Nayagarh/Cuttack/Keonjhar, April 27: At least six persons including four minors lost their lives in three separate incidents of drowning across

In the first incident, three minors drowned in a pond during play at Godibida village under Daspalla block of Nayagarh district. The deceased were identified as Umakant Nayak, 10, Ritesh Pradhan, 11, and Subham Khilar, 12. The fatal mishap occurred when the three slipped into the pond during play and drowned.

In a similar incident, a 14-yearold boy drowned while bathing in the Kathajodi river near Khannagar in Cuttack. The deceased was identified as Suryakanta Maihi. Locals and fire service personnel rescued him near the Khannagar railway bridge and took him to the SCB Medical College and Hospital, where the doctors declared him dead.

Meanwhile, in Keonjhar district, two youths drowned in the gorge of Patahara waterfall at Chandangiri under Harichandanpur police station limits when the duo was taking a selfie but slipped and fell into the gorge. The deceased were identified as Atul Ranjan Sahu, 20, and Rudra Narayan Mishra, 20, from Jagatsinghpur district.


Rape accused marries victim in Ganjam jail Berhampur: A 26-year-old man

lodged in a jail in Ganjam district in a rape case, Sunday married the survivor in the premises of the prison, officials said. The marriage was solemnised in the jail premises in the presence of the family members of the bride and groom, several dignitaries and jail officials. Due to certain misunderstandings between the families of the bride and groom, the 22-year-old woman lodged a rape complaint against Behera and subsequently, he was taken into custody, said PK Mishra, they have mutually agreed to their marriage, even though the groom is lodged in jail as an undertrial prisoner, he said.

Exit-India deadline ends Villagers lynch siblings, burn bodies in forest

s tensions between India A and Pakistan spiral following the gruesome Pahalgam terror attack, a wave of grief and helplessness swept over families torn apart at the Attari border. Amid the rush to exit, wedding celebrations were abandoned, long-awaited reunions cut short. Scenes of teary farewells and long queues underscored the anguish of forced separation in stark contrast to the nationwide anger and hardened political resolve. With emotions boiling over, the border turned into a scene of sorrow and suspicion—a heartbreaking reflection of personal loss against a backdrop of warlike atmosphere consuming the subcontinent clouded with uncertainty.

New Delhi, April 27: As many as 537 Pakistani nationals, including nine diplomats and officials, left India in four days through the Attari-Wagah border point since April 24 after the government announced the visa revocation the previous day, officials said. up to ₹3 lakh. "Terrorists and their backers carried out the Pahalgam attack to destroy Kashmir again as they did not like the return of peace and prosperity," Prime Minister Narendra Modi said Sunday and vowed the "harshest" response to the "perpetrators and conspirators"

As the Prime Minister, in his monthly Mann Ki Baat radio address, spoke of a "decisive battle" against terrorism, authorities in Jammu and Kashmir razed more houses of terrorists and rounded up their sympathisers in a stepped-up

crackdown on terror ecosystem after the Pakistan-linked ultras Tuesday shot dead 26 people, mostly tourists, in cold blood.

The National Investigation Agency (NIA) formally took over the Pahalgam terrorist attack probe, registering a case in Jammu Sunday.

As the tensions between the two countries soared, the Pakistani military engaged in unprovoked firing along the Line of Control in the areas opposite Tutmari Gali and Rampur sectors for the third consecutive night, military sources said.

The Pakistan military was engaged in similar firing Thursday and Friday nights as well. 'Our troops responded effectively with appropriate small arms fire," said an Indian official.

While the Pakistan military has been put on high alert following India's promise that it will hunt down those involved in the April 22 strike, the Indian Navy Sunday said its warships have successfully carried out multiple anti-ship firings, revalidating their readiness for long-range precision "offensive" strikes. "Indian Navy stands combat-ready, credible and future-ready in safeguarding the nation's maritime interests anytime, anywhere,

Khallikote/Berhampur,

April 27: A group of villagers allegedly lynched two siblings over past enmity at Shalabana village under Beguniapada police limits in Ganjam district, and later burnt their bodies in a nearby forest to destroy evidence, police said Sunday.

The deceased were identified as Sanjay Barik, 25, and his younger brother Ajay Barik, 23, of nearby Bhaliajhar village under Beguniapada police limits.

Both the siblings were history-sheeters with several cases registered in their names in multiple police stations of the district, Purushottampur SDPO Deepak Kumar Mishra said. Ajay was incarcerated in connection with the murder of former Beguniapada block chairman Debaraj Sahu in 2021 and recently

came out on bail, police said. The matter came to the fore after some locals spotted the partially burnt bodies of the brothers lying on Marei-Nuagaon road under Khallikote police and alerted the police. The SDPO, Beguniapada police and a scientific team rushed to the spot and launched an investi-

gation. The charred remains of the bodies were collected and sent for post-mortem. A murder case (No. 220/25) was registered in this connection at Beguniapada police station

According to police, the mur ders were motivated by old enmity and simmering pent-up tensions in the area.

Preliminary investigation suggested that the incident occurred when a religious ceremony was underway at Shalabana village. Meanwhile, Sanjay and Ajay arrived at the spot and reportedly engaged in an argu ment with some locals. Enraged a group of villagers allegedly beat them to pulp, dragged them to a remote area in a nearby forest and killed them. They later set the bodies on fire in a bid to destroy evidence. An investiga tion into the incident is under-

NEW NCERT TEXTBOOKS

Mughals out, Mahakumbh in

New Delhi, April 27: All references to Mughals and Delhi Sultanate have been dropped from Class VII NCERT textbooks, while chapter on Indian dynasties, 'sacred geography', references to Maha Kumbh, and government initiatives like Make in India and 'Beti Bachao, Beti padhao' are among the new additions.

The new textbooks released this week have been designed in line with the new National Education Policy (NEP) and the National Curriculum Framework for School Education (NCFSE) 2023, which emphasise incorporating Indian traditions, philosophies, and local context into school education.

When contacted, NCERT officials said these are only first part of the book and second part is expected in coming months. They, however, did not comment on whether the dropped portions will be retained in the second part of the book. The book now has all new chapters with no mention of Mughals and Delhi Sultanate throughout.

Another new edition in the book is a chapter called 'How the Land Becomes Sacred' that introduces concepts like sacred geography detailing networks of such places as 12 jyotirlingas, the char dham yatra, and the Shakti pithas.


Rancho's school finally gets CBSE affiliation

New Delhi, April 27: Druk Padma Karpo School, nestled in the cold desert of Ladakh and popularly known as Rancho's school, has finally got CBSE affiliation more than two decades after it was founded. The affiliation was granted after several delays and rejections.

The school, which shot to fame after it featured in the Aamir Khan-starrer movie '3 Idiots' in 2009, was so far affiliated with the Jammu and Kashmir State Board of School Education (JKBOSE).

Known for its innovative methods of teaching much before the new National Education Policy (NEP) proposed reforms



to move away from traditional rot learning, the school is now planning to expand till Class XII.

"We have finally got the CBSE affiliation after delay of several years and our first batch of Class X students is now waiting for their CBSE board exam results.'

"Though we had all the

required infrastructure in place, excellent result record and focus on innovative ways of teaching and learning, we didn't get the NOC from the JK-BOSE despite several attempts all these years," school principal Mingur Angmo told PTI.

As per the affiliation norms of the Central Board of Second-

ary Education (CBSE), schools require a 'no objection certificate' from the respective state board. The foreign schools require a similar document from the embassy concerned or the Consulate of India in the country concerned. The school has been trying to get the clearance since even before Ladakh acquired the Union Territory status. Even after the bifurcation, several schools in Ladakh continue to be affiliated to the Jammu and Kashmir board.

The 24-year-old school is named after Mipham Pema Karpo (1527-1592), who is revered as a great scholar, while Padma Karpo means 'White Lotus' in

Bothi, the local language. The school is now flocked by tourists, making it a 'must go point on the itinerary. A wall of the school's building featured in the closing scene of the Bollywood film in which one of the characters, Chatur, tries to urinate but gets an electric shock as two kids throw at him a light hulb connected with wire from the first floor's window. While the 'iconic idiotic wall'

- part of a building which was damaged in the 2010 flash floods still remains on campus the first floor, earlier made of bricks, has been replaced with wooden structures typically used in Ladakh. The school decided in 2018 to relocate the 'Rancho's wall' to ensure students don't get distracted due to inflow of tourists.







