Massive explosion at Iranian port kills 5, injures over 700

Muscat, April 26: A massive explosion and fire rocked a port Saturday in southern Iran purportedly linked to a shipment of a chemical ingredient used to make missile propellant, killing five people and injuring more than 700 others. Mehرداد Hasanazadeh, a provincial disaster management official, gave the updated casualty figure in an interview on state television.

The blast at the Shahid Rajaei port happened as Iran and the United States met Saturday in Oman for the third round of negotiations over Tehran's rapidly advancing nuclear programme.

While no one in Iran outright suggested that the explosion came from an attack, even Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi acknowledged that "our security services are on high alert given past instances of attempted sabotage and assassination operations designed to provoke a legitimate response."

For hours, authorities in Iran offered no clear explanation for what caused the blast at the port which is just outside of Bandar Abbas.

ROW OVER BJD MP'S REMARKS

Bhubaneswar: Opposition BJD Rajya Sabha MP Sulata Deo faced backlash Saturday after making contentious remarks about the Pahalgam attack that claimed 26 lives, including a tourist from Odisha. Speaking to television journalists, Deo remarked that it would have been impossible for the attackers to determine the religion of each victim before opening fire. "It may be my speculation, but it is impossible to enquire the religion of each tourist before killing them," she said. Her remarks drew sharp criticism from the BJP, with state Law Minister Prithviraj Harichandan condemning those as 'insensitive.'

Pak back to old tricks

Minor found dead; relative arrested for rape, murder

Following days of aggressive posturing and punitive diplomatic actions by India and Pakistan in the aftermath of April 22 Pahalgam terror attack, Islamabad Saturday offered to join any 'neutral and transparent' probe into the carnage. Pakistan PM Shehbaz Sharif said that his country is open to taking part in a 'credible' investigation. Sharif's statement came a day after Pakistani Defence Minister Khawaja Asif, in an interview with New York Times, said that Pakistan was 'ready to cooperate' with 'any investigation which is conducted by international inspectors'. New Delhi is yet to respond to Sharif's offer, which is perceived as yet another ploy to internationalise the Kashmir issue. Amid Sharif's overtures, Pak army chief General Asim Munir Saturday reiterated the 'two-nation theory', stating that Muslims and Hindus are two different nations. Meanwhile, US president Donald Trump maintained distance from the tension between the two nuclear-powered states, asserting that India and Pakistan will figure out themselves 'one way or the other'. Like the US, China too has so far maintained a neutral posture over the Indo-Pak tension, leaving India to fend for itself

HOUSES RAZED, HUNDREDS DETAINED IN KASHMIR

Srinagar: Authorities in Kashmir have launched a massive crackdown on terrorists and their sympathisers in the aftermath of the Pahalgam terror attack, razing homes of the ultras, raiding their safe havens and detaining hundreds of overground workers for questioning, officials said Saturday. Houses of six terrorists or their associates have been demolished in the past 48 hours with officials saying similar action will be taken against others involved in terror activities. Raids were carried out at more than 60 places Saturday in Srinagar 'to dismantle the terrorist ecosystem', a J-K Police spokesman said.

Islamabad/Lahore, April 26: Pakistan Saturday offered to join any 'neutral and transparent' probe into the Pahalgam terrorist attack that killed 26 people.

"The recent tragedy in Pahalgam is yet another example of this perpetual blame game, which must come to a grinding halt. Continuing with its role as a responsible country, Pakistan is open to participating in any neutral, transparent and credible investigation," Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif said while addressing the army-cadets passing-out parade at the Pakistan Military Academy in Khyber-Pakhtunkhwa's Kakul. Echoing his views, Interior

Minister Mohsin Naqvi in a press conference in Lahore said, "If neutral people of any third country carry out a probe into this incident, we are ready to cooperate with them."

Sharif said Muhammad Ali Jinnah had called Kashmir a jugular vein of Pakistan. He said the 'globally recognised dispute' remained unresolved despite UN resolutions.

Meanwhile, US President Donald Trump said there has always been tensions between India and Pakistan and the two countries will figure it out between themselves 'one way or the other'.

"I am very close to India and I'm very close to Pakistan, as you know. And they've had that fight for 1,000 years in

Kashmir. Kashmir has been going on for 1,000 years, probably longer than that. And it was a bad one yesterday, though, that was a bad one. Over 30 people," Trump said during a press gaggle with reporters aboard Air Force One on the way to Rome.

Pakistan army chief General Asim Munir Saturday highlighted the 'two-nation theory', stating that Muslims and Hindus are two different nations.

Munir's remarks came almost a week after he had described Kashmir as Pakistan's 'jugular vein' during a diaspora event and asked overseas Pakistanis to pass on the country's story to their children, emphasising that their forefathers believed Hindus and Muslims were different in every possible aspect of life.

Though there was no reaction from New Delhi on Sharif's proposal, Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister Omar Abdullah Saturday questioned Pakistan's offer.

"First they (Pakistan) did not accept that something happened in Pahalgam. Then they even said it was done by India. They were the ones who first accused us, so it's difficult to say anything about them," Abdullah told reporters.

Berhampur, April 26: Police Saturday recovered the body of a four-year-old girl from an under-construction Anganwadi centre at a village in Ganjam district, an officer said.

The girl was missing since Friday evening when a festival was going on in the village. Her body was recovered from under Pattapur police station limits in the district.

Family members suspected that the girl might have been raped and killed by miscreants.

Senior police officers, including SP (Ganjam) Subhendu Kumar Patra visited the spot. A forensic team and dog squad were also engaged to assist in the investigation.

The body was sent to MKCG Medical College and Hospital here for post-mortem examination. The exact cause of the death would be ascertained only after getting the autopsy report, said police.

"We are investigating from all angles and interrogating some of the people in the village suspecting their involvement in the gruesome incident," said the SP.

However, later in the evening, the police arrested a

27-year-old man on the charge of rape and murder of the girl. The accused is a distant relative of the deceased, said the SP.

The accused lured the girl by offering chocolate and a visit to the festival. He took her to an isolated place and attempted to rape her. He killed her by throttling her and then dumped the body. He was under the influence of liquor, police said.

The girl along with her mother had gone to her paternal uncle's house for the festival. She went missing while playing in the verandah of the house Friday evening. A missing complaint was lodged at the Pattapur police station.

The villagers found her body in the under-construction house of the Anganwadi centre and informed the police. A police team immediately rushed to the spot and recovered the body.

India, China to resume Kailash Mansarovar Yatra from June

New Delhi, April 26: After a gap of nearly five years, India and China will resume the Kailash Mansarovar Yatra from June -- a move being seen as an attempt to normalise their relationship that was severely hit by the eastern Ladakh border standoff.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) Saturday said the Yatra is set to take place from June to August via two routes -- Lipulekh Pass in Uttarakhand and Nathu La in Sikkim.

The pilgrimage to Mount Kailash and Mansarovar Lake in China's Tibet Autonomous Region holds religious significance to Hindus as well as Jains and Buddhists.

"Kailash Manasarovar Ya-

tra organised by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) is set to take place during June to August 2025," the MEA said.

The Yatra was suspended initially in 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequently because of the military standoff between the two sides on the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh.

The militaries of India and China completed disengagement of troops at the two remaining friction points of Demchok and Depsang under a pact sealed October 21 last year.

Two days later, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping held talks in the Russian city of Kazan and agreed to revive various bilateral dialogue mechanisms.

113mn-yr-old Brazilian fossil preserves oldest known ant

Brasília, April 26: Scientists have identified the fossilised remains of the oldest-known ant - a winged insect with fearsome scythe-like jaws that lived about 113 million years ago during the age of dinosaurs and was preserved in limestone unearthed in northeastern Brazil.

The species, called Vulcanidris cratensis, is part of a lineage called hell ants - named for their demonic-looking jaws - that prospered in a wide geographical range during the Cretaceous Period but have no descendants alive today. A previously discovered Cretaceous hell ant was named Haidomyrmex in honor of Hades, the ancient Greek god of the underworld.

A medium-sized ant about a half-inch (1.35 cm) long, Vulcanidris possessed highly specialised jaws that would have enabled it to pin down or impale prey. Like some ants alive today, it had wings and appears to have been a capable flier. It also had a well-developed stinger like a wasp.

"It would probably be confused with a wasp by an untrained eye," said entomologist Anderson Lepeco of the Museum of Zoology of the University of São Paulo, lead author of the study published this week in the journal Current Biology, opens new tab.

"They probably used their mandibles (mouthparts) to handle their prey in a specific way," Lepeco said.

Its mandibles moved up and down and not side to side, as

they do in today's ants.

"Currently, many odd mandible shapes can be found in ants, but they usually artic-

ulate horizontally," Lepeco said.

This ant is roughly 13 million years older than the previous oldest-known ants, specimens found in France and Myanmar that were preserved in amber, which is fossilized tree sap.

The Vulcanidris anatomy is remarkably well preserved in the limestone, which was excavated decades ago in the Crato geological formation in the Brazilian state of Ceará, probably in the 1980s or 1990s, according to Lepeco. It was held in a private collection before being donated to the São Paulo museum about five years ago.

Ants are believed to have evolved from a form of wasp. Their closest living relatives are wasps and bees.

Vulcanidris inhabited an ecosystem teeming with life. Fossils from the region show that Vulcanidris lived alongside other insects, spiders, millipedes, centipedes, various crustaceans, turtles, crocodilians, flying reptiles called pterosaurs, birds and dinosaurs including the feathered meat-eater Ubirajara. The ant's predators may have included frogs, birds, spiders and larger insects.

Ants have colonized almost everywhere on Earth, and research published in 2022 estimated that their total population is 20 quadrillion globally. That dwarfs the human population of about 8 billion.

"They are one of the most abundant groups in most environments on Earth," Lepeco said.

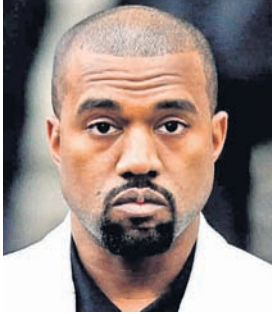

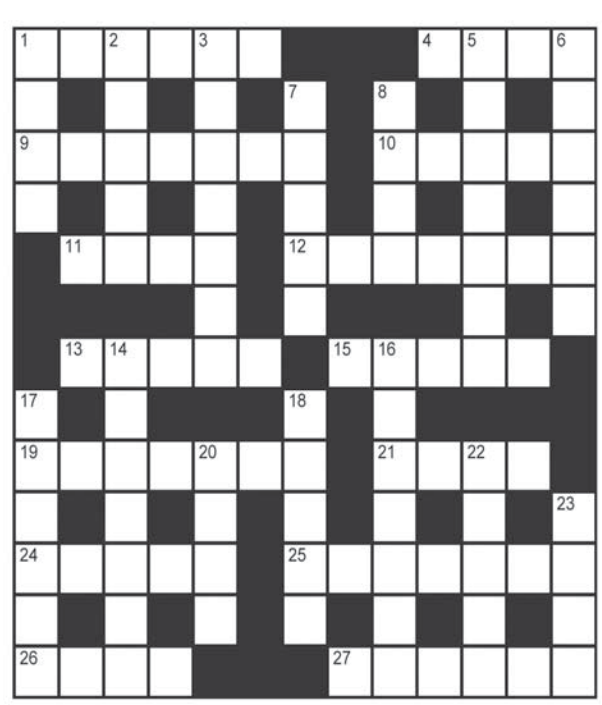

Security beefed up at Srimandir

Puri: In the wake of the recent terrorist attack in Pahalgam, Kashmir, the state government has strengthened security at the Srimandir, one of Hinduism's four sacred Dhams. As part of the enhanced measures, one commandant, two deputy commandants, and three assistant commandants have been deployed to oversee the temple's security arrangements. According to an order issued by the Additional DGP, the appointed officers are required to report by April 28 and will serve on deputation for a period of three years, informed Puri Superintendent of Police Vinit Agarwal. To further bolster security and maintain order, eight inspectors, 31 sub-inspectors, and 24 assistant sub-inspectors will also be stationed around the shrine. Their responsibilities will include managing the queue system during darshan and safeguarding key areas like the Parikrama corridor, Gundicha temple, and Mausima temple, Agarwal added.

