Justice BR Gavai takes oath as CJJ



New Delhi: Justice Bhushan Ramkrishna Gavai, who has been part of several benches that delivered landmark rulings including the one upholding the Centre's decision to abrogate provisions of Article 370 bestowing special status to Jammu and Kashmir, was Wednesday sworn in as the 52nd Chief Justice of India. The 64-year-old was administered oath by President Droupadi Murmu at a brief ceremony at the Ganatantra Mandap in the Rashtrapati Bhavan. He succeeds Justice Sanjiv Khanna, who demitted office Tuesday on attaining the age of 65.

'BHARGAVASTRA' TEST SUCCESSFUL

New Delhi: India achieved a significant milestone in its counter-drone capabilities with the successful test firing of its low-cost, hard-kill counter-swarm drone system, 'Bhargavastra', at the Seaward Firing Range in Gopalpur Wednesday. The system met all specified performance targets and is being hailed as a major advancement in the country's ability to neutralise the emerging threat of drone swarms. Developed indigenously by Solar Defence and Aerospace Limited, 'Bhargavastra' is a powerful addition to India's defence arsenal, particularly in its mission to secure airspace from unmanned aerial threats.

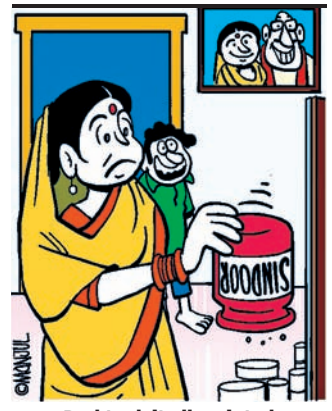

CHINA AT IT AGAIN

New Delhi: India Wednesday outrightly rejected China's attempts to rename some places in Arunachal Pradesh, saying such "preposterous" attempts will not alter the "undeniable" reality that the state "was, is, and will" always remain an integral part of India. New Delhi's reaction came in response to Beijing announcing Chinese names for some places in Arunachal Pradesh, which the neighbouring country claims as the southern part of Tibet. "We have noticed that China has persisted with its vain and preposterous attempts to name places in the Indian state of Arunachal Pradesh," MEA spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said.

Maori MPs face ban from NZ Parl for viral 'haka' protest

Wellington, May 14: Three New Zealand lawmakers from Te Pati Maori, the Maori Party, will receive temporary bans from Parliament and severe censure, it was announced Wednesday, over their protest of a proposed law by performing a haka, a chanting dance of challenge, directed at their opponents.

A committee of their peers recommended the penalties, understood to be the harshest ever assigned to New Zealand parliamentarians, in findings

that said the trio's actions could have intimidated other legislators and were in contempt of Parliament. Their temporary suspensions are expected to be affirmed by vote during a sitting of all lawmakers Thursday.

The decision means that Hana-Rawhiti Maipi-Clarke, who at 22 is currently New Zealand's youngest lawmaker, will be suspended from Parliament for seven days. The co-leaders of her political party, Rawiri Waititi and Debbie Ngarewa-Packer, face 21-day bans.

They won't receive salaries during their suspensions.

The ruling is the latest twist in a fraught national saga over a bill, now defeated, that opponents said would reverse decades of progress for Maori, New Zealand's Indigenous people, and provoke constitutional havoc.

Video of the legislators in full cry drew millions of views on social media and global news headlines last November. The bill they opposed was vanquished at a second vote in April.

However, some lawmakers from the centre-right government objected to the Maori Party legislators' protest during the first vote and complained to Par-



liament's speaker. At issue was the way the trio walked across the floor of the debating chamber towards their opponents

11.25% seats for SEBC category in higher edu

Bhubaneswar, May 14: The state government Wednesday decided to reserve 11.25 per cent of seats for the students belonging to the Socially and Economically Backward Class (SEBC), taking the total ratio of quota in education to 50 per cent in the state.

The decision was taken at a Cabinet meeting chaired by Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi. "Our government, within 11 months of its tenure, has given justice to the students belonging to the SEBC category," Majhi said.

Though the SEBC candidates were earlier getting reservation in jobs (11.25 per cent), there was no provision in education for which the opposition BJD and Congress were making demands both inside the Assembly and outside.



Briefing reporters, the Chief Minister said that it is a landmark decision of the government to introduce an 11.25 per cent reservation in admission for students belonging to SEBC in universities, state government and aided higher secondary and higher education institutions from the academic year 2025-26.

Majhi said the initiative ensures uniform implementation of reservation in admission for students belonging to ST (22.5 per cent), SC (16.25 per cent), SEBC (11.25 per cent), persons with disability (five per cent) and ex-servicemen (one per

cent) in institutions under the state government.

These include institutions under the School & Mass Education department (for Higher Secondary Schools, Teacher Training, and Vocational Courses), the Higher Education department (Undergraduate, Postgraduate, Teacher Education, LL.B., and Integrated Law Courses), the Odia Language, Literature & Culture department (Bachelor in Performing Arts Courses), and the Sports & Youth Services Department (B.P.Ed. and M.P.Ed. courses).

The decision is taken in line with NEP 2020, the Chief Minister said, adding that the move aims to promote access, equity, and inclusion, increase the gross enrolment ratio, and enhance opportunities for marginalised and disadvantaged communities in Odisha. **More P3**

MP MIN IN SOUP OVER REMARKS ON COL SOFIA QURESHI

Language of gutters: HC orders FIR

Jabalpur, May 14: The Madhya Pradesh High Court Wednesday castigated state minister Vijay Shah for passing scurrilous remarks and using "language of the gutters" against Colonel Sofia Qureshi, and ordered the police to file an FIR against him on the charge of promoting enmity and hatred.

It also said the armed forces were perhaps the last institution in this country that reflect integrity, discipline, sacrifice, selflessness, character, honour

and indomitable courage.

Colonel Qureshi came into the spotlight for holding regular press briefings along with Foreign Secretary Vikram Misir and Wing Commander Vyomika Singh about 'Operation Sindoor' conducted last week by Indian armed forces to strike terror camps in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK).

Shah, the tribal affairs minister and BJP leader, sparked a major controversy with objectionable comments against Colonel Qureshi, whom he tried

to project as a sister of terrorists. He made the remarks while addressing a gathering in Ramkunda village near Indore Monday.

Taking suo motu cognisance of the controversial statements, the high court's division bench of Justices Atul Shridharan and Anuradha Shukla ordered the police to register a first information report (FIR) against the minister.

The court directed the police department to register the FIR by 6pm Wednesday, and also directed it to inform about it.

5 killed in lightning strikes

Pottangi, May 14: Five persons, including three of a family, were killed in separate incidents of lightning strike in Koraput and Rayagada districts Wednesday.

In the first incident, a man, his daughter and the former's aunt were killed at Kandhaputabandh village under Ampabali panchayat and this block in

In a separate incident, a woman of Garlidabad village of Nuagaon panchayat in Koraput district died after lightning struck her while she was grazing cattle near Uparpaniki village. Similarly, a minor boy at Antameda village under Kolnara block in Rayagada district was killed after lightning struck him near a mango orchard.

Pak hands over BSF jawan after 21 days

Amritsar, May 14: India and Pakistan Wednesday handed each other's border-guarding personnel captured by the Border Security Force (BSF) and the Pakistan Rangers respectively at the International Borders (IB) between the two countries, officials said.



BSF jawan Purnam Kumar Shaw was handed over to India, 21 days after he was apprehended by the Rangers from along the International Border in Punjab. Shaw was apprehended by the Pakistan Rangers a day after the Pahalgam terrorist attack in which 26 people were killed. The officials said a Pakistani Ranger apprehended by the BSF from the Rajasthan border May 3 was also handed back to the neighbouring country.

Constable Shaw was handed over to the BSF by the Pakistan Rangers at 10.30am at the joint check post (JCP) Attari in Amritsar district opposite Pakistan's Wagah, a BSF spokesperson said.

posure (in millions) at the 2025 Met Gala. The Met Gala red car-



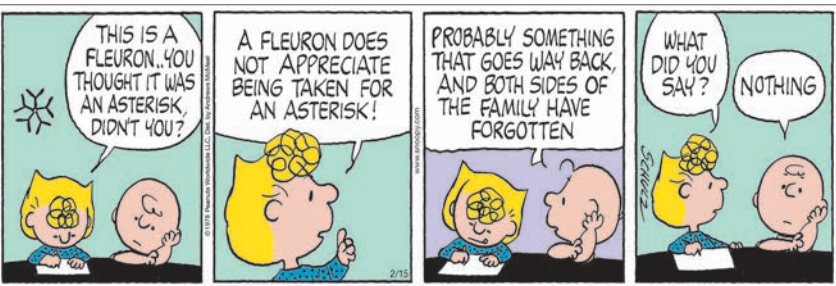
pet power rankings show which stars and brands generated the

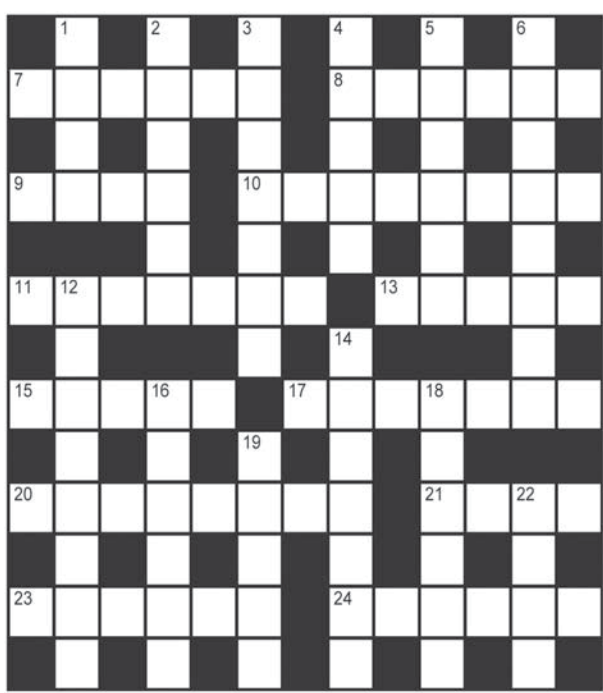

Minister Samanta calls for global handloom exposure

Bhubaneswar, May 14: Handloom, Textiles and Handicrafts Minister Pradeep Bal Samanta underlined the importance of handloom and handicrafts as key cultural symbols of the state, urging the need for enhanced marketing strategies and global exposure.

