FRESH SKIRMISH AT LAC LIKELY

New Delhi, Sept 8: Around 40 to 50 PLA soldiers, armed with spears and other sharp-edged weapons as well as guns, came just a few metres from the Indian position on the heights north of Rezang La in eastern Ladakh, and are likely to make a fresh attempt to dislodge the Indian soldiers, sources said Tuesday.

The fresh incident comes a day after Monday’s skirmish where Chinese People’s Liberation Army troops indulged in provocative military movements and also fired shots to intimidate Indian soldiers, as per the Indian Army. China, too, accused India of doing the same.

With tensions escalating again, the Indian security brass held several rounds of deliberations. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh met top security officials, and was also briefed by Army chief, General Manoj Mukund Naravane, about the emerging situation. Monday’s incident took place near

Shenpao mountain close to Rezang La on the south bank of Pangong Tso (lake). The Indian Army, in a statement, said that China continues to “undertake provocative activities to escalate” the situation at the border and it was the PLA troops who “fired a few rounds in the air” in an attempt to intimidate Indian troops.

“At no stage has the Indian Army transgressed across the LAC or resorted to use of any aggressive means,

including firing,” Indian Army spokesperson, Col Aman Anand said.

The army stated that it is the Chinese side that has been “blatantly violating agreements and carrying out aggressive manoeuvres, while engagement at the military, diplomatic and political level is in progress”. “In the instant case on September 7, 2020, it was the PLA troops who were attempting to close-in with one of our forward positions along the LAC and when dissuaded by

own troops, the PLA troops fired a few rounds in the air in an attempt to intimidate own troops,” Col Anand said. However, despite the grave provocation, Indian troops “exercised great restraint and behaved in a mature and responsible manner”, he added. “The Indian Army is committed to maintaining peace and tranquility, however; it is also determined to protect national integrity and sovereignty at all costs. The statement from the (PLA’s) Western Theatre Command is a bid to mislead their domestic audience.”

On Monday, the Chinese Army issued a statement that the Indian Army “blatantly fired threats” to the patrol of the Chinese border guards who had made a representation, and these border guards were forced to take “countermeasures to stabilise the situation on the ground”. The Indian Army has occupied crucial heights in areas around the south bank of Pangong lake and the Chinese have made several attempts to dislodge the Indian troops from these positions.

PLA CONFIRMS FIVE MISSING YOUTHS FOUND

New Delhi, Sept 8: China’s People’s Liberation Army has confirmed that five youths missing from Arunachal Pradesh have been found by them and their handing over process to Indian authorities is being worked out, Union minister Kiren Rijiju said Tuesday.

The five youths had gone missing Friday from the Sino-Indian border in the Upper Subansiri district of Arunachal Pradesh. “China’s PLA has responded to the hotline message sent by Indian Army. They have confirmed that the missing youths from Arunachal Pradesh have been found by their side. Further modalities to hand-over the persons to our authority is being worked out,” Rijiju tweeted.

Rijiju, the Minister of State for Youth Affairs & Sports, hails from Arunachal Pradesh and is an MP from the state. The incident of five missing youths came to light when two members from their group, who had gone for hunting in the jungle together, returned home and informed the families of the five that they had been whisked away by the Chinese troops from Sera-7, an Army patrol zone located about 12 km further north of Nacho.

Nacho is the last administrative circle along the McMahon Line and is around 120 km from the district headquarters Daporijo. Those who were allegedly kidnapped by the Chinese army have been identified as Toch Singkam, Prasat Ringling, Dongtu Ebiya, Tanu Baker and Ngaru Diri.

On Monday, China brushed off questions over the whereabouts of the five youths and needed India, saying it has never recognised Arunachal Pradesh which it claims is part of south Tibet.

“China’s position on the east sector of the China-India boundary, or Zangnan (the southern part of China’s Xizang (Tibet)), is consistent and clear,” Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Zhao Lijian told a media briefing in Beijing.

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Security provided to Varsha as she claims risk to life

Cuttack, Sept 8: Based on actress Varsha Priyadarshini’s FIR at Purighat police station in Cuttack, the police Tuesday summoned two youths who allegedly clicked photos from the bedroom of the actress when she was eating food Monday Police Tuesday provided security to Varsha after she complained of threat to her life.

The two youths have been identified as Sujit Dalei and Khagendra. Sujit is said to be a close friend and political associate of Varsha’s estranged husband and Kendrapara BJD MP Anubhav Mohanty. Details of Khagendra are yet to be known.

Notably, the two youths allegedly entered her bedroom and clicked photos and shot a video while she was having food. Following the incident, Varsha dialled police helpline number (100) and sought protection.

Varsha had Saturday filed a case under Section 12 of the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act against the BJD MP for allegedly assaulting and harassing her.

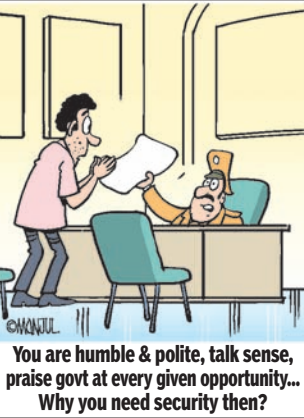


Instead of lodging any complaint with the police, Varsha had approached the Sub Divisional Judicial Magistrate (SDJM) court here in a criminal miscellaneous case against Anubhav under section 12 of the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act.

On the other hand, it was revealed that Anubhav had filed a divorce petition at Delhi’s Patiala Court back in July.

In his 47-page petition, the MP said that he wants to get a divorce on grounds that his wife has not allowed him to have physical relations with her during eight years of their marriage though she does not suffer from any physical disability.

SOPs for partial school reopening

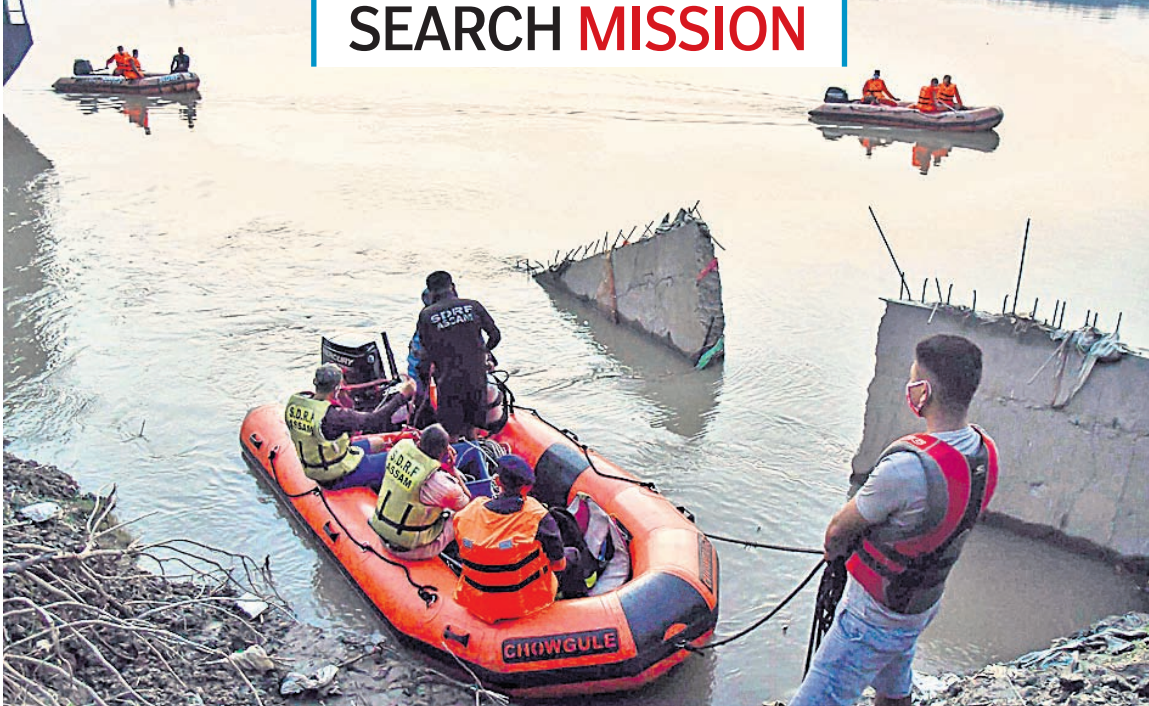

Economy to contract 10.5 pc in FY21: Fitch

New Delhi, Sept 8: Fitch Ratings Tuesday slashed India’s FY21 growth projection to (-) 10.5 per cent, from (-) 5 per cent estimated earlier, saying the continued spread of the virus and imposition of sporadic shutdowns across the country has disrupted economic activity.

In the first quarter of current fiscal India’s gross domestic product (GDP) contracted by a massive 23.9 per cent. Fitch said India recorded one of the sharpest GDP contractions in the world in the April-June quarter, but noted that growth should rebound strongly in the July-September period amid reopening of the economy. However, there are signs that the recovery has been sluggish and uneven, it said.

In its September update of Global Economic Outlook (GEO), Fitch said, the deepest recessions were

in India, the UK and Spain, countries that saw particularly large shocks in daily mobility data on visits to retail and recreation venues, and where lockdowns were stringent and long-lasting throughout 2Q20 (April-June).

It said multiple challenges are holding back recovery, both in the short and medium term. “New cases of the coronavirus continue to increase, forcing some states and union territories to re-tighten curbs... The continued spread of the virus and the imposition of shutdowns across the country depress sentiment and disrupt economic activity,” Fitch said. It noted that the severe fall in activity has also damaged household and corporate incomes and balance sheets, amid limited fiscal support. Also a looming deterioration in asset quality in the financial sector will hold back credit provision.

NCB arrests Rhea Chakraborty

Mumbai, Sept 8: After days of intense speculation and three days of tough grilling, the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) Tuesday arrested Bollywood actress Rhea Chakraborty in connection with its ongoing probe to unravel the drugs nexus in the film industry, officials said.

Rhea has been charged under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act for her alleged role in the drugs angle that has emerged during investigation into the June 14 death of actor Sushant Singh Rajput. Rhea, who has all along pleaded innocence, was quickly whisked away for a mandatory medical test at the BrihanMumbai Municipal Corporation’s LTMG Sion Hospital.

She is likely to be presented by the NCB before a court for her remand, while her legal team prepares to get her bailed out. Reacting to the development, Rhea’s lawyer



Satish Maneshinde termed the arrest a “travesty of justice” in a scathing statement targeting the family of Sushant.

“Three central agencies hounding a single woman – just because she was in love with a drug addict, suffering from mental health issues for several years under the care of five leading psychiatrists in Mumbai, who ended up committing suicide due to consumption of illegally administered medicines and used drugs,” Maneshinde said.

Her much-anticipated arrest came a day after Rhea took time out – at the height of the NCB interrogation sessions – to hit back at the late actor’s family by lodging a po-

lice complaint against Sushant’s sister Priyanka Singh and Dr Tarun Kumar of RML Hospital in New Delhi and others, alleging forged medical prescriptions.

A Mumbai Police spokesperson said that the complaint has been lodged with Bandra Police under the Indian Penal Code and the NDPS Act, and in line with the Supreme Court orders, the case has been transferred to the CBI for investigation.

Rhea’s arrest came three days after her brother Showik Chakraborty, Sushant’s home manager Samuel Miranda, and his house helper Dipesh Sawant were arrested and sent in NCB custody till September 9 (Wednesday), besides two other drug peddlers Abdel Basit Parihar and Zaid Vilatra, who are also in NCB custody.

The NCB had earlier said that with these arrests, it hopes to “uproot the drugs citadel in Bollywood and Mumbai” amidst talk of several other Bollywood personalities coming on the agency’s radar.

EOW arrests realtor in ₹5.16 cr fraud

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: The Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of the state crime branch arrested a realtor on charge of duping several flat aspirants to the tune of ₹5 crore. The accused, Akshay Kumar Choudhury, is a resident of Forest Park here. He is one of the directors of Keshari Estates Pvt Ltd at Kharavela Nagar.

The sleuths during the probe found that the directors of the company announced a housing project comprising 30 duplexes on a plot at Pokhariput in 2008. They reportedly collected amounts varying between ₹25 lakhs and ₹55 lakhs from each of the prospective buyers as advance booking or full payment for a duplex.

However, the accused did not undertake any construction at the said plot for more than three years after getting the money from the depositors. The company also later informed the buyers that the project was abandoned as the Bhubaneswar Development Authority refused to approve the project on the pretext of non-availability of an approach road to the plot and other allied problems. It was ascertained during the probe that the accused had not sought any approval from the BDA.

Subsequently, the directors again announced the launch of another project (Keshar Plaza) at Jadupur under Khandagiri police limits in 2013. The company promised to give 44 duplexes and triplexes to investors. The prospective buyers, who had invested in the earlier project, also deposited additional amounts for the fresh project at Jadupur.