H&UD Min visits Okhla waste-to-energy plant

Extraordinary evidence needed to prove alien life

The discovery of life beyond Earth would be one of the most profound scientific breakthroughs in human history. With hundreds of millions of potentially habitable planets in the Milky Way alone, astronomers are using powerful space telescopes to search for molecular signs of life in distant atmospheres.

Despite the excitement, no solid evidence for extraterrestrial life has been found so far. A recent paper published in April 2025 claimed to detect a possible biosignature in the atmosphere of the exoplanet K2-18b.

While the finding is intriguing, most astronomers, including the authors themselves, agree that it falls short of confirming the existence of alien life.

The famous astronomer Carl

Sagan once said, "Extraordinary claims require extraordinary evidence," a reminder that remarkable discoveries demand equally remarkable proof. The recent detection around K2-18b identified dimethyl sulfide, a molecule associated with life on Earth, particularly from oceanic bacteria and plankton. However, non-biological processes could also produce it, making this signal intriguing but inconclusive.

Moreover, the strength of the detection matters. In this case, the signal was significant at the 3-sigma level, implying a 0.3 per cent chance it was a random fluke.

While this sounds impressive, scientists typically demand a 5-sigma level—where the chance of error drops to nearly zero—for a claim of this



magnitude.

For instance, the discovery of the Higgs boson required two years of data collection to reach 5-sigma certainty before it was confirmed. Lastly, a credible discovery must be repeatable. Future observations,

such as detecting additional biosignature gases like oxygen, will be crucial before any firm conclusions can be drawn about life on K2-18b.

History is filled with cautionary tales of premature claims. Over a century ago,

astronomer Percival Lowell famously believed he had observed artificial canals on Mars, supposedly built by a dying civilisation.

His claims, however, were never confirmed by other astronomers and are now attributed to optical illusions and wishful thinking.

In 1996, NASA scientists announced that they had found possible microfossils in a Martian meteorite, only for subsequent studies to offer non-biological explanations. More recently, fluctuating methane levels detected on Mars stirred excitement, but inconsistent results from different spacecraft have kept scientists from confirming a biological origin.

The search for intelligent extraterrestrial civilisations has also produced intriguing but inconclusive evidence.

The famous "Wow!" signal detected in 1977 was a strong, one-minute radio burst from space that has never been repeated, and the mysterious interstellar object 'Oumuamua', which passed through our solar system in 2017, led some to speculate it could be artificial. Yet in both cases, the evidence was not strong or repeatable enough to justify extraordinary claims.

Even in cosmology, scientists must tread carefully. A 2014 claim that cosmic inflation had been detected was quickly retracted when galactic dust turned out to be the culprit.

However, the discovery of the universe's accelerating expansion in 1998, confirmed independently by two teams, stands as an example of the scientific method at its best. (The Conversation)

Trump’s Masterstroke

Can a competent plan on a vital matter be incompetently executed?

The United States says it is being looted by the world in trade and wants compensation. This looting has happened through the US not being able to export as much as it imports because of a strong dollar. And the dollar is permanently strong because the whole world uses it and it is constantly in demand. The US is thus forced to have a high trade deficit with most nations, including its allies, who cheat the US through subsidising their home companies and keeping their currencies artificially low.

And then the US also spends trillions on the safety of the world by maintaining military bases across the globe and fighting wars. The world must repay the US by accepting President Donald Trump’s new customs duties without retaliation and buying more things from the US, including defence equipment. They must also invest in factories in the US or they can simply send money to the US treasury.

This, more or less, is the plan that the US president has presented before the world and now asked it to pay up. Whether this is fair or not, or even true or not, is a separate matter. The US trade deficit is linked to its budget deficit and overspending, requiring capital to come from abroad to make up the gap.

The world has not asked America to set up bases outside its borders. Who the US attacks and who it defends is not based on some global consensus but a US assessment which it carries out alone. But all that is, as I said, separate. The issue at hand is this: Can a competent plan on a vital matter be incompetently executed?

And this is of course a vital matter. The tariff plan’s goals are to bring manufacturing back to America again; to decouple or reduce dependency on China; to at the same time reduce the relative value of the dollar while retaining its position as the reserve currency; to collect billions from tariffs that will be spent on tax cuts; and to balance the budget — in short to make America great again. It is a serious matter and it deserved serious levels of planning and execution.

Alas, the American tariff plan has unfolded with a series of pauses, withdrawals and exemptions — all of which were forced by events that had been predicted by critics. The result is chaos. Watching the American business networks it becomes apparent that nobody is really sure what the precise situation is with tariffs on any given day. The US trade representative is deposing before elected members in Congress and does not know that a U-turn has happened at the White House on the very issues that he is taking questions on. Statements made by the treasury secretary (finance minister) are at odds with those made by the commerce secretary. Trump tells Time magazine Chinese President Xi Jinping has called him to negotiate, apparently to mollify the markets that are getting jittery. The Chinese immediately issue a statement saying this is a lie and the markets are weak again.

Any competent plan would have assumed that targeted nations would retaliate. On 24 April the Washington Post ran a headline reading ‘U.S. agencies alarmed by China’s curbs on exports of rare-earth minerals.’ The report said that ‘Beijing’s curbs on rare earth exports, used to make military drones, consumer electronics, electric cars and more, have caused alarm across federal agencies.’

Why should retaliation from those being targeted ‘alarm’ anyone unless they did not think of the consequences of their actions? The people drafting the plan on such a vital matter should have not only anticipated this but also studied in detail the fallout, rather than being alarmed.

As the madness has unfolded it is unclear even what the ultimate objective is. If the aim is really free trade then how will manufacturing shift to the US from lower-cost nations? If the manufacturing of iPhones, shoes, garments, steel and semi-conductors is brought back to America and imports reduced, then the tariffs will not bring in much revenue and the deficit will remain. Both problems cannot be solved through this approach. If the aim is decoupling from China because it is poised to overtake the US as the world’s largest economy then what is the point of begging it for negotiations?

These are questions of course that should have been asked before the commencement of the exercise. They were not asked, except by critics who were dismissed as haters or anti-nationals determined to stop America from becoming great again.

To return to the question we began with, the answer is no. It is not possible for a competent plan on a vital matter to be incompetently executed. This is because any plan made with seriousness will and must anticipate the consequences, in particular the negative ones. A casual approach such as the one America is showing reflects not only on the execution, which is shoddy by all accounts including those of its supporters, but on the plan itself.

It means that little thinking has gone into creating it and not much weightage assigned to concerns that it may not work as intended and perhaps even fail.

It is shoddy work and shoddy thinking revealing itself in real time through the disorder of execution. It is a masterstroke.

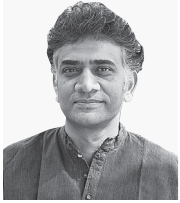

A SINGLE PRINCIPLE NOW SEEMS TO PREVAIL: MIGHT IS RIGHT

The cold blooded murder of innocent tourists in Pahalgam has shocked not only India but the whole world. World powers have swiftly reacted to the dastardly attack. Apparently the spot chosen by the assailants was not patrolled by the army or the paramilitary. No doubt, irrespective of the absence of security personnel, the ambush of unsuspecting tourists indicates the failure of intelligence. There are complaints of other lapses that led to this bloodshed. Those issues can be debated and investigated later. The important question to ask and watch is how the Indian government is reacting to this incident.

The terrorists called out the tourists from their tents and asked them to identify their religion to ascertain if they were Hindus, and then they shot the victims point blank. A lady begged to be killed as her husband was shot in her presence. She was spared her life and was advised to report the killing to Prime Minister Modi. A local pony man plunged at a terrorist to save a tourist and paid with his life. Such pathetic, humanistic as well as gory details of the massacre are gradually emerging in the public domain.

The attack is clearly the handiwork of Pakistani terror network. Whether the imminent attack was lost on the intelligence of the government is another point of debate. Observers point out that Pakistan’s ruling establishment had blamed India for aiding and abetting Baloch Liberation Army in hijacking of a local train in Balochistan and the murder of hundreds of hostages on 11 March this year. India had flatly denied

any involvement in that terrorist act. Pakistan had rejected the denial and the Pakistani army had sworn revenge. The other conjecture is about the strategic timing of the attack which coincided with the visit of US Vice President JD Vance. Although Vance is on a partly personal visit, he is outspoken on international affairs; therefore it was done during his presence on Indian soil in order to draw international attention.

Third, the choice of the spot for the attack; Pahalgam is a major tourist attraction. It is reported that there were more than two thousand tourists camping in that area on that fateful day. For some reason, there was not a single member of State Armed Forces – Army, Para-Military or even the local police – at the Baisaran meadow which is just five km from Pahalgam town and a designated tourist spot.

Be that as it may, innocent lives have been lost. The government’s claim of making the Valley of Kashmir free of terrorism also got busted. So the government as well as the people are raring to go after the

terrorists wherever they may be hiding. The public anger will force the government and the army to take some drastic action to bring the culprits to the book.

The larger question is what should India do to eliminate sporadic, unanticipated and inhuman attacks by terrorists coming from across the border? The second related question is how does India destroy the military-cum-militant machine that manufactures thousands of terrorists every year? Indian Army captures or kills some terrorists and more are sent by Pakistan. This ghastly cycle will continue until the terrorist bases in Pakistan are destroyed. It should be like the IDF (Israel) going after Hamas terror network and infrastructure.

New Delhi has to follow a two-pronged strategy. One, to mobilise diplomatic support for a decisive attack on terrorist hideouts and bases in Pakistan. New Delhi has initiated certain non-military steps like declaring the Pakistani High Commissioner non-grata, cancelling the Indus Water Treaty that will choke Pakistan with-

out water and openly declaring that it will not stop at anything short of stoppage of supply of terrorists from Pakistan.

India is a democracy. Citizens, military officers, and strategic experts have started debating if an all-out military intervention into Pakistani territory would be a prudent step. That is not for non-military persons who are not at the helm to suggest any concrete action. It is not a calculation whether India will succeed in weeding out terrorists from Pakistan. It is unavoidable for India to go in search of the terrorists.

