CM launches e-registration mobile app by Revenue dept

Bhubaneswar, June 25: Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi Wednesday launched an e-registration mobile application developed by the Revenue department.

While launching the app, the Chief Minister described it as a significant milestone in the state government’s efforts to deliver digital public services.

The app, Majhi said, allows users to book slots, obtain certified copies, and access encumbrance certificates (EC) for registration deeds—all from the convenience of their Android mobile phones.

The Chief Minister said that users can also check the benchmark value of land and access complete information about the respective Sub-Registrar’s office through the app.

He noted that the new system has become fully paperless and cashless, significantly reducing unnecessary crowding at Sub-Registrar offices.

Highlighting the achievements of the Revenue department, the Chief Minister stated that this year, under the Vasundhara Yojana, the government has provided housing leases to 16,727 homeless individuals.

In the past year, permanent land leases have been issued in the names of 20,385 government institutions, including primary schools, upper primary schools, high schools, and colleges.

Additionally, through a special campaign, 4,61,602 land accounts have been surveyed, and the names of 1,16,486 deceased persons have been officially recorded in favour of their legal heirs.

Majhi also unveiled a booklet published by the Revenue department, which documents the department’s achievements over the past year. He said it reflects a responsible administrative system marked by efficiency and citizen-centric governance.

Woman gangraped in Mayurbhanj dist

Karanjia, June 25: A woman was allegedly abducted and gangraped by four persons at a roadside dhaba under this police limits in Mayurbhanj district Tuesday night, police said Wednesday.

Acting on a complaint lodged by the survivor’s kin, police registered a case (219/25) and detained an accused. The rest three accused are absconding after committing the crime, police said.

The incident occurred at a time when the woman had come on a visit to her maternal uncle’s house under this police limits.

Sources said she was returning to her maternal uncle’s house after visiting a temple at around 4.30pm Tuesday. She was on her way back when the youths on a bike spotted her alone near a cashew forest and abducted her on the vehicle. They took her to a roadside dhaba in the area and took turns to rape her.

The woman managed to return home after much effort and narrated her ordeal before the family members. Shocked kin lodged a complaint at the Karanjia police station at 2.30am, the same day. This incident comes within 10 days of the alleged gangrape of a college student at Gopalpur sea beach in Ganjam district.

Class X board twice a year from 2026: CBSE

First phase mandatory, second optional; best score to be retained if opted

- ◆ Internal assessment to be conducted only once
- ◆ First phase results in April, second phase in June
- ◆ No separate supplementary exams will be conducted
- ◆ If a student does not appear for at least three subjects in the first exam, he or she will not be allowed to appear for the second exam



ommended in the new National Education Policy (NEP).

“The first phase will be conducted in February and second in May. The results for the two phases will be announced in April and June, respectively,” CBSE Examination Controller Sanyam Bhardwaj said.

“It will be mandatory (for students) to appear for the first phase while the second phase will be optional. Students will be allowed to improve their performance in any three subjects out of science, mathematics, social science and languages,” he added.

Explaining the rationale behind making the first phase mandatory for the students, CBSE Chairman Rahul Singh said it is being done to ensure that students take the exams seriously and the sanctity of the board exams is maintained.

“If a student does not appear for three or more subjects in the first examination, he or she will

not be allowed to appear for the second exam. Such students will be placed in the ‘Essential Repeat’ category and can take the examination only next year in the main exam in February,” he said.

“Students whose result in the first examination is compartment will be allowed to appear in the second examination under the compartment category. Additional subjects will not be permitted after passing Class X, students will not be allowed in stand-alone subjects,” he added.

According to the approved norms, Class X students from winter-bound schools will get an option to appear for the board exams in any of the two phases. Similarly, sports students will be allowed to appear in the second phase in subjects which coincide with their sports events.

The internal assessment will be conducted only once during the academic session. The CBSE announced the draft norms in February, which were put in the public domain for stakeholders’ feedback, including from schools, teachers, parents, students and the public.

The Board has clarified that no separate supplementary exams will be conducted under this system.

HC flays ‘bulldozer justice’

In a strong judicial retaliation against unlawful ‘bulldozer action’, the Orissa High Court has ordered the state govt to pay ₹10 lakh compensation, out of which ₹2 lakh is to be recovered from the salary of the concerned tehsildar, for illegally demolishing a structure belonging to a community centre

Cuttack, June 25: Expressing deep concern over the bulldozing of a community hall by an officer of tehsildar rank, the Orissa High Court Wednesday ordered the state government to pay ₹10 lakh compensation to the petitioners. In a sharply worded judgment, Justice SK Panigrahi observed that “in a system governed by law, force must follow reason, not precede it. Where the reverse occurs, the legitimacy of State action begins to erode, and with it, the credi-

bility of institutions tasked with upholding the rule of law.”

“The facts of this case echo a growing and troubling pattern, commonly referred to as ‘bulldozer justice’, where executive power, backed by machinery rather than reason, supplants legal process. The use of demolition as a tool of enforcement, absent procedural compliance and judicial finality, transforms what should be a lawful act into a coercive one,” the single-judge bench observed.

The judge warned that such actions, if left unchecked, could set a dangerous precedent, where field-level officers entrusted with significant statutory powers begin to treat judicial timelines as administrative gaps to be tactically exploited.

Holding the demolition to be unlawful, the court awarded ₹10 lakh as compensation to the petitioners. Of this, ₹2 lakh is to be recovered from

the tehsildar concerned, in instalments from his salary, due to his direct involvement in the misconduct. The remaining ₹8 lakh is to be paid by the State within eight weeks of the order’s presentation.

The case pertains to a community hall built on grazing land in Balasore, partly funded by government schemes and used by the public. On December 14, 2024, the hall was demolished by local authorities just a day after the High Court issued a stay order, making the action illegal. The authorities provided no emergency justification for its action.

“The office of the tehsildar is not a mere administrative post—it is a constitutional responsibility, especially in matters involving enforcement at the grassroots level,” the court observed and directed the initiation of departmental proceedings against the revenue officer

Berhampur man falls into open drain, dies

Berhampur, June 25: The menace of open drains has returned to haunt residents here as a 55-year-old man drowned after being swept away in an uncovered drain here, Wednesday.

The deceased was identified as Mahendra Panigrahi of Kharavela Nagar under Nimakhandi police limits in the city. Locals recovered the body near the drain close to MKCG Medical College and Hospital playground under Baidyanathpur police limits.

The incident occurred after the area witnessed torrential rain Wednesday. Passersby spotted the body floating near MKCG Medical College playground and rushed him to the hospital by auto-rickshaw. Police arrived after being informed of the incident.

Photos of the scene went viral on social media, prompting Mahendra’s son Siddhant Panigrahi and other family members to reach the hospital and identify the body. Police said a post-mortem examination will be conducted after the formal inquest.

Family members told police



that Mahendra had left home on his scooter in the afternoon. Due to heavy rain, the roads were flooded, and he may have failed to notice the open drain. Police said an investigation is ongoing to establish the exact location of the accident and recover the scooter.

This is the second such tragedy in the southern city in less than a year. On August 21 last year, a student returning home from tuition on his bicycle fell into an uncovered drain and drowned after losing sight of the road during heavy rain. His body was recovered the next day.

Numerous uncovered drains continue to pose serious hazard across the city, and neither the Works department nor the Berhampur Municipal Corporation (BeMC) has taken adequate measures to address the issue.

What a ride, says Shux, 2nd Indian in space

Shukla is set to become the first Indian astronaut to visit the International Space Station, with the docking of the Dragon spacecraft expected at 4.30pm IST today

New Delhi, June 25: “Kya kamaal ki ride thi (what an amazing ride),” India’s astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla, who goes by the call sign ‘Shux’, remarked as SpaceX’s Dragon spacecraft entered the orbit around the earth within 10 minutes of launch from NASA’s spaceport in Florida.

Shukla, who became the second Indian to travel to space, spoke in chaste Hindi to announce India’s return to

space after a gap of 41 years, and urged everyone to be a part of his journey.

“The Tiranga (Tricolour) on my shoulders tells me that I am not alone and I am with all of you,” the 39-year-old fighter pilot-turned-astronaut said in his first remarks from the earth’s orbit.

“Namaskar, my dear countrymen. What a ride! We have returned to space after a gap of 41 years and what an amazing ride it was (‘kya kamaal ki ride thi’),” he said.

“We are orbiting the earth at a speed of 7.5 km per second. This is not just the beginning of my journey to the International Space Station, but the beginning of India’s human space programme and it is my desire that all the countrymen become a part of this journey,” Shukla said.

“Your chest, too, should swell with pride... Together, let’s embark on this journey of India’s Human Space Programme. Jai Hind! Jai Bharat,” Shukla said.

Shukla scripted history by embarking on a space odyssey

along with three others to the International Space Station as part of a commercial mission by Axiom Space Wednesday, 41 years after astronaut Rakesh Sharma’s 1984 spaceflight on-board a Russian spacecraft.

The Dragon spacecraft – named Grace by the astronauts – is expected to dock at the International Space Station at 4.30pm IST Thursday. The 14-day mission on board the ISS will realise the return to human spaceflight for India, Poland and Hungary.

