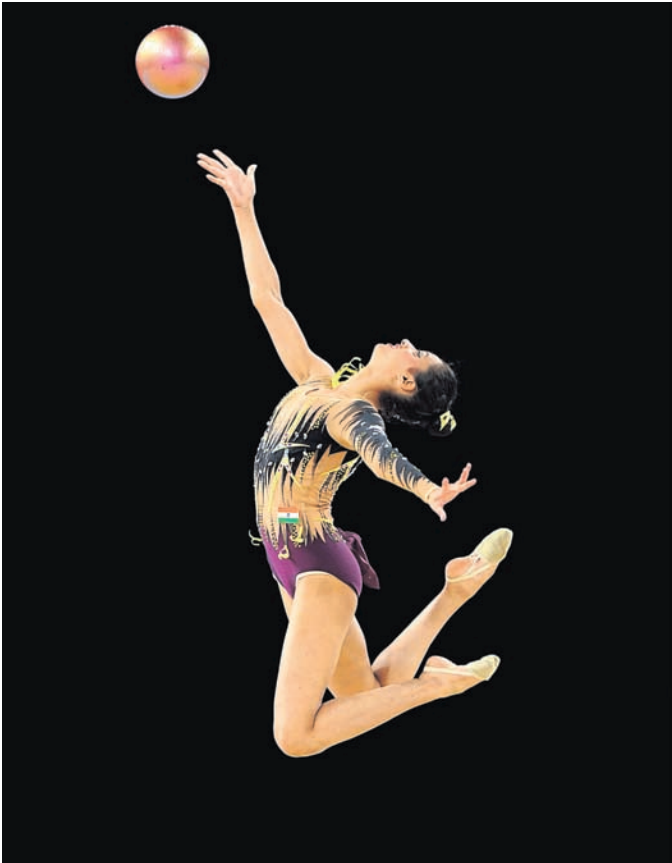

3 Odisha ex-lawmakers' assets attached by ED

New Delhi, August 4: The Enforcement Directorate said Thursday it has attached assets worth ₹2.16 crore of a company, whose former directors included an ex-MP and two former MLAs from Odisha, in a money-laundering probe linked to an alleged chit-fund scheme fraud.

A provisional order for attaching the properties of 'Nava Diganta Capital Services Ltd' and its group companies has been issued under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

In a statement, the ED said the group companies are represented through directors Anjan Kumar Baliyarsingh, Pradeep Kumar Pattnaik, Kartikeya Parida and ex-directors such as former Mayurbhanj MP Ramachandra Hansdah, former Keonjhar Sadar MLA Subarna Naik and ex-MLA



from Khariar: Hitesh Kumar Bagarti.

Hansdah, who was with the NCP and the BJD, joined the Jharkhand Mukti Morcha (JMM) last year. Naik too was with the Biju Janta Dal (BJD). He and Hansdah were suspended by the BJD after they were arrested by the CBI in this case in 2014. Bagarti too was arrested in the same case and he had won the seat on a BJP ticket.

The attached assets include deposits worth ₹16 lakh kept in 48 accounts of the IDBI Bank and Indian Bank, two land parcels worth ₹2 crore at Narendrapur mouza in Puri district and Kaipadar mouza in Khurda district. The total worth of the assets attached is

₹2.16 crore. The money-laundering case stems from an FIR and two charge sheets filed by the CBI against the accused.

"Nava Diganta Capital Services Ltd was collecting public deposits by issuing redeemable preference shares and non-convertible debentures (income debentures and wealth debentures) by fraudulently luring the gullible public on the pretext of giving higher interests by issuing money receipts and certificates to this effect without having any authorisation whatsoever from any regulatory authority namely RBI, SEBI etc to do such activities," the ED claimed.

The company, it said, was found to be 'misappropriating' the invested amount and 'diverting' the funds by way of granting loans and advances to its other group concerns like 'Nava Diganta Projects Ltd' and 'Nava Diganta Properties Ltd'.

Woman, daughter run over by truck driver after row

Dhamrasala/Jenapur, August 4: A truck driver allegedly mowed down a woman and her daughter in this district after a heated argument over overtaking, police said Thursday. The incident occurred Wednesday when Sritika Chakrabarty (47) and her daughter, Somali (26) were returning home in Rathapadia village under Sukinda block on a scooter after attending a shradh ritual in neighbouring Kendrapara district, a police officer informed.

The truck driver, Amar Swain, a resident of Totakan in Samparu panchayat, overtook the two-wheeler from the wrong side. The driver also abused the mother-daughter duo at Aruha Chowk under Dhamrasala police limits, following which a bitter argument broke out between Somali and him, police said. Locals intervened to calm the situation and sent them to their respective destinations.

However, Swain went with his vehicle about five kilometres from the argument site and waited near Barada Chowk on NH-53 under Jenapur police station locality. When the scooter riders reached there, he intentionally mowed down the two-wheeler killing both occupants.

Initially it was thought to be a case of accident. However, police during investigation found out that the two deceased had been mowed down by Swain deliberately.

Swain has admitted to his crime and was arrested Thursday. A murder case has been lodged against him, SP Jajpur district, Rahul PR said Thursday.

After the post-mortem, the bodies were consigned to flames at the native village of the deceased.

Justice Lalit to have 5th shortest tenure as CJI

New Delhi, August 4: Chief Justice of India (CJI) NV Ramana set in motion Thursday the process of appointment of his successor by recommending the name of Justice

Uday Umesh Lalit to the Centre in accordance with convention. The CJI personally handed over a copy of his letter of recommendation to Justice Lalit, next in seniority to Justice Ramana.

Justice Ramana, the 48th Chief Justice of India who took over as head of the Indian judiciary from SA Bobde April 24, 2021, is scheduled to demit office August 26 after

his tenure of over 16 months. Supreme Court judges retire at the age of 65.

"Hon'ble the Chief Justice of India Shri Justice NV Ramana

today recommended the name of Hon'ble Shri Justice Uday Umesh Lalit as his successor to the Hon'ble Minister for Law and Justice," a Law Ministry statement said.

If he is appointed, Justice Lalit will have a tenure of 74 days as CJI, the fifth shortest in office. He will be in office from August 27 to November 8. The shortest period in office for a CJI after independence belongs to Kamal Narain Singh who was in the chair for 17 days. Odisha's Gopal Ballav Pattanaik also features in the list of shortest tenures when he was in the CJI office for 40 days.

The prolific performer takes time off to talk to **Orissa POST** on a host of topics. Excerpts:

ARINDAM GANGULY, OP

■ **How One On One is different from other conventional plays?**

■ Often the stage lovers don't get the opportunities to watch dramatised version of some beautifully written stories. In *One On One*, we are presenting a collection of seven short plays, interwoven with each other, based on some good short stories. I'm sure the play will be a fun ride for the viewers.

■ **Odisha is a culturally rich state, have you ever watched any Odia play?**

■ I have not seen any of them, but I have staged a play *Mahua*, the theme of which has an Odisha connection. We used folk music of Odisha in that play.

■ **How is the response of the audience here in comparison to other cities?**

■ The response varies from one city to another. While people in metros prefer to watch commercial plays, I think, Odia viewers are more drawn towards folk theatre.

■ **You have portrayed many real life characters like Mahatma Gandhi, Vikram Sarabhai and Jawaharlal Nehru. How challenging were the roles?**

■ Pretty challenging because one needs

to do a lot of homework as they are not fictional. It's not possible to match them physically, but through their mannerisms an actor can convince the audience which I tried my best to do.

■ **What role the character Byomkesh Bakshi played in your success as an actor?**

■ Well, I am happy people still remember me as Bakshi and it is being binge-watched on YouTube channels. But for me, it was part of my job and I have moved on.

■ **What gives you more satisfaction as an actor?**

■ I love theatre because I get my work evaluated instantly by the audience. Besides, a chemistry is built up between the performer and audience during stage plays which is not the case in movies.

■ **Any plans to turn to film direction?**

■ I am yet to get a good plot to work on. Once I get one, I may consider directing a film. At the moment I am content with stage direction.

■ **What are your future projects?**

■ This year, my focus is more on theatre. However, I have a couple of movies like *Goldfish* and *Agent Durga* that I shot earlier which will be released in the coming days.

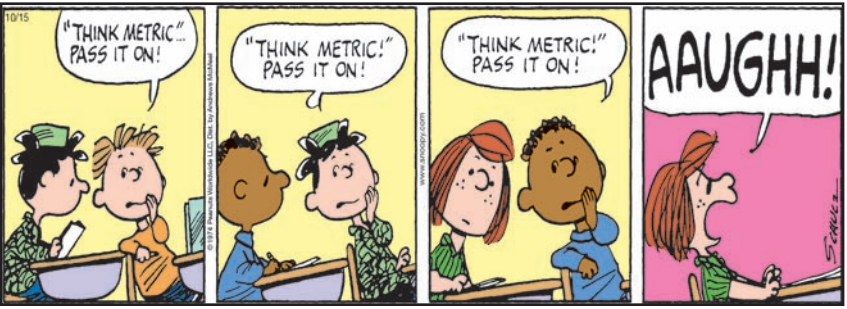
Raima on rumours about her love life

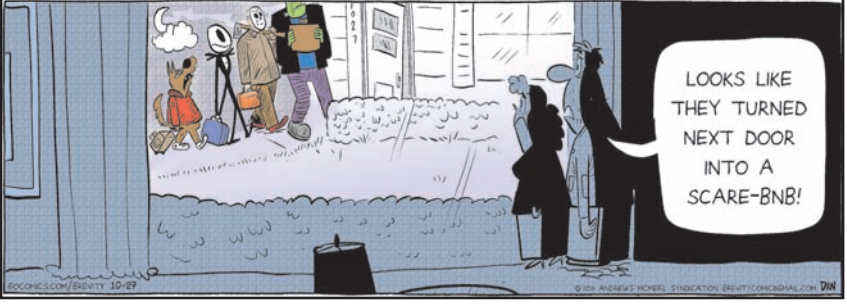

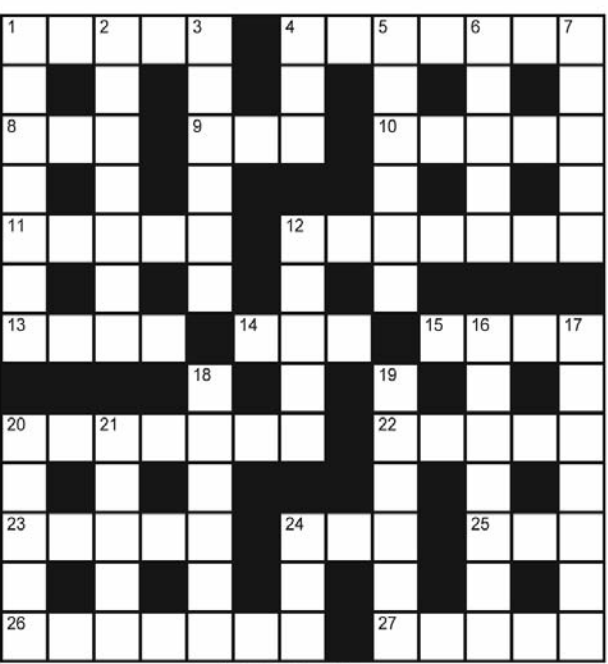

Nod to investment proposals worth ₹2,253cr

Bhubaneswar, August 4: The State Level Single Window Clearance Authority (SLSWCA), led by Chief Secretary Suresh Chandra Mahapatra, has approved 11 investment proposals worth Rs 2,253.15 crore which will create employment opportunities for 3,817 persons, an official said Thursday.