During the inauguration of a two-day workshop and review meeting for field officers of Handloom, Textiles, and Handicrafts department here Wednesday, the Minister emphasised leveraging online platforms to promote local products internationally.

Samanta noted that Odisha's traditional crafts have significant cultural value, but it is essential to strengthen the marketing mechanisms to make these products globally accessible.

sible. He called for a concerted effort to increase the global presence of the state's handicrafts while also improving the welfare of local artisans, weavers, and silk farmers.

The Minister emphasised the importance of inclusive planning that would prioritise the welfare of artisans and provide employment opportunities, especially for women and youth. He pointed out that investments in the apparel and textile industries could play a crucial role in creating job avenues, leading to economic growth in rural areas.

The meeting, which was attended by senior officials and field officers, also reviewed the progress and effectiveness of various departmental schemes. The focus was particularly on boosting silk production in the state, which includes Muga, Tussar, Eri, and Mulberry silks. Encouraging entrepreneurship, especially among unemployed youth, was another key focus area.

In her address, Commissioner-cum-Secretary Guha Poonam Tapas Kumar stressed the need for innovation in design, modern packaging techniques, and the development of new market linkages and clusters to promote Odisha's handloom and handicrafts. Director of Textiles Prem Chandra Chaudhary called for regular training programmes and the provision of incentives to upskill weavers and artisans.

Several key achievements for the 2024-25 fiscal year were outlined during the meeting, including the construction of 2,375 work sheds for weavers, loom pit concretisation for 762 weavers, and installation of lighting units for 9,428 weavers.

Additionally, interest-free working capital loans of up to ₹1 lakh were approved for 567 weavers and ancillary workers, with ₹180.78 lakh allocated to the Odisha State Cooperative Bank for interest subvention.

The workshop's overall goal is to create a strong foundation for the sustainable growth of Odisha's handloom, textiles, and handicrafts sectors.

1 held in Sishu Bhawan assault; 7 at large

Past enmity over cricket match led to planned attack

Bhubaneswar, May 14: The Airport Police have arrested a 39-year-old man in connection with a brutal assault near Sishu Bhawan Square that left a youth critically injured. The accused, identified as Ismile Mohammad of Delanga, was nabbed Wednesday after a dramatic chase.

According to Inspector-in-Charge (IIC) Rabindranath Meher, three other suspects were detained Tuesday, but around seven miscreants involved in the attack are still



absconding.

The incident occurred around 9pm Monday when Ismile and his associates allegedly targeted Vicky Nayak and his friend. The group chased them with sharp weapons. While Vicky's friend managed to escape, Vicky was cornered and stabbed multiple times, leaving him critically injured.

Police said the attack stemmed from a recent clash during a cricket match. Vicky had added a new player to his team without consulting others, which reportedly angered Ismile's group. The argument escalated into threats and ultimately led to the murder attempt.

Meher said the group had plotted the attack over the past few days, and efforts are on to trace the remaining accused.

The Airport Police have booked Ismile under Sections 115 (2), 109, 351 (2) (3), and 3 (5) of BNS, along with Section 25 (1) (a) of Arms Act. He was produced before a local court Wednesday.

Youth drowns in pond during Chandan Yatra

Puri: A youth drowned in Narendra Pond Wednesday during the 'Chapakhela' ritual of the Chandan Yatra festival in the holy town of Puri. Fire services personnel and lifeguards recovered the body, which was then sent to the District Headquarters Hospital for post-mortem by Kumbharpara Police. The youth remains unidentified, according to police sources. The incident occurred despite multiple safety measures implemented by the administration to prevent accidents and drowning. In response to last year's tragic firecracker mishap during the concluding 'Bhauni' festival – which claimed the lives of 17 devotees, the administration had ramped up safety protocols this year.

Oppn slams govt over teacher transfer rule

Bhubaneswar, May 14: The Congress and BJD have sharply opposed the state government's decision to let MPs and MLAs recommend teachers' transfers within their constituencies, calling it arbitrary and vulnerable to misuse.

According to an official letter addressed to the Directors of Elementary and Secondary Education, legislators can now propose the transfer of up to 15 teachers—covering both elementary and secondary levels—within their own constituencies.

These recommendations are to be submitted to the respective District Collectors, who will forward them to the District Level Transfer Committee (DLTC) for consideration.

This provision is applicable only for the current academic year, with a submission window from May 15 to June 15. Officials clarified that it is a one-time measure.

However, the decision has drawn sharp criticism from opposition parties. Odisha Pradesh Congress Committee (OPCC) President Bhakta Charan Das said the move undermines democratic institutions. "It appears the government is shifting executive powers to MPs and MLAs. Already, Panchayati Raj bodies, Zilla Parishads, and municipalities have been stripped of authority. This decision will only lead to corruption and favouritism," he stated.

Echoing similar concerns, BJD spokesperson Lekhashree Samantsinghar said that transfers should be policy-driven, not influenced by political figures. "Most MPs and MLAs in the state belong to the BJP. This will pave the way for biased transfers. If this continues, soon recommendations may also extend to doctors and engineers," she warned.

Min reviews paddy procurement

Grievance redressal centre established to ensure smooth rabi paddy procurement and protect farmers interests across the state

Bhubaneswar, May 14: In a move to protect the interests of farmers during the Rabi season, the Odisha State Civil Supplies Corporation Ltd has set up a centralised monitoring and grievance redressal centre to ensure smooth and transparent procurement of paddy. The procurement process commenced statewide Wednesday.

Food Supplies and Consumer Welfare Minister Krushna Chandra Patra visited the centre to assess the operational readiness and effectiveness of the system. During his visit, he closely reviewed the paddy procurement process at a mandi and inspected key mechanisms such as the CCTV monitoring system and vehicle tracking facilities used for transporting paddy from the mandi to rice mills.

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Temple land grab hits rev, may mar Rath Yatra

Kendrapara, May 14: With a little over a month left for the Rath Yatra at Lord Baladevjev Temple (Tulasi Kshetra) at Ichhapur in this town, the shrine authorities and devotees apprehend that non-availability of funds due to encroachment on temple land might hamper the conduct of the annual festival, a report said.

Since the temple lands remain under encroachment, the fund required for the conduct of rituals and festivals gets blocked, the report added.

Ahead of the June 27 Rath Yatra, ceremonial selection of timber for Lord Baladevjev's chariot, known as 'Brahma Taladhwa', was performed on the occasion of Akshaya Tritiya. However, with the cost of organising rituals, including the Rath Yatra goes up by ₹50 lakh annually, the temple is facing a serious fund crunch in organising the annual sojourn of the deities and various other festivals held round the year. Much of this cost is currently met through donations and auctions of temple shops and offerings, but these sources are

proving inadequate.

Devotees and local stakeholders argue that if encroached temple lands are recovered, the financial condition of the temple could improve significantly. According to Pratap Kumar Mohanty, a local Right to Information (RTI) activist, a 1974 state government order under Sections 6 and 7 of the Endowment Act had officially allotted 866.99 acres of land to Lord Baladevjev. Despite paying land revenue and water taxes, more than 100 acres of this land remain under illegal occupation.

Among the encroachments, 232 acres of land are held by former tenants (marfatdars) while 117.35 acres are with individuals referred to as 'Sikimi' tenants. Meanwhile, no revenue from these lands is being deposited into the endowment trust fund.

Only 146 acres under the trust board's control generate income. However, these funds are allocated for another Lakshmanjev temple in Kusiapala under Derabish block while the rest is spent on temple use.

The temple is situated on 2.2-acre land, Ratha Danda on

10 acre, a cattle haat on 2 acre and a pond on 8 acre. Meanwhile, the remaining 160 acre barren land and various unused properties produce zero income.

Even the yield from the 192.86 acres of cultivable land under direct control of the temple is quite inadequate which stands at just 350 sacks of paddy annually. According to Mohanty, the cost of land tax and water charges alone far exceeds the income.

Papun Kumar Swain, president of a voluntary outfit Baladev Sena, recalled that a meeting chaired by the then Law minister in 2007 issued directives to the District Collector to recover the encroached land. However, 18 years later, no concrete action has been taken in this regard.

Several locals like Rajesh Kumar Behera blamed both administrative inaction and indifference by the temple trust board for this impasse.

Servitors Gagan Patri, Nrusingha Prasad Patri, Jyotiranjana Patri, and Shashikant Suar, said daily rituals, festivals, and Rath Yatra activities require consistent annual funding exceeding ₹50 lakh. They argue that public donations, chariot auction proceeds, and sales from the allotment of stalls are not enough.

Given the religious and cultural importance of Tulasi Kshetra, devotees have called on the state government to establish a dedicated administrative mechanism to manage the temple affairs. Such a step, they believe, would ensure smooth conduct of rituals and traditions.

Arun Kumar Nayak, Sub-Collector and current chairman of the Trust Board, confirmed that efforts are underway to recover encroached temple lands.

Jaleswar SDPO cries mental harassment

Jaleswar, May 14: Jaleswar sub-divisional police officer (SDPO) Brajamohan Pradhan has accused Balasore SP Raj Prasad of mental harassment and written a letter to senior authorities warning that he may take extreme steps, like suicide, if the issue is not addressed promptly.

He has reportedly mentioned in his letter that he was repeatedly hurled with unsavoury remarks, humiliated and warned of departmental action even suspension from service. According to the letter, Pradhan alleged that he was repeatedly humiliated by the SP in front of subordinates and was assigned responsibilities beyond his capacity. Despite currently holding the DSP post at Balas-



ore headquarters, he was also made to continue serving as SDPO in Jaleswar.

Pradhan, 58, stated that the daily travel between Jaleswar and Balasore has taken a toll on his health. He also said that he was not provided with a typist to assist with office work at headquarters, which created further challenges. When he raised the issue, he was allegedly asked to resign.

"This treatment felt biased to me," Pradhan wrote in the

letter, noting that his mental health has deteriorated under the pressure. He warned that if his SDPO responsibilities are not withdrawn, he may be forced to end his life.

Pradhan had previously informed superiors April 4 about his inability to continue as SDPO failing which he will commit suicide. He approached Eastern Range DIG Satyajit Nayak with the complaint May 7.

On the other hand, while at Jaleswar police station, Pradhan suddenly fell ill and was admitted to GK Bhattar Hospital in Jaleswar. DIG Nayak visited him at the hospital and enquired about his health condition. The DIG said the allegations will be investigated and appropriate action will be taken based on the findings.