Trouble mounting for Dosanjh

MUMBAI: The controversy surrounding Diljit Dosanjh and his upcoming film is catching fire at a brisk pace. After slamming the actor-singer, the All Indian Cine Workers Association (AICWA), has now demanded the immediate suspension of all social media accounts of him in India.

In a letter addressed to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, AICWA has also demanded removal of all his songs and movies from platforms like YouTube, Spotify, JioSaavn & OTT platforms, permanent ban on his live concerts and public performances across India.

The association has al-

so called for full investigation into the funding of *Sardaar Ji 3*, and nationwide ban on its release. They have also appealed to the Chairman of CBFC (Central Board of Film Certification) to reject certification of all future films involving Dosanjh and to boycott him completely from Indian cinema.







Ex-banker gets 2-yr RI for ₹85L fraud

Bhubaneswar, June 25: A court in Kendrapara district Wednesday sentenced a former cashier of a nationalised bank's Singiri branch under Aul police station to two years of rigorous imprisonment (RI) for embezzling ₹85 lakh of the deposit money in the bank.

Abhiram Mallick, in his capacity as cashier, resorted to fraudulent practice and embezzled around ₹85 lakh deposited money from the account holders. The investigation by the local police found that the accused carried out multiple unauthorised transfers to siphon off the amount, by debiting funds from the accounts. Pronouncing the verdict, the judge Deban Satyadarshi Nanda convicted the accused to two-year RI under Sections 406, 467 and 471 of IPC after relying on the evidence of six witnesses, said Brundaban Nanda, the public prosecutor.

BHARTIYA RAIL: AT THE SERVICE OF RATH YATRA PILGRIMS

The holy city, the abode of Mahaprabhu, Jagannath Puri, is ready for the Rath Yatra.

It is a journey of faith for the millions of devotees coming from across the globe. And Bhartiya Rail is at the service of these pilgrims, facilitating their overall experience in the Shreekshetra Puri.

Last 11 years have been historic for Odisha's railway

infrastructure development. Under PM Shri Narendra Modi's Purvodaya policy, Odisha's railway budget allocation has seen a twelve-time jump to over ₹10,500 crore in 2025-26 as compared to the annual average during 2009-14. Since 2014, over 2,100 km of new tracks have been laid in Odisha - more than the entire rail network of Malaysia.

Approximately ₹73,000 crore worth of projects for constructing new tracks in Odisha are ongoing. 59 Amrit stations are being developed, including 16 stations in aspirational districts. 6 Vande Bharat services covering 17 districts are operational.

The most special contribution of Indian Railways to Odisha is during the Rath Yatra. The railways undertakes the task of serving lakhs of Rath Yatra pilgrims every year.

Ease of travel for the pilgrims

There has been a four-time jump in the Rath Yatra special trains over the last 11 years. A total of 1,215 train services - 850 regular and 365 special train services - are being provided this year for Jagannath Puri. These services connect many districts of Odisha including aspirational districts of Kalahandi, Bolangir, Nuapada, Koraput, Rayagada, Gajapati and Dhenkanal and interior tribal regions to Shreekshetra Puri. An AI-based real-time demand prediction system has enabled dynamic scheduling. 10 platforms are welcoming the pilgrims this year. Additional ticket counters have also been set up at Puri as well as other railway stations.

A comfortable visit for a divine experience

With the spirit of Seva Par-

amo Dharma, Bhartiya Rail ensures dignity, comfort, and security of the pilgrims during the Rath Yatra. This year marks one of the largest facilitation drives for inclusive pilgrimage travel.

Railways is ready to cater to around 20 lakh passengers with a daily peak of 2 lakh. A holding space with a capacity to accommodate 25,000 pilgrims has been designated. Adequate arrangements have been made to provide relief from the hot weather. Sufficient food stalls, water booths and coolers have been arranged. An estimated 2.5 lakh free meals will be served to the pilgrims.

Sanitation and cleanliness arrangements including modern jet cleaning machines and sewage suction trucks are also in place. A much larger pool of security personnel have been deployed for ensuring safety

and security of the pilgrims. They will be supported with CCTVs, drones, and face recognition systems. Accessibility needs of Divyangjans, elderly, women, and medically-vulnerable pilgrims have also been taken care of. Medical booths with doctors and paramedics, ambulances, and first-aid counters have been set up. This year, Indian Railways has converted Puri station into a model of inclusive and faith-centred public service.

Special railway jacks for a special cause

A team of Indian Railways including engineers and technicians is also deployed at the Rath Yatra. This team is responsible for ensuring smooth movement and repair work of the chariots during the Yatra. The team assists in transporting the massive chariots from

the construction site to Shree Jagannath temple.

The railways team uses the special screw jacks for ensuring proper positioning, alignment, and forward movement of the chariots on the designated path. It also helps in removing any obstacles and maintaining adequate distance between the chariots. The team accompanies the chariots till the completion of the Yatra. Bhartiya Rail is fondly called as the lifeline of the nation. It remains committed to the service of all Indians including the pilgrims who consider Rath Yatra as their lifeline.

Rath Yatra: Puri turns fortress

Puri, June 25: The seaside pilgrim town of Puri Wednesday turned into a fortress, with deployment of over 10,000 security personnel, including NSG (National Security Guard) snipers, for the annual Rath Yatra of the sibling deities beginning June 27.

The security personnel participated in a rehearsal to prepare themselves to handle the lakhs of devotees, who will arrive in the town from every nook and cranny of the country and abroad to get a glimpse of the Trinity – Lord Jagannath, Lord Balabhadra and Devi Subhadra.

The deities come out of the 12th-century shrine once a year to mingle with devotees cutting across caste, creed and religion.

As this year's Rath Yatra will be held post-Pahalgam terror attack, security arrangements have been made keeping different aspects in view, a senior police officer said.

"An integrated command and control room has been set up in Puri for the first time. Around 275 AI-enabled CCTV cameras have been installed along the route between Uttara Chhak and Puri town and between Puri and Konark. Live

visuals from these cameras will be monitored round-the-clock," Director General of Police (DGP) Yogesh Bahadur Khurania said after giving the final touch to the security arrangements for the mega festival.

Khurania said the AI-powered surveillance system will keep a watch on traffic movements, crowd surge and help security personnel make a prompt decision and face emergencies. Sub-control rooms have also been set up at key locations, the DGP said.

For the first time, NSG snipers have also been deployed on the rooftops of buildings given the threat assessment, while anti-drone technology and police-operated drones will also be in use for aerial surveillance, the DGP said, adding that anti-sabotage teams, bomb squads and dog squads are also in place.

Over 10,000 security personnel deployed for the festival comprise Odisha Police and eight companies of Central Armed Police Force (CAPF).

To ensure foolproof security on sea front, arrangements have been made with deployment of Odisha's Marine Police, Coast Guard, and Indian Navy, he said.

A real-time chatbot application has also been launched to assist visitors with information on park-

ing availability, route maps, and directions to vacant parking lots, Khurania said.

Expecting congregation of around 15 lakh people on the Day 1 and 2 of the festival, the DGP emphasised that priority will be given to proper service and security of the devotees.

"Extensive arrangements have been made for the orderly darshan of the devotees. Experienced police officers have been deployed for Rath Yatra duty," he said.

Director of Intelligence RP Koche said since Srimandir is located in a high-security zone, its importance increases significantly during the Rath Yatra.

Besides, special security arrangements have been made for Gundicha temple and the three chariots, Koche said.

Additional Director General (ADG) of Police (Modernisation) Soumendra Priyadarshi said appropriate arrangements have been made to control the crowd.

ADG (Law and Order) Sanjay Kumar said that the cooperation of the officers/staff of the police administration is essential for the orderly completion of the Rath Yatra.

The Rath Yatra will begin June 27 and end with deities returning to Srimandir July 8.

BJD student, youth wings stage demo

Bhubaneswar, June 25: Members of the student and youth wings of Opposition BJD Wednesday boycotted classes, staged demonstrations on streets and burnt effigies, protesting the rise in crimes against women, including the gangrape of a 20-year-old college student on Gopalpur beach in Ganjam district earlier this month.

The BJD, headed by former chief minister Naveen Patnaik, had given the



statewide students' strike call.

Holding placards and wearing black badges, the agitators raised slogans against the state's BJP government and accused it of failing to provide security

to women of all ages.

Apart from Utkal University and different colleges of Bhubaneswar, students also blockaded roads and staged protests in Cuttack, Puri, Kendrapara, Jagatsinghpur, Jajpur, Balasore,

Koraput, Sambalpur and other districts.

However, there was no report of any violence from anywhere, police said, adding that the students and youths expressed their displeasure over the rise in rapes.

BJD leaders, including MLAs, former ministers and ex-MPs, also participated in the agitations and addressed gatherings.

All of them criticised the state government over the prevailing law and order situation.

Shukla was Wednesday headed to the International Space Station (ISS) on a historic odyssey marking India's return to human spaceflight after a gap of 41 years following a successful launch of the Axiom Space mission in the US with a four-member multi-country crew.

The astronauts will spend 14 days at the ISS and conduct 60 scientific experiments during their mission. The commercial mission by Axiom Space, a US-based startup, is expected to contribute to microgravity research in areas including human physiology, nutrition, and seed germination in space.