Industries department Principal Secretary Hemant Kumar Sharma outlined the project proposals for consideration, it was learnt.

Giving nod to the project proposals, the Chief Secretary directed the departments to ensure providing proactive facilitation to the approved units for their early grounding.

The proposals approved in the meeting were mostly from sectors like aluminum downstream, steel,



food processing, infrastructure, oil and gas, information technology, electronic system designing and manufacturing.

The Industries Principal Secretary said, "As most of the proposals are from downstream and manufacturing, the units will boost economic activities in their respective areas through generation of indirect employment opportunities."

Fedders Electric and Engineering

Limited's proposal to set up an iron ore beneficiation plant in Sundargarh district at a cost of Rs 533.25 crore got the SLSWCA nod. The plant is expected to provide jobs to around 1,029 people.

Similarly, the proposal of Envirocare Infrasoil Pvt Ltd for establishment of DRI and pellet with beneficiation plant and ferro alloy plant with an investment of Rs 520 crore was also approved by the

state government. The initiative will create jobs for 600 youths.

Adani Enterprises Limited's proposal to set up a data centre at a cost of Rs 500 crore in Khurda also got the SLSWCA's nod. The centre which will offer cloud hosting services will generate employment opportunities for 200 people.

The proposal of Arya Iron and Steel Company Pvt Ltd to set up a Billet/Color coated TMT and Filter Cake Handling System in Keonjhar district with an investment of Rs 175.75 crore was also approved during the meeting. The initiative will provide jobs to 600 people. Meanwhile, Amrit Dhara Nutrifoods LLP's proposal to set up a dairy product processing unit in Cuttack with an investment of Rs 59.48 crore also got the single window clearance. The unit is expected to provide employment opportunities to 152 persons.

90% land acquisition completed: Gadkari

Bhubaneswar, August 4: About 90 per cent of land for the much-talked about Gopalpur-Ratanpur Coastal Highway has been acquired so far, Union Road Transport and Highways Minister Nitin Gadkari told the Lok Sabha Thursday.

In a written reply to a question raised by Puri MP Pinaki Misra, Gadkari said that as per the suggestion of state government, the alignment of Gopalpur-Ratanpur Coastal Highway has been modified to start from Rameshwar (near Tangi) instead of Gopalpur.

Land acquisition for the coastal highway from Rameshwar (near Tangi on NH 16)-Brahmagiri-Puri-Konark-Naugaon-Paradip Port-Ratanpur has started and is currently in 3A stage (90 per cent

completed), he said.

The approximate cost of land acquisition for the project is about Rs 817 crore. The work of the highway has not commenced as the project is in DPR stage, he added.

In April 2015, Gadkari had announced the coastal highway project during his visit to Odisha. After that, the project was delayed due to a political slugfest between the BJP

and the BJP.

Later, the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change refused to accord approval to the alignment of the highway. Originally it was between Gopalpur and Digha. Now, the coastal highway will start from Tangi in Khurda district to Digha.

A total of 150 structures, including 20 major bridges, 69 minor bridges, four rail over bridges, five vehicle underpasses and two flyovers, will be constructed for the project, sources said.

Bribery: CBI raids Mahima Mishra

Bhubaneswar, August 4: Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) sleuths Thursday raided the office and residence of Orissa Stevedores Limited (OSL) chief Mahimananda Mishra in connection with Rs 25 lakh bribe allegedly paid by a contractor to a senior official of Paradip Port Authority (PPA), an official said.

Apart from carrying out searches at the Paradip and Cuttack offices of OSL and Mishra's residence in the Silver City, the central agency sleuths also raided the office of Karam Chand Thapar (KCT) in Paradip, of which OSL is the handling agent, added the official.

CBI also interrogated Saroj Das, the chief mechanical engineer of PPA and Sumant Rout, who was working as a contractual worker at Das's office. Sources said based on the complaint of KCT, the CBI laid a trap and caught Rout, who was receiving Rs 25 lakh bribe from an OSL official on behalf of Das. The sources said that the CBI has detained Das, Mishra's son Chandan, Rout in connection with the incident.

Govt urges people to take booster doses of vaccine at the earliest

Bhubaneswar, August 4: The state government Thursday urged people to come forward and take the booster dose of COVID-19 vaccine at the earliest, expressing concern over the fact that only a few have been administered the third shot thus far, even as infections continue to get detected in the state.

The administration is looking at ways to administer as many precautionary doses as possible by September 30, the deadline set by the Union government for giving free jabs at public healthcare institutions, Health Director Bijay Panigrahi said.

"Only 26 per cent of those aged above 60 have taken the precaution doses," Panigrahi said in a media briefing in Bhubaneswar.

Around 2.65 crore of the population is between 18-60 years, of which only eight per

cent or 22.84 lakh people have taken the booster dose, according to the official.

Panigrahi added that around 25 lakh individuals above 12 years of age are yet to get their second dose.

He requested everyone to do the needful as soon as possible as cases could surge at any time.

Meanwhile, Odisha reported 870 new infections Thursday, pushing the tally to 13,16,473.

As many as 157 children were among the new patients. The state had logged 920 cases Wednesday.

The toll rose to 9,144 after Bhubaneswar and Cuttack reported one fatality each.

Of the new infections, Sundargarh reported the 220 cases, followed by 140 in Khurda.

Odisha now has 6,325 active cases, while 13,00,951 patients have recovered from the infection, including 928 since Wednesday.

Besides, 53 other COVID-19 patients have died due to comorbidities so far.

The test positivity rate stood at 4.17 per cent as the cases were detected out of 20,880 samples.

Rainfall activity is expected to increase from Friday due to the gradual strengthening of the monsoons and the anticipated low pressure

area, the Bhubaneswar Meteorological Centre said.

The weather system may form over northwest and west-central Bay of Bengal around Sunday, it said, predicting widespread rainfall from Saturday to next Wednesday across the state.

Fisherfolk have been advised not to venture into the deep sea areas of west-central Bay of Bengal from Sunday due to squally weather

with gusty wind speed of 45-55 kmph in the region.

The Met issued a yellow warning of 70-110 mm heavy rain in some parts of Malkangiri, Koraput, Nabarangpur, Rayagada, Kalahandi, Gajapati and Ganjam districts Friday

There can be downpour in several districts, including Puri and Cuttack, over the subsequent three days, according to a bulletin.

An orange warning of very heavy rainfall up to 200 mm has been issued for some areas of Malkangiri, Koraput, Nabarangpur, Rayagada and Gajapati districts Sunday. Very heavy rain can also occur across Puri, Khurda, Gajapati, Ganjam, Jagatsinghpur, Malkangiri and Koraput Monday. Showers can lead to waterlogging in low-lying areas and landslides or mudslides in vulnerable hilly areas, the weather office said. The maximum temperature is set to be above normal by 2.3 degree celsius during the next 24 hours, it added.

Earlier, the Higher Education department had cancelled the admissions of as many as eight students into the BJB Autonomous College for allegedly furnishing fake disability certificates. The admission of as many as 28 students of Bhadrak Autonomous College has also been cancelled.

Youth's body found from rly track; suicide suspected

Bhubaneswar, August 4: The body of a youth was found from the railway tracks near Patia railway station here late Wednesday evening. The deceased identified as Partha Narayan Das was a resident of Lambhitala village under Brahmagiri police limits in Puri district.

Das who worked as video editor in a noted electronic media web portal was staying in a rented house in Prashanti Vihar area under Infocity police limits.

According to sources, some locals spotted Das's mutilated body and informed police late Wednesday evening. On being informed, police reached the spot and sent the body to Capital hospital for post-mortem.

The deceased's body was later

handed over to the family members after the completion of autopsy Thursday morning. Sources in Police claimed that locals told the cops that Das jumped before a running train at around 9:30pm Wednesday.

The deceased's brother told media persons that Das had reportedly asked his mother to pay Rs 30,000 which she sent through phonepey Wednesday afternoon. He expressed shock on the suicide news and demanded proper investigation into the matter to find out whether Das had committed suicide or someone had killed him in a pre-planned manner.

However, the family members are yet to lodge a complaint. Meanwhile, police have initiated probe into the matter registering an unnatural death case.

Justice UU Lalit to have 5th shortest tenure as CJ

Justice Lalit has been part of several landmark judgements including the one which held the practice of divorce through instant 'triple talaq' among Muslims illegal and unconstitutional.

If appointed, Justice Lalit will become the second CJI who was directly elevated to the apex court Bench from the Bar. Justice Lalit, who was a renowned senior advocate, was appointed a judge of the Supreme Court August 13, 2014.