RPI(A) will protect Kangana in Mumbai: Athawale

Mumbai, Sept 8: RPI(A) workers will provide protection to actress Kangana Ranaut when she reaches Mumbai, Union Minister Ramdas Athawale said Tuesday. The actress is locked in a bitter war of words with the ruling Shiv Sena over her comments on the Mumbai Police after the death of actor Sushant Singh Rajput.

After Sena MP Sanjay Raut reportedly asked Ranaut not to return to Mumbai for comparing the city to Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (Pok), the actress had dared anybody to stop her when she reaches here

September 9. “RPI (A) workers have geared up to protect Ranaut who is scheduled to reach Mumbai Wednesday. Our party workers will offer protection to her at the airport as well as at her residence,” Athawale said in a statement.

Athawale’s party is an ally of the BJP in the Centre and in Maharashtra. Earlier, Sena MLA Pratap Sarnaik had issued a slap threat after the actress dared anyone to stop her when she returns to Mumbai. The Centre Monday decided to provide Y-plus category security to the actress.

While lashing out at the Sena-led Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) gov-



ernment, Athawale said, “Ranaut did not criticise the Mumbai city but the state government. It’s against the democratic principles to oppose her right to live here on the grounds of her critical remarks against the government. She has all the rights



to live here in Mumbai”. The Union minister also claimed that Ranaut had thanked him for offering her protection in Mumbai. “Shiv Sena spokesperson Sanjay Raut shouldn’t have threatened the actress over her right to live in Mumbai,” he added.

Heat mounts on ‘QUEEN’

MUMBAI: Already under fire over her remarks on Mumbai, trouble mounted for actress Kangana Ranaut as the Maharashtra government Tuesday said the police will probe allegations that she took drugs, while alterations made at her bungalow here came under the civic scanner. Home Minister Anil Deshmukh said the Mumbai police will probe allegations by actor Adhyayan Suman that Ranaut took drugs. Talking to reporters here, Deshmukh said Adhyayan, the son of veteran actor Shekhar Suman, was once in a relationship with Ranaut and he had alleged that she used to take drugs.

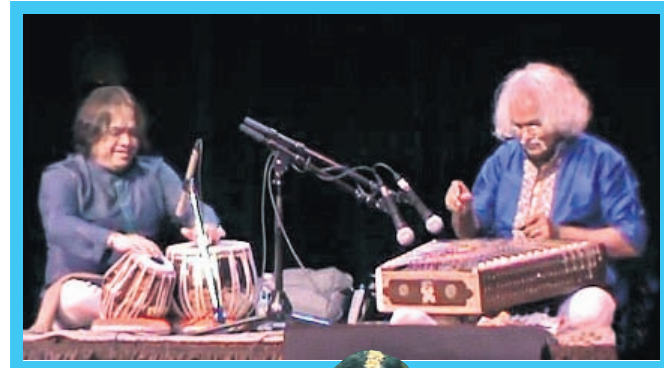


Valasini Natyam, santoor strains wow virtual audience

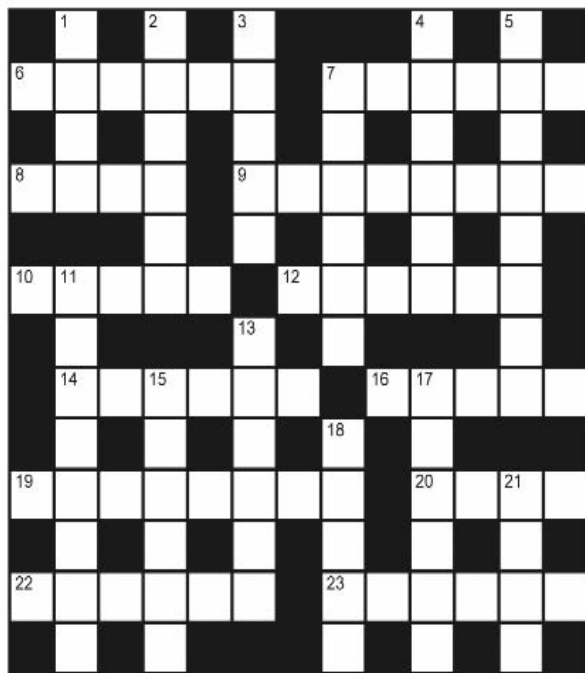

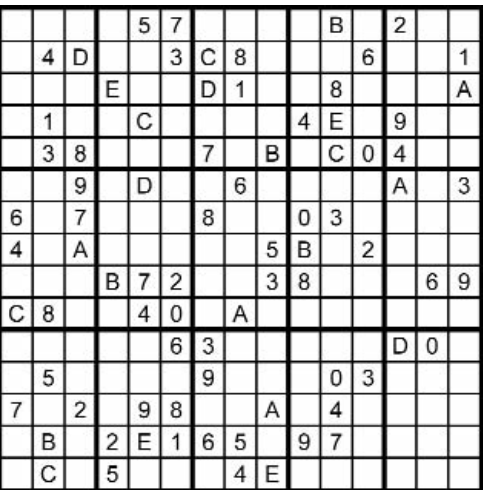

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: There seems to be no let-up in robbery and loot incidents in Capital city and its adjoining areas as unidentified miscreants Tuesday decamped with a bag containing ₹5 lakh from a woman in Phulnakhara area just a day after robbers struck a bank in Infocity area here. According to sources, the victim lady, Sunita Jena, Tuesday withdrew ₹5 lakh from the Indian Bank's branch at Trinath Bazar under Phulnakhara police station to invest in opening a mobile shop at the market. While she was busy speak-

Sources revealed that the woman and her brother chased the looter on the woman's scooter but in vain. The entire incident was captured in a CCTV installed at a nearby shop.

Jena lodged a complaint with the police at Pahal outpost in this

regard. Police have started investigations into the matter after registering a case (203/20) based on the complaint. Eyewitnesses said the miscreant was riding a black-colour Pulsar motorcycle.

Worth mentioning here that a miscreant with a black-colour Bajaj Pulsar bike had robbed ₹2.80 lakh at gun point from a nationalised bank in Infocity area here Monday afternoon.

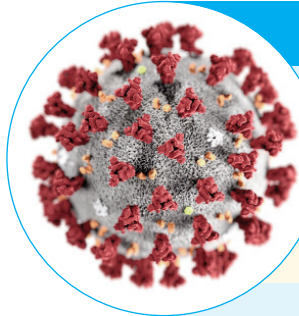
In yet another incident, four armed men decamped with the gold chain and ₹40,000 from a trader near Teishpur on Bhubaneswar-Puri National Highway at around 11:45pm Monday. The victim has been identified as Niranjan Nayak (45).

Niranjan has lodged a complaint with Pipli police. According to his FIR, he was returning home from Bhubaneswar. On the National Highway, some miscreants waylaid him and started demanding money. When he denied, the miscreants attacked him with a sword and snatched away the cash bag and gold chain from him.

Locals rescued Niranjan in a critical condition and rushed him to the Mangalpur Community Health Centre for treatment. Police have started an investigation into the matter and detained a person for questioning in this connection.

State sees 13% growth in Kharif registration

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: As many as 14, 02, 205 farmers have registered their names online for upcoming Kharif paddy procurement – a 13 per cent rise as compared to the previous year's registration.

According to sources at Food Supplies and Consumer Welfare (FS&CW) department, 14, 02, 205 farmers have registered themselves through online for the Kharif procurement season whereas 12, 35,908 farmers had registered their names for sale of Kharif paddy in 2019-20.

In the COVID-19 situation, adhering to all guidelines issued by the government and maintaining social distancing, the online farmers registration works have been executed smoothly by the department and 1, 66,297 more farmers have registered their names for the Kharif paddy procurement.

Food Supplies and Consumer Welfare Minister Ranendra Pratap Swain has thanked farmers as well as officials for achieving the feat.

A total of 2,852 designated primary agriculture cooperative societies (PACS) and LAMPS partic-

New norms for allotment of land in City

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: The state government Tuesday notified rules for settlement of government lands available in Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) area.

As per the government Rules of Business, general control over government land lying within the BMC area and leasing and transferring of sites in new capital is the subject matter of General Administration department.

Accordingly, GA & PG Department was allotting government land within BMC area for different purposes under the provisions of the Government Grants Act, 1895. However, the Centre has repealed the Government Grants Act, 1895.

Therefore, the state government has brought the rules making amendment to the Odisha Government Land Settlement Rules (OGLS), Rules 1983 by inserting a separate schedule for allotment of lands within the BMC limits.

The new rules will be applicable for leasing or transfer of government land in the Capital city for various purposes in public interests.

As per the new rules, land can be allotted to state departments, Union

government agencies, PSUs, Bhubaneswar Development Authority (BDA) and cooperative societies.

A committee led by Chief Secretary will be constituted to consider and recommend allotment of land to the state government. The director of estates has been authorised to scrutinise the applications, eligibility criteria and verify the land use plan. Any allotment of land will subject to payment of premium provided that government may exempt or reduce the fee. In addition to the premium, the lessee will

have to pay annual ground rent for the land as decided by the government from time to time.

In case the land is allotted to any department, the government will not charge any price for that.

The land allotted in favour of a department of the Union government or in favour of a department of the state government will be recorded in the departmental khata.

After conversion of leasehold residential plots to freehold status, the Record-of Rights (RoR) will be corrected in Shitiban or Raiyati status while the land allotted for res-

idential purposes shall be recorded as Gharabari.

The director of Estates, after obtaining government approval, can impose penalty and also resume the land if the lessee has used it for any purpose other than the one for which it was given for.

If the land has been kept unutilised for a period exceeding three years from the date of allotment, the government can also revoke the settlement. In case the lessee violates the terms and conditions of the lease, the government will cancel the allotment.

Resume train services for migrants: Pradhan

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: Union Minister Dharmendra Pradhan has written to Railway Minister Piyush Goyal, seeking his intervention to resume the now-suspended services of Shramik Special trains from Odisha to other states to facilitate return of migrant workers to their places of work.

In a letter to Goyal, the Union Petroleum and Steel Minister said he has received many representations from migrant labourers in the state, seeking resumption of such special train serv-

ices to Gujarat, Maharashtra and other states.

"As you would be aware, there was a mass exodus of migrant workers from states like Gujarat, Karnataka and Maharashtra to Odisha in the wake of nationwide COVID-19 lockdown. With the efforts of the Railway Ministry, thousands of workers across the country could reach their home towns by Shramik Special trains and the same was appreciated widely," Pradhan said.

There is a need to resume train services for migrant workers so that they can go back to their workplaces, he said, adding that these labourers have ex-

pressed their plight due to unavailability of jobs.

"I am informed that even though some employers are willing to offer bus transport service from Odisha, due to the prevailing monsoon conditions, a long and arduous journey via road is neither feasible nor safe," Pradhan said in his letter.

"I request your intervention for restarting of Shramik Express Trains from Odisha to states like Gujarat, Karnataka and Maharashtra at the earliest," he added.

Pradhan's letter came after eight migrant workers, who were on their way from Odisha's Ganjam to Surat in Gujarat, were killed and several injured when the bus carrying them met with an accident in Chhattisgarh last week.

nCoV recoveries cross 1-L mark

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: The state's COVID-19 tally mounted to 1, 31, 382 Tuesday with 3,490 people testing positive for the disease, a Health and Family Welfare department official said. Moreover, total recoveries in the state crossed the 1 lakh mark.


Thirteen more fatalities pushed the state's coronavirus death toll to 569, he said.

Of the fresh fatalities, three were reported from Puri, two each from Ganjam, Mayurbhanj and Rayagada and one each from Cuttack, Kandhamal, Khurda and Subarnapur districts.

Odisha had reported its highest single-day spike of 14 COVID-19 deaths August 29.

Ganjam district has so far accounted for 209 of the 569 fatalities in the state, followed by Khurda (77), he said. Fifty-three coronavirus patients have so far died in the state due to other ailments, the official said.

The fresh COVID-19 cases were reported from all the 30 districts of Odisha. Of the new cases, 2,094 were reported from quarantine cen-

Out of the 2,787 persons, 1145 are from Khordha, 230 from Cuttack, 192 from Puri, 153 from Mayurbhanj, 115 from Ganjam, 78 from Balasore, 76 from Keonjhar, 75 from Bargarh,

68 from Jajpur, 68 from Koraput, 64 from Jagatsinghpur, 62 from Sambalpur, 54 from Bhadrak, 50 from Jharsuguda, 45 from Nabarangpur, 41 from Malkangiri, 36 from Sonepur, 35 from Dhenkanal, 28 from Bolangir, 28 from Kandhamal, 25 from Nuapada, 23 from Sundargarh, 18 from Kalahandi, 18 from Rayagada, 17 from Gajapati, 15 from Kendrapara, 12 from Nayagarh, nine from Angul and seven from Boudh.

The state Monday tested 41,275 samples for COVID-19, taking the total number of tests conducted so far to 21.84 lakh.

