RS passes farm Bills amid high drama

TROUBLE STARTED WHEN THE SITTING OF THE HOUSE WAS EXTENDED BEYOND THE SCHEDULED TIME TO ALLOW PASSAGE OF THE BILLS

New Delhi, Sept 20: Rajya Sabha Sunday passed two key farm Bills amid a bedlam as Opposition members charged towards the podium of the presiding officer, flung the rule book at him, tore official papers and heckled him over their demand for a division of vote.

The Upper House, which witnessed a brief adjournment due to the pandemonium, passed by voice vote the Farmer's Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Bill, 2020, and the Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement of Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill, 2020. The Bills have already been passed by Lok Sabha and will now go to the President for his assent before they are notified as laws.

Trouble started when the sitting of the House was extended beyond the scheduled time to allow passage of the Bills. Opposition members, who felt such a move should be resorted to only by consensus, rushed into the Well, shouting slogans against the government and accusing it of being anti-farmer.

This forced Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar to cut short his reply and Deputy Chairman Harivansh took up the approval of the Bills.

Four Opposition sponsored motions to send the two Bills to a House panel for greater scrutiny were negated by voice vote, but the Congress, TMC, CPM and DMK members sought a di-

NEW DELHI: The Biju Janata Dal (BJD), which has been extending issue-based support to the NDA, demanded that the farm Bills be sent to select committee for further scrutiny. Speaking in the Upper House on the Bills, BJD MP Amar Patnaik said that there is possibility of cartelisation and asked the Union government to send the Bills to the Select Committee for scrutiny. The BJD MP said that the Bills are largely good on intent but ignore the implementation aspect. He said the Bills need to be evaluated from the point of view that who are the stakeholders. He said there are 63 ner cent small and marginal farmers in the country and asked that can a small or marginal farmer be in position to find out a contract for himself. These Bills may not get the desire benefits as the bargaining power of the farmers will be gone, Patnaik said. "I'm not sure if the Bills are going to bring buyer in the market and there is possibility of cartelisation," Patnaik said.

Bill, Tomar said minimum price or MSP based procurement of agriculture crops from farmers will continue and is not related to the farm bills that seek to give cultivators freedom to market their produce.

Bhubaneswar, Sept 20: The Odisha Lokayukta has directed the state Panchayati Raj and Drinking Water Department to initiate action against a Sarpanch who reportedly misappropriated a sum of ₹2 lakh earmarked for drinking water supply project in Haradeipur village under of Sindaria Gram Panchayat in Dharmashala block of Jajpur district.

The Lokayukta delivered the order while hearing a complaint filed by one Rilu Behera on the basis of data obtained through RTI in October last year.

The accused sarpanch, Gayatri Parida, along with three other officers misappropriated the entire amount meant for the construction of pipelines in the Haradeipur village for supply of drinking water.



State Covid toll breaches 700-mark

Bhubaneswar: Odisha Sunday registered its highest single-day spike of 4,330 COVID-19 cases, which pushed the state's infection count to 1,79,880, a health department official said. The death toll rose to 701 with 10 more people succumbing to the infection, he said. Of the 4,330 new cases, 2,556 were reported from various quarantine centres, while the rest were detected during contact tracing.



China erects 9 bldgs on Nepal's land Heavy rain forecast

CHINA HAS OCCUPIED PART OF NEPAL'S LAND ALONG THE BORDER AND EVEN PREVENTED NEPALI PEOPLE FROM VISITING THE AREA

New Delhi, Sept 20: China has erected nine buildings Nepal's land and also disallowing Nepali authorities from stepping foot in the area. According to reports, the Chinese are talking advantage of the border standoff with India and the absence of Nepalese security forces owing to the approaching winter season to gradually capture land in the region. The most recent incident of oc-

cupying Nepal's land by China has come to light from Humla district where the Chinese have stealthily constructed a building in Namkhya village. Work on nine buildings in the same village is now complete. Having occupied the region, China has even restricted the entry of Nepalese locals near these buildings.

Reports said that the matter first came to light when the head of the Namkhya village council, Vishnu Bahadur Lama visited border areas during a routine tour. He said that the People's Liberation Army (PLA) has completed the construction of nine buildings in the Lapcha area



of Limi village.

Lama further revealed that he was stopped from entering the area and claimed that Chinese soldiers involved in the construction crossed over to China when he asked them questions about the buildings. He said the construction has been done two kilometers inside Nepal's side of the China-Nepal border.

Local elected representatives said construction of three buildings by the Chinese between Limi

and Lapcha was halted after Nepal objected to road development by China in the area in 2019. However, the Chinese have now erected nine buildings which are now in the final phases of completion.

Lama also claimed that locals are being stopped from entering their own lands while PLA troops are conveniently crossing over the border to participate in the construction of said buildings. When contacted, Humla chief district officer Chiranjeevi Giri said he has no knowledge of Chinese erecting buildings between Limi and Lapcha.

Now, Nepalese security forces along with measurement and survev department officials have been dispatched to the area concerned.

Neither Nepal's Home Ministry nor Foreign Ministry has issued a statement in this regard. It seems like the country's top officials are waiting for chief district officer Chiranjeevi Giri's report.

Nepal's foreign minister Pradeep Kumar Gyawali, however, had denied any reports of China occupying Nepal's land.

Bhubaneswar, Sept 20: The Odisha Meteorological Department Sunday said that most parts of the state may see heavy to very heavy rains Monday and Tuesday due to a low pressure area building in the Bay

of Bengal.

Due to the sudden changes in the sea, rains are anticipated for the next two days, including heavy to very heavy rains in some parts of the state. Fishermen have also been warned not to venture into deep sea for go for fishing for the next three days.

Sudhakar Mallick, Duty Officer at the Bhubaneswar Meteorological Department said, "A low pressure area has been developing in the North East area of the Bay of Bengal. Due to this impact there are chances of rains in most parts of the state Monday. On Tuesday too there are chances of rains in all parts of the state. We have issued an Orange Category of warning to 10 districts for Monday,"

He said that they have also issued warning to the fishermen to not go



into deeper sea. "Fishermen have also been warned to not venture into sea for fishing activities. Water-logging in plain areas and chances of landslide cannot be ruled out in hilly areas due to the weather." he said

Due to the low pressure areas, it is anticipated that the chances of heavy rains are more in northern Odisha districts. Cuttack district has been put under Yellow Warning for Monday, the department said.

"Heavy rains are likely in the state from September 20 to September 23 but from September 23 the intensity of rains will come down slowly," Mallick said.

The weather bulletin said, "Heavy to very heavy rainfall very likely to occur at a few places with extremely heavy rainfall over Bargarh, Nuapada, Bolangir, Kalahandi, Sambalpur, Jharsuguda and Deogarh districts,.

