Singapore seeing new Covid-19 wave

Singapore, May 18: Island nation Singapore is seeing a new Covid-19 wave as the authorities recorded more than 25,900 cases from May 5 to 11 even as Health Minister Ong Ye Kung Saturday advised the wearing of masks again.

"We are at the beginning part of the wave where it is steadily rising," said Ong. "So, I would say the wave should peak in the next two to four weeks, which means between mid- and end of June," *The Straits Times* quoted the minister as saying.

The Ministry of Health (MoH) said the estimated number of Covid-19 cases in the week of May 5 to 11 rose to 25,900 cases, compared with 13,700 cases in the previous week. The average daily Covid-19 hospitalisations rose to about 250 from 181 the week before. The average daily ICU cases remained low at three cases, compared with two cases in the previous week.

Indian cult classic 'Manthan' breathes anew at Cannes

Cannes, May 18: A significant slice of Parallel Cinema history was under the spotlight at the 77th Cannes Film Festival Friday night. A restored 4K version of *Manthan* (The Churning), Shyam Benegal's 1976 film about the creation of India's first dairy cooperative in a Gujarat village, lit up the screen at Salle Bunuel.

Naseeruddin Shah, a key member of the film's cast, spoke ahead of the screening. "First and foremost, this show of *Manthan* is dedicated to Dr. Verghese Kurien," the veteran actor said. "It is also an occasion to recall Smita Patil, Girish Karnad,



Amrish Puri and music composer Vanraj Bhatia."

The actor said that at a time when Hindi filmmakers would make only what they felt that the audience wanted to see, Shyam Benegal "found ways to speak about the truth of the times".

Manthan, funded with a contribution of ₹2 each

from half a million milk farmers, was a follow-up to Benegal's first two films, *Ankur* (1974) and *Nishant* (1976), which were earlier screened at Cannes competition section. It completed a timely and powerful trilogy on rural distress.

The movie was restored using a 35mm camera negative preserved at the National Film Archive of India. The sound was digitised from the 35mm release print in the possession of Film Heritage Foundation (FHF), which undertook the restoration project a year and a half ago. It was funded by the Gujarat Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation Ltd. The film was restored

under the aegis of FHF at Prasad Corporation's post-studios and the Bolognabased L'Imagine Ritrovata laboratory in association with Benegal and cinematographer Govind Nihalani.

Shivendra Singh Dungarpur, speaking after Cannes Classics in-charge Gerald Duchaussoy introduced *Manthan*, said: "It is an extraordinary feeling to be here for the third year in a row."

Smita's son Prateik Babbar was on the stage to share his emotions while the late actor's sisters, Anita Patil Deshmukh and Manya Patil Seth, were in the audience. Also present at the screening of *Manthan* was Kurien's daughter, Nirmala Kurien.

126 'crorepatis' in Phase III Assly polls; Sanatan tops

Bhubaneswar, May 18: One hundred and twenty six candidates in fray for the third phase of Assembly elections in the state are 'crorepatis'. BJD candidate from Champua Sanatan Mahakud is the richest with ₹227.67 crore assets.

Bhubaneswar, Cuttack, Dhenkanal, Keonjhar, Puri and Sambalpur Lok Sabha constituencies along with 42 Assembly seats under these Lok Sabha segments will go to polls in the third phase May 25.

The Association for Democratic Reforms (ADR) and Odisha Election Watch have analysed the affidavits of 381 out of 383 candidates, who are contesting for 42 MLA seats in Odisha. In a report, the ADR said there are 126 (33 per cent) 'crorepatis' candidates in fray. Independent candidate from Ghasipura, Soumya Ranjan Patnaik is the second richest candidate after he declared family assets to the tune of ₹122.86 crore.

The third palace is held by the BJP candidate from Nayagarh, Pratyusha Rajeshwari Singh, who declared assets of her family totalling ₹120.56 crore.

102 companies of Central forces for law and order

Bhubaneswar: The Election Commission of India will deploy 102 companies of Central Armed Police Forces for the second phase of simultaneous Lok Sabha and Assembly polls in state May 20, an official said Saturday. Incidents of violence have been reported from Ganjam and Bolangir districts ahead of polling. Voting will be held in Aska, Bargarh, Bolangir, Kandhamal and Sundargarh LS seats and 35 Assembly constituencies Monday. CEO Nikunja Bihari Dhal said that the highest of 22 companies of forces would be deployed in Maoist-affected Kandhamal district, followed by Ganjam (20), Sundargarh (16), 14 each in Bargarh and Bolangir, five each in Jharsuguda and Boudh, four in Subarnapur and two in Nayagarh.

"The role of money power in our elections is evident from the fact that all major political parties give tickets to wealthy candidates. Among the major parties, 36 out of 42 candidates analysed from BJD, 29 are from Congress, 28 from BJP and four from AAP have declared assets valued more than ₹1 crore," the report said.

New Delhi, May 18: Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal said Saturday that he and other AAP leaders would go to the BJP headquarters March 19 "so that the Prime Minister can send anyone he wants to jail."

The BJP is saying they will send AAP MP Raghav Chadha and Delhi ministers Atishi and Saurabh Bharadwaj to jail too, he claimed at a press briefing hours after his aide Bibhav Kumar was arrested in connection with the alleged as-



sault on his party's parliamentarian Swati Maliwal.

Kejriwal, who is also the AAP national convener, however, asserted that his party could not be crushed by sending its leaders to jail.

Accusing Prime Minister Narendra Modi of 'playing the game' of sending AAP leaders such as Manish Sisodia, Satyendar Jain, and Sanjay Singh to jail, he

said, "I along with my MLAs and MPs would go to the BJP office at noon tomorrow so that the Prime Minister can send anyone he wants to jail."

"The AAP is an idea. For as many AAP leaders you jail, the country would produce leaders a hundred times more," Kejriwal said.

Maliwal attacker held; blackmail slur on BJP

NEW DELHI: Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's aide Bibhav Kumar was arrested Saturday in connection with the alleged assault on AAP MP Swati Maliwal, even as the party claimed she was 'blackmailed' by the BJP as she faces a corruption case. Kumar was picked up from the Chief Minister's residence by a Delhi Police team, a senior police officer said, a day after Maliwal recorded her statement before a magistrate at the Tis Hazari court. Maliwal has alleged that the CM's aide attacked her with full force, slapping her in the face and kicking her in the chest and abdomen May 13 when she had gone to meet the Chief Minister. P9




Janhvi on being media-objectified

Farah on children's choice of movies







CAMPAIGNING ENDS FOR PHASE II POLLS

79.69L to decide fate of 305 May 20

Bhubaneswar, May 18: Curtains came down Saturday on the high-decibel campaigning for the second phase polls in the state wherein over 79.69 lakh voters will decide the fate of 305 candidates in fray for five Lok Sabha and 35 Assembly seats May 20.

Voting will be held in Aska, Bargarh, Bolangir, Kandhamal and Sundargarh Lok Sabha segments and 35 Assembly constituencies falling under these Parliamentary seats spread over nine districts in western and southern Odisha, Monday.

According to Chief Electoral Officer (CEO) Nikunja Bihari Dhal, a total of 79,69,887 voters, including 40,33,992 male and 39,35,044 female, are eligible to exercise their franchise at 9,162 polling stations.

Of the total electorate, nearly 24 per cent are aged below 30 years, he said, adding there were 975 women for every 1,000 men.

Out of the 9,162, 1,541 are model polling stations, while 1,041 will be managed by all-woman personnel while 25 will be run by PwD officials.

Nearly 20 per cent of the 9,162 polling stations have been identified as critical, including those in Maoist-hit areas, he said.

A total of 265 MLA and 40 MP aspirants are in the fray, the CEO said, adding the EC has appointed 10 general observers, 15 expenditure observers and three police observers for this phase of the polls.

In 2019, Bargarh LS seat recorded 77.87 per cent turnout,

followed by Sundargarh (71.67), Bolangir (74.75), Kandhamal (72.90) and Aska (65.53), he said.

“With the IMD predicting heat-wave conditions May 20, adequate drinking water, ORS and essential medicines will be made available at each polling station. This apart, paramedics, ASHAs, ambulances and mobile health units will also be deployed,” he said.

An air ambulance will be kept on standby at Bolangir for exigencies. For any security-related emergency, one Indian Air Force helicopter will also be kept on standby, Dhal said.

The EC has so far seized cash, liquor, drugs and valuable materials worth ₹254 crore across Odisha during the polls, he added.

In the first phase of the election in Odisha, polling was held in four LS and 28 Assembly seats May 13 registering 75.68 per cent

turnout which sealed the fate of 243 Assembly candidates and 37 LS candidates.

The last day of electioneering saw candidates of all the major political parties and their leaders organising marathon election meetings, holding road-

shows and launching a door-to-door campaign to woo the voters.

Among the prominent candidates in the second phase of polls are BJD president and Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik, and his colleagues in the state govern-

ment Bikram Keshari Arukha, Niranjan Pujari, PK Amat, Tukuni Sahu and Rita Sahu.

Former Union minister and Sundargarh's sitting MP Jual Oram, former Indian hockey captain Dilip Tirkey, former Union minister and hotelier Dilip Ray, and BJP's four-time Lok Sabha MP Sangeeta Singh Deo are also in the fray in this round of elections.

102 companies of Central forces

Incidents of violence have been reported from Ganjam and Bolangir districts ahead of voting. Chief Electoral Officer Nikunja Bihari Dhal said that the highest of 22 companies of central forces would be deployed in Maoist-affected Kandhamal district, followed by Ganjam (20), Sundargarh (16), 14 each in Bargarh and Bolangir, five each in Jharsuguda and Boudh, four in Sonepur and two in Nayagarh.

One company of CAPF comprises around 100 personnel. So, 102 companies would amount to 10,200 personnel.

On pre-poll violence in Khallikote area of Ganjam district, where one BJP worker was killed, the CEO said, “It is a matter of concern. The police have registered a case and arrested some accused persons. They have launched a manhunt to nab the remaining accused.”

“The EC has taken a serious note of the violence and sought a report from the DGP, who has submitted it. I had called for a meeting with representatives of all the recognised political parties and informed them about the concern expressed by the EC, which has zero tolerance towards violence,” he said.

An additional DGP-rank officer has been deployed to look after the law and order situation in Aska Lok Sabha seat, under which Khallikote falls.