As many as 376 new COVID-19 cases were detected under Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) limits in last 24 hours, BMC said Tuesday.

While 145 of them are quarantine cases, remaining 231 are local contact ones. Meanwhile, 420 persons who earlier tested positive for the disease have recovered.

According to a notification issued by the civic body as of Tuesday, 14,065 persons have tested positive for COVID-19 in Bhubaneswar out of which 8,949 have recovered. While there are 5,053 active cases, 50 persons succumbed to the disease.

Vehicles from other states fork out ₹2.12-cr fine

Bhubaneswar, Sept 8: The state government has challaned 1,480 buses, goods carriages and taxis of other states under Odisha Motor Vehicle Taxation (OMVT) Act and Motor Vehicle Act from June 2 to June 6.

The Regional Transport Offices (RTOs) carried out a special drive against the vehicles plying within Odisha without obtaining the required permit and evading taxes to Odisha government.

During the five-day special drive by RTOs, the government earned ₹2.12 crore penalties from 1,480 vehicles.

The RTOs started the drive following the direction of State Transport Authority (STA).

The STA had directed the RTOs to undertake a special drive against vehicles plying within Odisha without obtaining the required permit and not paying the tax to the government.

Around 658 vehicles were found plying without permits whereas 70 vehicles were seized for failing to pay the tax and penalty as per the challan.

Odisha has made the online system for issuance of permit and payment of tax in respect of commercial vehicles of other states visiting the state.

Experts thrust on remedial classes

monitor SpO2 levels of all residents. SpO2 is known as oxygen saturation. It is a measurement of amount of oxygen carrying hemoglobin in the blood compared to amount of hemoglobin not carrying oxygen. The SpO2 of a healthy person should be between 94 and 100 per cent. Chhatrapur sub-collector Priyaranjan Prusty, BDO Ambika Prasad Das and tehsildar Nilamadhab Bhoi were present at such a campaign at the block Tuesday. On the other hand, the district had high mortality rate compared to others. It is observed that people having diabetes and high blood pressure are falling victim to the virus. It is worth mentioning that the district is no longer a Covid-19 hotspot and is already on the path towards recovery.

MOTORIST KILLED AS POLICE VEHICLE HITS HIM IN MALKANGIRI

Will Odisha Prison Training School in Silk City shut down?

Berhampur, Sept 8: Odisha Prison Training School was set up in Berhampur in 1984 with an aim to train recruits to run prisons in the state. Now, there is a plan to shut this training institute and merge it with another bigger one at Bhubaneswar; elsewhere, a report said. The 36-year-old training school is located on the way to Shilpanchal Road. Over

50 batches of students have successfully completed their training under this institute and were engaged in different jails in the state. Locals feel sad to know that the government is planning to shift the institute. The state government has set up Mahatma Gandhi Prison Academy in Bhubaneswar. According to the official announcement, this prison training school will be

merged with the academy. Some staff and assets have already been shifted to the academy. As a result, this old training school is going to be shut forever. Locals have been opposing this plan. In March, members of Ganjam Zilla Bikash Manch submitted a memorandum to the Chief Minister; opposing the merger of this old institute with the Bhubaneswar-based academy. It was alleged that the government has not taken any step in this regard. Earlier, people were told that the second campus of the prison academy will function at this institute. Sadly, there is no formal announcement in this regard till date, locals lamented. The institute is almost dysfunctional with some staff guarding the training school. All kinds of facilities are still here for training of the

prison personnel. The institute has been equipped with well-trained instructors and trainers with good classrooms, a library, a parade ground and, separate hostels for male and female trainees. When asked about the fate of this old prison training institute, superintendent of the circle jail Kulamani Behera said that a plan is afoot to merge this institute with the academy in Bhubaneswar, but there is no report about how far this plan has been worked upon.

Media going global

Another great exhortation from Prime Minister Narendra Damodardas Modi is that the Indian media should go “global” at a time when the nation enjoys a “very strong presence” at different international fora. True, the Indian media has failed to spread out beyond the nation’s boundaries, both print and visual, other than to areas abroad where there is an Indian presence.

While many of us have an exalted notion of the greatness of India and there are those who boast of India aiming to achieve a Super Power status in the near future, the reality on the ground is different. In the Asian region itself, India yielded ground not only to China but in the vision of most other countries such as Thailand, Myanmar, Malaysia or even Cambodia, it has no relevance. It is pointless to mention neighboring countries Nepal, Sri Lanka, Bhutan or Bangladesh where a near total mistrust and dislike for India is all pervading.

In the Indian media field, a particular national newspaper boasts of being the largest-circulated English daily in the world and this has more to do with the large spread of the English-educated population within a nation of 1.50 billion people than its popularity as a dependable media. None other than Indians take fancy to it outside this country.

The history of Indian media has been murky. Mostly owned by industry, mining or political interests, the shadow of slanted news has been ever persistent. It has come to such a pass in the present times that a single major business house virtually owns the bulk of the national level television channels. The Emergency in the mid seventies was a blot on free India because the government interfered with the media, thereby damaging its reputation. However, the media overcame that and saw a huge spurt of growth because citizens wanted unbiased reporting. Over time, media owners preferred to take stands that would help them and their friends in their business interests. After the Emergency, the next big jolt to the Indian media has come now. The present Union as well as most state governments are demonstrating extreme intolerance towards free and fair reporting which affects the credibility of the national media. This intolerance has noticeably increased after Modi’s coming to power. For example, the whole world would be interested to know what is happening in Kashmir. The near complete blockage of verifiable news from that region demonstrates that the Indian media is not free.

Both national and regional media are yet to work out economic models of survival which would be independent of state or national government ads or doles. The financial distress faced by Indian media in recent times has helped an extremely small set of business interests buy up all the ailing media houses. The economic threat meted out to Press Trust of India by the Union government recently over carrying an interview of the Chinese Ambassador to India was a clear indication of state censorship. When such acts get publicised, the world does not trust media reports emanating from a country that does not have genuine freedom.

Quality is what makes a product popular; which can only be measured by editorial neutrality, accuracy and corroboration. When these are absent, media loses its shine. The print medium was overtaken by the visual media, TV channels, by the turn of this century. Now, even these TV channels are under threat from digital media available on handheld phones. India has a lot of print, television and digital channels but none qualify at a global sphere. While there might be many reasons for the different media failing to attain global recognition, a major reason would be the non-acceptance of Indian social mores throughout the world. We are not more considered as harbingers of change. Because of negative coverage by Indian media, even the Nepalese citizens stopped watching Indian TV after their earthquake of 25 April 2015. This showed how our reporters need to mature to global levels. Contrast this with the Al Jazeera English and Arabic channels beamed from Qatar, the tiny Gulf state, which reach large viewership across continents; and they are not necessarily Moslem viewers alone. Quality stands out. Question could arise as to how India with its huge size could not come up with a global TV network. The answer may not be too difficult to fathom. Almost all Indian TV channels have business or political interests driving them. Thus excellence in journalism has never been a matter of priority for the Indian owners.

India’s Doordarshan seemed a poverty stricken channel. In the year 1990, Satellite Television Asia Region (STAR) and later CNN came in and started beaming news and other programmes, some related to American propaganda about the Gulf War, in a high-voltage manner and changed the way Indians were treated to visual programmes and news. The BBC maintains its old aura, and reaches Indian homes too. Sky TV, Fox TV and a host of other television channels revolutionized the way the world watched TV in later years. The wars in the Middle East, like the overthrow of Saddam Hussein and the play of Patriot and Iraqi Scud missiles over the skies, reached homes around the world live, adding to the popularity and reach of Western TV channels.

By contrast, what the Indian TV News channels specialize in is panel discussions in which the host makes a hero out of himself, with a bunch of mostly sad faceless meek participants making a laughing stock out of themselves. Otherwise, it is Rhea Chakraborty dominating the screen in what is being termed a ‘media trial’. Reaching out to the wider world for the Indian media is easier said than done.

The Prime Minister, it seems, needs very many such activities to throw up regularly to entice people and make them discuss something new each day. That, probably he thinks, will keep the citizens’ focus away from real life problems facing every Indian today. All due to massive governance mismanagement. The last one, as far as one can remember, was about the possibility of making India the toy manufacturing hub of the world. These are just pointless exhortations that do not sound true anymore.

Tinny

Tinny was once common in both Australia and New Zealand, though it has fallen somewhat out of use. That’s very probably because other slang senses have superseded it, such as those for a can or tin of beer and for a lightweight aluminium boat. As it happens, the first example recorded in print is from New Zealand, in the Chronicle of the New Zealand Expeditionary Force of 1918: “Remarks are heard on the ‘tinny’ luck or otherwise of the [poker] players while the ‘stiffs’ bemoan their luck.” A comment in a book by Eric Partridge two decades later asserts that it was First World War soldiers’ slang. Both the Oxford Australian Dictionary and the Oxford New Zealand Dictionary say the origin is the earlier slang tin for money. This is known from 1836. The Oxford English Dictionary notes, “Said to have been first applied to the small silver coins of the 18th century, which before their recall in 1817 were often worn quite smooth without trace of any device, so as to resemble pieces of tin.” Part of the stimulus for inventing it may have been the even older brass for money, which is known from the sixteenth century. Various compounds of tin appear in the record earlier than tinny. The Bulletin of Sydney noted in 1898 that a tin back is “a party who’s remarkable for luck”. Much later, tin-arsed appears as a term for a person who is remarkably lucky.

IF YOU RECEIVE RICE IN BULK, THE BEST THING TO DO IS FEED PEOPLE IN BULK

Following the Sepoy Mutiny in 1857 that came close to toppling the British rule in India and pursuant to the Government of India Act 1858, the administrative responsibilities were taken over by the Viceroy of India. The Viceroy was a direct representative of the Queen of England and assisted by the Imperial Civil Service (ICS). The ICS was headed by the Secretary of State for India, a member of the British cabinet.

Initially, almost all ICS officers were British and had been educated in elite British schools. Thereafter, a few Indians were inducted into the ICS. At the time of Independence, there were 322 Indians and 688 British ICS officers. In their heyday, those of the ICS were the most powerful officials in the Empire. A tiny cadre, a little over a thousand-strong, ruled more than 30 crore Indians. The ICS directed all the activities of British India, and every ICS officer had an average of three lakh subjects under him, and lorded over every corner of his subjects’ lives. The ICS, as belied by its name, was beholden to the British Empire and its principal role was to control colonial India on behalf of the Crown. Accordingly, all administrative and legal infrastructure were built to further this cause. This ethos of controlling every part of the subjects’ lives was carried forward by the successor service, the Indian Administrative Service (IAS), after Independence.

Jawaharlal Nehru noted that someone had once defined the Indian Civil Service “as neither Indian, nor civil, nor a service, but with which we are unfortunately still afflicted in this country.” At the time of Independence, the ranks and posts of the erstwhile ICS along with its top people were retained for continuity. The only thing that changed was the nomenclature as “IAS”. Other than that, nothing else changed.

Their main role was still to control almost every aspect of lives of the people under their jurisdiction and distribute largesse to those whom they fancied. There was no doubt at the time of Independence that the civil service was the frame of the country and that, without them, the country would collapse.

After Independence, India

adopted a controlled economy to manage its finances. Hence, the ethos of the ICS continued with the IAS. As result, while the political class was coming to terms as how to govern the nation, the philosophy of control set forth by our colonial bureaucrats was continued and strengthened by the IAS.

In 1979, Margaret Thatcher, elected on the promise of change and reform, stated, “We have to move this country in a new direction, to change the way we look at things, to create a wholly new attitude of mind.” She appointed Sir Derek Rayner, who was not connected with the Civil Service, to recommend reforms and make the government administration more efficient and accountable. This resulted in core policy being made by a core team of competent civil servants while the operation and execution of the approved policies were entrusted to a number of independent agencies headed by professionals.

Furthermore, Margaret Thatcher was a visionary who recognised the onset of globalisation and that there was the need for professionals rather than generalists in positions of decision-making to ensure that Britain continued to retain its place in the world order. She faced strong resistance from the well-entrenched

British Civil Service. Nonetheless, she stood firm in her conviction and reformed the service anyway.

The role and competence of the policy makers have evolved since the 1950s. Today, no policy can or should be made purely from a national perspective. It needs to be made after taking the geopolitical situation and the state of the world economy into account. Therefore, the policy makers need not only be competent, but also specialised in the subject matter that they are handling to define the nation’s policy.

I have no doubt that, at the time of being inducted, the officers of the Civil Service were the brightest. However, once put in a policy making position, without specialisation, they are not fit for the job. It is impossible to make a considered judgement without having a complete understanding of the subject matter to ensure that it is acceptable both at international and national levels.

Additionally, without in-depth knowledge of the subject matter, it would be impossible to defend the country’s interests socially and economically when negotiating with investors and trade partners; particularly so when every country is competing for the same piece of the pie and protecting their own interests.

