SHODDY INFRA CLAIMS LIFE

In yet another incident of shoddy infrastructure leading to loss of human life, a cab driver died while six people were injured after a portion of a roof caved in on them at Delhi airport's Terminal-1. That such a mishap could take place at the country's busiest airport speaks volumes on the state of affairs at other critical infrastructure which are used by millions of people on a daily basis. The incident happening on the very first day of monsoon hitting the national capital also shows how unprepared the city was to tackle a three-hour downpour

tenders were rushed to Terminal-1 of the airport after a call about the incident was received around 5:30 am. Besides the roof sheet, the support beams collapsed, damaging the cars parked in the pick-up and drop area of the terminal. A search operation was conducted to make sure no one was trapped inside the damaged vehicles, they said. The injured have been admitted to Medanta Hospital near the airport. A police official said the deceased was identified as Ramesh Kumar (45), a taxi driver and a resident of Rohini in Delhi. The injured

persons are residents of Delhi, Gujarat and Madhya Pradesh, the official said. The Congress Friday hit out at the Modi government over the incident, saying 'corruption' and 'criminal negligence' are responsible for the shoddy infrastructure created in the last 10 years. "Corruption and criminal negligence is responsible for the collapse of shoddy infrastructure falling like a deck of cards, in the past 10 years of Modi Government," Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge said in a post on X. "Delhi Airport (T1) roof collapse, Jabalpur airport roof collapse, Abysmal condition of Ayodhya's new roads, Ram Mandir leakage, cracks in Mumbai Trans Harbour Link road, 13 new bridges falling down in Bihar in 2023 & 2024, Pragati Maidan Tunnel submerging, Morbi bridge collapse tragedy in Gujarat, ... are some stark instances which exposes the tall claims by Modi ji and BJP of creating 'World Class Infrastructure'," he said. **P9**

Lying with confidence; faltering with facts

Washington, June 28: Thursday's presidential debate was a re-run that featured two candidates with a combined age of 159, but it went especially poorly for one of them, President Joe Biden. Already fighting voter concerns about his age, Biden, 81, was halting and seemed to lose his train of thought, sparking quick concerns among Democrats about the man they hope will keep former President Donald Trump from returning to office. For his part, Trump made repeated false claims and provocative statements. But Trump seemed smoother and more vigorous than Biden, who is only three years older than the Republican ex-president. The debate covered a wide range of topics and included a former president — Trump — not backing down from his vows to prosecute members of Congress and even the man he was debat-

ing. But the overarching theme was the difference between the candidates' performance. Presidential debates are often scored on style and impression more than substance. Trump was confident and composed, even as he steamrolled facts on abortion and immigration with false assertions, conspicuous exaggerations and empty superlatives. Biden was often halting, his

voice raspy, even when he had the facts on his side. He had difficulty finishing his arguments and marshalling his attacks. Trump's supporters have seemed unconcerned about his relationship with the truth, and his performance and delivery helped him. Biden's supporters consistently express concern about the president's age and capacity and he did little to reassure them. One of the first glimpses view-

ers got of Biden was when he lost his train of thought while making his case on tax rates and the number of billionaires in America — trailing off and looking down at his lectern before mumbling briefly and saying "we finally beat Medicare." When he tried to finish his point, he was cut off because of the time limits. At other times, Biden made some puzzling non sequiturs that seemed to undercut what the campaign has said are his strong points, including the economy and abortion rights. As Biden critiqued Trump's economic record, the president suddenly pivoted to Afghanistan and how Trump "didn't do anything about that" — although the botched withdrawal of Afghanistan is widely considered one of the lowest points of Biden's presidency. Later, as Biden singled out state restrictions on abortion, he confusingly pivoted to immigration and referred to a "young woman who was just murdered" by an immigrant. It

was unclear what point he was trying to make. Trump was cruising through the opening of the debate when he suddenly stumbled over the question of how he would reassure voters that he would respect his oath of office after the January 6, 2021, attack on the US Capitol. He continued to engage in denialism about the attack and refused to denounce those who attacked police and stormed the building by breaking doors and windows. He suggested that those charged will somehow be found one day to be innocent. Trump tried to avoid addressing the issue. He defended the people who stormed the Capitol, blaming Biden for prosecuting them. "What they've done to some people who are so innocent, you ought to be ashamed of yourself," Trump told Biden. Biden shot back: "The only person on this stage who's a convicted felon is the man I'm looking at."

State to set up centre for tribal languages

Bhubaneswar, June 28: The Odisha government-run Academy of Tribal Languages and Culture (ATLC) has decided to set up an academic centre and language laboratory dedicated to the development of tribal languages and culture. Nityananda Gond, Minister of ST and SC Development, Minorities & Backward Classes Welfare Department, has directed the setting up of the new academic centre and language laboratory as part of the department's 100-day plan, an official statement Friday said. According to the minister, the centre and language laboratory will come up at Gothapatna on the outskirts of Bhubaneswar, near the proposed Adivasi Bhawan. ATLC, a premier autonomous institution under the ST, SC Development Department, was previously known as the Academy of Tribal Dialects and Culture. Established in 1979, it was later rechristened as ATLC during 2007-2008.

Heavy rains for next 2 days

Bhubaneswar, June 28: Several parts of the state are likely to receive heavy rains in the next two days as the low pressure area over northwest Bay of Bengal (BoB), off north Odisha coast, moves northwards during the period, IMD sources said.

The low pressure area has been formed under the influence of a cyclonic circulation over northwest and the adjoining west-central Bay of Bengal (BoB), they added.

Meanwhile, widespread rainfall activity with very heavy rainfall at one or two places was recorded in Koraput district, Friday. Heavy rainfall was also witnessed at one or two places in Dhenkanal, Koraput, Malkangiri, Khurda, Rayagada, and Jajpur districts during the day.

Jeyapore in Koraput recorded 12 cm of rainfall, followed by Nandapur (Koraput) and Bhuban

(Dhenkanal) with 11 cm each, Malkangiri with 9 cm, and Bolagarh (Khurda) with 8 cm.

IMD sources said light to moderate rain/thundershowers are very likely to occur at most places over the districts of the state in the next two days.

They further stated that heavy to very heavy rainfall (7 to 20 cm) is very likely to occur at isolated places in Kalahandi, Kandhamal, Rayagada, Nayagarh, Ganjam, Jagatsinghpur, Kendrapara, and Bhadrak districts.

Heavy rainfall (7 to 11 cm) is also very likely to occur at isolated places over the districts of Khorda, Puri, Balasore, Jajpur, Cuttack, Bolangir, Nuapada, Boudh, Angul, Dhenkanal, Gajapati, Keonjhar, Mayurbhanj, and Koraput.

Fishermen have been alerted that squally weather with gusty surface wind speeds reaching 40 to 50 kmph is likely over the northwest Bay of Bengal off the Odisha coast until June 30.

The BJD, in the first two terms of the BJP-led NDA, had been a reliable source of support for the government in passing of legislations, even though it was not a formal ally.

80% math teachers falter on basic concepts: Study

Nearly 80 per cent of in-service math teachers across India and the Middle East falter on basic concepts such as ratio, proportional reasoning, algebraic reasoning, estimation and logical reasoning, according to a new study.

The study assessed over 1,300 in-service mathematics teachers of Classes III, IV, V and VI across 152 schools in India, UAE, Oman and Saudi Arabia over two years.

The study - Analysis of In-Service Mathematics Teachers' Subject Knowledge and Misconceptions on Primary and Middle-Grade Mathematics Concepts - was conducted by Ei, a leading EdTech company.

During the study, 1,357 teachers undertook the TIPS (Teacher Impact Programmes) - Math Subject Knowledge - Level 1 assessment, which not only meas-

ures teachers' subject and pedagogical knowledge but also shares detailed reports with the test-takers and school principals.

Among those who took the assessment, 80 per cent of the teachers were from India, 18 per cent from UAE and 1 per cent each from Oman and Saudi Arabia.

According to the study, 75 per cent of teachers struggled to answer 50 per cent of the questions correctly and a mere 25 per cent could accurately answer only 25 per cent of the questions asked.

"A staggering 80 per cent faltered on concepts such as ratio, proportional reasoning, algebraic reasoning, estimation, and logical reasoning - skills crucial for real-life problem-solving. While 73.3 per cent of the teachers answered grade 4 questions



correctly, only 36.7 per cent could answer the questions based on grade 7 topics," the report said.

"This parallel between teacher and student misconceptions is particularly alarming, suggesting a cyclical challenge in mathematical education where errors may be perpetuated through gen-

erations of learners," it added.

The report noted that misunderstandings were also found in geometric concepts, where 32.9 per cent of teachers erroneously believed that the perimeter of a shape formed by joining parts is simply the sum of the perimeters of those parts, indi-

Teenager among two held for drug peddling

Giving further details about the case, the police commissioner said acting on a tip-off, the sleuths laid a trap near Pokhariput-Sundarpada bypass and arrested them. Man gets life for raping daughter

Bhubaneswar, June 28: The Fast Track Special Court (FTSC) here Friday sentenced a man to life imprisonment after holding him guilty of raping his minor daughter under Badagada police limits in the City in 2021.

Adhoc ADJ (FTSC) Saroj Kumar Sahoo convicted Jyotirmaya Samal under several IPC Sections and POCSO Act. The court slapped a penalty of ₹5,000 on Samal, Special PP Rajib Sasmal said, adding that failure to pay the penalty would entail an additional three-month of jail term.

Around 10:30pm September 1, 2021, the minor girl and her mother were fast asleep at their rented house under Badagada police limits when Samal raped the girl.

ating a lack of understanding of basic geometric properties.

"A considerable proportion of teachers (36.3 per cent) demonstrated a misunderstanding in ordering decimals, incorrectly comparing the decimal part of numbers as whole numbers, which showcases a fundamental misconception in understanding place value and the properties of decimals," it said.

Misconceptions surrounding probability were notable, with 16.4 per cent and 25.9 per cent of teachers incorrectly asserting that the probability of an event cannot be a fraction or a decimal or erroneously stating that it cannot be 0 or 1.

"This study serves as a wakeup call for our education system, which has long prioritised rote learning, leading to deep-rooted academic misconceptions passed down through generations of

learners. India's low ranking of 72 out of 73 countries in the PISA assessment underscores the prevalence of rote memorisation in classrooms and widening gap in conceptual understanding caused by familiar textbook-style questions," said Sridhar Rajagopalan, Co-founder and Chief Learning Officer (CLO).

"The skills students acquire are heavily influenced by the types of questions they encounter, with rote learning undermining critical and creative thinking. While the NEP 2020 represents a positive policy step, schools and teachers must now take responsibility for up-skilling and breaking this cycle. The evolving demands of the modern world necessitate an education that fosters critical thinking and innovation, requiring educators to lead by example with the necessary skills," he added.