Don't use calcium carbide for fruit ripening: FSSAI

New Delhi, May 18: Food regulator FSSAI has asked traders and food business operators not to use the banned product 'calcium carbide' for ripening of fruits.

In an official statement, the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) said it has alerted traders/fruits handlers/ Food Business Operators (FBOs) operating ripening chambers to strictly ensure compliance with the prohibition on calcium carbide for artificial ripening of fruits, particularly during the mango season.

FSSAI has also advised Food Safety Departments of states and UTs to remain vigilant and take serious action and deal stringently against person(s) indulging in such unlawful practices as per the provisions of the FSS Act, 2006, and rules/regulations made thereunder.

“Calcium carbide, commonly used for ripening fruits like mangoes, releases acetylene gas which contains harmful traces of arsenic and phosphorus. These substances, also known as ‘masala’, can cause serious health issues such as dizziness, frequent thirst, irritation, weakness, difficulty in swallowing, vomiting and skin ulcers,” FSSAI said.

Additionally, acetylene gas is equally hazardous to those handling it. “There are chances that calcium carbide may come in direct contact with fruits during

application and leave residues of arsenic and phosphorus on fruits,” the regulator said.

Due to these dangers, the use of calcium carbide for ripening fruits has been banned under the Regulation of the Food Safety and Standards (Prohibition and Restrictions on Sales) Regulations, 2011.

This regulation explicitly states, “No person shall sell or offer or expose for sale or have in his premises for the purpose of sale under any description, fruits which have been artificially ripened by use of acetylene gas, commonly known as carbide gas.”

Considering the issue of rampant use of banned calcium carbide, FSSAI has permitted the use of ethylene gas as a safer alternative for fruit ripening in India

Ethylene gas can be used at concentrations up to 100 ppm, depending upon the crop, variety and maturity.

Ethylene, a naturally occurring hormone in fruits, regulates the ripening process by initiating and controlling a series of chemical and biochemical activities.

The treatment of unripe fruits with ethylene gas triggers the natural ripening process until the fruit itself starts producing ethylene in substantial quantities.

Further, the Central Insecticides Board and Registration Committee (CIB and RC) approved Ethephon 39 per cent SL for the uniform ripening of mangoes and other fruits.

Depression over Bay May 24: IMD

Bhubaneswar, May 18: A low-pressure area is likely to form over the southwest Bay of Bengal (BoB) around May 22 which will move initially northeastwards and concentrate into a depression over central parts of the BoB May 24, IMD said.

It said Friday's trough runs from south Chhattisgarh to the Comorin area and now runs from south Chhattisgarh to south interior Karnataka across Telangana and Rayalaseema at 3.1km above mean sea level.

Light to moderate rain or thundershower is likely to occur at a few places over the districts of south Odisha and one or two places over the districts of north Odisha in the next 24 hours, it said.

The IMD further said the maximum temperature is likely to gradually rise by 2-4 degrees Celsius in subsequent four to five days at many places over the districts of Odisha.

Meanwhile, light to moderate rainfall has occurred at a few places over the districts of south interior Odisha, at one or two



places over south coastal Odisha and north interior Odisha. At the same time, dry weather prevailed over the rest districts.

Maximum temperatures observed marked fall at one or two places over the districts of north interior Odisha, appreciable fall at a few places over the districts of north interior Odisha, and at one or two places over the districts of south interior Odisha.

There will be no large change elsewhere over the districts of Odisha. They were markedly below normal at a few places over the districts of interior Odisha.

The highest maximum temperature of 40.1 degrees Celsius was recorded at Chandbali and

the lowest minimum temperature of 21.4 degrees Celsius was recorded at Nuapada in the plains of Odisha.

The weatherman predicted that thunderstorms with lightning accompanied by gusty surface wind speed reaching 40-50 kmph are very likely to occur at one or two places over the districts of Koraput, Malkangiri, Kandhamal, Nabarangpur, Nuapada, Kalahandi, Rayagada, Gajapati, Ganjam, Puri and Bolangir.

Heavy Rainfall is very likely to occur in one or two places over the districts of Koraput, Kalahandi, Kandhamal, Nuapada.

Thunderstorm with lightning accompanied by gusty surface wind speed reaching 30-40 kmph is very likely to occur at one or two places over the districts of Nayagarh, Cuttack, Khurda, Jagatsinghpur and Kendrapara.

However, hot and humid weather conditions are very likely to prevail at one or two places over the districts of Balasore, Bhadrak, Jajpur, Kendrapara and Cuttack, the IMD said.

Man convicted in fake currency case

Bhubaneswar, May 18: A local court in Titlagarh Saturday convicted a man in a fake currency case of 2023.

Convict Lingaraj Behera was sentenced to undergo rigorous imprisonment (RI) for five years for the offence under Section 489B of the IPC and three years imprisonment for the offence under Section 489C of the IPC.

Both punishments will run concurrently, the Assistant Sessions Court ordered.

According to the prosecution, a raid was conducted near Titlagarh bus stand February 1, 2023 when Behera, along with his associate Dharmu Rana, was nabbed dealing in fake currency notes after procuring the same from Jharkhand and Bihar.

While Behera was apprehended, Rana managed to escape.

During search, one printed

bag containing Fake Indian Currency Notes (FICNs) of ₹31,27,500 were recovered from the possession of Behera. After successful investigation, a chargesheet was submitted against the two under Sections 489A, 489B, 489C and 120B of the IPC.

During the trial, the prosecution examined nine witnesses and exhibited 21 documents.

The seized FICNs were sent to Bharatiya Reserve Bank Note Mudran (P) Ltd in West Bengal for chemical examination and opinion.

After examination it was confirmed that these are counterfeit notes.

Notably, STF is the specialised wing of Odisha Police to curb the organised crime in the state. FICN is also one of the focus areas of STF and it will continue its drive against such criminals.

STF sources said a non-bailable warrant has been obtained against Rana who is on the run.

CID-CB's advisory on online investment fraud

THE FRAUDSTERS, THE CRIME BRANCH OF ODISHA POLICE SAID, OPERATE BY FIRST INDUCING INDIVIDUALS TO JOIN WHATSAPP AND TELEGRAM GROUPS PROMISING HIGH RETURNS ON INVESTMENTS IN A SHORT DURATION

Bhubaneswar, May 18: The CID-Crime Branch (CID-CB) of Odisha Police has issued an important advisory to protect citizens from falling prey to the rampant rise in online investment fraud cases in the state.

In a release issued here Saturday, the CID-CB said there has been a steep and concerning rise in cases of fraud through on-line investment apps, WhatsApp group links and Telegram group links. Many people, it said, have lost money by investing in such fake online schemes.

The fraudsters lure people with promises of high returns in a short time through investments in stock markets, shares, mutual funds and IPO allotments. However, most of these investors have lost their hard-



earned savings, the advisory said, adding that by exploiting the trust and greed of these people, online investment fraudsters have caused them devastating financial losses.

In 2023, a total of 22 investment fraud cases were registered by the CID-CB Cyber Crime Police Station, involving nearly ₹8.5 crore in fraudulent amounts. Alarminglly, within just four months of 2024, a total of 25 more cases have been registered, with fraud amounts totaling approximately ₹17 crore.

Though the Cyber Crime Wing of CID-CB has managed to arrest many of the criminals in the registered cases, only a small amount of money could be recovered compared to the losses incurred by victims, as the money has already been used by these criminals or, in some cases, siphoned off outside the country.

The fraudsters, the Crime Branch of Odisha Police said, op-

erate by first inducing individuals to join WhatsApp and Telegram groups promising high returns on investments in a short duration. These groups are populated by their gang members, who make innocent people believe they have profited from the suggested investments.

The fraudsters claim that the investments are made into SEBI-registered and verified companies using genuine photographs of industrialists or bankers to gain the victim's confidence. However, the investment platforms recommended are fraudulent, designed to display fake returns and wallet money, the CB said.

When the victims attempt to withdraw their funds, they are compelled to deposit more amounts for withdrawal, further pushing them into a cycle of fraud and financial losses.

The CID-CB said the accounts utilised by the fraudsters are often mule or hired, and the

funds received from victims are often converted into USD, then into bitcoins, and ultimately withdrawn at various locations outside the country, including Dubai, China, and Hong Kong. WhatsApp and Telegram channels used in these activities are often operated from locations such as Cambodia and Hong Kong.

It urged the public to exercise extreme caution when engaging in online investment activities and to carefully verify the authenticity of entities offering financial services.

In recent years, there has been a concerning increase in cases of investment fraud, with perpetrators often utilising WhatsApp or Telegram groups to carry out their scams. These groups often promise unrealistic returns and encourage individuals to deposit money into suggested accounts.

The CID-CB has appealed to citizens to spread the word among their family and friends, especially older people who might be lured by fraudsters into investing their hard-earned money and lifetime savings into such fake online investment groups.

The advisory said if citizens come across any suspicious online activities or become victims of cyber-related crimes, they should report such incidents promptly to the 1930 toll-free call center.

Cash worth ₹8L seized

They showed people they were

fighting the elections to oust the Naveen Patnaik-led BJD government in Odisha.

The five leaders came down heavily on the BJD government and accused it of pushing the state's development 50 years back.

After the roadshows, the senior BJP leaders held discussions and chalked out strategies with party leaders, candidates and

workers on how to win both the Balasore and Kendrapara Lok Sabha seats, besides winning in all the Assembly seats under their jurisdictions.

"We hope that the party will perform very well in the ongoing elections. The roadshow was held to encourage our workers and leaders before the June 1 polls to be held in Balasore and Kendrapara," said Samal.

India lost over 5 million farmland trees in five years

More than 50 lakh large farmland trees vanished between 2018 and 2022 in India, partly due to altered cultivation practices, revealing a 'concerning trajectory', new research published in the journal Nature Sustainability has found.

Researchers said that "an observable trend was emerging" wherein agroforestry systems are being replaced with paddy rice fields, even as a certain loss rate could be found to be natural.

Large and mature trees within these agroforestry fields are removed, and trees are now being cultivated within separate block plantations typically with lower ecological value, they said.

Block plantations, usually involving fewer species of trees, were found to have increased in numbers which some villagers from Telangana, Haryana, Maharashtra and other states confirmed via interviews.

The team, including researchers from the University of Copenhagen, Denmark, explained that the decision to remove trees is often driven by perceived low benefits of the trees, coupled with concerns that their shading effect, including that of Neem trees, may adversely affect crop yields.