Among the other landmark judgements which Justice Lalit has been a part of, a bench headed by him had ruled the erstwhile royal family of Travancore has the management right over the historic Sree Padmanabhaswamy Temple in Kerala, one of the richest shrines in the country. Born November 9, 1957, Justice Lalit had enrolled as an advocate in June 1983 and practised in the Bombay High Court till December 1985. He shifted his practice to Delhi in January 1986, and in April 2004, he was designated as a senior advocate by the apex court.

Climate change will significantly affect bird diversity: Study

Climate change will not only impact the number of bird species by 2080 but also have profound effects on their diversity and community composition, according to a study.

The scientists related past bird distributions to climate data and then applied these relationships to two future climate scenarios - based on low and medium greenhouse gas emissions - to predict changes in species distributions. The team looked not only at changes in numbers of species in areas but also at the types of species that would occur.

To summarise changes in species types they calculated something called phylogenetic diversity that summarises how many different types of birds would occur. For example, a community that had a

lot of closely-related species, such as insect-eating songbirds, would have a much lower phylogenetic diversity score than a community that included a mix of more distantly-related species, for example songbirds plus other species such as birds of prey, partridges or gulls.

The researchers analysed how the communities of birds all over the world could change in the future and discovered that that climate change will not only affect species numbers but will also have profound effects on phylogenetic diversity and community composition.

The study, published in the journal Proceedings of the Royal Society B, evaluated data for a total of 8,768 bird species globally to predict how many different lineages could be lost regionally, or added, as species respond to climate change



by shifting their distributions.

Although the researchers project species losses to be most common in tropical and subtropical areas, phylogenetic restructuring of species communities is expected to occur around the world. The study emphasises that preserva-

tion of local phylogenetic diversity can be a key to the resilience of biological diversity to environmental changes.

"In our study, we examined the effects of global warming on the regional distribution of terrestrial birds around the world," said study

Illegal mining in Ranpur unabated despite NGT fiat

Nayagarh/Ranpur, August 4: Mafia gangs are carrying out rampant mining of murrum and laterite stones in Mayurjharia area under Ranpur tehsil of Nayagarh district despite a directive issued by National Green Tribunal (NGT) to halt it, a report said. Locals said the administration fears to take action allegedly due to pressure from the mining mafia. Some are of the view that the administration, instead of taking action, is actually protecting the mafia gangs. However, Sub-collector Lagnajit Rout said illegal mining will be investigated and action will be taken against the guilty. Reports

said 144.09 acre (Plot No-1689 and Khata No-495) is reserved for gramya jungle in Mayurjharia area. A part of the land has cashew plantation and Odisha Cashew Corporation Limited used to lease it out at intervals. The tehsil administration, however, has leased out four acres of the cashew plantation in 2020-21. The leaseholder was accused of doing excessive mining on the land. In the last two years, murrum and laterite stones have been extracted from 3 acres of land by felling cashew trees. Inside the cashew forest, there are mining pits as deep as 40 to 50 ft. Locals have repeatedly been drawing the attention of the

Locals are of the view that the administration, instead of taking action, is actually protecting the mineral mafia gangs active in the area

Collector, sub-collector, tehsildar, RDC and ST secretary towards the illegal and excessive mining, but to no avail.

Shiba Prasad Raiguru, a local leader, said, "Illegal mining will not be stopped here as officials from top to the bottom are involved in it, resulting in losses to the government. Illegal mining is being run by a well-oiled racket here."

Dillip Kumar Samantray, who had moved the NGT against the illegal mining here, said that cashew forest is being cleared to carry out mining of murrum and laterite. "The leaseholder is not filling up the voids created after mining. Now, the leaseholder is expanding its area by felling cashew trees. The NGT order has failed in curbing the illegal mining. The administration is doing precious little."

The sub-collector hinted at investigation into the issue before a suitable action is taken against the guilty.



Man gets 12 years in jail for raping minor

Baripada, August 4: A special POCOS court here Thursday sentenced a 37-year-old man to 12 years of rigorous imprisonment after convicting him of raping a minor girl in 2017.

The incident took place inside Shri Jagannath Temple in Baripada. POCOS court judge Sumita Jena also imposed a fine of ₹20,000 on the convict, Gurucharan Behera, of Deulasahi under Baripada Town Police Station, special public prosecutor, Abhinna Kumar Pattnaik said.

The court also directed District Legal Services Authority to pay ₹4 Lakh to the rape survivor.

Patnaik said the convict had taken the 10-year-old girl inside the temple after luring her with chocolates at around 9pm March 31, 2017.

Baripada town police arrested him after registering a case against him under Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act.

The judgement was based on the medical report, statements of the minor girl, and 24 witnesses, the special public prosecutor said.



Dhenkikote woman killed by hubby; friend set free

Dhenkikote, August 4: A man, identified as Purastam Naik of Khaliabeda under Ghatagaon police limits was earlier suspected to have killed a woman after raping her, but police investigation revealed that it was the woman's husband, Bira, who committed the crime and tried to put the blame on his friend.

The murder was outcome of an extramarital affair between the woman (deceased) and Bira's friend. The incident has taken place in Dhenkikote area of Keonjhar district.

Ghatagaon IIC Pratibha Sahu said that the deceased's husband is the killer and police have registered a case in this regard.

Police said Bira's wife and his friend Purastam had physical relationship. Purastam was entertained with wine and dine at the house of Bira Sunday night. At midnight, Bira was shocked to see his friend and wife in an objectionable position.

Infuriated, Bira picked up a crowbar and pushed it into his wife's private parts. The pro-

fusely bleeding woman was taken to Jharbada hospital, where she was declared dead. To hide the fact from local residents, Bira spread a word that she had taken her wife to a godman for treatment, but she died.

Later, he brought the body and buried it in the backyard of his house. Then, he told his two daughters to blame Purastam for the crime. Accordingly, his daughters filed a complaint against Purastam at Ghatagaon police station following which the body was exhumed in the presence of a magistrate and sent for post-mortem. Police detained Bira and Purastam and grilled them about the incident. Bira confessed to his crime and Purastam was freed.

PMGSY roads messed up; 5 SDOs may face music

All these roads were laid under rural development sub-divisions of Jajpur Road, Mahakalpara, Pattamundai, Aul and Marshaghahi.

These PMGSY roads are from L060 expressway to Benapatia; from L042 Embankment to Raghunathpur; from Palimi to Desahi; Podana to Mandia; Juna to Purusottampur; Bhusaranga to Khamanagabindha and

Gunupur to Kathiapada.

However, five SDOs who are responsible for looking after proper execution of PMGSY projects have not yet submitted their action-taken reports on the report of the NQM team.

The engineer-in-chief of the Rural Development department has expressed concern over the negligence of these SDOs and has sent a letter to the office of the chief engineer (PMGSY) to frame draft charges against the SDOs concerned. Besides, he has also recommended submission of action-taken report based on NQM guidelines.

Elderly man killed on suspicion of witchcraft

Bhubaneswar/Rayagada, August 4: In a shocking incident, an elderly man was allegedly beaten to death on suspicion of practicing witchcraft in a village in Rayagada district, police said Thursday.

The deceased has been identified as Dai Majhi of Titiguda village under Kashiapur block in Rayagada district. Fortunately, the victim's two sons – Durya Majhi and Lalu Majhi – managed to escape from the attack with critical injuries.

Durya and Lalu are now under treatment at Tikiri hospital, the police said.

According to locals, the incident took place late Wednesday night when Dai, his wife and two sons were fast asleep at their home in Titiguda village.

Suddenly, some villagers allegedly barged into their house and pulled out Dai and his sons from the house. After tying them with a rope, the locals allegedly beat them. Dai was severely injured in the attack by the villagers leading to his death while his two sons managed to escape from the villagers' clutches, they said.

Later, Tikiri police rushed to the village, recovered Dai's body and sent it for post-mortem.

70% handloom units closed in Kendrapara

Kendrapara, August 4: Lack of government sponsorship, publicity and marketing facilities along with use of modern sewing machines and quality threads has dealt a body blow to the traditional handloom sector in this district, as per a report.

The impact can be gauged from the fact that over 70 per cent of the handloom units in the district have been shut down. Moreover, over 7,000 weavers have lost their jobs to modernisation sweeping the textile industry. They have been managing their profession somehow but the Covid pandemic dealt a heavy blow to their businesses.

They have stopped preparing clothes like dhoti napkins (gamchha) and sarees which had been their bread and butter for decades. Moreover, several handloom weavers' cooperative societies which had been marketing their products and working to safeguard their interests have now become a thing of the past after becoming defunct.

Tapan Sahu, a weaver of Kushiapal village on the outskirts of Kendrapara town, said that many looms have fallen silent as several weavers are now not keen on weaving sarees, lungis, dhotis and towels.

Increasing cost of raw materials has robbed the sheen off their businesses. He said that over 10,000 weavers of Kushiapal, Dihasahi, Haripur, Korua,

Kutaranga, Keutagada and other villages were depended on weaving clothes for their livelihood.

Hand woven napkins, dhotis and shawls produced were in great demand even in foreign countries. Weaving clothes in the loom became part of the curriculum and a school was established for the purpose during the freedom struggle launched by Mahatma Gandhi. However, despite a demand for handloom products

many units are on the verge of closure while others have shut down due to lack of government sponsorship.

Another weaver Narayan Bhadra of Korua village said that weaving is the second form of livelihood for many after agriculture. Over 3,000 people are still engaged in weaving textile products. Their business was completely shut for a period of two years during Covid pandemic while

some have returned to the business after lifting of the restrictions.

However, the weavers are losing their faith on this business after being troubled by a series of problems. The youths are no more interested in the age-old occupation and are migrating outside in search of other jobs.

Harekrushna Das, president of Kushiapal handloom weavers' cooperative society, said that the demand for handloom products is still high but lack of marketing facilities is troubling them.

Another weaver Ajay Kumar Behera said increasing cost of raw materials and lack of its proper availability have hit them hard. Moreover, the restrictions on use of chemical colours have got in the way of manufacturing impressive handloom products. Things have come to such a pass that the weavers now fail to recover the production cost of a handloom product when sold.