ECoR gears up for smooth Rath Yatra

Preparations ramped up at Puri Railway Station for safe, hassle-free travel for Rath Yatra devotees

Bhubaneswar, June 25: As Puri gears up for the grand Rath Yatra, East Coast Railway (ECoR) is undertaking extensive, coordinated preparations to ensure smooth travel and safety for the lakhs of devotees expected to attend the annual festival. ECoR general manager Parmeshwar Funkwal inspected Puri Railway Station Wednesday to review the comprehensive arrangements focused on passenger comfort, crowd management, and infrastructure readiness.

To handle the surge in passenger traffic, ECoR is running over 365 special trains from key stations including Odisha, Chhattisgarh, West Bengal, Andhra Pradesh, and Maharashtra.

Puri Railway Station, the spiritual hub during the festival, has undergone major upgrades with newly established Pilgrim Waiting Areas and Mela Sheds that can accommodate up to 20,000 devotees. These zones are equipped with covered seating, drinking water booths, modular toilets, mobile charging points, shaded rest areas, and medical first-aid sta-



tions with ambulance support, an official said.

Digital infrastructure has been significantly enhanced, with real-time train and crowd updates provided through LED displays, public announcements, and the dedicated “ECoR Yatra” app. To assist pilgrims, help desks and “May I Help You” counters have been set up at key locations. Digital ticketing is also being actively promoted via the UTS app, ATMs with facilitators, and mobile ticket counters.

Additionally, 34 booking counters at Puri and 35 more at junctions like Bhubaneswar, Khurda Road, Cuttack, Brahmapur, and Bhadrak have been set up to ease ticketing congestion.

Security arrangements have been significantly ramped up with the deployment of Railway Protection Force (RPF), Government Railway Police (GRP), Scouts and Guides, and dual-layer ticket checks. Sur-

veillance has been strengthened with 250 CCTV cameras, drones, sniffer dogs, face recognition systems, and fire tenders. Ten entry gates at the station have been fortified with barricades and manual frisking systems, while major junctions are under close watch through a “fortress check” mechanism.

In terms of amenities, pilgrims will have access to Janata meals, snacks, water bottles, and OSOP (One Station One Product) stalls that display local crafts, handlooms, and appliqué work. Temporary food stalls have also been set up at platforms and Mela Sheds to serve pilgrims.

ECoR is also prioritising cleanliness and medical support, with 24x7 sanitation staff, mobile toilets, jet-cleaning units, and waste management systems in place. Medical booths staffed with doctors and paramedics, supported by ambulances, are stationed at multiple points to handle any health emergencies.

Subhadra’s next aid on Raksha Bandhan

The meeting also approved the administrative and associated expenditures of the scheme incurred so far. In this context, detailed discussions were held on the impact of Subhadra assistance across all beneficiary categories, its utilisation, and digital financial inclusion. Following a prior decision, a field survey will be conducted from the first week of July by college girls (Subhadra reviewers) in collaboration with IIM-Sambalpur.

IIM-Sambalpur will provide full support for data collection, tools, training, and analysis. The meeting also focused on skill development for beneficiaries to ensure the effective use of Subhadra assistance, with collaborative discussions involving the Skill Development department.

Odisha aims for 50% EV registrations by 2036

Bhubaneswar, June 25: In a major push toward clean and sustainable mobility, the state government has set an ambitious target of achieving 50 per cent Battery Electric Vehicles (BEVs) in all new vehicle registrations by 2036. This target was a key focus during a high-level brainstorming session, jointly organised by the Commerce and Transport and Energy departments Wednesday to discuss the upcoming Odisha Electric Vehicle (EV) Policy 2.0.

The meeting was co-chaired by Commerce & Transport principal secretary Usha Padhee and Energy principal secretary Vishal Kumar Dev. Senior officials from both departments took part in comprehensive discussions aimed at advancing Odisha’s electric mobility transition and achieving key targets. The EV vehicle registration is on the rise, marking a significant step from 1.16 per cent in 2021 to 8.71 per cent as of June 20, 2025.

Odisha currently has over 550 Public Charging Stations (PCS), including captive infrastructure operated by two-wheeler OEMs, DISCOMs, and oil marketing companies.

INT’L DAY AGAINST DRUG ABUSE AND ILLICIT TRAFFICKING

Odisha community calls for a drug-free future

Bhubaneswar, June 25: As Bhubaneswar joins the global observance of the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking Thursday (June 26), the City itself is grappling with the very crisis the day aims to address. This year’s theme, “Break the Cycle, Stop Organised Crime,” resonates deeply in the Capital and surrounding areas, where juvenile arrests linked to narcotics—particularly brown sugar—are on the rise.

Recent investigations by local authorities have uncovered alarming trends: juvenile offenders caught with drugs worth lakhs were found to be part of a wider trafficking network with direct links to brown sugar suppliers in West Bengal and nearby regions. The findings point to the expanding influence of organised drug syndicates infiltrating both urban and rural areas of Odisha.

Speaking to **Orissa POST** on this occasion, Md Imran Ali, a noted de-addiction warrior, counselor, and Co-Founder of Salaam Jeewan, said, “Drug abuse and



trafficking have severely impacted our younger generation,” he said. “The drug mafias are deliberately targeting youth, spreading their operations from cities into villages, and pushing minors into both consumption and distribution. The entire ecosystem—from families to schools—must function as a vigilant force.”

The government and local administration must break the supply chain while expanding rehabilitation services, especially for women and children, he added.

Ali stressed the need for urgent reforms in enforcement, noting that the current implementation of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act remains weak.

Echoing this concern, Gatikrishna Satapathy, Convener of War Against Drugs Abuse (WADA), framed the crisis in broader societal terms: “Every parent dreams of a bright future for their child. But drugs are robbing us of that future—quietly and violently. Addiction destroys academic potential, family bonds, mental health,

and often pushes individuals into crime.”

Satapathy called for a community-based prevention strategy rooted in awareness. “It’s easier to avoid drugs than to quit them. Early education, strong family ties, and community vigilance are our best weapons. Prevention is not just better than cure—it is essential.”

In a strong message from the authorities, Police Commissioner S Dev Datta Singh assured strict action against drug peddlers operating in Bhubaneswar and Cuttack.

“We will deal firmly with those trying to lure our youth into addiction. At the same time, we are committed to helping those who want to quit. Police will actively support rehabilitation efforts and work with agencies to ensure drug-free futures for our youth,” Singh said.



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An Iranian Bomb

Israel and the United States have dealt punishing blows to Iran’s nuclear infrastructure. “Operation Rising Lion” and “Operation Midnight Hammer” have been portrayed as precision strikes that will stop the Islamic Republic’s nuclear programme in its tracks. But whatever the bombings might have achieved tactically, they risk forfeiting strategically, as Iran is now more convinced than ever that nuclear weapons are the only way to deter future aggression and ensure the regime’s survival.

Iran was once brought to the negotiating table through a carefully calibrated mix of pressure and incentives. Despite its imperfections, that approach worked. In 2015, the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action was agreed, with Iran agreeing to limit its nuclear programme in exchange for sanctions relief and other concessions. But – at Israel’s urging and despite Iran’s apparent compliance – Donald Trump abandoned the JCPOA during his first term as president, destroying whatever mutual trust had been built over the course of 20 months of painstaking diplomacy.

Now, despite pursuing new nuclear negotiations with Iran, the US has joined Israel in abandoning strategic patience in favour of spasmodic force. Some argue that Iran invited the attacks by deceiving the international community, stoking regional conflicts, and enriching uranium to levels well beyond those needed for any civilian application. These are legitimate complaints.

Even the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), in a report released just before Israel’s campaign began, raised concerns about Iran’s compliance with its international obligations. Indeed, an analysis of this report by the Institute for Science and International Security argued that “Iran can convert its current stock of 60 percent enriched uranium into 233 kg of [weapon-grade uranium] in three weeks at the Fordow Fuel Enrichment Plant (FFEP), enough for 9 nuclear weapons.”” That conclusion may well have lit a fire under the Trump administration.

But the IAEA also concluded that it had “no credible indications of an ongoing, undeclared structured nuclear program” in Iran, while underscoring the urgency of reaching a nuclear deal. “Iran,” the agency warned, “is the only non-nuclear-weapon state in the world that is producing and accumulating uranium enriched to 60 per cent” – just a short technical step away from the 90 per cent purity needed for weapons-grade material.

Even so, US and Israeli decision-makers greenlit attacks on Iranian nuclear sites at Fordow, Natanz, and Isfahan – facilities that are subject to IAEA safeguards and monitored under Iran’s Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT) commitments. With that, they unravelled the legal and verification framework that exists precisely to prevent weaponization.

Beyond undermining the authority of the IAEA and its inspection regime, the attacks violated the NPT’s principle of peaceful nuclear use (Article IV) and breached international law, including the United Nations Charter. The US, a nuclear superpower with a record of catastrophic wars aimed at regime change, and Israel, a clandestine nuclear-armed state that refuses to sign the NPT, have thus sent an unmistakable message: only the weak follow rules, and only the strong are safe. In fact, as long as you have nuclear weapons, you can violate international law at will.