Boosting crop yields also contributed to the expansion of paddy rice fields, further facilitated by water supply which was augmented by the establishment of new boreholes, the



authors said.

"This finding is particularly unsettling given the current emphasis on agroforestry as an essential natural climate solution, playing a crucial role in both climate change adaptation and mitigation strategies, as

well as for livelihoods and biodiversity," the authors wrote.

Agroforestry trees are a vital part of India's landscapes as they generate socio-ecological benefits, along with being a natural climate solution owing to their ability to absorb carbon

dioxide from the air.

However, despite their importance, the lack of robust monitoring mechanisms has contributed to an insufficient grasp of their distribution in relation to management practices, as well as their vulnerability to climate change and diseases, the researchers said.

For the study, the team used AI-based deep learning models for detecting individual non-forest trees for each year. By tracking the tree crown over the years, they then analysed the changes. Crowns of multiple trees together form a canopy. The researchers mapped about 60 crore farmland trees, excluding block plantations, and tracked them over the past decade.

They found that around 11 per cent of the large trees, each having a crown size of 96 square metres and mapped in 2010/2011, had disappeared by 2018.

"Moreover, during the period 2018-2022, more than 5 million large farmland trees (about 67 square metres crown size) have vanished, due partly to altered cultivation practices, where trees within fields are perceived as detrimental to crop yields," the authors wrote.

The researchers clarified that while the findings may appear to contradict official reports and studies showing that tree cover has increased in recent years, they reported only gross losses and did not look at tree gains as a separate class.

Elections end, migration starts in Rayagada district

Rayagada, May 18: There seems to be no let-up in migration from Rayagada as labourers from the district have again started migrating to their work places in other states to earn a livelihood after the first phase polling in the district ended, May 13.

According to reports, Rayagada district has turned into a hub for trafficking of thousands of labourers due to lack of work opportunities in the district.

Poverty is stated to be the main reason behind their migration. Middlemen taking advantage of their helplessness lure them with work and help them move to other states. However, these migrant workers are often subjected to harassment, violence, and discrimination during their stay at their destinations which force them to return home impoverished.

And also, once they reached their workplace, it becomes difficult for them to keep contact with their families while many go missing or die an untimely death during work due to lack of food or disease. This pushes them into uncertainties as they do not know when they will get an opportunity to return home.

The migrant labourers had come to their respective villages to cast their votes in on-going the elections. However, they have again started leaving for their

work places after culmination of the polls. People from various areas in the district were seen assembling at bus stands and railway stations for the last three days to board a bus or train to travel outside the state.

While some of them were seen getting into buses for Vizianagaram or Vishakhapatnam in Andhra Pradesh, some others were found boarding trains to Tamil Nadu. Some others were seen catching trains for Gujarat, Kerala, Karnataka, or some other states.

People are migrating to other states for work despite the presence of over 3,000 small, medium and large scale industries operating in the state. Absence of work opportunities in these industries is stated to be another reason behind the large scale migration.

Sources said that these migrant labourers had come home before the election and casted votes to the candidates in the election held, May 13. However, in between all these brouhaha, none of the political parties or candidates spared a thought to stop their migration or promised to provide employment opportunities to these poor labourers.

As a result, the migrant labourers, including minors, have again started packing back for their work places in distant lands after elections.

Reports said that out of the 11 blocks in the district, Kalyansinghpur, Kashipur, Chandrapur and Gudari are account for the maximum migrations in the district. The migrant labourers belong to all age-groups including adult, minor boys and minor girls too.

Sources said that eight youths from Kantamal and Surugunja villages under Kashipur block left for work to Chalakudi town in Kerala. They were found waiting at Rayagada railway station to board a train for Vizianagaram where they will again board a train to Chalakudi in Kerala.

Many inhabitants from Talajhiri, Banteji, Sarambai, Mandijhola, Routghati, Badamagur, Taladeska, Keshkeri, Chandagiri, Sindurghati, Chiliguda, Kantamal, Adatakiri, Baharduluki, Bhitarduluki, Padamajhi, Bariguda, Bhramarjhari, Siadimala and other villages under Kashipur block are now working as migrant labourers in Karnataka and Kerala.

Similarly, several residents of Belamguda, Jarpa, Bandiri, Katisur, Gendabaju, Khilundi, Raibiji, Guchhujaba in Chandrapur block and Polama, Siripur, Bhalumaska, Serigumma, Phulaguda, Lakshmi Nagar, Talasaja, Bijaynagar villages in Kalyansinghpur block are now working in Gujarat, Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Telangana and Andhra Pradesh.

When contacted, District Labour Officer Jasmine Sahu said that the Panchayatiraj department has been asked to keep details of the migrant labourers. "Funds have been allocated for this purpose, but there is no rule to stop people from migrating," she added.

The deceased was identified as Kuntala Nayak, 55, wife of Banshidhar Nayak in the village. On being informed, police arrested a man and his son for the murder and launched a manhunt to nab the third accused. The accused were identified as Rabi Nayak and his son Mangulu Nayak in the village. Another of Rabi's son, Puria Nayak, who is also an accused in the case, is presently absconding.

The incident occurred when Banshidhar was putting up a fence around his house at around

5pm, Friday. In the meantime, Rabi reached the spot and picked up a fight with the couple. His son Mangulu and Puria also joined him and allegedly thrashed the couple. The panic-stricken couple fled from their house and took shelter in another person's house in the village, leaving the door opened.

Later at night, the couple came to put a lock on the door when Rabi and his two sons allegedly hit Kuntala on the head with a stick. She died on the spot due to excessive bleeding. On being informed, Dhenkikote beat house police rushed to the spot, recovered the body and sent it for post-mortem. Ghatagaon SDPO Prabhat Tripathy also visited the crime scene. During investigation, police nabbed Mangulu from Dhenkikote market and his father from his residence.

Fisherman electrocuted

A fisherman died after he reportedly got electrocuted while making a country made boat at Pathara Jetty on the shores of Chilika lake, under this police limits, in Ganjam district Friday evening, police said Saturday. The deceased fisherman has been identified as Dhruva Tahal, 35, a resident of Kandarpapada village under Khallikote police station limits. According to sources, while making a boat near Pathara jetty on the shores of Chilika lake Friday evening, Dhruva got electrocuted. He was rescued in an unconscious state and rushed to the Khallikote community health centre where doctors declared him dead. On being informed, as per the instructions of Bheiput police outpost in charge, Debasish Mishra, sub-inspector Bhakta Charan Mukhi reached the hospital Saturday morning. He took custody of the body and sent it to MKCG Medical College and Hospital at Berhampur for post-mortem. A case of unnatural death (No- 12/24) has been registered at Khallikote police station in this regard.

Rourkela, May 18: At a tender age of 12 he is competing with people much elder to him in an arduous game like mountain terrain biking, and winning too.

Meet Tanush Kohli, 12, a Standard VI student of the Delhi Public School (DPS) here, who made the sport a passion ever since he turned eight when he first rode a cycle. "It just happened accidentally. We bought a small learner's cycle for him with stays on either side, like every family does for their children of that age. Little did we know that it was the beginning of his tryst with cycling before he graduated to much tougher Mountain Terrain Bikes (MTBs)," said Tanush's father Akhil Kohli, an



industrialist.

Tanush, who is at present in New Delhi, recently participated in one of the challenging MTB cycling competitions of the country, Firefox MTB Shimla. "It consists of a 120 km stretch ride passing through the treacherous terrains of Himalayas. Tanush completed the path in two days time," said Akhil. The participants, who age between

10 and 50 years, had to complete 70 km on the first day, while the remaining 50 km was to be covered on the second day, he said.

"But many seasoned and older cyclists left the race half way through as the ride is very taxing. However, my son remained struck and completed the race without any problem. He was tired, but enjoyed the challenge," Akhil said. And on completing the race, Tanush received the 'finisher medal' from the organisers, he said.

Prior to that, Tanush had participated in various cycling events and competitions in Odisha and Bengaluru. "He won several prizes in Bengaluru. He is also participating in the 50 km category in Odisha," informed the boy's father; Usually, Tanush begins his day

at 4.30 am. "We follow him in a car as he takes at least three laps on the Ring Road in Rourkela," Akhil said of Tanush's daily practice regime. The outer Ring Road spans a distance of 21 km. He is also guided by famous cyclist Sushil Das of RSP who is presently a coach. "He gets regular coaching from Sushil sir who keeps a close eye on him," said Akhil.

Sushil said, "I must say Tanush is one of the brightest promises in long distance cycling in the country. I am associated with him, and I am really surprised at his dedication and diligence."

Tanush is also good at his studies. "His studies are not affected by cycling. He manages to do well in his exams and secures more than 80 per cent marks", informed Akhil.

Whither Human Rights

On 13 May this year, a headline was published which read: “UN-linked body defers NHRC-India accreditation for second year in a row.” Beneath this was the line “The decision could now affect India’s ability to vote at the Human Rights Council and some UNGA bodies.”

NHRC stands for the National Human Rights Commission and this column is about why its accreditation was deferred. Last year, on 9 March, a group of non-governmental organisations (including mine) wrote to the Global Alliance of National Human Rights Institutions (GANHRI), the UN-linked body. We told it to review India’s accreditation status because the NHRC’s lack of independence, pluralism, diversity, and accountability were contrary to United Nations principles on national institutions (called ‘The Paris Principles’).

Taking cognisance of our letter and other civil society submissions, the global body deferred NHRC’s re-accreditation by 12 months after considering its failure to effectively discharge its mandates to respond to the escalating human rights violations in India. NHRC was also told to improve its processes and functions, but a year later this had not happened. This is what led to the second deferral of accreditation.

So what were the things contrary to the Paris Principles? First was a lack of independence. Both in the appointing of the NHRC’s functionaries and its functioning. The chairperson and other members of the NHRC are appointed by the President based on the recommendation of a committee consisting of the Prime Minister; the Speaker of the Lok Sabha, Minister of Home Affairs, Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha, and the Deputy Chairperson of the Rajya Sabha. However, since 2019 the post of the Opposition leader in the Lok Sabha has been vacant, leaving only a single Opposition voice in the selection committee.

After his retirement from the Supreme Court, Arun Mishra was made as chair on 31 May, 2021, despite strong disagreement by the lone Opposition voice in the selection committee. The second problem was that the NHRC has police officers investigate rights violations by the State including by the police. This is a conflict of interest, not independence from government interference. Despite this being pointed out in the 2023 review, the Modi government did not begin a legislative process to correct it or invite a consultation to begin it.

