.

'We are proud of the Indian Army. I am feeling proud to be

among the soldiers. Our soldiers have given their lives. 130 crore Indians are saddened by it," he said. India is the only country in the

world that has given the message of

peace to the whole world, he added. "We have never attacked anv country, nor have we occupied the land of any country. India has given the message of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam (the world is one fam-

ily)," the defence minister said.
"Now our India is not a weak

India. India has strong leadership. We have got a prime minister like Narendra Modi. We have got a prime minister who can take decisions,' Singh asserted.

He also paid tributes to the brave soldiers who guarded the borders of India by risking their lives in the Kargil war. Singh arrived in Leh on a daylong visit, accompanied by Chief of Defence Staff General Bipin Rawat and Army Chief General MM Naravane. Following a series of diplomatic

and military talks, India and China have begun a mutual disengagement process at most of the friction points on the Line of Actual Control(LAC) in eastern Ladakh on July 6. China and India are committed to "complete disengagement" of troops, and the process is "intricate" that requires "constant verification", the Indian Army had said Thursday after the fourth round of marathon military talks for further de-escalation of tension

'No need for CBI probe in Sushant death case'

Nagpur, July 17: There was no need for a CBI probe into the death case of Hindi film industry actor Sushant Singh Rajput as the Mumbai police were capable of handling the matter, said Maharashtra Home Minister Anil Deshmukh Friday.

The police were also examining the angle of "business rivalry" in the case, he said. Rajput, 34, was found dead in his Bandra apartment in Mumbai June 14 and what the police claimed was a case of suicide. In the initial investigation, the Mumbai police had found that the actor was under medication for depression.

Rajput's friend, actor Rhea Chakraborty Thursday in a tweet, demanded a CBI inquiry to understand what "pressures" prompted Rajput to take the extreme step of

suicide. Chakraborty said though she has "complete faith" in the government, a CBI inquiry would help bring justice to the case.

Talking to PTI. Deshmukh said the Mumbai police were conducting a detailed inquiry into the actor's death and also recording statements of people concerned.

"There was no need to give the case to the CBI. Our police officials are capable and doing the inquiry in right way. We are also examining the angle of business rivalry," said Deshmukh. So far, the police have recorded the statements of more than two dozen people, including Chakraborty, filmmaker Sanjay Leela Bhansali, Hindi film industry casting director Mukesh Chhabra and Rajput's family members, as part of probe into the suicide, which iolted the Hindi film industry.

Another Congress MLA resigns in MP

Bhopal: Days after the resignation of Pradyuman Singh Lodhi, another Congress MLA in Madhya Pradesh resigned from the Assembly Friday. Sumitra Devi Kasdekar, who represents Nepanagar in Burhanpur district, submitted her resignation in person to pro-tem Speaker Rameshwar Sharma in the afternoon. "I have accepted the resignation of the Nepanagar MLA as she insisted on resigning even after being given time to think over it, Speaker Sharma said.

Assam flood kills 5 more

Guwahati: Five more people died in flood-related incidents in Assam and around 36 lakh people across 28 districts are now affected, an official bulletin said Friday. One person each died in Dhubri, Darrang, Bongaigaon, Goalpara and Kamrup districts, the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA) said in its bulletin. More than 39.8 lakh people in 27 of the 33 districts in the state were affected by the deluge Thursday, it said.

5 of family killed in wall collapse

Shahjahanpur: Five persons of a family were killed and a child was injured when a wall collapsed in Wajid Khel locality of Chowk Kotwali area in Shahjahanpur district of Uttar Pradesh Friday. Shahjahanpur District Collector Indra Vikram Singh said the family of five was asleep when bricks from the wall of a neighbouring house fell on them, killing them. One child was critically injured and is undergoing treatment. Offering condolences, Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath announced ₹4 lakh compensation to the kin of the family. He ordered officials to ensure proper treatment to the injured child.