This is true not only for major powers, but also for smaller states. Pakistan, for example, nurtures cross-border terrorism and exports proxy war with impunity, threatening nuclear retaliation for anyone who crosses it. This poses a more acute threat to regional peace than Iran’s hypothetical bomb, but the US remains silent.

This hypocrisy is deeply rooted. It was the US, after all, that aided and abetted Pakistan’s covert pursuit of the bomb. Throughout the 1980s and 1990s, successive US administrations ignored mounting evidence that Pakistan was secretly enriching uranium and building nuclear weapons – and continued funnelling billions of dollars in aid to the country. The result is a fragile state armed with an “Islamic bomb.”

Today, with diplomacy derailed, inspections discredited, coercion normalized, and double standards embraced, what tools remain to convince Iran that remaining non-nuclear is wise and strategically viable? After years of debate over the value of a nuclear deterrent – with Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei even issuing religious edicts against nuclear weapons – Iranian decision-makers are almost certain to decide that there is no other way to keep the country safe from attack.

Iran now has every incentive to exit – or at least limit – the IAEA framework and race toward nuclear breakout. Just as Saddam Hussein took his nuclear program underground following Israel’s 1981 bombing of Iraq’s IAEA-monitored Osirak reactor, Iran is likely to reject transparency and oversight in favour of secrecy and ambiguity. That would not be some dramatic act of defiance, but rather a rational response to a serious – even existential – threat.

And it is not just Iran. If powerful states can bomb safeguarded nuclear facilities with impunity, why should any country put its faith in the global nonproliferation regime? Any government that wants to avoid the fate of Saddam’s Iraq or Muammar el-Qaddafi’s Libya (or, for that matter, democratic Ukraine), will seek to acquire the bomb – or at least come close enough to keep adversaries guessing.

The only viable path to nonproliferation is and always will be diplomacy, not destruction. Military strikes might slow down a nuclear program, but they cannot impose long-term restraint – especially when they are carried out by powers that flout the very rules they claim to be enforcing. In the end, Operation Rising Lion and Operation Midnight Hammer may be remembered not as preemptive strikes against Iran’s nuclear breakout, but as catalysts for it.

INDIA WILL NEED TO GROW BY 7.8% ON AVERAGE OVER THE NEXT 22 YEARS TO ACHIEVE ITS HIGH-INCOME STATUS AMBITION BY 2047

Air India Flight 171, a Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner bound for London, took off from Ahmedabad’s Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel International Airport on 12 June, only to plunge into a hostel of the BJ Medical College just 30 seconds later. The tragedy claimed 241 lives onboard and at least 39 on the ground, including medical students and a couple who stepped out to make an Aadhaar card correction just before the plane crashed in their neighbourhood, Meghani Nagar. This is a congested locality of buildings and slum pockets in the vicinity of the airport, causing many fatalities on the ground. Over 60 people from Meghani Nagar are being treated for injuries. While investigators look into a host of likely causes that range from engine and equipment failure to systemic problems and a breakdown in communications, the crash has drawn attention to other issues that need to be addressed: the chaos and growing congestion around many of our airports.

With the steady increase in air traffic and the consequent need for expanded airport infrastructure, interest in development and land use around airports is growing, with little regard for the impact in terms of safety issues and noise pollution on nearby populated areas. One way to reduce risks of damage or injury to persons or property on the ground due to aircraft accidents is to limit the density of development at or near airports. Studies have shown that accident probabilities increase with proximity to runway ends because of the greater concentration of aircraft, flying at low altitude, over these areas. Some airports and local communities have set development density limits ranging from 25 to 100 people per acre for various parts of a runway approach corridor. Shopping centres are likely to average about 75 people per acre and restaurants, over 100 people per acre. In general, high-density residential development and places of public assembly should not be permitted

in the airport’s approach corridors, says a chapter on “alternate land use” by the Airports Council International – North America in a document aimed at helping airports recognise and address the considerable challenges associated with such development in the vicinity.

Globally, there is a debate on where airports might be located and how land use around airports needs to be regulated. New airports set up far away from cities make the airport that much less accessible while legacy airports right in the thick of a city bring increased risks for aviation and for residents themselves. Since a majority of air accidents occur either during take-off or landing, that makes it riskier to have airports in the midst of a bustling city. While it is true that an accident of the kind seen in the case of AI-171 is rare and can technically happen anywhere, it is equally true that bustling neighbourhoods springing up on the outskirts of airports are best avoided.

That poses a challenge for India in particular because the aviation sector has grown rapidly in recent years, with the number of passengers growing from 66 million in 2014 to 161 million in 2024. Reports indicate that new airports are quickly turning out to be fully utilised to or beyond their designed capacity, driven by a growing economy and the growth of air traffic. Earlier this month Union Minister of

Civil Aviation K Rammoohan Naidu announced the country’s plans to add 50 more airports in the next five years, building upon the existing 162 airports. For instance, the Navi Mumbai airport is being built to address the capacity constraints of the existing Mumbai airport, and its initial phase is expected to significantly increase the region’s flight capacity. However, the nature of the market is such that housing prices in the vicinity of the new airport have already skyrocketed indicating that “development” follows, bringing a housing boom when an airport is built.

India’s expanding aviation ambitions have been superimposed on existing urban infrastructures that are already pushed to the limit by the rapid growth of cities. In Ahmedabad, as in some other Indian cities there is little buffer between the increasingly busy airport and the densely populated neighbourhoods that encircle it. The Airports Authority of India (AAI) has been trying to address this issue by seeking an allotment of nearly 30 acres of land to extend the safety area of the runway at the Sardar Vallabhai Patel (SVP) airport. This would enable the extension of the runway into Meghani Nagar where the Dreamliner crashed. The application placed before the Gujarat government in 2013 and 2018, is pending, according to reports. Frenetic and unregulated urban development have

found buildings and accompanying paraphernalia like billboards, poles, mobile towers and the like getting closer to runways. This is the subject of a court case against unauthorised buildings and structures that are potential flight hazards near the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport in Mumbai. The Bombay High Court has called for the removal of obstructing structures.

Among the air hazards caused by building clusters outside airports are from birds attracted by garbage heaps and other food sources. AAT’s Aeronautical Information Publication supplement for Mumbai International airport this month draws attention to the “daily concentration of birds in and around the vicinity of the aerodrome” especially between early morning hours and mid-day. The supplement that issues information, guidance and action requests “pilots to exercise caution during landing or take-off.” Engine ingestion or windshield damage can lead to aborted take-offs and accidents. In September 2019 a Kolkata-bound Go-Air flight suffered a bird-hit minutes after take-off and had to return to SVP airport stranding passengers. A month earlier AAI had drawn the attention of civic authorities to landfills and garbage heaps near the airport attracting birds. That year SVP led all major Indian airports with nearly 11 wildlife strike incidents per 10,000 flights. The airport recorded 319 bird and wildlife strikes between January 2018 and October 2023, according to data tabled in Rajya Sabha.

None of this should hamper or digress from investigations into the specific case of the AI171 crash. If engines failed, as has been speculated in some quarters, it is a shocking case that demands urgent answers from Boeing and the engine manufacturers. But while that track of inquiry continues, the crash can also be an occasion to revisit land usage around airports.

Deep economic faultlines

Global conflicts and disruptions have intensified, complicating growth for many nations, including India. According to World Bank’s Global Economic Prospects, January 2025, the global economy is facing substantial headwinds, emanating largely from an increase in trade tensions and heightened global policy uncertainty. Global growth this year is expected to be the weakest in 17 years, outside of outright recessions. Chief Economic Advisor V Anantha Nageswaran said on 18 June that he believes that India does indeed stand out as a relatively “bright spot.” India’s economy has shown resilience post-COVID, achieving strong growth and improving fiscal health.

In 2024, India became the fifth-largest economy, with a GDP of \$3.6 trillion. It aspires to become the third-largest economy, with a GDP of \$5 trillion by 2027-2028. Recently, it was publicized that by 2025-26, India will overtake Japan’s economy with \$4,187.017 billion to become the fourth largest. The three countries ahead of

India are the US (\$30.5 trillion), China (\$19.2 trillion), and Germany (\$4.74 trillion). It means the US and China are much ahead of India. In the 1980s, the size of the Indian economy was the same as China but now China’s economy is around five times more than that of India. If India, with a population of around 146 crore, consumes or its richer section consumes more, automatically, the size of the economy will grow and carry a false notion of development. Growth is not an indicator of the well-being of society. It is just an indicator of economic activities.

India’s per capita income of \$2,700 places it in the lower-middle-income category. Since 2007, India has been classified as a lower-middle-income country by the World Bank. According to World Bank, India faces “middle income trap,” and it may take over 75 years to reach one-quarter of US income per capita. The middle-income trap refers to a situation where a country experiences a rapid economic growth, reaching a middle-income level, but then gets stuck in a growth plateau, unable to advance

to a high-income status. The bitter truth is that in terms of per capita GDP, India’s ranks abysmally at 143 out of 195 countries, against China’s 70th rank and in terms of purchasing power parity, India ranks 127 out of 195 countries.