The initial training prepares

our civil servants for fieldwork. After they have done their mandatory fieldwork, they move to policy making positions (at the level of joint secretary at the Centre). At this stage, they are not specialised in any particular area from where they can dictate policy for the benefit of the national economy and the welfare of the Indian people after taking into account the geopolitical situations of the world. You cannot, and should not, have someone making policy on one subject one day and on another the next day. As a result, that person often gets either overwhelmed or over-dependent on the un-experienced junior cadre who do not have enough of exposure to fathom the larger picture. This often leads to decisions which have undesirable results.

The recent cabinet decision encouraging civil servants to reskill voluntarily is not the answer. When have the civil servants accepted any change to their service conditions voluntarily? They have responded only when the political masters ordered them to do this or that. Hence, mandatory specialisation is a must for policy makers.

While the civil service has served the country reasonably well, there is a need for an overhaul to meet the challenges of today. The Modi government came to power on the promise of change. Hence, it is incumbent on the Prime Minister to lead the charge for change for a new direction, to change the way we look at things, to create a new mindset for an India of the 21st Century. This is his ‘once in a century’ moment. No doubt there will be pushback from bureaucracy as they would not like to be disturbed from their comfort zones. Furthermore, the process cannot be led by the existing bureaucracy. It needs to be led by someone from outside the system and not having any existing baggage and definitely not a retired bureaucrat. Every bureaucrat will always protect his own brethren. Nonetheless, I believe the PM can do it. This is India’s chance of the century – reform we must or we miss the opportunity of the century and perish.

Buying in bulk can sometimes be risky

When I’m grocery shopping, I’m not always happy to see different sizes of the same food item. This means that I need to make a decision: should I buy the larger quantity or the smaller quantity – or perhaps even the medium quantity? There are several factors that go into this decision, but two of the most important ones are the rate of consumption within the household and the rate of decay of the food item; whether or not it is perishable.

wife says, “Can you get the rice for me?” She makes this request several times a week, perhaps eager to have a muscular husband.

My wife loves rice so much that if she won 100 bags of rice in a contest, she would be ecstatic, elated and what not! It would not matter if the amount of rice exceeded the amount of space in our kitchen. “Just fill our bedroom with rice,” she would say. “We’ll never have to buy rice again. We can sleep on the rice if we need to.”

While she undoubtedly has sweet dreams of this scenario, I have nightmares. It’s not that I don’t enjoy rice – it’s just that I prefer not to eat rice at every meal. One of my strongest culinary desires involves the occasional appearance at our dining table of a chapatti or naan.

Thankfully, I don’t have to worry too much about my wife winning 100 bags of rice, but there’s another scenario that I should probably be concerned about, thanks to the Twitter account of a writer named Shiv Ramdas.

Shiv recently live-tweeted an incident that happened at his sister’s home, somewhere in India. His brother-in-law got tired of making frequent trips to the store to buy rice. So, he decided to order some rice in bulk from a warehouse. But there was some kind of misunderstanding, resulting in a lorry filled with rice showing up at his home. Needless to say, his wife (Shiv’s sister) was soon berating him like he had accidentally set her saris on fire.

“If you have never heard a woman destroy a man with one

So how did Shiv’s brother-in-law solve this problem? He ended up negotiating with the lorry driver, using a mediator, and instead of buying the entire load on the lorry, agreed to buy ‘only’ 23 sacks of rice. The driver also received two bottles of liquor for his trouble.

I can’t help wondering what my wife would do if a lorry-load of rice arrived at our house. She would be upset that we needed to pay for so much rice at once, but after the initial shock, she would be a little excited. The first thing she would do is go shopping — for the biggest rice pot we can afford.

“We can’t eat that much rice,” I would say.

“Don’t worry,” she would say. “You don’t have to eat it. I’m going to feed all the homeless and hungry people — the ones who will truly appreciate my rice dishes.”

If you receive rice in bulk, the best thing to do is feed people in bulk.

Flight tickets refund

J&K glaciers melting at ‘significant’ rate

Srinagar, Sept 8: Glaciers in Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh are melting at a ‘significant’ rate, according to a first-of-its-kind study which used satellite data to find that over 1,200 glaciers in the Himalayan region saw an annual reduction in mass of 35 centimetres (cm) on average between 2000 and 2012.

The study, published in the journal Scientific Reports, was carried over the Jammu, Kashmir, and Ladakh region, including areas across the Line of Control (LoC) and Line of Actual Control (LAC), and in all 12,243 glaciers were studied for thickness and mass changes.

“In general, it was observed that the glaciers in the Pir Panjal range are melting at the higher rate – more than one metre per year – while as the glaciers in the Karakoram range are melting relatively at slower rate, around 10 cms per year,” noted Professor Shakil Ahmad Romshoo, corresponding author of the study.

“Some glaciers are even advancing or stable in the Karakoram range. In other mountain ranges like the Greater Himalayan range, Zaskaskar range, Shamabari range, Leh ranges, the glaciers are undoubtedly melting but the rate of melting is variable,” Romshoo, Dean of Research at the University of Kashmir in Srinagar, told PTI.

The research team, including



Tariq Abdullah and Irfan Rashid, both from Geoinformatics Department, University of Kashmir, used two satellite observations made in 2000 by NASA and in 2012 by German space agency DLR.

They employed this data to determine the glacier thickness changes over the entire Upper Indus Basin, comprising of over 12,000 glaciers.

“There is no such data (satellite observations) available in the world after 2012. This is a first of its kind study in the region and provides a very good idea about what is happening to the glaciers in the region,” Romshoo explained.

Till date, he said, only six to seven

glaciers have been studied in the region for thickness and glacial mass changes using field observations.

The researchers noted that while glacier melting is a continuous process and the shrinkage in area of the glaciers is being estimated routinely, thickness and mass changes are not possible always because of the lack of satellite data.

There are also limitations and challenges associated with field based studies in the mountainous Himalaya, they said.

The team noted that during one decade of observation in this study, the region has lost about 70.32 gigatonne of glacier mass, which is “quite significant.”

Romshoo noted that the continued melting of glaciers will have significant adverse impacts on every sector of economy in the region and beyond, particularly in the downstream areas which are already water scarce.

“It is pertinent to mention here that the waters emanating from this region are shared between the neighbouring countries in the south Asia,” the professor at the Department of Earth Sciences, University of Kashmir, added.

The knowledge generated about the glacier thickness changes across different mountain ranges in the data-scarce Himalayan region is vital for determining the sustain-

ability of water resources in the south Asian region, according to the researchers.

Romshoo noted that though there is “almost no industrialisation” in Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh Himalaya, the mountainous region is facing the brunt of climate change happening globally.

The latest study was conducted as part of the Department of Science and Technology research project “Centre of Excellence for glacial research in the western Himalaya.”

No Covid death yet in this northeastern state

An official said that 45,153 samples have been tested for COVID-19 till Monday.

The state recorded its first case of COVID-19 March 24, after a 50-year-old pastor who had returned from a trip to the Netherlands, tested positive. After spending over a month in the hospital, he was found negative April 27.

Over 1,000 J&K candidates appear for NDA exams

New Delhi, Sept 8: The Union Public Service Commission (UPSC), in collaboration with the Government of Jammu and Kashmir (J&K), Sunday conducted the annual entrance examinations in off-line mode for admission in different streams in the National Defence Academy (NDA), at eight centers in J&K. Over a thousand candidates participated in the exam.

These were the first off-line examinations held in J&K since the outbreak of the coronavirus pandemic in March 2020. Official sources said of the 1,000 candidates, 485 were from Kashmir alone. While 379 candidates appeared at the center set up at Amar Singh College in Srinagar, 199 more attended at the centre at S.P. Higher Secondary School. Over 500 candidates have reportedly appeared at six centres in Jammu.

Official sources said that due to the coronavirus pandemic, the observers from the UPSC did not oversee these exams in J&K and other stations this year.



Consequently, concerned Divisional Commissioners and Deputy Commissioners were engaged to discharge this duty. For the first time since March this year, special trains were operated to ferry the candidates from Baramulla and Banihal in the morning and back to home stations in the evening under strict Covid-19 standard operating procedures (SOPs).

Prescribed distance of two sq metre was maintained between the candidates even as the examination halls were fumigated and sanitized. Hand sanitizers were available and each candidate wore a face mask. Authorities had made elaborate security and surveillance arrangements at the centers as well as for smooth passage of the candidates through train and other modes of transportation.

Deputy Commissioner Shahid Iqbal Choudhary, who visited both the centers in the summer capital, said the candidates as well as the staff on exam and security duty observed all Covid-19 SOPs. He said it was for the first time that an examination was held in Kashmir under Covid-19 SOP.

Factory workers to get free sanitary napkins in Meghalaya

THE AMENDMENT TO THE 40-YEAR-OLD SERVICE RULES ALSO MAKES IT MANDATORY FOR FACTORIES TO PROVIDE PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT (PPEs) TO ALL WORKERS

Shillong, Sept 8: Women factory workers in Meghalaya are set to get free sanitary napkins at their workplace as the state cabinet has approved an amendment to the four-decades-old Factories Rules, a government spokesperson said Tuesday.

The amendment to the 40-year-old service rules also makes it mandatory for factories to provide personal protective equipment (PPEs) to all workers, he said.

“After discussion, the proposal to amend rules 25 and 78 (C) of the Meghalaya Factories Rules, 1980 was approved at the cabinet meeting chaired by Chief Minister Conrad Sangma Monday,” James PK Sangma told PTI.

The amendment was made after the Union Ministry of Labour and Employment had written to the

state government to incorporate the Model Factories Rules regarding the provisions of sanitary napkins for the women workers under the Factories Act, 1948 and also to incorporate rules regarding the PPEs for all workers, he said.

According to the government spokesperson, the proposed amendment also incorporated clauses to ensure that the sanitary napkins of adequate quantity and conforming to Indian standards shall be provided and maintained in the women’s toilets for their use and the same be replenished on a daily basis. He said disposal bins with a lid shall also be provided within the women’s toilets for the collection of the used napkins and they shall be disposed of as per procedures approved by the inspector.

The same clauses are also applicable to the PPEs provided in terms of quality and disposal, he

Guwahati/Kohima, Sept 8: Industry body FICCI has said that the recent rise in smuggling in the northeastern region can be attributed to economic distress induced by the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce & Industry (FICCI) said loss of jobs and lack of income due to recurrent lockdowns have left citizens without a means of livelihood.

“Reports suggest that smugglers and insurgents are using people from the local tribal areas to transport smuggled goods by taking advantage of their financial vulnerability caused due to Covid-19,” a FICCI report said.

The FICCI’s Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Activities Destroying the Economy (CASCADE) highly appreciated the efforts of central para-military force Assam Rifles and praised its Director General along with other officers for their anti-smuggling operations.

The FICCI report said: “The Assam Rifles during its recent successful interception, seized illicit cigarettes, smuggled from neighbouring country, worth Rs 14 crore. Enforcement agencies impounded illicit cartons of cigarettes in 26 operations along the Indo-Myanmar border during months of July and August alone.” “Various battalions of the forces intercepted smugglers transporting the illicit consignments using bikes, cars and trucks while hiding them inside rice sacks, jungle tracks, vegetation and others.”

FICCI CASCADE Chairman Anil Rajput said that illicit cigarette smuggling is a formidable challenge before our nation that has been draining our government exchequer by creating

opportunities from tax arbitrage. It also threatens local industries and their capacity to create livelihoods. Assam Rifles’ proactive vigilance in intercepting the movement of smuggled goods is a definitive step towards putting fear in the hearts of those who deal in such trading. Their commendable effort sets forth an example to be keenly studied and followed by other enforcement agencies of the country,” Rajput said in its report.

FICCI has also requested Union Home Secretary Ajay Bhalla to intervene into the vital issue and to sensitise other paramilitary forces on the gravity of the issue and amplify the need for a greater focus on combating smuggling and smuggling-related crimes at the borders. In order to create large-scale awareness of this menace, FICCI CASCADE has been conducting interactions with government and enforcement agencies across several states in India on the ways to mitigate this challenge.

FICCI also appealed to the central government to declare smuggling as a national threat and that should be addressed with stricter vigilance and reforms.

One sadhu was brutally beaten up when he protested.

Three associates of LeT arrested

Srinagar: Three "overground workers" of the Lashkar-e-Toiba (LeT) have been arrested in Jammu and Kashmir's Baniptora district and incriminating materials found in their possession, police said Tuesday. A police official said information was received on Sunday about miscreants hoisting Pakistani flags at the behest of active LeT militants at the main market of the Hajin area of the district in north Kashmir. "The flags were hoisted with a view to create a fear psychosis among the common people of Hajin town," he said.