This apart, handloom products do not get the kind of publicity that Sambalpuri handloom or Jhel saree of Mayurbhanj worn by President Droupadi Murmu gets, he added.

When contacted, ADM Pitambar Samal said the state government is laying stress on improvement of handloom sector and marketing the products through Khadi Board and Boyanika. Recently, the government has sanctioned ₹15 crore to Boyanika. This will help improve the business of the weavers, he added.

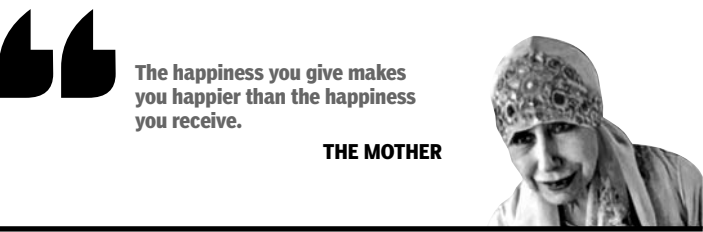

Woke Left & Alt-Right

The Canadian psychologist and Alt-right media fixture Jordan Peterson recently stumbled onto an important insight. In a podcast episode titled “Russia vs. Ukraine or Civil War in the West?,” he recognised a link between the war in Europe and the conflict between the liberal mainstream and the new populist Right in North America and Europe.

Although Peterson initially condemns Russian President Vladimir Putin’s war of aggression, his stance gradually morphs into a kind of metaphysical defence of Russia. Referencing Dostoevsky’s Diaries, he suggests that Western European hedonist individualism is far inferior to Russian collective spirituality, before duly endorsing the Kremlin’s designation of contemporary Western liberal civilisation as “degenerate.” He describes postmodernism as a transformation of Marxism that seeks to destroy the foundations of Christian civilisation. Viewed in this light, the war in Ukraine is a contest between traditional Christian values and a new form of communist degeneracy.

This language will be familiar to anyone familiar with Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán’s regime, or with the January 6, 2021, insurrection at the US Capitol. As CNN’s John Blake put it, that day “marked the first time many Americans realized the US is facing a burgeoning White Christian nationalist movement,” which “uses Christian language to cloak sexism and hostility to Black people and non-White immigrants in its quest to create a White Christian America.” This worldview has now “infiltrated the religious mainstream so thoroughly that virtually any conservative Christian pastor who tries to challenge its ideology risks their career.”

The fact that Peterson has assumed a pro-Russian, anti-communist position is indicative of a broader trend. In the United States, many Republican Party lawmakers have refused to support Ukraine. JD Vance, a Donald Trump-backed Republican Senate candidate from Ohio, finds it “insulting and strategically stupid to devote billions of resources to Ukraine while ignoring the problems in our own country.” And Matt Gaetz, a Republican member of the House of Representatives from Florida, is committed to ending US support for Ukraine if his party wins control of the chamber this November.

But does accepting Peterson’s premise that Russia’s war and the Alt-right in the US are platoons of the same global movement mean that Leftists should simply take the opposite side? Here, the situation gets more complicated. Although Peterson claims to oppose communism, he is attacking a major consequence of global capitalism. As Marx and Engels wrote more than 150 years ago in the first chapter of The Communist Manifesto:

“The bourgeoisie, wherever it has got the upper hand, has put an end to all feudal, patriarchal, idyllic relations. ... All fixed, fast-frozen relations, with their train of ancient and venerable prejudices and opinions, are swept away, all new-formed ones become antiquated before they can ossify. All that is solid melts into air; all that is holy is profaned, and man is at last compelled to face with sober senses his real conditions of life, and his relations with his kind.”

This observation is studiously ignored by Leftist cultural theorists who still focus their critique on patriarchal ideology and practice. Yet surely the critique of patriarchy has reached its apotheosis at precisely the historical moment when patriarchy has lost its hegemonic role – that is, when market individualism has swept it away. After all, what becomes of patriarchal family values when a child can sue her parents for neglect and abuse (implying that parenthood is just another temporary and dissolvable contract between utility-maximising individuals)?

Of course, such “Leftists” are sheep in wolves’ clothing, telling themselves that they are radical revolutionaries as they defend the reigning establishment. Today, the melting away of pre-modern social relations and forms has already gone much further than Marx could have imagined. All facets of human identity are now becoming a matter of choice; nature is becoming more and more an object of technological manipulation.

The “civil war” that Peterson sees in the developed West is thus a chimera, a conflict between two versions of the same global capitalist system: unrestrained liberal individualism versus neo-fascist conservatism, which seeks to unite capitalist dynamism with traditional values and hierarchies.

There is a double paradox here. Western political correctness (“wokeness”) has displaced class struggle, producing a liberal elite that claims to protect threatened racial and sexual minorities in order to divert attention from its members’ own economic and political power. At the same time, this lie allows Alt-right populists to present themselves as defenders of “real” people against corporate and “deep state” elites, even though they, too, occupy positions at the commanding heights of economic and political power.

Ultimately, both sides are fighting over the spoils of a system in which they are wholly complicit. Neither side really stands up for the exploited or has any interest in working-class solidarity. The implication is not that “Left” and “Right” are outdated notions – as one often hears – but rather that culture wars have displaced class struggle as the engine of politics.

Where does that leave Europe? The Guardian’s Simon Tisdall paints a bleak but accurate picture:

“Putin’s aim is the immiseration of Europe. By weaponising energy, food, refugees and information, Russia’s leader spreads the economic and political pain, creating wartime conditions for all. A long, cold, calamity-filled European winter of power shortages and turmoil looms. ... Freezing pensioners, hungry children, empty supermarket shelves, unaffordable cost of living increases, devalued wages, strikes and street protests point to Sri Lanka-style meltdowns. An exaggeration? Not really.”

To prevent a total collapse into disorder, the state apparatus, in close coordination with other states and relying on local mobilisations of people, will have to regulate the distribution of energy and food, perhaps resorting to administration by the armed forces. Europe thus has a unique chance to leave behind its charmed life of isolated welfare, a bubble in which gas and electricity prices were the biggest worries. As Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky recently told Vogue, “Just try to imagine what I’m talking about happening to your home, to your country. Would you still be thinking about gas prices or electricity prices?”

He’s right. Europe is under attack, and it needs to mobilise, not just militarily but socially and economically as well. We should use the crisis to change our way of life, adopting values that will spare us from an ecological catastrophe in the coming decades. This may be our only chance.

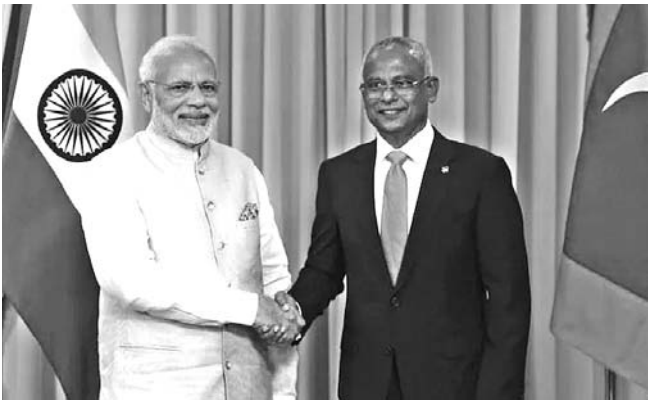

Maldivian President Ibrahim Mohamed Solih’s four-day visit to India marks a turning point in South Asian politics as China meddles in it, and internal rebellion in countries such as Sri Lanka poses a potential threat of spreading to other countries in the region. The visit, which began Monday, is hailed by both sides as manifestation of their respective friendly foreign policies towards each other. For Maldives, it is ‘India First’ and for India, it is ‘Neighbourhood First’. Both the strategies claim to work in tandem to tackle shared concerns and promote mutual interests.

The second important backdrop to this visit consists of the ‘leadership tension’ between President Solih and the Speaker and former President Mohamed Nasheed. In fact, Solih’s visit takes place in the face of a number of controversies raging back home, involving a delicate balance between his former friend Nasheed as well as religious extremist parties in his ruling coalition. Recall, angry youth had this June disrupted the yoga event held at a stadium in Male organised by the Indian High Commission, calling it ‘un-Islamic’.

A serious confrontation is afoot in Male as a no-confidence motion is sought to be moved against Speaker Nasheed protesting against the arrest of Nazim Abdul Sattar, an attorney and a brother: Nasheed claims the arrest as well as the no-confidence vote ‘would benefit radical elements in the country’. The Government of India, however, is quiet on the internal tension.

South Block is asserting that Maldives, though the smallest country in Asia, is India’s key neighbour and is known as the toll gate of the Indian Ocean. Maldives straddles a 960-km-long undersea ridge stretching north to south and forming a wall in the Indian Ocean. Though small in size, the geo-strategic importance of the island nation is significant. Notably, India’s relations with Maldives have been multi-dimensional, largely cordial

and cooperative. However, these were deeply strained under Maldives’s pro-China ex-President Abdullah Yameen, who spearheaded the ‘India Out’ campaign. In recent years, both sides assert that the partnership has witnessed rapid growth in most areas of cooperation, especially in the field of development. New Delhi has already given the island nation over 1.2 billion USD for upgradation of infrastructure and is engaged in additional 45 infrastructure development projects. This visit is supposed to lend a fresh momentum to the bilateral relations, tightening geo-political, security, and economic ties. A tweet from Ministry of External Affairs characterises and sums up the relationship. It reads: “A warm welcome to a close friend and a maritime neighbour: Ibrahim Mohammad Solih’s official visit to India provides an opportunity to nurture the unwavering friendship between our two countries and will lend further momentum to the multifaceted partnership.”

As India declares that Maldives has always been a close and significant maritime neighbour, New Delhi has extended timely help to it. President Solih acknowledged India’s contribution to the devel-

opment and stability of the island nation and highlighted the positive role in his country’s affairs in the past two years. In particular, he thanked the Indian government for helping out in coping with the COVID-19 pandemic and the supply of vaccines. Notably, India has extended a further support of 100 billion USD as line of credit for augmenting development activities and decided to support in 2020, implementation of Greater Male Connectivity Project in Maldives.