According to World Bank’s latest estimates, India will need to grow by 7.8% on average over the next 22 years to achieve its high-income status ambition by 2047. Key to this would be to increase private and public investment to at least 40% of GDP from 33% currently. India’s manufacturing sector, often touted as the engine of economic growth, is now facing one of its most critical challenges. The sector’s contribution to GDP, which has stagnated at 16-17% for years, is expected to drop to 13-14% this fiscal. This decline comes despite government initiatives such as Make in India and reflects structural weaknesses that global headwinds have exacerbated. Supply chain disruptions, cost disadvantages, and a tepid export environment have significantly eroded the sector’s competitiveness.

The gross domestic saving

(GDS) – key to investment and growth – as a percentage of GDP at current market prices has plummeted from record high of 37.8% in 2007-08 to 30.7% in 2023-24. Net financial savings that ensure capital at cheaper rates to government and corporations have also declined to 5.1% of GDP in 2023-24 from a peak of 12.10% in 2010-11. By contrast, net financial liabilities have increased from Rs 15.96 lakh crore or 5.9% of GDP in 2022-23 to Rs 18.79 lakh crore or 6.4% of GDP in 2023-24. The uptick in household debt, and the simultaneous decline in household net financial savings, has raised concerns about over-leverage and stress in the household balance sheet. India’s household debt which was 8% of GDP in 2010-11 rose to 37.6% in March 2023, and further rose to 42.9% of GDP (at current prices) in June 2024, as per RBI’s Financial Stability Report.

Hence, the government should try to address these problems before resorting to publicity blitzkrieg.

Akali leader Bikram Majithia arrested

Chandigarh: The Punjab Vigilance Bureau Wednesday arrested senior Akali leader and former minister Bikram Singh Majithia after conducting a raid at his residence in Amritsar in a disproportionate assets case registered against him, sources said. The bureau seized 29 mobile phones, four laptops, two iPads, eight diaries and some documents from Majithia's residence, they said. Majithia, who is the brother-in-law of Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) chief Sukhbir Singh Badal, is already facing probe in a 2021 drugs case. After conducting the raid, the vigilance team from Mohali faced protests by Majithia and his wife and Akali MLA Ganieve Kaur Majithia, who accused the officers of barging into the house in Green Avenue Wednesday morning.

EC to review voters lists in six states

New Delhi: The Election Commission will carry out an intensive review of electoral rolls this year in six states beginning with Bihar to weed out foreign illegal migrants by checking their place of birth. Bihar is going to polls this year while assembly polls in five other states -- Assam, Kerala, Puducherry, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal -- are scheduled in 2026. The move, which would be later expanded to other states, assumes significance in the wake of a crackdown in various states on illegal foreign migrants, including from Bangladesh and Myanmar. Eventually, the poll authority will begin special intensive revision in the entire country "for the discharge of its constitutional mandate to protect the integrity of the electoral rolls".

Kaliganj blast: Forensic team collects evidence

Kolkata: Forensic experts Wednesday collected samples from Kaliganj in West Bengal's Nadia district, where a minor girl was killed in a bomb explosion during a celebratory procession linked to bypoll results there June 23, police said. Sabina Yasmin, the mother of the 13-year-old victim, refused to accept the money offered by a ruling Trinamool Congress MLA and set a 24-hour deadline for the police to nab those culprits who are yet to be arrested.

"The Union Cabinet, chaired by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, resolved to commemorate and honour the sacrifices of countless individuals who valiantly resisted the Emergency and its attempt at subversion of the spirit of Indian Constitution, a subversion which began in 1974 with a heavy-handed attempt at crushing the Navnirman Andolan and Sampoorna Kranti Abhiyan," said the resolution passed at the Cabinet.

"The Union Cabinet paid tributes to their exemplary courage and valiant resistance to the Emergency's excesses," Information and Broadcasting Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw said at the Cabinet briefing.

The resolution further said the year 2025 marks 50 years of the 'Samvidhan Hatya Diwas' – an unforgettable chapter in the history of India where the Constitution was subverted, the Republic and democratic spirit of India were attacked, federalism was undermined, and fundamental rights, human liberty and dignity were suspended.

"The Union Cabinet reaffirmed that the people of India continue to repose unflinching faith in the Indian Constitution and the resilience of the country's democratic ethos," Vaishnaw said.

"It is as important for the young as it is for the old to draw inspiration from those who resisted dictatorial tendencies and stood firm to defend our Constitution and its democratic fabric," the minister said while reading out the resolution.

SC flags concern over police summoning lawyers

New Delhi: The Supreme Court Wednesday said allowing police or probe agencies to directly summon lawyers for advising clients would seriously undermine the autonomy of legal profession and was a "direct threat" to the independence of justice administration. A bench of Justices KV Viswanathan and N Kotiswar Singh observed the legal profession was an integral component of the process of administration of justice. "Permitting the investigating agencies/police to directly summon defense counsel or advocates who advise parties in a given case would seriously undermine the autonomy of legal profession and would even constitute a direct threat to the independence of the administration of justice," the apex court said.

Nitish Katara murder: SC grants 3-month furlough to Sukhdev Yadav

New Delhi: The Supreme Court Wednesday granted three months furlough to Sukhdev Yadav alias Pehalwan in the 2002 Nitish Katara murder case. A bench of Justices Ujjal Bhuyan and K Vinod Chandran noted that Yadav has undergone 20 years of uninterrupted incarceration without remission. The top court directed that Yadav be produced before the trial court within seven days and appropriate conditions be imposed on him by the trial court before grant of furlough. Furlough is a temporary release from prison, not a suspension or remission of the entire sentence, and is typically granted to long-term inmates who have served a portion of their sentence. Yadav's plea challenged a November 2024 order of the Delhi High Court, which dismissed his petition for releasing him on furlough for three weeks. The Supreme Court awarded a 25-year jail term without the benefit of remission to Vikas Yadav October 3, 2016 and his cousin Vishal Yadav for their role in the sensational kidnapping and killing of Katara. Co-convict Sukhdev Yadav was given a 20-year jail term in the case.

SC slams jail authorities for not releasing man on bail

New Delhi: The Supreme Court Wednesday slammed the Uttar Pradesh jail authorities for delaying the release of a man whom it granted bail April 29 in a case under UP's anti-conversion law, and directed the state to pay him ₹5 lakh as compensation. A bench of Justices KV Viswanathan and N Kotiswar Singh observed that liberty was a "very valuable and precious" right guaranteed under the Constitution and the man had lost his liberty for at least 28 days due to a "non-issue". The accused was granted bail by the apex court April 29 and subsequently May 27, a trial court in Ghaziabad issued the release order. The top court was informed Wednesday that the man was released from district jail Ghaziabad June 24. The bench took strong exception over the delay in the man's release on bail for such a long time on the ground that a sub-section of a provision of Uttar Pradesh Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Act, 2021 was not mentioned in the bail order. "God knows how many people are languishing in your jails inspite of court orders," the bench told the counsel appearing for Uttar Pradesh.

Flying anxiety peaks in India after fatal AI crash

Bangalore, June 25: Retired Air Force officer Dinesh K has seen a surge in demand for his \$500 therapy course to help people overcome their fear of flying since Air India flight 171 crashed moments after take-off from Ahmedabad two weeks ago.

Dinesh uses a combination of flight simulation and counselling at his Cockpit Vista centre for "fear of flying solutions" in Bangalore, the only one in India. The centre has received more than 100 enquiries since the disaster, compared to a previous average of about ten a month.

"Fear of flying is typically to do with things happening on an aeroplane - the sounds, motion, vibrations exposure therapy is the only solution," Dinesh, 55, told Reuters during a tour of the facility where he demonstrated how cockpit con-

trols relate to movements that often worry passengers.

The centre has a simulator for a Boeing and Cessna plane to help people experience how landings and takeoffs appear from the cockpit and understand that not every vibration or sound during a flight signals danger.

WhatsApp messages Dinesh received, and shared with Reuters, showed individuals complaining about "losing confidence" after the crash while others said it was "too hard on the brain".

A chilling 59-second CCTV clip showing the crash of the Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner, which killed 260 people, has been widely shared on social media and TV channels since the June 12 accident, which aviation and mental health experts said had led to an unusually high number of counselling requests.

Some travellers are becom-



ing more choosy in selecting their airline and aircraft - Boeing or Airbus - while others are so anxious they are taking more drastic steps by rescheduling or cancelling their air travel plans altogether.

"I am filtering on the basis

of not having to fly a Boeing. I'm bloody terrified currently, and I don't want to get back on a flight," said London-based Indian marketing consultant Nidhi Bhatia, 25, who flew to Mumbai in an Air India Boeing 777 plane a day before the

2 dead, 20 feared swept away in HP cloudburst

Shimla/Dharamshala, June 25: Two persons died while about 20 were feared swept away as cloudburst, flash floods and heavy rain wreaked havoc in Himachal Pradesh Wednesday.

Two bodies were recovered from the Manuni Khad in Kangra district while around 15-20 workers stationed at a labour colony near the Indira Priyadarshini Hydroelectric project site were feared swept away following a surge in water level in the Khaniyara Manuni Khad.

