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NEW WING FOR WOMEN, CHILD SAFETY

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: In the wake of the high profile rape and murder case of a minor girl in Nayagarh district, Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik Wednesday announced the creation of a special wing in the police department to curb rising cases of crime against women and children.

The announcement was made at the valedictory session of 62nd senior police officers' conference, 2020 via videoconferencing.

"Crime against women and children remains our focus area. I hereby announce creation of Special wing in Odisha Police to look after offences against women and children. I expect that with these initiatives, quality services will be provided to the women and children," the CM said.

Expressing concern over low conviction rate in the state, Patnaik asked senior cops to take all possible steps to enhance conviction rate by factoring in modern technology into the investigation.

"Road Safety is another area of concern. Road accident related fatalities are very high in the state. There is a need to take up preventive and enforcement initiatives as well as public awareness campaigns in coordination

with other stakeholders like Transport, Works department etc. to bring down such fatalities," he said.

Stating that the law and order situation in the state remained peaceful in 2020, Naveen said, "A progressive and sustainable improvement has been no-

ticed in the Left Wing Extremism situation. Two brave hearts laid down their lives this year in the fight against Maoists. Families of the martyrs should be taken care of by the state police."

As the LWE problem is dynamic in nature and keeps changing, he asked

the police officers to closely monitor it and continue to take focused efforts. He commended the work of SPs of Malkangiri and Kandhamal in this connection. He also appreciated the efforts of SP, Keonjhar and Angul for the overall improvement in the industrial atmosphere.

The Chief Minister also lauded the overall effort of Odisha police in handling the pandemic with compassion and empathy. While doing so many police personnel have laid down their lives in the line of duty. He paid homage to the departed souls and assured their families of all support.

Speaking on 5T and Mo Sarkar ini-

tiatives, the Chief Minister said, "It is satisfying to see that the feedback taken under Mo Sarkar has been very positive. Though certain good initiatives under 5T in Odisha Police have been taken up, there is a need to increase the same."

Within record time, special family pension has been sanctioned to 38 next of kin. Similarly, 29 next of kin have received ₹50 Lakh ex-gratia compensation and rest should be processed without any delay. He also lauded the 930 police personnel who have voluntarily donated plasma for treatment of Covid patients for their spirit of service.

He congratulated the state police for organising an effective drive against narcotic drugs throughout the state with the STF taking the lead. A record quantity of narcotics has been seized. Commendable work has been done by DIG, STF and SP, Koraput.

However, special drive against organized crime and extortion should be carried out with more focused efforts, he told the cops. On this occasion, the CM inaugurated six police stations at Angul Sadar in Angul district, Bharatpur in Bhubaneswar, Jharsuguda Sadar in Jharsuguda, Belagantha in Ganjam, and Sabrang and Pirahat in Bhadrak district.



₹3,000 crore Paradip port project okayed

New Delhi, Dec 30: The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi Wednesday approved a ₹3,000 crore project to turn Paradip Port world-class by setting up a dock.

The project focuses on 'Deepening and Optimization of Inner Harbour Facilities including Development of Western Dock on Build, Operate and Transfer (BOT) basis under Public-Private Partnership (PPP) mode to handle cape size vessels at Paradip Port.'

Addressing media on the issue, Union Petroleum and Natural Gas Minister Dharmendra Pradhan and Union Minister of State for Ports, Shipping and waterways (I/C) Mansukh Mandaviya informed that the estimated cost of the project is ₹3,004.63 crore.

This includes development of the new Western Dock on BOT basis and capital dredging by the selected concessionaire at a cost of ₹2,040 crore and ₹352.13 crore respectively. It has also been informed that there will be investments to the tune of ₹612.50 crore towards providing Common Supporting Project Infrastructure.

Paradip port in Odisha is one of the 12 major ports under the control of the Centre

"The Concession period shall be 30 years from the date of Award of Concession. Paradip Port Trust (Concessioning Authority) shall provide the Common Supporting Project Infrastructure works to facilitate handling of cape size vessels," the ministry said.

MUSIC MAESTRO SHANTANU DIES, TRIBUTES POUR IN

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: Legendary Odia music Director Shantanu Mohapatra died here, family sources said on Wednesday. He was 84.

Mohapatra was suffering from old age related ailments and finally succumbed to pneumonia and cardiac failure Tuesday night. A large number of people paid their last respect to the music maestro at his Palaspalli residence.

Odisha Governor Ganeshi Lal, Andhra Pradesh Governor B B Harichandan, Odisha Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, Union Minister Dharmendra Pradhan and many dignitaries condoled the demise of Mohapatra.

In a condolence message, Lal said Shantanu Mohapatra was part of Odisha music for almost six decades and he will be remembered by all for long.

Patnaik described Mohapatra as an 'Unfading Talent'. As a lyricist and music director, he has left the shining signature of his talent. The music directed by him will keep him immortal forever; the chief minister said. Noting that Odisha has lost a talent, Patnaik announced state honour for the departed music director.

Apart from Odia, Mohapatra also worked in different languages. He composed the first modern Odia ballad Konark Gatha with lyrics by lyricist Gurukrushna Goswami and sung by Akshay Mohanty. He also wrote 'Kaliyae' which was sung by Sikandar Alam.

Cinema halls set to reopen

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: Following a nine-month hiatus, cinema halls and theatres in the state are all set to reopen with 50 per cent capacity from January 1.

In its unlock guidelines for the month of January, the state government stated, "Cinema halls, theatres will be allowed to open with up to 50 per cent of capacity and operate as per SOPs issued by the Government of India/ State Government in that regard."

However, reopening of open air theatres and entertainment parks along with 'jatras' will be permitted by the local authorities (district collector, municipal commissioner or any officer authorised



by them) subject to compliance of safety protocols such as mandatory wearing of face masks and physical distancing among others.

The School & Mass Education, Higher Education and Skill Development & Technical Education departments will decide the date of re-opening of educational institutions under their control in a graded manner.

Police modernisation: Funds lie idle

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: Odisha Police has failed to utilise funds earmarked for modernisation of the force in recent years, as per a report by Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPRD).

Every year, the force receives grants from both the state and central government to upgrade its infrastructure and capacity to meet emerging challenges in internal security.

"The focus of the scheme is on strengthening of the police infrastructure by way of construction of secure and people friendly Police Stations, Police Outposts, Police Housing,



Improved Mobility, Modern Weaponry, Computerization, Communication Equipment, Modern Traffic Control Equipment, etc," stated the report.

As per the report, the force got ₹68.91 crore for modernisation

out of the total ₹3,559.51 crore earmarked for the police force in the state's annual budget for the year 2018-19. However, the BPRD report reveals that Odisha Police managed to spend only ₹41.49 crore out of the total

Odisha Police could only spend ₹14.89 crore out of the combined ₹58.50 crore it received as grant in 2018-19

Similarly, the force spent a meager ₹6.8 crore out of the total ₹70.75 grant it received in 2019-20

budget during 2018-19, while the rest is still unspent.

Similarly, Odisha police received ₹35.10 crore as modernisation grant from the central government and ₹23.40 from the state government during the financial year 2018-19.

The force could only spend ₹14.89 crore out of the combined ₹58.50 crore it received as grant in the period.

On similar lines, the force received ₹42.45 crore from the central government and ₹28.3 crore from the state government as modernisation grant during 2019-20 financial year. As per the report, the force police spent a meager ₹6.8 crore out of the total ₹70.75 grant it received.

RJD seeks to fish in troubled NDA waters in Bihar

Patna, Dec 30: Defection of JD(U) MLAs to the BJP in Arunachal Pradesh and the resultant cold vibes between the partners in the ruling coalition in Bihar, seem to have kindled fresh hopes in the RJD which has ended up heading the opposition here despite being the single largest party.

Shyam Rajak, a former national general secretary of the JD(U) who joined RJD shortly before the recent assembly elections, Wednesday sought to fish in the troubled waters with the claim that 17 MLAs of Chief Minister Nitish Kumar's party were willing to cross over.

They are all feeling stifled in the current dispensation where the CM appears to have capitulated before



a domineering BJP. They are willing to switch sides as soon as possible, Rajak, who was the JD(U)'s deputy leader in the previous assembly, said here.

He claimed en masse defection of the JD(U) MLAs has been put on hold since the RJD hoped that more would like to follow suit soon which

would raise the number sufficiently enough to cause a split, tenable under the anti-defection law in the party which has 43 MLAs.

At the JD(U) national executive meeting here Sunday, the party adopted a resolution condemning the violation of the spirit of coalition politics in the north-

eastern state.

K C Tyagi, the party's outspoken national general secretary and spokesman, asserted that events in Arunachal will not cast a shadow in Bihar but admitted that the JD(U) had felt aahat (hurt).

Consensus with farmers on two issues, says govt

New Delhi, Dec 30: The government and farm unions reached some common ground Wednesday to resolve protesting farmers' concerns over rise in power tariff and penalties for stubble burning, but the two sides remained deadlocked over the main contentious issues of the repeal of three farm laws and a legal guarantee for MSP.

After nearly five hours of the sixth round of negotiations between three union ministers and a 41-member representative group of thousands farmers protesting on Delhi borders, Agriculture Minister Narendra Singh Tomar said at least 50 per cent resolution has been reached with mutual agreement on two out of four items on the agenda and discussions would continue on the remaining two January 4.

"Discussions on the three farm laws and MSP are continuing and will continue in the next round of talks on January 4," Tomar told reporters after the meeting ended.

He said talks were held in a cordial atmosphere and the two sides reached an agreement on two issues - one relating to the proposed electricity law and the other about an ordinance on penal provisions for stubble burning.

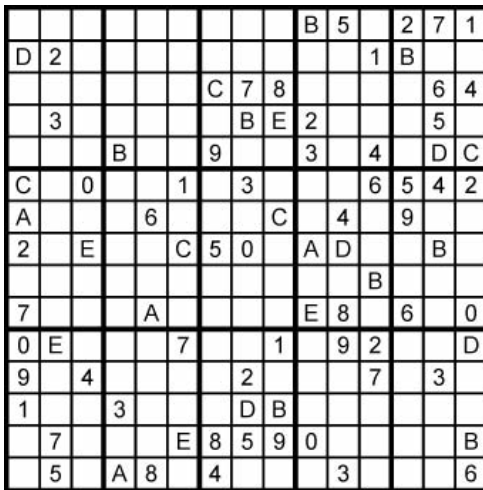

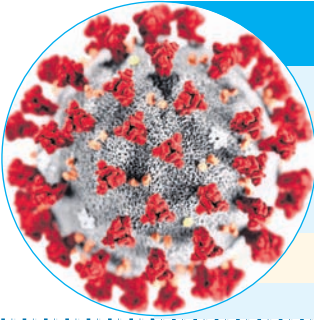

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: All government offices across the state will continue to remain closed Saturdays in January in view of the Covid-19 pandemic, as per a notification issued by General Administration and Public Grievances department, Wednesday. Offices in Bhubaneswar and Cuttack will function with 75 per cent strength of employees (all staffers including Group A officers) during January. The departments/head of offices in Bhubaneswar and Cuttack have been given power to decide the manner of selection of employees who will attend office. However, essential offices and



services like Special Relief Commissioner (SRC) & Odisha State Disaster Management Authority (OSDMA), police, fire, health & municipal services among others will function in full strength. All government offices and employees have been instructed to strictly follow all precautionary measures issued by the department, it said. In case of detection of any Covid case among the office employees, the office concerned will follow the protocol issued earlier. The officers/staffers, who have

They must be available to attend to any office work of urgent nature, at short notice and be available on telephone at all times, read the order. Meanwhile, the government has put restrictions on congregation and celebration of New Year's Day in government offices. The employees have been asked to use virtual means for conveying New Year greetings to colleagues and seniors.