DIESEL PRICES FALL AGAIN

Bhubaneswar/New Delhi, Sept 20: Diesel prices continued to decline for the fourth consecutive day Sunday on the back of falling global crude prices.

In state capital, diesel was dropped by 25 paisa, Sunday while petrol price remained unchanged. Now diesel price stood ₹77.94 and petrol was ₹81.74.

In Delhi, diesel was priced at ₹71.58 per litre, down from ₹71.82,

Similarly in the other metros of Mumbai, Chennai and Kolkata, the fuel was sold for ₹78.02. ₹76.99 and ₹75.09 Sunday, respectively, against the previous levels of ₹78.27, ₹77.21 and ₹75.32 per litre.

The recent fall in transport fuel prices comes in the wake of softening of global oil prices as an extended run of Covid-19 has depressed demand and created a glut in the market.

Prices of petrol, however, remained unchanged for the second straight day at ₹81.14, ₹87.82, ₹84.21 and ₹82.67 per litre across Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai and Kolkata, respectively.

Covid joblessness pushing youths to ultra groups in N-E

INDIA'S COVID-19 PANDEMIC LOCKDOWN IS NOW GIVING HEADACHES TO THE NATIONAL SECURITY AGENCIES

New Delhi, Sept 20: India's Covid-19 pandemic lockdown is now giving headaches to the national security agencies. Youth, left jobless during the pandemic, are reported to be joining the banned rebel groups such as the United Liberation Front of Assam (ULFA) and other such,

Adding to this are the reports of a large consignment of China-made weapons reaching the hands of the secessionist Myanmar-based radical groups, who share close links with militant groups in the Northeast.

The emerging scenario is threatening to upset the delicate balance achieved through years of hard work by the Indian security and intelligence officers, according to senior executives in the national security establishment, who requested to stay unnamed, citing government service rules.

The Arakan Army (AA) - which seeks an independent homeland in Myanmar's Rakhine state - has received the fresh cache of Chinese weapons and is known to be one of the key suppliers of arms and ammunition to the rebel groups in Northeast India

In addition, the AA opposes India's Kaladan Multi Modal Project, which provides states like Mizoram – a landlocked province – an outlet to the sea through the Sittwe port in Myanmar, officials said, Interestingly the AA has not opposed the China-Myanmar Economic Corridor.

Security agencies have told the government that insurgent groups active along the Indo-Myanmar border find easy recruits among youth left unemployed by Covid-19 pandemic lockdown.



"The successful induction of the Chinese-made weapons by the AA will have an impact on the security situation in India's Northeastern states, as much of these weapons are finding their way to some of the dormant militant groups of the Northeast," the official said

"The new weapons provide firepower to the northeastern groups whose ranks are increasing as youth left jobless by the pandemic are signing for militant groups."

Strengthened by new recruits and rearmed, the Khaplang faction National Socialist Council of

Nagaland (NSCN-K) – a banned militant group of Northeast based out of Myanmar-is gathering along the Indo-Myanmar Border in areas such as Mon to plan and execute attacks against the Indian security forces.

In 2016, the NSCN(K) killed 18 soldiers of the Indian Army, forcing India to launch cross border strikes on the militant hideouts taking refuge in Myanmar. Worryingly, for India. peace talks with the Naga rebel groups have failed despite efforts of the Narendra Modi government.

Agencies have warned that groups like the People's Democratic Council of Karbi Longri (PDCK) had recruited 15 fresh cadres in Assam. "There was recruitment of 10-15 cadres by the Karbi People's Liberation Tiger in the outfit," the source said. Further, United Liberation Front of Assam (ULFA) had recruited 15-20 youths in the outfit from Meghalaya.

In Tripura, intelligence input indicates that extremist Parimal Debbrama of National Liberation Front of Tripura (NLFT) is trying to revive his group and some newly recruited members of the outfit had completed their basic training in a hideout of Khagrachari District of Bangladesh.

These cadres are planning to infiltrate into India for operations," the source further added

Intelligence agencies also stated that the India-Myanmar border remained susceptible to threat due to the presence of insurgent groups.

"Many insurgents groups are camping in Myanmar and trying to infiltrate through Tirap, Longding and Changlang districts of Arunachal Pradesh, Mon Districtof Nagaland and Charaideo district of Assam," the source said.

Covid-19 +ve pregnant women 'shouldn't' opt home isolation

POST NEWS NETWORK

Bhubaneswar, Sept 20: Government authorised doctors in their daily interaction on home isolation Sunday said that pregnant women infected with Covid should get treatment at designated COVID Hospitals and not opt for home isolation.

Dr Ajit Kumar Mohanty, Special Secretary, Public Health department, said that pregnant women are among the high risk population who should not opt for home iso-

"A COVID-19 infected pregnant woman and other high risk people should get treatment at COVID Hospital. It is safe for them to get treatment at such hospitals. The risk then is for the mother as well as for the foetus too," he said.

He added that as per the protocol, in pregnancy operation cases are done in COVID Hospitals. "These days when pregnant women are admitted for delivery operation, they are tested before delivery. If they test negative then they are treated in general hospital otherwise in case of positive patients, the deliveries are done in COVID Hospitals," he highlighted.

subside appreciable with paracetamol. He also said that loss of taste or smell is one of the other characteristic symptoms of the global pandemic. He also said that COVID also leads to dehydration and people must consume ample water every day to fight this.

GOVT ADVICE FOR HOME ISOLATION

The official also tried to allay the fears of any side effects of these drugs given by the government in the home isolation kit. There is no side effect to the medicines given in the kit. "The health workers who go to give such medicines also apprise the patients on how to use it." he said.

Niranjan Mishra, Director, Public Health Department, said that the viral infection is self limiting and tients. He also said that self isolation is the best practice for its treat-"There is no drug specific for

COVID. The drugs are available for the symptoms. Home isolation is a very good option now for COVID treatment. This is a self limiting disease. COVID will be cured automatically in most people without affecting their health badly," he said.

When asked if a child could also be put under home isolation, he said if the child is mentally fit and cooperating and understands the situation, s/he could be allowed home isolation if detected positive. He also added that under such a situation the responsibility of the care

Bhubaneswar, Sept 20: Odisha's newly-constructed Krushi Bhawan brought laurels to the state once again as the building was adjudged as the 'People's Choice Winner' at the AZ Awards 2020 in Social Good

Krushi Bhawan was the only project from India at the globally recognised prestigious award.