2 killed, 15 injured as pickup auto overturns

Aska, May 14: Two women were killed and 15 others injured after a pickup auto-rickshaw overturned near Bhetanai under Kotinada police limits along Aska-Balipada main road late Tuesday night.

The deceased were identified as Gayatri Gouda, 25, and Sarojini Sahu, 50, both residents of Bhetanai.

The injured were identified as Barsha Jena, Sahi Jena, Basanti Gouda, Renu Gouda, Kabit Gouda, Shivananda Gouda, Sagar Gouda, Khushi Gouda, Pinky Sethi, Rohan Sethi, Radha Gouda, Kuja Gouda, Yamuna Sahu, Lata Sethi and Monalisa Sethi. While some of them are currently recuperating at Aska government hospital, seven of them, who are in critical condition, were shifted to MKCG Medical College and Hospital in Berhampur.

The accident occurred around 11:30pm when the vehicle, reportedly carrying passengers returning from a temple ceremony, lost balance and overturned. The passengers were returning from a temple consecration event held at Sanakholi village.

Court reserves verdict in Patnagarh blast case

Bhubaneswar/Bolangir, May 14: A court in Bolangir district Wednesday completed hearing in the 2018 Patnagarh wedding gift blast case. The Patnagarh Additional District Judge (ADJ) court reserved the judgement which is expected to be pronounced May 28, a government advocate said.

Two persons, including the groom, were killed in the blast which occurred when the groom was opening a gift packet February 23, 2018, a day after his wedding reception. The incident sparked an outrage across the state. The case was being investigated by the Crime Branch of Odisha Police.

"We have duly proved all evidence, collected against the accused Punjilal Meher during the investigation, before the court. We have not left any missing link in proving the evidence," government counsel Chittaranjan Kanungo said.

He said the arguments were based on circumstantial evidence as no direct evidence was there in this case.

Pramod Mishra, the counsel



for the accused, said the prosecution had started the arguments in the final phase of the case May 9 and the trial was completed during the day.

Soumya Sekhar, a man in his mid-twenties, and his 85-year-old grandmother were killed, while his wife, Seema Sahoo, sustained critical injuries when a parcel bomb disguised as a wedding gift exploded at their Patnagarh home in Bolangir district February 23, 2018. The blast had taken place when the groom opened a gift pack.

Following a request by the new bride and her family, the then CM Naveen Patnaik had ordered a CB probe into the incident.

The CB took over the investigation March 23, 2018 and arrested Meher in April, 2018. He is currently lodged in the Patnagarh sub-jail.

Ship with Pak crew: Security tightened

Paradip, May 14: Odisha Police Wednesday bolstered security at port town Paradip after the arrival of a ship with 21 Pakistani crew members on board, officials said.

The 'MT Siren II' with a total of 25 crew members reached Paradip port early Wednesday from South Korea via Singapore, carrying crude oil for Indian Oil Corporation Ltd, they said.

The rest of the crew comprises two Indians, a Sri Lankan and a Thai national, the officials said. Security arrangements have been tightened by Odisha Marine Police and the CISF after receiving information about the crew members from the Immigration department, said Marine Police Station IIC Babita Dehuri.

Paradip port had been put on high alert in the wake of the military conflict between India and Pakistan.

The ship is anchored at single point mooring (SPM), located around 20 km from the shore, the officials said.

"Orders have also been issued that no crew will be allowed to leave the ship during evacuation of crude oil," the police officer said.

Baripada, May 14: A local court here in Mayurbhanj district Wednesday sentenced two persons to four years of imprisonment and slapped a penalty of ₹50 lakh each while delivering a verdict on a wildlife poaching case.

Chief Judicial Magistrate Debashish Mohanty found the accused guilty and stated in the ruling that failure to pay the fine would result in an additional year of imprisonment. The convicts were identified as Nirmal Birua, 27, and Prem Munda, 35, both residents of Badajunapala under Kaptipada police limits.

According to case details, the

duo had illegally entered Similipal Tiger Reserve's (STR) Bagahanta range under the southern division on the night of June 23, 2020, with the intent to hunt wild animals. They camped overnight on a 'mancha' (an elevated stage made on trees) and allegedly hunted a deer early June 24 morning. The venison was then cut and taken home.

Acting on credible intelligence, Forest department personnel from Kaptipada range, along with staffers from Podadiha section, Similipal Tiger Protection Force, and Bagahanta forest unit, launched a coordinated operation. The accused were detained and interrogated. Authorities seized two bows, 12 arrows, a machete,

Maoist camp busted

Nuapada: Security forces uncovered a Maoist camp inside the protected forest near Gatibeda in Sunabeda Wildlife Sanctuary under Komna police limits Wednesday. Huge quantities of Maoist ration supplies were seized from the site, according to SP Gundala Reddy Raghavendra, who addressed a presser at the district headquarters here. The Maoists had set up a camp in the protected jungle with plans to launch a major attack targeting security personnel and other key installations. Intelligence inputs received by Nuapada police indicated suspicious Maoist activity in the area. Acting on a tip-off, a joint combing operation was launched in the morning under the direction of the SP. The team uncovered the deserted camp and seized various essential supplies, including rice, pulses, salt and other items.

Keonjhar village turns into bat sanctuary

Keonjhar, May 14: At a time when bat population across the world is dwindling due to emerging environment hazards, locals of a sleepy village in Ghatagaon block of this district have taken it upon themselves to protect the flying mammals, according to a report.

Balabhadrapur village, widely known for its craftsmanship in terracotta ware, has recently gained attention for becoming a safe haven for thousands of bats. For years, these nocturnal animals have made their homes in the trees, especially tamarind and other native species in the village. The efforts of the villagers have earned wide applause from several quarters.

During the day, the bats hang silently from trees and by evening they take to the skies in search of food, returning by



dawn. Their return is marked by soft, chirping sounds that villagers say have become part of their daily lives. The sight of hundreds of bats roosting creates a unique natural ambiance, drawing visitors' attention.

Locals say the bats have never caused any harm or any problem for the villagers. The village community not only refrains from doing any harm to them, but also ensures their protection from poachers. During summer, when temperatures soar, villagers grow concerned about heatstroke risks for the bats. Hundreds die each year due to extreme heat.

When heatwaves strike, Forest and Fire Services department officials sometimes assist the villagers with water-spraying operations to help cool the bats. Amid the broader crisis of biodiversity loss driven by climate change, villagers see their bats as a symbol of resilience.

Residents have called on the Forest department to implement dedicated conservation measures and offer formal support for their efforts.

"There aren't enough trees here for birds and animals to thrive," said Amarendra Sahu, a local resident. "If we plant more saplings, create

water sources and post guards for their protection, it will not only help the bats survive here but also attract more tourists."

Chaturbhuja Rana, an experienced terracotta artisan, recalled seeing bats in tamarind trees since his childhood. "They've always been here since long," he said. "But the threat of heatstroke during summer is a concern," he added.

Ghatagaon forest range officer Saroj Kumar Mishra acknowledged the villagers' efforts. "It's encouraging to see a community so invested in wildlife conservation. Thanks to intermittent rains that have prevented heatstroke incidents so far. But when needed, water-spraying is arranged."

Balabhadrapur's transformation from a terracotta village to a sanctuary for bats is not just a local success story — it's a model of grassroots conservation.

BRIDGING GREY AREAS



To break into the high human development tier (HDI > 0.700), it must address several persistent grey areas that hinder inclusive progress

pation in India remains low, hovering around 28%, which is well below the global average. The government should ensure the effective rollout of the reservation policy across all levels and support women entrepreneurs through financial and skill-building initiatives.

Education in India has expanded in terms of access, but quality remains a challenge. While the average years of schooling increased to 6.88 in 2023 and school enrolment levels are commendable, learning outcomes are far from satisfactory. The Annual Status of Education Report (ASER) 2023 reveals that only half of the students in grade 5 can read a grade 2-level text. This reflects a disconnect between schooling and actual learning. Moreover, digital education has become a necessity post-pandemic, yet a vast rural-urban divide persists. Over 70% of students in rural areas lack access to on-line learning resources. The government needs to make quality education a priority by improving teacher training, introducing performance-linked assessments, and ensuring the full implementation of the National Education Policy 2020.

Health outcomes in India have improved, but the gains are uneven. Life expectancy has reached a record 72 years, up

from 58.6 years in 1990. Yet, significant gaps persist, especially in rural and marginalised communities. Rural areas, which house the majority of the population, continue to suffer from inadequate infrastructure and a shortage of trained medical staff. Public health expenditure remains low at just 2.1% of GDP, well below the global average of 6%. India must increase its health spending to at least 3% of GDP and strengthen the reach and quality of primary healthcare services.

India has rapidly embraced digital technology, particularly in financial inclusion and e-governance. However, internet access remains skewed. Only 38% of rural households are connected to internet, compared to 72% of urban households. While India boasts the world's highest self-reported AI skills penetration, this digital progress does not reflect the experiences of most rural Indians, where only 15% of workforce is digitally literate. If left unaddressed, this divide could deepen socio-economic disparities and hinder access to education, healthcare, and employment.

Another under-addressed issue is the urban-rural development imbalance. Urban areas enjoy better infrastructure, healthcare, education, and employment opportunities, while

rural India—home to nearly two-thirds of the population—lags in nearly every dimension of development. This disparity is reflected in the rural HDI, estimated at 0.638 compared to 0.741 in urban areas. Rural development requires a holistic strategy that includes localised industrialisation, improved transport and communication networks, and better public services.

India's development is also increasingly threatened by climate vulnerabilities. As one of the most climate-affected countries in the world, India loses approximately 2.5% of its GDP annually due to climate-related disasters, according to the World Bank. Over 600 million Indians are at risk of climate-induced livelihood disruptions, especially in agriculture-dependent and coastal regions. Climate change undermines health, food security, and water availability—all critical aspects of human development. The path forward requires integrating climate adaptation strategies into development planning.

While India's steady climb on the HDI ladder is commendable, achieving a score above 0.700—and joining the ranks of high human development countries—will require a concerted push across multiple fronts. Reducing inequality, empowering women, strengthening public services, bridging the digital divide, and fostering sustainable development are no longer optional—they are imperative. These efforts must involve government policy, private sector innovation, academic research, and community engagement. But moving into the high human development category will depend on how equitably and sustainably the nation consolidates its gains. The time to act decisively on these grey areas is now.