President Solih announced that the Male connectivity projects will be completed under India’s 100 million USD grant and 400 million USD line of credit from the US. Addressing the media, Solih said: “Maldives-India relationship goes beyond diplomacy. This visit is an affirmation for the close bond between our two countries.”

Both the countries inked six agreements in various areas and issued a joint statement, which significantly reiterated that both countries would not allow their territories to be used against the other. It said, “This partnership is a force of stability in the Indian Ocean region.” The six pacts are expected to facilitate cooperation in capacity building, cybersecurity,

housing, disaster management and infrastructure development in Maldives. In order to counter transnational crimes and terrorism in the Indian Ocean region, both signed a cybersecurity agreement, wherein Prime Minister Modi said, “Chances of terrorism, drug trafficking and transnational crimes are high in the Indian Ocean region. We have, therefore, decided to increase cooperation in this field, which will include training and capacity building of the security officials in Maldives.”

On surveillance, India announced to provide Landing Craft Assault (LCA) to the Maldives National Defence Force (MNDF) and another warship to replace CGS Hurabee, a naval patrol vessel gifted in 2006. It will also provide 24 utility vehicles to MNDF. Another agreement is to design and construct 61 police infrastructures across Maldives. Remember, that India had built a National College for Policing and Law Enforcement in Addu city, which was inaugurated by EAM S Jaishankar on his earlier visit this year. Further, New Delhi has been supporting construction of social housing units in Maldives.

Although politics and politicians change, the assurance given by Ibrahim Solih is heartening for India. New Delhi has to carry its neighbours in trust and confidence. Solih said, “Maldives will remain a true friend of India... India has always been a reliable ally to Maldives through thick and thin.”

The height of his acknowledgement of friendship with India was when he said, “It is during my administration thus far, that we have reached the pinnacle of our diplomatic and economic relations.” He affirmed, “On our part, our relations with India will always be of highest priority.” New Delhi should reciprocate such confidence of her smaller neighbours.

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SPECTRUM EASTERN ECONOMIC FORUM

A strategic opportunity for India

The 7th Eastern Economic Forum (EEF) will take place in Russia’s Far Eastern port of Vladivostok from 5-8 September and represents a grand strategic opportunity for India. These two great powers have expanded their special and privileged strategic partnership in an unprecedented manner.

New Delhi has decisively acted to become the Kremlin’s irreplaceable valve from Western pressure and thus preemptively averted Moscow’s potentially disproportionate dependence on Beijing. This was a game-changer in terms of shaping the contours of the global systemic transition to multi-polarity that was accelerated by the Ukrainian conflict. EEF is always a major event in Russia-India relations, but this year it is more important than ever due to a larger context. Russia urgently needs to diversify from its hitherto disproportionate economic dependence on EU towards the Global South, and India has been designated its priority partner in this respect.

They’ve already revived the International North-South Transport Corridor (INSTC) through their shared Iranian strategic partner and have thus come to align their grand strategies in Eurasia, which is a major accomplishment. It is now time to do the same in the Indo-Pacific by taking maximum advantage of the EEF to that end.

The Vladivostok-Chennai Maritime Corridor (VCMC) that was jointly announced by Russian President Vladimir Putin and Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi during the latter’s appearance at the EEF in September 2019 as the guest of honour creates the geo-economic basis for bringing this about, but implementation was unexpectedly delayed as a result of the pandemic.

Nevertheless, there’s no better time than now for reviving the VCMC exactly as the INSTC was recently revived, which will align their Indo-Pacific grand strategies and thus enable them to more effectively shape the emerging multipolarity world order in the eastern hemisphere. The whopping 99-paragraph Partnership for Peace, Progress, and Prosperity that was agreed to during President Putin’s visit to New Delhi in December 2021, which importantly was his first trip abroad since the pandemic began apart from his brief meeting with US President Joe Biden in Geneva earlier that summer, provides a detailed action plan for implementing this vision.

Paragraphs 31-34 in particular explain how they hope to accomplish this in the Far East while paragraph 42 did the same when it came to the INSTC, the vision of which has already achieved tangible dividends as was earlier explained. It’s now incumbent on both great

powers to revive the VCMC during next month’s EEF.

The bulk of bilateral trade between Russia and India concerns arms and energy, the latter of which surged by over 50 times since Moscow began selling Delhi discounted oil after the start of its special military operation in Ukraine. Natural resources, however, should be but a single part of more comprehensive economic relations between these rising great powers. Influential Russian businessman Oleg Deripaska recently told the Economic Times that he envisions his country’s trade with India replacing its lost trade with Europe, but economic ties must urgently diversify in order for that to happen, and it’ll take a lot of time for that to occur. Therein lies the importance of next month’s EEF since India can double down on the Russian dimension of its multipolar grand strategy to make inroads in its partner’s resource-rich and geo-strategically positioned Far Eastern region. The VCMC will predictably have a major resource component to start off with, but it mustn’t remain limited only to trade in that sphere. Rather, flagship projects can serve as magnets for attracting other investments in different industries as Indian entrepreneurs build upon prior successes to truly making themselves an economic force to be reckoned with in this part

of the Indo-Pacific.

Russia needs major investments in Far East in order to have a more solid basis upon which to build the geo-economic dimension of its Indo-Pacific strategy. China’s already a key player in that part of the country but the Kremlin pragmatically wants to preemptively avert any potentially disproportionate dependence on China there just like it hopes to do in general like was earlier explained. Japan and the Republic of Korea were once considered to be promising partners for diversifying Russia’s development of the Far East but those two are reluctant to offend their American military ally by expanding trade with Moscow after the Ukrainian conflict. India therefore does not have much competition there in this respect since New Delhi has already proven that it won’t unilaterally concede on its objective national interests related to its special and privileged strategic partnership with Russia.

India as a civilisation-state should therefore prioritise the creation of a comprehensive joint action plan for developing the Russian Far East, one which might begin with expanding energy and other resource cooperation but will inevitably evolve into other domains including academic, industrial, merchant, and tourist cooperation, etc.

The hooch menace

Sir, Illicit liquor related deaths are quite common in India. A few are highlighted and the rest go unreported. In early 2021, spurious liquor claimed precious lives in the districts of Morena and Bulandshahr in Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh respectively. It is common knowledge that no state is spared of hooch deaths. But what is tragic about last week’s hooch tragedy in Gujarat is that there is prohibition in place in the state. Botad district was the worst hit while there were some casualties in Ahmedabad district. Nearly fifty people breathed their last in Botad district with many in the know claiming the state was not revealing the exact numbers. Manufacture, storage, sale and consumption of liquor have been banned in the state since 1949 through the Bombay Prohibition Act. After Gujarat became a state in 1960, the law was further ‘tightened’. Select star hotels in the state can ‘permit’ guests to consume liquor in the safe confines of their rooms. But illegal liquor sale has been going on unabated, and the Botad tragedy is a stark example. In liquor related deaths, bootleggers are routinely rounded up, and materials used in preparing hooch are seized and destroyed. Those from the lower socioeconomic sections are easy targets for illicit liquor vendors because they fall prey to inexpensive and powerful liquor sold by unscrupulous elements. The spurious hooch dealers lure and con the poor by offering employment opportunities, among others. When a person indulges in partake of the spurious liquor, the toxic actions of methanol onsets slowly but surely. Nationalisation of the sale of liquor to eliminate unlawful liquor operators, through a national liquor policy, and taking stringent measures to control the free availability of rectified spirit are steps that can arrest hooch deaths.

Labourer killed in grenade attack

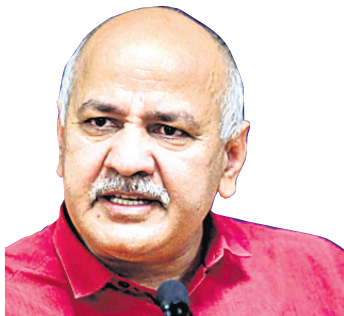

RAIN HAVOC Kerala: Red alert in eight districts

Thiruvananthapuram, August 4: A red alert was declared in 8 districts of Kerala Thursday by the India Meteorological Department (IMD) as rains continued to lash various parts of the state and disrupted the day-to-day lives of the people as roads got flooded or caved in and many got displaced from their homes to relief camps.



IMD issued a red alert for the day in the districts of Pathanamthitta, Alappuzha, Kottayam, Ernakulam, Idukki, Thrissur, Palakkad and Kannur and Orange alert in remaining districts except for Thiruvananthapuram where a Yellow alert is in place.

A red alert indicates heavy to extremely heavy rains of over 20 cm in 24 hours, while orange alert means very heavy rains of 6 cm to 20 cm. A yellow alert means heavy rainfall between 6 and 11 cm.

The inclement weather in the state resulted in water levels of various rivers - like Chalakkudi, Pampa, Manimala and Achankovil - in various districts rising close to or crossing danger levels.

As the rains intensified in the state and in anticipation of water in Chalakkudi river rising further, Kerala Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan warned residents along its banks and those in low-lying areas of Thrissur and Ernakulam districts to be cautious and to be ready to evacuate as per instructions of the authorities.

New Delhi, August 4: The second phase of Common University Entrance Test (CUET)-UG had a bad start Thursday with technical glitches and administrative issues forcing the NTA to cancel second shift exam across all 489 centres and postpone first shift at some locations in 17 states.

"Due to various administrative and technical reasons, the CUET (UG)-2022 scheduled for August 4 (first shift) has been postponed to August 12 for a few examination centres in 17 states," said Sadhana Parashar, Senior Director, National Testing Agency (NTA).

"Further, because of technical reasons, the question paper for the second shift of the examination could only be uploaded at 5 pm and the download at 489 centres could start at 5:25 pm, while the exam was scheduled to begin from 3 pm," she added.

Parashar said reports were asked from the observers and city coordinators on ground. "Based on their recommendations, the second shift scheduled for August 4 (from 3 pm to 6 pm) is cancelled and the same will now be conducted between August 12 and 14, 2022," she said.

ISRO eyes share in global small satellite market

New Delhi, August 4: The Indian Space Research Organisation August 7 will launch its smallest commercial rocket - SSLV - to put in orbit two satellites, offering cheap rides to space and eyeing a share in the burgeoning small satellite launch market.