Technical glitch hits passport services

Bhubaneswar, June 28: Thousands of passport applicants are left to fend for themselves as a severe technical glitch in the software has affected the processing of online applications at the Regional Passport Office (RPO) here, according to sources.

Alleging inaction by the passport officials, several applicants have claimed that they have been encountering a technical issue

in the Passport Seva Portal for the last three months. Although a few applicants have already made distress calls to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), apart from posting on X by tagging the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) and Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), the issue remains unresolved.

A senior official at the RPO, who wished not to be named, attributed the delay in processing of applications to a snag in the updated version of the software - Passport seva programme 2.0. The software was recently launched on a pilot-basis in Bhubaneswar and Nagpur to ensure seamless workflow, the official mentioned.

He also said, "The issue, mainly, is due to transfer of data

from old software to the new one, causing frequent crashes in the latter. This creates a hurdle in the processes related to passport renewal, issuance of fresh passports and retrieving the old data of passport applicants for verification. Technical teams have been roped in for quick resolution to the issue."

Following the issue, the appointment slots at RPO, Bhubaneswar have declined to nearly one-fifth.

Raseswar Sahoo, a resident of Burla, said he urgently required a passport before July-end, to apply for an upcoming seminar in Berlin, scheduled for August 18-24, but his application got suspended abruptly. "When I lodged my complaint through the toll-free number, my application got reinstated. However, when I wanted to book appointment slot on the portal, it showed that no slot is available for the next three months."

It's appalling and also strange that every other RPO in the country has vacant appointment slots despite scores of applications being processed there on a daily basis, except for the one here, he added.

Echoing similar concerns, Manmath Tripathy, a Bhubaneswar resident, said his application has been stuck in police station for nearly four months due to a technical snag from the RPO.

Healthcare sector faces cyber attacks

New Delhi, June 28: The Indian healthcare sector has become a major target for cybercriminals, experiencing an average of 6,935 cyber attacks per week over the last six months, compared to 1,821 attacks per organisation globally, a new report revealed Friday.

According to the cyber security provider 'Check Point Software Technologies' (CPST), this trend highlighted the increased attack surface due to the rapid adoption of technologies such as electronic health records (EHRs), telemedicine, and Internet of Things (IoT) devices.

"The simplicity of spoofing email addresses and the capability to deliver weaponised content makes email a powerful tool for spreading malware, stealing credentials, and executing so-



cial engineering attacks," said Sundar Balasubramanian, MD for India and SAARC at CPST.

"Users must avoid opening unverified email attachments, use strong passwords, enable multi-factor authentication, and exercise caution with unsolicited or suspicious emails," he added.

Following healthcare, the most attacked industries in India include education/research (6,244 attacks), consulting (3,989 attacks), and government/mili-

tary (3,618 attacks), the report mentioned.

The report also highlighted that Indian organisations, on average, were targeted 2,924 times per week over the past six months, compared to 1,401 attacks per organisation globally.

The most prevalent malware in India was 'Fake Updates', accompanied by other malicious software such as 'Botnets' and a Remote Access Trojan (RAT) named 'Remcos'.

Information disclosure was the most commonly exploited vulnerability in India, affecting 72 per cent of organisations, followed by Remote Code Execution (RCE) impacting 62 per cent, and Authentication Bypass affecting 52 per cent.

In the last 30 days, 63 per cent of malicious files in India were delivered via email, while 37 per cent were delivered through the web.

Notably, 58 per cent of the top malicious files delivered via email were executable files, while 59 per cent of malicious files delivered via the web were PDF files, the report said.

"Preventive measures, such as regular software updates, employee training, and the deployment of advanced security solutions, are essential to mitigate the growing threat landscape," Balasubramanian said.

First, a fire team from Bidanasi fire station reached the spot and then another fire service team from the city rushed to the spot. The fire was completely doused, Behera said.

By the time the fire was extinguished by the fire brigade officials, the bus was almost gutted. However, the cause of the fire is yet to be ascertained.

10th edition of CII Farm2Fork held

Bhubaneswar, June 28: To highlight the opportunities in increasing export of agricultural and food processing products of the state, the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) organised the 10th edition of 'CII Farm2Fork' here, Friday.

Speaking on the occasion, CII Eastern Region Government Industry Agri and Food Processing Forum chairman and executive director of ITC Limited B Sumant said, there is huge potential for export of paddy, wheat and organic spices from the state.

"Compared to other states, the use of fertilisers in paddy cultivation in Odisha is less. In such a situation, if the farmers focus on cultivating 'food safe' paddy, it can be exported to maintain the huge demand in the international market," he added.

CII Eastern Region Chairman Suvendra Kumar Behera said that in order to export agricultural products, one has to first understand the needs of the international market. "Emphasis has to be laid on quality standards and less use of fertilisers and pesticides," he said.

"When we are thinking for the export, our quality level should be internationally acceptable otherwise it becomes difficult to export agriculture products in global market," Behera added.

"In the Global market, quality is the benchmark for selling products. We at CII are keen to focus on certification for international standards for carrying out the exports," he said.

Speaking on the occasion, CII Odisha Council chairman Pradipta Mohanty said, "While 60 per cent of the state's labour force is dependent on the agriculture, increasing the income of farmers' remains a challenge."

IUCN list of threatened species grows by 6,000

The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) released its latest Red List of Threatened Species recently. Now in its 60th year, the list sounds the alarm about animals and plants at risk of extinction, but it also highlights conservation success stories such as the Iberian lynx.

The list now includes 1,63,040 species, an increase of about 6,000 from last year. Copiapoa cacti, native to Chile's Atacama coastal desert, the Bornean elephant and the Gran Canaria giant lizard are among the threatened species, IUCN revealed.

Over 45,000 species are now threatened with extinction — 1,000 more than last year — according to an international conservation organisation that blames pressures from climate change, invasive species and human activity such as illicit trade and infrastructural expansion.

Social media trend among extinction drivers

Copiapoa cacti have long been coveted as decorative plants,



driving an illegal trade that has been amplified by social media where enthusiasts and traders showcase and sell the cacti.

A staggering 82 per cent of the species is now at risk of extinction, a significant jump from 55 per cent in 2013, the report said.

IUCN said that the decline is due to the surge in demand for the Chilean cacti in Europe and Asia as ornamental species. The smugglers and poachers facili-

tating the trade, the organisation said, have gained increased accessibility to the plants' habitat due to roads and housing expansion in the Atacama area.

"It is easy to distinguish if Copiapoa cacti have been poached or grown in a greenhouse," said Pablo Guerrero, a member of the IUCN's group on the plants. "Poached copiapoa have a grey tone and are coated in a dusty-looking bloom that protects the

plants in one of the driest deserts on Earth, whereas cultivated plants appear greener."

The 2024 update also highlights the Asian elephant in Borneo as an endangered species. It is estimated that only about 1,000 Bornean elephants remain in the wild, according to IUCN analysis.

The population has decreased over the past 75 years primarily due to extensive logging of Borneo's forests, destroying much of the elephants' habitat. Conflicts with humans, habitat loss due to agriculture and timber plantations, mining and infrastructure development, poaching, exposure to agrochemicals, and vehicle collisions also threaten the species, the IUCN said.

The list also revealed the 'staggering' decline of endemic reptiles — the giant lizard and skink — on the Canary Islands and Ibiza due to predation by the invasive snakes.

Iberian lynx- 'greatest recovery'

In a contrasting tale, conservation efforts have revived the

Iberian lynx from the brink of extinction, with the population increasing from 62 mature individuals in 2001 to 648 in 2022 and more than 2,000 now.

Once considered one of the most endangered wild cat species in the world, their population declined by 87 per cent and the number of breeding females dropped by more than 90 per cent between 1985 and 2001, according to Canada-based International Society for Endangered Cats.


Since 2010, more than 400 Iberian lynx have been reintroduced to parts of Portugal and Spain, IUCN said.

It is "the greatest recovery of a cat species ever achieved through conservation," said Francisco Javier Salcedo Ortiz, who led the conservation action for the Iberian lynx.

But with threats remaining, mainly from fluctuations of their prey's population, poaching and road kills, Salcedo Ortiz said "there is still a lot of work to do to ensure that Iberian lynx populations survive."

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

Gender Gap in IFS

The presence of women in the Indian Foreign Service (IFS) increased by 6.6% to the current 37.8% in the period 2014–2022. Remarkably, between 2018 and 2020, the percentage of female recruits in the IFS surpassed 40%. Observers note that the IFS generally has a higher percentage of women compared to other services like the IAS and IPS.

While this is undeniable progress, a lot more needs to be done to attain gender parity in the diplomatic corps. Historically, women in the IFS faced numerous challenges, such as being excluded from challenging postings and needing government approval to marry, unlike their male counterparts. Pioneers like CB Muthamma fought against these discriminatory practices in 1979, leading to improvements by the 1980s.

Despite these advancements, the IFS remains a relatively small service, an anomaly in the context of India's self-image as a rising force. Over the years, foreign affairs mavens have called for tripling the number of recruits to address the gender gap and strengthen India's global presence. Historically, increasing the number of recruits has led to a higher proportion of women joining the service, as seen in 2015, when 17 women were inducted.

Currently, women head only eight Indian diplomatic missions and none in major capitals. This is a notable decline from 2008, when women led over 25 missions, including key locations. Today, only one of the seven top-level positions in the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) is held by a woman.


To achieve true gender parity in the IFS, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar will have to address the structural and cultural barriers to ensure equal opportunities for women's advancement and leadership. A more inclusive and representative diplomatic corps will better reflect the values and strengths of a modern India on the world stage.

Rapid-fire appointments

The NDA government under Prime Minister Narendra Modi isn't wasting any time. With the new Union Ministers settling into their roles, the Centre is quickly appointing private secretaries to assist them. In the first wave of appointments, private secretaries for Union ministers like Nitin Gadkari, Manohar Lal Khattar, Giriraj Singh and Hardeep Singh Puri were announced. The private secretaries are Shinde Deepak Arjun, Rassal Dwivedi, Raman Kumar, and B Vijay Datta, drawn from the 2010, 2011 and 2012 batches of the IAS. Interestingly, these appointments happened without much input from the ministers themselves, particularly in Gadkari's case.

Subsequently, in the second round, six officers were named as private secretaries to Union ministers. They include Anirudha Sravan Pulpaka of Karnataka cadre as Private Secretary to Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman.

What's driving this hurry? The urgency is due to the 100-day action plan for ministries and departments crafted by bureaucrats and Niti Aayog officials at Modi's directive, even before the elections were announced. Plans needing legislative approval or funding will be spotlighted in the upcoming Budget, set to be presented next month. The government is clearly on a mission to hit the ground running, and these swift appointments are just the beginning.

Gujarat babus show the way

In a generous and touching nod to 'ease of doing business', Gujarat officials are now accepting bribes on an EMI basis to reduce the burden on their victims. Yes, you read that right. These considerate babus have probably taken a leaf from the banking systems, allowing citizens to pay bribes in easy instalments.