According to officials, the project work had been suspended due to rain, and the workers were resting in the temporary shelters near the site when floodwaters from Manuni Khad and nearby drains diverted towards the labour colony, sweeping the workers away.

Teams from the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), local administration, gram panchayat, and the revenue department have reached the spot to carry out search and rescue operations.

Some local workers associated with the project have been reported safe, the officials said.

In a post on social media, Dharamshala's BJP MLA Sudhir Sharma said that about 20 workers were swept away in the incident.

Xi, Putin to skip BRICS Summit

Beijing/Moscow: Russian President Vladimir Putin and Chinese President Xi Jinping will not travel to Brazil for the BRICS Summit scheduled for early next month. Although there is no official announcement yet, media reports suggested that Xi plans to skip the BRICS Summit, which, if confirmed, will be his first-ever absence from the meeting of the bloc in over a decade. SK court junks arrest warrant for Yoon

Seoul: A South Korean court has rejected a request to issue an arrest warrant for former President Yoon Suk Yeol related to a probe into his short-lived attempt to impose martial law, the Yonhap News Agency said Wednesday, citing a special prosecutor. A spokesperson for the Seoul Central District Court and the prosecution office could not immediately be reached for comment. South Korea's special prosecutor had asked the court Tuesday to issue an arrest warrant for Yoon as an investigation intensified over the ousted leader's botched bid to declare martial law in December.

Man held for fuelling Chios fire with cigarette

Athens: Greece has arrested a Georgian woman suspected of discarding a cigarette that helped trigger one of several wildfires razing land and threatening homes on the island of Chios. Blazes broke out on Chios in the Aegean Sea Sunday and tore through 10,000 acres of mainly bush and pasture land in three days, Greece's climate crisis and civil protection ministry said Wednesday. The fire brigade said in a statement that the woman was arrested Tuesday night and that authorities were still investigating the cause of the fires.

Israeli attacks kill 79

Jerusalem: The Israeli military says seven Israeli soldiers have been killed in the southern Gaza Strip when a Palestinian attacker attached a bomb to their armoured vehicle while Palestinians health officials in the battered enclave reported that 79 people were killed in Israeli attacks across the strip Wednesday. The attack on the Israeli troops, which occurred Tuesday, was one of the deadliest for the army in Gaza in months.

Islamabad, June 25: An officer of the Pakistan Army's Special Services Group, who had claimed to have captured Indian Air Force pilot Abhinandan Varthaman after his jet was shot down in a dogfight in 2019, was killed in a clash with the Taliban militants, according to the army.

Major Syed Moiz Abbas Shah, 37, was killed Tuesday in a clash with the Taliban militants in the Sararogha area of South Waziristan near the Afghan border, according to a statement by the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR), the media wing of the army.



Lance Naik Jibran Ullah, 27, was also killed in the same battle, it said.

The army troops killed 11 terrorists belonging to the Tehreek-e-Taliban Pakistan (TTP) and wounded seven others in the same operation, the statement said.

After his death, it turned out that he was the same officer who had captured Abhinandan and saved him from mob violence, local media reported.

An old clip of his interview with Geo TV on social media shows Moiz, who was captain then, giving details of capturing Abhinandan.

NATO harks back to Cold War era

The intergovernmental transnational military alliance of 32 member states commit to spending hike sought by Trump, and to mutual defence

The Hague, June 25: NATO leaders Wednesday backed the big increase in defence spending that US President Donald Trump had demanded, and restated their commitment to defend each other from attack after a brief summit in the Netherlands.

While Trump got what he wanted at the annual meeting, tailor-made for him, his NATO allies will be relieved that he committed to the fundamental principle of collective defence after less clear-cut language Tuesday.

Trump told a press conference that "we had a great victory here", adding that he hoped that the additional funds would be spent on military hardware made in the US.

TRUMP THREATENS TO PUNISH SPAIN

However, he threatened to punish Spain after Prime Minister Pedro Sanchez declared it could meet its commitments to NATO while spending much less than the new target of 5% of GDP.

"I think it's terrible. You know, they (Spain) are doing very well ... And that economy could be blown right out of the water when something bad happens," Trump said, adding that Spain would get a tougher trade



deal from the U.S. than other European Union countries.

In a five-point statement, NATO endorsed the higher defence spending goal - a response not only to Trump but also to Europeans' fears that Russia poses a growing threat to their security following the 2022 invasion of Ukraine.

The 32 allies' brief communique added: "We reaffirm our ironclad commitment to collective defence as enshrined in Article 5 of the Washington Treaty - that an attack on one is an attack on all."

Asked to clarify his own stance on Article 5 after recent ambiguous comments, Trump said: "I stand with it. That's why I'm here. If I didn't stand with it, I wouldn't be here."

UK to buy 12 F-35A jets capable of N-warheads

London: Prime Minister Keir Starmer Wednesday announced that the UK will purchase 12 new F-35A fighter jets capable of carrying nuclear warheads after a government defence review warned that Britain must "actively prepare" for a direct attack on the country in a "wartime scenario". Starmer informed the ongoing North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO) summit in The Hague of the UK's plans to acquire the dual-capable aircraft, which can carry both nuclear and conventional weapons. The UK said it will deploy the jets as part of NATO's nuclear "Dual Capable Aircraft" mission in support of the alliance's nuclear deterrence posture. "In an era of radical uncertainty we can no longer take peace for granted, which is why my government is investing in our national security, ensuring our Armed Forces have the equipment they need and communities up and down the country reap the benefits from our defence dividend," said Starmer. "Supporting 100 businesses across the country and more than 20,000 jobs, these F35 dual-capable aircraft will herald a new era for our world-leading Royal Air Force (RAF) and deter hostile threats that threaten the UK and our Allies," he said.

Dubai, June 25: Iran's parliament approved a bill Wednesday to suspend cooperation with the U.N. nuclear watchdog, state-affiliated news outlet Nournews reported.

The move follows an air war with Israel in which Iran's longtime enemy said it wanted to prevent Tehran developing a nuclear weapon.

The bill, which must be approved by Iran's unelected Guardian Council to become law, stipulates that any future inspection by the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) would need approval by the Supreme National Security Council.

Parliament Speaker Mohammad Baqer Qalibaf was quoted by state media as also saying Iran would accelerate its civilian nuclear programme.

Tehran denies seeking nuclear weapons and says an IAEA resolution this month declaring Iran in breach of its non-proliferation obligations paved the way for Israel's attacks.

Qalibaf was quoted as saying the IAEA had refused even to



appear to condemn the attack on Iran's nuclear facilities and "has put its international credibility up for sale."

He said that "for this reason, the Atomic Energy Organisation of Iran will suspend its cooperation with the Agency until the security of the nuclear facilities is guaranteed, and move at a faster pace with the country's peaceful nuclear programme."

Indian origin Democrat Mamdani wins New York mayoral primary

New York, June 25: In a stunning victory, Indian-American lawmaker Zohran Kwame Mamdani defeated former governor Andrew Cuomo in the Democratic primary race for New York City mayor.

Mamdani, son of renowned Indian filmmaker Mira Nair and Mahmood Mamdani, a Ugandan author of Indian ancestry, was declared victorious in the Democratic mayoral primary Tuesday night.

"In the words of Nelson Mandela: it always seems impossible until it's done. My friends, it is done. And you are the ones who did it. I am honoured to be your Democratic nominee for the Mayor of New York City," Mamdani said in a post on X.

Mamdani was born in Kampala, Uganda, October 18, 1991, and raised in New York City. He moved to New York with his parents when he was seven. His mother Mira Nair has won applause for films like 'Monsoon Wedding' and 'Salaam Bombay!'

Mamdani, a state assembly-



man from Queens and a democratic socialist running for Mayor, is married to Brooklyn-based Syrian-born artist Rama Duwaji.

Mamdani has vowed that as Mayor, he will immediately freeze the rent for all stabilised tenants, and use every available resource to build the housing New Yorkers need and bring down the rent.

The New York City mayoral election is scheduled for November 4, 2025.

POWs, abductees, defectors, separated families legacy of Korean War

Gimpo, June 25: Prisoners of war held for decades after the fighting stopped. Civilian abductees. Defectors. Separated families.

They are Koreans who symbolise the decades of division and bitter animosities between North and South Korea, which have been split by a heavily fortified border since the 1950-53 Korean War.

North and South Koreans aren't allowed to exchange visits, phone calls or letters with their loved ones on the other side.

Wednesday is the 75th anniversary of the war's beginning. The Associated Press spoke with Koreans whose pain and sorrow likely won't be healed anytime soon as diplomacy between the Koreas remains dormant.

South Korean prisoner of war isolated after his return home

Lee Seon-wu, who was a South

Korean soldier, lost three fingers and was captured by Chinese troops during a fierce battle in the eastern Gangwon province in the final days of the war.

Like tens of thousands of other South Korean prisoners, Lee was held by North Korea even after an armistice ended the fighting. He was forced to resettle as a miner in the country's remote northeast.

In North Korea, Lee said he belonged to the lowest social class and married a poor woman. He also lived under constant state surveillance.