In November 2023, seven former IPS officers were appointed by the NHRC as special monitors. One of them, accused of corruption in 2018 while working as Special Director of CBI, India’s federal investigation agency, was given the responsibility to oversee the thematic areas of terrorism, counterinsurgency, communal riots and violence. A former director of the national Intelligence Bureau was made a member of the commission.

India has been repeatedly told of concerns about the lack of diversity in the NHRC, and asked to have a “pluralistic balance in its composition and staff” by ensuring the representation of a diverse Indian society including, but not limited to religious or ethnic minorities. This of course was not done in this country where the prime minister rants against minorities constantly including in his elections speeches.

Yet another issue was NHRC’s lack of effective engagement with civil society and human rights defenders in India. Towards this end the NHRC was asked to interpret its mandate in a “broad and purposive manner to promote a progressive definition of human rights” and told to address all human rights violations and ensure consistent follow up with State authorities. This may surprise those who have bought this government’s framing of the matter where all those who oppose its violence are ‘anti-nationals’. However, that is not how the world views it and proper democracies must engage with civil society.

In India, human rights defenders languish in detention for years without trial under various draconian laws including UAPA, with not a squeal from the NHRC. This includes those detained in connection with the Bhima Koregaon-Elgar Parishad case for more than five years; Kashmiri human rights defender Khurram Parvez who has been in detention since November 2021; and Umar Khalid. The NHRC has not taken any concrete steps to respond to the situation of the HRDs or intervene in a timely manner despite various UN special rapporteurs calling on Indian authorities to release these individuals. The NHRC has been next to useless on the issue of Manipur, Jammu and Kashmir, communal violence in Haryana and Uttarakhand and other ones that made the headlines. It has not covered itself in glory and the predicament it and the government find itself in is of their own making.

India holds an A rating currently and deferral of reaccreditation means its A rating is under threat. That further means that the NHRC stands to lose its voting position in the United Nations Human Rights Council and other bodies. This can only be corrected by doing the right thing, which nobody is stopping the government from doing.

All of us, including the signatories to that letter, want to see India accredited at the highest level on the global body. However, such an accreditation should be an honest one, reflective of a strong and independent human rights body in India committed in particular to responding to the rights violations by the State. It should not be an automatic right given to the self-appointed mother of democracy.

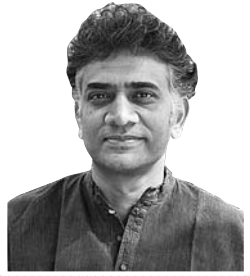

THE BJP MAKING AN EFFORT TO ENTER SOUTH INDIA RECENTLY TIED UP WITH TDP BREAKING ITS EARLIER UNWRITTEN ALLIANCE WITH YSRCP

Now that the votes have been cast there is a lot of speculation about the results in the first week of June from the two Telugu speaking states of Telangana and Andhra Pradesh. Will the BJP move beyond a few urban parts of Telangana or will the Congress keep its new stronghold? How far will Chandrababu Naidu, now in alliance with the BJP, get with Jagan Reddy’s YSRCP, the BJP’s former ally? The questions surround the fate of 17 Lok Sabha seats in Telangana and 25 in Andhra after old alliances have made way for newly forged ties in a battleground that Jagan Reddy has described as his “Kurukshetra.” The YSRCP is contesting all 25 Lok Sabha seats and is also battling to retain Andhra where Assembly elections were simultaneously held.

The state was bifurcated in 2014 to form Telangana and Andhra Pradesh. For the last ten years the TRS under K Chandrasekhar Rao (KCR) has ruled Telangana. Originally an important member of the Telugu Desam Party (TDP) led by Chandrababu Naidu, KCR rebelled because of his career not advancing rapidly and propagated the Telangana cause. The demand for Telangana has been around since the early 70s. Prime Minister Indira Gandhi had doused the fire by making a Telangana man the chief minister of the undivided state of Andhra Pradesh. This was none other than PV Narasimha Rao who two decades later became the Prime Minister. But the old demand came up once again in 1990s as locals were troubled by NT Rama Rao’s ideas of ‘Andhrification’. This meant the import of Andhra culture into Telangana areas. The two areas were different in food habits and local cultures and even how they spoke Telugu.

KCR’s plan for Telangana was successful because he was supported by the Congress, then the principal Opposition in the state. The Congress allowed the creation of the new state and tied up with TRS under KCR to consol-

idate their political position against Chandrababu Naidu who was part of the BJP-led NDA. But KCR even as he made of a show of aligning with the Congress ditched the party in the elections that followed the creation of Telangana in 2014. Incidentally KCR had successfully lobbied with the public to show he was the sole creator of Telangana and champion of its cause as he had fought hard for this including a fast unto death. He took advantage of the sentiment, winning 63 seats of the total 119 seats. The Congress came a poor second with 21 seats. He won again in 2019.

Once in power, KCR converted the Telangana government into his personal fiefdom ruling the state with son KT Rama Rao and nephew Harish Rao as important ministers. His daughter K Kavita became an MP and played a key role. Many of his ministers and important leaders were from his own Velama caste. A prosperous caste, the Velamas are not numerous. Even Velama businessmen were promoted. In his battle for Telangana, large sections of civil society had supported KCR. But once in power KCR cut himself off from these sections, losing his support base without realising it.

The new state required huge resources. How would Telangana get this? His son KT Rama Rao came up with the plan to intensify the commercialisation of Hyderabad. He stated so in 2014 when asked how he would find

resources for the newly created state. “We will expand Hyderabad so much that it – in a way – covers the entire state,” he said. This expansion plan was initiated by predecessor N Chandrababu Naidu who had created the Hi-tech City and a global scale airport and brought in new investments in the education and IT sectors. The KCR regime went ahead with fancier real estate, buildings and a financial district coming up. All this led to land prices going up and brought in new investors from Bangalore and Mumbai among other places. A new metro rail by L&T covering large parts of the city was also initiated. Visitors from other metro cities were highly impressed. All this increased the revenues of the government which was spent in creating more roads, dams and irrigation works. But the government failed to keep effective control on the work of contractors. As a result, shoddy roads and irrigation led to public angst which could show up in the election results.

Andhra had been a bastion of Congress from the beginning. So much so that when ousted from the north just after the Emergency, the party maintained its position in Andhra. But the bifurcation demolished the Congress. The party drew a blank and many sitting Union ministers lost the election. Chandrababu Naidu who was earlier chief minister of united Andhra won the election. New Andhra had no capital and ear-

lier people migrated to Hyderabad. Now Chandrababu Naidu zeroed in on a green field area, Amaravati, to establish his capital. Amaravati, on the banks of the river Krishna, has fertile land. Naidu was adamant on it against all arguments. The area was under the control of rich Kammas (Naidu’s caste) who had migrated to the US and wanted to divest from it. Naidu’s plan was to establish the new capital to attract investments from Singapore and Japan. Amaravati was a traditional Buddhist centre, so countries like Japan, Thailand would be attracted, Naidu has argued. But Jagan Reddy always opposed this believing Amaravati was chosen to further Kamma business interests. The Kammas are a rival caste of the Reddys and the two groups are deeply opposed to each other. Jagan Reddy, son of the late Congress CM of integrated Andhra YS Rajasekhara Reddy, fell out with the Congress after the demise of his father.

In the 2019 elections Jagan Reddy’s party swept the polls capturing a whopping 151 of 175 seats. He planned to move the capital to a far more developed city Visakhapatnam and announced it as his new headquarters. But with Assembly and High Court buildings ready in Amaravati, the move can only be partial. Andhra is caught in this position and people hope that after the results are announced, the state can move forward with the capital finalised. Jagan Reddy is hoping his policy of giving free or cheap grants to the people will help him sweep the polls. The BJP making an effort to enter south India recently tied up with TDP breaking its earlier unwritten alliance with YSRCP. As they race to the finishing line in Telangana and Andhra, hopes are high. YSRCP wants to keep its space, Congress which won the recent Assembly elections in Telangana wants a greater share, while the BJP is hoping to make a dent.

Sir, This refers to “Climate change affecting 85% of Indians: Survey,” **Orissa POST**, May 18. Home to over 1.4 billion people, India has the highest population in the world. India is also one of the fastest growing economies, but since it’s still considered to be industrialising, India’s exceptional development risks propelling global greenhouse gas emissions even higher. However, it’s not enough for India alone to take action. The actions of the Global North will play a role too. According to the International Energy Agency (IEA) India will need support from the Global North to the tune of \$1.4 trillion worth of investment. This is the only way India can realistically align its energy sector with global climate change targets.

LS polls: Sixth schedule, jobs key issues in Ladakh

Buddhist-dominated Leh and Shia Muslim-majority Kargil have come together over four demands -- safeguards under the Sixth Schedule of the Constitution, statehood, reservation in jobs for locals and a separate public service commission and two Lok Sabha seats for the region

Leh/Kargil, May 18: As Ladakh votes to elect its MP for the first time since the abrogation of Article 370 of the Constitution, safeguards under the sixth schedule, statehood and employment are the key issues in the two distant districts of the constituency that is the largest in the country in terms of area.

Spread over more than 59,000 square kilometres -- around 40 times the size of Delhi -- the two districts of Leh and Kargil are divided by geography and religion. Buddhist-dominated Leh and Shia Muslim-majority Kargil have come together over four demands -- safeguards under the sixth schedule of the Constitution, statehood, reservation in jobs for locals and a separate public service commission and two Lok Sabha seats for the region.

After the abrogation of Article 370, Ladakh, which shares its border with both Pakistan and China, was carved out as a Union Territory without legislature. While Leh welcomed the move initially, people in Kargil were unhappy about the split. However, soon the concerns over safeguards for land and jobs took



over, and protests erupted.

Padma Stanzin, a student leader from Leh, said employment is a major concern as not a single recruitment on a gazetted post has taken place since 2019.

"We were assured of better employment opportunities but that has failed. Some government recruitment has taken place, but all for class-4 posts," Stanzin told PTI.

Similar concerns were raised by Nordon, a young woman from Leh who stressed that the sixth schedule is not just a political demand but that of the people.

"More than 90 per cent of the population here is tribal. Jobs are a major concern as Ladakh has one of the highest rates of unemployment in the country," she said. "Any party that promises to fulfil our demands will get our support," Nordon said.