Expressing happiness over the feat, the Chief Minister's Office (CMO) said that the award is dedicated to farmers and artisans of Odisha, the inspiration behind de-

In a Twitter statement, the CMO wrote, "Odisha's architectural marvel #KrushiBhayan has added another feather to its hat, emerging as People's Choice Winner in #SocialGood category at the prestigious #AZAwards20. This award is dedicated to farmers & artisans of #Odisha, the inspiration behind

design of this building." (sic) Earlier, Krushi Bhawan became India's first government building to feature in Dezeen – a prestigious international journal on architecture in August this year. It was also shortlisted for the World Architecture Festival (WAF) Award, in 2019. In February, it had bagged Surface Design Awards 2020 in the categories of Public Building Exterior, Public Building Interior and Supreme Winner.

The building brilliantly showcases the famous Sambalpuri Ikat design. It seems the entire building is draped in a Sambalpuri saree. The striking feature is that the entire building was built out of the prize money Odisha had received

from the consecutive Krishi Karman awards for exemplary agricultural development.

The building has been designed by Studio Lotus through intricate brickwork facade. It houses administrative offices for the Department of Agriculture & Farmers' Empowerment around courtyards filled with ponds and

The brickwork elements that wrap the upper floor create a pattern akin to Odisha Ikat, a traditional dyeing technique from Odisha.

In order to give a real Odisha Ikat look, the patterns have been created with bricks using three different colours of clay sourced from the surrounding areas. The perforations in the facade are essential to make the design visible. But this apart, they also help keep the building cool naturally.

The building has regional materials and techniques. Its pedestal and part of north wing are made from laterite and Khondalite stone

The khondalite was carved by hand to create lattices around the central courtvard, which has a stone inlay floor that displays a yearly calendar according to the

Bas reliefs carved into the laterite on the complex's public plaza illustrate rice paddies in the style of Odisha Pattachitra scroll paintings, a traditional, cloth-based scroll

Dhokra, a type of metalwork perfected in India over 4,000 years, appears on screens along the building's corridors and the light fixtures on columns. Along with being a workplace for 600 staff, the site also houses spaces for education and community engagement.

These additional facilities were incorporated after they looked into German architect and planners Otto Königsberger's original plans to make Bhubaneswar's government offices a focal point for city life.

The plaza has an amphitheatre, and a garden with a pond to naturally cool the space. Entrance is

via a pathway lined with trees and stone colonnades, which doubles as a shady place for employees to eat their lunches.

A learning centre, gallery, auditorium, library and training rooms

are also located on the ground floor. Government offices are located on the first, second and third floors, where access can be restricted.

On the rooftop, there are urban farms that can be used to demonstrate the best agricultural practices. Odisha's climate is hot in the day but cooler at night, so a nightpurging system was incorporated to pull cool air in through the northern facade after dark, lowering the building's temperature before the hotter daytime hours.

The courtyard design, along with recessed windows, also features brick louvers that create shade and airflow. Using local materials lowered the building's carbon footprint and usage of green energy has been encouraged by installing solar pan-



Bhubaneswar, Sept 20: The state Sunday registered its highest single-day spike of 4,330 COVID-19 cases, which pushed Odisha's infection count to 1,79,880, an official of Health and Family Welfare (H&FW) department said.

The death toll, on the other hand, rose to 701 with 10 more people succumbing to the infection, said the

"Regret to inform the demise of Ten #COVID19 positive patients while under treatment in hospitals. (sic)," the H&FW department said on Twitter.

Of the 4,330 new cases, 2,556 were reported from various quarantine centres, while the rest were detected during contact tracing, the official pointed out.

Khurda district, of which state capital Bhubaneswar is a part, reported the maximum number of fresh cases at 644, followed by Cuttack (549) and Puri (292), Kandhamal (178), Angul (176), Jagatsinghpur (167), Jajpur (158) and Jharsuguda (153), said the of1,79,880 [+4,330] 0.81 % of India case

Meanwhile, as many as 4018 COVID patients recovered from the disease, taking the total recoveries in Odisha to 1,45,675. Fifty-three COVID-19 patients have died due to comorbidities. As many as 27.66 lakh samples have been tested for COVID-

19 in the state so far, including 51,154 Saturday, added the official.

Meanwhile, a team of doctors, led by Javanta Panda, has maintained that home isolation has become more useful for the asymptomatic and persons with mild symptoms who are identified as COVID positive. Panda, however, said persons with comorbidities are advised to avail treatment in hospitals.



Keonjhar, Sept 20: The National Green Tribunal (NGT) has sought a report from the state government about construction activities and deforestation in the Telkoi-Pallahada elephant Corridor in Keonjhar district.

HABITAT LOSS

he government had identified 23 elephant corridors in the state in 2011. Of them, 14 were given corridor status while nine others

An interim order of a court in 2016 banned disruptive or damaging activities in all the 14 elephant corridors in the state

But hills are being damaged to make space for the NH-49 elephant corridor. Opposing such activities, Odisha Wildlife Society has filed a petition with the NGT

There was an interim order of a court in 2016 that no disruptive or damaging activities would be carried out in all the 14 elephant corridors in the state. That means, the order has clearly banned deforestation, building of roads and railways through the elephant corridors.

Despite this order, hills are being damaged to make space for the NH-49 expansion in the Telkoi-Pallahada elephant corridor.

Expressing concern over such damaging activities in the elephant corridor, the Odisha Wildlife Society has filed a petition with the NGT

In the petition, Shankar Prasad Pani, the counsel of the Odisha Wildlife Society, said that despite the court order, construction activities have been taken up for road



expansion inside the elephant corridor, but the Keonjhar DFO did not apprise the government about the expansion work

The Odisha Wildlife Society observed that as a construction company has been carrying out the NH-49 expansion at huge costs, there should be action against the forest department.

It may be noted here that the government had identified 23 elephant corridors in the state in 2011. Of them, 14 were given corridor status while nine others are awaiting nod.

Telkoi-Pallahada and Karo-karam pada corridors are included in the 24. However, these two corridors are allegedly getting damaged for lack of proper measures and monitoring by the forest department.

The Odisha Wildlife Society said that the petition has been filed with the NGT for protection of elephant corridors, while wildlife activists and environmentalists have been advocating for safety of elephants and protection of their habitats and corridors in the state

As the elephants have been damaging crops, farmers are spending sleepless nights trying to drive





New focus on media

edia freedom is back into strong focus with the Supreme Court saying the government must frame guidelines for functioning of the electronic media that went overboard in their obsession with TRP ratings bordering on sensationalism and even communalism. The government swiftly threw the ball back into the judiciary's court, suggesting that it frame guidelines first on the digital media as the mainstream print and electronic media already have regulations. How this back-and-forth would progress is worth a wait and watch. This is no easy job, and chances are that the entire spectrum of the media – print, electronic and digital - would come under scrutiny in an increasing manner. Although scrutiny may not sound negative yet which individuals will scrutinize will be a matter of great concern.