No Zero Night, NYD bash in state

Bhubaneswar: In view of Covid-19, state government has prohibited celebration of Zero Night and New Year Day parties in public places. "Congregation in public places including hotels, restaurants, clubs, parks, convention halls, kalyan mandaps, etc. for Zero Night celebration/ welcome to New Year/similar other function on December 31, 2020 and January 1, 2021 will remain prohibited throughout the state," read an order issued by Chief Secretary Asit Tripathy, Wednesday. Usually, a large number of people congregate in hotels, restaurants, clubs, parks and other public places for Zero Night celebration on the eve of New Year. Since such congregations have large potential of spreading Covid-19 infection, the state government has imposed the order in public interest. Any person found violating this order will be punished under the provisions of the Disaster Management Act, 2005 and other relevant laws, warned the government.

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: Taking stern action against corrupt officials, the state government Wednesday gave compulsory retirement to six tainted officials with immediate effect. Of the six officials, four are engineers and two from Excise department. By the order of Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, compulsory retirement has been given to the corrupt and inefficient officials. Violators pay for littering City

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: Intensifying its drive against littering in public and open spaces, the Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation (BMC) collected penalties over Rs 1.61 lakh from different shops and establishments in two days. Carrying out enforcement drives in the three zones, the civic authority is reported to have collected Rs 1,61,650 as fine from 1,970 shops and commercial establishments for littering the public places since Monday. Two shops were also sealed during the drive. "As per an earlier order issued by BMC for penalising those found dumping garbage in open and not using dustbins we carried the enforcement drive. On the first day of enforcement, we had inspected 620 shops and imposed Rs 41,750 penalty. Meanwhile, on second day a total of Rs 1.19 lakh were imposed on 1,350 shops,"



said a senior officer of the enforcement squad. Launched under 'Mu Safaiwala' campaign, the civic authority in November had passed an official order banning any sort of littering in public spaces. However, it was found that shops and other entities are not following the thumb rule of keeping dustbins in their units,

Speaking on the fines imposed, BMC Commissioner Prem Chandra Chaudhary said, "Initially, we had conducted awareness drives and informed shopkeepers to strictly use dustbins. Our objective is not to make profits out of penalties but to enforce efficient hygiene and clean environment for the city."

Panigrahi had earlier filed a miscellaneous case in the HC and sought polygraph test on SIT chief Arun Bothra. He had also pleaded for a CBI investigation into the case. A division bench of Justice BR Sarangi and Justice Pramath Patnaik would take up Panigrahi's petitions January 12.

State ready for nCoV vaccine dry run

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: The state government Wednesday expressed its readiness to conduct dry run of Covid-19 vaccines. However, the earlier governments dissolved several state assemblies and imposed President's Rule in the states in 1968-69. Later, the Parliament was also dissolved and due to these activities, the two elections started taking place differently," she said.

BJP slams govt for 'mileage' over pucca houses

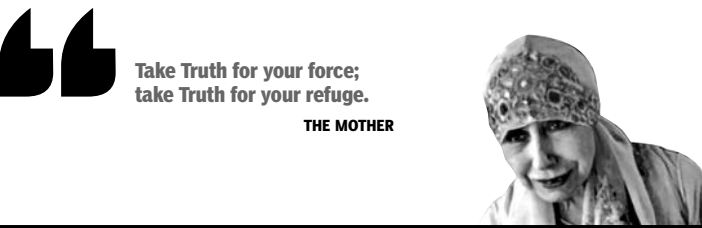

Children of one God

In the book/film ‘Sophie’s Choice’, the protagonist is forced to choose between the lives of her two children. How would you decide? Many meat eaters try to justify killing animals by claiming they can neither feel nor think. They place intelligence as the primary criterion that warrants continuation on the planet. Here is proof that all creatures great and small are both wise and wonderful.

Let’s start small. Look how social insects, like bumblebees, can solve complex non-natural tasks. A research team trained bumblebees to pull on a string in order to access a sugar water treat. The bees that acquired the string-pulling skill were labelled ‘innovators’. Twenty-five untrained bees watched the innovator bees solve the puzzle. About 60 per cent of these ‘naïve’ bees learned just by watching trained bees. The team then introduced a single innovator bee to three separate colonies of untrained bees. The skill spread quickly and half of the untrained bees gained the ability by learning from the innovator bee. Even after the original innovator bee died, the skill continued to be passed on to future generations. So, apart from the enormous intelligence required to design and operate intricate hives and social systems, bees have the ‘smarts’ to learn, teach, internalise and pass on new skills.

Cambridge University tested western scrub jays to see what they remembered about foods they had salted away. The birds were given different items to hide, some perishable (worms), others durable (peanuts). Four hours later, the jays looked for the worms—their favourite food—before they looked for the nuts, but five days later their response was reversed. They didn’t bother to look for worms, which by then would have rotted, but they still remembered the peanut locations. So, not only were the birds clever enough to remember their hiding places, but also to judge what should be eaten now and what saved for later.

Never be mean to a crow. Studies show how these birds can accurately identify tormentors. Like us, crows seldom forget or forgive and take revenge whenever their target is least expecting it. Plus, they call in reinforcements, in the form of their mates, who happily join in the surprise attack. The intelligence at work here seems comparable to our military strategists executing surgical strikes.

Chickens have a sense of numbers and can actually count. In one study, young chicks were able to track the changes of two quantities of objects hidden behind screens. They could consistently point out where the larger quantity was hidden, even when the puzzle required addition or subtraction.

But when it comes to maths, elephants may just be one of the cleverest creatures. A 2018 study shows how Asian elephants are able to process numbers in a more complex manner; similar to humans. Researchers trained a 14-year-old Asian elephant, named Authai, to use a computer touch screen panel. She had to indicate with the tip of her trunk, which one of two figures, shown to her at a time, contained more items. These ranged from 0 to 10 items. Authai was rewarded whenever she chose the figures featuring the larger number of items. This she did correctly 181 out of 271 times – a success rate of 66.8 per cent. Not just a pretty good score but evidence that non-human animals have cognitive characteristics, partially identical to human counting.

Rats are so small that the terror they evoke seems like an overreaction. Rats display a remarkable ability to reason. The fact that they avoid certain toxic foods, even if they don’t become nauseated until hours later, cannot be explained by simple association. It seems they are able to think back to previous food encounters to determine which one was likely to have made them sick. This kind of memory, known as episodic memory, is different from associative learning, as, when a dog learns he will earn a cookie by responding to the command ‘sit’. Episodic memory is the capacity to think back to a specific event, sometimes long ago—something that rats are able to do just like humans.

Fish are often mistaken to have no intelligence, no memory, and no ability to feel pain. Completely false. A new, well researched, book shows how fish have many abilities not that different from our own. Archerfish and damselfish are able to recognise human faces, even when the faces are partly obscured.

Of course we know that dogs can tell humans apart, but they can also identify human expressions. Studies show how dogs are able to consistently recognise the difference between happy and angry human faces. Even better, dogs can manifest emotional expressions on their own faces to evoke a desired human response. In a 2017 study, psychologists concluded that dogs display certain facial expressions in order to win human sympathy and attention. These particular facial expressions are not a reaction to food or any other stimuli, and nor are they something that dogs do when they interact with each other. In other words, dogs make these ‘faces’ only in the presence of humans to get their attention!

Goats are as clever as dogs. They too read emotions and can tell the difference between happy and sad humans. They gaze at humans in the same way as dogs do when asking for a treat that is out of reach. They are, in fact, just as capable of building emotional relationships with humans as any dog or cat. Sheep too are good with faces. They can distinguish between different expressions in humans, as well as detect changes in the faces of anxious sheep. Researchers found that sheep recognise the faces of at least 50 other sheep and can remember 50 different images.

Perhaps the greatest sign of intelligence, even in humans, is knowing what you previously do not know. In one study, a dolphin named Natua was asked to identify a high tone and a low tone. He swam at different speeds toward the response, depending on how easy or hard the answer was. When the tones were quite distinct, Natua swam confidently at full speed. If the tones were sort of similar, though, Natua slowed down, wagged his head, and wavered. Instead of touching one of the paddles to make his choice, he selected the opt-out paddle (asking for a new trial), which meant he knew that he’d probably flunk the task. So clever.

No surprises at how bright are our closest animal relatives, chimps. When heading out to a specific fig tree, where they have recently eaten, they can figure out how much sooner they would need to set out for trees far away from their nest, as for those nearby, to arrive at about the same early hour at both, in order to beat the rush by other animals. This suggests calculation of travel time based on distance, as well as the ability to plan ahead based upon past experience. Equally impressive is their power of inferential reasoning. In a test, apes were presented with two covered cups after they had learned that only one would contain grapes. Both cups were covered and shaken. As expected, the apes preferred the cup in which they could hear the grapes.

When mice are in pain, they grimace. Just like us. When chimps are tickled, they laugh. If we cannot see how amazingly bright animals are, it is our own lack of intelligence, not theirs. And if you can still bring yourself to eat an animal, you are clearly not using your head. Or your heart.

A Marshall Plan for the planet

2021 PROMISES TO BE A SUPER-YEAR FOR CLIMATE ACTION, WITH THE STARS ALIGNING FOR A CLEANER AND MORE SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

In a year dominated by COVID-19, it’s perhaps understandable that we’ve neglected the most profound, existential crisis we face: runaway climate change. But we must quickly make up for lost time, before it’s too late.

Fortunately, the prospects for effective international climate action in 2021 already look much better than they did a few months ago. For starters, as soon as President-elect Joe Biden takes office in January, the United States will rejoin the 2015 Paris climate agreement – the historic protocol that aims to limit global warming to well below 2°C, and preferably to 1.5°C, relative to pre-industrial levels.

This will send an unmistakable signal that the world’s biggest economy is again serious about accelerating its transition to net-zero carbon-dioxide emissions, and will build on China’s recent commitment to become carbon neutral before 2060. These two superpowers will define the twenty-first century, so the prospect of their enhanced climate collaboration provides real cause for optimism.

Likewise, the European Union is pressing ahead with its ambitious European Green Deal and aims to be climate neutral by 2050. And

UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson’s ten-point plan for a Green Industrial Revolution also points the way ahead. Energy efficiency and diversification, sustainable infrastructure and housing, renewable power generation, green technologies, carbon capture and storage, and nature-based solutions all provide a clear pathway to a net-zero future. This is the “Marshall Plan for the Planet” we urgently need, and we must now double down on achieving a true green recovery.

It is encouraging to see the international community mobilising. Next year, China will play a pivotal role in helping to protect and restore nature as the host of the United Nations Biodiversity Conference (COP15). The meeting comes at a critical time: one million species are threatened with extinction, and the destruction of our oceans, forests, peatlands, and mangroves – which all act as essential carbon sinks – has regrettably become routine business.