K'taka govt docs threaten strike

Bangalore: Government doctors in Karnataka have threatened to go on strike from September 15 if their demand for salaries on par with the Central Government Health Scheme scale were not met. Centre issues SOP for partial reopening of Classes 9 to 12

New Delhi, Sept 8: The Union Health and Family Welfare Ministry Tuesday issued standard operating procedures (SOPs) for partial resumption of teaching activities in schools for students of Classes 9 to 12, on a voluntary basis, from September 21.

In a statement, Health Minister Harsh Vardhan said: "Government of India is following a phase-wise unlocking of activities. In days to come, this would also involve partial resumption of activities in schools for students of Classes 9th to 12th on a voluntary basis, for taking guidance from their teachers. This would be allowed from 21st September 2020."

The precautionary measures include teachers, employees and students ensuring physical distancing of at least six feet, use of face covers, frequent hand-washing, following respiratory etiquette, self-monitoring of health, and not spitting.

Schools have been asked to specifically ensure that online or distance learning should continue to be permitted and encouraged and that students of Classes 9 to 12 should be permitted to visit their school on a voluntary basis for taking guidance from their teachers.

"This will be subject to written consent of their parents or guardians. Such visits and teacher-student interaction must be organised in a staggered manner," the ministry added.

Only the schools outside the containment zones will be allowed to open. Further, students, teachers and employees living in containment zones will not be allowed to attend. Students, teachers and employees will also be advised not

to visit areas falling within containment zones. Prior to resumption of activities, all work areas intended for teaching or demonstrations etc, including laboratories, other common utility areas shall be sanitised with one per cent sodium hypochlorite solution, with particular attention to frequently-touched surfaces.

Schools that were used as quarantine centres will be properly sanitised and deep cleaned before partial functioning is resumed. The teaching and non-teaching employees concerned, up to 50 per cent of the strength, may be called to schools for online teaching or tele-counselling and related work.

Instead of biometric attendance, alternate arrangements for contactless attendance shall be made by the school administration. At all times, the teachers and students shall maintain a physical distancing of six feet apart, wherever feasible.

BODIES OF COVID VICTIMS SWAPPED IN UP DISTRICT

Meerut (UP), Sept 8: Swapping of bodies of patients who die due to Covid is becoming a norm, rather than an exception in Uttar Pradesh.

In yet another incident Monday, a family, whose 84-year-old member had died due to Covid, stopped the cremation when one of the members lifted the shroud for a last glimpse of the deceased, after the body was placed on the pyre.

According to reports, the family was about to cremate the body of another man, who was in his 50s, when they realised that they had got the wrong body.

By the time the Meerut family contacted the family whose body they had, it was too late. They were returning home after doing the cremation and were carrying the ashes in an urn and had no inkling that their kin's body was still lying with another family. When the elderly man's family contacted the LLRM Medical

College on the issue, they were 'scolded' by the authorities for unpacking the body of a Covid-19 patient.

The nephew of the octogenarian told reporters, "We removed the shroud because some family members insisted on seeing him one last time. To our shock, the body was not of our uncle. It was someone else. When we contacted the LLRM Medical College, instead of accepting their fault, the officials started shouting at us for unpacking the body."

Meanwhile, the other family was also in a state of shock.

The son of the 50-year-old man said, "I got a call Sunday morning that my father's body is yet to be cremated. And we have performed the last rites of someone else."

Later, on Sunday, the body of the middle-aged man was handed over to the Modinagar family. And, in return, the Meerut family was given the urn of ashes.

A probe in the matter has been set up by the District Magistrate Anil Dhingra.

"A team of additional District Magistrate (city) and Chief Medical Officer will probe the incident," the Dhingra said.

Lala Lajpat Rai Memorial Medical College (LLRM) principal Gyanendra Kumar said, "The doctor, nurse and ward boy on duty have been asked to give an explanation on the matter. Action will be taken against whoever is found at fault."

Southwest monsoon withdrawal 'slower'

New Delhi, Sept 8: The Southwest monsoon in India is forecast to begin its withdrawal through South Asia at a slower than average pace this season, a weather report said Tuesday. This may delay the onset of the Northeast monsoon in southern India. "We do not expect the withdrawal to begin in northwestern India until the week of September 6 or 13," AccuWeather Lead International Meteorologist Jason Nicholls said.

On average, the monsoon begins its retreat in northwestern India at the very start of September.

With the later withdrawal of the Southwest monsoon, the Northeast monsoon onset in southern India may be delayed until late October. "Onset of the Northeast monsoon in Chennai can be delayed a week or perhaps more from its average October 20 start date," Nicholls added. AccuWeather's team of international meteorologists expects a normal to above-normal monsoon season across much of southern India from October through December. This Northeast monsoon brings a surge of rainfall to parts of eastern and southern India as dry air invades the main Asia continent. Far southern Tamil Nadu and

Kerala and Sri Lanka could be drier than average due partially to the late onset of the monsoon.

"Sri Lanka may make up for rainfall deficits from October to December as the Northeast monsoon and associated wet weather may last into January," Nicholls said.

Tropical depressions or cyclonic storms are forecast for both basins of the northern part of the Indian Ocean this autumn.

"The wild card for rainfall in South Asia will be the threat from tropical systems," Nicholls said.

Long-term weather and sea surface conditions are predicted to favour more storms over the Bay of

Bengal, but the Arabian Sea will be quite active this season, too.

"Steering winds may favour most storms in the Bay of Bengal to impact northeastern India and Bangladesh, but tracks into southern India cannot be ruled out," Nicholls said. "Systems in the Arabian Sea could impact western India, but the favoured areas for impacts look to be toward the southern Arabian Peninsula."

Drier weather is forecast to return to the southern part of the Arabian Peninsula during November.

Much of the rest of the Middle East will be drier and warmer than average for the autumn as a whole.

Cyber frauds exploiting security forces' goodwill to dupe people

New Delhi, Sept 8: Fraudsters are now cashing on the trust and goodwill of the Indian Army and paramilitary forces to cheat people online. A web is weaved around potential buyers or sellers on sites such as OLX and Quikr and people are lured by either the promise of a second-hand car in good condition or any other expensive item being sold at a throwaway price just because the army or paramilitary personnel have been transferred and could not carry the goods with them.

Sometimes the fraudsters pose as buyers and show urgency in transferring the amount. Most times the victims fall prey and end up losing money. To win the trust of innocent buyers, they also send them fake Army and Paramilitary ID cards and ask for a small advance booking

amount as token money which can range from Rs 2,000 to Rs 5,000, to seal the deal.

Once the buyer deposits the amount in the said bank account or the wallet of the seller, they stop picking up their calls and stop responding. Many buyers refrain from complaining to the police as the amount is small and they do not want to lodge an FIR.

So widespread is the magnitude of the fraud that even the Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) had to tweet from its official handle to caution buyers against falling in the trap. On a complaint of similar nature, in which a person tagged the CISF about the possible fraud in the name of the force, the CISF responded on Twitter.

"Fraudulent persons are cheating and duping others in pretext of selling or buying through OLX. Be aware of such fraudulent persons



& bring it to notice of others also. Kindly visit your nearest police Station and lodge a complaint about the fraud," the CISF tweeted September 4.

The Delhi Police in May this

year arrested a person for duping an Air Force officer with a similar modus operandi where a man claiming to be a CISF constable wanted to purchase his old furniture. Since, the complainant's app

wasn't functional, he requested using his relative's phone number for the money transfer. But, instead of the money being credited to the account, Rs 75,000 was debited from their account. The UPI link generated by them was not meant for crediting money but for debiting money for their potential victims' bank accounts.

A similar case came up in Shahdara district of Delhi earlier this month.

"The complainant stated that he posted the advertisement to sell his house products on an online Shopping Portal. The fraudster called him and stated that he is interested to buy the articles and claiming himself as an army man. After negotiations, the fraudster stated that he is sending the promised amount to him by QR code and stated that he has to scan the QR code after scanning QR code Rs. 1,76,500

were deducted from his account," said DCP Shahdara, Amit Sharma. Social media is flooded with complaints of a similar nature where the people are lured into such deals which appear lucrative to people. A seller falls into the trap thinking that he is dealing with a bonafide Army or paramilitary officer. Also, the alleged buyer doesn't even negotiate for the asked amount. Perceiving it to be a profitable deal, they scan the QR code sent through WhatsApp to receive money. However, they end up losing the same amount from their own account.

"Don't buy or sell the article on online shopping portals (for buying or selling used items) from anyone who is showing merely some unauthenticated official ID to buy or sell the articles. Your awareness can save your hard earned money," was the officer's advice.

With 1,133 deaths, India witnesses highest single-day toll

New Delhi, Sept 8: Recording over 90,000 new cases for two days in a row, India's COVID-19 tally rose by 75,809 in the last 24 hours to reach 42,80,422 Tuesday, while a record 1,133 fatalities took the death toll to 72,775, the Union Health Ministry data showed.

During the same period, the number of recoveries surged to 33,23,950 pushing the recovery rate to 77.65 per cent, according to the data updated at 8 am Tuesday. The COVID-19 case fatality rate stands at 1.7 per cent.

According to the data, there are 8,83,697 active cases of coronavirus infection in the country which comprise 20.65 per cent of the total caseload. India's tally of coronavirus infection crossed the 20-lakh mark on August 7, reached 30 lakh on August 23 and went past 40 lakh on September 5.



According to the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), the number of tests conducted for detection of COVID-19 in India has reached 5,06,50,128 with 10,98,621 samples being tested Monday.

Of the fresh deaths, 423 were reported from Maharashtra, 141 from Karnataka, 89 from Tamil Nadu, 70 from Andhra Pradesh, 61 from Punjab, 58 from West Bengal, 56 from Uttar Pradesh, 32

from Delhi, 23 from Haryana, 17 each from Madhya Pradesh and Jammu and Kashmir, 15 each from Chhattisgarh and Gujarat, 14 from Rajasthan and 13 from Jharkhand.

Twelve fatalities were reported from Kerala, 11 each from Bihar, Puducherry and Telangana, 10 each from Assam and Odisha, nine from Goa, seven from Uttarakhand, three each from Chandigarh and Tripura, while Himachal Pradesh

Rafale jets to be formally inducted into IAF tomorrow

New Delhi, Sept 8: Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, his French counterpart Florence Parly and India's top military brass will attend a ceremony in Ambala airbase Thursday to formally induct five Rafale fighter jets into the Indian Air Force, officials said.



Parly and Singh will hold talks in Ambala on ways to further deepen bilateral defence and security cooperation after the ceremony, they said.

The French Defence Minister is scheduled to arrive Thursday morning and will depart late afternoon, the officials said.

The first batch of five Rafale jets arrived in India July 29, nearly four years after India signed an

inter-governmental agreement with France to procure 36 of the aircraft at a cost of ₹59,000 crore.

The jets, produced by French aerospace major Dassault Aviation, are yet to be formally inducted into the IAF.

Ten Rafale jets have been delivered to India so far and five of them stayed back in France for imparting training to IAF pilots. The delivery of all 36 aircraft is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2021. A second batch of four to five Rafale jets is likely to arrive in India by November.

Sources said a preliminary discussion on a possible procurement of another batch of 36 Rafale jets by India from France may figure in the talks between Singh and Parly.

The Rafale jets, known for air-superiority and precision strikes, are India's first major acquisition of fighter planes in 23 year after the Sukhoi jets were imported from Russia. The Rafale jet is capable of carrying a range of potent weapons.

Team Rhea slanders Sushant, minutes after actor's arrest

New Delhi, Sept 8: Minutes after Rhea Chakraborty was arrested by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) Tuesday, her legal team headed by senior advocate Satish Manshinde slammed central agencies for "hounding" a lone woman "just because she was in love with a drug addict".

The Hindi film actor was arrested after a tough three days of grilling to unravel the drugs nexus in the film industry, officials said. Unlike on previous days when she was hounded by media and the actress looked flustered, trying to hop, skip and run away from media attention.

Rhea in an unexpected gesture waved at the media before boarding the van that took her for medical checkup. Social media called the gesture "almost a challenge" thrown at her detractors.

"Central Agencies hounding a



single Woman just because she was in love with a drug addict and was suffering from Mental Health issues for several years under the care of 5 Leading Psychiatrists in Mumbai, who ended up committing suicide due to consumption of Illegally Administered Medicines and used drugs," said Manshinde who is representing Rhea Chakraborty.

In his statement to the media, Manshinde also talked about the fresh complaint filed by his client with the Mumbai Police and said that the Bandra FIR has been transferred to CBI as per the order

of the Supreme Court.

"CBI will investigate if the doctor is criminally culpable or otherwise. There's no negligence alleged but Criminal culpability of forging a prescription. The drugs administered are prohibited psychotropic substances as contained in the NDPS Act, which are not the subject matter of the CBI case already pending investigations," he said.

Rhea has been charged under various sections of the NDPS Act for her alleged role in the drugs angle which has emerged in the investigations into the death of actor Sushant Singh Rajput.