NIA arrests bank manager

Srinagar: In a breakthrough in a recent narco-terror case. the National Investigation Agency (NIA) has arrested the key accused -- a branch manager of a cooperative bank -- from Srinagar, a spokesperson of the probe agency said. Afag Ahmad Wani, a resident of Maratgam village of Handwara, is the fourth person to have been arrested after the drug syndicate operating in Jammu and Kashmir was busted last month. It led to the seizure of 21 kg of heroin and over ₹1.35 crore in cash from the syndicate members.

SC DECLINES '1 NATION-1' **BOARD PLEA**

New Delhi, July 17: The Supreme Court Friday refused to entertain a PIL seeking to explore feasibility of establishing 'One Nation One Board' by merging ICSE and CBSE to ensure uniform education to all children aged between 6-14 years, saying such "policy issues" do not fall under its "domain".

A headed by Justices D Y Chandrachud, in a hearing via video-link, told PIL petitioner and BJP leader Ashwini Upadhyay that the issue of merger of education boards cannot be decided by courts.

"The Writ Petition raises issues of policy. We are affirmatively of the view that it is not within the domain of this court under Article 32 of the Constitution to direct the constitution of a National Education Council or National Education Commission. "These are matters which fall

within the domain of experts. Similarly, the relief which has been of introducing a 'standard textbook with a chapter on the Constitution' is a matter of policy. The school syllabus contains subjects bearing on the knowledge of rights, duties and governance under the Constitution.' said the bench which also comprised Justices Indu Malhotra and K M Joseph.

"Our students are already burdened with heavy school bags on their shoulders. Why do you want to add to their burden by adding more books," the bench asked during the hearing.

Police fired at Dubey in self-defence: UP tells SC

New Delhi, July 17: The police party escorting gangster Vikas Dubey from Ujjain in Madhya Pradesh to Kanpur had to "fire back in self-defence" as he tried to escape and was killed, the Uttar Pradesh government has said in an affidavit filed in the Supreme Court.

The UP government has constituted a 3-member SIT, headed by UP additional chief secretary Sanjay Bhoosreddy July 11, to look into the crimes committed by the dreaded gangster and the alleged collusion between Dubey, police and politicians, the affidavit said.

"The only option available to the escort party, under the circumstances was to fire back in self-defence,"Uttar Pradesh Director General of Police Hitesh Chandra Awasthy, in the affidavit filed on behalf of the state, on a plea seeking a court-monitored probe by the CBI or the NIA into the encounter



killing. The top police officer denied that Dubey had surrendered at Ujjain and said that the accused who was on the run was identified at the Mahakaal Temple by the Samiti authorities as well as the policemen at the temple premises.

The DGP also dealt with the question as to why Dubey was not handcuffed and said, "There were 15 police personnel and 3 vehicles to escort the accused directly to the court at Kanpur. He had to be produced at Kanpur within 24 hours before court which deadline was expiring at 10 am July 10".

The affidavit said: "These facts are explained in detail only with one objective of satisfying this court that deceased Vikas Dubey not only had a strong reason and motive to flee away from police custody (as he attempted to do July 10) but had the capacity, potential and experience of attacking the police personnel and killing them which in fact happened July 10, when he tried to escape and fire at the police party when prevented."

On July 14, the top court had said it may consider appointing a committee headed by a former judge to inquire into the encounters of Dubey and his associates as well as the killing of eight policemen in Uttar Pradesh like it did in the case of Hyderabad encounter in gang rape and murder case of last year. Dubey July 2 had massacred eight policemen on duty and had brutally cut the circle officer's leg after shooting him dead, Awasthy said.

Maharashtra man nabbed in Rann of Kutch while trying to sneak into Pakistan to meet girlfriend

Bhuj/Mumbai, July 17: A 20year-old engineering student from Maharashtra was apprehended by the Border Security Force (BSF) in Gujarat's Rann of Kutch while he was trying to sneak into Pakistan on foot to meet a girl he had befriended on social media, officials said Friday.