Looming Disaster

Despite a succession of shocks since 2020, the global economy has held up remarkably well – so far. But the margin for error is dwindling. Total global debt is now nearly 25 per cent higher than it was on the eve of the COVID-19 pandemic, when it already was at an all-time high. This overhang could undercut all economies' ability to shield themselves against the latest shock: higher trade tariffs.

Although debt is crucial for driving economic growth, it should be understood as a form of deferred taxation. By borrowing rather than taxing, governments can make long-term investments that will benefit future taxpayers without burdening the current generation; or they can prop up national growth and incomes during an economic emergency, when hiking taxes would only deepen the downturn.

Eventually, however, the piper must be paid, and if national income does not grow faster than the cost of borrowing, taxes must be raised to repay the debt. Persistently high debt thus becomes a barrier to economic progress.

That barrier has seldom been higher. Over the last 15 years, developing countries got hooked on debt, which they amassed at a record-setting clip: six percentage points of GDP per year, on average. Such rapid debt buildups often end in tears. Indeed, the odds that they will trigger a financial crisis are roughly 50-50.

Moreover, this particular surge has been punctuated by the fastest increase in interest rates in four decades. Borrowing costs doubled for half of all developing economies, with net interest costs as a share of government revenues rising from less than 9 per cent in 2007 to about 20 per cent in 2024. That alone constitutes a crisis.

Although the world has so far managed to dodge a "systemic" financial meltdown of the 2008-09 variety, too many developing economies are now in a doom loop. To service their debts, many are cutting the investments in education, healthcare, and infrastructure that they need to assure future growth.

This is especially true of the 78 poor countries that are eligible to borrow from the World Bank's International Development Association. These countries are home to one-quarter of humanity, representing a large slice of the 1.2 billion young people who will enter the global workforce in the next 10-15 years. Yet policymakers around the world have opted to tempt fate. In another triumph of hope over experience, they are betting that global growth will accelerate – and that interest rates will fall – by just enough to defuse the debt bomb.

Such passivity is understandable. It has been extremely difficult to devise a twenty-first-century system capable of ensuring global debt sustainability and swift debt restructuring for countries that need it. In the absence of such a system, the progress that has occurred has been too slow to avoid rising debt dangers.

But the world cannot afford yet another decade of drift and denial where debt is concerned. Under current policies, global growth will not speed up anytime soon, which means that sovereign debt-to-GDP ratios are likely to climb for the remainder of this decade.

Today's trade wars and record-breaking levels of policy uncertainty have only made the outlook worse. At the start of 2025, the consensus forecast among economists was predicted 2.6 per cent global growth this year. That number is now down to 2.2 per cent – nearly a third lower than the average that prevailed in the 2010s.

Nor will interest rates fall. In advanced economies, interest rates set by central banks are expected to average 3.4 per cent this year and next, more than five times the annual average between 2010 and 2019. This will compound developing economies' difficulties. In an era of scarce public resources, it will take an all-out mobilisation of private capital to boost growth and development over the next five years.

But foreign private capital is unlikely to flow into highly indebted economies with weak growth prospects. Private investors will correctly assume that any gains from economic growth will simply be taxed to pay off the debt. Thus, reducing debt should be the top priority for developing economies with persistently high debt-to-GDP ratios.

But we also need a clear-eyed view of the broader problem: the global apparatus for assessing the sustainability of a country's debt urgently needs to be upgraded. The current system is too quick to decide that countries merely need loans to tide them over, when most low-income countries today are in fact insolvent and will need debt write-offs. Governments also will need to ditch the habit of borrowing from domestic creditors; the rise in domestic debt is strangling domestic private-sector initiative.

After reducing debt, the next priority is to accelerate growth. It is foolish to pretend that growth will magically return. Policies that impede trade and investment – like tariffs and non-tariff barriers – should be rolled back as soon and as much as possible. For many developing economies, cutting tariffs equally with respect to all trading partners could be the fastest way to restore growth. Developing economies also have much to gain by fostering a more investment-friendly regulatory environment. And those gains can be used to shift the national focus back to development, particularly by ratcheting up investments in health, education, and infrastructure.

As the saying goes, when you're in a hole, it is wise to stop digging. An era of extraordinarily low interest rates encouraged too many countries to spend far beyond their means. A string of catastrophes – both natural and man-made – made it impossible for them to do anything else in the last five years. But prudence is now essential. Governments should revert to previous norms on what constitutes excessive sovereign debt. Call it the 40-60 maximum: 40 per cent of GDP for low-income economies, 60 per cent for high-income economies, with everyone else in between.

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Economic pragmatism

Sir, President Trump's recent tariff retreat marks one of the most abrupt and resounding reversals of economic policy in recent memory. After imposing severe tariffs on Chinese goods, the Trump administration has now agreed to roll back most of the punitive measures. This agreement represents a clear shift toward economic pragmatism and acknowledges the strain these policies placed on American prosperity. It is the second major reversal in a week, signaling a broader pullback from the administration's aggressive trade stance. Under the new agreement, the US will eliminate much of the 145% tariff imposed on Chinese imports in early April. What remains is a 10% global tariff, plus a 20% levy attributed to China's role in the fentanyl trade, combining for a total of 30%. In return, China will reduce its retaliatory tariffs from 125% to 10%. While only a temporary 90-day arrangement, the deal offers a reprieve from the escalating economic tensions and provides a window for further negotiations. courage during 'Operation Sindoor', and my son played a crucial role. The villagers are elated — our chests are swelling with pride. He has been a disciplined human being since childhood," he added.

Yadav said his son had not mentioned anything about the operation during a recent call. "I came to know about his role from neighbours in Srinagar Hata, Purnea town and from villagers, but we could hardly believe it. People have been calling and visiting to congrat-

ulate us," he added.

tack that claimed 26 lives.

Bharti's mother Urmila Devi said, "I have nothing much to say about my son. The entire country knows what he has done for the nation. It was his dream to join the armed forces. It's a proud moment for us, for the people of Purnea, and countrymen".

"Bhaiya did a great job for the country," said Mithilesh Kumar, Bharti's younger brother, who works in a pharmaceutical firm. "He hadn't spoken to us since the operation began. Today, after so many days, he finally called. People from across Purnea town and our village are coming to congratulate us. The whole village is celebrating," Mithilesh told PTI Videos.

"The last time he visited us was about a year ago. He met everyone with the same warmth as always. Our country is safe only because of our soldiers," he added.

Bharti did his primary schooling at a government school in Purnea and then at the Tilaiya Sainik School in Jharkhand. Later, he went to the National Defence Academy in Pune and was commissioned into the fighter stream of the Indian Air Force (IAF) in 1987.

He was awarded the President's Air Force Medal in 2008 and was promoted to Air Marshal in 2023.

'Operation Sindoor' was launched on the night of May 7 with precision attacks on nine sites in Pakistan-occupied-Kashmir (PoK) and even inside Pakistani territory that destroyed training camps of known terror organisations.

In a first, Delhi's manual scavengers to get PPE kits

According to data, 102 manual scavengers died in 2023, 116 in 2024, and 30 have died in 2025 so far. In Delhi alone, four workers have died this year

New Delhi, May 14: For the first time, nearly 4,000 manual scavengers in Delhi will be provided with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) kits ahead of the monsoon season.

The kits will include 42 safety items such as helmets with lights, gas protection masks, gumboots, protective clothing, gloves, and barrier creams designed to protect against hazardous gases and skin irritants.

The initiative is part of the Centre's 'Namaste' (National Action for Mechanised Sanitation Ecosystem) scheme launched in 2023-24 to ensure secure working conditions, financial assistance, and social security benefits for sanitation workers, especially those engaged in cleaning sewers and septic tanks.

Delhi Social Welfare Minister Ravinder Indraj Singh told PTI that around 4,000 scavengers will get PPE kits before the rains begin.

He also directed officials to ensure that all manual scavengers are enrolled under the Ayushman Bharat health insurance scheme.

In addition, departments have been instructed to expedite training and rehabilita-

tion efforts for those involved in manual sewer cleaning and to establish adequate Emergency Response Sanitation Units, Singh said.

All district magistrates have been ordered to resolve pending compensation cases related to sewer and septic tank deaths in a time-bound manner, he added.

"The safety of every sanitation worker is our priority. They must have access to PPE kits and health insurance before the monsoon," the minister said.

Social activist Bezwada Wilson, founder of the Safai Karam-

chari Andolan, said while PPE kits can help reduce health risks, they do not fully eliminate the dangers faced by manual scavengers.

"This step is welcome, but it still does not prevent the deaths of manual scavengers," said Wilson. Wilson also pointed out that the initiative raises concerns under the Prohibition of Employment as Manual Scavengers and Their Rehabilitation Act, 2013, which officially banned manual scavenging in India. "Instead of sending humans into toxic manholes, the government should focus on introducing machines to clean them," he added.

Wilson also shared data on the deaths of manual scavengers, stating that around 102 died in 2023, 116 in 2024, and 30 have died in 2025 so far. In Delhi alone, four workers have died this year, he said.

Red Fort to Qutub Minar, Delhi to spruce up iconic tourist sites

New Delhi, May 14: The Delhi government plans to enhance the premises of major city monuments including the Red Fort, Lotus Temple and Qutub Minar by installing street furniture such as lamps, benches and shaded seating areas.

The initiative aims to improve the overall tourist experience by making these heritage zones more accessible, welcoming and comfortable.

The beautification will also include clearing encroachments, installing traffic signs and ensuring better walkability.

Delhi Tourism Minister Kapil Mishra said, "We are working closely with officials from the tourism department to transform the areas around Red Fort, Qutub Minar and Lotus Temple into more walkable and pleasant spaces."

"The idea is to not just beautify the surroundings but to make them more functional, safe and

tourist-friendly. We plan to install street lights, benches and sheds to protect visitors from the sun, clear encroachments, and add proper traffic signs and signals," he said.

The government is also preparing to launch a city branding campaign. An agency will soon be appointed for the project and a fresh tagline for Delhi will be selected, Mishra said.

In 2013, the Congress-led Delhi government had organised a public contest to choose a tagline for the city. The tagline 'DilDar Dilli' was chosen and participant Amit Anand had won a prize of ₹50,000 for coining it.

Delhi is home to 174 heritage and tourist spots, including three UNESCO World Heritage Sites, several stepwells (baolis), and many lesser-known monuments. Through this renewed focus on tourism, the government hopes to bring these historical treasures into the spotlight.