Notably, the issue arose after Sudarshan TV telecast a programme which stated among other things that an attempt was on by Moslems to infiltrate the government services. The apex court rightly found this to be a case of communalising a situation by use of terms like UPSC Jihad and Bureaucracy Jihad. Four episodes were telecast in a series after the channel got the nod from the government on September 9, and 10. More episodes were to be released when the court applied brakes, terming this as the "vilification of a

The Central government's argument now is that, apart from the fact that the mainstream media already has a set of guidelines for functioning, while the digital media which has faster and wider reach and has the potential to become viral with applications like YouTube, WhatsApp, Twitter, Facebook

and such goes unfettered. In fact, the Centre has also opposed the court undertaking an exercise to regulate the electronic media alone, and said this was "unwarranted", if it is "merely based upon one episode or a few episodes of one channel, namely Sudarshan TV." The government's distaste to this exercise is clearly evident. It may also be noted that the Modi government came to power with the immense help and use of social media. Once in office, television became the main-



stay for propaganda. It is definitely easy to control and manipulate these channels as they are always at the mercy of the government for spectrum and uplinking licenses. Digital media, on the other hand, is a free horse and much more difficult to reign in.

Two aspects need be noted in relation to the Centre's stand. One, the Modi government came to power in 2014 and in 2019 through a massive digital/social media build-up and this support is dwindling over the years. Rather, now the social media is exposing the failures of the Modi government. Two, the electronic media is now at the beck and call of the establishment. Running TV channels is an expensive exercise, and these entities can easily be controlled through multiple governmental interferences by cutting their financial resources. It is also known that prominent channels are run by large business houses, which require to be on the correct side of the government for their other larger business interests.

Global digital media functions on massive budgets and a third world country like India can neither punish nor lure these platforms to perform according to the wishes of our politicians. Case in point was when the Modi government was desperately pushing Facebook to share user data with it. Hilariously, there was a time when suggestions were made by the government to link Aadhaar with every social media account, which these platforms flatly refused to do.

Digital media is a worldwide phenomenon. Its freedom is not questioned except in autocracies in the Middle East or in countries like China and Russia. The wider world has no problem with digital media. Democracies are allowing them a free run, also as it helps those in power to gauge the mood of the people. For autocracies, people's mood does not matter. By applying controls on digital media, India could enter the age of darkness. Today, a channel vilified Moslems. Tomorrow, another channel may vilify Hindoos.

It is not a question of the BJP, or the Congress, or any party for that matter which rules at the Centre. Access to information or their dissemination should not be controlled by the government. The Constitution has granted freedom to the people and to media in the form of Freedom of Expression (FoE), and it must be upheld as a sacred commitment to the Constitution itself. Today, the government recommends control on digital media; tomorrow it can ask for controls on print media; and another day it can seek curbs on TV channels. It is for the court to look at matters from a wider perspective. The health of the entire spectrum of media is important. There cannot be a selective approach to set matters right. People must be trusted and they are capable to decide what is fake and what is not.



LEAPING FLAMES OF HELL

here have been many, but let me cite just two reactions from the family Justices Chandrachud, Indu Malhotra and KM Joseph's utterances restraining Sudarshan TV from telecasting its 'UPSC Jihad' show. A relative mailed a couplet comprehensive

"Door insaan ke sar se yeh musi-

Aag dozakh ki bujha do, use jannat kar do'

(Remove this menace hovering over our heads,

Douse the leaping flames of hell; make it a paradise)

'Leaping flames of hell': that is how a majority of Indian TV shows register with petrified Muslims. TV news is daily mortification; lynchings happen outdoors. The Supreme Court's quest for 'some mechanism' for self-regulation of the media brings her hope. "Cricket will be played within a well-measured boundary?" Not too much to expect. The other reaction, from a younger relative, is more cynical. If the Supreme Court had sharp instincts, it would have taken suo moto note of the outrage, before Sudarshan TV was able to telecast even one episode.

Incinient communalism was part of the Republic from the very beginning. Contentious issues on that score, however, did not come up when the electronic media consisted only of Doordarshan. DD, launched in the mid-70s, faced roadblocks too – as in the screening of Tamas, based on a novel by Bhisham Sahni and directed by Govind Nihalani. Centered on the Partition, the director pulls no punches on exposing communalism on all sides. Since majoritarian communalism had never been placed under the scanner with such candour in Independent India, there was a furore. Screening was stopped. Only when Justices Bakhtawar Lentin and Sujata Manohar of the Bombay High Court cleared the serial, was it screened.

litical atmosphere by mainstream channels as well as fly-by-night media operators.

An anti-Muslim edge is a perceived requirement of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's march towards Hindu Rashtra. But an anti-Muslim edge in the media has antecedents which predate Modi. Four apparently disparate events stirred the cauldron of communalism. In 1990, the Soviet Union collapsed. The disappearance of a column in the international system on which India had depended, plus an unprecedented economic crisis, caused then Prime Minister PV Narasimha Rao and Finance Minister Manmohan Singh to lurch towards Washington and they swiftly embarked on liberal economic policies. With the new market economy came consumerism and the need for multiple TV channels to accommodate the burgeoning advertising. Remember when the Babri Masiid fell in December 1992, there was only Doordarshan to televise the news.

About this time, the Mandal versus Kamandal, or caste versus communalism, spiraled out of control. It is pointless speculating whether a mushroom growth of channels went some distance in amplifying the new, energetic, communal politics. 'Market and identity politics' is a separate study. Internal politics, however communal, would have been amenable to management.

The real problem arose when globalisation, spurred on by unbridled capitalism caused even Barack Obama to ask in retrospect: "Did we mishandle global isation?" I have often wondered if Ghalib's imagery is applicable:

"Rau mein hai rakhsh e umr kahaan dekhiye thamey,

Nay haath bag par hain, na pa

hai rakab mein. (The steed is in full flight; I know not where it will halt; I have lost control of the reins and, feet are not in the stirrups.) That was globalisation. Having brought down the Soviet Union, the US put its imprimatur on a Unipolar World Order by embarking on operation Desert Storm in February 1992. In some ways, Desert Storm bared the plans the US had for the future. The most important of these, pertinent to our narrative, was the inauguration of the Global Electronic Media which the Pentagon planned with such stealth that even arch ally like UK found itself flat-footed.

BBC's senior correspondent, John Simpson, walked around Baghdad with a lowly satellite telephone while Peter Arnett of the CNN launched the New World

Information order from the terrace of Baghdad's Al Rasheed hotel. For the first time in history a war was brought live into our drawing rooms. The unprecedented fire power which I saw from the 14th floor of Al Mansour Hotel remained a nightmare for months. This frightful exhibition, let it always be remembered, divided the world in perpetuity into two hostile sets of audience-the triumphant West and the defeated Muslim world, humiliated yet again. Had multiple channels been operational in India (they were not in 1991-92), would they have been cheering western victory or Muslim defeat? It would have been bad form to pose this query then? Please note how times have changed and why the Supreme Court's intervention is timely.