Gone are the days of scraping together lump sums for bribes. Need to pay a bribe but can't afford it all at once? No problem! Now, you can spread the cost over several months. For example, earlier this year, someone involved in a State GST bogus billing scam faced a Rs 21 lakh bribery demand. Thankfully, an EMI plan was available: Rs 2 lakh per month for nine months. Similarly, a cybercrime unit officer reportedly demanded Rs 10 lakh but accepted four installments instead.

The trend is spreading, sources have informed DKB. In Surat, a deputy sarpanch and a taluka panchayat member demanded Rs 85,000 from a villager to level his farm. But considering the villager's financial state, they kindly offered an EMI option – Rs 35,000 down payment and the rest in three installments.

In a more dramatic episode, two cops fled with Rs 4 lakh, the first installment of a Rs 10 lakh bribe they demanded from a resident of Sabarkantha district. They couldn't wait for the rest!

Senior police officials admit that this practice is gaining popularity, with at least 10 such cases reported this year alone. But now the rest of the nation is getting to learn about the hitherto hidden aspects of the fabled Gujarat model. Other states may even be inspired to adopt it! But don't forget to tip your hat to Gujarat where it began and thank your stars that you need not empty your pockets all at once; just be prepared for a monthly deduction instead.

Six months ago, at the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Dubai (COP28), the world transcended geopolitical divides – something few believed possible – and united behind a realistic plan, known as the UAE Consensus, to promote sustainable prosperity and address the threat of climate change. Nearly 200 governments and all sectors of the global economy coalesced around a practical, science-based pathway for achieving low-carbon economic growth while keeping 1.5° Celsius within reach.

The key to the agreement's success was inclusivity: no one was excluded, no industry was sidelined, and no solution was off the table. As we move to implementation, the world must leave no stone unturned to accelerate progress. Specifically, that means embracing artificial intelligence, which promises to have a far-reaching, transformational impact on the energy transition and is projected to add \$7 trillion to global GDP over the next ten years.

It is difficult to overstate the potential of AI in the fight against climate change. This evolving technology can change the pace of progress by redesigning industrial processes, optimizing transport systems, maximizing energy efficiency, and minimizing emissions at scale. AI will also strengthen our adaptive resilience through innovations in agriculture, water security, and health.

But AI development will necessarily lead to a surge in energy demand. Resolving the contradiction between AI's thirst for electricity and its potential to accelerate a just transition will require technology and energy firms to cooperate in new and creative ways.

There are grounds for optimism. AI is already driving efficiency gains across industries. Through AIQ, its technology joint venture with G42 and Presight, ADNOC has used predictive maintenance and machine-learning tools to reduce carbon dioxide emissions by up to a million tons in just one year. Other power companies are using neural networks to mitigate the intermittency and storage challenges of renewable energy by forecasting weather patterns and preempting peaks and dips in usage.

In material sciences, researchers are using AI to identify the molecular structures best suited for carbon capture. The technology is also transforming agriculture, another energy-intensive sector, by analyzing micronutrients, enhancing crop yields, and minimizing water use by as much as 40%. Over the next five to ten years, AI is expected to enable breakthroughs in fusion, hydrogen, and modular nuclear power; long-term battery storage, and as-yet-unimagined climate solutions.

The flipside to AI's transformative potential is its insatiable energy consumption, which is putting additional stress on an already-stretched power system. Since 2019, emissions from the largest AI firms have increased by roughly 30%. By 2030, demand for data-center power worldwide is expected to grow by 160%, owing to the technology's vast processing needs, and these new operations could consume as much electricity as Canada, implying a doubling of carbon dioxide emissions. Bridging this gap will be difficult, as no single energy source is currently capable of meeting such a huge leap in demand.

Major tech companies are starting to collaborate with energy companies to face this challenge head-on. In May, Microsoft and Brookfield closed a deal to develop 10.5 gigawatts of renewable capacity by 2030. Masdar, the United Arab Emirates' leading renewable energy company, is on track to quadruple its capacity to 100 gigawatts by 2030 and is exploring opportunities to supply the tech sector with clean electricity. There is also increased investment in nuclear-powered data centers, although these will take decades to build.

Adopting a holistic approach is critical to addressing these problems and reaping AI's potential benefits. To that end, I am convening a “Change Makers Majlis” – a majlis being a traditional gathering that encourages the exchange of diverse perspectives – in Abu Dhabi in November to discuss AI and the energy transition. Business leaders from the energy and technology sectors, policymakers, investors, and civil-society organizations will come together to reimagine the relationship between energy, AI, and inclusive economic growth.

The UAE has an established track record as a responsible energy supplier. Given our commitment to sustainable development, and our emergence as an AI leader –with investment platforms like MGX, infrastructure developers like G42, and the region's largest and fastest-growing large language model, Falcon – we are keen to bring all relevant stakeholders together on an issue of profound importance to all humanity. By building a bridge between energy and AI, we can help realize the UAE Consensus and, in doing so, take advantage of the greatest economic opportunity since the First Industrial Revolution.

Data key for decision making

DESPITE INDIA BEING THE WORLD'S LARGEST DATA GOLDMINE, ITS POTENTIAL IS OFTEN LIMITED BY QUALITY ISSUES, PREVENTING FULL UTILIZATION FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE PEOPLE

Prasanta Chandra Mahalanobis, known as the Father of Indian Statistics once said, “As we interpret it, the fundamental aim of statistics is to give determinate and adequate knowledge of reality with the help of numbers and numerical analysis.

These words have stood the test of time, as the reliance on data to make informed choices has grown exponentially in our increasingly complex societies.

Throughout history, data has played a pivotal role in shaping policies, improving governance, and driving innovations.

In contemporary India, the use of data for decision-making has been instrumental in various landmark initiatives.

For example, the Green Revolution of the 1960s relied heavily on agricultural data to boost crop yields and achieve food self-sufficiency.

Similarly, the Aadhaar project, the world's largest biometric identification system, uses vast amounts of data to streamline service delivery and reduce fraud.

The census provides foundational data essential for informed, data-driven decision making across various sectors and policy domains. Conducting the census in India is crucial for effective governance, equitable resource allocation, and informed policy-making. Accurate and up-to-date demographic data ensures that government programmes and services reach those who need them most, supports long-term development planning, and maintains fair representation in electoral constituencies.

Despite India being the world's largest data goldmine, its potential is often limited by quality issues, preventing full utilization for the benefit of the people. Key challenges include data collection biases, data entry inconsistencies, and a lack of standardized indicators. Poor data quality impacts decision-making, programme planning, organizational culture, timely interventions, and operational costs.

The Indian Civil Registration System (CRS) shows promise as a superior tool for subnational mortality measurement despite ongoing development challenges. In contrast, the Sample Registration System (SRS), covering less than 1% of the population, serves as an interim data source. While CRS boasts extensive infrastructure and high reporting, it underreports child and female deaths in many states. SRS data, though less precise, reveal mortality trends. Limited hospital reporting hampers medically certified causes of death data. Enhancing child and female death recording, improving reporting quality, and promoting verbal autopsy methods are critical for establishing CRS as a dependable subnational mortality statistics source.

Developed by the National Data Quality Forum (NDQF), National Guidelines for Data Quality in Surveys, provide principles for survey design, implementation, and analysis to ensure high-quality data. They cover phases of data quality assurance: preparatory (pre-tested sampling, study design), data collection (monitoring, regular reviews), and post-collection (analytical techniques, quality reporting). Machine learning aids real-time data monitoring by identifying patterns and detecting outliers.

Clearly defined data strategies and strong data systems are fundamental for evidence generation and data-driven governance. An integrated data policy covering the three pillars of data preparedness (data strategy, data systems and data-driven outcomes) needs to be adopted by all government agencies. The Data Governance Quality Index (DGQI) Methodology Toolkit by NITI Aayog, offers a framework for Indian government agencies to assess their data preparedness. This aids in internal review and cross-departmental comparison, aiming to promote evidence-based decision-making for improved governance.

Making data-driven decisions doesn't have to be daunting. It begins with a shift in mindset, akin to the transformative step taken in 1999 when the ICC

adopted the Duckworth-Lewis system. This statistical marvel calculates target scores in rain-affected matches, ensuring fairness and accuracy despite interruptions.

In everyday life, individuals increasingly rely on data to inform their decisions, transcending personal biases and anecdotal evidence. Whether choosing a route based on traffic data, making dietary choices guided by nutritional information, or evaluating investment options using historical performance data, the use of objective evidence helps navigate uncertainties and optimize outcomes.

A data-driven approach enables government-generated data to yield insights, convey information, and evaluate the health impact of policies and programs. Access to reliable and timely data is crucial for effectively planning, managing public health services, and addressing public health issues and crises.

Through the lens of data, we can envision a future where decisions are not just informed but are also intelligent, equitable, and impactful.

India’s capital goes from extreme heat to floods

Delhi grapples with unprecedented rainfall following scorching temperatures nearing 50 degrees Celsius. Within 24 hours, the city received a record-breaking 228.1 mm of rain, surpassing June’s average and causing severe water-logging and chaos

New Delhi, June 28: The residents of Delhi, who endured one of the worst heatwaves in history earlier this month, now face severe water-logging with record-breaking rainfall in just 24 hours, surpassing the city’s average for the entire month of June.

The torrential downpour caused a fatal airport roof collapse, disrupted flights, closed a metro station, blocked underpasses, and led to massive traffic jams, turning the city’s relief from the heat into chaos.

What’s happening?

The Indian capital of 20 million people received 228.1 mm rainfall in 24 hours at its main Safdarjung weather station until 8:30 am (0300 GMT) Friday, a 266% departure from normal, according to the India Meteorological Department (IMD).

Delhi has not recorded so much rain in the entire month of June at least in the last 15 years, IMD data shows. In three hours alone Friday, areas around the Delhi airport got 148.5 mm of rain, compared with 101.7 mm for all of June last year.

The seasonal monsoon rain, which slowly covers the country



beginning from its southern tip at the end of May, brought respite from heatwave conditions that persisted in Delhi until last week. Temperatures this summer has neared 50 degrees Celsius in the city and it has recorded at least 40 consecutive days of temperatures at or above 40 degrees Celsius till June 22, according to IMD data.

An IMD official said the progress of the monsoon was stalled for a week, which led to lower rainfall and heat waves in northern India, but sudden thunderstorms last week in the region pushed the monsoon clouds back on track. This, he said, will help the monsoon cover the entire country on time or even a few days ahead of the normal schedule.

Why the extremes?

For every degree increase in earth’s temperature, the amount of water vapour in the atmosphere can increase by about 7%, according to a NASA article, opens new tab. Experts say that can lead to heavy rains in a short period of time.