The man, identified as Zishan Mohammad Siddiqui, is a resident of Khwajangar in Maharashtra's Osmanabad town, they said.

"Siddiqui was held by the BSF Thursday night and later handed over to the local police, Kutch-East Superintendent of Police, Parikshita Rathod, said.

"Police had issued an alert after a motorcycle with the Maharashtra registration number was found abandoned near Dholavira village in the Rann of Kutch Thursday evening. The BSF later nabbed the man when he was found walking towards the border in a bid to enter Pakistan," Rathod added.

According to a police official



from Maharashtra, Siddiqui had left his home in Osmanabad on a motorcycle July 11 to meet the girl in Pakistan as no means of public transport was available due to the lockdown. "He went to Kutch on his motorcycle to cross the border and enter Pakistan," he said.

According to police sources, after his motorcycle got stuck in the sand, he started walking towards Pakistan. The police official said that Siddiqui was in touch with a Pakistani girl through social media since the last few months and they were in love with each other.

Based on his mobile phone records, the cyber wing of the Osmanabad police traced his whereabouts, the official said. He was traced near Kutch and the de tails were shared with the Gujarat police, he said.

New Delhi, July 17: The COVID-19 lockdown-led reduction in air pollution levels across five Indian cities in India, including Delhi and Mumbai, may have prevented about 630 premature deaths, and saved \$690 million in health costs in the country, according to a new study.

Scientists, including those from the University of Surrey in the UK, assessed the levels of harmful fine particulate matter (PM2.5) from vehicles and other sources in five Indian cities -- Delhi, Mumbai, Kolkata, Chennai and Hyderabad -- since the beginning of the lockdown period. The study, published in the iournal Sustainable Cities and Society, compared these lockdown PM2.5 figures from 25 March up

until 11 May, with those from similar periods of the preceding five years, and found that the measure reduced pollution levels in all these

According to the scientists, during this period, the levels of these harmful air pollutants reduced by 10 per cent in Mumbai, and by up to 54 per cent in Delhi. "The percentage reduction for the other cities ranged from 24 to 32 per cent, which were slightly smaller than the measured values for Delhi and Mumbai," the scientists noted in the study.

"While the reduction in PM2.5 pollution may not be surprising, the size of the reduction should make us all take notice of the impact we have been having on the planet," said Prashant Kumar, a co-

Russia is hacking virus vaccine trials, Western countries say

Washington, July 17: Western governments Thursday accused hackers believed to be part of Russian intelligence of trying to steal valuable private information about a coronavirus vaccine, calling out the Kremlin in an unusually detailed public warning to scientists and medical companies.

The alleged culprit is a familiar foe. Intelligence agencies in the United States, United Kingdom and Canada say the hacking group APT29, also known as Cozy Bear, is attacking academic and pharma-

volved in COVID-19 vaccine development. The same group was implicated in the hacking of Democratic email accounts during the 2016 US presidential election.

It was unclear whether any useful information was stolen. But British Foreign Secretary Dominic Raab said, "It is completely unacceptable that the Russian Intelligence Services are targeting those working to combat the coronavirus pandemic." He accused Moscow of pursuing "selfish interests with reckless behavior."

Sticking to more general lan-



guage, White House press secretary Kayleigh McEnany said, "We

worked very closely with our allies to ensure that we would take measures to keep that information safe and we continue do so."

The allegation that hackers linked to a foreign government are attempting to siphon secret research during the pandemic is not entirely new US officials as recently as Thursday have accused China of similar conduct. But the latest warning was startling for the detail it provided, attributing the targeting by name to a particular hacking group and specifying the software vulnerabilities the hackers have been

Also, Russian cyberattacks strike a particular nerve in the US given the Kremlin's sophisticated campaign to influence the 2016 presidential election. And the coordination of the new warning across continents seemed designed to add heft and gravity to the announcement and to prompt the Western targets of the hackers to protect themselves.