The post 9/11 war on terror transformed itself into a crusade against Islam. Journalistic restraint became a casualty. Geraldo Rivera of Fox News flourished a revolver in front of a TV camera in October 2001 in Afghanistan. "Should I see Osama bin Laden anywhere, I shall finish him off with this," said he, his finger on the trigger. The copycat Indian media, now in a phase of rapid expansion, picked up every inflection. When Narendra Modi ar rived in Gujarat in October 2001 for his baptism as Chief Minister, the fireworks over Afghanistan, demonisation of Osama bin Laden was dominating the airwaves.

Global Islamophobia dovetailed nicely into Indian communalism. The February 2002 Gujarat pogrom produced some excellent TV journalism but the confluence of Islamophobia and hard saffron muffled the murderous events for an attentive global audience.

All Prime Ministers of India from 1947 to the mid-90s depended on traditional forms of mass mobilisation, prior to the TV era. A more media savvy prime minister than Narendra Modi, there has not been. He played all the strings to arrange for himself a saturation coverage of the 2014 and 2019 elections with expert ease. Crony capitalism was essential and it was easily managed.

'No' to new projects, sale of PSUs

mbition is good. The \$5 trillion economy is a nice goal, but the path chosen has to match the goal. Since the April-June quarter of 2019, the economy has been nose-diving. The industry has continuously been bringing to notice the demand plunge. Belated freeing of taxes up to ₹5 lakh of income was a prudent decision. So was relief to the corporates. Several other factors and contraction of factory output, job losses, salary cuts and other issues had taken 2019 to a virtual abyss.

It has started reflecting since December 2019, when the government started pruning allocations of various departments. In many cases, during the last quarter, before being hit by corona, the financial situation had turned severe. A stock taking is needed for taking right decisions and for giving up many projects that are now on offer. People have the wisdom to understand the difficulties and agree for course corrections. A visit to the hinterlands would make it clear how the village elders do such retractions. They say that if you are in difficulty desist from buying ornaments to keep your family happy. It is raw wisdom. The nation must imbibe it. In difficult times, a temptation to sell assets is natural. The process of putting the PSUs on sale reflects that. No family, however, easily parts with their hard-earned assets. The nation has to rethink. The family silver, PSU, has been paying high dividends to help the government sail through difficult times.

PSUs like BPCL need ₹400 crore to sell but a mere ₹72 crore to refurbish and rerun. The PSUs have been harbinger of progress with measly investment. The 59th Public Enterprises Survey 2018-19 says as on March 31, 2019, there were 339 CPSEs with a total investment of ₹16,40,628 crore. The total revenue earned in 2018-19 was ₹25,43,370 crore. The dividend paid by only seven of these was ₹21,000 crore. Was this a bad performance?

In terms of giving jobs with living wages, the central PSUs are better than their private sector competitors. They employ 20 lakh people (sustain at least 80 lakh) and give indirect employment to almost equal numbers. The coal, steel, engineering, power and textiles have the largest number of employees.

The PSUs have beaten the private sector in 2017-18 with 8 per cent employment growth. The private sector growth was only 6.3 per cent, says a Care Ratings study of 700 companies. The study noted that overall job growth in the private sector had declined in 2018. The total employment was 4.57 million; of these, 2 million in PSUs. Additionally, the companies with net sales of ₹50-100 crore, ₹100-250 crore and ₹500-1000 crore underperformed and pulled down the overall employment growth.

The development indicates that the slide had started in 2017. However, the country had not taken the developments of 2017 to 2019 in a serious manner leading to almost a crisis situation post lockdown. It has raised a fundamental question of total stoppage of production, functioning and processes since the March 22 janata curfew. Still the unlock period is also marked by several restrictions. The lockdown has not been a prudent decision. An unseemly comparison with neighbouring Pakistan is one such hint. Except for local containment areas, there was no general lockdown. Industrial or economic or official activities were not stopped. Pakistan economy is growing and not as hit as large economies such as the US or Europe

or smaller ones like South Africa. Islamabad interestingly has also received rave reviews from WHO. Its Director-General TA Ghebreyesus says Pakistan is included among the seven countries that the world can learn how to deal with the Covid-19 pandemic. The state must be caring but not to the extent that it jeopardises activities. Many problems including severe job and income crunch today emanate from it.

It has to move beyond it, beyond falling factory outputs, infrastructure investments and less productive investments.

The time is to give up all luxuries, and hold PSUs and the Railways sales on hold. We must give up many euphoric projects that the country does not need. These include the ₹1.1 lakh crore bullet train; the ₹862 core proposed new Parliament complex; the ₹20,000 crore New Delhi Central Vista project; the ₹29, 560 crore Jewar airport that may cause environmental degradation; the ₹22,000 crore new memorial projects in Mumbai, and may modify the ecologically sensitive Char Dham project linking in Uttarakhand.

Saturday, Ghosh took to Twitter and wrote that the "Gangs of Wasseypur" director was sexually inappropriate towards her, a claim he has dismissed.

The 30-year-old actor tagged Prime Minister Narendra Modi in her tweet, requesting him to take action against Kashyap.

"@anuragkashyap72 has forced himself on me and extremely badly. @PMOIndia @narendramodi ii. kindly take action and let the country see the demon behind this cre-

ative guy. I am aware that it can harm me and my security is at risk. Please help!" Ghosh wrote.

In a video released to ABN Telugu, Ghosh claimed that the incident happened in 2014-2015.

The actor, who made her Hindi debut with Rishi Kapoor-Paresh Rawal starrer "Patel Ki Punjabi Shaadi", also claimed that Kashyap boasted about his connection with megastar Amitabh Bachchan and claimed that there were other female

artistes who he got intimate with. Dismissing the allegations, Kashyap called Ghosh's claim an attempt to "silence" him.

An outspoken critic of administration and a member of the Indian film industry who is vocal about the vilification of Bollywood by celebrities and trolls online, the director said it had taken some people "such a long time" to "shut me up".

"(But) while shutting me up, you lied so much that you dragged other women also in it. Please maintain some dignity madam. All I will say is that all your allegations are baseless," Kashyap, 48, tweeted.

"Any lover or all those female actors with whom I've worked or the team of all those girls and women that have been working with me or all those women I've met in private or in public. I neither behaved like this nor do I tolerate such a behaviour at any cost. Rest we will see what happens," he added.

New Delhi, Sept 20 : As many as 16.79 lakh people in Jammu and Kashmir have been given domicile certificates so far, the Ministry of Home Affairs informed Lok Sabha

Union Minister of State for Home G Kishan Reddy said, as per the information provided by the Jammu and Kashmir administration, a total of 21,13,879 people have applied for the domicile certificates. Out of these, 16,79,520 people have been given the domicile certificates, he said replying to a written question.