CM's public hearing at Berhampur soon

Bhubaneswar, April 27: Nearly a week after conducting a regional public grievance hearing in Sambalpur, Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Sunday announced that the Chief Minister's Grievance Cell will visit Berhampur soon. The CM said this while addressing the centenary year celebration function of the historic Bhimpur Advanced High School in Ganjam.

The centenary celebration at Bhimpur Advanced High School was attended by hundreds of students, alumni, teachers and locals.

In his keynote address, Majhi praised the legacy of the high school, describing it as a "pillar of knowledge and empowerment" in the region. He acknowledged the contributions of past educators and alumni in shaping not only the school's reputation but also the growth of the surrounding community.

"This school has been a torchbearer of knowledge for a century. It has produced doctors, engineers, teachers and leaders who have contributed immensely to our society. Today, as we celebrate its centenary, we also look ahead to the future," he said.

The CM took the opportunity to outline the state government's long-term vision for a prosperous and developed state by 2036, which will mark 100 years of Odisha's formation as a separate state. He emphasised that education will play



a central role in achieving this milestone.

"Odisha Vision 2036 is about inclusive growth, technological advancement, and sustainable development. But at the heart of all these efforts is education. An educated and skilled youth population is the strongest foundation we can lay for our future," he said.

Majhi also announced that Bhimpur Advanced High School would be recognised as a 'heritage school'. He instructed the Ganjam Collector to prepare a detailed project report (DPR) for infrastructure development at the school, ensuring that the school's legacy is preserved and further strengthened for future generations. All other demands made by the school will also be fulfilled by the state govern-

The Chief Minister also highlighted the government's commitment to implementing the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, which had suffered a delay in Odisha during the previous government. He emphasised that under the current government, the policy is now being fully implemented, aiming to bring about a massive shift in the education sector.

He further emphasised that primary education in Odisha is undergoing a transformation under Godbarish Mishra Model Primary School Scheme. This new scheme aims at appointment of well-trained, qualified teachers at panchayat level, to ensure that quality education is accessible even in remote areas. In addition, he revealed that a significant portion of the state's Budget - a record ₹31,000 crore – had been allocated to bolster primary ed-

ucation this year. The CM took a swipe at the previous government's 5T school system, calling it a "farce." He stated that the initiative had failed to provide the promised digital infrastructure, with only 16 per cent of schools having internet access.

Cuttack, April 27: Odisha Public Service Commission (OPSC) and Odisha Staff Selection Commission (OSSC) faced outrage when errors were detected in two major recruitment exams Sunday. The mistakes in the Civil Services Main-2023 and Excise and Traffic Sub-Inspector (SI) exams have infuriated candidates, who said such lapses are unacceptable given the exams' importance to their careers. The OPSC's Civil Services

Main-2023 Anthropology exam. held from 9am to 12pm and 2pm to 5pm, had a critical flaw. Questions from second paper appeared in the first and vice versa. Candidates were dismayed by the mix-up. OPSC acknowledged the error online but has not outlined remedial steps. The commission directed candidates to proceed with the exam using the provided question-cum-answer booklet. The OPSC has since assured all concerned that appropriate steps will be taken to address the situation while maintaining the integrity of the exam.

The OSSC's Combined Main Examination for Excise and



Traffic SI posts omitted syllabus sections like General English, Odia, and General Studies. After complaints, OS-SC admitted the oversight, expressed regret, and proposed a supplementary exam. Candidates can submit suggestions for remedies via OSSC's website or email by May 4, 2025, but skepticism persists.

Examinees, who prepared extensively, are outraged. "Our future hinges on these exams," one candidate said. Social media, including X, reflects widespread frustration, with claims that OSSC included irrelevant questions from unrelated exams. Both commissions' errors, despite apologies, have eroded trust.

Flaws in OPSC, OSSC 'Stranded' flyers protest at BPIA

Rape accused marries victim in jail

Berhampur, April 27: A 26-year-old man lodged in a jail in Ganjam district in a rape case, Sunday married the survivor on the premises of the prison, officials said. The marriage was solemnised in-

side the jail in the presence of the family members of the bride and groom, several dignitaries and jail officials.

The entire sub-jail in Kodala wore a festive look, when the under-trial prisoner (UTP), identified as Surya Kant Behera of Gochhabadi in Polasara police station limits, tied the nuptial knot with the woman he was in love with before landing in the jail in November 2024

Behera was working in Surat (Gujarat) before he was arrested by the police. Due to certain misunderstandings between the families



of the bride and groom, the 22-yearold woman lodged a rape complaint against Behera and subsequently, he was taken into custody, said PK Mishra, an advocate of the bride.

Now, they have mutually agreed to their marriage, even though the groom is lodged in jail as a UTP, he said. "After getting permission from the jail authorities and following all legal aspects, we have coordinated their marriage function," said Tarinisen Dehury, jailor of Kodala sub-jail.

He said the marriage was solemnised following the traditional Hindu rituals and in the presence of the family members of both bride and groom and other dignitaries.

The groom arrived at the venue in a decorated electric vehicle (EV), which was also arranged by the jail

Elderly persons, present in the venue, blessed both bride and groom and wished them a happy married life. All the expenditure, including the marriage dresses for the groom, was borne by the families of the bride and groom. "We are only facilitating their marriage," said Dehury.

Anzac biscuit myth and women's wartime role

he Anzac biscuit stands as a cultural symbol, representing the bond between those on the home front and soldiers serving overseas during the First World War.

Often said to have been developed to survive the long journey to the trenches and boost soldiers' morale, the biscuit's story carries the charm of wartime folklore. Yet behind this appealing narrative lies a broader history — the story of women who worked tirelessly to provide comfort and supplies to troops.

The biscuit myth

Soldiers at the front did receive biscuits, but they were more akin to the hard, long-lasting "ship's biscuits" of earlier centuries. Made from simple ingredients like flour, water,

and dry milk, these were tough enough to be used as stationery and often needed to be soaked or grated to be eaten.

Although baked goods were requested from the public, they had to meet strict requirements to survive the long transit. The recipe known today — featuring oats, coconut, and golden syrup — likely would not have lasted the journey, especially given the risk of ingredients like coconut becoming rancid.

The recipe we now recognise did not appear until several years after the war. While biscuits were indeed sent overseas, they were not the same as the Anzac biscuits we know today

tion, largely led by women, coordinated the effort to provide soldiers with essential and comfort items. In 1917, a cookery book was published to raise funds, featuring the first printed biscuit recipe bearing the name 'Anzac'. However, this coconut and was instead spiced and sandwiched with jam.

The organisation's motto, 'keep the fit man fit,' reflected its goal: to support soldiers' well-being beyond basic survival. Items such as socks, mittens pyjamas, tobacco, and even gramophones and sporting goods were distributed. Women also operated canteens near the front, providing millions of mugs of tea, coffee, soup, and cocoa to weary troops.

One soldier recalled during the harsh winter how the thought of the canteen's soup kitchen gave him strength to endure the hardships of trench life The modern Anzac biscuit

Today, strict guidelines protect the name and recipe of Anzac biscuits. However,

complied with these standards. It wasn't until the 1920s that recipes combining oats and golden syrup — and later coconut — began appearing in newspapers.

This timeline shows that while biscuits were indeed sent to soldiers, they were not the iconic Anzac biscuits as we now know them.

2 from WB killed, another injured in road accident

Bhadrak, April 27: Two persons were killed and another seriously injured when their motorcycle crashed into a protection wall of a bridge on NH 16 in Bhadrak district Sunday, police said.

According to police, three persons from West Bengal (WB) were travelling towards Cuttack on a motorcycle. The bike crashed into the protection wall near Banta Chak. throwing all three riders into the middle of the road. While two of them died at the spot, local residents rescued the critically injured youth and rushed him to the hospital, a police officer said.

The injured youth has been admitted to Bhadrak Medical College and Hospital for treatment.

Upon receiving information, police reached the scene, sent the bodies to Bhadrak Medical College for post-mortem examination, and launched an investigation into the incident, said Bhadrak Town Police Station inspector in charge (IIC) Sudhanshu Sekhar Mishra.


Preliminary investigation suggests that one of the deceased has been identified as Ased Ali, 23, from the Purba Medinipur district of West Bengal.