Valued at \$125 trillion a year, our natural capital and biodiversity are the real source of our wealth. Or, as the economist Herman Daly argues, “the economy is a wholly owned subsidiary of the environment, not the reverse.” That’s why

Business for Nature – a diverse group of more than 600 firms and 50 partner organisations – is advocating more ambitious government and corporate action to provide nature with the safety net it needs to flourish.

Next year’s UN Food Systems and Nutrition for Growth summits will also be important opportunities to raise collective ambition. But perhaps the most critical international meeting in 2021 will be November’s UN climate conference (COP26) in Glasgow. Governments must boost their carbon-cutting measures in a race to the top that helps the world achieve net-zero emissions by 2050 – at the latest. Crucially, COP26 must also uphold rich countries’ commitment to provide poorer economies with the climate finance they need to manage extreme weather hazards – storms, droughts, and wildfires – which are increasing in prevalence and holding back their development and growth.

Decisive climate action cannot be the responsibility of governments alone. Business must also play its part by setting science-based emission-reduction targets, improving energy efficiency, enhancing climate reporting and dis-

closures, and eliminating deforestation from supply chains.

The We Mean Business coalition is a great example of joint private-sector action. Companies with a combined market capitalisation of over \$24 trillion are working together to drive more ambitious climate policies and accelerate the transition to a zero-carbon economy. Similarly the Task Force on Climate-related Financial Disclosures is helping firms better calculate the risks and opportunities of climate change, thereby making it easier for investors to support sustainable businesses. This is creating a domino effect that is helping to move financial markets in a greener direction.

The pandemic has led to a temporary decrease in greenhouse-gas emissions and a resurgence of nature. But a brief reprieve for the planet is no substitute for a coherent global climate strategy. All told, 2021 promises to be a super-year for climate action, with the stars aligning for a cleaner and more sustainable future. We must seize the opportunity while we still can.

‘ASIAN CENTURY’

In the early stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, it was common to divide countries and their responses according to their political systems, with many attributing China’s success in controlling the virus to its authoritarianism. As of late 2020, however, it is clear that the real dividing line is not political but geographical. Regardless of whether a country is democratic or authoritarian, an island or continental, Confucian or Buddhist, communitarian or individualistic, if it is East Asian, Southeast Asian, or Australasian, it has managed COVID-19 better than any European or North American country.

While this line is not exactly hemispheric, it is close enough to be suggestive. Even Asia’s worst performers (in public-health terms) – such as the Philippines and Indonesia – controlled the pandemic more effectively than did Europe’s biggest and wealthiest countries. Notwithstanding reasonable doubts about the quality and accuracy of the reported mortality data in the case of the Philippines (and India), the fact remains that you were much likelier to die of COVID-19 in 2020 if you were European or American than if you were Asian.

Comprehensive, interdisciplinary research is urgently needed to explain these performance differentials. Because much of our current understanding is anecdotal and insufficiently pan-regional, it is vulnerable to political exploitation and distortion. To help all countries prepare for future biological threats, several specific questions need to be explored. First is the extent to which the experience of SARS, MERS, Avian flu, and other disease outbreaks in many Asian countries left a legacy of health-system preparedness and public receptiveness to anti-transmission messaging.

Clearly, some Asian countries have benefited from existing structures designed to prevent outbreaks of tuberculosis, cholera, typhoid, HIV/AIDS, and other infectious diseases. For example, as

of 2014, Japan had 48,452 public-health nurses (PHNs), 7,266 of whom were employed in public-health centres where they could be mobilised quickly to assist with COVID-19 contact tracing. Although occupational definitions vary, one can compare these figures with those for England, where just 350-750 PHNs served 11,000 patients in 2014. (England’s population is roughly half the size of Japan’s.)

We also will need a better understanding of the effect of specific policies, such as rapidly closing borders and suspending international travel. Likewise, some countries did a much better job than others at protecting care homes and other facilities for the elderly – especially in countries (notably Japan and South Korea) with a high proportion of people over 65.

Moreover, the effectiveness of public-health communications clearly varied across countries, and it is possible that genetic differences and past programs of anti-tuberculosis vaccination may have helped limit the spread of the coronavirus in some areas. Only with rigorous empirical research will we

have the information we need to prepare for future threats.

Many are also wondering what Asia’s relative success this year will mean for public policymaking and geopolitics after the pandemic. If future historians want a precise date for when the ‘Asian Century’ began, they may be tempted to choose 2020, just as the US publisher Henry Luce dated the ‘American Century’ from the onset of World War II.

But this particular comparison suggests that any such judgement may be premature. After all, Luce’s America was an individual superpower. Emerging victorious from the war, it would go on to claim and define its era (in competition with another superpower, the Soviet Union). The Asian Century, by contrast, will feature an entire continent comprising a wide range of countries.

In other words, it is not simply about China. To be sure, the rising new superpower has been notably successful in coping with the pandemic after its initial failures and lack of transparency. But its scope for asserting systemic superiority

is circumscribed by the fact that so many other Asian countries have been equally successful without Chinese assistance.

The post-war comparison also may be premature for economic reasons. Asian countries’ economic performance in 2020 did not match the success of their pandemic response. While Vietnam, China, and Taiwan have beaten the rest of the world in terms of GDP growth, the United States has not fared too badly, despite its failure to manage the virus. With forecasts pointing to a 3.6 per cent contraction for the year, the US is in better shape than every European economy, as well as Japan, Malaysia, Singapore, Thailand, the Philippines, and others in Asia. The difference is largely a function of interconnectedness: compared to the US, many Asian economies are more exposed to trade and travel bans, which cut deeply into the tourism industry.

Although China’s public-health and economic outcomes have been better than the West’s in 2020, it has neither found nor really sought a political or diplomatic advantage from the crisis. If anything, China has become more aggressive toward nearby neighbours and countries like Australia. This suggests that Chinese leaders are not even trying to build an Asian network of friends and supporters.

How China approaches the issue of international debt restructurings – especially those connected with its Belt and Road Initiative – will be a key test in 2021. But, of course, the US and the rest of the West also will be tested, and on a wide range of issues, from international finance to sociopolitical stability.

It may be too soon to announce a new historical epoch; but it is not too early to start absorbing the lessons of Asia’s public-health successes.

But if we analyse the decision from the point of view of genuine hardworking students who are cracking engineering and medical entrances without getting any coaching due to economic disadvantage, the decision might be agonising. Therefore, it would rather be good if the government ensures supply of sufficient study material, employ professionals, develop advanced infrastructure in every block as a hub for coaching, assess individual aspirants after due coaching, and develop crash courses ahead of entrance examinations. Though the decision will be beneficial to students from rural background and government schools, a meticulous effort to pick up the most eligible is needed to ensure equality.

Paddy from other districts lands in Sonepur, Sambalpur

Sonepur/Sambalpur, Dec 30: Even as farmers in different parts of western Odisha have been cribbing about delayed tokens and other procurement issues, some traders are brining paddy from other districts to Sonepur. Some millers are allegedly buying outside paddy at under rates, a report said.

Jadupur villagers prepare to migrate

SIT INTENSIFIES PROBE INTO PARI MURDER MYSTERY

Nayagarh, Dec 30: After a brief lull, the Special Investigation Team (SIT) has intensified its probe in the minor girl murder case in Jadupur village in this district, Tuesday. However, the SIT stayed away from visiting Jadupur village and instead called selected persons from the village and interrogated them in this connection.

This has left the residents unnerved as they chose to keep their mouth shut and refused to speak anything when questioned by the media or some other persons. When questioned, they said to have only received a call to appear in person before the SIT but are yet to be interrogated in this connection. They waited there for long and were returning home, a person called for

questioning said, in condition of anonymity.

Meanwhile, regular visits by the SIT team to Jadupur village and the time to time interrogation of the residents during the probe had its impact on the villagers. A villager claimed that this has led to loss of livelihood for many. As result, people are preparing to migrate to other states in search of livelihood.

When contacted, the village committee president Jaykrushna Parida and nine others are preparing to leave for Kerala in search of livelihood after January 12. He said he along with other villagers has fully cooperated with the SIT in their investigation and expect it to complete its probe soon. However, he requested not to implicate innocent persons in the case and arrest only those involved in the crime.

Malkangiri inmate's death is murder: Kin

Chitrakonda, Dec 30: The death of a Malkangiri sub-jail inmate took a twist Tuesday when the deceased's family members brought up allegations that he was brutally murdered in the jail.

The inmate, Danu Goleri, died while undergoing treatment at a hospital in Malkangiri Sunday.

Danu was suspected to be a Maoist and was thus arrested three months ago. The family members met him at the sub-jail more than once and, they claimed, he never complained of any kind of sufferings.

The family members alleged that they were told that Danu had fallen sick. It was when they reached at the sub-jail to enquire about his condition, the jail authorities asked them to take his body.

Demanding a high-level inquiry, the aggrieved family members were not performing the last rites of the deceased. Only when the villagers and relatives intervened, they budged and the last rites of Danu were performed.

PEOPLE DRINK WATER FROM STREAMS

SOLAR PROJECTS IN MANY HILLY AND REMOTE AREAS OF JHUMPURA BLOCK HAVE GONE KAPUT

Jhumpura, Dec 30: As a solar-powered drinking water project and tube well are lying defunct, people in hilly and remote areas under Jhumpura block of Keonjhar district are forced to drink water from streams and pits, a report said.

According to the report, the government has made provisions of solar-powered drinking water projects in hilly and remote panchayats like



Malda, Nayagad, Basantpur, Kutugan and Nischintapur.

Over 200 tube wells have been set up in these areas too while nearly Rs 10 lakh from the DMF fund has been spent for these projects.

The state-owned OREDA had been awarded a contract to set up solar panels to run drinking water projects. A project was set up in Malda panchayat, but it has been left half-way done. Two years have passed, but no

step was taken to set it right, locals alleged. The company is bound by an agreement to repair the projects whenever necessary till five years since their installation.

As water is not available from the project, people have to drink water from a nearby stream, said a villager of Kutugan. The villagers accused the OREDA of being apathetic to their problem.

Villagers of Andharkhamani,

Goduatopa, Hatimara, Sanakalimati, Bagarampada Sahi, Jampada Sahi, Kutugan and Chipinda alleged that nobody from the OREDA or RWSS comes to repair once solar systems go out of order. Unless five to six projects go defunct in the area, the OREDA officials will not come for repair, they alleged.

At Kutugan, tow solar projects have been lying defunct for the last two months. The villagers apprised the Jhumpura-based RWSS division of their miseries that have cropped up over shortage of water, but no steps have been taken to set these projects right.

When asked about the problem, a junior engineer who is in charge of these projects at the RWSS office, said he is on leave for the last two months.

Another engineer Subhamsita Khamari said that she has intimated the problem to the district office.

Dayanidhi Sahu, executive engineer of the Keonjhar RWSS office said that technical staff f the OREDA has been intimated about the defunct solar projects. These projects will be repaired, Sahu added.