The 34-metre Small Satellite Launch Vehicle (SSLV) is 10 metres shorter than ISRO's warhorse rocket Polar Satellite Launch Vehicle (PSLV) and can put payloads up to 500 kg into 500 km planar orbit.

Unlike the PSLV, the SSLV uses solid fuel - hydroxyl-terminated polybutadiene - to fire the three stages of the rocket which takes the

payloads to the desired altitude. The liquid-propelled Velocity Trimming Module (VTM) then inserts the satellite into orbit.

In its maiden launch, the SSLV will place in orbit the 145 kg Earth Observation-2 satellite and AzaadiSat, a 8-kg cubesat designed by 750 girl students from government schools across the country to mark the 75th anniversary of Independence.

According to ISRO officials, the SSLV has a low turnaround time and can be assembled within a fortnight, allowing the space agency to provide launch on demand service in the fast growing low earth orbit launch sector.

The SSLV D-1 will soar into the



skies at 9:18 am from the Satish Dhawan Space Centre at Sriharikota Sunday and place in orbit the two payloads at the end of its 13.2 minute flight.

The SSLV is 34 metres in height with a vehicle diameter of two me-

tres and a lift off mass of 120 tonnes.

The PSLV, on the other hand, is 44 metres tall, 2.8 metres in diameter and a lift-off mass of 320 tonnes. It has the capacity to put up to 1,800 kg payloads into orbit.

New Delhi, August 4: The Congress Thursday raised the issue of ED action and police gherao of its party office and the residences of Sonia Gandhi and Rahul Gandhi, with Leader of Opposition Mallikarjun Kharge saying in the Rajya Sabha that he has been summoned by the ED at a time when Parliament is in session.

The ED resumed its searches at the office of Young Indian (YI) here in the National Herald case after Mallikarjun Kharge presented himself before the probe agency with the Congress slamming the summons to the senior party leader right in the middle of the Parliament session.

The appearance of 80-year-old Kharge before the officials of Enforcement Directorate (ED) at the Herald House building and its



action in the money laundering case linked to the Congress-owned newspaper also turned into a slugfest between the Congress and the BJP after the Leader of Opposition in the Rajya Sabha told the House during Question Hour he was summoned to appear at 12.30 PM.

The Congress also raised the issue of ED action in both the Houses of Parliament and caused disruptions. While Kharge, who was quizzed for over seven hours, alleged this was an attempt to "frighten and intimidate" the Congress and wondered if democracy would remain alive, his party said the ED summons during the working hours of Parliament was a "black chapter of democracy" and an "insult" to the legislature.

Union minister Piyush Goyal, who is the Leader of the House in the Rajya Sabha, hit back and re-

jected Kharge's charge as "baseless". He maintained that the government does not interfere in the functioning of law enforcement agencies, and asked the Congress leaders to face the law instead of running away.

Launching a scathing attack on the Prime Minister, senior Congress leader Rahul Gandhi said he is "not afraid of Narendra Modi" and will not be "intimidated" by the ED action in the National Herald case.

Rahul's attack drew a sharp response from the BJP which accused the Congress of trying to spread "anarchy" and "abusing and intimidating" the ED.

"Sonia Gandhi and Rahul should know that they are not above law. The country is governed by the Constitution," BJP spokesperson Gaurav Bhatia said.

Targeting the government, the Congress said Kharge's summoning by the ED during the working hours of Parliament was an "insult" to the legislature and alleged that "Modishahi" is reaching a new low. Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh said Kharge was called by the probe agency when Parliament is in session and he left around 12:20 pm and presented himself.

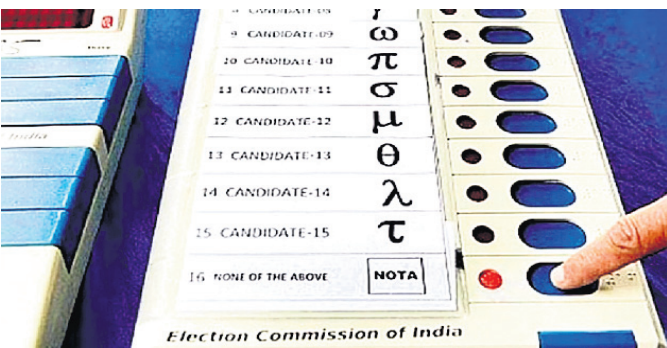
New Delhi, August 4: About 1.29 crore votes were cast for NOTA option in the last five years in state and general elections, poll rights body ADR said Thursday.

The Association for Democratic Reforms (ADR) and National Election Watch (NEW) have analysed the number of votes secured by NOTA (None of the above) in various elections during 2018 to 2022. According to the report, on an average

NOTA has secured 64,53,652 votes (64.53 lakhs) in the state assembly elections.

The report said overall, NOTA secured 65,23,975 (1.06 per cent) votes. Among the NOTA votes in Lok Sabha elections, the highest number of votes i.e., 51,660 was in Gopalganj (SC) constituency in Bihar while the lowest number of NOTA votes i.e., 100 was in Lakshadweep.

Among state assembly elections, NOTA has secured the highest percentage of votes in 2020 at 1.46 per



cent (7,49,360 votes) in two states assembly elections of Bihar (7,06,252 votes) and NCT Delhi (43,108 votes).

NOTA secured lowest percentage of votes in 2022, i.e., 0.70 per cent (8, 15,430 votes) in five states assembly elections (combined) of Goa (10,629 votes),

Manipur (10,349 votes), Punjab (1,10,308 votes), Uttar Pradesh (6,37,304 votes) and Uttarakhand (46,840 votes), the report said.

NOTA secured the highest number of votes in Maharashtra (7,42,134) in state Assembly Elections, 2019, and secured the

lowest number of NOTA votes (2,917) in Mizoram Assembly Elections, 2018. NOTA secured the highest percentage of vote share i.e., 1.98 per cent in Chhattisgarh state assembly, 2018, it said.

NOTA secured the lowest percentage of vote share i.e., 0.46 per cent in both Delhi State Assembly Elections, 2020 and Mizoram State Assembly Elections, 2018. Constituency wise, NOTA has secured as high as 27,500 votes in Latur Rural constituency of Maharashtra and as low as nine votes in Tali constituency of Arunachal Pradesh.

In few constituencies of Arunachal Pradesh such as Dirang, Along East, Yachuli and Nagaland's one constituency Northern Angami the candidate did not have any

rival candidates so NOTA has secured no votes.

Red Alert Constituencies which have three or more candidates with criminal cases contesting elections, NOTA has secured 26,77,616 votes (26.77 lakhs) in state assembly elections since 2018, the ADR said.

NOTA has secured the highest percentage of votes, i.e., 1.63 per cent (6,11,122) in 217 red alert constituencies of Bihar, it said. The ADR has recommended that if in any constituency, votes polled for NOTA are higher than all the contesting candidates then no candidates should be declared as elected and fresh election should be conducted, in which none of the earlier candidates should be allowed to contest.

India to host UNSC meet on counter-terrorism

EAM, Blinken discuss pressing global issues

New Delhi, August 4: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and US Secretary of State Antony Blinken Thursday held talks on pressing global challenges, amid rising tensions between China and Taiwan following US House Speaker Nancy Pelosi's high-profile visit to Taipei.

In his opening remarks at the meeting that took place on the margins of an ASEAN conclave in Phnom Penh, Blinken referred to concerns over "challenges" in Sri Lanka, Myanmar, and the situation in the Indo-Pacific.

It is understood that the escalating tension between China and Taiwan, especially in the Taiwan Strait, following Pelosi's visit to Taipei figured in the talks.

China has launched a major live-fire military exercise in the waters around Taiwan in response to Pelosi's visit to the self-ruled island, triggering global concerns.



The Jaishankar-Blinken meeting also came days after the US killed Ayman al-Zawahiri, the al-Qaeda leader and a key plotter of the 9/11 attacks, in a drone strike in a Kabul safe house. "A warm conversation to start meetings on sidelines of ASEAN Ministerial in Phnom Penh. Discussed the ever strengthening India-US relationship and the global situation with US Secretary of State @SecBlinken," Jaishankar tweeted.

In his opening remarks at the meeting, Blinken said the US and India are strong proponents of the ASEAN centrality in the Indo-Pacific, according to the US State Department. Last month, Sri Lanka witnessed massive political turmoil following mass protests that forced President Gotabaya Rajapaksa to flee the country.

Govt holds meeting with experts

India has so far reported nine cases of monkeypox including one death

New Delhi, August 4: A meeting of top health experts called by the Centre Thursday deliberated on the need for revisiting existing guidelines on management of monkeypox amid rising number of cases of the disease in the country.

"It was a technical meeting to revisit the existing guidelines," an official said.

The meeting was chaired by Dr L Swasticharan, director of Emergency Medical Relief and attended by officials from the National Aids Control Organisation, National Centre for Disease Control and World Health Organisation (WHO) representatives.

According to existing 'Guidelines on Management of Monkeypox Disease' issued by the Centre, any person having a history of travel to affected countries within the



last 21 days presenting with an unexplained acute rash and symptoms like swollen lymph nodes, fever, headaches, body aches and profound weakness is to be considered to be a 'suspected case'.

A 'probable case' has to be a person meeting the case definition for a suspected case, clinically compatible illness and has an epidemiological link like face-to-face exposure, including health care workers without appropriate PPE, direct physical contact with skin or skin lesions, including sexual contact, or contact with contaminated material such as clothing, bedding or utensils.

A case is considered laboratory confirmed for monkeypox virus by detection of unique sequences of viral DNA either by polymerase

chain reaction (PCR) and/or sequencing.

Defining contacts, the guidelines stated that a contact is defined as a person who, in the period beginning with the onset of the source case's first symptoms, and ending when all scabs have fallen off, has had one or more of the exposures-- face-to-face exposure, direct physical contact, including sexual contact, contact with contaminated materials such as clothing or bedding -- with a probable or confirmed case of monkey pox.

Cases can be prompted to identify contacts across household, workplace, school/nursery, sexual contacts, healthcare, houses of worship, transportation, sports, social gatherings, and any other recalled interactions.