“Because of climate change, you will get more extreme rain events, which means more rain in a fewer number of rainy days, rainy hours,” Sunita Narain, Director General of Research Body Centre for Science and Environment, said

in a recent video post.

“If you look at the data from across India, you will find that many weather stations are already reporting that they are breaking the record of 24-hour rainfall, which means that a city, a region, can get its annual rain, as much as a whole year’s rain, in a matter of a few days or even one day.”

What needs to be done?

Delhi has endured erratic monsoon patterns over the last 40 years, facing both deficient and excessive rainfall, said Vishwas Chitale, at think-tank Council on Energy, Environment and Water. “Such skewed distribution of rainfall impacts infrastructure and people severely, which re-emphasises the importance of climate proofing infrastructure and the economy,” he said.

Experts say India needs to dig more lakes and ponds to store the water from heavy rain to prevent massive water shortages in places like Delhi and Bengaluru. Municipalities need to ensure drains and canals are unclogged to avoid heavy flooding and major disruptions.

The country also needs to substantially increase its green cover and raise public awareness about the impacts of heat, stagger work hours and change school timings.

Guwahati/Agartala, June 28:

Over 3,500 police personnel in seven northeastern states have received training while hundreds more security officers of different ranks would be trained on the execution of the three new criminal laws coming into force from July 1.

The new criminal laws, namely Bharatiya Nyay Sanhita (BNS), Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNSS), and Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam (BSA) will replace the Indian Penal Code (IPC), Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), and the Indian Evidence Act, respectively, from July 1.

Officials said that all the state governments in the northeastern have taken numerous steps to ensure the smooth implementation of the three new criminal laws.

Assam DGP Gyanendra Pratap Singh said that around 200 officers of Assam Police have already received training on criminal forensic science while over 500 officers would be trained in the next few months.

Addressing a workshop, Additional Director General of Police, CID, Munna Prasad Gupta, asserted that major changes have been made in the three criminal laws with more focus on the rights of the victim, especially for women and children.



There will be more use of technology in the judicial system under the new setup, Gupta said, adding that the three new laws will focus on speedy justice rather than punishment.

He also said that these laws would make the justice system hassle-free, wherein digital evidence will be at par with physical evidence.

A similar workshop was organised in Agartala by the Press Information Bureau (PIB) of the Information and Broadcasting Ministry in association with the Tripura State Legal Services Authority, Tripura Judicial Academy, National Law University, and the Government Law College.

Addressing the workshop, Tripura Advocate General Siddhartha Shankar Dey said the country will finally have its own criminal laws after 75 years of Independence, during the

‘Amrit Kaal’.

Referring to the ‘Nirbhaya’ gangrape and murder case of 2012, he said it was an eye-opener for our legal system to understand the necessity of making our own laws to build up a sound justice delivery system.

Tripura DGP (Intelligence) Anurag said the facility of filing ‘Zero FIR’ is being provided under the ambit of the new laws, which allows the citizens to file an FIR from anywhere through e-mail.

Over 800 police officers and security personnel of different ranks in eight districts of Tripura have been provided training on the three new criminal laws.

In Mizoram, officials said that around 1,500 police personnel from 11 districts have been trained so far.

Besides 93 per cent of the police staff and supervisory officers, training has also been given to

1,965 persons comprising church leaders, students, and functionaries of various NGOs.

The state government has constituted five new committees to deal with the legal issues, technology upgradation, training, digital investigation, and financial implications.

“These committees studied the various needs and requirements and made suggestions and recommendations based on these studies to ensure the successful implementation of the new laws,” an official said.

In Meghalaya, the state’s Law Department has organised several sensitisation programmes in different districts to make the police and other law enforcement officers familiar with the three new laws.

In Manipur, an awareness-cum-sensitisation campaign on the three new laws was organised by Manipur University. The campaign aims to create awareness among the masses about the new laws.

Over 500 police officers have been trained in Manipur so far. In Arunachal Pradesh, Chief Secretary Dharmendra chaired a meeting of the State Level Steering Committee (SLSC) last week on the implementation of the three new criminal laws.

He said the state police and the Law Department are dedicatedly working to implement the new laws from July 1.

Power demand surges in Delhi

New Delhi, June 28: Delhi recorded a sizable jump in temperature-related electricity demand in the last 12 months, with peak demand rising by an average of 711 megawatts (MW) on the hottest and most humid days, according to a new analysis published Friday.

The report by the independent think tank Institute for Energy Economics and Financial Analysis (IEEFA) said Delhi’s peak power demand rose by an average of 506 MW on cold and dry days but only by 188 MW on days when the temperature and humidity were moderate. The analysis used wet-bulb temperature (WBT) as a yardstick.

The wet-bulb temperature (WBT) is the lowest tempera-



ture to which a person or object can be cooled solely by the evaporation of water.

At the other end of the temperature scale, the increase was smaller on very cold and dry days (7.5 degrees Celsius WBT) but still significant at 506 MW, or 2.7 times higher than the increase on moderate days.

This suggests that Delhi’s recent power demand growth can largely be attributed to cooling and heating, with more year-round factors (such as those related to economic growth) playing a far smaller role. “There

were 24 such hot and humid days in 2022-23, which jumped to 40 days in the 12-month period just completed,” it said. WBTs above 35 degrees Celsius have been considered impossible to survive in for more than a few hours.

“Temperature levels which directly threaten human health have been surpassed far more often in this year’s heatwave. Cooling on such days is no luxury; it is life-saving, and reliably meeting electricity demand is of utmost importance,” the note’s author, Charles Worringham, a guest contributor at IEEFA, said.

A prolonged heatwave drove the national capital’s peak power demand to 8,647 MW June 19, the highest-ever for the city, according to power discom (distribution companies) officials.

KUMARGHAT TRAGEDY

Tripura brings new norms for Rath Yatra chariots

Agartala, June 28: Following last year’s tragic incident at Kumarghat in Tripura’s Unakoti district where ten devotees lost their lives during Ulta Rath Yatra, the West Tripura district administration Friday instructed organisers to keep the height of Lord Jagannath’s chariots below five feet.

“We held a meeting with all stakeholders of the upcoming rath yatra festival scheduled to commence July 7. We have instructed organisers that the height of chariots should not exceed 5 feet to prevent incidents like Kumarghat. Additionally, we have emphasised minimising the use of metal in construction of chariots,” West Tripura district magistrate Vishal Kumar told reporters.

The Public Works Department (PWD) and Tripura Electricity Corporation Ltd (TECL) will inspect the proposed chariots, with TECL specifically checking transmission lines along the designated routes of the rath yatra, he said. Kumar further assured the deployment of ambulances and increased police presence to prevent any untoward incidents.

Ten devotees died of electrocution and 16 others were injured as a rath, made of iron and heavily decorated, came in contact with a high-tension wire in Unakoti district June 29, 2023.

RAIMONA NATIONAL PARK

Rare ‘Mainland Serow’ spotted in Assam forest

Guwahati, June 28: The first photographic evidence of the ‘Mainland Serow,’ a vulnerable mammal species recognised by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), has been documented in Assam’s Raimona National Park by Forest officials and conservationists, an official said.

The photographic evidence of the ‘Mainland Serow’ was captured twice by Forest department personnel and members of the biodiversity group ‘Aaranyak’ using digital camera traps near the Ganda Bajrum Anti-poaching camp, in the western range of Raimona National Park.

“The discovery of the Mainland Serow in Raimona National Park is good news for biodiversity conservation, and we are thrilled by the finding,” said Bhanu Sinha, Divisional Forest Officer of the



Kachugaon Forest Division.

The Forest department’s goal is to conserve this species and other wildlife extensively found in the national park, Sinha added.

The Mainland Serow population is widely distributed in the neighboring Phibsoo Wildlife Sanctuary and the Royal Manas National Park of Bhutan, which may contribute to the population recovery in Raimona National Park.

The finding has been published as a scientific paper in the Journal of Threatened Taxa.

“There is a wealth of wildlife in Raimona National Park, and the discovery of this species is good news for the conservation world,” said M.

Firoz Ahmed, a senior scientist at Aaranyak.

The Mainland Serow (Capricornis sumatraensis thar) is found across various habitats extending from the Himalayas on the Indian subcontinent to southern China, mainland Southeast Asia, and Sumatra, Ahmed said.

The species’ populations are fragmented, isolated, and rapidly declining due to poaching, habitat destruction, and habitat loss, according to senior conservationist Dipankar Lahkar. The lack of reliable data on this species’ abundance and distribution makes it difficult to implement effective conservation actions to ensure long-term survival, Lahkar added.

Occasional poaching for bushmeat and habitat alteration due to logging during ethnopolitical violence are the primary conservation concerns of Raimona National Park.

Southwest monsoon covers entire J'hkhand

Ranchi: The southwest monsoon covered entire Jharkhand Friday despite a significant 69 per cent rain deficit, with five districts experiencing over 80 per cent shortfall, a Meteorological Department official said. Although the monsoon arrived June 21, which was 11 days later than usual, it took approximately eight more days to encompass the entire state due to its delayed progress. The weather department predicted widespread rainfall with possibility of one or two spells of heavy rains in few pockets of the state June 29 and 30 under influence of a low pressure.

Flood situation improves in Assam

Guwahati: The flood situation improved further Friday with the water levels of major rivers and their tributaries receding, according to the Assam State Disaster Management Authority (ASDMA). However, around 1.07 lakh people are still suffering because of the disaster in five districts of the state, and one more person lost his life in Barpeta, taking the toll so far in this year's flood, landslide and storm to 42. Over 1.15 lakh people were suffering because of the deluge Thursday.

EAM to represent India at SCO summit

New Delhi: External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar will represent India at the annual summit of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) in Astana next week. The summit, to be held July 3 and 4, is expected to focus on the regional security situation and ways to boost connectivity and trade. "The Indian delegation at the SCO summit will be led by external affairs minister S Jaishankar," external affairs ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said at his weekly media briefing.

MAHA BUDGET Oppn slams govt's torrential assurances

Mumbai, June 28: The Opposition in Maharashtra Friday targeted the Eknath Shinde government over its last budget before the state goes to the polls later this year, describing it as a "torrent of assurances" but said there was no clarity on how the money will be raised for the schemes announced.

Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar, who holds the finance portfolio, earlier in the day presented a ₹20,051 crore revenue deficit budget in which he announced sops for women, youth and farmers and other segments of society that entail an outlay of more than ₹80,000 crore.

Shiv Sena (UBT) chief Uddhav Thackeray said the budget was a "false narrative" pretending to offer something to every section of society.

Talking to reporters at the legislative complex here, the former Chief Minister said the 'Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin' scheme under which a monthly allowance of ₹1,500 would be given to the eligible women was a "pitiable attempt" to woo women voters ahead of the Assembly elections.

Thackeray asked why similar allowance was not announced for men as unemployment was on the rise, and said nothing was being done to create jobs.