KIYG revives Barauni's deep-rooted football culture

Over the next three decades, Barauni turned into a cradle of footballing dreams, led by unsung heroes like Chandra Shekhar, and former Mohun Bagan goalkeeper-turned-mentor Sanjeev Kumar Singh, who chose turf over a steady Army career, love for the game over comfort

Begusarai, May 14: Football ke rang, Begusarai ke sangh. It's more than just a tagline pasted on the pillars of an under-construction flyover leading into this town. It's a quiet revolution that began with broken legs and bruised pride in a forgotten corner of Bihar.

Tucked away from the din of Patna's bustle, in a humble locality of Barauni in Begusarai district, football did not just arrive, it fought its way in. This ground, a patch of land that carries the legacy of a freedom fighter Yamuna Bhagat, became football's unlikely home nearly 80 years ago.

But the spark that truly lit its modern-day fire came in

1990, when a hastily assembled team of local girls, untrained and unsure, were battered by a seasoned Muzaffarpur team in an exhibition match, meant to mark the ground's 50th anniversary.

Some hobbled away, some were stretched and all had wounds that cut deeper than skin. But instead of shame, it birthed a movement. "We were humiliated. But we turned that pain into purpose," recalls Chandra Shekhar, a retired schoolteacher and former footballer, whose words carry the weight of generations.

"The story of the ground dates back to pre-Independence era, when freedom fighter Yamuna Bhagat started with a library to educate youngsters

from the oppressed communities upon his released from jail. The real transformation took place in 1990 when we planned to celebrate 50 years of the ground," narrated Chandra while reflecting on the struggles and sacrifices, the village made to turn it into a nursery for young female footballers.

"We had invited two teams for an exhibition match, and only one of the two reached

here. As organisers, we were left red-faced, and all of a sudden we decided to form a team with young girls who had never played the sport," he recalled.

"Unfortunately, some of our girls fractured their legs, and most of them ended up with some wound during the loss. That loss somewhere hurt us from within. The whole village united and decided to form a team, we hired a few coaches,

with whatever funds we could gather to pay them," Chandra Shekhar said.

A year later, armed with courage and fuelled by community spirit, Begusarai's girls returned to the field, not to survive, but to compete. They beat Ara 1-0, a side that had former India striker Poonam in its ranks, in what would be remembered not for the result, but for the resolve.

That one goal was a clarion call: We belong here.

Over the next three decades, Barauni turned into a cradle of footballing dreams, led by unsung heroes like Chandra Shekhar, and former Mohun Bagan goalkeeper-turned-mentor Sanjeev Kumar Singh, who chose turf over a steady Army career, love for the game over comfort.

Together, they nurtured talent, mentored generations and preserved a ground that once broke them and later, built them. Sanjeev candidly admitted that his dedication for football has come at the cost of ignoring the interests and needs of his family but pointed out that someone had to shoulder the responsibility.

"For my family, I'm useless, but I can't help it. I try to support them but football remains my first love. Everyone is busy with their jobs, so someone had to take responsibility. It's a sacrifice born of love, not obligation. A choice that helped this venue host Santosh Trophy matches in 2018, and now, India's flagship youth sporting event," said an emotional Sanjeev.

Today, Begusarai has emerged 12-time state champion, supplies 70 percent of Bihar's squad, and a football culture rooted deep in community pride, Barauni finally finds itself on the national map, hosting the Khelo India Youth Games 2025.

It's the applause for three decades of quiet toil, village-wide sacrifice, and football played with heart, not boots. The scouts from the Sports Authority of India (SAI) are in town, identifying prospects and predictably, many have roots in this very village.

For many, KIYG is a platform. For Barauni, it's validation, a celebration of a village that turned heartbreak into heritage.

JNU suspends MoU with Turkish Inonu University

New Delhi, May 14: Jawaharlal Nehru University has suspended an academic memorandum of understanding (MoU) with Turkiye's Inonu University, citing national security considerations, officials of the university here confirmed Tuesday.

The MoU was inked February 3 for a period of three years. "We have suspended the MoU with Turkiye's Inonu University. Under the pact, there were plans for faculty exchange and student exchange programmes, among others," a JNU official said.

Inonu University, at Malatya in Turkiye, had entered into the academic partnership with JNU as part of efforts to boost cross-cultural research and student collaboration.

The decision to suspend the MoU comes against the backdrop of tensions between India and Pakistan. The two neighbours reached an agreement May 10 to halt military actions after four days of intense cross-border drone and missile strikes.

Pak reels from heavy losses

As the dust settles from India's bold 'Operation Sindoor', launched May 7, the true scale of devastation inflicted on Pakistan's military infrastructure is beginning to emerge. Top sources confirm that 20% of the Pakistan Air Force's infrastructure has been decimated in the strikes, with significant damage to its fleet and facilities.

According to reports, dozens of Pakistani fighter jets, including JF-17s and F-16s, have been destroyed. The strikes also claimed the lives of over 30-40 Pakistani military personnel, with 50 casualties reported at the Bholari airbase alone, including Squadron Leader Usman Yusuf and four airmen.

What triggered Operation Sindoor

The operation was India's measured yet forceful response to the Pahalgam terror attack, widely believed to be orchestrated with Pakistani support. Despite India's focus on terror hubs in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK), the Pakistani military reacted by launching drones and missiles toward Indian territory, attempting to target military and civilian structures.

In retaliation, the Indian Armed Forces launched aggressive, high-precision strikes on at least 10-11 airbases across Pakistan, including critical installations in Sargodha, Bholari, Nur Khan (Chaklala), Rafiqui (Shorkot), Murid (Chakwal),



Defence stocks surge over ₹86K-cr in market value

MUMBAI: The Indian defence sector has witnessed a sharp rise in its market capitalisation, gaining an impressive ₹ 86,211 crore since the Pahalgam terror attack, which claimed 26 lives. The bull rally began after the Indian armed forces launched 'Operation Sindoor,' a major precision strike on terrorist infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK). This operation, India's largest tri-service action since the 1971 war, significantly boosted the confidence in defence stocks. Despite the heightened geopolitical tensions, shares of defence companies surged.

Sukkur, Sialkot, Pasrur, Chuni-an, Skardu, and Jacobabad.

Satellite evidence and confirmed damage

High-resolution satellite images have since confirmed extensive structural damage across several key airbases, including those in Jacobabad, Sukkur, Rahim Yar Khan, Nur Khan, Mushaf (Sargodha), and Bholari. Craters on runways, shattered hangars, and destroyed ammunition depots are visible, offering stark vi-

sual proof of the operation's effectiveness.

Pakistan's official statement acknowledged 11 military deaths and over 70 injuries, though Indian sources maintain that 35-40 Pakistani soldiers were killed in the four-day operation.

Strategic gains for India

'Operation Sindoor' marks a turning point in India's counter-terrorism doctrine. Prime Minister Narendra Modi as-

serted that the operation represents a new normal—any future provocation from Pakistan will invite stronger retaliation. Among its major successes, India:

- Eliminated nine key terror launchpads tied to Lashkar-e-Taiba, Jaish-e-Mohammed, and Hizbul Mujahideen.
- Struck deep into Pakistan's interior, including strategic towns like Bahawalpur and Mudriki, long suspected to harbor terrorist infrastructure.
- Exposed significant weaknesses in Pakistan's air defence, which Indian jets either bypassed or neutralised during the 23-minute operation.
- Proved the resilience and readiness of India's air defence systems, which successfully countered Pakistan's retaliatory drone and missile attacks.

A global shift in perception

Unlike in past episodes, where India faced international calls for restraint, global powers this time largely supported India's right to self-defence. This reflects a growing recognition of India's firm stance against cross-border terrorism.

Operation Sindoor has also helped reframe the Kashmir discourse. For the first time, the issue was de-hyphenated from terrorism. PM Modi declared that any talks with Pakistan would only focus on terrorism and the return of Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK).

Trade ties with Turkiye, Azerbaijan under strain

New Delhi, May 14: India's trade relations with Turkiye and Azerbaijan are expected to come under strain due to Ankara and Baku backing Islamabad and condemning India's recent strikes on terror camps in Pakistan.

Following their support to Pakistan, calls for boycotting Turkish goods and tourism have surfaced across the country, with online travel platforms like EaseMyTrip and Ixigo issuing advisories against visiting these nations. Here are a few questions and answers (Q&A) explaining the impact of these developments on India's trade ties with Turkiye and Azerbaijan.

Q: Why India's ties with Turkiye and Azerbaijan may come under strain?

A: The two countries have criticised India's strike on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir. Islamabad has also used Turkish drones in the conflict.

Q: What kind of trade does India have with Turkiye and Azerbaijan?

A: India's exports to Turkiye stood at USD 5.2 billion during April-February 2024-25 as against USD 6.65 billion in 2023-24. It accounts for only about 1.5 per cent of India's total exports of USD 437 billion. India's exports to Azerbaijan stood at only USD 86.07 million during Apr-Feb 2024-25 as against USD 89.67 million in 2023-24. It



accounts for a meagre 0.02 per cent of India's total outbound shipments.

India's imports from Turkiye were USD 2.84 billion during April-February 2024-25 as against USD 3.78 billion in 2023-24. It accounts for only about 0.5 per cent of India's total imports of USD 720 billion. Imports from Azerbaijan were USD 1.93 million during April-February 2024-25 as against USD 0.74 million in 2023-24. It accounts for a meagre 0.0002 per cent of India's total inbound shipments. India has a trade surplus with both nations.

Q: What are the major products traded between these countries?

A: India's exports to Turkiye include: mineral fuels and oil (USD 960 million in 2023-24), electrical machinery and equipment, auto and its parts, organic chemicals, pharma products, tanning and dyeing items, plastic,

rubber, cotton, man-made fibres and filaments, iron and steel.

IMPORTS: Different types of marbles (blocks and slabs); fresh apples (about USD 10 million), gold, vegetables, lime and cement; mineral oil (USD 1.81 billion in 2023-24); chemicals; natural or cultured pearls; iron and steel.

A bilateral trade agreement was signed in 1973, followed by a pact on setting up an India-Turkiye Joint Commission on Economic and Technical Co-operation in 1983.

India's exports to Azerbaijan: tobacco and its products (USD 28.67 million in 2023-24), tea, coffee, cereals, chemicals, plastic, rubber, paper and paper board, and ceramic products.