RS passes Family Courts (Amendment) Bill, 2022

New Delhi, August 4: Amid continuous sloganeering by the opposition members, the Rajya Sabha Thursday passed the 'Family Courts (Amendment) Bill, 2022' by a voice vote. Lok Sabha had passed this bill last week.

Opposition members led by Congress were protesting alleging misuse of investigating agencies by the government against the political opponents. In response to the discussion on the bill, Union Minister of Law and Justice Kiren Rijiju talked about the need to have the legislation passed considering the long list of pending cases.

He said that there are at present

715 family courts in the country with over 11 lakh pending cases and the government is emphasising to have at least one family court in each district for speedy disposal of cases. According to the Family Court Act of 1984, it is mandatory for a state government to set up a family court for every city or a town whose population exceeds one million. The Minister informed the House that the Union government has already asked judicial officers to give importance to family matters. Rijiju further mentioned that in India, marriage is not only a union of two individuals but that of families and communities, and that when a marriage breaks down, a structure crumbles.

Navy's all-women aircrew creates history

New Delhi, August 4: In a rare feat, five women officers of the Indian Navy carried out the first independent maritime reconnaissance and surveillance mission in the North Arabian Sea onboard a Dornier aircraft.

The aircraft was captained by Mission Commander, Lt Commander Aanchal Sharma, and other members of the team are Lt Shrivangi and Lt Apurva Gite (both pilots), and tactical and sensor officers, Lt Pooja Panda and Sub Lt Pooja Shekhawat. "On Wednesday, five officers of the Indian Navy's INAS 314 based at naval air enclave in Porbandar created history

Commander Madhwal said the first-of-its-kind military flying mission on Wednesday was unique and is expected to pave the way for women officers in the aviation cadre to assume greater responsibility and aspire for more challenging roles.

'India enhanced goals when world seeing less action'

The Union Cabinet Wednesday approved India's updated NDC, incorporating two of the promises made by PM Modi at the Glasgow conference -- reducing emissions intensity of GDP by 45% by 2030, compared to 2005 levels, and achieving about 50% cumulative electric power installed capacity from non-fossil fuel-based energy resources by that year



with the prime minister's Glasgow announcements. It enhances the ambition and yet puts sustainable development at the centre of the debate, she noted.

Director General of Centre for Science and Environment (CSE) Sunita Narain said India has taken important action at a time when the

world is seeing less action on climate change. "But disappointed that we have stated that we will have 50 per cent installed non-fossil fuel capacity by 2030 instead of what India had said in Glasgow that we will meet 50 per cent of electricity requirements from renewables by 2030. This is disap-

pointing as we are already roughly 40 per cent (power generation capacity from non-fossil fuel-based sources)," she said.

Council on Energy, Environment and Water (CEEW) fellow Dr Vaibhav Chaturvedi said the share of non-fossil sources in India's power generation capacity has al-

ready crossed 41 per cent on the back of dedicated policies, and emissions intensity of GDP declined by 24 per cent between 2005 and 2016. Emission intensity is the volume of emissions per unit of GDP.

"That India's ambition has been enhanced in the post-pandemic scenario needs to be emphasised and appreciated."

"The Union Cabinet's statement explicitly states that the enhanced NDC is a step towards the net-zero goal, the government should now follow this with explicit inclusion of the 2070 net-zero pledge in its yet to be submitted long-term strategy to the UN," he said.

The revised NDC does not include 500 GW of non-fossil fuel-based capacity by 2030 and a reduction of one billion tonnes of carbon emissions by 2030.

Tibetan festival resumes after 20 yrs

Beijing: A Tibetan community festival, banned for 20 years after the arrest of a popular religious leader, has been allowed by Chinese authorities to resume with no explanation given for the sudden lifting of control, Tibetan sources say, a report mentioned. The annual event held in Nyagchuka county in Sichuan's Kardze (Ganzi) Tibetan Autonomous Prefecture, formerly a part of historic Tibet, features horse races and picnics, a Tibetan living exile told RFA, citing local sources. "But since 2002, the year when Tulkus Tenzin Delek was arrested on a charge of bombing a public square, the Chinese authorities had barred Tibetans in the region from celebrating the annual event," RFA's source said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Pakistan to hold polls by October

Islamabad: Pakistan's election commission is preparing to hold general elections by October, one year ahead of schedule, according to a media report Thursday. The Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP) has completed the work of delimitation of constituencies and eliminated any objections regarding them, The Express Tribune newspaper quoted sources as saying. "Work has been completed in all constituencies for all national and provincial seats," it quoted the source as saying.

Nepal general elections Nov 20

Kathmandu: Nepal will conduct general elections in a single phase on November 20, a Cabinet meeting headed by Prime Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba decided Thursday. The Himalayan nation will hold the elections of the members of the House of Representatives and Provincial Assembly on November 20, according to sources in the Cabinet. There are a total of 275 seats in the House of Representatives in Nepal, and out of this 165 members are directly elected.

Pope promotes Vatican nurse

Rome: Pope Francis has promoted a Vatican nurse whom he credited with saving his life to be his "personal health care assistant." The Vatican announced the appointment of Massimiliano Strappetti in a one-line statement issued Thursday. Strappetti, the nursing coordinator of the Vatican's health department, accompanied Francis on a difficult trip to Canada last month. Francis, 85, last year credited Strappetti with having accurately ascertained an intestinal problem that led to the pope's 10-day hospital stay in July 2021 to remove 33 centimeters (13 inches) of his colon that had narrowed.

China conducts precision strikes over Taiwan Strait

Ukraine under pressure in east

Kyiv, August 4: Ukraine said Thursday it had repelled multiple Russian assaults on a strategic stronghold in the east of the country, and the head of the NATO military alliance said Moscow must not be allowed to win the war.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskiy this week described the pressure his armed forces were under in the Donbas region in eastern Ukraine as "Hell". He spoke of fierce fighting around the town of Avdiivka and the fortified village of Pisky, where Kyiv has acknowledged its Russian foe's "partial success" in recent days.

The Ukrainian military said on Thursday Russian forces had mounted at least two assaults on Pisky but that Ukraine troops had managed to repel them.

Ukraine has spent the last eight years fortifying defensive positions in Pisky, viewing it as a buffer zone against Russian-backed forces who control the city of Donetsk about 10 km (6 miles) to the southeast.

The Russian defence ministry on Thursday confirmed its forces were on the offensive.

It said they had inflicted heavy losses on Ukrainian forces around Avdiivka and two other locations in Donetsk province, forcing Kyiv's mechanised and mechanised infantry units to withdraw.

Iran nuclear talks resume in Vienna

Vienna, August 4: Negotiators from Iran, the US and the European Union prepared on Thursday to resume months-long, indirect talks over Tehran's tattered nuclear deal, even as international inspectors acknowledged the Islamic Republic began a new expansion of its uranium enrichment.

The resumption of the Vienna talks, suddenly called on Wednesday, appears not to include high-level representation from all the countries part of Iran's 2015 deal with world powers. That comes as Western officials express growing scepticism over a deal to restore the accord and the EU's top diplomat has warned "the space for additional significant compromises has been exhausted".

Iran's top negotiator, Ali Bagheri Kani, had arrived in Vienna for the talks, Iranian state media reported. US Special Representative for Iran Rob Malley also was on hand, tweeting on Wednesday that "our expectations are in check".

As in other talks, the US won't directly negotiate with Iran, instead speaking through EU diplomat Enrique Mora. The US hasn't had direct talks with Iran since then-President Donald Trump unilaterally withdrew America from the accord in 2018.

Mora also met on Thursday with Russian Ambassador Mikhail Ulyanov, who has represented Moscow's interests in the talks. Ulyanov also met with Bagheri Kani in a separate meeting.

"As always we had a frank, pragmatic and constructive exchange of views on ways and means of overcoming the last outstanding issues," Ulyanov wrote on Twitter. But going into the negotiations, Iran laid out a maximalist stance. Through its state-run IRNA news agency, Tehran denied that it had abandoned its effort to get America to delist its paramilitary Revolutionary Guard as a terrorist organisation as a precondition to the talks.

Islamabad, August 4: The US drone strike that killed Ayman al-Zawahiri has raised questions over Pakistan's possible role in the raid amid reports suggesting that the country's airspace could have been used for carrying out the precision strike on the al-Qaeda chief's safe house in Kabul.

In the first high-profile US attack in Afghanistan since American troops withdrew from Afghanistan in August of last year, a drone strike in the Afghan capital this weekend killed Zawahiri, who helped Osama bin Laden plot the September 11, 2001, attacks on the United States. The attack has led to specula-

tion here whether Pakistani airspace was used by the CIA drone to attack Zawahiri in the neighbouring country

"A US drone flew into Afghanistan from the direction of the Gulf region - assuming Pak hasn't given bases yet (unless this govt has done so covertly) - but flew over which country's airspace? Iran does not give any airspace rights to US mly so was Pak airspace used?" senior Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) leader Shireen Mazari tweeted after some media reports that the American drone that eliminated Zawahiri was possibly launched from an airbase in Kyrgyzstan.

Reports claim that the attack was launched from Ganci Airbase, a US transit facility at Manas in northern Kyrgyzstan. Ganci is a former American military base in Kyrgyzstan, near the Bishkek international airport. It was operated by the US Air Force, which handed it over to the Kyrgyz military in June 2014.

London, August 4: The Bank of England (BoE) raised interest rates by the most in 27 years Thursday, despite warning that a long recession is on its way, as it rushed to smother a rise in inflation which is now set to top 13%.

Reeling from a surge in energy prices caused by Russia's invasion of Ukraine, the BoE's Monetary Policy Committee voted 8-1 for a half percentage point rise in Bank Rate to 1.75% - its highest level since late 2008 - from 1.25%.

The economy would begin to shrink in the final quarter of 2022 and contract throughout all of 2023, making it the longest recession since after the global financial crisis.

Ushering in the slowdown, consumer price inflation was now likely to peak at 13.3% in October - the highest since 1980 - due mostly to the surge in energy prices following Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

That would leave households facing two consecutive years of declines in their disposable incomes, the biggest squeeze since these records began in 1964.