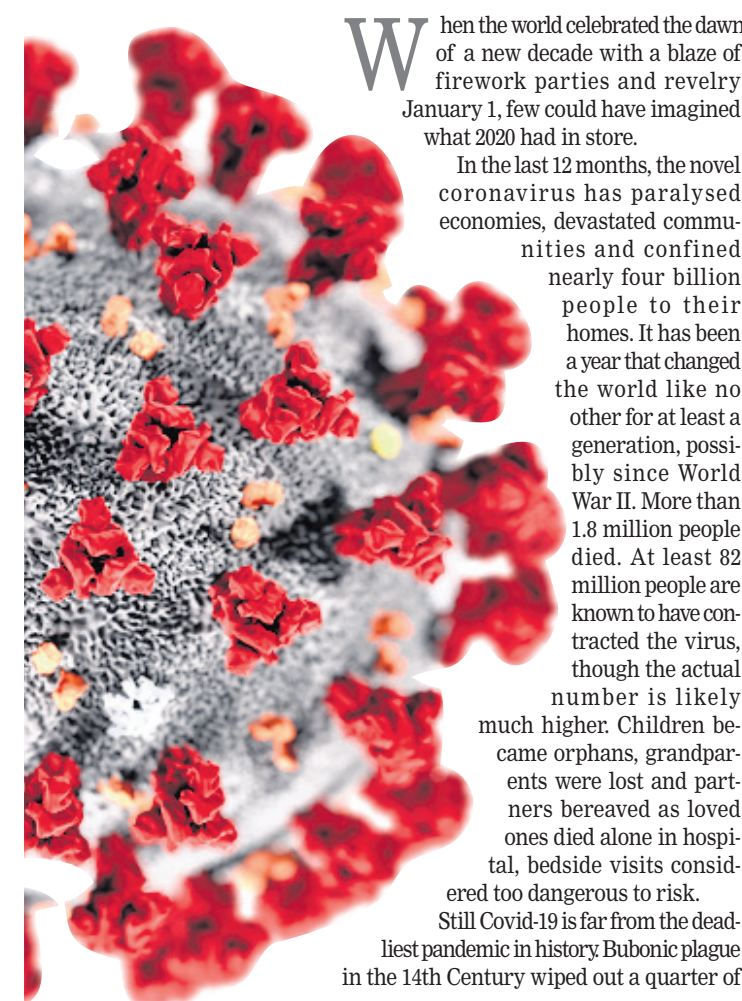

How the pandemic changed the world



When the world celebrated the dawn of a new decade with a blaze of fireworks parties and revelry January 1, few could have imagined what 2020 had in store.

In the last 12 months, the novel coronavirus has paralysed economies, devastated communities and confined nearly four billion people to their homes. It has been a year that changed the world like no other for at least a generation, possibly since World War II. More than 1.8 million people died. At least 82 million people are known to have contracted the virus, though the actual number is likely much higher. Children became orphans, grandparents were lost and partners bereaved as loved ones died alone in hospital, bedside visits considered too dangerous to risk.

Still Covid-19 is far from the deadliest pandemic in history. Bubonic plague in the 14th century wiped out a quarter of the population. At least 50 million succumbed to Spanish Influenza in 1918-19. Thirty-three million people died of AIDS.

The scale of the global disaster was scarcely imaginable when December 31, Chinese authorities announced 27 cases of 'viral pneumonia of unknown origin' that was baffling doctors in the city of Wuhan.

The next day, authorities quietly shut the Wuhan animal market initially linked to the outbreak. On January 7, Chinese officials announced they had identified the new virus, calling it 2019-nCoV. On January 11, China announced the first death in Wuhan. Within days, cases flared across Asia, in France and the United States.

By the end of the month, countries were airlifting foreigners out of China. Borders around the world started to close and more than 50 million people living in Wuhan's province of Hubei were in quarantine.

As the horror went global, the race for a vaccine had already begun. A small German biotech company called BioNTech quietly put their cancer work aside and launched another project. Its name? 'Speed of Light'.

On February 11, the World Health Organization named the new disease as Covid-19. First Italy then Spain, France and Britain went into lockdown. WHO declared Covid-19 a pandemic. US borders, already closed to China, shut to most of Europe. For the first time in peacetime, the summer Olympics was delayed. From Paris to New York, from Delhi to Lagos, and from London

US ELECTIONS

The US elections became the talking point across the world during the second-half of 2020. On December 14 the Electoral College confirmed Democratic candidate Joe Biden as America's next President, ratifying his November victory in an authoritative state-by-state denial by President Donald Trump's refusal to concede his defeat. The presidential electors gave the 78-year-old Biden a solid majority of 306 electoral votes as compared to Trump's 232. This is the same margin that Trump bragged was a landslide when he won the White House in 2016.

Covid-19 and the plight of migrants

To contain the spread of the novel Coronavirus, the Indian government initiated the largest national lockdown in the world March 2020. Initially announced to last until April 14, the lockdown severely affected the movement of people, disrupting daily life and access to healthcare facilities.

One of the consequences of lockdown measures in the country has led to an unprecedented migration of workers and families from large urban centers to rural India. For decades, millions of workers have migrated from their rural homes and villages to urban cities, looking for opportunities and livelihoods. The sudden enforcement of lockdown following a 14-hour 'Janata curfew' March 22 immediately disadvantaged already vulnerable populations as it restricted people stepping out from their homes. All transport—roadways, airways and railways—were suspended, including hospitality industries, educational institutions, and industrial units. As the factories and workplaces closed down, millions of migrant workers had to deal with loss of income, food shortages and climbing on rooftops to find a place. Some group of migrants tried to hire people carriers, however returning migrants faced other danger.

On May 1, 2020, the government introduced special 'Shramik Special' trains from many districts in the country for migrants. Since then, Indian Railways have ferried over 5 million migrant workers by more than 3,000 Shramik special trains.

For many migrant workers who desperately tried to return home, homecoming has been bittersweet. They stare at another crisis. With significantly reduced work opportunities (the very reason for them to migrate) and trying to come to terms with the labelling of 'virus carrier' stigma has caused a great deal of anxiety and associated violence has been reported. Migrants thought that going back to their hometown; they could return to farming or take up employment in the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act scheme, but only a fortunate few could avail the benefit.

With chronic underfunding in the rural healthcare and economy, the pandemic has highlighted the failings of rural infrastructure. The extraordinary migrant crisis due to Covid-19 is unparalleled since Indo-Pakistan partition of 1948. Similar to the fallout from the partition, this current crisis will leave a lasting legacy on future of India. It appears the Covid-19 pandemic has forced India to finally acknowledge the migrant.

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ROUND THE GLOBE

FARMERS' PROTESTS



For over three weeks, kilometers after kilometers of trucks and tractor-trailers have been piled up just north of New Delhi. The farmers who drove to New Delhi border are protesting agricultural laws they worry will hurt their earnings and benefit tycoons. And there is no sign of a retreat. Trucks hand out oranges, and stalls distribute hot tea and pudding to passersby. Temporary salons have sprung up. For now, these roads and trailers are their home, despite the cold. "More farmers are joining us next week," says farmer Ram Singh, who travelled 140 miles to join. "Most of our wives and children are back home for now, but they'll join us, too, if needed." As Prime Minister Narendra Modi's administration veers right, fellow Hindu nationalists have often dismissed critics as "anti-national." But agriculture employs half of India's workforce, making the farmers' protests one of the most serious challenges yet to his populist image. And the demonstrations have come to symbolise a wider kind of discontent, about democratic ideals and room for dissent.

INDIA-CHINA CLASH



At least 20 Indian soldiers were killed in a clash with Chinese forces in a disputed Himalayan border area, June 15. The incident follows rising tensions, and is the first deadly clash in the border area in at least 45 years. The Indian Army initially said three of its soldiers had been killed, adding that both sides suffered casualties. But later officials said a number of critically injured soldiers had died of their wounds. India's external affairs ministry accused China of breaking an agreement struck the previous week to respect the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in the Galwan Valley.

TINSEL TOWN DRUGS CASE



Sushant Singh was found hanging at his Bandra home June 14, sparking off a huge political controversy, an upheaval in the Hindi film world besides multiple probes by the Mumbai Police, Patna Police, Central Bureau of Investigation, ED and the NCB. On September 4, the brother of Sushant's ex-girlfriend Rhea-Showik Chakraborty - was arrested by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) in a drugs related case as part of the investigations into the death of Sushant Singh Rajput. He was granted bail December 2, three months after his arrest.

BREXIT



Britain and the European Union (EU) finally will look forward to begin a new chapter in their relationship; the negotiations to which began in 2017. UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson is expected to announce the contours of the trade deal at Downing Street soon. Johnson and European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen have been in close contact over the past few days as the December 31 transition period cut-off loomed over the negotiations, which have missed repeated deadlines as the two sides failed to agree on key areas of fishing rights in each other's waters that would apply to the UK as a non-member of the 27-member economic bloc.

BLACK LIVES MATTER



George Floyd, a 46-year-old black man, was killed in Minneapolis, Minnesota, May 25, this year while being arrested for allegedly using a counterfeit bill. During the arrest Derek Chauvin, a white police officer from the Minneapolis Police Department, knelt on Floyd's neck for about 9 and half minutes after Floyd was handcuffed and lying face down. Two police officers, J. Alexander Kueng and Thomas Lane, assisted Chauvin in restraining Floyd, while another officer, Tou Thao, prevented bystanders from interfering with the arrest and intervening as events unfolded. The barbaric killing of Floyd was captured by a man on his mobile, and the video went viral, following which widespread protests began not only in the US but across the world by the slogan, "Black Lives Matter".

BACK HOME

PRICE FOR 'FLYING HIGH'

The year exposed an IFS officer, who had amassed ill-gotten wealth and was leading a plush lifestyle. The Vigilance sleuths December 27 arrested Odisha cadre IFS officer, Abhay Kant Pathak, for possessing assets disproportionate to his known sources of income and his son Akash Pathak for duping job seekers. Akash had identified himself as the MD of Tata Motors. The state government placed the senior officer under suspension immediately after the arrest. The Vigilance department said that Pathak's total properties are around 435 per cent of his known sources of income. Pathak had paid 33 crore towards booking chartered planes for travelling to cities like Mumbai, Patna and Delhi during the lockdown. The Vigilance officials also seized gold ornaments weighing around 800 grams worth 123 lakh, 160 lakh cash from his house and also found three luxury cars like Mercedes, BMW and Tata Harier in his possession along with three Yamaha FZs registered in his son's name. Gopalpur MLA Pradeep Maharathy was also arrested and expelled from the BJP for his alleged complicity with the Pathaks.

FAITH PREVAILED OVER FEAR

Amidst the intense war against novel coronavirus, faith finally prevailed over fear as this year's Rath Yatra was organised without congregation of devotees on the Grand Road in Puri, adding a new chapter to the Srirampuri's history. Srirampuri, the abode of Lord Jagannath, was shut for devotees since March end due to the outbreak of novel coronavirus. The Supreme Court ordered for cancellation of Car Festival due to Covid-19 spread while hearing a petition June 18. The order created a lot of resentment among the devotees and servants. The state government filed an affidavit in the SC and supported Rath Yatra with restrictions in place. Finally, on June 22 a three-member bench of the SC allowed conduct of Car Festival in Puri. With just a few hours in hand for the mega festival, the state government pulled out all the stops to hold the festival June 23. In another development, the temple, which remained out of bounds for devotees for nine-months, reopened for servants and their family members December 23 and for Puri residents December 26.