A committee of experts should

be formed to find out how many of the schemes announced by the BJP-Shiv Sena-NCP 'Mahayuti' government in the last two years were implemented, said Thackeray.

There was no mention of how the funds would be raised, the former Chief Minister said.

On the waiver of electricity bills of farmers, Thackeray said although his demand in this regard was accepted by the government, his main demand that farmers be made debt-free remains unfulfilled.

The schemes announced in the budget would not help the ruling coalition as the people were waiting for Assembly polls to defeat it, he said.

Maharashtra Congress chief Nana Patole too hit out at the Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana asking what a sum of ₹1,500 could do at the time of rising inflation.

Patole said the scheme to waive farmers' electricity bill is a farce, adding that the state government has ignored the woes of the people and the Congress' demand to waive farmers' loan completely on the lines of Telangana. Mahesh Tapase, chief spokesperson of the Sharad Pawar-led Nationalist Congress Party, accused the government of financial mismanagement and highlighted that debt burden of the state has crossed ₹7 lakh crore.

POCSO case: Relief for BS Yediyurappa

Bangalore, June 28: The Karnataka High Court Friday extended by two weeks its interim order restraining the Criminal Investigation Department (CID) from arresting former Chief Minister B S Yediyurappa, in connection with a case registered against the BJP leader under POCSO Act.

The bench of Justice Krishna S Dixit continued its June 14 order, as it permitted the prosecution to file its objections to the petition filed by Yediyurappa seeking quashing of the case.

The Special Public Prosecutor sought time to file objections, and maintained that Yediyurappa's petition may not survive as a chargesheet has already been filed. The CID Thursday filed a chargesheet at the Fast Track Court 1 for POCSO Act cases here against Yediyurappa and three of his aides in connection with the case based on a complaint by the mother of a 17-year-old girl who alleged that he sexually assaulted her daughter during a meeting February two this year, at his residence in Dollars Colony here.

Yediyurappa was questioned for over three hours by the CID June 17.

The 81-year-old Yediyurappa has been charged under Section 8 (punishment for sexual assault) of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act and Sections 354A (sexual harassment), 204 (destruction of document or electronic record to prevent its production as evidence) and 214 (offering gift or restoration of property in consideration of screening offender) of the Indian Penal Code (IPC).



I am victim of conspiracy: Soren

Ranchi, June 28: After spending around five months in jail in a money laundering case, former Jharkhand Chief Minister Hemant Soren was granted bail Friday and, after stepping out of the prison, the JMM leader alleged that he was a victim of a conspiracy.

Soren, the executive president of the Jharkhand Mukti Morcha (JMM), was arrested by the Enforcement Directorate (ED) January 31 in connection with its investigation into the money laundering case linked to a land scam. The court had June 13 reserved its order on the 48-year-old politician's bail plea. "...The petitioner is directed to be released on bail on furnishing bail bond of ₹50,000 with two sureties of the like amount each," said the 55-page order passed by Justice



Rongon Mukhopadhyay.

Soren was released from Birs Munda Jail here around 4 pm after completion of legal formalities, an official said. Jharkhand Chief Minister Champai Soren and his West Bengal counterpart Mamata Banerjee welcomed the court's order granting bail to Soren. The former CM's wife Kalpana Soren, a JMM legislator, also thanked the judiciary. "The court has held that prima facie he is

not guilty of the offence and there is no likelihood of the petitioner committing an offence when on bail," Soren's senior counsel Arunabh Chowdhury told PTI.

As Soren stepped out of the jail, a large number of JMM supporters cheered and raised slogans in favour of him. The leader also waved at them. Addressing the media he claimed that he was falsely implicated in a money laundering case and was forced to spend about five months in jail.

In a veiled attack on the BJP, Soren said he was concerned about how the voice of political leaders, social workers and journalists was being silenced in the country. "I was falsely implicated. A conspiracy was hatched against me and I was forced to spend five months in jail," Soren said.

ing a discussion on an issue before the House takes up the Motion of Thanks. "There is a difference between protest on the road and protest inside the House... You (Opposition) don't want House to run? You don't want to discuss NEET during Motion of Thanks discussion?" Birla said.

As the House continued to see uproar, Birla adjourned the proceedings till Monday. Amid din, TMC member S K Nurul Islam took oath as a Lok Sabha member from his seat as he was visibly unwell.

Earlier when the House met in morning, Opposition members were up on their feet seeking the acceptance of an adjournment motion to suspend all business and discuss matters related to NEET.

However, Birla said he would first take up the obituary references to 13 former members, including ex-Lok Sabha speaker and ex-Maharashtra chief minister Manohar Joshi. When the obituary references were over, the Opposition members were on their feet again.

ED files 9th chargesheet in Delhi excise policy case

New Delhi, June 28: The Enforcement Directorate Friday filed a fresh and the ninth charge sheet in the Delhi excise policy-linked money laundering case naming a person called Vinod Chauhan as an accused, official sources said.

Chauhan was arrested by the federal agency in May as part of this investigation. The sources said a fresh and the ninth prosecution complaint (charge sheet) was filed before a special Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) court here naming Vinod Chauhan.

He was the 18th person to have been arrested by the ED in this case in which it has also taken into custody Delhi Chief Minister and AAP supremo Arvind Kejriwal, his party colleague and former Deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia, Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) MP Sanjay Singh, BRS leader and former Telangana CM K Chandrashekar Rao's politician daughter K Kavitha and several liquor businessmen and others. The ED has mentioned the alleged role of Chauhan in this case in an official document submitted before a court in relation to the arrest of Kavitha.

The agency had earlier charged that out of the ₹100-crore bribe money given to the AAP in the Delhi excise policy by the South Group -- consisting of Kavitha and some others as members -- ₹45 crore was used for its Goa assembly election campaign. The excise case pertains to alleged corruption and money laundering in formulating and executing the Delhi government's excise policy for 2021-22, which was later scrapped.

Delhi Lieutenant Governor V K Saxena had recommended a CBI probe into the alleged irregularities. Subsequently, the ED registered a case under the PMLA.

Taking cognisance of a CBI FIR lodged August 17, 2022, the ED filed its money laundering case August 22, 2022 to probe the alleged irregularities.

India slams 'deeply biased' US religious freedom report

New criminal laws to come into force July 1

New Delhi, June 28: All 17,500 police stations in the country will hold a special event July 1 involving women, youth, students, senior citizens and eminent personalities to apprise them the key features of the new criminal laws, which will come into force on that day, official sources said.

The new laws -- Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita 2023, Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita 2023 and Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam 2023 -- will come into effect from July 1. These laws are set to replace the British-era Indian Penal Code, Code of Criminal Procedure and the Indian Evidence Act respectively. Sources said coinciding with commencement of these three criminal laws, an event will be held July 1 by the officer-in-charge of each police station in all states and Union Territories highlighting the key features of the new criminal laws.

The programme at the police station or a suitable place will in-



volve women, youth, students, senior citizens, retired police officers, eminent personalities and members of self-help groups, anganwadi centres and local peace committee and also educational institutions like schools, colleges etc, they said. According to a data of the Police Organizations compiled by Bureau of Police Research & Development (BPR&D), there are over 17,500 police stations in the country.

All higher education institutions under the University Grants Commission (UGC), All India

Council for Technical Education (AICTE) as well as in the states and UTs will organise a day long activities July 1 that will focus on group discussions, workshops, seminars on various provisions of new criminal laws, highlighting the major transformation intended to achieve the ends of justice with wide participation of students, faculties and other staff.

Zero FIR, registration of police complaints online, summons through electronic modes and mandatory videography of crime scenes of all heinous crimes are

Arunachal to use English, Hindi versions of new criminal laws

Itanagar: Arunachal Pradesh will use the English and Hindi versions of the three new criminal laws since the state's people speak in "innumerable" dialects, an official said Friday. Officials and other people concerned are being trained on the new laws in English and Hindi, he said. English is the official language of the northeastern state. From July 1, three new criminal laws, Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita 2023, Bharatiya Nagrik Suraksha Sanhita 2023 and Bharatiya Sakshya Adhiniyam 2023, will come into effect across the country. These laws will replace the Indian Penal Code 1860, Indian Evidence Act 1872 and the Code of Criminal Procedure 1973.

the key highlights of the three new criminal laws. The Union home ministry is gearing up to roll out the three new criminal laws from next week with 40 lakh grassroots functionaries trained to ensure people are aware about the legislations and the impact these will have on everyone, particularly women and children, official sources said Wednesday.

Under the new laws, victims will receive a free copy of the FIR, ensuring their participation in the legal process. An interesting addition of the law

is that in the event of an arrest, the individual has the right to inform a person of his choice about his or her situation. This will ensure immediate support and assistance to the arrested individual.

To strengthen the case and investigations, it has become mandatory for forensic experts to visit crime scenes for serious offences and collect evidence. Additionally, the process of evidence collection at the crime scene will be mandatorily video-graphed to prevent tampering of evidence.

New Delhi, June 28: Five people died in rain-related incidents in Delhi Friday as Monsoon arrived with a fury early in the morning, lashing the city with its highest rainfall in a single day of June in 88 years which brought it to a standstill with streets flooded, traffic in chaos and some commuters stranded on roads.

The deceased included a cab driver who died after a portion of a canopy at the Delhi airport collapsed on cars following the rains. Flight operations were suspended at Delhi airport's Terminal-1 following the incident. A 39-year-old man was electrocuted in Rohini's Prem Nagar area after he came in contact with a live wire. Two children drowned in a rainwater pool in New Usmanpur area.

Police Also said that a man in his late 20s drowned in rainwater accumulated at an underpass in northwest Delhi's Shalimar Bagh area.

Besides, three labourers were trapped when an under construction wall in Vasant Vihar collapsed early morning. Rescue operations continued till evening, their hopes of survival dimming with each passing minute.

Key tunnels like the one at Pragati Maidan were closed and reports of homes being flooded came in from across the city, including the upscale areas of Lutyens' Delhi. Bungalows of Delhi Water Minister Atishi and several MPs, including Congress's Shashi Tharoor and Manish Tewari and Samjawadi

Party's Ramgopal Yadav, were flooded. In several areas, vehicles were submerged as rainwater flooded streets. Many areas experienced severe power cuts and several trees were uprooted. In Kishanganj, passengers stuck inside a bus under the flooded Kodia Bridge underpass were pulled out by police and rescue teams. Using life jackets and water tubes tied with ropes, officials waded through the water to take out the passengers.

According to India Meteorological Department (IMD) data, 228.1 mm of rainfall was recorded at Safdarjung, the city's primary weather station, 192.8 mm at Lodhi Road, Mausam Bhavan, 150.4 mm at Ridge, 106.6 mm at Palam, and 66.3 mm at Ayanagar in the last 20 to 30 hours. The IMD, which defines very heavy rain as rainfall amounting to between 124.5 and 244.4 mm in a day, said that

Waterlogging in many areas of the city led to a flood-like situation forcing vehicles to crawl amid massive traffic jams.