The two main political parties in Ladakh are the BJP, which has fielded Leh Autonomous

Hill Development Council Chairman Tashi Gyalson in the election, and the Congress, which has picked the Leader of Opposition in the council, Tsering Namgyal, as its candidate. The third candidate is Mohammad Haneefa Jan from Kargil, popularly known as Haji Haneefa, who is contesting the polls as an independent after quitting the National Conference.

In its manifesto, the Congress has promised safeguards under the sixth schedule, while Haneefa has mentioned all four demands.

The BJP's manifesto is silent on the sixth schedule and statehood, but Gyalson and other leaders of the party, during their campaign, have assured the locals that the talks will continue.

Locals say there is anger against the BJP for not keeping its word on the sixth schedule, which was promised in the run-up to the 2019 Lok Sabha polls as well as during the Leh hill council polls in 2020.

"We were assured safeguards, but nothing has happened so far. That is why we are demanding the sixth schedule so that our interests can be protected. For that a rally was held March 3 and then from March 6, Sonam Wangchuk sat on a fast," Stanzin said. A sit-in protest that started in Leh March 6 went on for 66 days and was suspended ahead of the election. Renowned educationist and social reformer Sonam Wangchuk had led the protest.

Mehdi Shah from Turtuk, one of the remotest villages of India,

says there is fear over losing the cultural identity as well as damage to the environment.

"There is a fear of losing our cultural identity and the fragile ecosystem being damaged if rampant development takes place. That is why the demand for the sixth schedule has become the main issue in this election," he said.

Haji Riyaz Ahmed, a septuagenarian who runs a shop in the Leh market, agrees that employment and livelihood are a major concern.

"Earlier, one could get a job after graduation. Now, even with a PhD, people are unable to get jobs. The employment that comes in the tourist season is temporary. Even in this market, there are only a few shops that belong to Ladakhis," he said.

He stressed that the focus should be on promoting cottage industry centred around local products like apricots, Leh berry and Pashmina. He also countered the Leh versus Kargil narrative and said the voters are focused on their demands for preserving their culture and environment.

More than 200 kilometres away in Kargil, people voice similar concerns. While they say the Union Territory status was the demand of Leh, the four-point demand is now the key issue.

Haji Mohammad Qasim says Article 370 is not an issue for them, but they want someone from Kargil to represent them this time. "Article 370 is not an issue. This time people want someone from Kargil to represent the constituency. Had the Congress fielded someone from here, we would have supported him. Now, we have an independent candidate and we are united in backing him," he said.

Fayaz Hojazi said employment and education opportunities are the main concern, along with the sixth schedule and statehood.

Rousing welcome to Omar in Hizbul chief's village

Soibugh, May 18: Former Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah received a rousing reception on Saturday from a large number of women when he reached this central Kashmir village, once a hotbed of militancy, on the last day of campaign for the fifth phase of Lok Sabha polls.

The women at the ancestral village of Syed Salahuddin, the Pakistan-based supreme commander of proscribed terror outfit Hizbul Mujahideen, welcomed him with traditional 'Wanwun' (folk songs) to express their love for their leader, who is the National Conference (NC) candidate from the Baramulla constituency.

The cavalcade of the NC vice president was showered with candies and flower petals by the enthusiastic supporters as he moved through the village in the Budgam district.

Seeking people's support, Abdullah said he will visit villages and interact with them to hear their issues sometime after the conclusion of the ongoing general elections.

He was on a roadshow on the last day of campaigning in the

Beerwah assembly segment which he won in the 2014 state elections.

The Baramulla parliamentary constituency is going to polls in the fifth phase May 20. The campaign for this phase of polls ended Saturday evening.

Besides Abdullah, there are 21 other candidates in the fray including former separatist Sajad Lone, who later became a minister; former MLA Sheikh Abdul Rashid alias 'Engineer Rashid', who is currently lodged in the Tihar jail, and the PDP's former Rajya Sabha member Fayaz Ahmad Mir.

As one of its residents emerged as the most wanted terrorist commander, the scene at the Soibugh village was altogether a different.

With the eruption of terrorism in the Valley in early 1990s and one of its residents emerging as the most wanted terrorist commander, the scene at the Soibugh village in previous elections was totally different than what is being seen in the 2024 polls.

Its residents, including men, women and children, danced on the road with the NC flags to welcome Abdullah, and raised slogans in his praise.

With tiger on prowl, 36 villages put on alert

Bhopal, May 18: Forest authorities have sounded a red alert for 36 villages in Madhya Pradesh's Raisen district as a tiger is on the prowl after killing a 62-year-old man in the region close to the capital Bhopal, an official said Saturday.

The half-eaten body of the victim, Maniram Jatav, a resident of Neemkheda village, was found on Wednesday in the east range of the Raisen forest division, about 35 km from Bhopal district headquarters, the official said.

The big cat was seen moving around and changing its location frequently, he said.

The attack has caused panic among villages as such killings are unheard of in the forested areas around Bhopal.

"We are monitoring the movements of the big cat. A red alert was sounded Friday for 36 villages spread over 150 sq km. People have been asked not to venture into the forests till the animal is captured and the forest department intimates them," Raisen divisional forest officer (DFO) Vijay Kumar told PTI.

The red alert is issued when there is a threat to human life by a wild animal, he said.

At least 100 people, including forest officials and volunteers from the NGOs, Wildlife Conservation Trust and Tinsa Foundation, are monitoring the tiger's locations, he said.

There are 100 cameras installed in the area. Teams on foot and in vehicles and people

in a control room are analysing the footage to figure out the tiger's next move, the DFO said.

Tiger sightings were not new in the forests of the 36 villages, and such movements have been noticed in the region since 2017, he said.

"We believe the big cat entered the area from Mhow in Indore," he said.

Following the attack, residents of Neemkheda village are not stepping out of their houses alone or without a stick.

The DFO said a post-mortem confirmed that the deceased was killed by a tiger.

The victim had ventured into the forest to pluck tendu leaves used in beedis, he added.

Speaking on behalf of his wife, Pooja Jatav, who is the sarpanch of Neemkheda village, Purshottam Jatav said people in the area were not venturing out at night.

"About three months ago, a tiger killed some cattle in our village. We informed the forest officials and they promptly provided compensation," he said.

According to forest officials, the killer tiger might have ventured out of Ratapani Wildlife Sanctuary in the Obaidullahganj forest division of Raisen.

Ratpani was home to more than 60 big cats.

Since the Raisen district covers a large forest area, it is divided into the Raisen and Obaidullahganj forest divisions.

Madhya Pradesh has the highest number of 785 tigers in India, according to the latest official big cats count released last year.



300 rare weapons on display at BSF's Arms Museum in Indore

Indore, May 18: Have you seen a gun that looks like a stick from the outside but is capable of killing someone when its trigger is pulled and the bullet hits the target?

At least three such 'stick guns' are on display at the Arms Museum of the Central School of Armament and Warfare Skills (CSWT) of the Border Security Force (BSF) in Madhya Pradesh's Indore.

Set up in 1967 based on the vision of BSF Director General K F Rustomjee, the museum is home to 300 rare weapons, officials said Friday on the eve of International Museum Day, observed May 18.

The museum's collection, sourced from different places, includes big weapons such as rocket launchers and machine guns of various sizes to mini pistols that can fit into one's palm, they said.

Talking to PTI, CSWT Inspector General BS Rawat said the museum displays weapons from the 14th century to the later



periods. "The museum gives you a glimpse of weapons used by man since the beginning and how they gradually evolved by the first and second World Wars," he said.

Rawat said the facility had also housed the pistol that freedom fighter Bhagat Singh used to kill British officer JP Saunders on December 17, 1928, in Lahore.

The semi-automatic pistol, developed by US-based weapons manufacturer Colts, was sent to Punjab in 2017 fol-

lowing the directions of the Union Home Ministry and is currently on display at a museum at Hussainiwala in Ferozepur district.

A portrait of this pistol is at the arms museum in honour of the martyred freedom fighter, he said.

The senior officer further said personnel who train at CSWT are introduced to these weapons to learn the shortcomings of the indigenous and foreign weapons of various periods.

Focus on conservation of dwindling 'Noorjahan' mango trees

Indore, May 18: The authorities in Madhya Pradesh plan to renew efforts to multiply the number of rare 'Noorjahan' mango trees, which has shrunk to 10, in the Katthiwada area of Alirajpur district in the state, officials said.

Thought to be of Afghan origin, the Noorjahan mango variety is known for its big size, weighing between 3.5 kg and 4.5 kg. "Scientific efforts should be intensified for the conservation of Noorjahan in Alirajpur district's Katthiwada area," said Indore Division Commissioner (Revenue) Deepak Singh during a meeting of the Horticulture Department here.

Expressing concern over the dwindling number of the mango



trees, mostly confined to the Alirajpur district, he instructed the forest department to pre-

pare new saplings of Noorjahan with the help of tissue culture. "Merely 10 fruit-bearing trees

of Noorjahan mangoes are left. We have not given up. We are trying to multiply their num-

ber to 200 in the next five years by plantation. We will not let this species become extinct," said Dr R K Yadav, head of Krishi Vigyan Kendra, Alirajpur.

He added that a few decades ago, the maximum weight of a Noorjahan mango used to be up to 4.5 kilograms, which has now reduced to between 3.5 and 3.8 kg.

Mango grower Shivraj Singh Jadhav, who owns three Noorjahan trees, said the yield is low this time.

"My three trees brought forth just 20 mangoes. Unseasonal rains and storms came as a crop- per to the yield," said Jadhav.

He said his garden produced the heaviest "Noorjahan of 3.8 kg that fetched him ₹2,000" last year. The Noorjahan variety tree blooms in January and mangoes are up for sale in June when they turn ripe, Jadhav added.

New Delhi, May 18: Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's aide Bibhav Kumar was arrested Saturday in connection with the alleged assault on AAP MP Swati Maliwal, even as the party claimed she was 'blackmailed' by the BJP as she faces a corruption case.

Kumar was picked up from the Chief Minister's residence by a Delhi Police team, a senior police officer said, a day after Maliwal recorded her statement before a magistrate at the Tis Hazari court.

Maliwal has alleged that the CM's aide attacked her with full force, slapping her in the face and kicking her in the chest and abdomen May 13 when she had gone to meet the Chief Minister.

A senior police officer said Kumar was arrested from the Chief Minister's residence Saturday.