NAYAGARH HORROR

The alleged murder of a minor girl of Nayagarh continued to hog the limelight throughout the second half of the year. The allegation of organ trading by the minor girl's parents and the Opposition parties put the state government in a tight spot. Parents of the deceased minor alleged that their kid was murdered for organ smuggling and accused Minister Arun Sahoo of being involved in the act. The BJP and Congress took out rallies and staged demonstrations demanding CBI probe into the incident. Buckling under pressure from the Opposition parties, the government had to form an SIT to probe the matter. It was headed by OSRT CMD Arun Bothra. The minor girl was playing near her house July 13. Her skeletal remains stayed in a gunny bag were found in the backside of her house July 23. The incident came to the fore after girl's parents attempted self-immolation in front of the Assembly in Bhubaneswar November 24 as the district police failed to crack the case several months after the incident. The SIT picked up Saroj Sethi, a college student and neighbour of the girl, from Jadupur village in the district.

GOOD NEWS FOR GOVT SCHOOL PUPILS

In a major move to promote students passing out of government-run high schools, the Odisha Cabinet December 28 passed a resolution to reserve some seats in medical and engineering colleges for these students. Parliamentary Affairs Minister Bikram Keshari Anukula said, after introduction of centralised exams like NEET and JEE for medical and engineering courses, it is observed that the number of meritorious students from government-run high schools and colleges in Odisha, qualifying for admissions in these institutions, has been reducing over the years. This is not due to lack of meritorious students but a deeper divide in access to coaching classes which is missing in rural areas, he said. The government realised that thousands of meritorious students from government schools are at a disadvantage and fare lower than their potential in the entrance exams. To correct the imbalance and provide due recognition to meritorious students of government schools, to help them fulfill their dreams to become doctors and engineers, the state government decided to provide reservation to eligible government school and college students of Odisha for admission into medical and engineering colleges in the state. The decision will come into effect from the next academic year.

Will Goa legalise cannabis cultivation

MINISTERS IN THE STATE ARE DIVIDED IN THEIR VIEWS

Panaji, Dec 30: Ministers in Goa appear to be a divided lot on regulated cannabis cultivation in the coastal state for medicinal purposes, a day after Law Minister Nilesh Cabral made a strong pitch for such endeavour.

Speaking to reporters in Panaji Wednesday, Art and Culture Minister Govind Gaude said that that while the move could help generate employment, it could also lead to adverse social impact. Earlier in the day, he said he did not even know what cannabis was.

"I don't even know what cannabis is. Whether it is used for 'ganja' or for medicinal purposes, I cannot comment on it. I will study it first," Gaude told reporters.

"If we are looking at it from the employment point of view,



we must also spare a thought for the families which may be destroyed on account of such a decision," Gaude said.

According to Tourism Minister Manohar Ajaonkar, the proposal mooted by the Health Department needed a thorough vetting by experts, to under the long-term impact



of the decision.

"It should be studied. This is a matter which deals with people's health," Ajaonkar said. The Cabinet Minister also said that experts needed to be consulted before allowing legal cultivation of cannabis in Goa.

"It should be studied and a report needs to be compiled before taking such a decision... if experts give us good inputs, the government can go ahead with it, but only after a proper study is conducted," Ajaonkar said.

The opposition is up in arms over the proposal - which has already been vetted by the Law Department - claiming that the implications would be disastrous for

Goa, a tourism-dependent state that is already infamous as a narco-tourism destination.

While Chief Minister Pramod Sawant has maintained that a final decision on the matter is yet to be taken and that the proposal needed Cabinet approval, Law Minister Nilesh Cabral has said that 'bhanga', a derivative of the cannabis plant, is already legally sold in seven Indian states.

"In seven states in India, a form of this (cannabis) plant, known as 'bhanga', is already available. Bhang is sold across the counter in some states in licensed stores like liquor vendes elsewhere," Cabral said on Tuesday.

The Goa Forward party has opposed the move, saying it may lead the youth in Goa to ruin.

"How will this benefit the youth of Goa? Is this needed for their future?" Goa Forward President and former Deputy Chief Minister Vijai Sardesai had asked.

The Shiv Sena in Goa had also opposed the move and its state President Jitesh Kamat said sarcastically: "Now that farmers in Goa will be allowed to farm cannabis, the government should now consider issuing them Krishi cards".

Will Mollem park survive rail, road expansion

MOLLEM NATIONAL PARK HAS LONG BEEN THE EMERALD IN GOA'S CROWN

Panaji, Dec 30: The verdant jungle which covers this steep area of India's Western Ghats mountain range is home to leopards, Bengal tigers, pangolins, black panthers and hundreds of endemic species of flora and fauna found nowhere else on the planet. The muscular state animal of Goa - the gaur, or Indian bison - is often seen trudging through the forests, and the park's Dudhsagar waterfall is among the highest in the country.

Yet Mollem and the adjoining Bhagwan Mahaveer Sanctuary, covering a protected area of 240 sq km, is set to be splintered and partially deforested by three invasive projects; the doubling of a railway line, road expansion and an electric power transmission line.

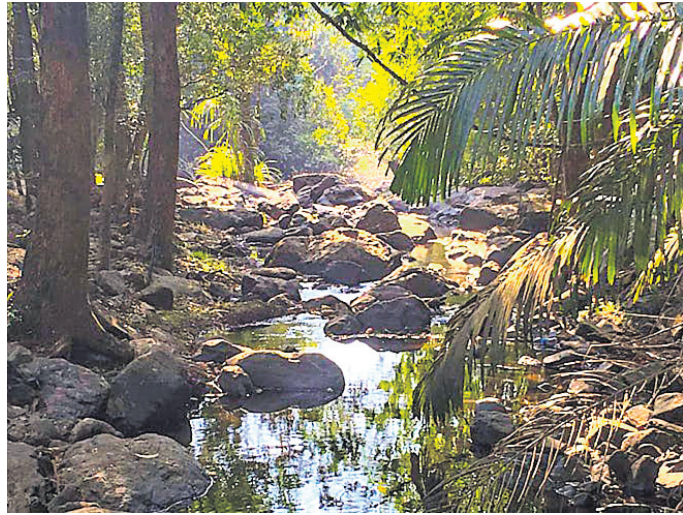
"This is an area declared by Unesco to be one of the world's eight biodiversity hotspots and which includes a proposed tiger reserve. This project will undo so much that can never be recovered again," said Claude Alvares, an ac-

tivist with the Goa Foundation who has taken up litigation against all three projects in the Bombay high court and before a committee of the Supreme Court.

Indian law bans construction in wildlife sanctuaries but the government has approved them in the name of public interest and Goa's future development. However, many believe these three projects are part of a masterplan to turn India's smallest state into a corridor for a fivefold increase in coal imports by some of India's biggest industrialists, known for their close ties to the ruling Bharatiya Janata party (BJP).

Cumulatively it will involve diverting 378 hectares (934 acres) of forest in Goa, felling 40,000 protected trees and shifting more than 1.8m tonnes of mud and earth from inside the sanctuary.

Activists and citizens claim these projects have been foisted on Goa by the central government without any public consultation or transparency. They are now subject to multiple legal challenges and have



sparked a grassroots opposition movement unlike anything seen in Goa for decades, with thousands taking to the streets in protest. Students, artists, biologists, tourism bodies and 150 scientists have written to India's environment minister Prakash Javadekar and the Supreme Court requesting the proj-

ects be halted, alleging environmental laws have been broken or ignored. More than 8,000 people took part in a recent demonstration and dozens have been booked by police or arrested.

"We are not just saving Mollem forests for their beauty but for the very survival of life in Goa," said

artist Svabhu Kohli, who began the My Mollem campaign, which brought together artists, lawyers, researchers, biologists and local communities to raise awareness through art and action of the impact the projects could have on Mollem.

"They say they are doing this to benefit the people of Goa. But everyone in Goa knows Mollem has a special magic, so how can cutting down irreplaceable forests be beneficial? And if it's for us, why were we never consulted?"

For the past three years, Goa's main port, Mormugao Port Trust in the north of the state, has been on an expansion drive to become a hub for imported coal. Since 2018, two of India's biggest coal importers, Adani and JSW, have set up multiple terminals at the port.

In 2020, the environment ministry granted clearance for a third coal terminal and deep-water dredging to accommodate large coal vessels. Currently the port handles 12m tonnes of coal, but importers hope to increase that to 51m tonnes by 2035.

Undertrial escapes Goa police custody

Panaji, Dec 30: An undertrial accused of robbery and lodged in the Colvale central jail in North Goa, escaped from police custody Wednesday while returning from a medical check-up at a nearby government hospital. Two accomplices sprayed pepper and fired warning shots to stop the police escort from foiling their attempt to flee.

Deputy Superintendent of Police Gajanan Prabhudessai said the attempt was pre-planned and that the police were now on the lookout for the accused Vivek Kumar Gautam, who originally hails from Uttarakhand.

According to the police official, the incident occurred Wednesday

morning after Gautam complained that he was suffering from a painful stomach ailment and was feeling uneasy.

While Gautam was returning from a government hospital in Mapusa town, his accomplices sprayed pepper spray at the police escort and fired shots in the air to deter the policemen from following them.

"We have intensified our search to nab the three accused. It was clearly a pre-planned move and points to the use of mobile phones within the jail. We have recovered the used cartridges from the scene and have begun interrogating key persons, including the ambulance driver who went missing at the time of discharge," Prabhudessai said.

Karna prepares for schools reopening

Bangalore, Dec 30: With schools set to reopen from January 1 in Karnataka, Primary and Secondary Education Minister S Suresh Kumar Wednesday visited a few institutions here and reviewed their preparedness to conduct classes adhering to COVID-19 guidelines.

The Minister inspected arrangements in classrooms and spoke to the headmasters, principals, lecturers and teachers, instructing them to take precautions to prevent spread of the virus once the classes resume, official sources said. He also advised the staff to sensitise the students about the sig-



nificance of passing the SSLC and secondary PU classes with high marks, they said.

The state is gearing for reopen of schools and pre-university (higher secondary) colleges, which have remained shut since March due to COVID-19, after the government on December 19 decided to resume

regular classes for Class X and PU-II year (class 12) students from January 1.

It has also planned to hold regular classes for PU-I year from January 15 and to start Vidyagama programme for students of classes six to nine in government schools, taking education to their doorsteps.

Under this programme a teacher will teach a small batch of students at a place convenient for them to assemble and study by abiding by the COVID-19 guidelines.

The government's decision to reopen schools has been opposed by some quarters, including ruling BJP MLC AH Vishwanath, a former education minister:

Tourism in Goa yet to recover from Covid-dent

ONLY 1,400 OF 4,000 HOTELS IN GOA ARE OPERATIONAL, SAYS A TOURISM OFFICIAL

Panaji, Dec 30: Despite the rush of domestic holidaymakers in Goa, only 1,400 of the 4,000 hotels registered in the coastal state have opened for business. The emergence of the new mutated strain of Covid-19 has also had a detrimental effect on the state's tourism prospects, a top tourism official said Wednesday.