Whatever the nature of response, it has to be decisive in the sense that terrorism on Indian soil becomes a thing of the past. It is so worrying that, as a nation, when things tend to become normal people begin to live in relative peace and security, Pakistan throws a spanner by sponsoring terrorist activities like those in Mumbai, Uri, Pathankot, Pulwama and Pahalgam. New Delhi has been mobilising the world relentlessly against terrorism by raising it in international forum. Yet, the scourge of terrorism does not stop inflicting India.

The world should rally together to fight this evil. New Delhi has been advocating against terrorism. Now it is time it should lead in action as well. Terrorism is an international menace. It has to be fought collectively. Let India give this message loud and clear through diplomacy as well as forceful action whenever necessary.

The choice between Caesar & Aurelius

At the beginning of Donald Trump’s first term in the White House, I argued that this would be no ordinary US presidency. The international order, already beset by fundamental weaknesses and disputes over its core values and institutions, was now facing a seismic shift.

With the beginning of Trump’s second term marked by even greater chaos, what once seemed like an isolated shock has evolved into a full-blown “systemic earthquake.” Trump’s inflammatory rhetoric, often unhinged executive orders, and despotic approach to the wars in Gaza and Ukraine have shaken the very foundations of the multi-lateral system, which took four centuries of wars and suffering – dating back to the Peace of Westphalia – to build.

Trump’s actions and pronouncements over the past two months suggest that we are entering an era of profound uncertainty in which crises can erupt and escalate at any moment. A single principle now seems to prevail: might is right. After all, at the heart of international law lies the principle of pacta sunt servanda: treaties must be honored. Yet within weeks of returning to the White House, Trump

has violated, invalidated, or withdrawn from numerous agreements and commitments made by previous US administrations, including his own.

Trump’s broader foreign-policy objective appears to be to dismantle the global order established 80 years ago by a generation scarred by the horrors of World War II and usher in an era of neo-colonial competition. His threats to annex Greenland “one way or another,” reclaim control of the Panama Canal, and turn Canada into the 51st state – along with his portrayal of Gazans as little more than an obstacle to a real-estate deal – offer a stark glimpse of his neo-imperialist worldview.

Unlike the imperial systems that preceded it, the postwar US-led order rested on three pillars: US-dominated multi-lateral institutions, a global security architecture built around alliances like NATO, and an economic order based on free trade and the dollar’s status as the world’s main reserve currency.

By contrast, Trump’s vision of Pax Americana for the twenty-first century is one of unchecked, tech-driven totalitarianism. This shift didn’t come out of nowhere. The US-led order has been fraying

for years. Since the end of the Cold War, US foreign policy has been marked by strategic discontinuity, with each administration adopting wildly different doctrines. George HW Bush’s call for a “new world order” was followed by Bill Clinton’s humanitarian interventionism. The terrorist attacks of 11 September, 2001, fuelled George W Bush’s neo-conservative rationale for invading Afghanistan and Iraq.

Barack Obama’s multilateral but often passive diplomacy, in turn, triggered the reactionary reflexes that defined Trump’s first term, just as Joe Biden’s inconsistent and largely ineffective foreign policy – particularly in Gaza – helped pave the way for Trump’s return.

Now, with Trump more emboldened than ever, we are witnessing the consequences of America’s strategic discontinuity: a neo-colonial order driven by Christian nationalism, empowered by advanced technologies, sustained by irrational impulses, and wrapped in brazen rhetoric.

In the spring of 2002, in a lecture at Princeton University, I noted the surge of extreme nationalism in post-9/11 America and warned that the US did not need a Caesar-like leader who seeks domination through mil-

itary might. Instead, it needed a Marcus Aurelius – a philosopher-statesman capable of leading a complex global order with wisdom, restraint, and respect for international law.

For a while, I believed Obama could become such a leader. When he took office in 2009 and chose Turkey as his first overseas destination – followed by Iraq, Saudi Arabia, and Egypt – I felt a genuine sense of hope. Alas, I was wrong. But my own experiences as foreign minister and later prime minister of Turkey reinforced my belief in the possibility of balancing diplomacy and force in a way that serves the interests of all countries – not just those of great powers.

From Argentina to Turkey, countries around the world face the same fundamental choice confronting the US: Will we succumb to authoritarian Caesars who become more oppressive as their power grows, or will we choose leaders who, like Marcus Aurelius, seek to govern deliberatively? That is the defining question of our time, and we must answer it together.

Weaponising water

Sir, This refers to “Not a drop of water for Pakistan,” **Orissa POST**, April 26. Six decades after that Cold War bargain, New Delhi has suspended the Indus Water Treaty (IWT) and put water—South Asia’s most irreplaceable resource—squarely on the strategic chessboard. Islamabad’s dash to the International Court of Justice is predictable, yet history shows ICJ verdicts bite only when backed by power. Cutting even ten per cent of Indus flow scorches Pakistan’s Punjabi breadbasket—the same demographic pool that feeds its terror pipeline. Hunger concentrates minds faster than diplomatic dossiers. Pakistan is the perpetrator, exporting jihad; India is the victim. Expecting the victim to hydrate its attacker is strategic absurdity. New Delhi’s willingness to weaponise water sends a clear signal to Beijing, which eyes the Brahmaputra from Tibet. China now knows any adventurism in Ladakh or Arunachal could trigger reciprocal pain—hydrological or otherwise. Suspending the IWT is not cruelty; it is rational statecraft. Pakistan wagered that nuclear weapons provided a terror umbrella India dare not breach. Balakot air strikes poked the first hole; hydrological pressure tears it wider. .

Pahalgam killings deepen Bengal's identity rift, give way to fresh wave of polarisation

Kolkata, April 26: The return of four coffins from Kashmir to Bengal — three deceased of the Pahalgam terror attack and one soldier killed in Udhampur — has not only stirred grief, but also ignited a volatile mix of religion, politics and emotion — deepening polarisation and marking a turning point in the state's identity politics.

With the 2026 Assembly elections less than a year away, the killings have swiftly taken on a political charge, threatening to become the emotional nucleus around which competing narratives and electoral strategies will revolve.

The brutal killing of tourists Bitan Adhikari, Samir Guha and Manish Ranjan Mishra in Kashmir after being asked to reveal their religion has sent shockwaves through the state.

The chilling nature of these targeted killings has thrust the politics of religious identity into the spotlight, with the faith of the victims now becoming a potent political tool.

As parties scramble to frame the narrative through religion,

nationalism and victimhood, the deaths have transformed into a new battleground in Bengal's fierce political contest.

The fourth coffin — of soldier Jhantu Ali Sheikh from Nadia killed in a separate ambush in Udhampur — has further complicated the emotional and political discourse, as martyrdom and terror are increasingly viewed through communal prisms.

The invocation of religious identity following the attacks has signalled a shift in Bengal's political choreography — one that observers say is aligned with the BJP's ideological thrust and the TMC's appeasement politics.

"This isn't just a story of terror and tragedy. It's about the religious identity of the dead. We are now witnessing a contest of competing narratives, shaped by identity and political stakes," political scientist at the Centre for Studies in Social Sciences, Maidul Islam, told PTI.

What unfolded at Kolkata airport Wednesday evening highlighted the intensity of the moment.

As the coffins arrived, Leader of the Opposition in the West Bengal Assembly, Suwendu Adhikari, and a large contingent of BJP leaders staged an emotionally charged appearance at the cargo terminal.

With folded hands and bowed head, Adhikari knelt beside a coffin, touched his forehead to it, and cradled Bitan's infant son. He solemnly declared, "They were killed because they were Hindus," and urged the grieving widow to recount her version of events.

The TMC, though present at the airport through leaders like Firhad Hakim and Arup Biswas, appeared momentarily caught off-guard by the BJP's theatrics.

Biswas met Bitan's family and Hakim visited the home of another victim.

The TMC also sought to highlight the sacrifice of Jhantu Ali Sheikh, stressing that martyrdom knows no religion. But the BJP struck back sharply.

"The TMC is trying to equate a terrorist attack with the death of a soldier," said state BJP spokesperson Keya Ghosh.

"In Kashmir, just like during the Murshidabad riots, Hindus were killed by Islamic terrorists after identifying their religion. Sheikh died in an ambush. Both are not the same. Islamic terrorism is a reality; the sooner we accept it, the better," she said.

The remark laid bare the deeper ideological clash while the BJP seeks to frame the killings through the lens of religious identity, the TMC is attempting to dilute that narrative by emphasising a broader idea of national sacrifice.

TMC veteran Sougata Roy, however, rejected the BJP's framing. "This is clearly a security and intelligence failure. The BJP is using this incident to stir communal sentiments ahead of the Bihar elections and next year's Bengal polls," he told PTI. But the BJP remains unwavering.

"The Hindus of Bengal know that TMC panders to jihadis and fundamentalists for vote-

bank politics," said BJP state president and Union Minister Sukanta Majumdar.

Political analysts believe the Pahalgam killings have given the BJP's Hindutva plank a significant emotional push — echoing the post-Pulwama sentiment of 2019, though with a sharper, more divisive edge.

"In Pulwama, martyrdom was a unifying force rooted in nationalism. In Pahalgam, it's being interpreted through a religious lens, which is far more divisive," said political scientist Biswanath Chakraborty.

"What happened in Kashmir is now being fought over in Bengal's streets by the TMC and the BJP. The focus on religious identity is only going to deepen existing communal divides ahead of the 2026 assembly polls," he said.

Another analyst echoed the sentiment. "The politics around the religious identity of the corpses will sharpen the state's fault lines."

From the CAA-NRC protests to recurring incidents of communal violence in districts like Murshidabad, West Bengal has seen an uptick in religious tensions over the past few years.

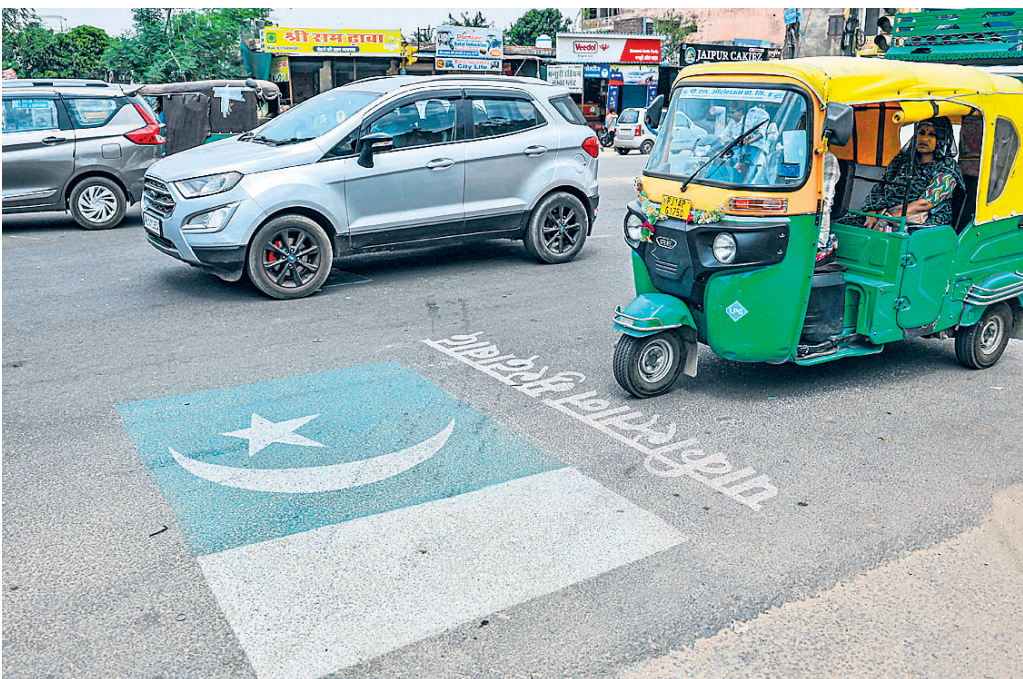
Both the TMC and the BJP have capitalised on these fissures, portraying themselves as protectors of their respective vote bases — Muslims and Hindus.