The officer said Kumar had gone there in the morning to meet Kejriwal.

"He will be produced before

a court and police will seek his custody for further interrogation," the officer said. Police said they have recorded the statement of at least 10 people, including security personnel and other staff at the Chief Minister's residence, who were present at the time of the alleged assault May 13.

Earlier in the day, Bibhav Kumar wrote to police, saying that he is ready to cooperate in their investigation, but they should also consider his complaint against Maliwal.

Kumar filed a police com-



plaint Friday alleging Maliwal breached the security of the CM's residence to gain unauthorised entry May 13 and created a ruckus there. The CM's aide also alleged that when he tried to stop her she hurled abuses at him.

Senior AAP leader Atishi addressed a press conference here in which she said if the Delhi Police is impartial, it should also register an FIR on Kumar's complaint. Talking to PTI Videos, Atishi claimed the former DCW chief faces arrest in an illegal recruitment case and she was "blackmailed" by the BJP to become part of a "conspiracy" against Kejriwal.

Atishi, who is also a cabinet minister in the Delhi government, alleged that Maliwal went to the Chief Minister's official residence Monday without an appointment.

Ch'garh: Man kills 5 of a family, hangs self

Raipur, May 18: A 32-year-old man allegedly murdered five members of a family including a married woman who had rejected his marriage proposal and her minor son before committing suicide in Chhattisgarh's Sarangarh-Bilaigarh district Saturday, police said.

The grisly incident took place in the wee hours at Thargoon village under Saliha police station limits, some 200 km from Raipur, district Superintendent of Police Pushkar Sharma told PTI.

Those killed were identified as Hemlal Sahu (55), his wife Jagmoti Sahu (50), their daughters Meera Sahu (30) and Mamta Sahu (35), and Meera's son Ayush (5).

Accused Manoj Sahu, a resident of the same village, was found hanging in another room, the official said.

After being alerted by locals, a police team rushed to the spot and sent the bodies for autopsy, the official said.

As per preliminary information, Manoj, armed with an axe, entered the house and killed the victims when they were asleep and then hanged himself with a saree, the SP said.

Manoj was a tailor by profession and had proposed marriage to Meera years ago but she had rejected the proposal, Sharma added. A case has been registered and further probe is underway, the SP said.

Terrorists kill former sarpanch in Shopian

Srinagar, May 18: Terrorists killed a former sarpanch in J&K's Shopian district Saturday besides injuring a non-local tourist couple in Anantnag district.

Officials said that terrorists fired at and injured a former sarpanch identified as Aijaz Ahmad Sheikh at Hurpura village in Shopian district Saturday evening.

"He was shifted to a hospital where he succumbed to his injuries. Terrorists also fired at a tourist couple from Jaipur identified as Tabriz and his wife Farha in the Yannar area of Anantnag district. The injured couple has been shifted to the hospital for treatment. The area has been cordoned off for searches," an official said in a statement.

Anantnag and Shopian are part of the Anantnag-Rajouri Lok Sabha constituency which is scheduled to go to polls May 25.

EC issues notices to BJP's West Bengal chief

New Delhi: The Election Commission Saturday issued two separate show-cause notices to West Bengal BJP chief Sukanta Majumdar for "misleading" advertisements targeting the state's ruling TMC. The poll watchdog has sought his response as to why the two advertisements should not be treated as violative of the model code of conduct and its advisory to political parties. Majumdar has been asked to respond by 5 pm May 21. According to the English transcript provided in the notices, one advertisement is titled "Trinamool is root cause of corruption" while the other is titled "Anti-Sanatan Trinamool". The Trinamool Congress (TMC) had approached the Election Commission against the advertisements.

Ch'garh: Naxalite carrying bounty killed in encounter

Sukma: A Naxalite, who was wanted in connection with 16 cases and carried a bounty of ₹1 lakh on his head, was killed in an encounter with the police in Chhattisgarh's Sukma district Saturday, an official said. The gunfight took place around 6.30 am in the forest near Banjarpara village under Polampalli police station limits, where a team of police personnel was out on an anti-Naxal operation, the official said. The operation was launched Friday night based on inputs about the presence of senior Naxalites, including the secretary of the Konta area committee of Maoists, Vetti Mangdu, and area command-in-chief Hitesh, along with 15-20 cadres in forests of Tolnai, Tetrai, Banjarpara, and Arlampalli villages, he said. The exchange of fire lasted for about 20 to 25 minutes, following which Naxalites escaped into the dense forest after security personnel started zeroing in on them, the official said.

No objection to action if Prajwal found guilty: Deve Gowda

Bangalore: Breaking his silence over the sexual abuse charges levelled against JDS MP Prajwal Revanna, party Supremo H D Deve Gowda Saturday said he has no objection to the action taken against his grandson if he is found guilty. He also said the cases against his son and JD(S) MLA H D Revanna, who is facing charges of sexual harassment and kidnap of a woman, were "created", but refrained from commenting further, as the matter was subjudice. Addressing reporters, Gowda, who turned 92 today, said, "... I don't want to comment on things that are going on in the court regarding Revanna. Prajwal Revanna has gone abroad, regarding that Kumaraswamy (Gowda's other son and state JD(S) chief) has on behalf of our family said it is the duty of the government to take action in accordance with the law of the land."

Heatwave in northwest India for next five days

New Delhi, May 18: The extreme heat scorching large parts of northwest India will continue for another five days, with Delhi, Haryana, Punjab, Rajasthan and Uttar Pradesh predicted to bear the maximum impact.

A brutal heatwave swept swathes of north India Friday, with the maximum temperature soaring to a scorching 47.4 degrees Celsius in southwest Delhi's Najafgarh, the highest this sea-

son in the country so far. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) Saturday predicted a severe heatwave over the plains of northwest India during the next five days and a heat wave over the east and central regions during the next three days.

The Met office also issued a red warning for Delhi, Haryana, Punjab and west Rajasthan, stressing the need for "extreme care for vulnerable people".

It issued an orange alert for east Rajasthan, Uttar Pradesh



and Bihar and emphasised "high health concern" for vulnerable people, including infants, the elderly and those with chronic diseases. The Met office said high humidity could add to peo-

ple's inconvenience in Goa and sub-Himalayan West Bengal.

The IMD also said warm night conditions are likely in Uttar Pradesh, Bihar and west Rajasthan over the next two-three days. High night temperatures are considered dangerous because the body doesn't get a chance to cool down. Increasing nighttime heat is more common in cities because of the urban heat island effect, in which metro areas are significantly hotter than their surroundings.

Matheran's popular toy train to don heritage steam engine look

Mumbai, May 18: The iconic toy train that runs at Matheran, a hill station located around 100 km from Mumbai, will soon get a heritage makeover as the present diesel-run engine will be given the look of a steam engine of the past, officials said.

The Central Railway (CR), which operates this narrow gauge train that passes through a difficult and steep mountainous terrain offering a picturesque view of a thickly wooded ridge and a valley, has decided to give a heritage look to it to revive the glorious past of this train, they said.

But despite the new steam engine look, the train will con-

tinue to run on diesel, the officials added. China's space tourism debut by '28

TICKETS WILL COST 2MN TO 3MN YUAN (\$415,127) PER PERSON PER TRIP

Beijing, May 18: Chinese commercial space company CAS Space announced its "space tourism vehicle" will first fly in 2027 and travel to the edge of space in 2028, state media reported Friday.

The announcement comes just days after Jeff Bezos-backed Blue Origin announced that its New Shepard Rocket, which flies cargo and humans on short trips to the edge of space, would resume flights Sunday, ending a near two-year pause of crewed operations.

CAS Space said that its vehicle will include a tourist cabin that has four panoramic



windows and can carry seven passengers per flight. The company plans to arrange a launch every 100 hours from a newly-built aerospace theme park, with ten vehicles available to take tourists to the edge of space in shifts.

Tickets will cost 2 million to 3 million yuan (\$415,127) per person per trip, state media said. Guangzhou-based CAS Space

was founded in 2018 and its second-largest shareholder is China's biggest state research institute, the Chinese Academy of Sciences.

China's space exploration program has recently narrowed the gap with the United States and could become the first country to return samples from the far side of the moon after it launched the Chang'e-6 mission earlier this month.

That launch attracted hordes of tourists to the launch site on China's island province of Hainan. Before blast-off tens of thousands of people gathered in different viewing spots near the launch site, causing long traffic jams.

Georgian Prez vetoes 'foreign agents' bill

Tbilisi, May 18: Georgian President Salome Zourabichvili has announced that she has vetoed a draft law on foreign agents, Russia's state-run TASS news agency reported on Saturday.

4 Indians among 6 charged for visa fraud conspiracy

Washington, May 18: Six individuals, including four Indian nationals, were Friday indicted by a federal court for staging armed robberies in Chicago and the suburbs so that the victims could apply for immigration visas reserved for certain crime victims in the United States.

According to an indictment unsealed in federal court in Chicago, the four individuals Bhikhabhai Patel, Nilesh Patel, Ravinaben Patel and Rajni Kumar Patel, arranged with Parth Nayi and Kewong Young to be "victims" of the staged robberies so that they could submit applications for U nonimmigrant status ("U-visa").

U-Visa is set aside for victims of certain crimes who have suffered mental or physical abuse and are helpful to law enforcement or government officials in an investigation or prosecution.

The indictment alleges that the four individuals paid Nayi thousands of dollars to participate in the scam.

During the staged robberies, individuals acting as robbers brandished what appeared to be firearms, approached the purported victims and demanded money and property, the indictment states.

Afterwards, some of the purported victims submitted forms to local law enforcement to obtain certification that they were victims of a qualifying crime and had been or would be helpful in the investigation, the indictment states.

Upon receiving certification, some of the purported victims then submitted fraudulent U-visa applications to U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services predicated upon their alleged status as a robbery victim, the Department of Justice said in a statement.

Nayi, 26, Young, 31, Bhikhabhai Patel, 51, Nilesh Patel, 32, Ravinaben Patel, 23, and Rajnikumar Patel, 32, are charged with conspiracy to commit visa fraud.

'DANGER BEHIND BEAUTY'

THE SUN BLASTED OUT THE STRONGEST SOLAR FLARE SEEN IN YEARS TUESDAY

Paris, May 18: Tourists normally have to pay big money and brave cold climates for a chance to see an aurora, but last weekend many people around the world simply had to look up to see these colourful displays dance across the sky.