"I think (the governments) have very specific intelligence that they can provide," said John Hultquist, senior director of analysis at Mandiant Threat Intelligence. "The report is full of specific operational information that defenders can use" to protect their net

Anniversary of world's 1st atomic test fuels nuclear debate

Albuquerque (US), July 17: Transported in the backseat of a blacked-out Plymouth sedan was the culmination of years of feverish work a hefty plutonium core that would soon be used to trigger the world's first atomic explosion. Within days of being taken in

1945 from a top secret installation in the mountains of northern New Mexico to a desert outpost more than 200 miles away, the core and other components were assembled for what was code-named the Trinity test.

Scientists weren't entirely sure whether the Gadget would work as intended or if the explosion would ignite the Earth's atmosphere or maybe lead to the evaporation of the

They found out in the early morn-

The detonation forever changed the course of history, ensuring the end of World War II and marking the dawn of the atomic age. After 75 years, the test is both revered for the scientific advancements it helped to usher in and vilified for the moral and diplomatic implications that still linger in its wake.

Lisa Gordon-Hagerty, head of the National Nuclear Security Administration, traveled to Los Alamos National Laboratory Thursday to commemorate the anniversary.

The lab is known as the birthplace of the atomic bomb where Robert Oppenheimer and a disparate collection of physicists went about untangling the theoretical and practical challenges of what came to be known as the Manhattan Project.

The immediacy of their work

was fueled by word in the late 1930s that German chemists had discovered fission through their work with uranium and that the possibility of the Nazis setting up nuclear chain reactions had become more real and could lead to the con struction of bombs.

A group of scientists that included Albert Einstein pressed then US President Franklin D. Roosevelt about the importance of the United

States getting the jump on Germany. Gordon-Hagerty, a self-described science and history geek, said she often has thought about what it would have been like to stand in Oppenheimer's shoes the morning of the Trinity test.

From uranium miners, truck drivers and government workers to those living in communities near test sites, thousands were exposed over the years to radiation that resulted in cancer, birth defects and other illnesses.

Members of New Mexico's congressional delegation say radiation exposure has disproportionately affected minority communities, including those in the shadow of that first test. They lawmakers have been pushing to expand the federal government's compensation programme to include downwinders in Tularosa Basin.

Tina Cordova, a cancer survivor and co-founder of the Tularosa Basin Downwinders Consortium, says many people who lived near the Trinity Site weren't told it involved an atomic weapon until the US dropped bombs on the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki and World War II ended.

"It's horribly disheartening and unforgivable to be relegated to nothingness, like we don't count for anything, while other people are being taking care of," she said, accusing the federal government of looking the other way for decades.

Cordova and others also have concerns about New Mexico's continued ties to nuclear research, bomb making and the resulting waste, saying the state already has made enough sacrifices for the good of the country.

China moves rocket into place for its 1st Mars mission

Beijing, July 17: China has moved a rocket into position to launch a rover to Mars in one of three upcoming missions to the red planet, one from the US and another by the United Arab Emirates.

The Long March-5 carrier rocket is China's heaviest-lift launch vehicle and has been used experimentally three times, but never with a payload. Dubbed Tianwen-1, China's first mission to Mars aims to land a rover to gather scientific data.

The rocket is due to blast off from the Wenchang Space Launch Center in the southern island province of Hainan in late July or early August, according to state media reports Friday that quoted the China National Space Administration.

The mission is one of the most ambitious yet for China's space program, which has advanced rapidly since launching its first crewed mission in 2003. Since then, it has sent astronauts to an experimental space station, begun work on a larger, more permanent facility and landed a probe on the lessexplored far side of the moon.

This summer's trio of missions is the most sweeping effort yet to seek signs of ancient microscopic life while scouting out Mars for fu-

ture astronauts. The timelines for such missions are daunting and the countries involved are striving to take best advantage of a one-month window in which Mars and Earth are in ideal alignment on the same side of the sun, minimising travel time and fuel use. Such a window opens only once every 26 months.