However, the identities of the other two are yet to be ascertained, he said. In another incident, a four-year-old boy was killed, and his parents and uncle were injured after their motorcycle hit a dumper on the Patnagarh-Gaisilet Road in Bolangir district, police said.

The boy was seated on the fuel tank of the motorcycle, while his uncle was riding it. and his parents were seated behind.

Decades old tech flaw leaves Baitarani downsteam parched



Joda, April 27: An alleged technical flaw dating back to 1980s, when construction of the Kanpur dam on Baitarani river began, has rendered the downstream of the river go parched. The construction of the dam, the second major river dam project in Odisha, is yet to complete.

Sources said that the dam authorities, without making any alternative arrangements, have stopped the river's flow and are now building a depletion switch. As a result, the complete cutoff of water is severely impacting both agriculture and industry on the downstream of the river.

The Baitarani River originates from the Gonasika hill in Keonihar district, flowing over 360 km before merging with the Brahmani river near Dhamara in Bhadrak district, and ultimately draining into the Bay of Bengal. A major dam project at the river's upper catchment area, near Kanpur under Joda block in Keonjhar district, was commissioned in 1968. The construction began in 1980 and is on its last leg.

However, the river's flow was abruptly stopped since last few days, causing significant resentment among

the local residents on the downstream who rely on the river for water. The lack of water and the resulting fall in groundwater levels have created a state of distress in the

region. While farmers have reportedly taken to protests, several industries that draw water from the river, including Jindal Steel and Power Ltd. (JSPL), Tata Steel, and BRPL are facing operational

The scarcity has prompted some industries to start laying their own pipelines to secure water supply

Due to the reduction in water flow, water leakage from canal sluices is now visible, disrupting the supply of irrigation water to farmers' fields. The severe heat and drying up of water sources have left residents of the river basin areas facing acute hardships.

The water crisis is affecting a wide region, starting from the Kanpur dam and extending through Champua, Turumunga, Udaypur, Patana, Anandapur, and into Jajpur.

Prasad Ranjan Panda, a senior engineer of the Kanpur irrigation project, said a technical flaw from the 1980s has caused today's difficulties. He explained that river water was not properly conserved,

Sub-Collector visits Kanpur dam

Meanwhile, Champua Sub-Collector Umakanta Parida visited the spot and took stock of the situation Sunday. He assured to take steps to supply water to the farmlands of farmers. Accompanied by Block Agriculture Officer Sarada Hansda and Assistant Agriculture Officer Ramamani Sahu, Parida discussed about ways to combat the present situation. He also interacted with project engineer Prasad Ranjan Panda and officials of Agriculture and Rural Water Supply departments, farmers and industrial firms on the issue. He said farmers will be supplied with water on priority basis as per the order of Keonjhar Collector Vishal Singh. A mega water pump of 170 HP will be used which will benefit 1,500 farmers in 10 villages, while 132 lift irrigation points has also been installed, he added.

and depletion switches were not installed at crucial points during the dam construction. "Because of that, efforts are now underway to build these depletion switches to retain water in the dam," he said.

However, the work is time-consuming, and, as a result, there is no flow of water into the river at present. Panda said by June, after the start of the monsoon, canal gates at the dam will be opened to allow high-volume water flow into the river.

"Had the depletion switches been constructed when the spillway was originally built, today's crisis could have been avoided," he said, adding, the installation of the switches will help stabilise the dam's structure and restore the river's natural water flow.

Panda assured that the work will be completed before the beginning of rainy season.

Man beaten to death in Ganjam

Commuters suffer as amenity centre closed for 10 months

Nandapur, April 27: A wayside amenity centre built in Handiput under this block in Koraput district has remained shut for the past 10 months, leaving commuters and tourists inconvenienced without access to basic amenities.

The apathy of the concerned departments has sparked growing dissatisfaction among locals and visitors alike. The centre was built with funds worth several lakhs jointly by the state Public Works and Tourism departments to provide amenities like restrooms and waiting areas for vehicle drivers and tourists visiting various destinations in this block. However, the crucial facility has remained locked and unused for the last 10 months.

While the state and district administrations have been making efforts to promote tourism and create employment for locals, the situation at Handiput highlights a glaring exception. Few days back, the doors and windows of the toilets in the centre was found vandalised, prompting repair and appointment of two guards to maintain the facility. Despite this, tourists visiting nearby attractions such as Machhkund Duduma waterfall, Machhkund

hydropower project, Jolaput water reservoir, Balda Nageswari cave and hills, hilltop ponds, Muktiamba Raia cave Mayurajholia waterfall, Nandapur Rani Duduma, the Batrisa Simhasana (Throne of 32 Steps), and Subai Jain temple continue to miss out on these basic services.

Woman detained for misusing terror victim's photo to raise funds; let off

Balasore, April 27: The Cyber police here Sunday detained a woman for allegedly misusing the name and photograph of Pahalgam terror attack victim Prashant Satapathy to fraudulently collect money using so-

Satapathy, who died in the attack in Jammu and Kashmir April 22, has been hailed nationwide as a hero. However, the woman, misused his image on social media to solicit funds without the family's knowledge or consent, a police official said.

The matter came to light Saturday when Satapathy's family noticed the misuse, and immediately lodged a complaint with the Balasore Cyber Police Station. Acting swiftly, the cyber police tracked the accused - a writer by profession- to Angul district and brought her to Balasore Sunday.

In the presence of the family members, she admitted to her wrongdoings, claiming it was a mistake. She then apologised and agreed to return the collected money to the donors.

However, the incident left the family deeply distressed. Priyadarshini Satapathy, Prashant's widow, said, "We have not sought any money from anyone, nor have we made any ap-



peal on social media. The entire nation regards my husband as a hero, and that honour is more than enough for me. I only wish that no other family suffers this way.

Jayanta Satapathy, Prashant's younger brother, emphasised that the family had never authorised any fundraising activities. "We disapprove of anyone collecting money using my brother's photograph. We request everyone to stay away from such unauthorised initiatives," he said. Sushanta

Satapathy, Prashant's elder brother, added that the wrongdoer confessed, apologised, and refunded the amounts received from contributors. "We then decided not to initiate any legal, or police action against her," he said. Police also refused to disclose her name following the admission of guilt and apologies.



No Friends Here

S President Donald Trump's remarks that there have always been tensions between India and Pakistan and the two countries will figure it out between themselves "one way or the other" sends a very clear message to India which, at present, is being goaded, by internal political pressure, to contemplate armed retaliation against its arch rival Pakistan over the recent terror attack that claimed the lives of 26 tourists in Pahalgam, Kashmir. "I am very close to India and I'm very close to Pakistan, as you know. And they've had that fight for 1,000 years in Kashmir. Kashmir has been going on for 1,000 years, probably longer than that. And it was a bad one yesterday, though, that was a bad one. Over 30 people," Trump said during a press gaggle with reporters aboard Air Force One on the way to Rome. This very assertion that the US is equally close to both India and Pakistan lays bare the apparent failure of our foreign affairs apparatus, irrespective of the tall claims to the contrary and the constant declaration by India's national television media that the PoTUS is a "dear friend" of our Prime Minister. Moreover, three months into his presidency, Trump has yet to appoint an ambassador to India, indicating the low priority this country holds on his agenda.

For starters, the terror strike on civilians, that too tourists, was possible due to utter intelligence and security failure. About two thousand tourists were picnicking in the Baisaran meadow, touted as a Mini Switzerland in Pahalgam, and there was not a single jawan of Central forces or the state police in the vicinity. The Centre's claim that the situation in the restive Kashmir Valley has become "normal" six years after the abrogation of Article 370 has perhaps led the administration into a state of complacency, leaving the unsuspecting tourists vulnerable to Islamist extremists. While most biased commentators are baying for Pakistan's blood, none has questioned, as yet, about accountability of the Indian security system that failed to react instantly and minimize loss of lives. The nation would like to know who is responsible for the multiple failures and who is answerable.