Usually banished to the poles of Earth, the auroras strayed as far as Mexico, southern Europe and South Africa on the evening of May 10, delighting skygazers and filling social media with images of exuberant pinks, greens and purples.

But for those charged with protecting Earth from powerful solar storms such as the one that caused the auroras, a threat lurks beneath the stunning colours.

"We need to understand that behind this beauty, there is danger," Quentin Verspieren, the European Space Agency's space safety pro-

More solar storms could be heading our way



'Definitely not over'

These strange effects are caused by massive explosions on the surface of the Sun that shoot out plasma, radiation and even magnetic fields at incredibly fast speeds born on the solar wind.

The recent activity has come from a sunspot cluster 17 times the size of Earth which has continued raging over the week.

The most famous example came in 1859 during the worst solar storm in recorded history, called the Carrington Event

The sunspot has been turning towards the edge of the Sun's disc, so activity is expected to die down in the short term as its outbursts aim away from our planet.

But in roughly two weeks the storm will swing back around, again turning its gaze towards Earth.

In the meantime, another sunspot is "coming into view

Solar activity is only just approaching the peak of its roughly 11-year cycle, so the odds of another major storm are highest between now and the end of next year

right now" which could trigger "major activity in the coming days", ESA space weather service coordinator Alexi Glover told AFP.

So the solar activity is "definitely not over", she added.

It is difficult to predict how violent these sunspots could be or whether they could spark further auroras.

What threat do solar storms pose?

Geomagnetic storms such as the recent one create a magnetic charge of voltage and current, "essentially overloading" things like satellites and power grids, according to Bettwy.

As well as stunning auroras, the storm caused sparks to fly off

of telegraph stations. The charge that originated from the Sun was so strong that some telegraphs worked without being plugged into a power source.

So what would happen if such a powerful geomagnetic storm struck Earth again?

Bettwy said most countries have improved their power grids, which should prevent prolonged outages like those that hit Sweden in 2003 or Canada in 1989.

Still, he suggested people have an emergency kit in case electricity is knocked out for a day or two. Fresh water might also help in case filtration plants go offline.

Astronauts are particularly at risk from radiation during extreme solar activity. Those on the International Space Station usually take the best shelter they can when a bad storm is expected. Bettwy said a massive solar storm could expose astronauts to an "unhealthy dose" of radiation, but he did not think it would be lethal.

Nestle India shareholders vote against increase in royalty to Swiss parent

New Delhi, May 18: Shareholders of FMCG firm Nestle India Ltd have rejected a proposal by the company to increase royalty payment to its parent firm.

Nestle India's board had last month approved increasing royalty payment to its parent firm Societe des Produits Nestle S.A (licensor) by 0.15 per cent per year for the next five years thereby enhancing it to 5.25 per cent of net sales.

It had proposed to start the 0.15 per cent per annum increase over the current royalty fee of 4.5 per annum from July 1, 2024. Subsequently, it had sought approval from its shareholders of the same as an ordinary resolution through a postal ballot.

In a regulatory filing, Nestle India said 57.18 per cent of the total votes were against the ordinary resolution and 42.82 per cent of the votes were in favour.

The ordinary resolution, has not been passed due to lack of requisite majority of votes in favour of the resolution.

In 2013, Nestle India's board had approved an increase in royalty payment by 0.20 per cent per year over a period of five years to its parent firm, thereby enhancing it to 4.5 per cent of the sales.

On the other hand, the shareholders of Nestle India approved the special resolution for the appointment of Suneeta Reddy, Managing Director of Apollo Hospitals Enterprise Ltd, as an Additional Independent non-executive Director with effect from April 5, 2024, for a term of five consecutive years up to April 4, 2029, with requisite majority.



In separate circulars, the two exchanges said there will be two sessions -- the first from 9:15 am to 10:00 am from the PR, and the second from 11:30 am to 12:30 pm from the DR site.

In preparation for the refinancing, OYO has already moved its application with markets regulator SEBI to withdraw its current draft red herring prospectus (DRHP). The company intends to refile an updated version of the DRHP after the bond issuance.

Oravel Stays Ltd, OYO's parent company, had in November prepaid a significant chunk of its debt amounting to ₹1,620 crore through a buyback process. The buyback involved repurchasing

30 per cent of its outstanding Term Loan B of \$660 million. The move brought down its outstanding loan amount to around \$450 million.

A source closely involved in the company's IPO plans told PTI, "The refinancing will result in material changes to OYO's financial statements. Hence as per existing regulations, it will need to revise its filings with the regulator".

"Since the decision for refinancing is at an advanced stage,

it doesn't make sense to continue pursuing IPO approval with the current financials. So it's prudent to withdraw the current application," he added.

The refinancing will extend the repayment timeline to five years -- versus the repayment of the remaining TLB due in 2026 -- the source said.

The bond issuance would significantly lower the current effective interest rate of 14 per cent on its existing \$450 million Term Loan B (TLB) facility.

Norway sovereign wealth fund excludes APSEZ

The Adani Group's port firm joins 14 other Indian cos facing similar action

New Delhi, May 18: Norway's central bank has excluded Adani Group's port firm, APSEZ from its government pension fund over ethical concerns, making it the 15th Indian company to face such action with previous ones being the likes of ONGC, GAIL, NTPC and Vedanta.

Norges Bank, which manages the sovereign wealth fund, May 15 stated that it has decided to exclude Adani Ports and Special Economic Zone due to "unacceptable risk that the company contributes to serious violations of individuals' rights in situations of war or conflict."

APSEZ, which was on the central bank's watch list for possible exclusion from investment since March 2022,

faced the action due to its business association with the armed forces in Myanmar. Sources however said the Adani group firm sold the Myanmar asset entirely in May last year, and there has been no incremental disclosures made regarding that asset, as the company has fully exited.

The Norwegian fund's Council of Ethics acknowledged APSEZ's May 2023 disclosure that it had sold its port-related operations in Myanmar to Solar Energy Ltd but said "no information on buyer is available, and APSEZ has stated that it cannot share any such information on the grounds of confidentiality."

"Lack of information means that the Council cannot establish whether APSEZ has links to the enterprise concerned. Vi mulls rolling out 5G in six months

New Delhi, May 18: Debt-ridden Vodafone Idea is planning to begin 5G rollout in six months in select cities and places where 5G device concentration is high, a senior company official said Friday.

Vodafone Idea CEO Akshaya Moondra said the company expects capital expenditure of the company to be in the range of ₹50,000-Rs 55,000 crore over the next three years with focus on expanding and strengthening 4G coverage.

Rest of the investments in capacity growth will happen as the traffic grows. We expect that we should be rolling out 5G on a large scale from about six months from now. The main focus is going to be the main cities or other areas where there is a large concentration of 5G devices. We will make investments as the market evolves," Moondra said.

He said the company's investment will focus on expanding and strengthening coverage in 17 priority circles to be competitive.

VIL CEO said the company has been losing customers because of weak network coverage and the investment will help the company arrest customer churn.

VIL total customer base has declined 5.7 per cent to 21.3 crore from 22.6 crore in the March 2023 quarter. The company reported an increase in the share of post-paid customers of about 1.3 per cent on a year-on-year basis.

The 4G subscriber base of VIL increased to 12.63 crore from 12.26 crore on a year-on-year basis during the period under review.

Bond traders hanker for short-term borrowing cuts

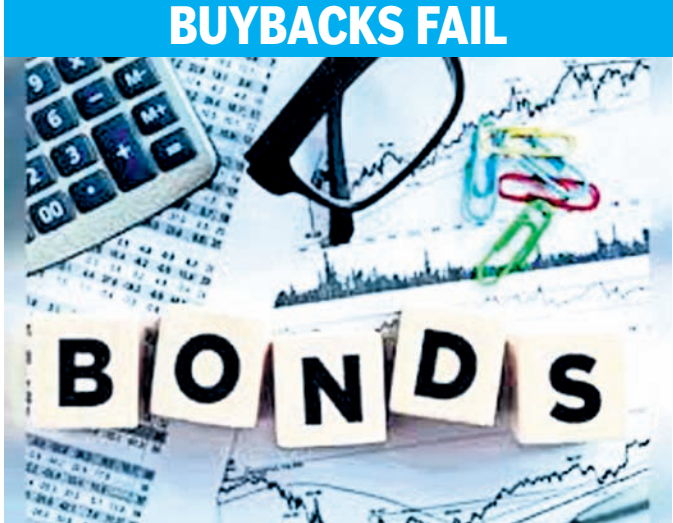
Mumbai, May 18: Most Indian bond traders are looking for a cut in the government's short-term borrowing as a better way to regulate banking system liquidity after two consecutive attempts to buy back debt failed, several traders said.

Government spending has been low due to an ongoing national election, leading to a build-up in the government's cash balances and a subsequent cash deficit in the banking system.

tem. Liquidity deficit is expected to widen further in the next few days as there is an outflow of goods and services taxes.

New Delhi has cumulatively repurchased only ₹126 billion (\$1.51 billion) worth of bonds, far short of its offer to buy ₹1 trillion worth of securities over two auctions conducted so far in May.

Despite the lackluster outcome the government announced a third buyback to be held May 21, which five traders



said may see a "slightly better" results because of a change in the securities being offered.

India said Thursday it will buy back bonds maturing between June and November of

2024, instead of those maturing between November 2024 to January 2025.

"The change in securities would yield better results for sure", but would still be about half subscribed, a senior treasury official at a large private bank said requesting anonymity as he is not authorised to speak to media.

"Looking at the government's cash balance, some reduction in T-bill supply would be more impactful and meaningful," he added. The government is scheduled to borrow ₹220 billion every week through sale of T-bills, including ₹150 billion from 91-

day and 182-day papers, aggregating to ₹1.32 trillion till end of June. It has already borrowed ₹1.89 trillion in the first seven weeks of the fiscal year.

"Since buybacks are seeing limitations, the government can cancel around three 91-day and 182-day T-bill auction and that would lead to similar amount of cash management," said Soumyajit Niyogi, a director at India Ratings & Research.

India's banking system liquidity has stayed in a deficit for the last four weeks, coinciding with the start of the first phase of general elections, with average daily average deficit in May rising to ₹1.2 trillion.

Satwik-Chirag pair in final

Bangkok, May 18: India's premier men's doubles pair of Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty entered the final of the Thailand Open badminton tournament with an easy straight-game victory over Lu Ming-Che and Tang Kai-Wei of Chinese Taipei here Saturday.