According to Nilesh Shah, President of the Travel and Tourism Association of Goa, hotel rates in the state during the festive season were nearly 20 to 30 per cent less than the comparative period last year.

"The situation is still evolving. Vaccination will play a major role in determining how the tourism prospects for 2021 pan out. The



emergence of the second strain of coronavirus has caused some negativity, as a result of which the tourism trade which we thought was opening up, has now gone into reverse gear," Shah told IANS

Wednesday. While Goa has witnessed a surge in domestic tourist arrivals during the week from December 25 onwards, Shah said the shortfall in expectations could be gauged from the number of regis-

tered hotels which have opened up during the pandemic and the comparatively low pricing of the existing hotels.

"Many hotels have not opened yet in Goa. At present, of 4,100 registered hotels, only 1,300 to 1,400 are open," Shah added.

While charter tourism, which used to facilitate the arrival of nearly half a million foreign tourists every year, has gone for a toss, the volume of domestic tourists has made up for the loss, he said.

The Travel and Tourism Association of Goa is one of the oldest tourism bodies in the state, comprising members from the travel and hospitality industry.

"The tourism season in 2021 looks challenging. We are not expecting any charter bookings till October. We have been lobbying for a flight

bubble arrangement from Russia which could help," Shah added. Over the last decade and a half, Russian tourists have topped the number of foreign tourists visiting the state, followed by travellers from the United Kingdom.

He said that once the vaccination programme rolls out globally, the tourism industry across the world could possibly be salvaged by a travel document regime like the one made for travelling to Africa.

"If you are flying to Africa, you need to be immunised for certain illnesses and travellers need to carry official certificates. The same protocol may kick in vis-a-vis Covid-19, after the vaccination programme rolls out. This means if one wishes to cross international boundaries, a Covid-19 immunisation shot may become compulsory," Shah added.

Yedi appeals for cooperation

The Karnataka CM urges 'missing' UK returnees to cooperate with govt

Bangalore, Dec 30: Karnataka Chief Minister BS Yediyurappa Wednesday appealed to all "missing" UK returnees to get tested for the new strain of coronavirus, for their own safety and also to curb the spread of the infection.

"As the Chief Minister of the state, I urge all those who have returned from the UK to come forward and get their health check up done. See to it that you don't create trouble for others," Yediyurappa said before reporters.

Yediyurappa tweeted: "Dear citizens, the danger of corona has still not subsided. As we enter into the New Year even a slightest ignorance regarding the pandemic is not done. Follow the government's guidelines and rules and stay safe by taking all

the necessary precautionary measures, and cooperate." The CM's appeal comes in the wake of seven people, who returned to the state from the UK recently, testing positive for the new strain of the virus and who are undergoing treatment at designated hospitals in the city.

A total of 2,500 people have come to the state from the UK between November 25 and December 22 on two flights -- Air India and British Airways.

Till Tuesday evening, the Karnataka health department had conducted tests on 1,903 UK passengers. Out of them 29 have tested positive and 1,599 negative, while the results of 275 are awaited.

In view of some UK returnees going off the radar, Karnataka's health department has sought the

home department's help to locate them. The CM ruled out any change in the Covid safety guidelines for now as the danger of coronavirus has not subsided. "There is no change in guidelines at this point in time. If there is any instructions from Delhi (Union government), let's see then," he said in response to a query.

The Chief Minister said that the Union Health Ministry is monitoring the spread of the new UK variant of coronavirus in India, therefore Karnataka cannot decide on its own. "We will wait for fresh guideline from them only then the state will think of changing present Covid safety protocols," he said, adding that until then all will have to remain alert and test those who have come from outside.

Bangalore, Dec 30: Karnataka Health Minister K Sudhakar Wednesday confirmed that seven cases of the new coronavirus strain have been reported in the state.

"All seven Covid cases had returned from Britain and landed in Karnataka during December. Of the seven cases, three are in Bangalore and four in Shivamogga district, which is also the home district of Chief Minister B.S. Yediyurappa," the Minister told the media.

According to Sudhakar, three primary contacts of the Shivamogga cases have also tested positive. "Their samples have been sent for testing for the new coronavirus strain. All seven Covid positive patients have been put under home quarantine," he said.

The apartment of the three positive patients from one family in Bangalore has been sealed by the Bruhat Bangalore Mahanagara

Palike (BBMP) for 14 days.

The civic body claimed the action was taken as a precautionary measure and all residents had been advised to stay at home for 14 days.

In the wake of the new strain of the coronavirus, Chief Minister Yediyurappa appealed to all the UK returnees in the past two months to get themselves tested.

"A few returnees are still untraceable and the health department has asked the home department to help in tracing the UK returnees," Sudhakar said.

The swab samples of 26 persons who tested positive for Covid-19 were sent to the National Institute of Mental Health and Neuro Sciences (Nimhans) to ascertain whether it is the new strain and seven of them were found to have contracted the UK variant, the Health Minister added.

He claimed that the 26 persons were among the 1,614 UK returnees who were subjected to the tests.

Panel to consider SII's request for vaccine use

New Delhi, Dec 30: Experts at India's drug regulator were meeting on Wednesday to consider approving an AstraZeneca/Oxford coronavirus vaccine for emergency use after Britain became the first country to do so, two sources with knowledge of the matter said.

A representative of India's Central Drugs Standard Control Organization (CDSCO) declined to reveal the agenda of the meeting but said its minutes would be uploaded on its website within hours.

Sources earlier told Reuters the CDSCO was likely to approve the vaccine this week after its local manufacturer, Serum Institute of India (SII), submitted additional trial data.

SII, the world's biggest producer of vaccines, has already stockpiled about 50 million doses, enough for 25 million people.

It welcomed the UK approval. "This is great and encouraging



news," Chief Executive Adar Poonawalla said in a statement. "We will wait for the final approval from Indian regulators."

India wants to start administering the shots starting next month and is also considering emergency use authorisation applications for vaccines made by Pfizer Inc with Germany's BioNTech and by India's Bharat Biotech.

India, which has the world's second highest number of COVID-19 infections in the world after the United States, plans to inoculate

300 million people in the next six to eight months and the affordable Oxford vaccine is its biggest hope.

Though the Indian government has not yet signed a purchase agreement with SII, the company says it will focus on its home market first, and then exports, mainly to South Asian countries and Africa.

India's COVID-19 caseload rose to 1,02,44,852 with 20,549 new infections being reported in a day, while the number of people who have recuperated from the disease surged to 98.34 lakh pushing the national

20 people found with new UK variant

India Wednesday recorded 14 cases of a mutant strain of coronavirus, which is 70% more transmissible, and has prompted a wave of panic and border closures around the world. With 14 more cases in India, the authorities said today morning that 20 patients have been infected with the mutant strain, which was first reported in the United Kingdom in September, so far. The fresh 20 cases include six persons reported earlier (three in NIMHANS, Bengaluru, two in CCMB, Hyderabad and one in NIV, Pune). Around 107 samples were tested in the 10 labs as indicated in the table below.

BJP plays hardball with AIADMK

Chennai, Dec 30: The BJP Wednesday said it may seek the support of superstar Rajinikanth for the 2021 assembly elections in Tamil Nadu, a day after the star said he has abandoned his plan to make a political foray.

Asserting that its alliance with the AIADMK was strong, BJP national general secretary C T Ravi, however, said the NDA was led by his party and 'Prime Minister Narendra Modi' in the state as well, apparently indicating that it was not steered by the ruling party, the senior partner.

In Tamil Nadu, AIADMK was the largest partner in the National Democratic Alliance (NDA) and naturally, the Chief Minister will be from that party, Ravi, BJP's state incharge, told reporters here, answering a volley of questions on ties between the two parties.

A formal decision would be made on the Chief Ministerial candidate of the NDA once the Election Commission issues the notification for the assembly elections, expected in April-May, he said, adding the strategy was part of the ongoing exercise to strengthen the BJP in the state. The AIADMK has already announced incumbent K

Palaniswami as its Chief Ministerial candidate in the election.

Earlier, former Indian team leg spinner and cricket commentator, Laxman Sivaramakrishnan and several elected representatives at the level of local bodies joined the BJP. On Rajinikanth's announcement that he would not launch a political party, Ravi praised the actor, saying he had always protected the national and Tamil Nadu's interests. "He is a great leader." Asked if his party would seek his support, he said, "I hope, we will ask him." To a similar question, Ravi said everyone knows, "how close Modi Ji and Rajinikanth are." AIADMK has also expressed the view that Rajinikanth would support the party-led alliance in view of his decision not to float his outfit. Opposition parties have said Rajinikanth's decision not to join politics would hurt the BJP, maintaining that it was hoping to join hands with him and become a force in the state. Rajinikanth, who earlier said he would launch his party next month, had on Tuesday announced he would not foray into politics in view of his health status, having undergone a kidney transplant four years ago, and considering the coronavirus pandemic situation.

Haryana civic polls: Setback for BJP-JJP

Chandigarh, Dec 30: In another humiliating defeat to Haryana's ruling BJP-JJP combine, it lost mayoral polls in two municipal corporations but won in one civic body Wednesday.

The opposition Congress won the post of Mayor for the Sonapat Municipal Corporation, while the BJP won the post in Panchkula Municipal Corporation.

In the Ambala Municipal Corporation, Congress rebel Venod Sharma's Haryana Jan Chetna Party won. BJP's Kulbhushan Goyal won the Panchkula mayor election

by defeating Congress' Upinder Kaur Ahluwalia by a margin of 2,057 votes. Goyal got 49,860 votes, while Ahluwalia polled 47,803 votes.

In Ambala, Haryana Jan Chetna Party's Shakti Rani Sharma defeated BJP's Vandana Sharma by a margin of over 7,000 votes.

Congress' Nikhil Madaan defeated BJP's candidate Lalit Batra by a margin of 13,818 votes in Sonapat for the mayor seat.

However in the Rewari Municipal Council, the BJP won the post of Chairperson. BJP's Poonam Yadav defeated Independent Upma Yadav by 2,087 votes. The Congress was third on this seat.

In the Uklana municipal committee election, independent candidate Sushil Sahu defeated BJP's ally Jannayak Janata Party (JJP) candidate Mahender Soni for the President's post.

In Sampla, independent candidate Pooja, who was backed by former Chief Minister and Congress leader Bhupinder Singh Hooda, defeated the BJP nominee for the President's post.

In the Dharuhera Municipal Committee election in Rewari district, independent nominee Kanwar Singh became the President by defeating nearest rival and BJP candidate Sandeep Bohra by 632 votes.

Fight against nCoV kept health ministry on its toes in 2020

New Delhi, Dec 30: The Union health ministry was in the thick of action throughout 2020 in India's fight against coronavirus, ramping up testing facilities as well as health infrastructure while simultaneously issuing COVID-19 treatment and management guidelines from time and time.

At the same time, it put on track the development of a vaccine which is likely to be available early next year.

The first case of coronavirus infection in the country was recorded January 30 in Kerala and the first death on March 10 in Karnataka. By September, India became the second worst-hit nation, after the US, in terms of COVID-19 cases.