The Pahalgam episode may further deepen these divides, especially if the religious identity of the dead continues to dominate the narrative around terrorism and martyrdom.

The CPI(M) and the Congress, meanwhile, which find themselves politically sidelined in this increasingly polarised environment, have issued cautious appeals for restraint.

"One form of fundamentalism breeds another. We must not let martyrdom be used as fuel for hatred," said CPI(M) leader Sujan Chakraborty.

But in Bengal's high-stakes political arena, where optics often outweigh nuance, such cautionary voices risk being drowned out.

Over 400 Pakistani nationals in Rajasthan face expulsion

Jaipur, April 26: Following the recent terrorist attack in Jammu and Kashmir's (J&K) Pahalgam area in which 26 people were brutally killed and scores were injured, Rajasthan authorities have initiated the process of identifying and sending back Pakistani citizens currently residing in the state.

This action comes after clear directives to this effect from the Central government.

It has been reported that over 400 Pakistani nationals are staying in Rajasthan.

Union Home Minister Amit Shah has instructed Chief Ministers across the country to take immediate action in this regard, with specific emphasis on Rajasthan to ensure the return of all Pakistani citizens present within its borders via the Attari border, which remains open for their return.

In response to these directives, the Rajasthan Intelligence Department and the state police have been actively working to identify individuals who arrived from Pakistan on various visas.

They are currently verifying records to ascertain who has already returned and who remains in the state.



The Intelligence Wing of the Police Headquarters has issued clear instructions to Superintendents of Police (SPs) of all districts and Intelligence officers to facilitate the return of all Pakistani citizens who entered India on tourist, religious, student, medical, or any other short-term visa.

Sources indicate that a number of Pakistani citizens have already left India following the increased scrutiny from both the central and state governments.

Notably, Hindu and other minority refugees who have migrated from Pakistan to escape persecution will be exempt from this expulsion order.

Initial reports indicate that

out of approximately 30 Pakistani citizens in Jaipur, seven have already returned, while 23 residing in Jodhpur have contacted the Foreigners Regional Registration Office (FRRO) to facilitate their return.

According to Intelligence sources, the FRRO is actively contacting all Pakistani citizens in the state, instructing them to return to Pakistan via the Attari border.

Concerned SPs are also being informed about the Pakistani citizens residing in their respective jurisdictions to verify their return status.

CM Bhajan Lal Sharma has directed the Home Department to strictly implement the order.

Hundreds turn up to honour fallen soldier

Kolkata, April 26: Hundreds of people thronged the narrow lanes of Tehatta village in West Bengal's Nadia district Saturday to pay their last respect to Armyman Havildar Jhantu Ali Sheikh whose mortal remains were brought to his native village this morning.

Sheikh laid down his life during an anti-terror operation in Jammu & Kashmir's Udhampur district.

His sacrifice was honoured with a wreath-laying ceremony at the 166 Military Hospital in Jammu Friday, where senior officials of the Army, CRPF, BSF, and Jammu & Kashmir Police paid their final respects.

His mortal remains were brought to Kolkata Friday night and then Barrackpore before being taken to his native village Saturday morning, an official said. The body, wrapped in the tricolour, reached his home at around 8am.

As the body arrived in the village, a large number of people, irrespective of caste, creed, and religion, gathered on both sides of the lanes, rooftops and balconies to bid farewell to their hero.

Emotions ran high as Sheikh's family, inconsolable

in their grief, received the coffin. A stage was set up near a local mosque where the mortal remains were placed, allowing residents to pay their last respects. His niece, Amina Sheikh, said that six bullets had hit the martyr's body—one injuring his throat and ear, another hitting his ear and head, while the rest four struck his back as the firing took place from the rear.

Before the final rites, Army personnel arranged for bathing the body. During this time, female family members were not allowed near the site as per protocol, she said. The national flag draped over the coffin was later folded and handed over to his wife by Army personnel.

The burial took place near his home around 11.45am, she added. His wife demanded justice. "Those responsible for his death must be punished," she said.

West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee expressed deep sorrow over the soldier's death and pledged all possible support to his bereaved family.

"The entire state stands by the family of Jhantu Ali Sheikh. His sacrifice will never be forgotten," the CM said.

Jhantu is survived by his wife, a 10-year-old son and a 6-year-old daughter.

Don't panic, remain vigilant: Rajasthan BSF IG tells public

"We are utilising the UAVs extensively to ensure real-time monitoring and immediate response," he said.

Jaipur, April 26: Rajasthan's Shaitan Singh got engaged to Kesar Kanwar from Pakistan's Sindh province four years ago. As the groom's family struggled for years to get visas, the cross-border wedding was hit by another hurdle when the government closed the Attari border Thursday.

With his wedding attire ready and all set to tie the knot in Pakistan's Amarkot city, April 30, Singh along with his family and 'baraat' set out from Barmer district for the Attari border Tuesday.

But by the time they reached there, authorities refused to let them cross the border as India Wednesday ordered an immediate shutdown of the Attari-Wagah border as part



of a series of retaliatory steps following the tragic Pahalgam terror attack.

"We've waited a long time for this day," said Singh, adding that after years of efforts, he, his father, and his brother were granted visas only recently, February 18.

The groom's cousin Surendra Singh said the situation has left both families disheartened.

"Our relatives from Pakistan had come here but they had to return. We are very disappointed. Terror attacks cause

a lot of damage. Relations get spoiled. Movement on the border stops," he said as the cross-border wedding remains disrupted.

The visa of Singh, a resident of Indroi village in Barmer district, is valid until May 12, giving the families a glimmer of hope that the wedding might still happen if the border reopens in time.

"Whatever the terrorists did was wrong. The wedding has been interrupted. What to do? It is a matter of borders," the groom said.

The cross-border marriage was arranged through family ties, a common practice among the Sodha Rajput community, which has a significant population in the Sindh

province of Pakistan.

Many of them prefer marrying within the community and often seek matches across the border to preserve their cultural traditions.

Singh, who works in the finance sector, is one of many in the region with relatives in Pakistan. For now, his family waits in the hope that the situation improves and the border reopens in time for the marriage to go ahead.

India Wednesday downgraded diplomatic relations with Pakistan following the April 22 terror attack in Jammu and Kashmir's Pahalgam in which 26 people, mostly tourists, were gunned down.

A Cabinet Committee on Security meeting, chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, took a series of retaliatory steps, including suspension of the Indus Water Treaty of 1960, revocation of visa services of Pakistani nationals and immediate shutting down of the Attari land-transit post.

Terror attack: NIA team visits victim's house in Kolkata

Kolkata, April 26: A three-member team of the NIA Saturday visited the residence of Samir Guha, one of the 26 people killed in the Pahalgam terror attack, in Kolkata's Behala area to record statements of his family members, a senior official said.

The NIA team would also meet the wife of Bitan Adhikari, another deceased in the terror attack, in the Baishnabghata area to record her statement, he said.

"We will record the statements of the family members of Guha and file a report on that. We will also visit Adhikari's house and talk to his wife to take a detailed note of the attack," the official said.

Three victims – Bitan Adhikari (of Baishnabghata, Kolkata), Samir Guha (Sakher Bazar, Kolkata), and Manish Ranjan (Jhalda, Purulia) – were from West Bengal.

Special teams of the NIA have started reaching out to eyewitnesses, including tourists who survived the deadly attack by terrorists in south Kashmir's Pahalgam, officials had said Friday.

Armed with the latest gadgets like Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) and drones, Jammu and Kashmir Police, Army and paramilitary forces continued their massive operations to hunt down the terrorists in the dense jungles of the Pir Panjal range, overlooking Pahalgam and the Jammu-Srinagar national highway.

Initial investigations into the terror attack indicate that the number of terrorists involved could range from five to seven. They were aided by at least two local militants who received training in Pakistan, the officials said.

Mercury soars to 42.1 deg C in Delhi

New Delhi: Delhi Saturday recorded its highest maximum temperature in the last three years, with the mercury touching 42.1 degrees Celsius. According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), the last time a higher temperature was recorded was in 2022, when the maximum had reached 43.5 degrees Celsius. The minimum temperature Saturday settled at 20.7 degrees Celsius, 3.1 notches below the seasonal average. Humidity levels fluctuated between 35 per cent and 15 per cent.

TN CM Stalin hikes pension of ex-MLAs


Chennai: Tamil Nadu Chief Minister MK Stalin Saturday announced in the State Assembly that the pension of former MLAs and MLCs (members of the now defunct upper house, legislative council) would be increased to ₹35,000 from ₹30,000. The annual medical allowance for them shall also be increased to ₹1 lakh from the current ₹75,000, he said. Referring to representations seeking a hike in pension of former MLAs and MLCs, Stalin said, effective April 1, 2025, it would be increased to ₹35,000 per month from ₹30,000.

Katihar (Bihar): Five policemen were injured after a mob attacked Dandkhora police station in Bihar's Katihar district, officials said Saturday. 7 sanitation workers killed, 5 hurt after being hit by vehicle

Gurugram, April 26: Seven sanitation workers, six of them women, were killed and five others were injured after they were run over by a speeding truck near Ibrahimbas village on the Delhi-Mumbai Expressway in Nuh district Saturday morning, police said.

The injured have been admitted to the hospital for treatment where their condition remains critical, they said. The accident took place around 10 am when about 11 sanitation workers were cleaning the expressway. A speeding pickup vehicle hit the workers, killing six of them on the spot, police said.

Locals informed the police and helped rushing the injured to the hospital, they said. The deceased have been identified as Resham, 60, Prem, 60, Ratna, 40, Pista, 30, Jaidei, 40, Satanbati, 30, all natives of Kheri Kalan village under Pinangwa Police Station, and Aas Mohammad, 45, a native of Jhimrawat village under Ferozpur Jhirka Police Station.

The injured were Lajjawati, 41, Hemlata, 37, Jagwati, 32, all of them natives of Kheri Kalan village. They were referred to Delhi due to their critical condition. The fourth injured Anita, 32, a native of Rigad village, was admitted to medical college, Nalhar. Nuh District Commissioner Vishram Kumar Meena said all possible financial help will be given to the affected families.

Police have arrested the truck driver and identified him as Monu, a native of Mohamadpur village in Mahendergarh district.

Civil services exam topper Shakti Dubey scores 51.5 per cent

New Delhi, April 26: Banaras Hindu University's (BHU) post-graduate Shakti Dubey has scored 51.5 per cent in the civil services examination, according to the details of the selected candidates' marks released by the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC).

Dubey (28) got a total of 1,043 marks -- 843 in the written exam and 200 in the personality test. She cleared the exam in her fifth attempt with political science and international relations as her optional subject.