Rhea has been taken for a medical test and is likely to be produced before a magistrate through video-conferencing for remand in the evening.

The NCB had interrogated Rhea for six hours Sunday, later Monday for eight hours and again for around five hours Tuesday before placing her under arrest.

Deepak Kochhar in ED custody till Sept 19

Mumbai, Sept 8: A Mumbai court Tuesday remanded Deepak Kochhar, husband of former ICICI Bank CEO Chanda, in the custody of the Enforcement Directorate till September 19 in a money laundering case.

Deepak Kochhar was arrested by the Enforcement Directorate (ED) here on Monday under sections of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act in connection with the ICICI Bank-Videocon money laundering case probe.

Officials had said he was placed under arrest as the agency wants to put him under custodial interrogation to obtain more details about some fresh evidence gathered in this case, that was filed under the criminal sections of the anti-money laundering law in January last year. The probing agency produced Deepak Kochhar before the court of special PMLA judge Milind V Kurtadikar, who remanded him in the custody of ED.

Teen pays ₹2.3L for PUBG from grandfather's account

New Delhi, Sept 8: A teenager allegedly transferred ₹2.3 lakh from the pension account of his grandfather for his PUBG game, Delhi Police said.

The cyber cell of the Delhi Police said the 15-year-old boy transferred money from the pension account of his grandfather and used the money to fund his PUBG game for months.

The matter came to light after the complainant received a message on his mobile phone that ₹2,500 had been debited with the account balance at ₹275. He immediately approached his bank where he was informed that ₹2.34 lakh had been transferred from his pension account.

The complainant approached police and alleged that he had not carried out any transaction and did not receive the one-time password (OTP) too.



The cyber cell found that ₹2,34,497 had been transferred from the complainant's account in a period of two months.

The police discovered that the payments were being made to a Paytm Account registered in the name of one Pankaj Kumar, 23.

The cyber cell apprehended Pankaj Kumar and after his interrogation found that one of his friends had asked him for his ID and password of Paytm account. The police found that this person had used Pankaj's account to make payments on Google Play for PUBG. This person was later identified as the grandson of the complainant and apprehended.

Experts warn China-India standoff risks unintentional war

The two Asian giants have held several rounds of talks, mainly involving military commanders, without success

Srinagar, Sept 8: As a months-long military standoff between India and China along their disputed mountain border protracts, experts warn that the nuclear-armed countries - which already have engaged in their bloodiest clash in decades - could unintentionally slide into war.

For 45 years, a series of agreements, written and unwritten, maintained an uneasy truce along the border on the eastern edge of the Himalayan region of Kashmir. But moves and clashes over the past few months have made the situation unpredictable, raising the risk that a miscalculation from either side could have serious consequences that res-

onate beyond the cold-desert region. "The situation is very dangerous on the ground and can spiral out of control," said Lt. Gen. DS Hooda, who was head of the Indian military's Northern Command from 2014 to 2016. "A lot will depend on whether the two sides are able to control the volatile situation and make sure it doesn't spread to other areas."

The two Asian giants have held several rounds of talks, mainly involving military commanders, without success. In a sign that the talks are now shifting to the political level, their defense ministers met in the Russian capital Friday to try end the impasse. It was the first high-level direct contact between the sides since the standoff erupted in the Ladakh region four months ago.

Last week, the world's two most populous nations, which share thousands of kilometers of disputed border, accused each another of fresh provocations, including allegations of soldiers crossing into each other's territory.

India said its soldiers thwarted "provocative" movements by China's military twice last week. In turn, China's Defense Ministry accused Indian troops of crossing established lines of control and creating provocations along the border.

Tensions first erupted in early May with a brawl between soldiers from the two sides. The situation escalated dramatically in June when they fought with clubs, stones and fists, leaving 20 Indian soldiers dead and dozens wounded.



The standoff is over disputed portions of a pristine landscape in a region that boasts the world's highest landing strip and a glacier that feeds one of the largest irrigation systems in the world.

Hooda said that while he doesn't

think either side is looking for full-scale war, the "real calamity" is the breakdown of existing agreements and protocols.

Wang Lian, a professor of international relations at Peking University in Beijing, said the pos-

sibility of open warfare is unlikely because both sides have shown restraint in recent encounters. But he also said that New Delhi is under pressure from domestic anti-China sentiment and has been emboldened by tougher US measures against Beijing.

"I don't think (India) would go so far as to escalate military conflict of a larger scale, but I believe both sides are making some preparations," Wang said.

The two nations fought a border war in 1962 that also spilled into Ladakh and ended in a fragile truce. Since then, troops from both sides have patrolled and guarded the undefined border area, according to protocols worked out by the two countries that included not using firearms.

Nirav faces suicide risk

New headache for TikTok

London: TikTok says it's working to remove videos of a man apparently taking his own life and banning users that keep trying to spread the clips on the popular social media platform. It's the latest example of the ongoing struggle by big tech companies to police their platforms for harmful content amid increasing pressure from regulators. The video was originally livestreamed on Facebook before being circulated on other platforms including TikTok, the company said.

Campaign to succeed PM Abe

Tokyo: The official campaigning to lead Japan's ruling party began Tuesday with the longtime right-hand man of Prime Minister Shinzo Abe now seen as a top candidate and his likely successor to lead the government. Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga, 71, had formally submitted his candidacy for the Liberal Democratic Party leadership last week. The chief government spokesman faces two younger contenders, former Defence Minister Shigeru Ishiba and former Foreign Minister Fumio Kishida, both 63. The winner of the in-party vote September 14 will eventually become Japan's next prime minister because of the ruling bloc's majority in the parliament. Abe is stepping down for health reasons.

Colombo, Sept 8: Ships and aircraft from Sri Lanka and India Tuesday battled to contain a re-ignited fire on board a giant oil tanker that went up in flames last week off Sri Lanka's eastern waters while carrying crude oil from Kuwait to India.

The Sri Lankan Navy in a statement said the re-ignited fire on board the Panama-registered tanker MT New Diamond, carrying nearly 2 million barrels of crude oil, has been curbed to an extent.

The fire on board MT New Diamond, which killed one Filipino crew member and injured another, was extinguished completely on Sunday but a new fire broke out due to extreme heat, the Navy said. "There is no risk of the fire spreading to the oil storage or leaking oil from the ship into the sea as of now," the statement said.

Ships, aircraft and tugs belonging to the Sri Lanka Navy, Sri Lanka Air Force, Indian Navy, Indian Coast Guard and other stakeholders are continuing their disaster management operations to suppress the fire caused by adverse

weather, the Navy added.

The Navy said that at least 11 disaster management professionals, directed to the island by the company that acts as the commercial and technical operator of New Diamond, have arrived at the location where the tanker is located to support disaster management operations.

At least nine ships, five tugs and aircraft are working in the disaster management operation about 30 nautical miles off Sangamankanda off the east coast of Ampara.

A research team from the National Aquatic Resources Research and Development Agency (NARA), Marine Environment Protection Authority (MEPA) and University of Ruhuna departed this morning from the port of Hambantota to visit the site to inspect water samples, to find out if any damage to the marine environment due to this disaster.

The tanker which caught fire last Thursday was transporting crude oil from the port of Mina Al Ahmadi in Kuwait to the Indian port of Paradip, where the Indian Oil Corp. has a refinery.

EU, UK blame each other

London, Sept 8: The UK and the European Union blamed each other Tuesday in their increasingly acrimonious post-Brexit trade discussions that could just be weeks from collapse.

While the UK urged the EU to show "more realism" in the discussions, the 27-nation bloc noted that it was a "world power."

The latest round of discussions kicked off in London Tuesday amid an air of pessimism because of concerns that the British government is set to violate international law by reneging on commitments made before the country's departure from the bloc January 31.

The news that the head of the British government's legal department has quit — reportedly over plans to bypass commitments

made with regard to the Irish border — and an intervention from Prime Minister Boris Johnson's predecessor only added to the sense the talks are going nowhere.

Though the UK left the bloc January 31, it is in a transition period that effectively sees it abide by EU rules until the end of this year. David Frost, the British gov-

ernment's chief negotiator, said the two sides "can no longer afford to go over well-trodden ground" in the deadlocked talks and that the EU needs to show "more realism" about the U.K.'s status as an independent country. European Council President Charles Michel retorted that the bloc is in no mood to budge on its demands. The trade discussions have made very little progress over the summer, with the two sides seemingly wide apart on several issues, notably on business regulations, the extent to which the UK can support certain industries and over the EU fishing fleet's access to British waters. The EU has been particularly insistent on level playing field issues in order to ensure that British-based businesses don't have an unfair advantage as a result of laxer social, environmental or subsidy rules in the UK.

Oz JOURNOS LEAVE CHINA AMID 'STANDOFF'

Melbourne, Sept 8: Two journalists from Australia working in China have been evacuated after they were questioned by Chinese police and were forced to seek refuge in Australian diplomatic missions in the communist nation amidst a diplomatic standoff between Canberra and Beijing.

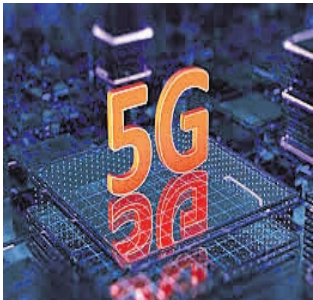
The development came days after Beijing publicly confirmed the arrest of an Australian journalist, Cheng Lei, who was working for China's state-run China Global Television Network (CGTN), the Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) News reported.

Bill Birtles, the ABC's correspondent based in Beijing, and Mike Smith, the Australian Financial Review's (AFR) correspondent based in Shanghai, boarded a flight to Sydney Monday night after they were questioned separately by China's Ministry of State security, the report said. They landed in Sydney Tuesday.

With the two journalists moving out of China, Australia now has no accredited reporter left in the country for the first time since the mid-1970s.

Australian Foreign Minister Marise Payne in a statement on Tuesday said consular officials had provided support to the journalists. Seven uniformed officers simultaneously visited the homes of Smith in Shanghai and Birtles in Beijing on Thursday morning. Both journalists were told they were persons of interest in an investigation into Cheng who was detained last month, the AFR reported. In July, Australia changed its travel advice for China, warning that its citizens faced "arbitrary detention" on the mainland.

India, US, Israel collaborating in 5G tech: Report

Washington, Sept 8: India, Israel and the US have earnestly begun trilateral cooperation on digital leadership and innovation, a top American official has said, asserting that it is right that the three countries play a key role in delivering the next generation 5G technology in a way that is "open, interoperable, reliable and secure."

The 5G collaboration is the first step and just the tip of the iceberg, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) Deputy Administrator, Bonnie Glick, told PTI after the US-India-Israel forum on strategic, tech and development/water co-operation discussion last week.

"We'll collaborate in science, research and development in coming up with the next generations of technologies... But by partnering by officially affirming the importance of this relationship, we'll advance it," she said.

The US enjoys a strong relationship with both the countries, based on shared democratic and free-market principles, the official said. Organised by the Asia-Pacific Institute of the American Jewish Committee in partnership with Indiaspora, the Sunday Guardian Foundation and the Global Indian-Jewish Relations Institute, the summit among others was addressed by Israel's Ambassador to India Dr Ron Malka and India's Ambassador to Israel Sanjeev Singla.

Kamala will never be President: Trump

Washington, Sept 8: US President Donald Trump has slammed the "rhetoric" against the coronavirus vaccine by Democratic presidential candidate Joe Biden and running mate Senator Kamala Harris, who he said would "never" be the President.

Trump was apparently responding to a CNN interview by Harris, in which the vice-presidential nominee said she would not trust the President unless there was a credible source of information that talks about the vaccine's efficacy and reliability. "She (Harris) is talking about disparaging a vaccine so that people don't think the achievement was a great achievement," Trump said at a Labor Day

press conference at the White House Monday. "I don't want the achievement for myself. I want something (that's) going to make people better; that people aren't going to get sick with," he said. The President asserted that a coronavirus vaccine would be available in a record time, maybe by the end of the year and even before the November 3 Presidential election. This, he said, had unnerved his political opponents. Trump asserted that the vaccine — which could have normally taken two-three years — would be in the market before the end of the year. "(We) could even have it during the month of October. Contrary to all of the lies, the vaccine will be very safe and very effective, and it will be delivered very soon," he said in a statement.

Calif. fire sparked by device to reveal baby's gender

Los Angeles, Sept 8: A couple's plan to reveal their baby's gender went up not in blue or pink smoke but in flames when the device they used sparked a wildfire that burned thousands of acres and forced people to flee from a city east of Los Angeles.

The fire prompted evacuations in parts of Yucaipa, a city of 54,000, and the surrounding area. Water-dropping helicopters were brought in but the fire has proven stubborn — it grew to 11.5 square miles (30 square kilometres) by Monday morning and more than 500 firefighters on the scene only had minimal containment. No homes have burned and no injuries reported.