The Pahalgam massacre, one of the many deadly terror attacks to have struck India in recent years, has led New Delhi to further downgrade its ties with Islamabad with a host of measures including cancellation of visa for Pakistan nationals, closing the Attari-Wagah border and keeping the Indus Water Treaty, which has survived three wars, in abeyance. The national mood, to some extent, has been whipped up in favour of harsh retaliation against Pakistan in terms of military intervention even as the Centre has not yet declared how it proposes to punish the perpetrators, backers and handlers of terror. Many observers are of the view that the Pahalgam terror attack could be a trap that Pakistan has laid for India. First and foremost could be to distract its own people from the economic and other hardship plaguing that country. Pakistan is probably in great economic crisis and is, as is usual for it, managing to stay afloat primarily due to bailout packages from China and some Gulf countries. Also, there is growing discontent among the masses towards the country's all-powerful military. A war with India could change the national mood and unite all factions for a common cause.

Secondly, Pakistan has consistently leveraged the Kashmir issue as a political and ideological instrument. However, the recent attack in Pahalgam reveals a new aspect and that is the communal targeting of non-Moslems. The terror attack follows Pakistan army chief General Asim Munir's comments referencing the Two-Nation Theory, which initially provided the rationale for the Partition of India based on religion. While anti-India rhetoric has long been a part of Pakistan's military narrative, introducing a communal

Thirdly and most importantly, Pakistan may be acting at China's behest to harm India's interests. For, Beijing understands that a military conflict between Pakistan and India, even if a minor one, could damage India's economy which is already facing a host of problems. If India is perceived as unstable or engaged in warfare, most international companies that are withdrawing from China due to the ongoing trade war with the US might refrain from investing in India. Many analysts see China taking advantage of the situation in which India currently finds itself.

It should be amply clear to any impartial observer that India is all alone in this fight against terrorism with no country, neighbor or otherwise, willing to support it militarily. Adding to the problem is that our ties with all our neighbors, not just Pakistan, have greatly deteriorated. This leaves a lot to ponder for India's foreign policy makers because it is exactly their failure that has led this country to the present day isolation and mess that it seems to have fallen into.

THE ASSAULT ON TRADE

Trump's misguided trade war against the rest of the world could mark the beginning of the end for both his political dominance and his "Make America Great Again" (MAGA) movement but only if Germany and Europe can coordinate a powerful international response.

The European Commission and the outgoing German government's biggest mistake was to signal a willingness to concede to Trump's demands, potentially turning his economic blunder into a political victory. It should be clear by now that appeasing Trump will only hasten the collapse of the multilateral trading system and further undermine democratic governance worldwide.

The European Union's response will be pivotal in determining whether the Trump administration (which is intent on dismantling the multilateral trading order) or China (which seeks to preserve it) will prevail. European leaders face a clear choice: stand for multilateralism and align with China or side with Trump's MAGA-fied United States. There is no third option. Germany and Europe cannot remain neutral in this conflict. Giving in to Trump's demands by pursuing a bilateral trade agreement would be tantamount to endorsing the end of multilateralism.

The EU's ongoing failure to push back against Trump's policies reflects shocking shortsightedness and political naivete. While the direct economic impact of Trump's tariffs on Europe will likely be limited, the long-term consequences - especially for Germany's export-driven eco-

nomic model - could be dire. Yielding to Trump would threaten the very foundation of German prosperity, which depends more than that of any other European country on open global trade grounded in non-discrimination, fairness, and competition.

So, how should Germany and the EU respond to Trump's tariffs? The incoming German government - together with France, the United Kingdom, and other European partners - must defend multilateralism by aligning with China and imposing reciprocal tariffs on American goods.

In future negotiations with the US, European leaders must also insist on two key conditions. First, they should call for a renewed commitment to multilateralism as the foundation of the global trade system. That includes not only rolling back tariffs and other trade barriers to pre-crisis levels, but also revitalizing multilateral institutions like the World Trade Organization, which the US has systematically undermined by blocking the appointment of new judges to its appellate body.

Importantly, the focus should not be limited to the WTO. Other multilateral institutions such as the United Nations, the International Monetary Fund, and the World Bank must also be empowered to play a more active role, particularly in representing and protecting the interests of the weakest economies in the Global South.

Second, Europe should push for fair competition and common rules, especially when it comes to regulating US-based tech giants. These companies pay little to no tax and routinely violate EU laws and regulations concerning data protection, ethical standards, and market competition.

The recent US court ruling that Google has indeed built an illegal monopoly in search underscores the urgency of the issue. As German Finance Minister Jörg Kukies recently observed. European countries are increasingly reliant on services provided by US tech giants. If the EU fails to act now, this harmful dependence will continue to deepen, making Europe even more vulnerable to Trump-style political and

commercial blackmail

Reviving multilateralism will also require meaningful concessions and reforms from China, the EU, and Germany to help correct global imbalances. Through massive subsidies and other forms of support for domestic firms, China has repeatedly undermined multilateral rules to gain unfair advantages. But Germany also must reduce its own gigantic current-account surpluses, which are largely driven by domestic regulations and other structural barriers that make it harder for foreign

Given that addressing these distortions could offer considerable benefits to American companies, there is good reason to believe that such a balanced trade agreement might appeal to Trump and encourage him to change course.

companies to enter its market.

Despite its economic costs, Trump's global tariff war offers Europe a chance to establish itself as a mediator and defender of multilateralism in an increasingly multipolar world. It is high time that Europe stood up for its values and coordinated a unified response with partners like China, Canada, Mexico, the UK, and Japan.

By provoking a confrontation with all the world's major economies at once. Trump has made a serious strategic miscalculation. Pushing back may cost Europe in the short term, but allowing Trump to prevail and dismantle the multilateral trading system would be far more damaging both to the EU economy and to democracy itself.

ill Artificial Intelligence (AI)-led robots take over classrooms and replace teachers? Will AI-driven technology undermine human connections in teaching? Will AI disrupt traditional classroom-based teaching and learning? As concerns about a so-called dystopian future for teachers and education grows, these fundamental questions reflect the fear surrounding AI-driven digitalisation of classrooms, educational processes, systems, teaching and learning environments. Adding to the debate, Microsoft co-founder and tech mogul Bill Gates has asserted that AI will replace teachers within the next ten years. While this may sound bizarre, it reflects yet another organised attack on education—one that seems to follow a strategic pattern of predictive propaganda. It is essential to expose the underlying strategies employed by tech moguls that aim to dismantle the collective foundations of education and leaning.

Teaching and learning in a classroom setting are far from monotonous activities confined to a rigid curriculum. The dynamic interaction between teacher and students constantly reshapes the nature of the educational experience. As a result, two classes taught by the same teacher on the same topic can be vastly different from each other. Classrooms serve as spaces where both teachers and students learn from one another, building a collective foundation of knowledge. They are not merely places for the transmission of information: they create and promote critical thinking, questioning, argumentation, articulation, observation, interaction, and the exchange of ideas. Through this collaborative process, knowledge is both processed and produced—whether in its essentialist form or as a tool for emancipation. Classrooms not only shape minds but also train hands. Such an experiential or hands-on learning is good for employability and generating critical consciousness for global citizenship. No technology can truly replicate the dynamic, human-centered nature of the classroom experience. However, the narrative pro-

moted by tech moguls-that AI will replace teachers—is a form of propaganda designed to further the privatisation of education, consolidating control in the hands of powerful online platform companies like Microsoft. Such a strategy is designed to generate further revenue for the rent seeking techno feudal platform capitalism. So, the greatest threat to education and educators today is not AI itself, but the techno-moguls who wield it as a tool to serve their interests.

New technologies help in processes of teaching and learning. It enhances the classroom dynamism and democratises teaching and learning processes. Technology facilitates in the

and in the process of cocreation and dissemination of knowledge. Technology is an inseparable part of the classroom teaching and learning today. Technology plays a crucial role from attendance monitoring, classroom organisation to evaluation and feedforward processes in teaching and learning activities. The AI led digitalisation of classroom has transformed the way teaching and learning takes place. It redefines teaching and learning environment where roles of educators have been already transformed. Technology-driven transfor-

mations of classroom teaching and learning environments have the potential to accelerate deeper and faster learning, while also enhancing the creative capabilities of both teachers and students. Therefore, the accessibility, availability, and democratization of technology and its platforms are crucial for the educational empowerment of both students and teachers

However, the techno-feudal environment perpetuated by the owners of technology and platform companies promotes an undemocratic, rent-seeking culture rooted in the digital divide where access to and availability of technology depend largely on one's ability to pay. This environment not only promotes discrimination but also reinforces entrenched class divisions in a digital form, deepening existing

inequalities under the guise of technological progress

Tech moguls like Bill Gates rarely speak about the democratisation of technology or ensuring universal access to digital education and skills for all irrespective of different back grounds of the learners. Instead the focus is often on replacing teachers with technology. This is deeply concerning, as teachers do far more than deliver content—they nurture creative thinking and critical awareness. enabling students to reflect on everyday realities while also acquiring skills for employability.