As the country eased the lockdown norms through a graded and pre-emptive approach, the health ministry started issuing standard

operating procedures for opening up of religious places, shopping malls, restaurants, hotel and offices and most recently for educational institutions to prevent the spread of the virus.

The Centre March 30 also launched Rs 50-lakh insurance cover for health workers fighting COVID-19. It also constituted 11 empowered groups on different aspects of COVID-19 management in the country to take informed decisions on various issues.

The number of daily coronavirus cases peaked in September with 97,894 infections being reported on the 17th day of the month, after which India began witnessing a decline in cases even though several other countries saw a surge in infections.

Recoveries have crossed 98 lakh, putting the country in the number one position in terms of the number of recovered coronavirus cases,



followed by Brazil while it is in the third spot in terms of fatalities globally after the US and Brazil, according to the Johns Hopkins University, which has been compiling global COVID-19 data.

While battling the pandemic, India ramped up the production of COVID-19 protective gears like PPE and N-95 masks while scaling up test-

ing facilities boosting indigenous production of such items thereby reducing dependency on foreign countries.

India has so far tested over 17 crore samples for COVID-19 in its over 1,200 government and 1,080 private laboratories.

As several countries raced to develop a vaccine against the deadly

viral disease, Indian scientists too plunged into action and developed at least three vaccine candidates, one of which now is under active consideration for approval. At present, six COVID-19 vaccines are undergoing clinical trials in India.

They are: Covaxin, developed by Bharat Biotech in collaboration with ICMR; Oxford vaccine manufactured by SII under licence from AstraZeneca; ZyCoV-D being developed by Cadila Healthcare Ltd in Ahmedabad in collaboration with the Centre's Department of Biotechnology; Sputnik V vaccine manufactured by Dr Reddy's Lab, Hyderabad, in collaboration with Russia's Gamaleya National Centre; one manufactured by Biological E Ltd, Hyderabad, in collaboration with MIT, US and the sixth developed by Pune-based Gennova Biopharmaceuticals Ltd in collaboration with HDT, US.

Besides, there is NVX-CoV2373,

which is being developed by SII in collaboration with Novavax and its phase-3 clinical trial is under consideration with the drug regulator.

An eighth vaccine is being developed by Bharat Biotech International Ltd in collaboration with Thomas Jefferson University, US and it is at the pre-clinical stages.

Another vaccine, which is in the initial stage, is being developed by Aurbindo Pharma.

Meanwhile, Bharat Biotech, Serum Institute of India and Pfizer have applied to the Drugs Controller General of India seeking emergency use authorisation for their COVID-19 vaccines. While Pfizer is yet to make a presentation, the applications of Bharat Biotech and Serum Institute are being examined, the Centre recently said asserting that DCGI's requirement for more data from the companies will not impact the vaccine-roll out timeline.

■ Landslide in Norway, 10 hurt

Helsinki: A landslide smashed into a residential area near the Norwegian capital Wednesday, injuring at least 10 people, leaving 21 unaccounted for and destroying several homes, authorities said. Islamabad: The Pakistan government Wednesday said it will cancel the passport of former prime minister Nawaz Sharif February 16. Sharif, 70, the Pakistan Muslim League Nawaz (PML-N) supremo, has been living in London since November last year after the Lahore High Court granted him permission to go abroad for four weeks for treatment. The three-time former prime minister has been convicted in two corruption cases.

■ Oli is 'tired of making deals'

Kathmandu: Embattled Prime Minister KP Sharma Oli said Wednesday that he is "tired of making deals" with the rival faction leader Pushpa Kamal Dahal "Prachanda" and accused him of breaching various agreements reached between them on several occasions to keep the ruling Nepal Communist Party's unity intact. Oli's remarks came hours after a four-member Chinese delegation led by Vice Minister of the International Department of the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC) Guo Yezhou returned home without much success in its mission to patch up differences between Nepal's feuding leaders.

■ Hindu temple vandalised

Peshawar: A Hindu temple was vandalised by an angry mob in northwest Pakistan Wednesday, police said. The incident took place in Terri village in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's Karak district, District Police Officer Irfan Marwat told reporters. According to Marwat, protesting the expansion work of the temple, the mob demolished the newly constructed work alongside the old structure. No case has been registered and neither any arrest made so far in the incident.

UK nod to Astra/Oxford vax

London, Dec 30: Britain Wednesday became the first country in the world to approve a coronavirus vaccine developed by Oxford University and AstraZeneca, hoping that rapid action would help it stem a surge of infections driven by a highly contagious variant of the virus.

Boris Johnson's government, which has already ordered 100 million doses of the vaccine, has jumped ahead of other Western countries with its vaccination programme.

It was the first to approve a shot developed by Pfizer of the United States and Germany's BioNTech, with the result that hundreds of thousands of people were vaccinated in Britain before European Union countries and the United States even began administering it this month.

The AstraZeneca/Oxford shot, unlikely to be approved for some time by EU or U.S. regulators, will start being administered Monday,

While the approval by the UK Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) is a vindication for a shot seen as essential for mass immunisations in the developing world as well as in Britain, it does not eliminate questions about trial data that make it unlikely to be approved so rapidly in the European Union or the United States.

Uncertainty has swirled over the most effective dosing pattern for the AstraZeneca/Oxford vaccine since it released data last month showing a 90% success rate for a half-dose followed by a full dose, but only 62% - still usually more than enough for regulators - for two full doses.

The MHRA said that the results for the half-dose regimen had not been borne out by analysis. Instead, it approved the regimen of two full doses. An official involved in the

UK MPs approve Brexit trade deal

London, Dec 30: Members of the UK Parliament Wednesday voted in favour of the Brexit trade deal 521 votes to 73.

UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson had recalled Parliament from its Christmas break to get the Brexit free trade agreement (FTA) struck with the European Union (EU) cleared through all parliamentary stages for the EU (Future Relationship) Bill to become law in time for January 1, 2021.

The 80-page Bill, which follows a last-minute deal agreed with the EU last week, just days before the December 31 deadline of the end of the Brexit transition period, was debated by MPs in the House of Commons followed by the House of Lords.

Johnson had urged MPs to back the "historic" Bill, which he says is not "a rupture but a resolution" of the UK's relationship with its European neighbours.



Once both Houses pass the Bill, it will go to the Queen for her Royal Assent to make it law.

"What we sought was not a rupture but a resolution, a resolution of the old and vexed question of Britain's political relations with Europe, which bedevilled our post-War history," says Johnson, as part of his opening speech in the Commons.

"First we stood aloof, then we became a half-hearted, sometimes obstructive member of the EU. Now, with this bill, we shall be a friendly neighbour - the best friend and ally the EU could have - working hand-in-glove whenever our values and interests coincide while fulfilling the sovereign wish of the British people to live under their own laws, made by their own elected Parliament. That is the historic resolution delivered by this Bill," he said.

Congress inching closer to Trump veto override

Washington, Dec 30: The US Senate was due Wednesday to hold a procedural vote that could pave the way for Congress to override President Donald Trump's veto of a key defense bill, as tension between the outgoing Republican president and party leaders grows.

Trump Tuesday ramped-up pressure on his fellow Republicans to support his decision to veto the bill because it does not repeal certain legal protections for tech giants, and to back \$2,000 one-time stimulus checks for struggling Americans.

The president attacked Republican leaders on Twitter as "pathetic," and warned that the party had a "death wish" if it did not back the bigger payments. He also called again for scrapping social media company legal protections.

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell, however, blocked a quick vote on the checks, and urged lawmakers to override Trump's veto. If successful, the veto override would be the first such con-



gressional rebuke of Trump.

The House of Representatives overturned his veto on Monday, and the Senate is expected to hold a procedural vote on Wednesday evening. Final passage of the override could come later in the week or over the weekend.

Late on Tuesday, McConnell introduced a bill that combined the \$2,000 checks with a provision scrapping the social media company protections and another to study election security, a major issue for Trump who has claimed without evidence that fraud robbed him of victory in the November election.

Since most Democrats do not support the second two measures, the maneuver looks set to kill off all three.

NEPAL IS SEEKING INDIA'S 'HELP' TO PROCURE COVAX

Kathmandu, Dec 30: Nepal has sought India's help to procure COVID-19 vaccines for around 20 per cent of its population. The Himalayan nation is ramping up its efforts to contain the deadly virus that has killed more than 1,800 people and infected over 260,000 others, a media report said Wednesday.

The Nepal government has written to the Indian government, requesting for procurement of COVID-19 vaccines to inoculate around 20 per cent of the Nepali population, the Kathmandu Post reported.

Nepal will pay for the vaccines it sources through India, the paper added. At least two vaccine candidates including Oxford's AstraZeneca and domestically developed candidate Bharat Biotech's vaccine are in the final stages of a third phase trial in India.

"To get the vaccines at the earliest, the government has requested the Indian government to buy vaccines for 20 per cent Nepalis," the paper said, quoting a Health



Ministry official.

Nepal is also pursuing vaccines made in other countries.

"Around 15 vaccine candidates of different countries and companies are in third phase trials. The government has written letters to most of the countries for help and to the individual companies to procure the vaccines," said Dr Shyam Raj Upreti, coordinator of Nepal's COVID-19 Vaccine Advisory Committee.

Last month, the government sent diplomatic notes to India, China, Russia, the UK and the US, countries whose vaccines against the coronavirus have either completed the third phase trials or are near their completion, for early availability in Nepal, the report said.

Last month, India assured the people of Nepal that once it rolls out a vaccine against COVID-19, meeting their requirement will be a priority for New Delhi.

ARGENTINA PASSES LANDMARK BILL TO LEGALISE ABORTION

THE BILL WAS ALREADY APPROVED BY ARGENTINA'S CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES AND HAS THE SUPPORT OF PRESIDENT ALBERTO FERNANDEZ, MEANING THE SENATE VOTE WAS ITS FINAL HURDLE

Buenos Aires, Dec 30: Argentina's Senate has passed a law legalising abortion in Pope Francis' homeland after a marathon 12-hour session, a victory for the women's movement that has been fighting for the right for decades.

The vote means that abortion will be legalised up to the 14th week of pregnancy, and also will be legal after that time in cases of rape or danger to the mother's life. It will have repercussions across a continent where the procedure is largely illegal.

The measure was passed with 38 votes in favour, 29 against and one abstention, after a session that

began late Tuesday.

It was already approved by Argentina's Chamber of Deputies and has the support of President Alberto Fernández, meaning the Senate vote was its final hurdle.

"This has been a struggle for many years, many women died. Never again will there be a woman killed in a clandestine abortion," said Vilma Ibarra, the author of the law and legal and technical secretary for the presidency, who wept as she spoke to reporters after the result.

"We did it sisters. We made history. We did it together. There are no words for this moment, it passes through the body and the soul," tweeted Monica Macha, a lawmaker with President Alberto Fernandez'



center-left ruling coalition.

"Safe, legal and free abortion is now the law," Fernández himself tweeted after the vote, noting that

it had been an election pledge.

"Today, we are a better society that expands women's rights and guarantees public health," he added.

Protests outside parliament

Argentina is the largest Latin American country to legalise abortion and the vote was being closely watched.