It's the latest in what has become a lengthy list of tragedies at events where typically smoke, confetti, balloons or other coloured objects



are used to reveal the soon-to-be-born child's biological sex — pink for girls and blue for boys. Sometimes the made-for-social-media gatherings are spectacles and include explosives and even guns, and at least one had deadly consequences.

The fire started Saturday morning at El Ranch Dorado Park, a rugged natural area popular with

hikers and dog owners. In summer the park's tall natural grasses dry out and turn golden, and when combined with the San Bernardino Mountains in the distance, provide a popular backdrop for family photos and videos. The unidentified couple chose the location to reveal their baby's gender. They were accompanied by their young children

and had a friend or relative videoing on a cell phone, said Capt. Bennet Milloy of the California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection.

The family went into a field and fired off the device, which quickly ignited 4-foot (1.2 meter) grasses, Milloy said. Conditions were perfect for a fire to spread quickly — triple-digit temperatures, low humidity, dry vegetation and a stiff breeze.

Surveillance video showed the couple frantically race to their vehicle to retrieve water bottles to try to extinguish the flames. It was futile and they called 911. "You can't fight a fire like this with a water bottle," Milloy said. "They had no chance after it started." Firefighters arrived within minutes and the distraught couple told them what happened and provided their own photos and video to aid the investigation, Milloy said. "It's a pretty tragic

situation," he said. "Obviously this was supposed to be a happy event." The couple could be liable for the cost of fighting the fire and criminally charged with misdemeanour or felony counts. In 2017, a massive Arizona wildfire was accidentally started by an off-duty Border Patrol agent who shot a target filled with an explosive blue powder. The fire burned 47,000 acres (73 square miles) and caused \$8 million in damages, Agent Dennis Dickey was charged with a misdemeanour and sentenced to probation. Last year, a homemade explosive used to reveal a baby's gender killed 56-year-old Pamela Kreimeyer in Knoxville, Iowa. The device was meant to spray powder but instead blew up like a pipe bomb. Kreimeyer, who was standing 45 feet (13 metres) away, died instantly when debris struck her head.

Is your hand-sanitiser safe?

Washington, Sept 8: What should I look for in a hand sanitiser? Pick one that contains mostly alcohol, and has few other ingredients.

The US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention says hand sanitisers should be at least 60 per cent ethyl alcohol or 70 per cent isopropyl alcohol.

Other approved ingredients may include sterile distilled water, hydrogen peroxide and glycerin, according to the US Food and Drug Administration. You should avoid anything with methanol or 1-propanol, both of which can be highly toxic. The FDA also warns people to watch out for hand sanitisers packaged in food and drink containers, since accidentally ingesting them could be dangerous. Health officials also say to avoid hand sanitisers



that replace alcohol with benzalkonium chloride, which is less effective at killing certain bacteria and viruses.

Making your own sanitisers isn't encouraged either; the wrong mix of chemicals can be ineffective or cause skin burns. And you should only use hand sanitiser when you can't wash your hands with soap and water, says Barun Mathema, an infectious disease researcher at Columbia University. Hand washing is better at removing more germs.

New Delhi: Ministry of Commerce and Industry will release the next edition of ranking of states and union territories (UTs) based on their startup ecosystem on September 11, an official said. The rankings are based on the initiatives taken to develop the startup ecosystem for promoting budding entrepreneurs. The ranking framework covers seven pillars and 30 action points, including policy support, incubation centres, seed funding, angel and venture funding and easier regulations. "The ranking is ready," the official added.

Bleakest hiring outlook in 15 yrs

New Delhi: India is witnessing the weakest hiring sentiment in 15 years with just 3 per cent companies planning to add staff in the next three months, a survey of over 800 employers said Tuesday. According to the ManpowerGroup Employment Outlook Survey, that covered 813 firms across India, Indian employers report cautious hiring plans for the final quarter of 2020. As per the survey, 7 per cent of employers anticipate an increase in payrolls, 3 per cent forecast a decrease.

CPCL's refinery to come up in TN

Hyderabad: A committee under the Ministry of Environment has accorded 'green signal' for Chennai Petroleum Corporation Ltd to set up a nine million metric tonnes per annum (MMTPA) Cauvery Basin Refinery in Nagapattinam district of Tamil Nadu at an outlay of nearly Rs 33,000 crore. The CPCL is in the process of setting up a refinery and a public hearing on the project was conducted by the District Collector of Nagapattinam on September 20, 2019.

RATING AGENCIES CUT GDP FORECAST

New Delhi, Sept 8: Global rating and research houses, such as Fitch and Goldman Sachs, have cut their estimates for growth in India's gross domestic product (GDP) for the current fiscal 2020-21 (FY21). While Fitch now expects the country's GDP to contract 10.5 per cent in FY21 versus its earlier estimate of 5 per cent contraction in this period, Goldman Sachs forecasts a sharper contraction at 14.8 per cent (-11.8 per cent forecasted earlier) in FY21 and 11.1 per cent (-9.6 per cent earlier) in calendar year (CY20).

The downward revision in India's forecast for FY21 comes on the heels of a sharp contraction in Indian economy in the April-June 2020 period, when the GDP came in at a negative 23.9 per cent year-on-year (YoY), the worst performance in nearly four decades.

"The severe fall in activity has damaged household and corporate incomes and balance sheets, amid limited fiscal support. A looming deterioration in asset quality in the financial sector will hold back credit provision amid weak bank capital buffers. Furthermore, high inflation has added strains to the household income," Fitch said.

A common thread that runs



through the commentary of both is the hope of a faster recovery going ahead. Fitch expects the GDP to rebound strongly in the third quarter of calendar year 2020 (Q3-20) as the economy re-opens. However, does it caution that the recovery has been sluggish and uneven.

"The PMI balances have bounced back but they imply that the level of activity is still well below its pre-pandemic level in Q3-20. Still-depressed levels of imports, two-wheeler sales and capital goods production indicate a muted recovery in domestic spending," Fitch said.

Assuming around 70 per cent of the lost output in June 2020 is recovered in June 2021, those at Goldman Sachs peg real GDP in Q2-2021 at +27.1 per cent YoY and average annual GDP growth in CY21 and FY22 at 9.9 per cent and 15.7 per cent, respectively.

THE DOWNWARD REVISION IN INDIA'S FORECAST FOR FY21 COMES ON THE HEELS OF A SHARP CONTRACTION IN INDIAN ECONOMY

FITCH EXPECTS GLOBAL GDP TO FALL BY 4.4 PER CENT IN 2020, A MODEST UPWARD REVISION FROM THE 4.6 PER CENT DECLINE EXPECTED EARLIER

"While the economy must now climb out of a deeper trough in 2020, we have upgraded our expectations of a rebound next year. In Q2-2021, we expect real GDP growth to bounce back sharply on a year-over-year basis due to favorable base effects. Our forecasts assume that in level terms, real output in March 2022 would still be around 2 per cent below its level in March 2020," wrote Prachi Mishra and Andrew Tilton of Goldman Sachs in a September 7 note.

On its part, India Ratings – a Fitch Group company – has also lowered its expectations for India's economic growth in FY21 to -11.8 per cent from -5.3 per cent forecasted earlier. "The economic loss in FY21 is estimated to be Rs 18.44 trillion. However, GDP is expected to rebound and grow at 9.9 per cent YoY in FY22 mainly due to the weak base of FY21," said Devendra Pant, chief economist and senior director for Public Finance, India Ratings & Research.

Govt to sell 20% IRCTC stake

New Delhi, Sept 8: The government plans to sell about 15-20 per cent stake in IRCTC via offer for sale (OFS) and would like to complete the transaction in minimum number of tranches.

Last month, the Department of Investment and Public Asset Management (DIPAM) had invited bids from merchant bankers by September 10 for managing the sale in Indian Railway Catering and Tourism Corp (IRCTC).

However, it did not disclose the

quantum of stake on offer in the Request for Proposal (RFP). Following this, a pre-bid meeting was held on September 4 with potential bidders.

DIPAM has now posted its response to the queries raised by potential bidders on its website. The government currently holds 87.40 per cent stake in IRCTC. To meet Sebi's public holding norm, it has to lower its stake in the company to 75 per cent.

Shares of IRCTC Tuesday closed 2.57 per cent lower at Rs 1,378.05 on the BSE. Asked if payment would

be made by the government to merchant banker after completion of every single tranche or cumulatively after the completion of entire transaction, DIPAM said, "GOI would not like to have an OFS overhang and hence would like to complete the transaction in minimum number of tranches as advised by merchant bankers based on market conditions.

"In case more than one tranche is used, pro-rata payment would be made to the merchant bankers". The company had raised Rs 645 crore through the IPO.

Auto sales set to decline by 30 pc

New Delhi, Sept 8: India's auto sector is expected to face challenges this year, with the country's economy predicted to contract in 2020 amid the pandemic, Moody's Investors Service said Tuesday.

According to it, auto unit sales will decline at least 30 per cent in 2020, following a decline of over 40 per cent in the seven months through July.

"The lower annual decline reflects our expectation of a pickup in economic activity during the remainder of 2020, which also includes the festive period - October through December," the Moody's Investors Service said in a report.

"A second wave of infections and extension of lockdowns cast a shadow of risk on these forecasts. Also, tighter lending criteria could limit liquidity available for consumers and auto dealers."



As per the report, looking ahead, unit sales will likely grow around 20 per cent in 2021, though clearly on a lower base.

"Moreover it will take at least another four years for India's unit sales to recover to pre-pandemic levels," the report said.

On the other hand, the global automotive industry's outlook has been changed to stable from negative. "The stable outlook for

the global automotive industry reflects rising sales through 2021, with continued, but slow, increases through 2023," said Bruce Clark, Moody's Senior Vice President.

"Nevertheless, auto shipments won't recover to pre-pandemic levels until the middle of the decade."

The coronavirus-driven downturn in unit sales is significantly worse than the 2009 decline, Clark said.

NSDC, LinkedIn partner to impart skills training

New Delhi: National Skill Development Corporation and professional network LinkedIn on Tuesday said they have joined hands to provide access to free LinkedIn Learning resources for imparting digital skills to youth for enhancing employability. Under the partnership, 10 free LinkedIn Learning paths, consisting of 140 courses for a range of in-demand tech jobs, will be made available for free on eSkill India digital platform until March 31, 2021. LinkedIn will also provide periodic labour market insights based on its economic graph of more than 69 million. This will include in-demand skills, emerging jobs, and global hiring rates to NSDC to better understand the skill ecosystem. Indian professionals with digital skills were 20 per cent more in demand than professionals without digital skills in 2020.

Amazon India to add 5 sort centres

New Delhi: E-commerce giant Amazon India Tuesday said it is adding five sort centres and expanding eight such existing facilities in the country to strengthen its capacity ahead of the festive season. The five new sort centres will be launched in Visakhapatnam, Farukh Nagar, Bengaluru, Mumbai and Ahmedabad, a statement said. Apart from these new buildings, Amazon India will also expand eight existing sort centres to increase its overall sortation area to more than 2.2 million square feet, across 19 states, it added. "With this expansion, Amazon India will strengthen its delivery speed and connectivity for customers and sellers, ahead of the festive season," the statement said. Amazon India had also announced expansion plans for its warehousing network.

Reliance unveils details of O2C business spinoff

New Delhi: Reliance Industries Ltd's new oil-to-chemical business unit will hold its oil refinery and petrochemical assets and retail fuel business but not upstream oil and gas producing fields such as KG-D6 and textiles business, the firm said detailing hiving-off plans. RIL has started work on hiving off the oil-to-chemical (O2C) business into a separate unit for a possible stake sale to companies such as Saudi Aramco. Reliance O2C Ltd will house oil refining and petrochemical plants and manufacturing assets, bulk and wholesale fuel marketing, and RIL's 51 per cent interest in retail fuel joint venture with BP of the UK, according to the Scheme of Arrangement. The O2C unit would also house RIL's Singapore and the UK-based oil trading subsidiaries.

Move aside robots, Tesla bets on aluminium casting

THE ELECTRIC CARMAKER HAS STRUGGLED TO RAISE PRODUCTION VOLUMES THROUGH HI-TECH AUTOMATION

Frankfurt, Sept 8: Robots are not efficient enough for Tesla's new car factory in Germany, which plans to replace hundreds of them with giant aluminium casting machines to build simpler chassis parts, a person familiar with the matter said.

The electric carmaker has struggled to raise production volumes through hi-tech automation and was forced to fly in a new production line from Germany to Nevada in 2018 after robots failed to coordinate seamlessly at the U.S. factory.

For the new Model Y, Tesla chief executive Elon Musk has said he will

replace 70 components glued and riveted into the car's rear underbody with a single module made using an aluminium casting machine. That's just the start of a new automation drive, with the vehicle's front module and other parts to come, the source said.