Mr Reddy said, altogether 1,21,630 applications have been rejected so far for not annexing prescribed documents with the application.

He said the Rule 5 of the Jammu

and Kashmir Grant of Domicile Certificate (Procedure) Rules, 2020 mandates certain documents which are to be annexed with the application. The applications which lack the prescribed documents are re-



The minister said, as per the registration records maintained with the Provincial Rehabilitation Officer (PRO), Jammu and Kashmir, a total of 6,565 families were registered as displaced families from Chhamb Niabat area during the Indo-Pak war of 1971.

For the displaced families of 1971, agricultural land at the rate of 4 acres (irrigated) or 6 acres (unirrigated) was allotted. A cash compensation of 7,500 per family was also paid, he said.

Mr Reddy said, due to the Indo-Pak war of 1947, a total of 31,619 families got displaced from the Pakistan Occupied Jammu and Kashmir (POJK), out of which 26,319 families got registered and settled in the erstwhile State of Jammu and Kashmir.

Srinagar, Sept 20: The Jammu and Kashmir High Court will have arbitration centres in both regions of the union territory to provide an institutionalised framework for speedy and expeditious resolution of disputes through an alternate dispute resolution mechanism.

The court has accorded approval to setting up of high court annexed arbitration centres at Srinagar and Jammu, an official spokesman said here on late Saturday evening.

The centres will be called "The Jammu and Kashmir International Arbitration Centre (JKIAC)"

For securing fair, speedy and inexpensive justice to the litigants and being sensitive to the fact that the object of the Section 89, in absence of detailed modalities, has remained somewhat dormant in Jammu and Kashmir, the court has set up these arbitration centres, the spokesman said.

He said to ensure that the constitution of such centres is smooth and effective, the high court has also framed "The Jammu and Kashmir International Arbitration



Centre (JKIAC) (International Management Rules, 2020)".

As per these rules, he said, the chief justice of the high court of Jammu and Kashmir shall be the patron-in-chief of the Jammu and Kashmir International Arbitration

Centre (JKIAC). To monitor and oversee the centres, an arbitration committee consisting of three judges of the high court, advocate general, assistant solicitor general attached to the high court and three members to be nominated by the Chief Justice of the Common High Court of Jammu and Kashmir and Ladakh out of nated senior advocate, while the others may be any arbitration expert, in India or abroad has to be established, the spokesman said.

He said to supervise and manage the JKIAC, a secretariat consisting of coordinator who shall be a member of higher judicial service and two additional coordinators who shall be members of Judicial Service, have to be appointed by the chief justice.

The spokesman said the rules further envisage appointment of Chief Counsel and Deputy Counsel amongst advocates having experience in the field of arbitration.

As per the rules, the JKIAC has to prepare and maintain a panel of arbitrators as approved by the arbitration committee from time to time from amongst the persons who are suitable and willing to serve as arbitrators provided that their suitability shall be determined by the arbitration committee, he said.

The empanelment of the arbitrators shall consist of former judges, former judicial officers, chartered accountants, bureaucrats, engineers, architects, professors etc. he added.

Mumbai, Sept 20: Two days after the state education department relaxed the cut-off date for age criteria to nursery and Class 1 admissions in the state, experts have raised concerns over the new norms.

As per a government resolution released September 18, a child has to complete 3 years by December 31 to be eligible for pre-primary/nurserv admissions. Similarly, the child should have completed 6 years by the same date for admission to Class 1.



Mumbai, Sept 20: In his long career as a reporter, Walter Alfred has seen many things, including the launch of the Quit India movement, wars and the inside of a Pakistani jail.

Alfred, who had a long innings with the Press Trust of India (PTI) as a journalist, turns 100 on September 21.

He has covered many wars India has fought, including the 1962 war with China and the 1965 war with Pakistan. Reminiscing about his reporting days at his house in Mira Road township on the outskirts of Mumbai, he said, "For me, the 1962 war with China was a painful memory as it deeply affected the then

Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru. "The shock of China defying him was severe for him," he said.

Now, as Indian troops are once again locked in a stand-off with China, Alfred said back then, there was "no dearth of official information" about the border developments.

Alfred, who retired from PTI in 1978, took up teaching at the Indian Institute of Mass Communication and a few other journalism institutes.



The figure was provided by the NCSK in response to an RTI query on the number of deaths reported while cleaning sewers and septic tanks from 2010 to March 2020. According to the data, 631 such fatalities were reported during the period. The highest number of deaths were reported in 2019 at 115.

A single person has not been punished under the Prohibition of Employment as Manual Scavengers and their Rehabilitation Act since its enactment. An Act should not be a false promise like an election manifesto, an Act should be what we should implement in an unequal society," the Magsaysay award winning activist said.

Man found hanging in police lock-up

New Delhi, Sept 20: A 38-year-old man held in a POCSO case was found hanging in the lock-up of the Samaypur Badli police station in Delhi's Outer North District Sunday morning, following which his kin accused police of torturing him to death.

Police, however, claimed that the man hanged himself with a bedsheet in the lock-up. Accused Dharmendra was detained in a sexual assault case by the Swaroop Nagar police station on Saturday. Later, he was arrested and shifted to the Samaypur Badli police station where he was found hanging, police said Sunday.

According to police, the man was in jailed on murder charge but was out on parole since March. His parole was extended because of the coronavirus pandemic. The police said that a case under Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act was registered at the Swaroop Nagar police station after Dharmendra allegedly sexually assaulted a 14-year-old girl in Swaroop Nagar while her parents were away Saturday. Police claimed that he fled the crime spot and hid at a relative's house. Later, he was apprehended and brought to the police station.

Sources said that Dharmendra had requested a policeman posted in the lock-up for food and as the latter moved out to look for his relatives, the man allegedly hanged himself with a bedsheet tied to an iron grill.

"The police tortured him so much that he died; now, they are trying to cook up stories about his hanging. He could not commit suicide. He was tortured to death by police," said Dharmendra's

'Mosque may be square-shaped like Kaaba'

Lucknow, Sept 20: The mosque to come up in Ayodhya pursuant to the Supreme Court verdict in the Ram Janmabhoomi case may be square-shaped like the Kaaba Sharif in Mecca and will not be named after any emperor or king.

Secretary and spokesperson of the Indo-Islamic Cultural Foundation (IICF) Athar Hussain said Sunday. 'A mosque measuring 15,000 square feet will be built in Dhannipur village. It will be of the same size as that of the Babri mosque. The shape of the mosque may be completely different from that of other mosques. It may be square-shaped like the Kaaba Sharif in Mecca, as hinted

by architect SM Akhtar."