People like Bill Gates promote the individualisation of the digital learning environment, a model that prioritises profit while promoting a culture of compliance concomitant with the requirements of platform based digital techno capitalism.

It is essential to protect the collective foundations of classroom teaching and learning, while also democratising digitalisation and ensuring collec tive control over technological ly advanced learning platforms. Only by doing so can we truly empower both students and teachers, and work toward a 21st-century education that is scientific, secular, technological, and universal-free from all forms of discrimination.

with herbivores and not carnivores. Opened in November 1959, the National Zoological Park currently houses 95 species of animals and birds. It received its first lion pair in 1969.

Gujarat is the world's last abode of Asiatic lions. As per the last census conducted in June 2020, the state is home to 674 Asiatic lions, mainly the Gir Wildlife Sanctuary. Population estimation of Asiatic lions is carried out once every five years and the last such exercise was conducted in 2020.

Mumbai: PNB's scam-hit branch now brews organic coffee

Mumbai, April 27: The Brady House branch of the Punjab National Bank (PNB) in Mumbai, infamous for a multi-million dollar scam involving diamantaire Nirav Modi and his uncle Mehul Choksi, has been turned into a cosy cafe.

Patrons sit on comfy chairs and plush sofas, sipping steaming cups of organic coffee with light music playing in the background on the premises, a stark contrast to the chaos that erupted after the duo defrauded the bank of more than ₹13.000 crore

The premises in the Brady House building in the Fort area of south Mumbai were once at the centre of one of the biggest financial scams to rock the country.

Nirav Modi and his uncle Mehul Choksi allegedly siphoned off over ₹13,000 crore of public money from the PNB using LoUs and foreign letters of credit (FLCs) by bribing officials of the bank's Brady House branch between March 2011 and November 2017.

With Choksi's arrest in Belgium two weeks ago, the Brady House is again in the spotlight, but the operations of this branch were shifted to PNB House at Sir P M Road in Fort a few years ago.

The scam came to light in January 2018 when the PNB submitted a fraud report to the Reserve Bank of India and lodged a complaint with the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI).

Choksi and Modi had fled the country before that, and the CBI and the Enforcement Directorate (ED) have probed into the scam.

In March 2019, Modi was arrested in London on an extradi tion warrant based on the CBI and ED's charges against him and has been languishing in



New Delhi, April 27: In a step towards addressing the issue of bovines straying on the national capital's roads, the Delhi government will survey cow shelters and frame a scheme to extend financial support for the smooth operation of such facilities.

Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta announced the measures at a public gathering at Gramin Gaushala in Bawana and stressed that she, her ministers and the BJP MLAs consider the cow as a mother figure ("Gau

Reminding the cattle owners that such animals were not allowed within the city limits. she suggested the bovines be housed at designated places like Ghoga Dairy, around 50 kilometres from Central Delhi.

The chief minister said her government would conduct a survey of all cow shelters in Delhi and a scheme would

be drawn to provide financial assistance for the facilities to care for the cows in a holistic manner. It is the government's duty to take care of the old and ill cows wandering on roads after being abandoned and the dispensation is committed to fulfil its duty. Gupta added.

In its maiden budget session after coming to power in Delhi, the BJP government last month announced bringing a law for the conservation and protection of stray cows in the city. The proposed legislation would include strict enforcement mechanisms to curb cow exploitation, illegal cattle trade, and owners' negligence.

Several BJP MLAs have repeatedly raised the issue of stray cows causing traffic congestion, sanitation hazards and more often than not accidents.

According to data provided in the assembly by Model Town MLA Ashok Goel, police received 25,393 stray crow-re lated complaints between Jan uary 1 and February 19 this year, primarily the bovines causing traffic congestion and accidents.

Asia's oldest newspaper Mumbai Samachar to digitise its rich legacy

Mumbai, April 27: Asia's oldest active newspaper, 'Mumbai Samachar', which published reports on the first war of Indian independence in 1857, the death of legendary Rani Laxmibai of Jhansi and the birth of Congress, is turning a new page in its illustrious history by digitising its rich legacy.

Established in 1822 by Fardunji Marzban, a Parsi scholar, the newspaper's management has launched a new project to digitise and document the rich legacy of the Gujarati daily. Located in a colonial-era building in Mumbai's prominent Horniman Circle area, the newspaper has weathered many storms during its 203-year-old history, including a drop in subscription and readership after the advent of the internet, news apps and social media expansion, but continues its journey.

NIA registers case, intensifies search

New Delhi, April 27: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) has formally taken over the Pahalgam terrorist attack case, intensifying its search for evidence and questioning eyewitnesses to unravel the terror conspiracy, officials said Sunday. They said the anti-terror agency registered a case in Jammu Sunday following orders from the Union Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA), and several teams are involved in the investigation.

After the dastardly terror attack Tuesday afternoon that claimed 26 lives, a team of NIA officials led by its Inspector General (IG) was rushed to the site to assist the local police, the officials said. They said NIA teams have been camping at the terror attack site since Wednesday, looking for clues. "The entry and exit points

are being closely scrutinised by the investigating NIA teams for clues to the modus operandi of the terrorists. The teams, aided by forensic and other experts. are checking the entire area thoroughly for evidence to expose the terror conspiracy that led to the horrendous attack that has shocked the nation,' an NIA statement said. The evewitnesses are also being questioned in minute detail to piece together the sequence of events that led to one of the worst terror attacks in Kashmir, it said. The teams, overseen by an IG, a Deputy Inspector General (DIG) and a Superintendent of Police (SP) from the anti-terror agency, are examining eyewitnesses who had seen the horrifying attack unfold before their eyes at the peaceful and picturesque Baisaran

800 shanties gutted as fire engulfs jhuggi cluster; two kids die

New Delhi, April 27: Two children died and five people were injured when a massive fire gutted over 800 shanties in a ihuggi cluster at Sector 17 in Rohini Sunday morning, a Delhi Fire Service official said.

The blaze was doused completely after fire-fighters worked tirelessly for three hours, but cooling operations are still underway, he said. Charred bodies of two children -- a two-and-a-half year old and a three-year-old -- were recovered from the remains, Deputy Commissioner of Police (Rohi ni) Amit Goel told PTI.

The Delhi Fire Service (DFS) official said they received a distress call around 11.55 am "We received a call reporting a fire close to Srini ketan Apartment at Sector 17. We immediately dispatched 17 fire engines. Upon observing the intensity of the fire, we upgraded it to a medium category fire by 12.40 pm and called for more vehicles and manpower,' he said, adding that a total of 26 fire tenders were deployed at the spot.

The fire engulfed over 800 densely packed shanties spread across around five acres. Thick plumes of smoke billowed into the sky as fire fighters battled the flames.

"It took more than three hours to douse the flames completely. The cooling operation is still underway. The bodies of two children were recovered and immediately sent to a nearby hospital," the DFS official said. Multiple police teams were also deployed at the spot along with the fire

According to DFS, the fire started from one of the huts and immediately engulfed the entire area. The official explained that fire-fighters faced significant hurdles due to the location. Police will investigate the exact cause of fire, he told PTI Videos.

Pakistanis overstaying in India may face 3 years jail or ₹3L fine or both

New Delhi, April 27: Any Pakistani, who fails to leave India government, will be arrested, prosecuted and may face a jail term of up to three years or a fine of a maximum ₹3 lakh or

The 'Leave India' notice to the Pakistani nationals was issued by the government after 26 people, mostly tourists, were killed by Pakistan-linked terrorists at Pahalgam in Jammu and Kashmir April 22.

The deadline for exiting India for those holding SAARC visas was April 26. For those carrying medical visas, the deadline is April 29. The 12 categories of visas whose holders have to leave India by Sunday are -- visa on arrival, business. film, journalist, transit, conference, mountaineering, student, visitor, group tourist, pilgrim and group pilgrim.

According to the Immigration and Foreigners Act 2025. which came into effect April 4, overstaying, violating visa conditions, or trespassing in restricted areas could lead to three years in jail and a fine of up to ₹3 lakh.