Asian Games gold medallist pair of Satwik and Chirag needed just 35 minutes to beat their World No.80 opponents 21-11, 21-12 in the semifinal match of the Super 500 tournament at the Nimibutr Stadium here.

Satwik and Chirag have a deep relation with Thailand as it was here five years back in 2019 that they had won their maiden super 500 crown. The Indian pair inched closer to regaining the title Saturday after reaching the summit clash again.

The Indian pair thus continued to make waves in the BWF World Tour after progressing to their fourth final of the season. The duo had finished runner-up at Malaysia super 1000 and India super 750 before claiming the French super 750 in March.

In Sunday's final, the World No.3 Indian duo, the top seeds in this tournament, will be up against the Chinese pair of Chen Bo Yang and Liu Yi, who defeated Kim Gi Jung and Kim Sa Rang of South Korea 21-19, 21-18 in the other semifinal Saturday.

Satwik and Chirag had some low returns in the last couple of tournaments. The Indian pair lost in the second round at All England Championships and



then missed the Asia Championships due to an injury to Satwik. The Thomas Cup campaign was also not too fruitful as they lost a couple of narrow matches to top pairs. The final appearance will thus provide a major boost ahead of the Paris Olympics.

Satwik and Chirag were not really tested Saturday by Lu and Tang, who played well only in patches but lacked the aggression and accuracy to trouble the Indians, who were a cut above their rivals.

In the opening game, Satwik and Chirag were up 3-0 but the Taiwanese pair managed to make it 5-4 before they started

leaking points. Errors crept into their game as they went long a number of times, allowing the Indians to enter the break with an 11-7 lead.

Things didn't change after resumption as the Indians continued to gather point with their sharp placements. At 17-10, Chirag produced a powerpacked smash as they gained nine game points when the Chinese went out twice.

The second game began on a close note as the two pairs moves 4-4 to 6-6. Satwik also produced an ambitious behind-the-back return only to spray it wide. Leading 9-7 for the first time in the match, Lu and Tang, however,

couldn't sustain the pressure as a fast and long rally ended at the nets for the Chinese.

With Lu and Tang continuing to find the going tough, it was 15-10 in favour of the Indians, who grabbed 8 match points when the Chinese made another soft error at the net. Chirag then stood at the front court and sealed it with a barrage of fast returns.

In the women's doubles, the fourth-seeded Indian pair of Tanisha Carsto and Ashwini Ponnappa lost 12-20, 20-22 to top seeds Jongkolphan Kititharakul and Rawinda Prangjai of Thailand in the semifinals.

RCB's ecstasy CSK's agony

Bengaluru sail into IPL playoffs marking a likely end to Dhoni era

Bangalore, May 18: Royal Challengers Bengaluru continued their fairytale run to grab the fourth and final playoff berth with a 27-run victory over defending champions Chennai Super Kings in their must-win last IPL league game here Saturday.

It was the sixth straight win for RCB, who first posted a solid 218/5 after being invited to bat and then restricted CSK to 191/7 to make it to the playoffs for the ninth time in 15 seasons.

RCB survived a scare as Ravindra Jadeja (42 n o, 22b, 3x4, 3x6) and MS Dhoni (25, 13b, 3x4, 1x6) had conjured up hopes of a turnaround after Rachin Ravindra's 61 (37b, 5x4, 3x6) but Yash Dayal (2/42) held his nerves in the final over to take the hosts home.

While it was ecstasy for RCB, the legion of fans of Dhoni sank into despair as it could potentially be the last time they witnessed their 'Thala' perform on a cricket field.

Down and out after losing seven out of their first eight games, RCB had weaved five wins on the trot to script a remarkable turnaround and give themselves a chance to make it to the final four.

Saturday, the hosts needed to win by at least 18 runs to book the final playoff berth and they did that in style with yet another impressive show at the M Chinnaswamy Stadium. The two teams finished at 14 points but RCB sneaked into the final four on the basis of a better net run-rate.

The equation was in favour of CSK when they began their run-

chase as a 200-plus score would have sealed their place in the final four at the expense of RCB even if they had lost the game.

However, CSK lost skipper Ruturaj Gaikwad (0) and Daryl Mitchell (4) to be reduced to 19/2 in the third over. Ajinkya Rahane (33, 22b, 3x4, 1x6) and Ravindra steadied the innings with a 64-run stand but Lockie Ferguson broke the partnership as the former was holed out by Du Plessis and then the New Zealander was run out. Du Plessis then took a screamer to remove Mitchell Santner as CSK slipped to 129/6 in 15 overs.

With their backs to the wall, Jadeja and Dhoni added a whirlwind 61 off 27 balls to bring the equation down to 11 off five balls to qualify for the playoffs. With CSK needing 17 runs off the last six balls to qualify, Dayal bowled

the final over and he was straight away smashed for a six by Dhoni but the pacer came back strongly to dismiss the former CSK skipper and then conceded just one run to seal it for RCB.

Earlier, sent in to bat, RCB's top order, led by skipper Du Plessis (54, 39b, 3x4, 3x6), fired in unison. Virat Kohli (47, 29b, 3x4, 4x6), Rajat Patidar (41, 23b, 2x4, 4x6) and Cameron Green (38 n o, 17b, 3x4, 3x6) also went on a six-hitting spree to put RCB on solid ground.

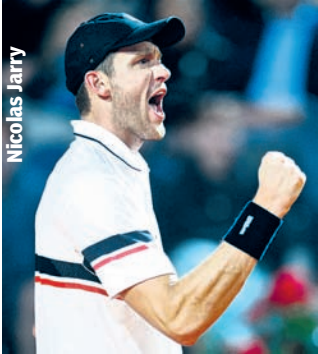

Zverev to face Jarry for Italian Open title

Rome, May 18: For about an hour, Alexander Zverev had no answer to the rocket-like forehands and perfectly placed drop shots that Alejandro Tabilo kept producing on Rome's red clay.

The fifth-ranked Zverev kept patient, though, and took his chance when it came as he rallied to beat his unheralded Chilean opponent 1-6, 7-6(7-4), 6-2 Friday for a spot in the Italian Open final.

In Sunday's final, Zverev will face another Chilean, Nicolas Jarry, who beat Tommy Paul 6-3, 6-7(3-7), 6-3 on the American's 27th birthday. The 24th-ranked Jarry came back from a set down to eliminate Stefanos Tsitsipas in the quarterfinals and will be playing his first Masters Series final. It was an appealing contrast



in styles between the big-serving 6-foot-7 (2.01 meter) Jarry, who goes for a lot of his shots, and the more defensive-minded Paul, who grinds it out and likes to make his opponents play longer points.

Zverev, the 2017 Rome champion, had the pinkie on his left hand bandaged following a fall in his previous match, after which he said his finger was "crooked." The German plays right-handed but uses a two-handed backhand. He said his pinkie was swollen and he was using painkillers.

It's Zverev's third final in Rome. He won in 2017 by beating Novak Djokovic in straight sets for his first Masters Series title. He lost to Rafael Nadal in the title match a year later. Rome is the last big wamup before the French Open starts May 26.

Royals, Sunrisers aim for second spot

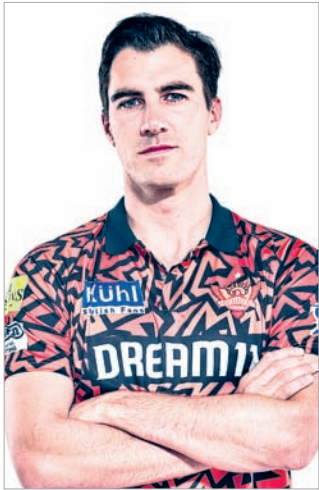
Their top three batters Yashasvi Jaiswal, skipper Sanju Samson and local hero Riyan Parag will have to shoulder additional responsibilities if they are to snap the losing streak and head to the playoffs finishing in top-two, that will give them two cracks to reach the final.

KKR (19 points), on the other hand, have already assured themselves a table top position after

The third-placed Sunrisers have been somewhat unlucky in their last six outings, winning just two while three matches ended in defeats and one match was a washout.

New Delhi, May 18: Jaismine Lamboria will compete in the second Olympic boxing qualifiers in Thailand beginning May 24 after India was forced to surrender the women's 57kg category quota for the Paris Games owing to holder Parveen Hooda's international suspension.

Parveen was suspended for three whereabouts failures in 12 months. Parveen was handed a 22-month suspension by the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) on Friday.

"Jaismine will compete at 2nd Olympic qualifiers in Thailand in the 57kg category after the suspension of quota winner Parveen by the International Testing Agency (ITA) for Whereabouts Failures Olympic qualifiers start from May 24," Boxing Federation of India said Saturday.

Jaismine had competed in 60kg in the first qualifiers and the Hangzhou Asian Games last



year. She had won a 60kg bronze medal in the 2022 Birmingham Commonwealth Games.

In an unprecedented embarrassment for Indian boxing, the country was forced to surrender the women's 57kg category Olympic quota Friday owing to Parveen's suspension.

The 2022 World Championship bronze-medallist boxer, who fetched the Olympic quota with an Asian Games bronze last year,

failed to file her whereabouts in the period from April 2022 to March 2023 as per WADA rules. However, after discussion with the concerned agencies, Parveen's sanction has been back-dated and she has to now serve a 14-month suspension starting Friday.

In boxing, a quota is awarded to the country and not to the athlete. Three Indian boxers – Nikhat Zareen (50kg), Preeti

(54kg) and Lovlina Borgohain (75kg) – have already booked Olympic quotas for India so far.

NIKHAT, MINAKSHI BAG GOLD

Reigning World Champion Nikhat and Minakshi clinched a gold each as the Indian team concluded their Elorda Cup campaign in Astana (Kazakhstan) with a best-ever tally of a whopping 12 medals Saturday.

Besides Nikhat and Minakshi's gold medals, Indian boxers won two silver and eight bronze to better their last edition's record of five medals.

Nikhat (52kg) continued her dominance in the prestigious tournament as she outclassed Zhazira Urakbayeva of Kazakhstan with a unanimous 5-0 scoreline to add yet another gold medal to her impressive resume.

Minakshi started the day for India with a bang when she defeated Uzbekistan's Rahmonova Saidahon 4-1 in the women's 48kg final to give India their first gold medal of the competition.