TN passes resolution to scrap NEET exam

Chennai, June 28: The Tamil Nadu Assembly Friday once again passed a unanimous resolution urging the Centre to exempt the state from National



Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test and allow it to admit students to medical courses based on Plus Two exam marks.

The resolution, adopted by the House amid the BJP's Opposition and walkout, called upon the Centre to amend the National Medical Commission Act and abolish the country-wide screening test taking into account the irregularities and in-

creasing Opposition to the test in several states, which toed Tamil Nadu's line.

BJP's ally, the PMK, however, supported the resolution piloted by Chief Minister and DMK president M K Stalin, who argued that the test was discriminatory and deprived an opportunity for the rural and poor students to access medical education and denied states their rights to admit students with Plus Two marks as the qualifying criteria. AIADMK general secretary and former Chief Minister Edappadi K Palaniswami, accused the DMK of having done precious little to abolish NEET, and asked "what is the point in bringing a resolution in the Assembly for the third time?"

"This is just another political drama of the DMK government. People no longer believe in such futile political gimmicks that try to conceal the Kallakurichi illicit liquor deaths," Palaniswami said in a post on the social media platform X.

New Delhi, June 28: Nearly five billion people globally, including 619 million from India, experienced climate-change-driven extreme heat over nine days in June, according to a new analysis by an independent group of scientists based in the US.

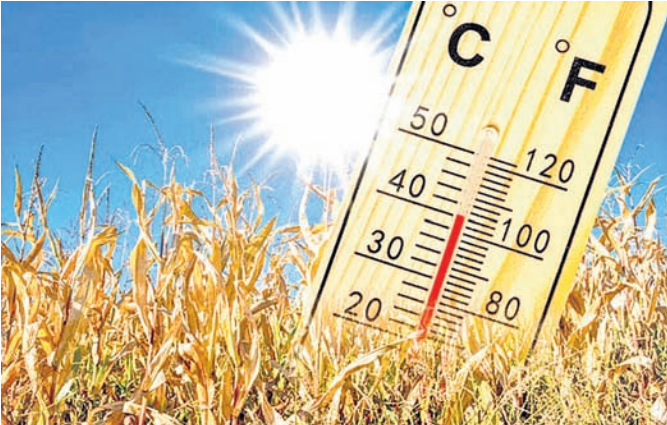
"More than 60 per cent of the world population faced extreme heat that was made at least three times more likely by climate change during June 16-24," it said. Andrew Pershing, chief program officer at Climate Central, said, "More than a century of burning coal, oil, and natural gas has given us an increasingly dangerous world. The heat waves around the world this summer are unnatural dis-

asters that will become more common until carbon pollution stops."

Climate Central's Climate Shift Index (CSI) determines the influence of climate change on temperatures around the globe. "Between June 16-24, 4.97 billion people experienced extreme heat reaching CSI levels of at least 3, indicating that climate change made these temperatures at least three times more likely to occur," the report said.

India, which experienced one of its hottest and longest heat waves, recorded more than 40,000 suspected heat stroke cases and over 100 heat-related deaths. The intense heat overwhelmed the water supply system and power grids, with Delhi grappling with a severe water crisis.

619 million affected in June: Report



According to the India Meteorological Department, around 40 per cent of the country recorded double the number of heatwave days than usual during the April to June period. Temperatures breached 50 degrees Celsius in parts of Rajasthan, with nighttime temperatures hovering around 35 degrees Celsius in many places. In Delhi, which logged 40 consecutive days of temperatures above 40 degrees Celsius since May 13, there have been around

60 heat-related deaths this year, according to media reports.

In Saudi Arabia, at least 1,300 people died from heat-related illnesses during the annual Haj pilgrimage. Temperatures were extremely high, with some cities surpassing 50 degrees Celsius.

Climate Central's analysis found that the city of Mecca experienced temperatures made at least three times more likely due to climate change every day since May 18, and five times more likely since May 24.

A previous analysis by climate scientists at Climameter, an EU-funded initiative, found that climate change made the heat wave in Saudi Arabia up to 2.5 degrees Celsius hotter.

The US suffered two back-to-back heat episodes during the last two weeks of June.

The first heat wave affected the southern part of the country, Mexico, and countries in Central America.

In Mexico, at least 125 people died, with temperatures reaching 52 degrees Celsius in the Sonora state June 21.

A study by the World Weather Attribution group found that climate change made the extreme heat of May and June 35 times more likely.

In Egypt, high temperatures nearing 50 degrees Celsius have been recorded in recent days. In the southern province of Aswan, at least 40 people have died. The high temperatures have caused a surge in energy consumption across the country, forcing the government to impose daily power cuts to avoid overloading the electrical grid.

Haveri (Karnataka), June 28: As many as 13 people, including two children died and four others were injured after the van they were travelling in allegedly collided with a lorry at Gundinahalli cross in Byadagi Taluk early Friday, police said.

The deceased children, both boys, were aged four and six, they said. Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah has announced a compensation of ₹2 lakh each to the kin of those who died in the accident.

According to police, the accident occurred around 3.45 am when the van collided with a lorry which was parked on the side of National Highway 48 in Byadagi in Haveri district.

A total of 17 persons were travelling in the van. Of them, eleven people died on the spot while two others were declared dead at a hospital, a senior police official said. Among the four injured, two are admitted in the ICU of the hospital, he said.

"The victims were coming from Chincholi Mayamma Devasthanam and heading to their native Yemehatti village in Shivamogga district. The lorry was standing on the side of the highway. The van hit the lorry from behind," Anshu Kumar Srivastava, Superintendent of Police (Haveri) told PTI.

The bodies have been shifted to the mortuary and the injured have been admitted to Haveri Government Hospital, he said.

Police suspected that the driver dozed off resulting in the accident. Because of the impact of the collision, the bodies were stuck in the mangled remains of the van and the fire brigade and police personnel had a difficult time in extricating them, police said.

The deceased have been identified as Nagesh (50), Vishalakshi (40), Adarsh (23), Parashuram (45), Bhagya (40), Punya (50), Manasa (24), Roopa (40), Subhadra Bai (65), Manjula Bai (62) and Manjula (50), police said. Names of the deceased children have not been shared by the police. Police further said Nagesh, Vishalakshi and Adarsh were from the same family. It is also learnt that Nagesh was behind the wheel. "Nagesh had purchased a new van (tempo traveller) and had decided to pay his obeisance with his parents and relatives to Tulja Bhavani in Maharashtra, Renuka Yallamma in Savadatti and Mariyamma in Chincholi in Belagavi," family sources said.

Dubai: Iranians voted Friday for a new President following the death of Ebrahim Raisi in a helicopter crash, choosing from a tightly controlled group of four candidates loyal to the supreme leader at a time of growing public frustration and Western pressure. Three candidates are hardliners and one is a low-profile comparative moderate, backed by the reformist faction that has largely been sidelined in Iran in recent years.

Missile blast in air: SK exposes North

Seoul: South Korea's military Friday released a video that it said showed a North Korean missile abnormally spiralling early in flight and exploding, a rare publicising of surveillance footage to dismiss the North's claim of a successful test. Footage filmed by a thermal observation device with South Korean frontline units showed a projectile spiralling out of control on an irregular flight path, then disintegrating. The South Korean military assessed that "instability during flight" led to the missile's explosion, it said in a statement Friday.

Sex assault cases against US soldiers

Tokyo: Japan's government protested Friday to the US Embassy in Tokyo over at least two sexual assault cases involving American servicemembers on the southern Japanese island of Okinawa which were only recently made public. In one case, an Air Force member is accused of assaulting a 16-year-old girl in December, while the other, which dates from May, involves a Marine who is accused of assaulting a 21-year-old woman.

'Pak can target TTP sanctuaries'

Islamabad: Defence Minister Khawaja Asif has warned that Pakistan can target sanctuaries of the outlawed terrorist group TTP in Afghanistan under the newly launched military operation, as he ruled out any dialogue with the dreaded outfit as there was no "common ground". The government announced the launch of 'Operation Azm-i-Istehkam' last week to tackle the rising threat of terrorism in the wake of lukewarm support by the Afghan Taliban to stop the use of their soil by the Tehreek-i-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) rebels against Pakistan.

Dems scramble to limit damage

Biden's wobbly debate show against Trump is likely to take a heavy toll during US presidential election

Atlanta, June 28: President Joe Biden's allies scrambled to contain the fallout Friday from his faltering performance at the first 2024 US presidential debate after he struggled to stem a barrage of attacks and false claims from his Republican rival Donald Trump.

The Biden campaign had hoped that a strong debate would quell concerns among voters that the 81-year-old Democratic incumbent is too old to serve a second four-year term.

Instead, a hoarse Biden stumbled over his words and lost his train of thought at times, especially early in the debate.

One Biden donor, who asked for anonymity, called his performance "disqualifying" and predicted that some Democrats would revisit calls for Biden to

step aside in favor of another candidate before the party's national convention in August.

Panicking Democrats exchanged messages wondering whether Biden would consider stepping down.

One senior Democratic strategist said there would be calls for Biden to step down.

One such plea came from Thomas Friedman, the New York Times columnist who has the President's ear, who called Biden a good man and a good President in an opinion piece early Friday. But to stop Trump, he wrote, "The President has to come forward and declare that he will not be running for re-election."

"It's not likely to happen," retorted Biden campaign co-chair Mitch Landrieu on CNN. As the dust clears from the debate and with four months left before the election, he predicted Biden and Trump would be the nominees in November.

Josh Shapiro, the Democratic governor of Pennsylvania, urged Democrats to stop worrying and start working.

"Joe Biden had a bad debate, right, but Donald Trump was a

EU leaders nominate Von der Leyen to head commission again

Brussels, June 28: European Union leaders agreed Friday to nominate Ursula von der Leyen of Germany for a second five-year term as President of the European Commission, the EU's powerful executive body.

At a summit in Brussels, the bloc's 27 national leaders also picked former Portuguese premier Antonio Costa as the future chair of their European Council meetings and selected Estonian Prime Minister Kaja Kallas as the next EU foreign policy chief.



The leadership package represents continuity for the 27-member bloc, with centrist pro-EU factions keeping hold of top posts despite a far-right surge in elections to the European Parliament earlier this month.

Von der Leyen's nomination still needs approval from the European Parliament in a secret ballot.

The deal was announced by the current European Council President, Charles Michel, on social media.

The trio won broad backing from leaders but diplomats said right-wing Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni abstained from the vote on von der Leyen and voted against Costa and Kallas.

Von der Leyen's nomination still needs approval from the European Parliament in a secret ballot, widely seen as a trickier proposition than her endorsement by EU leaders.