The merit is determined out of the total of 2,025 marks -- the written or main exam is of 1,750 marks and the interview is of 275 marks. Second-rank achiever Harshita Goyal has scored 1,038 marks (51.28 per cent) -- 851 in the main exam and 187 in the interview.

Goyal did her post-graduation in chartered accountancy. She has a Bachelor of Commerce degree from the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda. Goyal (24) qualified the exam with political science and international relations as her optional subject in her third attempt. She lives in Gujarat's

Vadodara and her home state is Haryana. Third and fourth-rank holders Dongre Archit Parag and Shah Margi Chirag have got 1,038 (848 in the main exam and 190 in the interview) and 1,035 (825 in the main exam and 210 in the interview) marks, respectively.

Thus, Parag has also scored 51.28 per cent and Chirag 51.11 per cent. Parag holds a Bachelor of Technology degree in electrical and electronics engineering from the Vellore Institute of Technology (VIT), Tamil Nadu. A native of Pune, 26-year-old Parag cleared the exam in his third attempt.

Chirag (26) has a Bachelor of Engineering degree in computer engineering from the Gujarat Technological University, Ahmedabad. She cracked the examination in her fifth attempt. Delhi topper Aakash Garg has got 1,032 marks (831 in the main exam and 201 in the interview) or 50.96 per cent.

Garg (24) secured the fifth rank in his second attempt, with sociology as his optional subject.

He has a Bachelor of Technology degree in computer science from the Guru Gobind Singh Indraprastha University, Delhi.

As many as 1,009 candidates -- 725 men and 284 women -- have cleared the civil services examination this year, the results of which were declared on Tuesday.

This advisory reiterates earlier communications from the Ministry, reminding broadcasters of Rule 6(1) (p) of the Cable Television Networks (Amendment) Rules, 2021. The rule clearly states: "No programme should be carried in the cable service which contains live coverage of any anti-terrorist operation by security forces, wherein media coverage shall be restricted to periodic briefing by an officer designated by the appropriate Government, till such operation concludes."

Mumbai police question Tahawwur Rana for 8 hours

Mumbai: A Mumbai crime branch team questioned Tahawwur Hussain Rana, a key accused in the 26/11 Mumbai terror attacks, for over eight hours in New Delhi where he is in National Investigation Agency's custody, officials said Saturday. The crime branch team comprising four officers questioned Rana Wednesday for his alleged role in the conspiracy of the terror attacks, an official said. During the questioning, Rana gave evasive answers and did not cooperate, the official said without giving any further information. Rana, a 64-year-old Pakistani-origin Canadian businessman, was extradited from the USA for his alleged role in the 26/11 Mumbai terror attacks earlier this month. He is currently in the NIA's custody in the national capital.

Bharat Summit passes Hyderabad resolution on global issues

Hyderabad: The Bharat Summit 2025, a two-day global conclave held here Saturday adopted the 'Hyderabad Resolution: Delivering Global Justice' a 44-point charter, reaffirming steadfast commitment to the values of freedom, equality, justice, and solidarity. The resolution condemned terrorism in all forms, including by nations that support violence and vowed to stand with progressive movements around the world that are being silenced. Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi delivered the keynote address on the second day. Pakistani Hindu refugees anxious over visa status

As the April 27 deadline approaches, the atmosphere among Hindu refugees from Pakistan remains tense, with families clinging to hope that they will not be uprooted again

New Delhi, April 26: Pakistani Hindu refugees staying at Delhi's Majnu Ka Tila are anxious about their status due to inadequate information even though the government has clarified that Long Term Visas (LTVs) already granted to Hindu Pakistani nationals will remain valid.

Delhi Police officials said that a verification drive has been launched but they will ensure that no one is harassed unnecessarily.

India announced Thursday that all visas issued to Pakistani nationals would be revoked from April 27 and asked

these people to leave the country as tensions between the two countries escalated after the barbaric terror attack in Jammu and Kashmir's Pahalgam left 26 people dead.

While the government later clarified that LTVs already granted to Hindu Pakistani nationals will remain valid, many refugees say they are worried about their fate as their visas are renewed every two years and their applications for Indian citizenship under the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019 are still being processed.

Sona Das, president of the Hindu refugee community at Majnu Ka Tila, said several families have been living



in Delhi for years, renewing their visas periodically after document verification by authorities.

"Also, many of these families crossed over from Pakistan just one or two months ago, some are living in camps near Majnu Ka Tila, while others have taken shelter under the Signature

Bridge," Das told PTI.

Recently, the police asked the refugees to submit their documents for verification to check if anyone was staying illegally or using forged papers, he said.

"All relevant documents were collected, but people are nervous about what might happen next," he added.

Many refugees, awaiting citizenship under the Citizenship Amendment Act, fear potential displacement as authorities conduct document verification drives

Delhi Police officials said they will ensure that no one is harassed unnecessarily. "We are simply checking that all migrants have proper documents," an official said.

Following the government's directive, the Delhi Police has launched a drive to ensure that no Pakistani nationals are residing illegally in the capital. Officials said the focus would be

on verifying documents of those who recently entered India.

Krishan Lal, another resident of the refugee camp, said he is worried about his family. "My wife, children and brother applied for Indian citizenship, but it hasn't been granted yet," Lal said.

Earlier, March 11, the Centre had granted Indian citizenship to 186 Pakistani Hindus under the Citizenship (Amendment) Act, 2019. However, many others are still waiting.

After the decision on the suspension of visas, Union Home Minister Amit Shah has also spoken to the chief ministers of all states, directing them to ensure that no Pakistani national stays beyond the new deadline.

The revocation of visas does not apply to long-term visas issued to Hindu Pakistani nationals, these remain valid, officials said.

The Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) Saturday said the Yatra is set to take place from June to August via two routes -- Lipulekh Pass in Uttarakhand and Nathu La in Sikkim.

The pilgrimage to Mount Kailash and Mansarovar Lake in China's Tibet Autonomous

Region holds religious significance to Hindus as well as Jains and Buddhists.

“Kailash Manasarovar Yatra organised by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) is set to take place during June to August 2025,” the MEA said.

The Yatra was suspended initially in 2020 because of the COVID-19 pandemic and subsequently because of the military standoff between the two sides on the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh.

The militaries of India and China completed disengagement of troops at the two remaining friction points of Demchok and Depsang under a pact



sealed October 21 last year.

Two days later, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping held talks in the Russian city of Kazan and agreed to revive various

bilateral dialogue mechanisms.

Following the Modi-Xi talks, the two sides held a series of meetings in the last few months which were aimed at normalising the bilateral relations.

14 held in Assam so far for ‘pro-Pak’ posts

Guwahati, April 26: At least 14 people have been arrested in Assam so far for making ‘seditious comments’ in the wake of the Pahalgam attack, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said Saturday.

He warned that if required, these people would be booked under the National Security Act (NSA).

“There are no similarities between Bharat and Pakistan. The two countries are enemy nations and we must remain like that,” Sarma told reporters on the sidelines of a programme at the state BJP office here.

He said a leader of Krishak Mukti Sangram Samiti was apprehended Friday for his ‘anti-India comment’ and warned that anyone who takes such a stance will be arrested.

“If required, we will impose provisions of NSA on them. We are examining all (social media) posts, and action will be taken against those who, we feel, are anti-national,” the chief minister asserted.

In a post on X, he said the number of arrested persons for making ‘pro-Pakistan’ comments has increased to 14.

At least six arrests were reported during the day, including two in Cachar and one each in Hailakandi, Nagaon and Sribhumi.

Sarma, in another post on X, said one person was held in Sribhumi district Friday night.

Houses razed, hundreds detained in Kashmir

Srinagar, April 26: Authorities in Kashmir have launched a massive crackdown on terrorists and their sympathisers in the aftermath of the Pahalgam terror attack, razing homes of the ultras, raiding their safe havens and detaining hundreds of overground workers for questioning, officials said Saturday.

Over the past 48 hours, security forces have demolished the homes of six terrorists or their associates and detained hundreds of overground workers (OGWs) for questioning.

Officials said the campaign aims to dismantle the “terrorist ecosystem” and create a deterrent against similar attacks. Jammu and Kashmir Police raided over 60 locations in Srinagar Saturday, including areas like Safakadal, Soura, Bemina, and Lal Bazar. The searches, conducted legally in the presence of magistrates, targeted OGWs and associates of proscribed outfits, with a focus on seizing digital devices, weapons, and documents.

In Anantnag district, round-the-clock search operations are underway. Security forces have set up mobile checkpoints across the region to monitor suspicious movement. The crackdown intensified after



Tuesday's attack in Baisaran, Pahalgam, where terrorists opened fire on tourists, sparking fresh India-Pakistan tensions. Prime Minister Narendra Modi vowed to pursue the attackers “to the ends of the earth.”

Among the homes demolished was that of Aadil Thoker, named as one of the attackers, in Bijbehara. Another blast destroyed the house of Asif Sheikh in Tral, whose role in the attack is under investigation. Four more houses were razed in Pulwama, Shopian, Kulgam, and Kupwara Friday night. These belonged to known terrorists including LeT commander Shahid Ahmad Kuttay and Pakistani-trained Ahsan ul Haq.

In Bandipora, one alleged OGW, Altaf Lalli, was killed by terrorists during a security operation. He had led forces to a suspected hideout when ultras

opened fire, injuring two policemen and escaping.

Police emphasized their commitment to uprooting terrorist networks, warning that anyone aiding anti-national activities will face strict legal consequences under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act.

Meanwhile, tensions escalated along the Line of Control (LoC), with the Pakistani military carrying out unprovoked firing for a second consecutive night. Indian forces responded appropriately, and no casualties were reported. The Pakistani military is reportedly on high alert after India's pledge to avenge the Pahalgam killings.

Officials say the ongoing operations aim to disrupt terror networks, strengthen security, and reassure civilians as the region grapples with one of its deadliest attacks in recent years.

171mn lifted above poverty line in 10 yrs: WB

New York, April 26: India has lifted 171 million people from extreme poverty in the decade between 2011-12 and 2022-23, the World Bank said.

“Over the past decade, India has significantly reduced poverty. Extreme poverty (living on less than \$2.15 per day) fell from 16.2 per cent in 2011-12 to 2.3 per cent in 2022-23, lifting 171

million people above this line,” the World Bank said in its ‘Poverty & Equity Brief’ on India.

It added that rural extreme poverty dropped from 18.4 per cent to 2.8 per cent, and urban from 10.7 per cent to 1.1 per cent, narrowing the rural-urban gap from 7.7 to 1.7 percentage points — a 16 per cent annual decline.

The brief said that India also transitioned into the lower-middle-income category. Using the

\$3.65 per day LMIC poverty line, poverty fell from 61.8 per cent to 28.1 per cent, lifting 378 million people out of poverty.

Rural poverty dropped from 69 per cent to 32.5 per cent, and urban poverty from 43.5 per cent to 17.2 per cent, reducing the rural-urban gap from 25 to 15 percentage points with a 7 per cent annual decline.

India's five most populous states — Uttar Pradesh, Maha-

rashtra, Bihar, West Bengal, and Madhya Pradesh—accounted for 65 per cent of the country's extreme poor in 2011-12 and contributed to two-thirds of the overall decline in extreme poverty by 2022-23, it said.