Abortion is extremely rare in a region where the Church has held cultural and political sway for centuries. With the exceptions of Uruguay, Cuba, Mexico City, Mexico's Oaxaca state, the Antilles and French Guiana, abortion remains

largely illegal across the region.

Outside the Senate, pro- and anti-abortion rights activists gathered, with the bill's supporters wearing the color green that represents their abortion rights movement. Backers waved green flags as Vice President Cristina Fernández de Kirchner, who presided over the debate, announced the result, shouting "legal abortion in the hospital" as the measure was passed.

Argentina until now has penalised women and those who help them abort. The only exceptions were cases involving rape or a risk to the health of the mother, and activists complain even these exceptions are not respected in some provinces.

Revenue collection up 4% by Nov end

Bhubaneswar, Dec 30: Beating the pandemic in different sectors of economy, Odisha has maintained an upward trend in revenue generation because of the government's dynamic financial management strategies. By the end of November during the current fiscal, the total revenue collection has grown by 4% over the corresponding period of 2020. Chief Secretary Asit Tripathy briefed about this today at the all secretaries meeting held under his chairmanship at the Convention center located at the Lokseva Bhawan.

The total revenue generation from both the sources by end of November, 2019 was Rs 28,402 crore which increased to Rs 29,411.29 crore during the current financial year. The total non-tax revenue during the period grew by 23.29 per cent during the current fiscal as compared to the last fiscal. The total revenue generated from non-tax sources up to November, 2019 was Rs 8,485 crore which increased to Rs 10,462 crore during the corresponding period of the current year.

On face of shutdowns and lockdowns, the total budget utilisation by end of November, 2020 reached around Rs 60,000 crore in different infrastructure, social, agriculture and allied sectors.

Reviewing fiscal performances of various departments up to November 2020 presented by Principal Secretary (Finance) Ashok Kumar Meena, Chief Secretary Tripathy directed the departments

to focus on faster implementation of the projects by utilising the budgeted money without parking the funds anywhere. He also directed the departments to ensure expeditious execution of the infrastructure laying and livelihood generating projects.

Development Commissioner Suresh Chandra Mohapatra directed the departments to take regular review and monitoring of the OMBADC (Odisha Mineral Bearing Areas Development Corporation) and DMF (District Mineral Foundation) projects. Mohapatra added, "The projects of Rs 20,000 crore are being implemented in major mineral bearing districts of Angul, Jajpur, Jharsuguda,

Keonjhar, Koraput, Mayurbhanj, Rayagada, and Sundargarh. These projects would cater to many basic needs of the people."

Further, Tripathy asked the departments of water resources, rural development, works, housing and urban development to "prioritise identified strategic projects and complete those within the scheduled time". On the other hand, Meena assured the departments that there would be "no dearth of funds project implementation".

Development Commissioner Mohapatra, Additional Chief Secretary and Agriculture Production Commissioner Raj Kumar Sharma, Additional Chief Secretary (Rural Development and SRC) Pradeep Kumar Jena, Additional Chief Secretary (Health and Family Welfare) Pradipta Kumar Mohapatra, Additional Chief Secretary (Forest & Environment) Mona Sharma, along with Principal Secretaries, Secretaries and Special Secretaries of all departments participated in the discussion.

International flight ban extended till January end

New Delhi, Dec 30: The coronavirus-induced suspension of scheduled international passenger flights has been extended till January 31, aviation regulator DGCA said Wednesday.

"However, international scheduled flights may be allowed on selected routes by the competent authority on a case-to-case basis," the Directorate General of Civil Aviation added.

Scheduled international passenger services have been suspended in India since March 23 due to the coronavirus pandemic. But special international flights have

been operating under the Vande Bharat Mission since May and under bilateral "air bubble" arrangements with selected countries since July.

India has formed air bubble pacts with 24 countries including the US, the UK, the UAE, Kenya, Bhutan and France. Under an air bubble pact between two countries, special international flights can be operated by their airlines between their territories.

The DGCA circular also said that the suspension does not affect the operation of international all-cargo operations and flights specifically approved by it.

'Ahmedabad most affordable housing market, Mumbai costliest'

New Delhi, Dec 30: Ahmedabad has become the most affordable housing market in the country while Mumbai remains the costliest, according to property consultant Knight Frank India.

The consultant released its Affordability Index 2020, which showed that Ahmedabad was the most affordable housing market in India with an affordability ratio of 24 per cent, followed by Pune and Chennai at 26 per cent each in 2020.

A ratio over 50 per cent makes it difficult to secure home loans from banks and housing finance companies, making it unaffordable to purchase a house, Knight Frank India said.

The affordability index, which tracks the EMI (Equated Monthly Installment) to income ratio for an average household, has shown meaningful improvement in affordability over the last decade.



The consultant said that decline in housing prices and multi-decade low home loan interest rates have helped improve housing affordability in 2020.

"While Mumbai is the most expensive market, with affordability ratio of (61 per cent), other cities like

Ahmedabad, Chennai and Pune are relatively more affordable," Knight Frank said.

Even for Mumbai, the affordability ratio has improved from a high of 93 per cent in 2010 to 61 per cent in 2020.

Current account surplus moderates to \$15.5bn in Q2: RBI

Mumbai, Dec 30: India's current account surplus moderated to \$15.5 billion or 2.4 per cent of the GDP in the July-September quarter of the current fiscal. The same was at \$19.2 billion or 3.8 per cent of the GDP in the preceding three months on account of a rise in the merchandise trade deficit, the RBI said Wednesday.

A current account deficit of \$7.6 billion or 1.1 per cent of the GDP was recorded in the second quarter of 2019-20.

India recorded a current account surplus of 3.1% of the GDP in the first half of the fiscal as against a deficit of 1.6% in the corresponding period of 2019-20

India recorded a current account surplus of 3.1 per cent of the GDP in the first half of the fiscal as against a deficit of 1.6 per cent in the corresponding period of 2019-20. This was mainly on account of a sharp contraction in the trade deficit.

The narrowing of the current account surplus in the second quarter of 2020-21 was due to a rise in the merchandise trade deficit to \$14.8 billion from \$10.8 billion in the preceding quarter, the central bank said.

New Delhi, Dec 30: The CBI Wednesday carried out searches at the premises of infrastructure firm IVRCL, its Managing Director E Sudhir Reddy and Joint Managing Director R Balarami Reddy who have been booked by the agency for an alleged fraud worth over Rs 4,800 crore against a consortium of banks, officials said.

The agency has booked the Hyderabad-based company and its directors on a complaint from the State Bank of India, CBI Spokesperson RC Joshi said. It was alleged that the accused in connivance with unknown public servants and others defrauded the consortium of public sector banks, consisting of State Bank of India, IDBI Bank, Canara Bank, Andhra Bank, Corporation Bank, EXIM Bank, Punjab & Sind Bank, Union Bank of India and caused a loss of



Rs 4,837 crore to the banks,' he said.

The CBI has alleged that the company had availed credit facilities from consortium members and cheated them by not repaying the loan amount. It was also alleged that as per the forensic audit report, the company made payments to related parties through letters of credit (LCs), without recording any

'RCom group owes ₹26,000cr to banks, financial institutions'

New Delhi, Dec 30: Debt-ridden telecom firm Reliance Communications Wednesday said the group owes around Rs 26,000 crore to Indian banks and financial institutions.

The Indians banks, vendors and other creditors have made claims of around Rs 86,000 crore on the company which is currently going through insolvency proceedings.

"As per figures certified by the Resolution Professional appointed by the lenders, the RCOM group owed around Rs 26,000 crore to Indian banks and financial institutions as on the date of filing before the NCLT," Reliance Communications (RCom) said in a statement.

The creditors have submitted claims of around Rs 49,000 crore on RCom, Rs 24,000 crore on Reliance Telecom and Rs 12,600 crore on Reliance Infratel before the National Company Law Tribunal (NCLT).

"The alleged 'fraud' classification by certain banks is entirely unjustified and unwarranted, and the Hon'ble Delhi High Court by an interim order has directed the same to be kept in abeyance for the time being, and the matter is now sub judice," RCom said.

It further said that the Resolution Plans unanimously agreed by the

lenders are at various stages of approval before the NCLT, and upon implementation thereof, the lenders are likely to recover at least 70 per cent of their dues, with potential subsequent upside.

"The financial stress in the telecom sector, owing inter alia to the entry of a new player in 2016 with unlimited free offerings, was not unique to Rcom, but decimated the entire industry, and led to the shutdown of services by Aircel, Sistema, Videocon, Tata Docomo and several other players, and also severely impacted the financials of global giants like Vodafone in its Indian operations," RCom said.

The company said that Vodafone Idea has reported losses aggregating Rs 1 lakh crore in the last 15 months.

Digital India delivered outcomes effectively amid pandemic: Prasad

However, it didn't bother the organisers considering the rise in digital viewership. Mumbai Indians secured their fifth title beating Delhi Capitals in the final. KL Rahul (670 runs) and Kagiso Rabada (30 wickets) won the Orange and Purple caps respectively. It was also a heartbreaking season for Chennai Super Kings fans as the MS Dhoni-led side couldn't make it into the play-offs for the first time in IPL history.

WOMEN'S T20 CHALLENGE: Smriti Mandhana-led Trailblazers won the tournament beating Supernovas in the final and denying the Harmanpreet Kaur-led side their third successive title in the tournament history.

ICC WOMEN'S WORLD T20: Australian eyes decimated India to claim their fifth world title. They entered the semifinals, losing first game and narrowly surviving the second. They were lucky enough to enter the final, courtesy rain. However, they brought out their 'A' game in the summit clash to overwhelm an unbeaten Indian side to clinch the title.

FIRST INT'L CRICKET POST PANDEMIC: West Indies visited England for a three-Test series in July. The Caribbean side drew the first blood winning the first match in Southampton. However they lost the series losing the next two Tests in Manchester.

HOUR OF EMBARRASSMENT
The historic low came in the first Test - a Day/Night affair at Adelaide. Virat Kohli's men were in complete control of the match, before an embarrassing hour of play in their second innings pulled them into the history books. They were bundled out for 36, lowest than their previous worst of 42. They lost the match comprehensively. However, they won the Boxing Day Test to level the series at 1-1. The Men in Blue made a sloppy start to the tour losing the ODI series 1-2, before making a comeback in T20Is, winning it 2-1.

END OF AN ERA

MS Dhoni hung up his gloves announcing his international retirement, August 15. He last played for India in the 2019 World Cup semifinal against New Zealand. Since then, he was out of the team showing personal reasons for more than a year. Interestingly, he had begun his international career in an ODI, being dismissed via run-out and he ended his career also in an ODI via run-out. However, he played in the IPL later in the year, captaining CSK. Dhoni is the only skipper in the world to have won all three major ICC trophies - 2007 World T20, 2011 World Cup and 2013 Champions Trophy. He has also held the ICC Test mace for leading India to the top of ICC Test rankings.

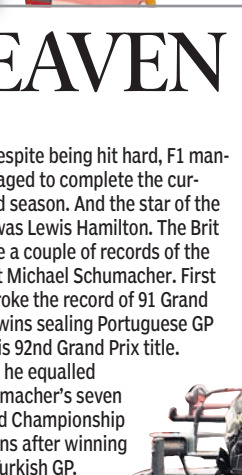