At the summit, the EU also signed a security agreement with Ukraine, debated how to bolster EU defences against Russia and agreed bloc's strategic priorities for the next five years.

The security deal underlines EU support for Kyiv fighting off Moscow's invasion for a third year, despite gains by the far-right in European elections, uncertainty created by French snap elections and the US presidential vote in November.

But despite a litany of falsehoods from Trump during the debate, the focus in the aftermath was squarely on the incumbent.

Neither candidate is popular, and polls show many Americans are dissatisfied with their options. The country is deeply polarized, and a majority of voters have expressed concern that political violence could follow the election.

Ultra-Orthodox Jews block highway in protest against IDF enlistment

Bnei Brak, June 28: Hundreds of ultra-Orthodox Jewish men blocked a major highway in central Israel for two hours Thursday to protest a recent Supreme Court decision ordering young religious men to enlist for military service.

Military service is compulsory for most Jewish men and women in Israel. But politically powerful ultra-Orthodox parties have won draft exemptions for their followers that allow them instead to study in religious seminaries.

This long-standing arrangement has bred widespread resentment among the broader public, a sentiment that has grown stronger during the eight-month war against Hamas in Gaza.

Over 600 soldiers have been killed, and tens of thousands of reservists have been activated, straining careers, businesses



and family lives.

Protesters sat on the highway and lay on the ground as police lifted them up and dragged them away. Officers mounted on horseback charged into the crowd. Many demonstrators held signs and chanted "To prison! Not to the army!"

"We all came here for one goal, we reflect the position of all the Orthodox public, said a young man, identifying himself only by his first name Ozer. "All the

Orthodox public prefers to go to prison and not to the army."

The ultra-Orthodox see their full-time religious study as their part in protecting the state. Many fear that greater contact with secular society through the military will distance adherents from strict observance of the faith.

The Supreme Court this week ordered the government to begin drafting ultra-Orthodox men, saying the system of exemptions is unequal.

INDIA MATTERS 137 Indians held for cybercrime ops

Colombo: As many as 137 Indian nationals who were allegedly involved in a large-scale online financial scam across multiple locations in Sri Lanka have been arrested by police, according to a media report Friday. They were arrested Thursday from the Colombo suburbs of Madiwela and Battaramulla and the western coastal town of Negombo, said Police Spokesman SSP Nihal Thaldudu was quoted as saying by Daily Mirror newspaper. He said the Criminal Investigations Department (CID) conducted simultaneous raids in these areas, leading to the seizure of 158 mobile phones, 16 laptops, and 60 desktop computers. In Negombo, 55 suspects were detained along with 55 mobile phones and 29 laptops. Similarly, in Kochchikade, authorities apprehended 53 individuals and confiscated 31 laptops and 58 mobile phones.



The operation in Madiwela led to the arrest of 13 suspects and recovery of eight laptops and 38 mobile phones, while in Thalangama, 16 suspects were taken into custody with eight laptops and 38 mobile phones. The SSP said that all the arrested suspects were males. The crackdown follows a complaint from a victim who was lured into a WhatsApp group promising cash for social media interactions.

Tata Steel UK begins legal action against union stir



London: Tata Steel Friday said it is being forced to commence legal action to challenge the validity of a steelworkers' union strike ballot, as it warned that its blast furnaces at Port Talbot may have to pause operations amid the industrial action. The Mumbai-headquartered steel major had originally planned to shut down one of the blast furnaces by the end of June and the second one by September. However, Unite the Union's proposed strike from July 8 could result in the closure being forced earlier. "Following the announcement by the Unite Union to unilaterally call strike action from July 8, Tata Steel is unfortunately forced to commence legal action to challenge the validity of Unite's ballot," a Tata Steel spokesperson said. "In the coming days, if we cannot be certain that we are able to continue to safely and stably operate our assets through the period of strike action, we will not have any choice but to pause or stop heavy end operations (including both blast furnaces) on the Port Talbot site. That is not a decision we would take lightly, and we recognise that it would prove extremely costly and disruptive throughout the supply chain, but the safety of people on or around our sites will always take priority over everything else," the spokesperson said.

Same-sex couples may solve SK's population problem

Suwon, June 28: South Koreans Kim Eun-ha and Park Cho-hyeon would like to get married and have children, a plan that fits in with government ambitions to boost the world's lowest fertility rate.

The catch is that same-sex unions remain illegal in South Korea, and doctors refuse to perform artificial insemination on women without a male partner, citing ethical guidelines.

"A lot of single people and lesbian couples around me want

to have children. If the various types of families who can have children are accepted first, I think it will contribute a lot to the fertility rate," Kim Eun-ha told Reuters.

While campaigns to legalize same-sex marriage have succeeded in Taiwan and Thailand, there is no legal acknowledgement of LGBT partnerships in South Korea and many couples are forced move abroad if they want to get married or have a baby.

Every year, the LGBT community faces a lot of opposition to the annual Seoul Queer



Culture Festival from conservative religious groups that have mounted fierce resistance to efforts to pass laws against discrimination.

Kim Ji-hak, who heads non-profit organization Diversity

Korea, said the government should acknowledge diversity if it is serious about increasing the birthrate.

Despite these efforts, the population declined for a fourth straight year in 2023.

"If we become a society where people don't have to worry about healthcare, education, labour and ageing, everyone will want to have more children," Kim said.

There have been a few steps towards LGBT rights: last year, a court made a landmark ruling on national health coverage for a gay couple.

But doctors still refuse to perform artificial insemination for single women and same-sex couples due to guidelines set by the Korean Society of Obstetrics and Gynecology. In 2022, the National

Human Rights Commission of Korea recommended the guidelines to be revised, but nothing has yet changed.

For Kim Eun-ha and Park, who live together and also run a YouTube channel that aims to raise awareness about LGBT issues, the lack of recognition for LGBT unions is the biggest obstacle to boosting the birth rate.

The couple plan to go to Australia to get married, even though the South Korean government will not recognise their union, before thinking about how they can have children.

"I think the only way to start solving everything from raising children, healthcare to housing is to recognize marriage for same-sex couples. It's only when this form of love is acknowledged, everything else becomes possible," Kim Eun-ha said.

Tariff hike: Airtel, Voda follow Jio

New Delhi: Bharti Airtel Friday announced a 10-21 per cent hike in prepaid and postpaid mobile tariffs, a day after larger rival Reliance Jio announced an increase in rates. The move assumes significance, as it marks the first major increase in tariffs by the telecom industry, in two-and-a-half years. Airtel's tariff hike across various plans ranges from 10-21 per cent, and will be effective from July 3. Loss-making telecom operator Vodafone Idea (VI) will also raise mobile tariffs across the board by 11-24 per cent from July 4, according to a company statement. The company has raised the entry-level plan, minimum recharge value for 28 days of mobile service, by about 11 per cent to ₹199 from ₹179. VI has raised the price of a popular 84-day validity plan with 1.5 GB data per day to ₹859 from ₹719 earlier.

PFRDA's same-day settlement for NPS

New Delhi: The Pension Fund Regulatory and Development Authority has permitted T+0 settlement for National Pension System (NPS) subscribers effective July 1. NPS contributions received by the Trustee Bank until 11 am (T) on any settlement day will be invested on the same day and the subscribers will get the benefit of same-day NAV (Net Asset Value), PFRDA said in a statement. Hitherto, contributions received by the Trustee Bank are invested on the next settlement day (T+1), meaning contributions received until the previous day are invested the following day, it said.

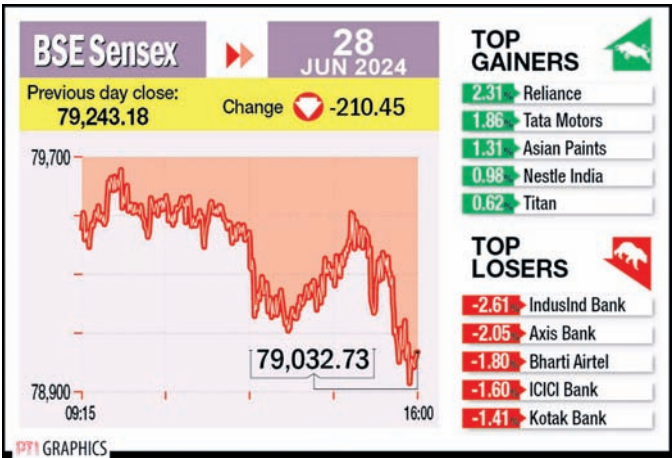

"India's optimism about the upcoming budget and upgrade in GDP forecasts continues to provide momentum in the market. Large caps are in favour due to the comeback of FIIs. However, profit booking ensued at the end of the week, at higher levels, in financials, especially private banks, which dragged the market down after the recent rally," said Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Financial Services. Among indices, bankex declined 1.04 per cent, telecom-communication (0.65 per cent), financial services (0.52 per cent), tech (0.42 per cent) and industrials (0.26 per cent). Healthcare, energy, metal, oil & gas, utilities and commodities were among the gainers. Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) bought equities worth ₹7,658.77 crore Thursday, according to exchange data. Global oil benchmark Brent crude climbed 0.89 per cent to \$87.16 a barrel. The BSE benchmark jumped 568.93 points or 0.72 per cent to settle at a new closing peak of 79,243.18 Thursday. The Nifty ended at a fresh record high of 24,044.50, rising 175.70 points or 0.74 per cent.

New Delhi, June 28: The government Friday left the interest rates on various small savings schemes unchanged for the quarter beginning July 1, 2024. "The rates of interest on various small savings schemes for the second quarter of FY 2024-25, starting from July 1, 2024, and ending on September 30, 2024, shall remain unchanged from those notified for the first quarter (March 1, 2024, to June 30, 2024) of FY 2024-25," said a finance ministry notification.

As per the notification, deposits under the Sukanya Samriddhi scheme will attract an interest rate of 8.2 per cent, while the rate on a three-year term deposit remains at 7.1 per cent. The interest rates for popular PPF and post office savings deposits scheme too have been

retained at 7.1 per cent and 4 per cent, respectively. The interest rate on the Kisan Vikas Patra will be 7.5 per cent, and the investments will mature in 115 months. The interest rate on the National Savings Certificate

(NSC) will remain at 7.7 per cent for the July-September 2024 period.

Sebi eases rules for NRIs, OCIs, RIs in IFSC bets

New Delhi, June 28: Markets regulator Sebi has allowed up to 100 per cent aggregate contribution by non-resident Indians, Overseas Citizens of India, Resident Indians in the corpus of FPIs that are based out of International Financial Services Centre (IFSC).

The move is expected to enhance investment by Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) in India.

In a circular issued Thursday, Sebi said it has amended FPI rules to "provide flexibility of having up to 100 per cent aggregate contribution by non-resident Indians (NRIs), Overseas Citizens of India (OCIs) and Resident Indians (RIs) Individuals in the corpus of FPIs based in IFSCs in India and regulated by International Financial Services Centres Authority (IFSCA)".