To a question on whether the mosque will have no domes or minarets like the Kaaba Sharif, Hussain said it could be a possibility. He said the architect has been given a free hand in this regard. "The mosque will not be named Babri Masjid. It will not be named

after any king or emperor. My personal opinion is that it should be called the Dhannipur Masjid.' Hussain said.

He also informed that the trust is making its portal so that people can donate for the mosque and the museum, hospital and research centre which will be built inside

Villages along LoC finally connected with national power grid

Kupwara (Kashmir), Sept 20: Shouts of 'Bijli' from thrilled villagers lit up the face of Kupwara Deputy Commissioner Anshul Garg after efforts for over a year finally connected habitats in Keran and Machil in far north Kashmir to the national power grid, ending an over sevendecade-long wait for people living in these areas along the Line of Control.

"When I took over as deputy commissioner (DC) of this northernmost district of the country, I began interacting with local people living in far-flung areas, especially those in villages located near the LoC (Line of Control)," 31-year-old Garg,

Terrorists building bunkers to escape

Shopian (Kashmir), Sept 20: Hideouts in higher reaches and seeking refuge in local houses are a thing of the past as terrorists in Kashmir valley now dig underground bunkers in dense orchards and even in seasonal streams to escape the dragnet of army and se-

This trend has been witnessed off late in twin districts of Pulwama and Shopian with the latter having a majority of them in view of dense apple orchards and jungles," says Colonel A K Singh, heading the 44 Rashtriya Rifles, the army's counter-insurgent unit which earned a distinction of having maximum kills of terrorists as well as surrenders or apprehensions.

Col Singh and his team is always seen engaging with locals to sort out their problems which may even include career counselling or guidance in education but when it comes to countering terrorists, they are much ahead by neutralising 47 militants and ensuring detentions and surrender of seven of them.

For Col Singh and his team, who man two areas of Shopian and three of Pulwama districts, both considered to be hotbeds of militancy, the task has not been easy after recovery of underground bunkers where terrorists could hide for several days without being noticed by the security forces.

The shocker was a hideout in the

middle of Rambi Ara, known for fluctuating water levels and often affected by flash floods, that led Col Singh and his team members back to the drawing board. "The terrorists were hiding inside an iron bunker made in the middle of Rambi Ara. The alert troops saw an opening of an empty oil barrel which was subsequently used by terrorists to enter into the bunker."This was something worth suspicion and

discreet surveillance was mounted on the opening. Much to our surprise, we saw terrorists emerging out from underground in the middle of the stream, which generally has water gushing only in the rainy season," he said. Five terrorists belonging to banned Lashkar-e-Taiba and Hizbul Mujahideen were killed after the troops launched an attack earlier this year. However, for the army, it was not the statistics of some trend indicating that terrorists were now well-entrenched inside the underground bunkers.

With the help of technical intelligence coupled with human resources, a survey was ordered of surrounding areas especially in Shopian and the results were encouraging as reports of more cavities in traditional Kashmiri households and underground bunkers started surfacing.

Covered by dense apple trees and situated at a height, the army found another underground bunker in Bandpoh in June this year where terrorists had managed to create a 12 feet by 10 feet room. The militants were enjoying their stay while army soldiers were looking for them in other civilian areas.

The underground bunker finally lay exposed after troops noticed a polythene sheet covering nothing and the earth nearby was filled recently.

"The difficult moment for us during this operation was the presence of nearly 50 ladies in the orchards which included one who was pregnant. We initiated an evacuation process and rushed the pregnant lady to a nearby health centre before launching an operation.

Five terrorists were gunned down around the underground bunker, says Col Singh, who after taking over the command of 44-Rashtriya Rifles had visited some civilian houses whose kin had joined terror groups.

Single-day recoveries surpass fresh cases

New Delhi, Sept 20: India's singleday recoveries surpassed the number of new infections for the second consecutive day Sunday, with 94,612 people having recuperated from COVID-19, even as the total caseload sprinted past 54 lakh, according to the Union Health Ministry's data.

A total of 94,612 people recovered from coronavirus in a span of 24 hours, taking the national recovery rate to 79.68 per cent, while 92,605 people tested positive for the disease during the period, taking the total COVID-19 cases to 54,00,619.

The death toll climbed to 86,752 with the virus claiming 1,133 lives in a span of 24 hours, the data updated at 8 am showed. The total COVID-19 recoveries have surged to 43,03,043.

The COVID-19 case fatality rate was recorded at 1.61 per cent. There are 10,10,824 active cases in the country which comprise 18.72 per cent of the total caseload, the data stated.

India's COVID-19 tally had crossed the 20-lakh mark on August 7, 30 lakh on August 23, 40 lakh on September 5 and it went past 50 lakh on September 16. According to the ICMR, a cumulative total of 6,36,61,060 samples have been tested up to September 19 with 12,06,806 samples being tested on Saturday.

This will reduce the loan burden to potential buyers to about Rs 20,000 crore. The government is likely to pay Air India's dues worth Rs 22,000 crore to vendors such as airports and oil companies before putting up the airline for sale.

Iran dismisses US efforts for Letter containing poison **UN sanctions as currency drops**

Tehran, Sept 20: Iran dismissed US efforts to restore all UN sanctions on the country as mounting economic pressure from Washington pushed the local currency down to its lowest level ever Sunday. Iran's currency dropped to 2,72,500 to the US dollar at money exchange

shops across Tehran. The Rial has lost more than 30 per cent of its value to the dollar since June as sweeping US sanctions on Iran continue to crush its ability to sell oil globally.

Iran's currency was at 32,000 Rials to the dollar at the time of Tehran's 2015 nuclear deal with world powers, which was signed by the Obama administration but which the Trump administration pulled the US out of. As the currency plummeted. Iran's foreign ministry spokesman Saeed Khatibzadeh slammed the Trump administration's declaration Saturday that all UN sanctions against Iran have been reimposed because Tehran is not complying with the nuclear deal.

"Tehran's message to Washington is clear: return to the international community, return to your commitments and stop bullying so the international community will accept you." he said. The US move has been rejected as illegal by most of the rest of the world and sets the stage for an ugly showdown at the world body ahead of its annual General Assembly this week.



US lost legal standing to invoke snapback sanctions when President Donald Trump withdrew from the press nuclear deal in 2018 and began reimposing US sanctions on Iran.

France, Germany and Britain issued a joint statement Sunday reiterating that they contest the legal basis of the Trump administration's bid to activate the "snapback" sanctions mechanism because the United States withdrew from the nuclear accord.

The statement said "it follows that any decision or action taken on the basis of this procedure ... are without effect in law." The three countries stressed they remain determined to preserve the nuclear deal with Iran. The Iranian government spokesman said the snapback sanctions have only happened in "the fantastical world" of the Trump administration. He said the US stands on the wrong side of history. "They are attempting to make everyone believe it, but nobody is buying it except for themselves, Khatibzadeh said during his weekly briefing Sunday "It is a television show whose sole presenter, viewers and those cheering it on are Mr. Pompeo himself and a handful of others," the spokesman said, referring to the US secretary of state.