“Nevertheless, these states still accounted for 54 per cent of India's extremely poor (2022-23) and 51 per cent of the multidimensionally poor (2019-21),” the brief said.

Humans to blame for 80% drop in three-striped roofed turtle numbers

The study, supported by the National Mission for Clean Ganga, has revealed an alarmingly low genetic diversity in the rescued population of the freshwater reptile species, raising concerns over its long-term survival

New Delhi, April 26: The three-striped roofed turtle, once found in numbers in the Ganga and Brahmaputra rivers, has now largely disappeared with a government-funded study detecting an over 80 per cent drop in its population in half a century,

largely due to habitat loss, illegal trade and pollution.

The study, supported by the National Mission for Clean Ganga, has revealed an alarmingly low genetic diversity in the rescued population of the freshwater reptile species, raising concerns over its long-term survival.

Underscoring the urgent need for science-backed conservation efforts, the study called for long-term genetic tracking, stricter enforcement against poaching, and efforts to restore the semi-aquatic turtle's habitat, especially in its last stronghold -- the National Chambal Sanctuary.

The sanctuary is located on the Chambal river near the tri-point of Rajasthan, Madhya Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh.

“The population of Batagur



dhongoka (three-striped roofed turtle) has experienced a substantial decline due to entanglement in fishing nets, the construction of major hydrological projects affecting river flow dynamics and nesting beaches, water pollution, and the detrimental effects of illegal trade,” the study said.

Researchers from the Wild-

life Institute of India analysed genetic samples from the turtles housed at two Turtle Rescue and Rehabilitation Centres -- TRRC in Varanasi and GARRC in Narora -- part of a captive care initiative under the Namami Gange programme.

Using mitochondrial DNA and microsatellite markers, the study found that the population



exhibit low levels of genetic variation, a warning sign for any species on the brink.

The genetic data showed only weak structuring between the two populations, one from TRRC in Varanasi and the other from GARRC in Narora, suggesting past intermixing but also indicating the danger of inbreeding. The average heterozygosity was under 50 per cent and many individual turtles carried similar genetic markers. Moreover, the demographic pattern estimated by the Bayesian skyline plot (BSP) analysis indicates historical stability followed by growth in the effective population size, with a recent reduction in population size from 2,000 years ago.

The study flagged a major concern for the ongoing rehabilitation programme -- a lack of clarity around the geographic origin

of some rescued turtles. This not only makes it harder to plan successful reintroductions but also raises the risk of outbreeding depression if genetically mismatched turtles are placed with wild populations, it said.

“Gathering information on the geographic origin of individual (turtles) is sometimes difficult and the release of these unknown origin rescue individuals in the wild is often accompanied by high initial losses of released individuals.

In order to ensure the effective protection and conservation of the three-striped roofed turtle, the government has taken a proactive measure by incorporating it into Schedule I of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, as amended in 2022. Species under this schedule enjoys the highest level of protection.

Israel continues assault; 49 killed

Deir Al-Balah: At least 49 people were killed by Israeli strikes in the last 24 hours, according to health officials, as Arab mediators scrambled to restart a ceasefire. An airstrike in a neighbourhood in western Gaza City early Saturday morning, flattened a three-story house, killing 10 people, according to a cameraman cooperating with The Associated Press. The number was confirmed by Gaza's Health Ministry, along with three more people who were killed in the Shati refugee camp along the city's shoreline. The attacks come as Hamas said on Saturday that it sent a high-level delegation to Cairo to try and get the stalled ceasefire back on track. There was no immediate comment from Israel on the strikes.

US, Iran N-talks

Muscat: Iran and the United States began in-depth negotiations in Oman over Tehran's rapidly advancing nuclear programme Saturday, talks that likely will hinge on the Islamic Republic's enrichment of uranium. Iranian state television reported the talks had begun in Muscat, the mountain-wrapped capital of this sultanate on the eastern edge of the Arabian Peninsula. However, neither Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi nor US Mideast envoy Steve Witkoff offered any immediate specifics or details on the talks that they'll lead. Araghchi arrived Friday in Oman and met with Omani Foreign Minister Badr al-Busaidi, who has mediated the two previous round of talks in Muscat and Rome.

The 15-nation Security Council underlines need to hold perpetrators accountable

United Nations, April 26: The UNSC has "condemned in the strongest terms" the terrorist attack in Jammu and Kashmir, stressing that those responsible should be held accountable and the organisers and sponsors of this "reprehensible act of terrorism" should be brought to justice.

The 15-nation Council issued a Press Statement on 'terrorist attack in Jammu and Kashmir' in which the members "condemned in the strongest terms the terrorist attack in Jammu and Kashmir" April 22, during which at least 26 people were killed and many more injured. "The members of the Security Council underlined the need to hold perpetrators, organisers, financiers and sponsors of this reprehensible act of terrorism accountable and bring them to justice," the press statement said. "They stressed that those responsible for these killings should be held accountable, and urged all States, in accordance with their obligations under

international law and relevant Security Council resolutions, to cooperate actively with all relevant authorities in this regard," it said. A press statement is a declaration to the media made by the President of the Security Council on behalf of all 15 Members. France is President of the Council for the month of April and the press statement was issued by Council President Permanent Representative of France to the UN Ambassador Jerome Bonnafont. It is learnt that the US had floated the draft statement, which was then discussed by Council members. Pakistan currently sits in

Reprehensible act of terrorism: UNSC

India, Pak will figure it out: Trump

New York: US President Donald Trump has said there has always been tensions between India and Pakistan and the two countries will figure it out between themselves "one way or the other". Trump made these remarks Friday after he was asked about tensions between India and Pakistan in the wake of the Pahalgam terror attack in which 26 civilians were killed and if he would be talking to the leaders of the two nations. "I am very close to India and I'm very close to Pakistan, as you know. And they've had that fight for 1,000 years in Kashmir. Kashmir has been going on for 1,000 years, probably longer than that. And it was a bad one yesterday, though, that was a bad one. Over 30 people," Trump said during a press gaggle with reporters aboard Air Force One on the way to Rome. There have been "tensions on that border for 1,500 years. So you know, the same as it's been, but they'll get it figured out one way or the other. I'm sure... I know both leaders. There is great tension between Pakistan and India. But there always has been", he said.

Pak official's throat slit gesture at protesters in UK



There was a face-off between Indian diaspora groups who gathered to protest Pakistan-backed terrorism in the wake of the Pahalgam terrorist attack and counter-protesters outside the Pakistan High Commission here, which saw scenes of a Pakistani diplomatic official making threatening gestures. In videos posted by Indian community groups from Friday evening's protest on social media, the Pakistani official can be seen taunting them from the balcony of the mission building at Lowndes Square. He was holding a poster with a sketch of Captain Abhinandan Varthaman and the words "Chai is Fantastic" – a reference to the Indian Air Force (IAF) pilot's captivity in February 2019. The official, standing next to a large banner reading "Pakistan stands with Kashmiris", could be seen making a threatening throat-slitting gesture towards the Indian protesters across the building. There was a strong Metropolitan Police security detail in place, with several officers lined up between both groups of demonstrators to ensure order. The tense face-off saw Indians waving placards calling on Pakistan to "End Terror on Kashmir" alongside the Indian national flag. "Holding the Indian tricolour and placards reading 'Stop Terrorism', we are here to condemn the killing of innocents by Pakistan's support of terrorism in Kashmir. We demand strict international action and urge the UK government to stand with India and reconsider its policy towards Pakistan," said a spokesperson for the Friends of India Society International (FISI) UK. "In a shocking and utterly deplorable display, a member of the Pakistani High Commission in the UK brandished a photo of India's Wing Commander Abhinandan and made a barbaric throat-slitting gesture during a protest over the Pahalgam attack – an act that reflects not only blatant hostility but also a dangerous disregard for diplomatic norms and human decency," the spokesperson added. "Join us to stand for unity, justice and humanity and protest against terror attacks on innocents," read the flyers outside the Pakistan High Commission in London. The Pakistani counter-protesters had organised loudspeakers and were blaring patriotic songs in an attempt to drown out the Indian protesters' anti-terror sloganeering and speeches.

Over 450 Indians leave Pak for home via Wagah border

Lahore: More than 450 Indians have left Pakistan for their home via the Wagah border over the last three days after they were forced to cut short their visits because of cancellation of visas in the wake of developments following the Pahalgam terror attack. Among those who left Saturday were 23 Indians, who were part of a broadcast company of PSL (Pakistan Super League) 2025, officials said here. Around 300 Indians returned home Friday and 100-odd Thursdays via the same route, the officials added. At the same time, 200 Pakistani nationals have returned home from India, they said. In Pakistan, individuals holding long-term visas, Overseas Citizens of India (OCI) and those with 'No Objection to Return to India' stamps were denied border crossing. Some Indian-origin foreign nationals, including Sikh families, were stopped by Indian immigration and security officials from entering into Pakistan, the officials said.



Pak initiates 'emergency' steps to secure drug supplies

Islamabad: Pakistani health authorities have initiated "emergency preparedness" measures to secure pharmaceutical supplies in response to the suspension of trade ties with India, according to a media report Saturday. Geo News reported that India trade halt triggered "urgent measures to secure" pharmaceutical needs in Pakistan and health authorities have initiated "emergency preparedness" measures to secure the supplies. The Drug Regulatory Authority of Pakistan (DRAP) has confirmed that while there has been no formal notification regarding the ban's impact on the pharmaceutical sector, contingency plans are already in place, it said. "Following the 2019 crisis, we had started preparing for such contingencies. We are now actively looking at alternative avenues to meet our pharmaceutical needs," the report quoted a senior DRAP official as saying. Currently, Pakistan relies on India for 30% to 40% of its pharmaceutical raw materials, including Active Pharmaceutical Ingredients (API) and various advanced therapeutic products.



Russia declares liberation of Kursk; Ukraine denies claim

Moscow, April 26: Russia Saturday declared full liberation of western Kursk region and lauded the role of North Korean troops in purging the Armed Forces of Ukraine. Parts of the Kursk region were captured by the Ukrainian armed forces in August 2024 in incursion. Ukraine denied Russia's claim. Briefing President Vladimir Putin, Chief of the General Staff of RF Armed Forces, Gen Valery Gerasimov said: "Kursk

region is fully liberated from Ukrainian troops after the last habitation of Gornal was liberated this morning." "Soldiers and officers of the Korean People's Army, performing combat missions shoulder to shoulder with Russian servicemen, demonstrated high professionalism during the repelling of the Ukrainian invasion, demonstrated fortitude, courage and heroism in the battle," TASS quoted Gen Gerasimov as saying. "The Russian side will never forget its friends from



the DPRK," Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova thanked the North Koreans for standing by Russia. Kiev had attempted to occupy the Kursk region bordering on eastern Ukraine to take over control of gas export terminal Sudzha as a bargaining chip in

future negotiations. However, backed by NATO arms and mercenaries, Ukrainian forces were unable to capture the regional Atomic Power plant. In August 2024, Ukraine attacked across the border and took control of approximately 1,300 square kilometres of land in the hope of using it in future negotiations. Ukrainian officials denied Russia's claim about the Kursk region. They said the fighting was still continuing. "The statements of representatives of the high command of the aggressor

country about the alleged end of hostilities in the Kursk region of the Russian Federation are not true," Ukraine's General staff said Saturday. "The defensive operation of the Ukrainian Defence Forces in certain areas in the Kursk region continues. The operational situation is difficult, but our units continue to hold designated positions and carry out assigned tasks, while inflicting effective fire damage on the enemy with all types of weapons, including using active defense tactics," it added.