Over the years, there has been a consistent demand to channel more NRI and OCI investments into the Indian securities markets by enabling greater participation of NRIs and OCIs in FPI corporates.

In the July 2019 budget speech, Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman had also recognized that despite India being the world's top remittance recipient, NRI investment in Indian capital markets remains relatively low.

At the time of registration, an FPI applicant must submit a declaration to their DDP (Designated Depository Participant) stating its intent to have 50 per cent or more of their corpus contributed by NRIs, OCIs, and resident Indians, Sebi said.

Existing FPIs have six months from the date of the circular to submit this declaration. The declaration can only be reviewed during the renewal of registration.

IIP growth slows to 6.3% in May

THE PRODUCTION OF THE EIGHT SECTORS GREW 6.7% IN APRIL

New Delhi, June 28: The eight key infrastructure sectors' growth rose by 6.3 per cent in May on healthy expansion in the production of coal, natural gas, and electricity, though the growth rate is lower than in April, according to official data released Friday.

The production of the eight sectors grew 6.7 per cent in April. The growth of these core sectors -- coal, crude oil, natural gas, refinery products, fertiliser, steel, cement and electricity -- was 5.2 per cent in May 2023.

The official data showed that fertiliser, crude oil, and cement output recorded negative growth in May.

During April-May this fiscal, the output of these sectors was up 6.5 per cent against 4.9 per cent in the same period last fiscal.

The production growth of coal, natural gas and electricity rose by 10.2 per cent, 7.5 per cent and 12.8 per cent, respectively, against 7.2 per cent, (-) 0.3 per cent and 0.8 per cent in May 2023.

duction of refinery products and steel slowed down to 0.5 per cent and 7.6 per cent during the month under review.

The eight core sectors contribute 40.27 per cent to the country's Index of Industrial Production (IIP).

Commenting on the data, Icra Ltd Chief Economist Aditi Nayar said that while the core sector growth sustained above 6 per cent for the fourth consecutive month, it eased slightly in May. "At the same time, the heat-wave boosted demand for power, which translated into a rise in the growth of coal and electricity in May 2024 compared to the previous month. We expect IIP growth print at 4.5 per cent in May 2024," she added.

Mumbai, June 28: India's forex reserves jumped by \$816 million to \$653.711 billion for the week ended June 21, the RBI said Friday.

In the previous reporting week, the overall reserves had dropped by \$2.922 billion to \$652.895 billion.

The all-time high for the reserves is at \$655.817 billion achieved June 7. For the week ended June 21, foreign currency assets, a major component of the reserves, decreased by \$106 million to \$574.134 billion, the data released Friday showed.



Fiscal deficit at 3% of full year Budget estimates at May-end

New Delhi, June 28: The central government's fiscal deficit was only at 3 per cent of the annual estimates at May-end 2024-25, the first two months of the financial year during which model code of conduct was in place due to Lok Sabha elections.

The fiscal deficit or the gap between the government's expenditure and revenue was 11.8 per cent of Budget Estimates (BE) of 2023-24 in the first two months of the previous financial year.

For the current financial year (2024-25), the government estimates the fiscal deficit at 5.1 per cent of the GDP, or ₹16,85,494 crore.

According to data released by the Controller General of Accounts (CGA), fiscal deficit during April-May 2024 was ₹50,615 crore or 3 per cent of the BE 2024-25. In the corresponding

period of the last fiscal it was 11.8 per cent of that year's BE.

Net tax revenue was ₹3.19 lakh crore or 12.3 per cent of BE 2024-25. In the corresponding period it was 11.9 per cent of BE 2023-24. Total expenditure at May-end 2024 was ₹6.23 lakh crore or 13.1

GROSS LIABILITIES RISE 3.4% IN Q4 OF FY24

Total gross liabilities of the government increased to ₹171.78 lakh crore at the end of March 2024 from ₹166.14 lakh crore at December-end, the finance ministry has said. This represented a quarter-on-quarter increase of 3.4 per cent in the fourth quarter of 2023-24, said the public debt management quarterly report (January-March, 2024). Public debt accounted for 90.2 per cent of total gross liabilities during the quarter, it said. "During the quarter, the yield on Indian domestic bond softened on account of lower than anticipated borrowing plan announced in interim budget, adjustment of the fiscal deficit to 5.1 per cent of the GDP for FY25, a targeted reduction of the fiscal deficit at or below 4.5 per cent by FY26, FPI inflows and steady inflation," it said. On the other hand, it said, US treasury yields remained volatile during the quarter mostly affected by Federal Reserve action, inflation, and employment data.

"People are not able to actually cope with the outside temperatures," he said.

India-South Africa lock horns in the T20 World Cup final with unbeaten streaks under their belts

Barbados, June 28: The boys have been left behind and it is now the time for the men to engage in an exhilarating battle for the T20 World Cup title. Both India and South Africa registered emphatic victories in the

semifinals over England and Afghanistan respectively to reach the title round. It will all boil down to who holds the nerves better when the contest gets underway Saturday at the Kensington Oval here. More than a

decade back (June 2013), India won their last ICC title. For South Africa it will be their first final after losing seven semifinals in ICC trophies in all formats. Both will want to put the record straight and for that someone will have to give. Who does that only time will tell.

Both India and South Africa have remained unbeaten in the tournament. Except for dropping a point in the rain washed out game against at Canada, the *Men in Blue* have been dominant in all the other matches winning them in a canter. South Africa, on the other hand, have stuttered a bit, especially the one-run win against Nepal and the five-run victory against

Bangladesh. However, from the Super 8 stage their performances peaked and reached a crescendo against Afghanistan and they decimated the latter by nine wickets.

Amid this scenario, the two teams will take the field where they will probably get the best batting surface that the World Cup has so far had to offer. And both sides have power hitters who can simply swing the game in their favour in a couple of overs. Containment will not work at the Kensington Oval, but wickets will and both sides should remember that.

After India's 68-run win over England in the semifinal Thursday, there were a few emotional moments with Indian

skipper Rohit Sharma shedding a tear or two. He has every right to, he realises the enormity of the situation, the chance to rectify after everything went horribly wrong for the Indian side in the final of the ODI World Cup, November 19, 2023 at Ahmedabad, where the stage was set for coronation, but a different king arrived.

Seven months down the line, India have another chance to rewrite history and lay their

hands on the ICC trophy they first won in the inaugural year in 2007. This is also the chance for the cricketers to bring unbridled joy to the nation and to Indians across the world, the chance to rise like a phoenix from the ashes of the ODI World Cup final loss and make it a moment to rejoice. History doesn't give much of a second chance - India have got it and they should grab it with both hands.

Rohit understands the importance of being in a second final in the space of seven months. However, more importantly for him it is the team's ability to adjust to conditions and remain calm that has helped them.

"We have been very calm as a team. We do understand the occasion (final), but for us it is important to remain calm and composed. It will help us take correct decisions and we have done that so far. The ability to adjust and adapt to all types of conditions has stood us in good stead," Rohit said after India's win over England.

"We do understand the importance of the final, but more importantly we need to play good cricket as well," the Indian skipper added. Rohit also lauded the hard work put in by the team. "We've worked very hard to come to this stage, and to win the game like that

(England) was a great effort from everyone. I thought we played to the conditions really well; that's been the success story for us so far. If bowlers and batters understand and play according to the conditions, things fall in place. It's very pleasing how we came through (against England)," he stated.

For South Africa it is a question of now or never. Having returned to international cricket in 1992, the Proteas have come close to winning ICC trophies on a number of occasions. However, silverware has always eluded them and they will certainly be desperate to rectify what their predecessors failed to do.

South Africans however, appear determined this time. "It is one more step for us, it (the

final) is an opportunity we have never had, nothing to be scared of," said Markram after the game against Afghanistan. "We have some world-class players in the side but like I said, it takes a whole squad to be able to deliver such a performance. We have so far done that and we would like to do the same basic things in the final," the South African skipper had added.

JASPRIT BUMRAH vs QUINTON DE KOCK

De Kock is the highest run-getter for SA in this World Cup with 204 runs from eight matches, made at a strike-rate of 143. But he will be up against Bumrah, the best bowler on the planet at this moment. The Indian pacer has taken 13 wickets from seven matches at an astounding economy of 4.12.

ROHIT SHARMA vs MARCO JANSEN

It's not a fabled rivalry, yet. But the Indian skipper has a certain vulnerable side to left-arm pace as substantiated by Pakistan's Mohammad Amir and Shaheen Shah Afridi in the past. However, the numbers favour Rohit. The Mumbaikar has faced the SA pacer in nine T20I innings and was dismissed only once while taking 113 runs off him.

RISHABH PANT vs KESHAV MAHARAJ

This could be a very interesting battle. Pant has so far made 171 runs from seven matches at a reasonable strike-rate of 129 and Maharaj has bagged nine wickets. Maharaj will have to be at his accurate best to prevent Pant from playing all his unconventional shots.

AXAR /KULDEEP vs HEINRICH KLAASEN

Klaasen is certainly among the most destructive players against spin. But in this World Cup he has made just 138 runs from eight matches at a strike-rate of 112. The right-hander will have to contend with Axar and Kuldeep, who have been troubling batters with their exemplary lines and subtle variations.

VIRAT KOHLI vs KAGISO RABADA

Kohli will run into a formidable opponent in Rabada in the title clash. The SA quick has so far taken 12 wickets from eight matches, but his economy is even more impressive - 5.88. Rabada has ousted Kohli four times in 13 innings, giving away just 51 runs.

INDIAN EVES RIDE ON SHAFALI'S DOUBLE TON

Batter takes the least number of deliveries to hit a double century in women's cricket

Chennai, June 28: Young opener Shafali Verma (205, 197b, 23x4, 8x6) played out of her skin to score a record-breaking double century, which helped India to the highest-ever single-day total as a plethora of landmarks were rewritten on the opening day of the one-off women's Test against South Africa here Friday.

Shafali's double century and her formidable 292-run partnership with Smriti Mandhana (149, 161b, 27x4, 1x6) set the platform for India's massive 525 for four on a day when the visitors were sent on a leather hunt by the host batters.

Shafali eclipsed the double-century record of Annabel Sutherland of Australia, who had achieved the feat off 248 deliveries in a Test against South Africa in February. The 20-year-old also became only the second Indian woman cricketer after the legendary Mithali Raj to hit a double century in Test cricket. India also broke the 89-year-old

Manu suspended

Panchkula: Indian javelin thrower DP Manu, who was being seen as an Olympic hopeful, has been provisionally suspended by the National Anti-Doping Agency (NADA) after testing positive for an anabolic steroid. A source privy to the development confirmed Friday that Manu's positive test came during the Indian Grand Prix in April this year. The 24-year-old Manu, who won a silver medal at the 2023 Asian Championships, was more or less certain to qualify for the Olympics.