Preparations have continued amid the coronavirus outbreak, which in part prompted Europe and Russia to drop their plans to send a life-seeking rover to Mars this summer.

Each spacecraft will travel more than 480 million kilometers before reaching Mars next February.

New Delhi, July 17: The Indian industry has a delayed recovery in comparison to other countries, but the FMCG sector has touched the pre-COVID-19 level sales in June primarily helped by a rebound in rural consumption and sales from traditional channels, said data analytics firm Nielsen Friday.

According to Nielsen, both urban and rural sales are growing but the recovery/sales from the undeveloped semi-urban/rural quarters are much faster and traditional trade channels as neighbourhood and Kirana stores have scored over modern trade outlets as retail outlets and hypermarkets.

Compared with other global markets such as China, Malaysia, Indonesia and Thailand, the industry in India has witnessed a delayed growth recovery due to extended lockdowns, said Nielsen President - South Asia Prasun Basu.

'Though it has taken three months, we are kind of coming back to the levels, which we had left behind at the end of last year and the beginning of this year Q1 period. If that was 100 in the index, then today we are at 98, which is almost recovered. Good news is that it is a clear recovery but a slowish recovery," said Basu.

Sources said that in 695 cases positive reports have been received from CGST formations that have found their suppliers to have availed ineligible ITC. Out of these, in 461 cases of IGST refund /drawback amounting to ₹273 crore is under suspension.

These risky suppliers have been shared with jurisdictional field formations for their physical/financial verification and to verify the ineligible ITC availed by them.

New Delhi, July 17: Future economic policies need to be tailored towards supporting the economy, depending on how effects of pandemic play out, RBI executive director M Rajeshwar Rao said Friday. He said the first set of responses from the Reserve Bank of India (RBD) was to ensure that the markets continue to function and ensure solvency in the financial sector.

Several measures, including reduction in Cash Reserve Ratio, special finance facility, Long Term Repo Operations (LTRO) and Targeted Long Term Repo Operations (TLTRO) were announced, he said at a webinar organised by Assocham. As a result of various measures,

he said, the RBI injected around ₹6.5 lakh crore liquidity in the banking system during the pandemic.

Going forward, he said, "We need to see how the impact is going to be there on the economic activities of the various players, and once we get a fix on this issue perhaps the policy responses could be appropriately tailored. We have to see how the situation evolves and based on evolving situation the policies

could be suitably modified to address concerns"

Emphasising that the world and India will not remain in the grip of COVID-19 forever, he said, "not in a distinct future this pandemic will end through combination treatment, vaccination and achievement of herd immunity. 

Madrid clinched their 34th Spanish league title — and first since 2017 — after extending their perfect run following the pandemic break with a 2-1 win over Villarreal Thursday, opening a seven-point gap to second-place Barcelona with one round to go.

Barcelona lost to 10man Osasuna at the Camp

Benzema scored twice to give Madrid their 10th consecutive league victory. It was the only team with a perfect record after the coronavirus-enforced break, having trailed Barcelona by two points before the league was halted.

Zidane quit as Madrid coach in 2018 after leading the team to three straight Champions League titles, then returned less than a year later with the team floundering. In his first full season back in charge, Madrid wrested the league title away from Barcelona for the first time in three

Messi blasts 'weak' team

than we were and it seems we have to fall behind to react like we tried to do in the second half," the Argentine lamented.

"I said it some time ago, that playing like this we had no chance of winning the Champions League, and it turns out we didn't even have enough to win la Liga," Messi said. "We need to take a breather, let some air in, and clean out minds of all that has happened

since December. Barcelona must regroup for the second leg of its Champions League round of 16 match against Napoli August 8. The first leg finished 1-1 in Italy. "Playing like this we will lose against Napoli," Messi said. "We have to start from zero in the CL and blame ourselves for what went wrong," he