Imports include Animal fodder, organic chemicals, essential oils and perfumery, and raw hides and skins and leather (USD 1.52 million during Apr-Feb 2024-25). In 2023, India was the third-largest destination for Azerbaijan's crude oil.

Modi chairs Cabinet Security panel meet

He was joined by Defence Minister Rajnath Singh and Home Minister Amit Shah in the meeting, where they discussed the current situation and India's preparedness. The Prime Minister later chaired a meeting of the Union Cabinet.

Asked about ministers lauding the prime minister during the cabinet meeting, Union Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said, "Operation Sindoor was an example of India's pride, the role of armed forces and the decisive leadership, besides the new doctrine. This is very commendable for the country." In his first address to the nation after Operation Sindoor Monday, Prime Minister

Op Sindoor still underway: BJP

NEW DELHI: Slamming the Congress and other opposition parties, the BJP Wednesday asserted that Operation Sindoor is still going on and it has been stopped only temporarily, asking them to refrain from raising "unnecessary and unwanted" questions on the issue. Talking to reporters, BJP national spokesperson Sudhanshu Trivedi said the government has not used the word "ceasefire" anywhere and clearly stated that the solution to the issue of Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK) can be resolved through bilateral talk between India and Pakistan.

Narendra Modi sternly warned Pakistan that India will not succumb to nuclear blackmail and sent a clear message to the world: terror and trade, terror and talks cannot go together.

"Operation Sindoor is India's new policy against terrorism and our unwavering pledge for justice. It is the new normal. We have only kept in abeyance our operations against Pakistan and the future will depend on their behaviour," Modi said in the 22-minute address.

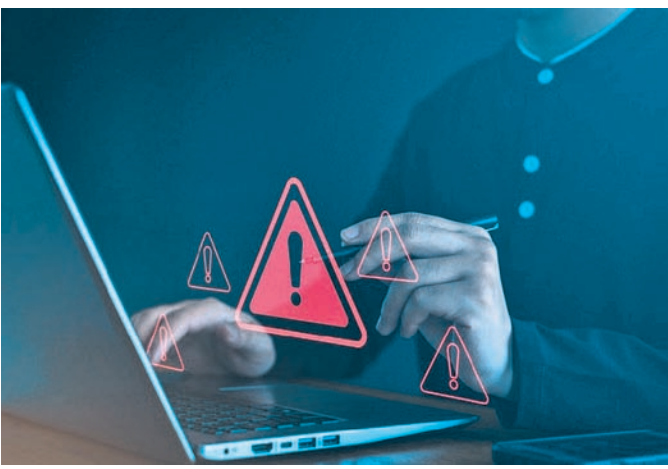
India battled drone swarms, misinformation during conflict

New Delhi, May 14: During a four-day intense military confrontation, the Indian armed forces neutralised swarms of Pakistani drones and countered a coordinated campaign of cyberattacks and misinformation, underscoring the evolving nature of modern warfare.

Ahead of India's precision strikes under Operation Sindoor May 7, targeting nine terror camps in Pakistan-Occupied Kashmir and Pakistan, multiple Indian websites came under cyberattack. The digital offensive began shortly after the April Pahalgam terror attack in Jammu and Kashmir. The website of the Army Nursing College in Jalandhar was hacked and defaced with inflammatory content. At least four Army Public Schools, including APS Nagrota and APS Sunjuwan, were also targeted by hackers.

In tandem with these intrusions, a wave of misinformation



was unleashed across social media platforms, intensifying post-Operation Sindoor and amid Pakistan's military retaliation. False claims were made to discredit the Indian armed forces, including attempts to portray India as the aggressor against its own cities. Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri dismissed these claims as "preposterous," citing a false narrative

about Indian forces allegedly attacking cities like Amritsar and even the Nankana Sahib Gurdwara. "That we would attack our own cities is the kind of deranged fantasy that only the Pakistani State can come up with," he said during a press briefing May 9.

On May 8 at 8 p.m., multiple Pakistani unmanned aerial systems targeted Indian Air

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Force (IAF) bases in Jammu, Udhampur, Pathankot, Amritsar, Bathinda, Nal, Dalhousie, Thoise, Jaisalmer, Uttarlai, Phalodi, and Naliya. The drone assaults came in waves but were intercepted and neutralised by India's well-prepared air defence systems, including the Barak-8, S-400 Triumph, Akash missiles, and indigenous anti-drone technology. "All these waves were neutralised by our trained crew. There was no damage on the ground," confirmed Air Marshal AK Bharti May 11.

Simultaneously, Indian cyber

teams and intelligence units worked around the clock to dismantle the misinformation network. The Press Information Bureau's Fact Check Unit debunked several fake claims, such as the alleged removal of Northern Command chief Lt Gen MV Suchindra Kumar after the Pahalgam attack.

Defence analysts highlighted how information warfare has become integral to modern conflict. "Even false information can serve as a weapon to demoralise the adversary," noted an expert from the Manohar Parrikar Institute for Defence

Studies and Analyses.

As attacks escalated online, India enhanced its cybersecurity posture. Defence sources confirmed that appropriate measures were taken to strengthen digital defences and improve the resilience of online platforms against further incursions. Agencies continue to actively monitor cyberspace, especially for threats with alleged cross-border links.

The Headquarters Integrated Defence Staff declared the success of Operation Sindoor as a milestone in India-Pakistan relations, demonstrating military dominance and technological prowess across both kinetic and non-kinetic domains—including space, cyber, and electronic warfare.

Though both sides have since agreed to cease hostilities, Indian forces remain on high alert. With vigilance in both airspace and cyberspace, India has signalled its preparedness for any future misadventure.

India had 'clear edge' in strikes on Pakistan military facilities: NYT

New York, May 14: India appears to have had a "clear edge" in targeting Pakistan's military facilities and airfields during the recent four-day confrontation, the New York Times reported, citing satellite imagery. High-resolution satellite imagery, from before and after the strikes, shows "clear damage" to Pakistan's facilities by Indian attacks, according to the report.

"The four-day military clash between India and Pakistan was the most expansive fighting in half a century between the two nuclear-armed countries. As both sides used drones and missiles to test each other's air defences and hit military facilities, they claimed to inflict severe damage," the report said. It added that satellite imagery indicates that while the attacks were widespread, the damage was far more contained than claimed — "and appeared mostly inflicted by India on Pakistani facilities."

In the new age of high-tech warfare, the report said that strikes by both sides, verified by the imagery, appeared to be precisely targeted. "Where India appears to have had a clear edge is in its targeting of Pakistan's military facilities and airfields, as the latter stretch of fighting shifted from symbolic strikes and shows of force to attacks on each other's defence capabilities," the report said.

At Bholari air base, located less than 100 miles from the Pakistani port city of Karachi, India's defence officials said they had struck an aircraft hangar with a precision attack.

Further, the Nur Khan air base, within a roughly 15-mile range of both the Pakistani Army's headquarters and the office of the country's prime minister and a short distance from the unit that oversees and protects Pakistan's nuclear arsenal, was "perhaps the most sensitive military target that India struck."

The Indian military said it had particularly targeted the runways and other facilities at some of Pakistan's key air bases and "satellite images showed the damage", the report said, noting that May 10, Pakistan issued a notice for the Rahim Yar Khan air base saying that the runway was not operational.

Indian-origin student dies in Bahamas

New York: An Indian-origin college student from the US died in the Bahamas after accidentally falling from a hotel balcony just days before he was set to graduate. Gaurav Jaisingh was a student at Bentley University, Waltham, Massachusetts and was in the Bahamas for an annual senior class trip when he died in the accident Sunday. Jaisingh was set to graduate later this week. Bentley University said in a post on X that “it’s been a difficult few days and our community is feeling the emotional toll of the tragic loss of Gaurav Jaisingh’ 25. Our hearts go out to Gaurav’s family and friends. We plan to honour Gaurav at the undergraduate commencement ceremony,” scheduled for May 17.

Russia jails election watchdog head

London: The head of Russia’s only independent election watchdog was sentenced Wednesday to five years in a penal colony after being found guilty of working with an “undesirable organization”. Grigory Melkonyants, co-chair of the Golos movement, was arrested in August 2023. He pleaded not guilty at his trial. Human rights campaigners say the case against the 44-year-old is part of a wider crackdown on civil society that has intensified since Russia’s full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022.

Canada PM slams UK Trump invite

London: Canadian Prime Minister Mark Carney has criticised Britain’s invitation to Donald Trump for a second state visit, saying it undermined his government’s effort to project a united front against the US president’s talk of annexing Canada. Since taking office in January, Trump has repeatedly said he wants Canada to become the 51st US state, a suggestion that has angered Canadians and left Britain trying to tread a fine line between the two North American countries.

Fire breaks out at chemicals warehouse

Alcala De Guadaira: A fire broke out Wednesday at a warehouse for chemical product distribution near Seville in southern Spain, sending a plume of dark smoke billowing from the site as authorities asked residents to remain indoors. A spokesperson for the regional emergency services told Reuters they had received hundreds of calls - starting at around 1:20 pm - alerting them to the fire at the La Red industrial park.

Karachi/Islamabad, May 14: The International Monetary Fund has disbursed a second tranche of \$1.023 billion under the Extended Fund Facility programme for Pakistan, the central bank said Wednesday. The disbursement of the second tranche comes on a day when the International Monetary Fund (IMF) is holding virtual discussions on Pakistan’s upcoming budget as the visit of its mission to Islamabad was delayed due to security concerns in the region.

With the transfer, the total disbursements stand at approximately \$2.1 billion under the IMF’s Extended Fund Facility (EFF) of \$7 billion, which was signed between Pakistan and the global lender last year.

The federal government is planning to unveil the budget for fiscal 2025-26 June 2. The IMF talks will continue until May 16.

The Central bank said the second tranche amount would be reflected in its foreign exchange reserves for the week ending May 16.

The amount was approved last week by the IMF board under the ongoing Extended Fund Facility (EFF) and allowed an additional arrangement for the \$1.4 billion Resilience and Sustainability Facility (RSF).