'Whoever,—(a) being a foreigner, remains in any area in India for a period exceeding the period for which the visa was issued to him or stays in India without a valid passport or other valid travel document in contravention of provisions of Section 3 or does any act in violation of the conditions of the valid visa issued to him for his entry and stay in India or any part thereunder; "(b)

contravenes any other provisions of this Act, other than sections 17 and 19, or of any rule or order made thereunder or any direction or instruction given in pursuance of this Act or such order or direction of instruction for which, no specific punishment is provided under this Act, shall be punishable with an imprisonment for a term which may extend to three years or with a

12 dead as van hits bike, lands in water-filled well in MP

Mandsaur: A speeding van plunged into a water-filled well after hitting a bike in Madhya Pradesh's Mandsaur district Sunday, leaving 12 persons, including a biker and a rescuer, dead, officials said. The incident occurred in the Narayangarh police station area, police said. Prime Minister Narendra Modi expressed grief over the accident and announced an ex-gratia of ₹2 lakh from PMNRF to the next of kin of each deceased. The injured would be given ₹50,000. "Saddened by the loss of lives in an accident in Mandsaur, Madhya Pradesh. Condolences to those who have lost their loved ones. May the injured recover soon," Modi stated on X. Deputy Chief Minister Jagdish Devda, who rushed to the accident site, said the death toll has risen to 12.

Massive fire at ED office doused after 12 hours

Mumbai: A huge fire broke out at the Enforcement Directorate's office building in south Mumbai in the early hours of Sunday, though no one was hurt in the incident, officials said. A Mumbai Fire Brigade official said the Level III (major) blaze at Kaiser-I-Hind building in Ballard Estate area was doused around 2:10pm after a sustained operation of 12 hours during which eight fire engines, six jetties, water tankers and other equipment were deployed. The fire, which broke out on the fourth floor of the five-storey building housing the ED office, raged for hours and was brought under control around 12.15 pm, when it was covered from all the sides.

Malayalam directors arrested for possessing hybrid ganja

Kochi: Three persons, including noted Malayalam directors Khalid Rahman and Ashraf Hamsa, known for several notable movies, were arrested with hybrid ganja from a flat here in the early hours of Sunday, Excise officials said. 1.63 grams of hybrid ganja was seized from them, and the trio were released on station bail later, they said. 

"Indian Navy ships undertook successful multiple anti-ship firings to revalidate

and demonstrate readiness of platforms, systems and crew for long range precision offensive strike," the Indian Navy said in a brief statement.

"Indian Navy stands combat ready, credible and future ready in safeguarding the nation's maritime interests anytime, anywhere, anyhow," it said.

The Indian Navy also released videos of the live firings at sea but did not provide details like when the exercise was carried out. As the tensions between the two countries soared. Pakistani military continued to resort to unprovoked firing along the Line of Control in the areas opposite Tutmari Gali and Rampur Sectors Saturday night, military sources said.



US deploys anti-ship missiles in Philippines

Batan Island: The US military has deployed an anti-ship missile launcher for the first time on Batan Island in the Philippines, as Marines unloaded the high-precision weapon on the northern tip of the archipelago, just a sea border away from Taiwan. US and Philippine forces separately unleashed a barrage of missile and artillery fire that shot down several drones acting as hostile aircraft in live-fire drills Sunday in Zambales province facing the disputed South China Sea. The mock battle scenarios over the weekend in the annual Balikatan exercises between the US and its oldest treaty ally in Asia, the Philippines. not only simulated real-life war. Kathmandu: At least seven teachers and a few policemen were injured in Kathmandu city of Nepal on Sunday as clashes erupted between the two sides during a demonstration for education reforms and a pay increase. The police used baton charges and water cannons to disperse thousands of agitating teachers who tried to break the security cordon to enter the restricted area in Navabaneshwor area of Kathmandu, an evewitness said. The witness said a few policemen also suffered iniuries. Tens of thousands of school teachers from different parts of the country. demanding reforms in school education and an increase in pay and perks, have been staging demonstrations for nearly one month in

Kathmandu.

Gaza death toll breaches 52,000

Deir al-Balah, April 27: Hospitals in the Gaza Strip received the remains of 51 Palestinians over the past 24 hours who were killed in Israeli strikes, the lo cal Health Ministry said Sun day, bringing the Palestinian death toll from the 18-month old Israel-Hamas war to 52,243

The overall toll includes nearly 700 bodies for which the documentation process was re cently completed, the ministry said in its latest update. The daily toll includes bodies retrieved from the rubble after earlier strikes. Israel ended its ceasefire

with Hamas by launching a surprise bombardment March 18, and has been carrying out daily waves of strikes since then. Ground forces have ex panded a buffer zone and encircled the southern city of Rafah, and now control around 50% of the territory.

Israel has also sealed off the territory's 2 million Palestin ians from all imports, including food and medicine, for nearly 60 days. Aid groups say supplies will soon run out and that thousands of children are malnourished.

Israeli authorities say the renewed offensive and tightened blockade are aimed at pressuring Hamas to release hostages abducted in its Oct 7 2023, attack that triggered the war. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has vowed to continue the war until Hamas is destroyed or disarmed, and all the hostages are returned.

Ukrainians decry US peace plan to surrender annexed-Crimea

Kyiv, April 27: A peace proposal by the Trump administration that includes recognising Russian authority over Crimea shocked Ukrainian officials, who say they will not accept any formal surrender of the peninsula, even though they expect to concede the territory to the Kremlin, at least temporarily.

Giving up the land that was illegally annexed by Russia in 2014 is also politically and legally impossible, according to experts. It would require a change to the Ukrainian constitution and a nationwide vote, and it could be considered treason. Lawmakers and the public are firmly opposed to the idea.

"It doesn't mean anything," said Oleksandr Merezkho, a lawmaker with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy's party. "We will never recognize Crimea as part of Russia."

Unlike a territorial concession, a formal surrender



would permanently relinquish Crimea and abandon the hope that Ukraine could regain it in the future.

The Ukrainian public largely understands that land must be ceded as part of any armistice because there is no way to retake it militarily. Polls indicate a rising percentage of the population accepts such a trade-off.

But much of the public messaging about land concessions has suggested that they are not necessarily permanent, as when Kyiv Mayor Vitalii Klitschko told the BBC recently that Ukraine may need to temporarily give up land as

part of a peace deal. Saying otherwise would ef-

fectively admit defeat — a deeply unpopular move, especially for Ukrainians living under Russian occupation who hope to be liberated and reunited with their families one day. It also would call into question the sacrifices made by tens of thousands of Ukrainian service members who have been killed

US President Donald Trump underscored the Crimea pro posal in an interview published Friday in Time magazine: "Crimea will stay with Russia. Zelenskyy understands that, and everybody understands that it's been with them for a long time.

His comments offered the latest example of the US leader pressuring Ukraine to make concessions to end the war while it remains under siege. Trump has also accused Zelenskyy of prolonging the war by resisting negotiations with Russian President Vladimir Putin.

Iran port blast toll rises to 40, some 800 hurt

Muscat: A massive explosion and fire rocked a port Saturday in southern Iran purportedly linked to a shipment of a chemical ingredient used to make missile propellant, killing 40 people and injuring around 800 others. Helicopters and aircraft dumped water from the air on the raging fire through the night into Sunday morning at the Shahid Rajaei port.

The explosion occurred just as Iran and the United States met Saturday in Oman for the third round of negotiations over Tehran's rapidly advancing nuclear program. No one in Iran outright suggested that the explosion came from an attack. However, even Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, who led the talks, Wednesday acknowledged that "our security

services are on high alert give en past instances of attempted sabotage and assassination operations designed to provoke a legitimate response." Meanwhile, state TV reported the fire was under control and will be fully extinguished later Sunday. It also said activities have resumed at the port, showing footage of containers of a commercial ship being unloaded.