In 2006, he fled to South Korea via China, only to learn that his parents and two of his three siblings had already died. Lee said he was shunned by his nephew, who likely worried Lee would demand the return of land that was originally bought with compensation money that authorities gave to his family after they wrongly concluded that Lee had died in the war.



Now 94, he doesn't stay in touch with any relatives in South Korea and misses family members in North Korea.

Lee said his three daughters in North Korea rejected his offer to flee to South Korea because they feared punishment if caught. Lee said he also has a grandson whose parents — Lee's son and daughter-in-law — died in an accident.

"I'm happy because I've returned to my homeland but I shed tears when I think about them in North Korea," Lee said during an interview at his home in Gimpo, a city near Seoul.

A total of 80 South Korean POWs have fled to South Korea since 1994, but only seven of them including Lee are still alive. In 2016, the South Korean government estimated about

500 South Korean POWs were still alive in North Korea.

North Korean daughter fights for her late South Korean POW dad

Son Myong Hwa, 63, is the North Korea-born daughter of a South Korean POW held in the North. She said her father sang and played the harmonica well but often drank alone at home and wept.

Son's father, who also worked as a miner in North Korea, died of lung cancer in 1984. Son said he left a will asking her to move his ashes to his South Korean hometown when the Koreans are unified.

Son escaped to South Korea in 2005 and brought her father's remains to South Korea with the help of her brother and sister in North Korea in 2013. Her father's remains were eventually buried at the national cemetery. But Son said her demand for the government to give her father's compensation to her

has gone unanswered because South Korean law only grants financial assistance to returning POWs, not their bereaved families.

Son has been fighting legal battles to get what she thinks she deserves. She said she can't back down now because she has lost too many things. She said she learned that her brother and sister involved in the smuggling of their father's remains were later arrested by North Korean authorities and sent to a prison camp. The trouble has left Son estranged from her two other sisters who also resettled in South Korea.

"Why am I struggling like this? I harbour ill feeling against South Korean governments because I think they've abandoned POWs left in North Korea," Son said. "I think deceased POWs also have honours to be respected so their compensation must be provided posthumously."

The study revealed that fintech hotspots include UK, India, US, Singapore, Brazil and Indonesia, each of which headquartered over 10 firms and showcased a booming fintech sector.



China, India oil import shift slipping Indonesian exports

Global fall in prices changed the Indian oil purchase scenario, traders have increased higher-grade coal purchases from Kazakhstan, Colombia and Mozambique

Beijing, June 25: Top thermal coal importers China and India are slashing Indonesian shipments of the power generating fuel in favour of energy-dense grades from elsewhere as a global fall in prices has made higher-quality coal more competitive.

Coal purchases by China and India from Indonesia, the world's biggest exporter, are dropping faster than their overall thermal coal imports, as both nations shift toward higher-calorific value (CV) coal that yields more energy per ton, industry officials say.

"Higher CV coal is more expensive, but produces more energy for every dollar spent at current prices. One million tons of higher CV coal can replace 1.2-1.3 million tons or even 1.5 million tons from Indonesia," said Vasudev Pamnani, director at India-based coal trader I-Energy Natural Resources.

In China, Indonesian medium- and low-calorific thermal coal has been struggling to compete with discounted Russian supplies of similar grades, said Kpler analyst Zhiyuan Li. Ramli Ahmad, the president director of Indonesian miner Ombilin Energi, said Indonesian coal could make a comeback if prices of higher grades rise due to the Middle



East conflict, but lower-CV coal will suffer as long as more energy-dense grades are competitive.

Mongolian coal in China and South African coal in India have been the biggest gainers at Indonesia's expense, with their shares touching record highs in these markets in the first five months of 2025, Chinese customs and Indian trade data showed.

Higher production and improved efficiency will continue to boost Mongolian coal exports despite falling thermal coal prices in China as Mongolian coal has remained price-competitive, said Xue Dingcui, analyst at Mysteel.

China and India have also stepped up purchases from Tanzania, which was largely been absent from the global seaborne coal trade map until Russia's war on Ukraine in 2022.

Indian traders have also increased higher-grade coal purchases from Kazakhstan, Colombia and Mozambique this year, while Australian supplies have gained share in China.

Indonesian and Australian coal indexes, reflecting grades preferred by Chinese buyers, have been trending lower since

October 2023, with the Australian benchmark declining faster than the Indonesian one.

Looking within

Overall, Chinese coal imports fell nearly 10 per cent to 137.4 million tons in the first five months of the year, while shipments to India dropped more than five per cent to 74 million tons.

Indonesian exports have been the worst hit, with supplies to China and India sliding 12.3 per cent and 14.3 per cent, respectively. The Southeast Asian nation's total coal exports dropped 12 per cent to 187 million tons in the January-May period, data from analytics firm Kpler showed.

To counter export declines, Indonesian miners are pivoting to domestic demand, with local deliveries poised to rise three per cent this year and exports set to decline about 10 per cent, according to the Indonesian Mining Services Association.

Domestic demand, driven by demand from nickel smelters, is on track to account for the highest share of Indonesian coal output in at least a decade and stands at 48.6 per cent currently.

SEBI slaps ₹25L penalty on BSE

New Delhi, June 25: Security Exchange Board of India (SEBI) Wednesday slapped ₹25 lakh penalty on BSE for failing to provide equal access to corporate disclosures to all stakeholders and take action against brokers with frequent modifications during trades.

The market regulator passed the order after an inspection conducted between February 2021 and September 2022. SEBI found that BSE's system architecture allowed its paid clients and internal listing compliance monitoring (LCM) team to access corporate announcements before the same were made public through its website, resulting in a breach of norms.

The regulator also observed that the data dissemination process lacked safeguards to ensure simultaneous and equal access to all stakeholders, which is critical to maintaining market integrity and preventing unfair information advantage.

Accordingly, SEBI concluded that BSE failed to comply with Regulation 39(3) of the Securities Contracts (Regulation) SECC (Stock Exchange and Clearing Corporations) Regulations, 2018.

BSE failed to initiate disciplinary action against brokers with frequent modifications and did not adequately monitor 'error accounts', raising concerns over the possibility of misuse and lack of due diligence in trades between unrelated institutional clients. "The role of stock exchanges as 'the first layer of oversight' is of much significance, while handling material price sensitive information about listed companies and their securities. Therefore, as a premier recognised stock exchange, BSE must have internal controls on how to manage and handle such corporate announcements so as to ensure compliance with its obligations," SEBI's Quasi Judicial Authority Santosh Shukla said in the order.

Mumbai, June 25: Benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty surged nearly 1 per cent Wednesday, powered by widespread buying and a positive trend in global equities amid easing tensions in the Middle East following a ceasefire between Iran and Israel.

30-share Sensex jumped 700.40 points or 0.85 per cent to settle at 82,755.51. During the day, it surged 760.8 points or 0.92 per cent to 82,815.91.

Indian economy resilient despite global flux: RBI

Mumbai, June 25: India's economy remains resilient despite a state of flux in the global economy due to the twin shocks from trade and geopolitical tensions, the Reserve Bank of India said in its monthly bulletin released Wednesday.

The RBI cut its key policy rate by a larger-than-expected 50 basis points earlier this month and slashed the reserve ratio for banks as low inflation gave it room to focus on supporting growth amid volatile global conditions.

"In this state of elevated global uncertainty, various high-frequency indicators for May 2025 point towards resilient economic activity in India across the industrial



and services sectors," the RBI said in its 'State of the Economy' article.

"Agriculture showed a broad-based increase in production across most major crops during 2024-25. The domestic prices situation remains benign with headline inflation staying below the target for the fourth consecutive month in May," it said. India's annual retail infla-

tion slowed to 2.82% in May, the lowest in more than six years, from 3.16% in April.

Financial conditions remain conducive to facilitate an efficient transmission of rate cuts to the credit market, the central bank said in the bulletin.

The trade policy outcomes in July, after the temporary tariff hiatus is over, and the future course of geopolitical events would likely shape medium-term economic prospects, the RBI said.

"Going forward, as noted by the MPC (monetary policy committee) in its resolution, the MPC decided to remain data-dependent to chart the future course of monetary policy and strike the appropriate growth-inflation balance," it said.

AI appliances contribute 50% sales in H1 2025: Samsung

The adaptability of such new-age technologies is exorbitant among Indian consumers, who are looking at it as a practical solution for their requirements

New Delhi, June 25: Consumer Electronics major Samsung, which is increasing its play in the premium appliances segment, expects artificial intelligence-powered and internet-connected appliances to contribute 50 per cent of its total sales in the first half of 2025, a company official said.

The company expects a 'single-digit growth' overall in the refrigerator and washing segment in 2025. However, it estimates a double-digit growth in the premium segment.

Besides, the company is also increasing its retail presence and plans to add 150 more exclusive brand outlets pan India, taking the total number to 900 by the end of this year, Samsung India Vice President

Digital Appliances Business Ghufuran Alam said.

On the integration of artificial intelligence (AI) in appliances, Samsung said the adaptability of such new-age technologies is exorbitant among Indian consumers, who are looking at it as a practical solution for their requirements.

Samsung is democratising its portfolio of appliances by launching more products under its AI range, from segments like washing machines, and refrigerators to residential air-conditioners.