The British central bank has now raised rates six times since December but Thursday's move was the biggest since 1995.

The pressure on Governor Andrew Bailey and colleagues to move in larger steps intensified after recent big rate hikes by the US Federal Reserve, the European Central Bank and other central banks. Those moves weakened the value of the pound, which can add to inflation. The BoE repeated that it was ready to move forcefully if needed to stem more persistent inflationary pressures. But it stressed

that there were "extremely large" uncertainties about the economy - which could make the slowdown more or less severe than its core forecasts - and it would judge what its next moves should be as events unfold.

"Policy is not on a pre-set path," the BoE said. "The scale, pace and timing of any further changes in Bank Rate will reflect the Committee's assessment of the economic outlook and inflationary pressures."

The BoE said it expected to start selling down its huge stockpile of government bonds, with active sales of around 10 billion pounds a quarter, shortly after its next meeting in mid-September. The gilt holdings peaked at 875 billion pounds in December and have since fallen to 844 billion pounds after the BoE stopped reinvesting the proceeds of maturing bonds in February.

Automobile retail sales plummet 8% in July

New Delhi, August 4: Automobile retail sales in India dropped 8 per cent on an annual basis in July on account of fall in registrations of passenger vehicles, two-wheelers and tractors.

As per data released by the automobile dealers' body FADA Thursday, the overall automobile retail sales last month stood at 14,36,927 units, as compared with 15,59,106 units in July 2021.

Passenger vehicle retail sales witnessed a dip of 5 per cent at 2,50,972 units last month, as against 2,63,238 units in the year-ago period.

Federation of Automobile Dealers Associations (FADA) President Vinkesh Gulati noted that though there is a blip in July numbers, the segment continues to see introduction of new models, especially compact SUVs, aiding growth. "Along with this, a better supply in the coming months

will help in bringing down customer anxiety due to the long waiting period," he added.

Similarly, two-wheeler retail sales stood at 10,09,574 units in July down 11 per cent from 11,33,344 units in July 2021. "The two-wheeler retail run witnessed poor demand as rural India continues to underperform. This coupled with high inflation, erratic monsoon and high cost of ownership continues to keep bottom of the pyramid customers at bay," he noted.

Russia is India's 3rd largest coal supplier

New Delhi, August 4: Russia became India's third-largest coal supplier in July, with imports rising by over a fifth compared with June to a record 2.06 million tonne, data from Indian consultancy Coalmint showed.

Russia has historically been the sixth-largest supplier of coal to India, behind Indonesia, South Africa, Australia, and the United States, with Mozambique and Colombia alternately featuring in the top five.

India, the world's second-largest producer, importer and consumer of coal, has historically imported more coking coal — used mainly in steelmaking — from Russia, with Australia being the other key supplier.

However, steep discounts offered by Russian suppliers to Indian consumers in the recent months have incentivized higher buying of thermal coal — used mainly in power generation — especially as global prices have traded at near-record highs due to western sanctions choking traditional trade.

Thermal coal imports from Russia jumped 70.3% in July, compared with June, to a record 1.29 million tonne, while coking coal imports rose by over two-thirds to more than 280,000 tonne, Coalmint data showed.

Yes Bank charts growth roadmap after \$1bn capital raising

Moody's Thursday said it has upgraded Yes Bank's rating while changing outlook to 'stable' on the back of its equity capital raise plan

to a 10% stake to Carlyle Group and Advent International.

The fundraising marked a rare vote of confidence in Yes Bank, which had to be taken over by the central bank in March 2020 after months of deterioration in its financials and allegations of mismanagement.

Yes Bank is looking to increase its loan book by 15% in the fiscal year ending March 2023 as it sharpens its focus on mortgages, vehicle loans and small and mid-sized business loans, said CEO Prashant Kumar.

Its loan book expanded 8% in the last fiscal year, slightly lower than the 9.6% growth posted by the Indian banking sector, after having contracted in the preceding two years.

"We will definitely be growing



(the loan book) more than what the industry is, but we would not like to make any mistake," Kumar told Reuters, alluding to the bank's previous rapid credit expansion that was blamed for its woes.

"We may also explore opportunities in microfinance, as that is an area we are not present yet and it

will take time to build it internally so it may make sense to acquire instead," said Kumar, who took over the reins in March 2020.

LONG ROAD AHEAD

Set up in 2004, Yes Bank was the country's fifth-largest lender up until early 2020, after which it

lurched from one crisis to another, including the arrest of its founder amid allegations of governance lapses.

Its gross bad loans as a percentage of total lending had risen to 18.87% as of December 2019, from 2.1% a year earlier. At the end of June 2022, the ratio was 13.9%. Other state-owned banks and private lenders had to step in 2020 to rescue the bank.

Yes Bank's stock has risen over 22% so far this year, after having fallen 23% last year and 62% in 2020. In fiscal 2022, the bank reported a profit of ₹10.66 billion (\$134 million) compared to a loss of 34.62 billion rupees the previous year. Kumar is confident that its stabilising capital position will lead to an improved rating of the bank, which in turn will bring in more business and aid profitability.

However, analysts and investors remain sceptical.

"Even if the Yes Bank turnaround works, it'll take at least six to seven years," said a fund manager, whose portfolio currently does not hold the bank's stock and who declined to be identified as he was not authorised to speak to the media. "I don't think the latest developments will excite investors."

Hima qualifies for 200m semifinals

The 22-year-old Hima led the five-woman field from the start with Rhoda Njobvu of Zambia clocking 23.85s to finish second while Jacent Nyamhunge of Uganda finished third with a timing of 24.07. There are six heats lined up in the women's 200m and the top-16 will qualify for the semi-final.

Hima won heat 2 but Favour Ofili of Nigeria (22.71s in Heat 1) and the formidable Elaine-Thompson-Herah (22.80s in heat 5) had superior timings. At least six athletes have clocked better time, compared to Hima, en route their semifinal entries.

Meanwhile, in the women's hammer throw event, India's Manju Bala advanced to the final while compatriot Sarita Singh failed to make the cut. The 33-year-old Bala finished 11th in the qualification round with a best throw of 59.68m in her first attempt.

In the same event, the other Indian athlete Sarita failed to make the final after she finished 13th with her best throw of 57.48. According to the rules, best 12 performers advance to the final, which will be held Saturday, August 6.

Canada's Camryn Rogers topped the qualification round with best throw of 74.68m, which is a Commonwealth Games record.

Adlington had Tulika on the mat with a forceful throw and the Indian landed on her back, ending the contest with 30 seconds remaining. A silver was still a creditable performance from the 23-year-old from Delhi who gave India its third judo medal in the Birmingham Games.

TEJASWIN OPENS UP ON PLANS FOR ASIAN GAMES

Birmingham: Indian high jumper Tejaswin Shankar Thursday said he has not been able to perform to his full potential owing to chronic tendonitis and it's now a "certainty" that he will compete in decathlon at next year's Asian Games. The problem, however, could not come in his way of winning the country its first-ever medal – a bronze – in high jump at the CWG. Tejaswin said he wants to compete in decathlon at next year's Asian Games. "That is a certainty. I want to compete in decathlon at the Asian Games. That is what I am going to do, going forward," Tejaswin said. Decathlon is a competition in which athletes participate in 10 sporting events – 100m, long jump, shot put, high jump, 400m, 110m hurdles, discus throw, pole vault, javelin throw and 1500m – over two days. "Even if I do not compete at decathlon, I want to continue training in decathlon because it really works for me."

Birmingham, August 4: As soon as Nooh Dastagir Butt won Pakistan's first gold medal at the Birmingham Games, one of the first persons to lend a congratulatory hand was none other than Indian superstar Mirabai Chanu.

As an Olympic medallist, Chanu has catapulted herself to superstardom and is not only an icon in India but also for weightlifters from the neighbouring nation.

"It was such a proud moment for me when she congratulated me and praised my performance," Butt told PTI after winning the gold in the men's 109+kg category with a record lift of 405 kg. The 24-year-old Pakistani shattered all the three Games record – 173 in snatch, 232 in clean and jerk and the aggregate.

"We look up to Mirabai for inspiration. She has shown us that,



we from the South Asian countries can also win an Olympic medal. We became so proud of her when she won the silver at the Tokyo Olympics."

Gurdeep Singh won bronze in the same category and Butt considers the Indian as one of his close

friends. "We have been very good friends for the last seven-eight years. We have trained together in abroad a few times. We are always in touch," Butt let everyone know the bonhomie he shares with his Indian counter-parts.

For Butt, it was never an Indo-

Pak battle but an individual challenge to surpassing his best. "It was not that I was competing with an India lifter. I just wanted to give my best and win it here," he said of Gurdeep. Butt has been to India twice for international events. First was the Youth Commonwealth Championship in Pune, back in 2015 and the very next year for the South Asian Games in Guwahati.

"I've been to India two times and the support I received each time is unforgettable. I long to go back to India again," he added. "I think, mere Pakistan se jyada fans India mein hai (I think, I've more fans in India than back home)," he said in jest. It has been six years since that championship and Butt wouldn't mind visiting India again. "Definitely, I look forward to visiting again. I never enjoyed any other competition like the way I did in India," he added.

After the win, India were on course to top Pool B as they enjoy a goal difference of 22 over England, who still have a match against Canada.

The Indians had the better share of possession in the first two quarters, but Wales gave a tough fight to their fancied opponents, especially in the first 15 minutes.

After a barren first quarter, India secured back-to-back penalty corners in the 18th minute, the second of which was put into goal by the ever-reliable Harmanpreet with a

low powerful grounded flick.

A minute later, India secured another penalty corner and Harmanpreet exhibited his bagful of tricks with another perfect conversion to hand his side a 2-0 lead at halftime.

In the 40th minute, the Tokyo Olympics bronze medallists earned back-to-back penalty corners, the second of which resulted in a penalty stroke, and Harmanpreet made no mistake from the spot.

An agile Gurjant made the score-

line 4-0 two minutes later as he perfectly turned the face of his stick to deflect in Samsher Singh's high pass. Wales then secured two penalty corners in quick time and Furlong made use of the second opportunity.