"Will be amazing to see it in operation! Biggest casting machine ever made. Will make rear body in a single piece, including crash rails," Musk said on Twitter Aug. 13. He did not say where or when the new machine would be rolled out. Tesla did not respond to requests for comment.

Tesmanian, a blog specialising in Tesla news, said Monday the company's new plant in Brandenburg,



near Berlin, would be supplied with eight "Gigapress" machines. Car bodies have traditionally been made by assembling multiple stamped metal panels, which has helped carmakers to design crumple zones to absorb energy during a crash, but

Musk is charting a new course at the Brandenburg plant.

"He wants the car's body to be made from modules, as few of them as possible," the source explained. "He sees casting as the new way forward. Like casting a

toy car out of metal." The Gigapress, which is the size of a small house, will be supplied by Italy's IDRA Srl, and forms a key part of Musk's drive to reinvent "the machine that builds the machine," the source added.

Musk's push to reduce manufacturing complexity comes as German carmakers BMW, Mercedes and Audi face pressure from their workers to preserve domestic assembly jobs which are under threat as regulators push electric cars that have fewer components than combustion-engined ones.

Aluminium has proven cumbersome to use in large components because it is difficult to stamp into complex shapes.

State-run banks to step up loans for MP vendors

Mumbai, Sept 8: Banks in Madhya Pradesh are scrambling to boost lending to street vendors in a bid to bolster numbers ahead of a visit this week by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, according to sources and letters seen by Reuters.

A scheme that is part of a coronavirus relief package launched this year offers collateral-free loans of 10,000 rupees (\$136.13) to help an estimated 5 million street vendors, but state-run banks mired in bad debt have been hesitant to lend.



"All bank branches in the state need to immediately accept all applications submitted under the street vendor scheme and disburse loans without delay," the Bank of India told some senior employees in a letter, in light of Modi's visit. Reuters reviewed similar memorandums and emails sent by Central Bank of India and Punjab & Sind Bank to employees in Madhya Pradesh, ordering them to sanction and disburse loans by Tuesday.

The prime minister's office, the finance ministry, the Bank of India, the Central Bank of India and the Punjab & Sind Bank did not immediately respond to requests for comment. Several branches of state-run banks were open on Sunday to distribute loans, according to one banker and an email seen by Reuters.

Indore to get its astroturf in 18 months

Indore, Sept 8: Stuck in procedural delays for nearly two years, Indore's first astroturf hockey ground is finally set to witness the light of the day in 18 months time, Madhya Pradesh's Sports and Welfare department said.

District Sports Officer Joseph Baxla informed that the state government has finally accepted the proposal to build an astroturf hockey pitch in five acres of land in suburban Bijalpur area of the city.

"The astroturf hockey pitch in Indore with a cost of ₹5 crore is expected to come up in 18 months," Baxla said. He also said that there was a proposal to build an astroturf in the city-based Prakash Hockey Club's ground in the Residency area but it was scrapped as the developer found the space inadequate.

The Indore Municipal Corporation (IMC) had later turned that space into a waste disposal centre. "That's why the turf for hockey could not come up and the IMC took possession of the land," Baxla said.

Since then former Indian hockey team goalkeeper Mir Ranjan Negi, who was inspiration behind the Bollywood blockbuster 'Chak De India', had been advocating the need for an astroturf in Indore.

Devoid of basic infrastructure, Negi had been forced to impart hockey skills to poor children of the city on a footpath.

"I am training 125 children mostly poor, on a footpath attached to the district jail's boundary wall in Residency area," the 62-year-old Negi told this agency Tuesday.

He said most of his trainees were members of city based Prakash Hockey Club, which established in 1940. Negi also said that he had written to Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, requesting him to set up an astroturf for hockey inside the city's Devi Ahilya Vishwavidyalaya campus.

"I request hockey lover Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan to build an astroturf for hockey in Indore as soon as possible," he said. "The city needs a ground desperately for the revival off hockey."

Bopanna-Shapovalov ousted from US Open

New York: The Indian challenge came to an end at the US Open with the quarterfinal loss of Rohan Bopanna and his Canadian partner Denis Shapovalov in the men's doubles event here. Bopanna and Shapovalov lost 5-7, 5-7 to Dutch Jean-Julien Rojer and Romania's Horea Tecau in the last eight match which lasted one hour and 26 minutes Monday. Bopanna and Shapovalov lost their serve once in each set and could not convert the only break chance that came their way in the second set. It was Bopanna's best performance at a Slam since he made the quarterfinals at both the US Open and the French Open in 2018.

Workload management key for pacers in hot UAE: Shami

Kolkata, Sept 8: Keeping in mind the hot and humid conditions in the UAE, it will be vital for fast bowlers to manage their workload properly as the task at hand wouldn't be easy when the IPL gets underway September 19, feels Kings XI Punjab pacer Mohammad Shami.

The IPL was moved to the UAE due to rising COVID-19 cases in India. The cities of Dubai, Abu Dhabi and Sharjah – which will host the league – are expected to experience temperatures of around 35-40 degree celsius during the tournament.

"Temperature is much higher compared to India. There are chances of getting dehydrated. There will be chances of cramps. So we will have to keep those things in mind," Shami told this agency in an interview from Dubai Tuesday.

"It will be difficult as the wickets here are also different. So workload management is important. But it is not that difficult that it can't be managed. It depends on us how we manage our workload," added the 30-year-old, rated as one of the best pacers in the World at the moment.

Mbappe tests COVID-19 positive

Paris: France and Paris Saint-Germain striker Kylian Mbappe tested positive for COVID-19 and will miss Tuesday's Nations League match against Croatia, the French federation said. Mbappe was isolated once he found out about his positive test and left France's training camp to return home Monday evening. The French federation said the test was carried out by UEFA in the morning. Mbappe scored for France to beat Sweden 1-0 in the Nations League Saturday, his 14th international goal. The federation said Mbappe passed a test before joining his teammates at the national training camp. He also tested negative Wednesday ahead of the game against Sweden.

Barty opts out of French Open

Brisbane: Top-ranked Ash Barty will not defend her French Open title because of concerns over travelling during the COVID-19 pandemic. After skipping the US Open, which is being contested in New York without crowds, Barty has also decided against traveling to Europe for an event in Rome starting September 14 and the September 27-October 10 French Open. Barty announced her withdrawal hours after French Open organizers said spectators would be allowed at the tournament despite a growing number of coronavirus cases in the country.



"It felt great getting out of home and coming to Dubai. We are all grateful to play the game which we all love. So the feeling cannot be compared. The best part is that everyone is on the field and training. In India, IPL should bring smiles to the faces of all," he said.

Shami will lead the pace attack for the KL Rahul-led side, which is yet to win the IPL trophy. Asked

with a good Serena against you, it's done."

This was a rematch from August 25, when Williams faded after building a lead and lost in three sets to Sakkari at the Western & Southern Open, a hard-court tournament usually held in Ohio but moved to the US Open site as part of a two-tournament 'controlled environment' without spectators amid the coronavirus pandemic.

"Of course I thought about (the loss), but ever so little, because it's a completely different match, completely different scenario, completely different moment," Williams said.

In the earlier one, Williams' legs were cramping by the end, and she blamed herself for that situation, memorably declaring: "I put myself in a bad situation. It's like dating a guy that you know sucks."

Asked about that line Monday, Williams joked: "Thank God, I got rid of that guy. Never want to see him again. He was the worst." That setback made the American 3-2 since tennis returned from its COVID-19 hiatus, all three-setters. And since, she is 4-0 at the US Open.

Williams, who turns 39 in less than three weeks, will face unseeded Tsvetana Pironkova for a semifinal berth. Playing in her first tournament in more than three years after taking time off to have a child, the 32-year-old Pironkova advanced with a 6-4, 7-6(7-5), 6-3 victory over Alize Cornet.

No.16 seed Elise Mertens knocked off second-seeded Sofia Kenin 6-3, 6-3 to reach the quarterfinals of the tournament for the second year in a row and deny the American a chance for back-to-back Grand Slam titles.

Kenin won the Australian Open and was trying to become the first with two straight Grand Slam titles since Naomi Osaka won the 2018 US Open and the 2019 Australian Open.

Mertens will face Victoria Azarenka, who beat No.20 Karolina Muchova 5-7, 6-1, 6-4 for her ninth straight win. Azarenka won the Western & Southern Open that was played in New York as an in-the-bubble warm-up for the US Open.

THIEM OKAY WITH BIG THREE ABSENCE

New York, Sept 8: Don't tell Dominic Thiem the US Open is diminished in any way just because it's the first Grand Slam tournament since the 2004 French Open without at least one of Roger Federer, Rafa Nadal or Novak Djokovic in the quarterfinals.

"It doesn't matter at all if the Big Three are here or not," the No.2-seeded Thiem said Monday after beating No.15 Felix Auger-Aliassime 7-6(7-4), 6-1, 6-1 in the fourth round at Flushing Meadows.

"Everybody wants their hands on the trophy," said Thiem, who won almost half of Auger-Aliassime's service points, 46 of 88. "It doesn't really matter who they're going to beat."

Djokovic — seeded No.1, unbeaten this season and the overwhelming favorite — was disqualified Sunday after unintentionally hitting a line judge in the throat with a ball after dropping a game in the first set against Pablo Carreno Busta.

Nadal (pandemic concerns) and Federer (two knee operations) did not enter the tournament at all.

DJOKOVIC FINED

NEW YORK: Novak Djokovic's US Open default is costing him USD 267,500. That's all of his \$250,000 prize money for reaching the fourth round, plus USD 10,000 for unsportsmanlike conduct and an additional USD 7,500 for skipping his post-match news conference. The fines were announced Monday, a day after the Djokovic was disqualified for accidentally hitting a line judge in the throat with a ball after dropping a game. Both of those fall below the maximum USD 20,000 the Grand Slam rule book says he could have been docked for each infraction.

This ends a run of 13 consecutive major championships won by a member of the Big Three.

"It's been getting pretty boring," said Denis Shapovalov, the first Canadian man to reach the US Open quarterfinals, "with these three guys winning every tournament."

None of the men left has ever earned so much as one Slam trophy yet. The quarterfinals on the bottom half of the draw will be Thiem

against No.21 Alex de Minaur; and No.10 Andrey Rublev against No.3 Daniil Medvedev.

On the top half, where Djokovic used to loom: No.12 Shapovalov vs. No.20 Carreno Busta; No.5 Alexander Zverev vs. No.27 Borna Coric.

Medvedev was runner-up to Nadal last year, losing in five sets. He hasn't dropped a set while advancing to the quarterfinals and he's dropped serve only three times.

Thiem is the only remaining man who has contested multiple major finals. He is 0-3, losing twice to Nadal at the French Open and to Djokovic at the Australian Open this February.

"I am probably one of the oldest players left in the field," said the 27-year-old Thiem, "which is surreal to me." Second oldest, actually: Carreno Busta is 29.

It's the first US Open since 2010 without at least one male quarter-finalist who is 30 or older.

Next up for Thiem is the 21-year-old de Minaur, who reached his first major quarterfinal by saving four set points in the opening tiebreaker and going on to a 7-6(8-6), 6-3, 6-2 victory over Vasek Pospisil.

Italy edge past The Netherlands

Amsterdam, Sept 8: A dominant Italy performance propelled them past the Netherlands 1-0 and to the top of their Nations League group.

Nicolo Barella headed in the only goal shortly before halftime as Italy wasted chances. But the display will go a long way to helping the Azzurri put the disappointment of drawing against Bosnia-Herzegovina 1-1 last Friday behind them.

It was Italy's 11th win in 12 matches although some critics tempered that feat by pointing out that none of those victories were against the so-called 'big teams' of international football.

The only disappointing moment for Italy came when forward Nicolo Zaniolo, playing his first international since returning from a serious knee injury, limped off in the 42nd minute after a challenge by Donny van de Beek.

The win sent Italy to the top of League A Group 1 as Poland beat Bosnia 2-1 in the group's other match. Italy have a point more than the Netherlands and Poland, and three more than Bosnia.

With international football returning for the first time since the outbreak of the coronavirus pandemic, all 54 games that are taking place across Europe over six days are subject to strict hygiene measures, including the exclusion of fans. Players had to pass mandatory pregame tests for COVID-19.

The Czech Republic had to name a new squad as regular members and coach Jaroslav Silhavy were quarantined after Friday's 3-1 win in Slovakia following a coronavirus outbreak in the team camp.

Led by David Holoubek, coach of the U-18 national team, and with only two of the 23 having played for the national team before, the Czechs lost at home to Scotland 1-2 in League B. Israel drew at home to Slovakia 1-1 in the same group.

Also in League B, Alexander Sorloth netted two goals as Norway beat Northern Ireland 5-1 and took his tally to six goals in his past five internationals. Sorloth scored just twice in his previous 19 appearances. Romania beat Austria 3-2. In League C, Kazakhstan lost at home to Belarus 2-0, and Lithuania won in Albania 1-0.