Earlier in April 2024, Samsung India said it expects 70 per cent of appliance sales here will come from AI-powered products by the end of 2025.

"Last year (2024), AI appliances accounted for only 10 per cent of Samsung's overall



revenue in India. By the end of the year, the contribution of AI appliances to Samsung's overall sales reached 28 per cent, and this portion increased to 50 per cent as of H1 exit, 2025," Alam said.

"We do expect to reach 70 per cent by the end of this year," he added.

Moreover, the integration of AI is also helping Samsung to expand its play into the premium segment, which is witnessing higher growth across the industry, led by key factors like rising disposable incomes, rapid urbanisation, digital affluence through social media and favourable demographic

shifts.

"The rising sales of AI appliances have helped Samsung become the number 1 brand in premium refrigerators," he said.

"For refrigerators, the premium segment accounts for around 10 per cent of the overall refrigerator business (by value) and is estimated to be growing in double digits (15 per cent) in 2025."

When asked about the sales in the first half of 2025, Alam said in the last two months, "because of unpredictable weather, there has been some kind of softness in demand" for compressor-based cooling products like room air conditioners and refrigerators.

However, he hopes for a recovery in sales during the second half, based on the sales

data of the last few years, when people purchased these summer-centric products even during the festive season sales.

"Refrigerator is round the year product, now in AC, also, we are seeing dependability of H1 (having extreme summer months) is going down for last two years," he said.

"So, we see a robust demand, looking at the festivals, which we have, starting with Onam, and then to Durga Puja and Diwali in North India. So, we see a robust demand for these products in the second half, and we are prepared for it."

In FY24, Samsung India's total income was ₹1.02 lakh crore, where revenue from the HHP (handheld phones) segment, which covers operations relating to mobile phones & accessories, at ₹71,157.6 crore.

India eye parity after loss

Kuldeep for Shardul could be the only change in the second Test against England beginning July 2

New Delhi, June 25: India head coach Gautam Gambhir defended captain Shubman Gill's decision to under bowl Shardul Thakur in the series opener against England but it would be tough to justify his selection in the second Test beginning July 2.

In his first Test since December 2023, Shardul was under-utilised in the pace department and was rather underwhelming with the bat, totalling five off 20 balls across two innings.

Questions were raised about his presence in the playing eleven ahead of a specialist bowler when he rolled his arm over for six overs in the first innings before bowling 10

in the second.

Like he often does, Shardul did pick a couple of wickets out of nowhere to raise hopes of an Indian comeback on day five but the bite in his bowling was missing. He alongside the likes of Prasidh Krishna offered too many loose balls, lacking consistency to test the opposition batters.

With India losing the game having controlled for a major part of five days, there is no need to ring the alarm bells but a few changes are certain in the playing eleven for the Edgbaston Test.

Experts cried out for Kuldeep Yadav's inclusion in the series opener and now he is most likely to replace Shardul with the surface expected to aid the spinners in

"Kuldeep Yadav has to come back. I'm sorry to say, but Shardul Thakur has to go out," former India batter Sanjay Manjrekar said on JioStar.

"That is one change India will have to make. As for Nitish Kumar Reddy - I backed him for the first Test purely based on what he did in Australia. It's an unpopular choice, because when he comes in, the balance does get affected a bit. Shardul's under-utilisation and he understandably came in support of the captain.

"Sometimes captain goes with his instincts and Ravindra Jadeja gave us control in the first innings, that was important and we could rotate our three pacers at the other end. We know what is Shardul's quality and that is why he is playing for India and is in the dressing room. Just because he is the fourth seamer does not necessarily mean that he has to be brought ahead of a spinner. A captain went by his instinct and depending on surface, we were playing," said Gambhir.

Other changes in the bowling line-up are unlikely with pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah expected to play with a long enough gap between the first and the second Test.

Uncapped Arshdeep Singh is likely to warm the bench again with the management expected to persist with Prasidh, who bowled much better and fuller in the second essay and Mohammed Siraj, who is not able to extract a lot out of his stock wobbled seam delivery of late.

In comparison, teen prodigy Madhesh, who impressed with calm and focused play, won the title outright, with eight points, scoring a last-round win over Vyom Malhotra.

Madhesh earned Rs 2 lakh for his fine performance, while Advik Agrawal finished

runner-up and earned Rs 1.5 lakhs. Top seed Aansh Nerurkar had to settle for third place and Rs 1 lakh. The fourth and fifth places were secured by CM Madhvendra Pratap Sharma (Rs 75,000) and Jagreet Mishra (Rs 50,000), respectively.

Sannidhi Bhat was adjudged the Best Female Player and won Rs 45,000 plus a trophy, while Rachit Gurnani and Mysha Perwez emerged the best among the Mumbai Boys and Girls, respectively, winning Rs 30,000 each and a trophy.

9-year-old Indian prodigy holds Carlsen to a draw

Aarit played this event from his hotel in Georgia where he is currently battling for a podium finish in the under-10 World championship. Aarit has scored victories in the first two rounds and will play his third game Wednesday.



Rajasthan Royals owner accuses former co-owner Raj Kundra of blackmail

London, June 25: Indian Premier League cricket franchise Rajasthan Royals' majority owner Wednesday accused his former co-owner of trying to blackmail him by alleging he was defrauded out of his minority stake in the club.

London-based venture capitalist Manoj Badale and his company Emerging Media Ventures are suing businessman Raj Kundra at London's High Court for allegedly breaching a 2019 confidential settlement agreement.

The case centres on Kundra's former shares in Rajasthan Royals, winner of 2008's inaugural IPL which is now cricket's richest tournament with a brand value of \$12 billion.

Badale's lawyer Adam Speker said Kundra, who is married to Bollywood star Shilpa Shetty, had threatened to report serious allegations to Indian authorities in a "blackmail attempt".

New Delhi, June 25: In the past four years, whenever June 25 comes, absence of one of the most vibrant members of the '83' whatsapp group rankles the other 13.

It is now almost four years since Yashpal Sharma left this world but there is not a single day that 'Yash Paaji' isn't missed by his teammates.

Just before Covid-19 hit, Yashpal, who was a selector in Punjab, had come to watch a Ranji Trophy match Delhi and lamented to a couple of journalists present there about not having a recording of India's first match against West Indies at Old Trafford where his 89 paved the way for an improbable 34-run win.

"I was ready to offer GBP 5000 to anyone who had the re-

cording. I didn't get it. That was perhaps my best ODI knock. It seemed Maco (Malcolm Marshall) had an unwritten deal with me. Mere aate hi do gaaend chaati pe maarta thaa (At least two deliveries, I would take on my ribs)," Yashpal, who was the top scorer with 240 runs in the tournament, fondly recollected on that December day.

The candour is deeply missed by his teammates.

"Yes, he was a very popular member of the team and he is missed by every one of us," the legendary Sunil Gavaskar told PTI when asked about the only member, who is no longer with them.

The 83 whatsapp group comprises the 14 members of that team and administrative manager PR Man Singh.

Whether the team wins the Border Gavaskar Trophy un-



der Ravi Shastri or Roger Binny becomes BCCI president or for that matter Kirti Azad wins Lok Sabha elections, the group is always buzzing.

"We are in touch almost every day but most certainly today," Gavaskar said.

Back in 2008, the Vijay Malaya owned UB Group had organised the 25th anniversary celebration at the iconic Lord's with all team members present on that historic balcony.

In 2023, the Adani Group had also felicitated the members on the 40th anniversary of the Cup win.

However, this time with Gavaskar and Ravi Shastri busy with their media commitments for the Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy and Dilip Vengsarkar also out of the country, the planned celebrations have been kept on hold.

"We had planned one this year but with the current series

we had to postpone it. We have had a few celebrations on other years too. Two years back on the 40th anniversary, the Adani's felicitated the team at their headquarters in Ahmedabad," Gavaskar recalled.

It is 42 years and at least two more golden generations have also walked into the sunset since that day when first seeds of a behemoth called Indian cricket were sown.

"...1983 was huge. Watching Kapil Dev, Sandhu, Madan Lal, Roger Binny, Sandeep Patil at Lord's was huge. It inspired us a lot to take up cricket," one of India's greatest captains, Sourav Ganguly, told PTI in a recent podcast.

The stories associated with the tournament are still fresh and told and retold to the passing generations.

They have all aged and have

vague memories. Kapil was candid enough to tell young reporters recently that he doesn't remember anything from that historic innings.

They are also scattered in different parts of India. Gavaskar and Shastri live out of suitcases as premier broadcasters, and are voices of Indian cricket. Krish Srikkanth runs a successful Tamil YouTube channel with his son Anirudha, having been a chairman of selectors. Vengsarkar runs one of Mumbai's most successful academies with branches in Pune.

Sunil Valson lives in a quaint hill station in North-east India, Madan Lal runs his academy at Siri Fort and is an expert on TV channels while Syed Kirmani recently wrote his autobiography.

So did Mohinder Amarnath, who lives in Goa. Kirti Azad shuttles between Ansol and Delhi while dealing with voices in Trinamool Congress that consider him an outsider.

Binny is the BCCI president and probably, the quietest one among all those that the country's cricket establishment has ever heard.