The White House plans to issue an executive order on Monday spelling out how the US will enforce the restored sanctions, and the State and Treasury departments are expected to outline how foreign individuals and businesses will be penalised for violations.

Washington, Sept 20: A package containing ricin poison that was addressed to US President Donald Trump has been intercepted before it reached the White House, officials told American media

The letter was discovered at a screening facility for White House mail earlier this week, the BBC quoted the officials as saying to the outlets Saturday.

They said a substance found inside the envelope was identified as

ricin, a poison found naturally in castor beans. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the Secret Service are investigating where the package came from and whether others have been sent through the US postal system.

"At this time, there is no known threat to public safety," the FBI told CNN in a statement Saturday. One official told the New York Times that investigators believe the package was sent from Canada.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) said Saturday it was working with the FBI to investigate the "suspicious letter sent to the White House". Ricin is produced by processing castor beans.

It is a lethal substance that, if swallowed, inhaled or injected, can cause nausea, vomiting, internal bleeding and ultimately organ failure, the BBC reported.

No known antidote exists for ricin. If a person is exposed to ricin, death can take place within 36 to 72 hours, depending on the dose received, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Nawaz Sharif makes political comeback

Islamabad, Sept 20: Pakistan's deposed premier Nawaz Sharif Sunday staged a political comeback by criticising the powerful Army and said the Opposition was not against Prime Minister Imran Khan but against those who brought an "inefficient" man to power.

Addressing the All-Parties Conference (APC) hosted by the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) via a video link aimed at launching a protest movement against the Khanled Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) government, the three-time premier launched a scathing attack on the ruling party for its "failure to address the basic problems of the people"

Sharif, 70, the Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz (PML-N) supremo, has been living in London since November last year after the Lahore High Court granted him permission to go abroad for four weeks for treatment.

On Friday, PPP chairman Zardari talked to him over phone and invited him to virtually attend the Opposition-led All Parties

Conference (APC) scheduled to be held on Sunday.

Addressing the conference. Sharif criticised the country's powerful establishment for allegedly supporting Khan. "Our struggle is not against

Imran Khan. Today, our struggle is against those who installed Imran Khan and who manipulated elections (of 2018) to bring an inefficient man like him into power and thus destroyed the country," he said. Sharif said that the foremost

priority should be to remove "this selected government and this system", adding that "if the change is not brought, it will bring irreversible loss to this country."

Sharif, his daughter Maryam and son-in-law Muhammad Safdar were convicted in the Avenfield properties case July 6, 2018.

TRUMP VOWS TO **NOMINATE WOMAN JUDGE FOR SC**



Washington, Sept 20: President Donald Trump has said he will next week nominate a woman to replace the late US Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, escalating a political row with the Democrats over her successor weeks before the presidential election.

"I will be putting forth a nominee next week. I could say most likely it would be a woman. I think I can say that. If somebody were to ask me now I would say that a woman would be in first place," Trump told supporters at an election rally in North Carolina Saturday.

Ginsburg, a history-making jurist, feminist icon and a champion of women's rights and social justice, died of cancer Friday. She was 87. She was the second woman ever to serve as a justice on the nation's highest court.

Trump said he is within his rights to fill the vacancy in the US Supreme Court, a move that has infuriated Democrats, who fear Republicans will vote to lock in a decades-long conservative majority on the country's top court.

HK's first cannabis cafe

Hong Kong, Sept 20: Cannabis may be illegal in Hong Kong, but a new cafe is offering a range of food and drinks that contain parts of the cannabis plant without breaking any local laws. The cafe, named Found, is the city's first to offer a range of coffees, biscuits, beer and fruit juices that contain cannabidiol, or CBD, a substance from the cannabis plant that is said to offer therapeutic effects without

getting users intoxicated. Cannabis's tetrahydrocannabinol compound -- commonly known as THC — is the psychoactive ingredient that gives users a high. But unlike THC, CBD is typically used to

help reduce stress without the high. One Found customer, Killian Hussey, who works in finance in Hong Kong, said consuming CBD coffee is relaxing. The coffee is delicious, and I like the effect that the CBD has on me," Hussey said. "Cognitively and physically, it kind of helps me get through the aches and pains of a normal day." A bottle of cold CBD-infused coffee costs 80 Hong Kong dollars (\$10) at Found, while a can of CBD beer is HK\$70 (\$9). The cafe, which had a soft opening this month, is expected to be fully operational in October

"Hong Kong is actually one of Asia's most progressive cannabinoid markets," said Fiachra Mullen, co-owner of Altum International, a cannabinoids supplier in Asia that operates Found. According to the Hong Kong government's Centre for Food and Safety, under the Dangerous Drugs Ordinance, the illicit import of cannabis or any products that contain controlled cannabinoids constitutes a criminal offence. Although CBD is a cannabinoid, it is not classified as a dangerous drug under Hong Kong law.



New Delhi, Sept 20: Public sector banks (PSBs) reported frauds worth over ₹19,964 crore in total 2,867 cases during the April-June quarter of the ongoing fiscal year, according to a reply to an RTI

The country's largest lender State Bank of India (SBI) saw the highest number of fraud cases: however, Bank of India was the worst hit in terms of value, as per a reply from the Reserve Bank on frauds reported by these lenders to RTI activist Chandra Shekhar

Of the 12 PSBs, SBI reported the maximum 2,050 fraud cases involving ₹2,325.88 crore during April-June 2020.

Bank of India took the biggest hit in terms of valuation at ₹5,124.87 crore in 47 cases, followed by Canara Bank ₹3,885.26 crore in 33 cases, Bank of Baroda ₹2,842.94 crore in 60 cases, Indian Bank ₹1,469.79 crore in 45 cases, Indian Overseas Bank ₹1.207.65 crore in 37 cases and Bank of Maharashtra ₹1,140.37 crore in 9 cases.

New Delhi, Sept 20: With the gradual lifting of the restrictions on economic activities across the country, business sentiments have recovered with the CII Business Confidence Index surging to 50.3 in the July-September period.

During the April-June quarter of 2020, it recorded its lowest reading at 41.0.

"The stellar recovery in the index has been supported by the remarkable increase in the Expectations Index (EI), which rose 46% quarter-on-quarter, to the level of 55.2, as the nationwide lockdown restrictions were lifted, and businesses gradually began to reopen during the July-September quarter," a CII statement said.

The 'Current Situation Index', on the other hand, was recorded below the psychological level of 50 -- at 40.6 -- as the stringent lock-



down restrictions led to the complete shutdown of most business operations for a larger part of the quarter, thus impacting business senti-


Praying for crowds