The RSF is intended to support countries facing climate vulnerabilities and natural di-



B'desh to receive \$1.3bn from IMF

DHAKA: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) is set to release \$1.3 billion to Bangladesh in June, after completing a fourth review of its \$4.7-billion loan programme and a key breakthrough in talks on exchange rate reforms, the finance ministry said. The funds, covering both the fourth and fifth tranches, had been held up as the IMF pressed for greater exchange rate flexibility, particularly the adoption of a crawling peg mechanism. The fourth review in Dhaka in April was followed by further discussions during the Bank-Fund Spring Meetings in Washington DC that month, focused on critical reforms in revenue management, fiscal policy, and the foreign exchange regime. “After carefully reviewing all the issues ... both parties have agreed on the revenue management, currency exchange rate and other reform frameworks,” the finance ministry said in a statement Wednesday. With completion of a staff-level agreement on the fourth review, the IMF is expected to release \$1.3 billion set for the fourth and fifth installments together by June, it added.

Pakistan is heavily dependent on the IMF bailout package which helped to shore up its dwindling reserves. The country got backing of the fund at a critical time last year when it was on the verge of bankruptcy and was saved by the lender by providing \$3 billion on a short term basis. According to the details on

the IMF website, Pakistan has received at least 25 bailout loans since becoming members of the fund. Interestingly, different governments announced to say goodbye to the IMF but so far failed to fulfil the promise.

The decision to release the funds came after the IMF expressed satisfaction on the first review of Pakistan’s economic reform programme supported by the EFF Arrangement, the bank said.

Kim supervises special operations' drills

Seoul, May 14: North Korean leader Kim Jong-un has supervised combined tactical drills of special operations, stressing that the most “crucial” task for the North’s armed forces is to make full preparations for war, state media reported Wednesday. The combined tactical drills of special operations and tank subunits’ joint fire strike demonstration took place the previous day, Yonhap news agency reported quoting the Korean Central News Agency (KCNA). “Saying that our revolutionary armed forces are now in charge of not a few fronts, but the most important among them is the anti-imperialist class front and making full preparations for war is the most crucial task,” Kim was quoted as saying by the KCNA.

Indian heritage Anita Anand becomes Canada's foreign min

OTTAWA: Indo-Canadians Anita Anand and Maninder Sidhu have landed important portfolios in the new cabinet announced by Prime Minister Mark Carney after reshuffle. While Anand was appointed as the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Sidhu is the new Minister for International Trade in the new cabinet announced Tuesday. Carney announced the reshuffle almost two weeks after his Liberal Party won the federal elections in Canada. He had replaced Justin Trudeau months ahead of the elections. Anand, 58, was the Minister of Innovation, Science and Industry before the polls and in the past has served in the roles including of defence minister. She replaced Melanie Joly, who is now the Minister of Industry.

Japan grounds military training jets after crash leaves 2 missing



Tokyo: Japan grounded most of its aging military training aircraft Wednesday after one of the planes crashed minutes after take off. Two crew are missing after the T-4 training aircraft operated by the Japan Air Self-Defence Force crashed after taking off from Komaki Air Base, in the central Japanese prefecture of Aichi, officials said. The force said the plane was lost from radar two minutes after departure. The authorities are searching for the missing aircraft and its crew in an area near a reservoir known as the Iruka pond, officials said. The reservoir, in the city of Inuyama, is about 10 kilometres northeast of the air base. The military has grounded temporarily nearly 200 T-4s until the cause of the accident is identified and safety checks and training are carried out, Hiroaki Uchikura, the air force chief of staff, told a news conference late Wednesday. The crashed plane was a 36-year-old T-4 operated out of Nyutabaru Air Base, in the southern prefecture of Miyazaki. It was not fitted with a voice recorder or a flight data recorder.

Israel intensifies Gaza bombardment

Cairo, May 14: Israeli military strikes killed at least 70 Palestinians across the Gaza Strip Wednesday, local health authorities said, in an intensification of the bombardment as US President Donald Trump visits the Middle East.

Medics said most of the dead, including women and children, were killed in a barrage of Israeli airstrikes on houses in the Jabalia area of northern Gaza. “Some victims are still on the road and under the rubble where rescue and civil emergency teams can’t reach (them),” the health ministry statement said.

Israel’s military had no immediate comment. It said it was trying to verify the reports.

Reuters television footage showed residents returning to

the ruins of their homes. Some sifted through the remains of walls and furniture, looking for documents and belongings.

“They fired two rockets, they told us the house of Mogbel (had been hit),” said Hadi Mogbel, who lost relatives in the attack in Jabalia. “We came running, we saw body parts on the ground, children killed, the woman killed and a baby killed - his head was exploded like a flower. He was two months old.”

Israeli press reports Wednesday cited security officials as saying they believed Hamas military leader Mohammad Sinwar and other senior officials had been killed in a strike Tuesday on what the Israeli military described as a command and control bunker under the European Hospital in the southern Gaza city of Khan Younis.

Balochs declare ‘Balochistan is not Pakistan’

Quetta, May 14: As several individuals continue to be forcibly disappeared across multiple districts of Balochistan province, several Baloch activists all over the world have renewed their call to pressurise Pakistan to immediately end its repressive policies in the province.

“Baloch people across Pakistan-occupied Balochistan (PoB) are up on streets and this is their national verdict that Balochistan is not Pakistan and world can’t be a silent spectator anymore,” Mir Yar Baloch, a Baloch human rights activist posted on X Wednesday afternoon.

Paank - the Baloch National Movement’s Human Rights Department - has also strongly condemned the continuing policy of enforced disappearances carried out by Pakistani security forces and intelligence agencies in Balochistan.

Revealing a series of incidents between April and May, it stated that five more individuals were forcibly disappeared across multiple districts of Balochistan, reflecting a persistent climate of fear, impunity, and state repression in the province.



“On April 14, 2025, Shah Jan, son of Qadir Dad, a driver by profession and resident of Absar Bunday Kalat in Turbat, was forcibly disappeared by military intelligence operatives from the Yaqoob Mohla Absar area in Turbat city, Kech district. TRUMP MEETS SYRIAN PREZ

Doha, May 14: US President Donald Trump met with Syria’s president in Saudi Arabia Wednesday and urged him to normalise ties with longtime foe Israel, after a surprise US announcement that it would lift all sanctions on the Islamist-led government.

Trump met Syria’s Ahmed al-Sharaa, who once pledged allegiance to al Qaeda and swept to power at the head of a group that Washington has called a terrorist organisation, before a summit between the United States and Gulf Arab countries.

He urged Sharaa to join the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and Morocco, which normalised relations with Israel under the US-brokered Abraham Accords in 2020, the White House press secretary posted on X.

Trump said he thought Syria would join at some point, according to a Washington Post pool report.

“I think they have to get themselves straightened out. I told him, ‘I hope you’re going to join when it’s straightened out.’ He said, ‘Yes.’ But they have a lot of work to do,” said Trump.

Photos posted on Saudi state television showed them shaking hands in the presence of Saudi Arabia’s Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman, also known as MbS.

Trump’s Middle East trip has fuelled doubts in Israel about where the country stands in Washington’s priorities.

The US exploring the possibility of normalising ties with Syria, one of Israel’s biggest longstanding foes, and holding nuclear talks with its other en-

emy Iran has sidelined Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and his far-right allies in the government.

Israel considers Iran’s nuclear program “an existential threat” and does not trust Syria’s new Islamist president.

Despite concerns within sectors of his own administration over Syria’s leaders’ former ties to al Qaeda, Trump said Tuesday he would lift sanctions on Syria in a major policy shift.

Israeli remains deeply suspicious of Sharaa’s administration and Israeli officials have continued to describe Sharaa as a jihadist, though he severed ties with al Qaeda in 2016. The Israeli prime minister’s office did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Trump, who said his Gulf region trip does not sideline Israel, told reporters the fact he has relationships with countries in the Middle East is “very good for Israel”.

He said the meeting with Sharaa, who he described as a young, attractive guy with a very strong past, was ‘great’.

“He’s got a real shot at holding it together,” said Trump.

Sharaa was for years the leader of al Qaeda’s official wing in the Syrian conflict.

He first joined the group in Iraq, where he spent five years in a US prison. The United States removed a \$10 million bounty on his head in December.

The US also hopes regional heavyweight Saudi Arabia will join the Abraham Accords, but discussions came to a halt after the Gaza war erupted and the kingdom insists there can be no normalisation without Palestinian statehood.

“Victims are often taken without any legal procedure, warrant, or due process, and families are left in anguish with no information on their loved ones’ whereabouts or well-being,” it pointed out.

Paank also called on international human rights organisations, including the United Nations Working Group on Enforced or Involuntary Disappearances and the broader international community, to pressurise Pakistan to immediately release all forcibly disappeared persons and end its repressive policies in Balochistan.

“The practice of enforced disappearances must be recognised as a crime against humanity, and perpetrators must be held accountable under international law,” the human rights agency stated.

WPI inflation dips to 13-month low

Marginal decrease in WPI inflation generally seen positive, especially if it's driven by factors like increased supply or reduced demand rather than a decrease in economic activity. However, expert predicts more cut in future

New Delhi, May 14: Wholesale price inflation dropped to a 13-month low of 0.85 per cent in April with softening in prices of food articles, fuel and manufactured products, with experts projecting further easing in the data of next month, government data showed Wednesday. WPI-based inflation was 2.05 per cent in March. It was 1.19 per cent in April last year. "Positive rate of inflation in April, 2025 is primarily due to an increase in prices of manufacture of food products, other

manufacturing, chemicals and chemical products, manufacture of other transport equipment and manufacture of machinery and equipment, etc," the industry ministry said in a statement.

As per the WPI (Wholesale price index) data, deflation in food, and fuel and power WPI, along with disinflation in manufactured products drove the moderation. Food articles saw a deflation of 0.86 per cent in April, against an inflation of 1.57 per cent in March. Deflation in vegetables was 18.26 per cent during April compared to deflation of 15.88 per cent in March.

In onion, inflation eased to 0.20 per cent in April, as against 26.65 per cent in March. Inflation in fruits softened to 8.38 per cent, from 20.78 per cent in the previous month. Potato and pulses saw a deflation of 24.30 per cent and 5.57 per cent, respectively.

"Favourable base effects to keep WPI inflation low in coming months," Barclays said in a research note.



Deflation in fuel and power was 2.18 per cent in April, compared to a 0.20 per cent inflation in March.

"Sharp sequential decline in prices of mineral oils such as kerosene (which was also reflected in consumer prices) and ATF and motor fuels, drove this fall," Barclays said.

Cabinet sanctions HCL-Foxconn semiconductor joint venture

New Delhi, May 14: The Union Cabinet Wednesday approved ₹3,706 crore semiconductor plant at Jewar in Uttar Pradesh, to be set up by the HCL-Foxconn joint venture to manufacture display driver chips for mobile phones, laptops, and automobiles.