N Korea unveils new 'Kim Jong Un style' 5,000-tonne warship

Seoul, April 26: North Korean leader Kim Jong Un attended a ceremony for the launch of a "new multipurpose destroyer", state media KCNA reported. The 5,000-tonne warship was equipped with the "most powerful weapons" and built "within 400-odd days perfectly with our own strength and technology", the report said, quoting Jo Chun Ryong, a secretary in the ruling Workers' Party. Kim, in a speech from the launch reported by KCNA, said the warship would be handed over to the navy and go into service early next year. Footage from North Korea's state-run television KRT showed Kim arriving in Nampho with his daughter Ju Ae after travelling to the western port city by train. "If the US continues to renew its record in the protests of military power, we will have no choice but to renew it in the exercise of strategic deterrence," the leader was heard saying on TV footage. The launch, which took place Friday at the military shipbuilding dockyard of Nampho, marked a new era of the "great Kim Jong Un-style fleet building", KCNA said, quoting Vice-Admiral Pak Kwang Sop.

message: there was no going back. The first pontiff from Latin America had been "attentive to the signs of the times and what the Holy Spirit was awakening in the Church," he said. Applause rang out as Francis' coffin, inlaid with a large cross, was brought out of the basilica and into the sun-filled square by 14 white-gloved pallbearers at the start of the Mass. The Vatican estimated more

than 250,000 people attended the ceremony, cramming the square and the roads around. The crowds clapped loudly again at the end of the service when the ushers picked up the casket and tilted it slightly so more people could see. Aerial views of the Vatican showed a patchwork of colours - black from the dark garb of the world's leaders, red from the vestments of some 250 cardinals, the purple worn by some of the 400 bishops and the white worn by 4,000 attending priests. Francis, who shunned much of the pomp and privilege of the papacy, had asked to be buried there rather than in St Peter's – the first time a pope had been laid to rest outside the Vatican in more than a century. The burial itself was conducted in private. The popemobile left the Vatican from the Perugino Gate, a side entrance just yards away

from the Santa Marta guest-house where Francis had chosen to live, instead of the ornate Renaissance apartments in the papal palace. Crowds estimated by police as numbering some 150,000 lined the 5.5-km (3.4-mile) route to St. Mary Major. The scene resembled many popemobile rides Francis took in his 47 trips to all corners of the world. Some in the crowd waved signs and others threw flowers towards the casket. They shouted "viva il papa" (long live the pope) and "ciao, Francesco" (goodbye, Francis) as the procession made its way around Rome's ancient monuments, including the Colosseum. His tomb has just "Franciscus", his name in Latin, inscribed on the top. A reproduction of the simple, iron-plated cross he used to wear around his neck hangs above the marble slab.

India Cements profit at ₹14.68cr

New Delhi: The India Cements Ltd, now an Aditya Birla Group firm, Saturday reported a consolidated net profit of ₹14.68 crore for the quarter ended in March 2025. It had reported a net loss of ₹60.55 crore in the January-March period a year ago, according to a BSE filing. However, its revenue from operations was down 3.11 per cent to ₹1,197.30 crore in the March quarter of FY25. This was at ₹1,235.74 crore in the corresponding quarter last fiscal. Total expenses of India Cements were at ₹1,313.2 crore, down marginally in the March quarter. Total income, which includes other income, declined by 2.52 per cent to ₹1,255.66 crore in the March quarter.

MRPL net profit drops 68%

New Delhi: Mangalore Refinery and Petrochemicals Ltd (MRPL) Saturday reported a 68 per cent drop in its March quarter net profit on the back of a fall in refining margins. Net profit was ₹363 crore in January-March - the fourth quarter of April 2024 to March 2025 fiscal year - compared with ₹1,137 crore earnings in the same period a year back, the company said in a statement. The firm, which is a subsidiary of state-owned Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC), earned USD 6.23 on turning every barrel of crude oil into fuel in the fourth quarter as compared to a gross refining margin of USD 11.35 per barrel a year back. Revenue from operations dropped to ₹27,601 crore from ₹29,190 crore in January-March 2024 on lower oil prices.

L&T Finance profit up 15%

New Delhi: Retail-focused non-bank lender L&T Finance has reported a 15 per cent rise in consolidated net profit to ₹636 crore for the January-March quarter of 2024-25. The company had earned a net profit of ₹554 crore in the corresponding quarter of the previous financial year. During the quarter, the NBFC's total income increased to ₹4,027 crore from ₹3,676 crore a year ago, L&T Finance said in a regulatory filing. Interest income grew to ₹3,750 crore during the period under review, from ₹3,323 crore in the corresponding quarter a year ago.

Edible oil industry seeks hike in import duty of palm oil

New Delhi, April 26: Edible oil industry body SEA has demanded that the government should raise import duty on refined palm oil to 40 per cent from the current 32.5 per cent to protect the domestic processing industries.

Solvent Extractors' Association of India (SEA) President Sanjeev Asthana has written a letter to Union Food and Consumer Affairs Minister Pralhad Joshi requesting him to raise import duty difference between CPO and RBD Palmolein for providing level-playing field to domestic refining industries.

"This import of finished goods is contrary to our national interests and is seriously affecting the capacity utilisation of our palm refining industry," Asthana said, adding that the refined palmolein is cheaper by USD 50 per tonne currently.

"The main reason for rise in palmolein imports is the encouragement given by exporting countries (Malaysia and Indonesia) to their industry. They have kept high export duties on CPO and low export duty on palmolein (finished product)," he said.

Asthana urged the minister to increase RBD palmolein duty from current level of 32.5 per cent to 40 per cent.

Effective September 14, 2024, the Basic Customs Duty on Crude Soybean Oil, Crude Palm Oil, and Crude Sunflower Oil has been raised from zero to 20 per cent, making the effective duty on crude oils to 27.5 per cent.

Anant Ambani appointed Executive Director of RIL

New Delhi, April 26: Billionaire Mukesh Ambani's youngest son, Anant has been appointed as Executive Director of Reliance Industries Ltd for a five-year term effective May 1, the company said.

Ambani had in August 2023 inducted his three children - twins Isha and Akash and Anant - on the board of oil-to-telecom conglomerate as non-executive directors, in preparation of an eventual succession plan.

Asia's richest person in recent years has said that the children would have significant roles at Reliance, India's most valuable and profitable company.

Eldest son Akash is already chairman of the telecom arm, Jio Infocomm since June 2022 after joining the unit in 2014.

His twin sister Isha drives the company's retail, e-com-

merce and luxury businesses. Anant overseas new energy business.

All three children are on board of Jio Platforms, the unit that holds telecom and digital properties of Reliance, and Reliance Retail.

"The Board of Directors of Reliance at its meeting on April 25, on the recommendation of the Human Resources, Nomination and Remuneration Committee, considered and appointed Anant M. Ambani, a Non-Executive Director... as Whole-time Director designated as Executive Director of the Company, for a period of 5 years with effect from May 1, 2025, subject to approval of members of the company," Reliance said in a stock exchange filing.

Anant, a graduate from Brown University, is the first among the Ambani siblings to be appointed as an executive director at Reliance.

Apple plans to make most iPhones for US in India

Bangalore, April 26: Apple aims to make most of its iPhones sold in the United States at factories in India by the end of 2026, and is speeding up those plans to navigate potentially higher tariffs in China, its main manufacturing base, a source told Reuters.

The US tech giant is holding urgent talks with contract manufacturers Foxconn and Tata to achieve that goal, the person, who declined to be named as the planning process is confidential, said Friday.

Apple and Foxconn did not immediately respond to requests for comment, while Tata declined to comment.

Apple sells over 60 million iPhones in the US annually with roughly 80 per cent of them made in China currently.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi has in recent years promoted India as a smartphone manufacturing hub, but higher duties on importing mobile phone parts compared to many other countries means it is still expensive for companies to produce in India.

For iPhones, manufacturing costs in India are 5-8 per cent higher than in China, with the difference rising to as much as 10 per cent in some cases, the source said.

Apple has already stepped up production in India to beat



US President Donald Trump's tariffs, shipping some 600 tons of iPhones worth \$2 billion to the United States in March. The shipments from India marked a record for both its contractors Tata and Foxconn, with the latter alone accounting for smartphones worth \$1.3 billion, Reuters reported last week.

In April, the U.S. administration imposed 26 per cent duties on imports from India, much lower than the more than 100 per cent China was facing at the time. Washington has since paused most du-

ties for three months, except for China.

Trump's administration has since signalled openness to de-escalating the trade war between the world's two largest economies that has raised fears of recession.

The Financial Times first reported about Apple's plan Friday.

As Apple diversifies its manufacturing beyond China, it has positioned India for a critical role. Foxconn and Tata, its two main suppliers there, have three factories in all, with two more being built.

10.35% annual growth in domestic air passengers

Airlines are expanding their fleet as well as networks to meet the rising air travel demand in the country, which is one of the world's fastest-growing civil aviation markets

New Delhi, April 26: India saw a robust 10.35 per cent annual growth in passengers carried by domestic airlines at 431.98 lakh last fiscal (FY25), from 391.46 lakh in the previous fiscal (FY24), according to the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) data released Saturday.

In the month of March, the figure was 145.42 lakh as against 133.68 lakh during the corresponding period of the previous year, thereby registering a monthly growth of 8.79 per cent, according to the official data.

Low-cost carrier IndiGo reached 93.1 lakh passengers with

a market share of 64 per cent. Air India Group (Air India and Air India Express) flew 38.8 lakh passengers with 26.7 per cent market share, the DGCA data revealed.

Akasa Air and SpiceJet clocked 7.2 lakh and 4.8 lakh passengers, respectively, last month - with a market share of 5 per cent and 3.3 per cent.

The overall cancellation rate of scheduled domestic airlines for the month of March 2025 has been 0.56 per cent, according to the DGCA.

During March, a total of 739 passenger-related complaints had been received by the scheduled domestic airlines. The number of complaints per 10,000 passengers carried for the month of March has been around 0.51.

New Delhi, April 26: The Indian stock markets extended their recovery for yet another week, registering nearly a one per cent gain amid a phase of consolidation.

After an initial surge, the benchmarks traded in a narrow range through the middle of the week, before witnessing profit-taking in the final session. Ultimately, the Nifty and Sensex ended at 24,039.35 and 79,212.53 respectively.

According to analysts, global market stability, driven by ongoing discussions between the United States and its trade partners on new trade agreements, helped ease concerns about the impact of tariffs on global commerce.

"This, coupled with renewed foreign institutional investor (FII) inflows, bolstered market sentiment. However, rising geopolitical tensions between India and Pakistan - following a terrorist attack in Jammu and Kashmir - sparked investor caution and led to some profit-bookings," said Ajit Mishra-SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd.



Sector-wise, the sharp rebound in the IT sector stood out as a key driver.