Trump's first 100 days: American prez overturning world order

Countries consider defense boosts, closer China ties amid US policy shifts as experts warn of lasting damage to American relations with traditional allies

Washington, April 27: He has launched an unprecedented global tariff war and slashed US foreign aid. He has disparaged NATO allies and embraced Russia's narrative about its invasion of Ukraine. And he has spoken about annexing Greenland, retaking the Panama Canal and making Canada the 51st

In the chaotic first 100 days since President Donald Trump returned to office, he has waged an often unpredictable campaign that has upended parts of the rules-based world order that Washington helped build from the ashes of World War II. "Trump is much more radi-

cal now than he was eight years ago," said Elliott Abrams, a conservative who served under Presidents Ronald Reagan and George W Bush before being appointed US special envoy on Iran and Venezuela in Trump's first term. "I have been surprised."

Trump's second-term "America First" agenda has alienated friends and emboldened adversaries while raising questions about how far he is prepared to go. His actions, coupled with that uncertainty, have so unnerved some governments that they are responding in ways that could be difficult to undo, even if a more traditional US president is elected in 2028.

All this comes amid what the Republican president's critics see as signs of democratic backsliding at home that have raised concerns abroad. These include verbal attacks on judges, a pressure campaign against universities and the transfer of migrants to a notorious El Salvador prison as part of a broad-



er deportation drive. This assessment of Trump's

shakeup of the global system comes from Reuters interviews with more than a dozen current and former government officials, foreign diplomats and independent analysts in Washington and capitals around the world.

Many say that while some of the damage already done could be long-lasting, the situation may not be beyond repair if Trump softens his approach. He has already backtracked on some issues, including the timing and severity of his tariffs.

But they see little chance of a dramatic shift by Trump and instead expect many countries to make lasting changes in their relationships with the US to safeguard against his erratic More than half of **Americans, including** one in four Republicans, think Trump is "too

India, Netherlands hold trade talks

New Delhi: India and European nation Netherlands have discussed ways to boost trade and investments ties during the visit of Commerce Secretary Sunil Barthwal to Hague. The visit assumes significance as India's exports to Netherlands are recording healthy growth despite global economic uncertainties. "Commerce Secretary Mr. Sunil Barthwal & Ambassador @ktuhinv met **DG Foreign Economic Relations** Mr. Michiel Sweers in The Hague to discuss strengthening bilateral trade and economic ties. Discussions focused on enhancing collaboration through the joint trade and investment committee (JTIC) and advancing strategic economic cooperation," the department of commerce said in a post on X. In 2024-25, India's exports to the Netherlands rose by 1.75 per cent to USD 22.76 billion as against USD 22.36 billion in 2023-24. The imports during the period stood at over USD 5 billion. During this visit, the commerce ministry's Joint Secretary Saket Kumar also met senior officials in Hague to discuss advancing cooperation in the startup and innovation ecosystem.

Goyal refutes **Reddit post**

New Delhi: Zomato Founder and CEO Deepinder Goval has rejected an anonymous Reddit post alleging that things were "going off the rails" with the company, rebranded as Eternal, losing market share to Zepto Cafe and Swiggy and forcing employees to order from its food delivery platform. The post also claimed that the work culture has become "laughably inconsistent" with "toxicity" baked in, and the only thing keeping the company profitable now is platform fees, and the "crisis" compounded by "underpaid and overworked" delivery partners. In a post on X on Saturday, Goyal said, "All of this - reddit.com/r/StartUpIndia' - is utter nonsense. Neither are we losing market share, nor will we ever force our employees to order on Zomato. Freedom of choice is something we stand for vehemently." He further said "it is embarrassing to even clarify this -- but doing it since many people reached out to me with

for your concern.. appreciate it".

FPIs extend investment in Indian equities

New Delhi, April 27: Foreign investors have infused ₹17,425 crore in the country's equity markets last week, supported by a combination of favourable global cues and strong domestic macroeconomic fundamentals

This came following a net investment of ₹8,500 crore in the preceding holiday-truncated week ended April 18.

Globally, steady performances in major markets, expectations of a pause in US Federal Reserve's rate hikes, and a stable US dollar boosted risk appetite for emerging markets like India. Easing global trade tensions further lifted investor sentiment, Himanshu Srivastava, Associate director - Manager Research, Morningstar Investment, said. Domestically, India's resil-

ient growth outlook, moderating inflation, and an optimistic forecast of an above-normal monsoon for 2025 enhanced

confidence in the market. Together, these factors created an attractive investment environment for foreign investors. he added.

According to the data with the depositories, Foreign Portfolio Investors (FPIs) made a net investment of ₹17,425 crore in equities during April 21 to

Overall, FPIs pulled out ₹5,678 crore from the equities in April so far, taking the total outflow to ₹1.22 lakh crore since the beginning of 2025, data showed.

The initial part of the month

FPI selling, driven largely by global uncertainties stemming from the US tariff policy devel-This reversal in FPI activity

happened at a time of heightened tensions between India and Pakistan following the Pahalgam terror attacks.

This renewed interest in FPI activity has been caused by two important factors. One, the sustained rise in dollar, which triggered the momentum trade towards US equities, has reversed with the dollar index falling from a peak of 111 in mid-January this year to around 99 now, V K Vijayakumar, Chief Investment Strategist, Geojit Investments, said.

Two, the steep decline in US growth expected this year will impact corporate earnings in US while the Indian economy will continue to remain resil ient with growth of above 6 per cent accompanied by recovery in corporate earnings,

Geopolitical issues to drive markets: Analysts

New Delhi, April 27: Geopolitical developments between India and Pakistan, quarterly earnings and macro data will be the key drivers of stock markets in the holiday-shortened week, say analysts. Trading activity of foreign investors, who were sustained buyers in the Indian market last week, and global trends would also guide movement in the market, they said.

Equity markets will remain closed Thursday for 'Maharashtra Day'. Further updates related to tariffs will also be watched by investors, experts noted. Stock markets witnessed

profit-taking in the last two sessions due to increased geopolitical tensions between India and Pakistan following the death of 26 people in a terror attack on tourists at Pahalgam in Jammu and Kashmir. "The upcoming holiday-shortened week also marks the beginning of a new month, making monthly auto sales data a key area of focus for market participants. On the macroeconomic front, investors will closely track the Index of Industrial Production (IIP) data and the HSBC manufacturing PMI data.

"Meanwhile, geopolitical developments between India and Pakistan will remain on the radar. On the corporate earnings front,

several prominent companiesincluding BPCL, IOC, Bajaj Finance, TVS Motor, and UltraTech Cement—are set to release their quarterly results. Globally, updates related to tariffs and trade will also be watched closely," Ajit Mishra-SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said. Last week, the BSE bench-

mark gauge climbed 659.33 points or 0.83 per cent, and the NSE Nifty went up by 187.7 points or 0.78 per cent despite profit-taking in the last two sessions. Friday, the 30-share BSE barometer Sensex tanked 588.90 points or 0.74 per cent to settle at 79,212.53. The NSE Nifty dropped 207.35 points or 0.86 per cent to 24,039.35.

Siddhartha Khemka, Head Research, Wealth Management, Motilal Oswal Financial Services Ltd, said, "Geopolitical developments between India and Pakistan could add volatility to the Indian market over the next few days. Meanwhile, stock/sector specific action would continue on the back of ongoing Q4 earnings announcements. Key results this week include those from largecaps like Ultratech Cement, Bajaj Finance, Trent, Ambuja Cements amongst others."



New Delhi, April 27: India is likely to ask the US to ease export controls and grant it access to critical technologies on par with key American allies like Australia, the UK, and Japan under the proposed bilateral trade agreement (BTA), sources said.

They added that India may seek these easing for sectors like telecom equipment, biotechnology, AI (artificial intelligence), pharmaceuticals, quantum computing and semiconductors.

The country is also seeking duty concessions for labour-intensive sectors like textiles, gems and jewellery, leather goods, garments, plastics, chemicals, shrimp, oil seeds, chemicals, grapes and bananas in the proposed pact with America. On the other hand, the US wants duty concessions in sectors like certain industrial goods, automobiles (electric vehicles particularly), wines, petrochemical products, dairy, agriculture items such as apples, and tree nuts, they said.

As part of the proposed BTA, one of the sources said, India may request the US to place it on par with other key US allies including Australia, UK and Japan regarding access to technology through easing of export

controls particularly in key areas like telecom equipment, biotechnology, and AI.

Easy access to cutting-edge technologies in these sectors would help boost India's innovation capabilities, enhance its technological infrastructure, and further push the country's economic growth. The commerce ministry, which is leading the negotiations for the agreement, declined to comment when asked about these issues.