The plant will have the capacity to handle 20,000 wafers per month, and 3.6 crore chips will be produced per month, Information and Broadcasting Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said while briefing the media on the Cabinet decision. The minister also said that the plant will make driver chips for displays used in mobile phones, laptops, automobiles, and other devices.

"The Cabinet has approved a sixth semiconductor plant that will be set up in Jewar, Uttar Pradesh. It is a joint venture between HCL and Foxconn to manufacture display driver chips. These chips control the quality and format of the content displayed on screen. It is a very advanced technology that is being set up," Vaishnaw said. Foxconn is the biggest manufacturer of electronic products, including Apple's iPhone.

"What we understand is that once this unit is there, then the display panel plant will also come to India. This will meet 40 per cent of India's capacity. It is a large plant. It will also meet the requirements of Foxconn for the rest of the world," Vaishnaw said

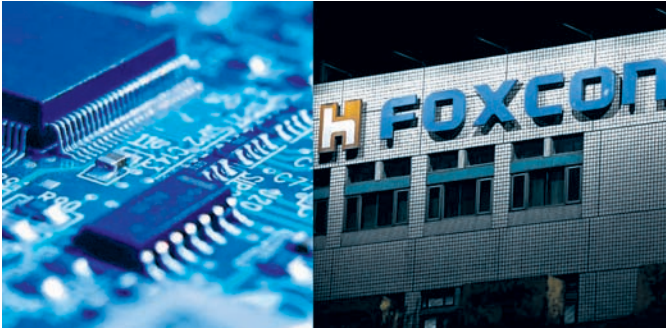

Mumbai, May 14: Equity benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty ended higher Wednesday due to selective buying support amid easing inflation and positive global cues.

"Markets were choppy in intra-day trade but managed to end in the green on selective buying support as investors don't want to rush into equities after Monday's strong optimism. While foreign fund flows in the domestic market will be critical going ahead, investors are worried that the US-China settling tariff disputes could revive foreign investors' interest in Chinese markets again," Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said.

Tata Steel emerged as the biggest winner, rising 3.88 per cent, followed by Eternal, Tech Mahindra, Maruti, Mahindra & Mahindra, Infosys, IndusInd Bank, HCL Tech, Tata Consultancy Services and Bharti Airtel were the major gainers.

Telecom operator Bharti Airtel climbed nearly 1 per cent after it posted about a five-fold jump in consolidated net profit to ₹11,022 crore in the March 2025 quarter, mainly due to the tariff hike impact and one-time gain on tax benefits.

However, Asian Paints, Tata Motors, Kotak Mahindra Bank, NTPC, and Power Grid were among the laggards. Tata Motors dipped over 1 per cent after

Indian cos commit nearly \$6mn in Azerbaijan, Turkey

New Delhi, May 14: Four Indian entities committed foreign direct investments worth nearly \$6 million in Azerbaijan and Turkey, accounting for a small part of the total \$6.8 billion overseas investments proposed by Indian companies in April, according to the latest Reserve Bank data.

Axiro semiconductor pvt ltd has committed funds in Turkey's manufacturing space through a wholly-owned subsidiary. Together, the three entities' total commitment is around \$0.28 million. The data showed that Project Aslan has committed an amount of \$5.6 million in Azerbaijan's agriculture and mining sectors.

On the contrary, companies like Tata communications ltd has committed \$1.12 billion, including a guarantee of little over \$1 billion and equity of \$88.77 million, in the Netherlands. JSW Neo Energy's financial commitment stood at \$720.6 million through its

SEBI awares investors as Strata exits SM REIT framework

New Delhi, May 14: Security Exchange Board of India (SEBI) Wednesday cautioned investors against dealing with Strata Small and Medium Real Estate Investment Trust (SM REIT) as it is no longer a regulated intermediary. The decision came after the markets regulator reviewed certain legal proceedings against the promoter of SEBI registered, SM REIT

The regulator said it had engaged with Strata SM REIT, its independent director, compliance and other officers and the trustee. Based on the engagement and discussions there at, Strata SM REIT has surrendered its certificate of registration as an SM REIT and will not hold out or represent itself as a SEBI-regulated intermediary, the regulator said in a statement.

Strata had registered as an SM REIT, a new asset class introduced by SEBI as a sub-class within the REIT framework for assets valued between ₹50-500 crore. Similar to REITs, SM REIT units are required to be listed on stock exchanges but with a minimum lot size of 1 unit of ₹10 lakh. Under the framework, SM REITs are not permitted to invest in under-construction assets or land and must distribute 95 per cent of earnings as distributions to unit holders.

IPL revises replacement rules

THE DECISION WAS TAKEN CONSIDERING NON-AVAILABILITY OF A FEW FOREIGN PLAYERS

New Delhi, May 14: The Indian Premier League Wednesday allowed teams to make temporary replacements in their squad for the remainder of the tournament considering the non-availability of a few foreign players owing to the forced re-scheduling of the event.

IPL had to be suspended last week due to the India-Pakistan military conflict but the announcement of the ceasefire paved the way for its resumption May 17.

As per the original schedule, the IPL final was to be held May 25 but now it will take place June 3, making it trickier for the players who had to report for national duty.

While a few players are not returning due to personal reasons, the likes of Jamie Overton, representing CSK this season, will stay back in the UK for the white-ball series against the West Indies at home.

In an email to franchises which was accessed by PTI, IPL informed the teams of the temporary replacement player option. "... in the current situation, where we had to temporarily suspend IPL 2025, resulting in its completion beyond the earlier set-out date of May 25, 2025, we have reassessed the Replacement Player provisions.

"Given the non-availability of certain foreign players due to national commitments or personal reasons or any injury or illness, Temporary Replacement Players will be allowed until the conclusion of this tournament.

"This decision is subject to the condition that the Temporary Replacement players taken from this point forward will not be eligible for retention in the following year," IPL said in its note.

lations 2025-27, players can be replaced if they are injured or ill, provided the injury or illness occurs during or before the 12th league match of the relevant team in that season.

"Temporary Replacement players will have to register for the IPL Player Auction 2026. The replacements which were approved or taken before the suspended period will be eligible for retention ahead of 2026 player auction," the note added.

The rescheduling is likely to impact the preparation of South Africa and Australia for the World Test Championship final beginning at Lord's June 11.

WTC Final-bound SA players may miss IPL

Johannesburg: South African players who have been picked for the World Test Championship Final against Australia are likely to miss the IPL playoffs as the country's cricket board is standing firm on prioritising national duty over league commitments. The BCCI confirmed Monday that the IPL will resume May 17 with the final slated for June 3. However, the revised schedule has left players from WTC finalists Australia and South Africa in a tight spot. The franchises and the BCCI have urged foreign boards to make their players available for the remainder of the tournament. CSA, however, has reiterated its commitment to WTC Final preparations. "It is an individual decision, obviously, to return or to play or continue," CSA's director of national teams and high performance Enoch Nkwe said during press conference. "One thing we've made clear, and we are finalising this with the IPL and the BCCI, is sticking to our original plan when it comes to the WTC preparations." "May 26 is the latest for the Test guys to come back. The original plans don't change because the No 1 priority is the WTC final. We've been engaging with them over the last day or two to make sure we're all on the same page," he added. Eight South African players -- Kagiso Rabada (Gujarat Titans), Lungi Ngidi (Royal Challengers Bengaluru), Tristan Stubbs (Delhi Capitals), Aiden Markram (Lucknow Super Giants), Ryan Rickelton (Mumbai Indians), Corbin Bosch (MI), Marco Jansen (Punjab Kings) and Wiaan Mulder (Sunrisers Hyderabad) -- have been named in the Proteas squad for the WTC Final, scheduled to start from June 11 in London.

Mustafizur, who made his IPL debut in 2016, previously represented the Delhi Capitals during the 2022 and 2023 seasons. Chopra became India's most successful individual Olympian after he claimed a silver medal at the 2024 Paris Olympics in the javelin throw, marking his second medal at the Games after his historic gold in the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

Chopra became the first Indian track and field athlete to win a gold medal in Tokyo. He ended his 2024 season with a second-place finish in the prestigious Diamond League Final in Brussels.

Neeraj was earlier enrolled as a Junior Commissioned Officer in the rank of Naib Subedar in the Indian Army August 26, 2016, before being promoted to Subedar in 2021 after his heroics in Tokyo.

Like the gold medalist, there are a few more individual medalists at the quadrennial Games who hold ranks in the Indian Army. Abhinav Bindra, who made history in the Beijing 2008 Olympics by becoming the first Indian to win an individual gold medal, was also conferred with the honour of being a Lt. Colonel, and shooter Vijay Kumar was made an honorary Captain after winning a silver medal in 2012.

One of the most famous athletes to receive the honour has been Mahendra Singh Dhoni. After guiding India to major tournament victories, including the 2007 T20 World Cup and 2011 ODI World Cup, he was awarded the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the Territorial Army in 2011.

India to host inaugural Tennis Cricket Ball World Cup and Asia Cup

New Delhi, May 14: Tennis cricket, a backyard sport that has long been synonymous with India's passion for the game, is set to receive international legitimacy with the launch of the first-ever Tennis Cricket Ball World Cup and Asia Cup, both scheduled to be hosted in India.

This marks a historic moment as tennis ball cricket steps onto the global stage with official international and continental tournaments.

Recognizing the sport's rapid grassroots growth in India, the International Tennis Cricket Federation (ITCF) has thrown its weight behind the initiative.

The decision comes after observing the popularity and scale of domestic tennis ball cricket tournaments across the country, culminating in a new structured league format known as the Dream League of India — a competition that will now serve as the official selection platform for India's squads in both global events.

Players participating in the Dream League will have the opportunity to represent India in both the World Cup and the Asia Cup.

The league will be held across the country, ensuring widespread participation and the scouting of hidden talent from even the most remote corners. Over 1,500 certified coaches will supervise the open, fair trials conducted in various districts and centres, where junior (ages 13-18) and senior (18+) players can showcase their skills.

The league is designed with two distinct categories: juniors and seniors, each comprising six competitive franchises. Following nationwide trials, 860 players from each category will be shortlisted for the league auction, where teams will select their squads. Top performers will not only be under the radar of ITCF selectors but will also compete for a place in India's tennis cricket squad on the international stage.