Additionally, the auto, pharma, and real estate sectors also posted gains. Conversely, financials and fast-moving consumer goods (FMCG) sectors ended the week in the red. Broader market indices managed to close in the green, delivering gains in the range of 0.83 per cent to 1.73 per cent.

According to a note by Bajaj Broking Research, index on weekly chart has formed a bull candle with a long upper shad-

ow which maintained a higher high and higher low, signalling positive bias with profit booking at higher levels after recent strong up move.

"Going ahead in the coming truncated week, a move above last 3 sessions almost identical high (24,365) will open further upside towards 24,550 being the 61.8 per cent retracement of the entire decline (26277-21743). Failure to move above last week high (24365) will signal consolidation in the range 23,500-24,350," the note said.

World breathes sigh of relief as Trump spares Fed, IMF

Washington, April 26: Global policymakers gathering in Washington this week breathed a collective sigh of relief that the U.S.-centric economic order that prevailed for the past 80 years was not collapsing just yet despite Donald Trump's inward-looking approach.

The Spring Meetings of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank were dominated by trade talks, which also brought some de-escalatory statements from Washington about its relations with China.

But some deeper questions hovered over central bankers and finance ministers after Trump's attacks on international institutions and the Federal Reserve: can we still count on the U.S. dollar as the world's safe haven and on the two lenders that have supported the international economic system since the end of World War Two?

Conversations with dozens of policymakers from all over

the world revealed generalised relief at Trump's scaling back his threats to fire Fed Chair Jerome Powell, the guardian of the dollar's international status whom he had previously described as a "major loser".

And many also saw a silver lining in U.S. Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent's call to reshape the IMF and World Bank according to Trump's priorities because it implied that the United States was not about to pull out of the two lenders that it helped create at the Bretton Woods conference of 1944.

"This week was one of cautious relief," Austria's central bank governor Robert Holzmann said. "There was a turn (in the U.S. administration's stance) but I fret this may not be the last. I keep my reservations."

A politicization of the Fed and, to a lesser extent, the hollowing out of the IMF and World Bank are almost too much to fathom for most officials.

Deprived of a lender of last



resort, some \$25 trillion of bonds and loans issued abroad would be called into question.

At the heart of policymakers' concerns is that there is no ready alternative to the United States as the world's financial hegemon - a situation that economists know as the Kindleberger Trap after renowned historian Charles Kindleberger.

To be sure, the euro, a distant-second reserve currency, is gaining popularity in light of the European Union's newly found status as an island of relative stability.

But policymakers who spoke to Reuters were adamant that the European single currency was not ready yet to dethrone the dollar and could at best

hope to add a little to its 20% share of the world's reserves.

Of the 20 countries that share the euro only Germany has the credit rating and the size that investors demand from a safe haven.

Some other members are highly indebted and prone to bouts of political and financial turmoil - most recently in France last year - which raise lingering questions about the bloc's long-term viability.

And the euro zone's geographical proximity to Russia - particularly the three Baltic countries that were once part of the Soviet Union - cast an even more sinister shadow.

With Japan now too small and China's heavily managed currency in an even worse position, this left no alternative to the dollar system underpinned by the Fed and the two Bretton Woods institutions.

In fact, the IMF and the World Bank could scarcely survive if their largest shareholder, the United States, pulled out, officials said.

"The U.S. is absolutely crucial for multilateral institutions," Polish Finance Minister Andrzej Domanski told Reuters. "We're happy they remain."

Still, few expected to go back to the old status quo and thorny issues were likely to await, such as widespread dependence on U.S. firms for a number of key services from credit cards to satellites.

But some observers argued that the market turmoil of the past few weeks, which saw U.S. bonds, shares and the currency sell off sharply, might have been a shot in the arm as it forced a change of tack by the administration.

"When President Trump talked about firing Jay Powell, the fact that markets reacted so vigorously to that ended up being a disciplining reality just reminding the administration that, if you cross that line, it could have some very severe implications," said Nathan Sheets, global chief economist at Citi.

In reply, KKR were seven for no loss in one over when a sudden thunderstorm struck around 9.35pm, sending debris flying across the ground and even blowing the covers into the stands.

The ground staff quickly covered the pitch, but relentless rain followed, leaving no scope for a resumption of play.

After nearly 90 minutes of waiting, with no let-up in the weather, the match was officially called off at 10.58pm.

As a result, both the teams shared one point each.

KKR now have seven points from nine matches to stay at seventh spot, while Punjab Kings moved to 11 points from nine games.

Earlier, in-form Arya, who scored a maiden IPL century against Chennai Super Kings, continued his dream debut season with a classy 27-ball fifty.

He, along with the seasoned Prabhsimran, gave PBKS a blazing start with a 120-run opening stand in just 11.5 overs.

Arya was the early aggressor,



crafting a fluent 69 off 35 balls (8x4s, 4x6s), while Prabhsimran shifted gears after Arya's dismissal, finishing with a sparkling 83 off 49 deliveries (6x4s, 6x6s).

From a tentative 32 off 34 balls, Prabhsimran exploded by smashing 49 runs off his next 17 balls.

However, the momentum dipped after Prabhsimran's departure, with KKR conceding just 40 runs and picking up two wickets in the final five overs, a phase that could leave PBKS 20-30 runs short of a daunting total.

Vaibhav Arora (2/34) was the pick of KKR bowlers, dismissing Prabhsimran with a full toss.

Andre Russell, who broke the opening stand by removing Arya in the 12th over, finished

with 1/27 from three tidy overs.

Varun Chakravarthy (1/39) and Sunil Narine (0/35) also played key roles in slowing down the scoring rate in the second half.

In full flow, Prabhsimran had earlier unleashed an assault on Chakravarthy, smashing him for 4-6-4 in a 19-run over as PBKS looked set for a total in excess of 230.

Between overs 10 and 15, they hammered 71 runs and the run rate went past 11 runs per over.

It proved a good toss to win for Punjab Kings, who made merry on a batting paradise with the ball coming nicely on to the bat against a low-on-confidence KKR side.

Unlike previous matches where the pitch slowed down, Saturday's strip was perfect for batting, and Arya capital-

ised with his array of elegant strokes.

Bhubaneswar, April 26: Indian Super League Shield and Cup winners Mohun Bagan Super Giant (MBSG) beat Kerala Blasters 2-1 to enter the Super Cup semifinals here Saturday.

MBSG, fielding an all-Indian squad except for Portuguese defender Nuno Reis, scored once in each half through Sahal Abdul Samad (22nd minute) and Suhail Ahmad Bhat (51st).

Sreekuttan MS (90+4) pulled one back for the Blasters, but it was too little, too late for the Kerala side.

The game began at a leisurely pace, with both teams not committing many bodies in the opposition half. After 20 minutes of no goal-mouth action, Mohun Bagan SG churned out the opener with their first meaningful attack of the match.

With some lightning-quick footwork, Salahudheen Adnan twisted and turned past left-back Naocha Singh and slipped a cross into the six-yard box. Getting on the end of it was Samad, who swiftly evaded Ruivah Hormipam's challenge and dinked the ball over goalkeeper Sachin Suresh to make it 1-0 in the 22nd minute.

From then on, it was all Kerala Blasters, who grew desperate for the equaliser. Noah Sadaoui cut in from the right and took a shot from distance, but he didn't get enough elevation, and the ball landed straight into the gloves of MBSG goalkeeper Dheeraj Singh.

The Blasters became increas-



ingly dangerous from corners. In the 30th minute, after playing a one-two with Vibin Mohanan, Sadaoui drilled a low cross that was cleared by Dipendu Biswas.

Later, from another corner, Hormipam's cross-turned-shot almost landed into the top corner, but Dheeraj did well to tip it over.

In the added time of first half, Mohammed Aimen was fed on the left wing by Vibin. The midfielder cut in from the left before seeing his right-footer swerve over the bar.

Before Kerala Blasters could even get into gear for the second half, Mohun Bagan SG struck another goal.

Ashique Kuruniyan created the second goal from the left flank. The India international skipped past Hormipam and squared an inch-perfect ball

into the six-yard box for Bhat to guide it into the net with ease.

Three minutes later, Dheeraj palmed over substitute Kwame Peprah's right-footed shot from a narrow angle.

With just five minutes to go, Peprah tried to set up Jimenez with a low cross into the six-yard box, but the Spaniard couldn't sort his feet out quickly enough and missed it completely.

Dheeraj again made himself big to deny Peprah from six yards before Ebendas's attempt on the rebound was cleared off the line by Amandeep.

The Mohun Bagan custodian was finally beaten in the 94th minute when Jimenez slipped a neat ball for Sreekuttan on the right. The substitute thrashed it over Dheeraj and into the back of the net, but it only turned out to be a consolation strike.

Referee in tears over Real Madrid TV attacks

Madrid, April 26: The referee appointed for the upcoming Copa del Rey final between FC Barcelona and Real Madrid, Ricardo de Burgos Bengoetxea, became emotional Friday while discussing the intense pressure he faces ahead of the match.

He was questioned about a video released by Real Madrid's Club TV network, RMTV, which highlights his supposed mistakes in previous matches against them. This tactic is frequently employed by RMTV to influence referees before key games.

When asked about this latest video, de Burgos Bengoetxea could not hold back tears as he spoke about the impact on him and his family, reports Xinhua.



"When your son comes back from school and other kids have said to him that his father is a thief, it's really hard," he said. "They have no right to make us go through this, but it's not just something between profession-

als; a lot of families depend on this, and everyone should take some time to reflect on what they are doing."

Pablo Gonzalez Fuentes, who will serve as the VAR official for Saturday's match, also crit-

icised RMTV's actions. "They have to understand the consequences of these videos," he said, explaining that they lead to online campaigns against officials.

"We're seeing community managers on official social media platforms attacking the community for just one more like. We see actions by football players that suggest we're dishonest. When a journalist talks about 'theft,' fans take that frustration out on the child who's about to referee a youth team. We must address these types of situations and return to a healthier and cleaner style of football," he commented.

PSG's unbeaten run ends in Ligue 1

Paris, April 26: Paris Saint-Germain's bid to go unbeaten in Ligue 1 was ruined Friday when it lost to Nice 3-1.

PSG's first home defeat in almost a year was a shock reverse for a club which clinched the French league title three weeks ago and was shifting its focus to the Champions League semifinal first leg at Arsenal Tuesday.

Coach Luis Enrique rested several starters but it was still one-way traffic as PSG dominated the early stages.

However, profligate finishing and an inspired performance by Nice goalkeeper Marcin Bulka kept PSG scoreless.

Nice's Morgan Sanson broke the deadlock when Badredine Bouanani's elegant through ball left him with only Gianluigi Donnarumma to beat and he slipped the ball neatly under the keeper.



Nice's lead, however, lasted only five minutes. PSG's Fabian Ruiz turned inside the box and fired home a neat chip over the defense from Ousmane Dembélé.

Nice did the unlikely again a minute into the second half and once more it was Sanson who did the damage, scoring with a spectacular scissor kick volley. Even with the introduction

of Bradley Barcola, Gonçalo Ramos, Warren Zaire-Emery, and Lucas Beraldo, the home side failed to react and, incredibly, Nice scored again. An unmarked Youssouf Ndayishimiye headed home the third in the 70th.

The win lifted Nice into fourth place, equal on points with Monaco and a point behind second-placed Marseille.