According to think tank GTRI, the US has eased export controls to strengthen technology partnerships with close allies like Australia, the United Kingdom, and Japan. The changes are designed to make collaboration easier in critical sectors. It said that as part of the AUKUS security pact, the US has simplified rules for

technologies with Australia and the UK. Beginning September 1, 2024, about 80 per cent of defence-related exports to these countries no longer require individual licences under revised US arms regulations. In September 2024, Washing-

ton also introduced new global controls on exports related to quantum computing and semiconductor manufacturing.

However, trusted partners such as Australia, the UK, Japan, and other G7 nations are largely exempt from these new requirements, helping keep research and trade channels open. GTRI Founder Ajay Srivastava said. On India's request, he said, while Washington is eager to strengthen tech ties with India, especially under the Quad framework, it may stop short of offering full parity.

'American officials could point to ongoing concerns about India's export controls, intellectual property protections, cybersecurity standards and military relationships with Russia. Rather than blanket exemptions, Washington may suggest mechanisms such as trusted partner programmes. project-specific licences, or expanded licensing exceptions for select Indian entities," Srivas-The terms of references

(ToRs) have been finalised by India and the US for the proposed agreement, which include around 19 chapters covering issues such as tariffs, goods, services, rules of origin, non-tariff barriers, and customs facilitation.

To give further impetus to the talks in the 90-day tariff pause window, an Indian official team was there in Washington to iron out differences on certain issues before formally launching negotiations for the pact. The US remained India's largest trading partner for the fourth consecutive year in 2024-25 with bilateral trade valued at USD 131.84 billion. The US ac counts for about 18 per cent of India's total goods exports, 6.22 per cent in imports, and 10.73 per cent in the country's total merchandise trade.

IPO investors in CPSE stocks get bumper returns

New Delhi, April 27: As many as 15 out of 18 public sector companies listed over the last 8 years have given bumper returns with Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders topping the list by making investors richer by a whopping 3,700 per cent, according to an analysis.

The analysis shows that barring insurance companies, all central public sector enterprises (CPSEs), especially from

shipping and rail sectors, listed since May 2017 gave positive returns to investors who bought shares in the initial public offering (IPO) and have stayed invested in the company so far.

Besides. Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders, Rail Vikas Nigam Ltd (RVNL), Garden Reach Shipbuilders and Engineers Ltd and Indian Railways Catering and Tourism Corporation (IRCTC) provided over 1,000 per cent returns to IPO investors. Sector wise analysis reveals that Railways and Shipping

CPSEs have outperformed CPSEs in other sectors. Mazagon Dock. which listed on bourses in 2020 at an issue price of ₹145, was trading at ₹5,510.2 a share on April 22, 2025, despite a stock split in December 2024. Garden Reach Shipbuilders listed on bourses in 2018 at an issue price of ₹118. The shares are currently trading at ₹1,733.9 apiece, thus giving a 1.369 per cent returns to investors. Cochin Shipyard, which listed in 2017, has given returns of 590 per cent with share price rising to ₹2,979.7 from the IPO issue price of ₹432. This return is despite a stock split.

Among Railways CPSEs, RVNL gave returns of 1,866 per cent, rising from 2019 IPO issue price of ₹19 a share to ₹373.6. Similarly, IRCTC shares jumped 1,110 per cent from ₹320 in 2019, to ₹3,872.75 a share. Others like RITES and IRCON International (listed in 2018) gave investors returns of 225 per cent and 243 per cent respectively.

Economic uncertainty now higher than ever: IMF

Barcelona, April 27: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has just published its World Economic Outlook, and it does not take an expert to deduce that, even among some of the world's top economic minds, confident predictions are currently hard to come by.

Every spring the IMF and World Bank hold their Spring Meetings in Washington DC: a week of seminars, briefings and press conferences focusing on the global economy, international development and world

At both the Spring Meetings and the Annual Meeting, held each autumn, the IMF publish-

financial markets.

es its global economic growth forecasts.

For its 2025 Spring Meeting the IMF has published a baseline forecast, as well as an addendum analysing the tariff events that took place between 9 and 14 April. According to the Fund's report, world GDP will grow by 2.8% in 2025 and 3.0% in 2026. For the euro area, growth will be 0.8% and 1.2% for 2025 and 2026 respectively.

These forecasts represent a substantial downward revision from IMF figures published just three months ago. Globally, growth in 2025 is down by 0.5%compared to the Fund's January update, with a reduction of 0.2% for the euro area.

One major shift is key to un-



derstanding the most recent IMF report and its pessimistic predictions: we live in a much more uncertain world than we did three months ago.

If one had to sum up the new

US tariff policy in a word, "unpredictable" would suffice, as the so-called "Liberation Day" of 2 April 2025 represented the largest tariff increase in modern history.

Just one week later, the US president then made two further announcements. First, a 90-day freeze on tariff hikes, apparently in search of bilateral agreements with the countries to which he had applied tariffs above 10%. Second, that China would be excluded from this exception, with tariffs on its products being raised to 145%. This freeze means that until

July EU goods being sold to the US will have a 10% tariff instead of the 20% that was announced on 2 April. However, the 10% applied by the new US administration is still much higher than the average tariff of 1.34% that was in force before 5 April. But what will the tariff be after these 90 days? What about in December? What about in 2 years' time' What goods will be exempted? How far will the trade war between China and the US go? The answer to all of these questions is: nobody knows. This uncertainty is evident in of the IMF's spring forecast. The IMF's world trade uncertainty index is cur rently 7 times higher than it was in October 2024, much higher than in the pandemic. As far as the economy is con-

cerned, this uncertainty is far worse than a high but definitive tariff. With a tariff, companies can at least reorganise their production chain, and consumers can look for alternative products. There is a cost, but at least businesses and consumers can plan for it.

The Reds lift their 20th league title, tying Manchester **United for most in England's top division**

Liverpool, April 27: Liverpool have been crowned the 2024-25 Premier League champions after their 5-1 win over Tottenham Hotspur at the Anfield Stadium. Goals by Luis Diaz, Alexis Mac Allister, Cody Gakpo, Mohamed Salah and an own goal by Destiny Udogie saw The Reds lift their 20th league title, tying Manchester United for

most in England's top division. It is fair to say that the Arne Slot era is off to a glorious start. The Dutch head coach came to Merseyside with a job not many thought was possible - replacing Jurgen Klopp- but Slot has led Liverpool to their second league title in the Premier League era, matching the German's tally.

It was Tottenham Hotspur who looked like they were in



the mood to delay the title celebrations when they fired early through Dominic Solanke in the 11th minute when he headed past Alisson via a James Maddison corner. However Liverpool were not

willing to lie down and equalized just five minutes later when Szoboszlai squared the ball to Diaz for a simple finish. The Reds snatched the lead eight minutes later when Ryan Gravenberch won the ball in the Spurs box and kay it off for Mac Allister who buried it into the top right corner to take the lead into half-time.

Cody Gakpo added to their tally shortly after the half when a corner fell for him inside the box and he danced around the

Spurs defender to find the bottom corner of the goal. With The Reds marching to-

wards the title, how could Salah not be involved in the proceedings. The Egyptian continued his almost mythical season when he scored his 28th goal of the campaign and added a fourth to Spurs' misery. A cross by Trent Alexander-Arnold saw Destiny Udogie nudge the ball into his net to complete the five star performance by Liverpool.

Liverpool clinched the title in 34 games, having conjured 82 points with 25 wins, seven draws and two losses. They hold a 15-point lead over second placed Arsenal who seemed poised to finish as runners-up for the third season running.

India withdraw team from Central Asian **Volleyball event in Pak**

Lahore, April 27: Pakistan Vollevball Federation Sundav said India have withdrawn their contingent from the next month's Central Asian Volleyball in Islamabad.

PVF official Abdul Ahad said India had confirmed sending a 30-member squad, including 22 players for the championship starting May 28 at the Jinnah complex. Following the April 22 terror attack in Pahalgam, where 26 tourists were killed, diplomatic tension has grown between the two nations.

"The Indian Volleyball officials have informed the region al body that their government has cancelled the NOC issued to them for the tournament after the incident in Pahalgam,' Ahad said. "It is disappointing to know India has withdrawn from the championship and they will be replaced either by Afghanistan or Sri Lanka."

Teams from Iran, Turkmenistan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan are scheduled to compete in the event.
