Window frame of Spicejet aircraft dislodges mid-air


Mumbai, July 2: A window frame of Spice Jet's aircraft operating its flight to Pune from Goa was found dislodged midair but there was no impact on passengers' safety, the airline said Wednesday.

The frame was fixed once the aircraft landed at the next (Pune) airport, in accordance with standard maintenance procedures, the airline said in a statement. SpiceJet, however, did not share other details.

"A cosmetic (interior) window frame on one of the Q400 Aircraft became loose during flight and was found dislodged,' the airline said in a statement.

SpiceJet also said that cabin pressurisation remained normal throughout the flight, and there was no impact on passenger safety, adding that the dislodged part was a non-structural trim component, fitted onto the window for the purpose of shade, and did not compromise the safety or integrity of the aircraft in any way.

Questioning the airworthiness of the aircraft, a passenger posted a video of the dislodged window on social media platform X, while tagging the aviation safety regulator DGCA in the post.



Congress slams govt over rise in per capita debt

New Delhi, July 2: The Con gress Wednesday slammed the Centre over the rise in the per capita debt of individual borrowers and said the government is constantly trying to hide the real shortcomings by taking the help of statistics and experts, but the debt burden on the country is at its peak in Modi Raj.

Congress general secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh shared screen shots of media reports to attack the government.

One media report stated that the average debt of every person in the country has increased by ₹90,000 in the last two years and the per capita debt of individual borrowers increased to ₹4.8 lakh in March 2025 from ₹3.9 lakh ir March 2023. The other report shared by Ramesh said 25.7 per cent of the common man's disposable income is going towards paying EMIs of loans which are non-productive for him in the future.

Ramesh said the latest report of the Reserve Bank of India has revealed a worrying picture of India's economy.In 2 years, the per capita debt has increased by ₹90,000 to ₹4.8 lakh, he said.



Parl Monsoon session from July 21 to Aug 21

New Delhi: The government Wednesday said the Monsoon session of Parliament will begin July 21 and continue till August 21. a week longer than planned earlier, signalling a heavy legislative agenda Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju said President Droupadi Murmu has approved the government's proposal to convene the Session from July 21 to August 21. "In view of Independence Day celebrations. there will be no sittings on the 13th and 14th of August," Rijiju said in a post on X. Earlier, the session was to conclude August 12, but now it has been extended by a week. The longer duration of the session comes amid the government's plans to bring in key legislations, including one to facilitate the entry of the private sector in the atomic energy domain.

4 from Odisha killed in T'gana factory blast

Bhubaneswar: At least four workers from Odisha were killed and four others injured in the explosion at a pharmaceutical factory in Telangana, an officer said Wednesday. So far, 36 people were killed and several others injured in the powerful blast at a pharmaceutical manufacturing unit in Telangana's Sangareddy district. The explosion occurred Monday at Sigachi Industries' plant in Pashamylaram. The deceased were identified as R Jaganmohan from Chatrapur area in Ganjam district, Lagnajit Duari from Tigiria area in Cuttack district, Manoj Rout from Simulia in Balasore district and Dolagovind Sahu from Dharmasala in Jajpur district, he said.

official work across Odisha paralysed for two days because of a 'cease work' by Odisha Administrative Service (OAS) and Odisha Revenue Service (ORS) officers, the state government Wednesday appealed to the agitating officers to resume duty.

State government officials launched the protest Tuesday; a day after BMC Additional Commissioner Ratnakar Sahoo was dragged out of his office and assaulted by a group of miscreants. Five people have been arrested so far in connection with the incident.

To resolve the ongoing deadlock, CM Mohan Charan Majhi convened a meeting with senior officials. After the meeting, Revenue and Disaster Management Minister Suresh Pujari urged the officers to end their agitation and assured that such an incident would not happen again.

He said the OAS Association has already held meetings with the CM and the Chief Secretary.

"If they (officers) want, we are ready for further discussions. This is not the proper time to go on 'cease work'. I appeal to them to resume their duties. We can hold discussions on their demands," Pujari said. He also pointed to the ongo-

ing flood situation in parts of northern Odisha and the Rath Yatra festival as reasons why the agitation is untimely.

In their memorandum to the Chief Secretary, the agitating officers demanded the arrest of **BJP** leader Jagannath Pradhan for his alleged involvement in

On OAS Association's demand for arrest of Pradhan, Pujari said, "Police are investigating the incident from all angles. Once they complete the investigation, it can be ascertained who was behind the assault. It will not be right to arrest someone without an investigation. So, let's allow the law to take its course.'

Meanwhile, Pradhan stated that he had a meeting with party president Manmohan Samal Wednesday and that he would accept whatever decision the party takes. Samal said the partv would take a decision after conducting a review.

LADY TEACHER HELD FOR RAPING STUDENT

Mumbai, July 2: A 40-year old woman teacher from a prominent school in Mumbai has been arrested for allegedly repeatedly sexually assaulting a 16-year-old male student, a

police official said Wednesday The English language teacher. who is married, took the minor to luxury hotels where she alleged ly abused him, the official said.

The woman, who was taken into custody last week, was so obsessed with the minor that she tried to contact him even after he passed out of school this year, police said.

According to the police of ficial, the accused became attracted to her student during various meetings in connec tion with the school's annual function in December 2023. She allegedly made her first sexual advance in January 2024.

Soon after the accused teacher started taking the teenager to expensive hotels to sexually assault him, the student devel oped acute anxiety. She then allegedly gave him some an ti-anxiety pills, the official said

The boy cleared his Class X exam a few months ago and left the school, but slipped into depression, said the official. His family decided to speak up when the accused again sent the boy a message, through their domestic staff, to meet her, the official said.

Dalai Lama says he will be reincarnated

The Dalai Lama's affirmation that his spiritual lineage will continue after his death has reignited tensions with China, which insists it holds the sole authority to approve reincarnations of the Tibetan Buddhist leader. By declaring that the Gaden Phodrang Trust alone will oversee the identification of the 15th Dalai Lama, he directly challenges China's long-standing claim of control over Tibetan religious succession. The Dalai Lama's move, just days ahead of his 90th birthday, reinforces Tibetan autonomy in spiritual matters and sends a clear signal to exiled communities and international supporters. It also undercuts China's attempts to manipulate religious traditions for political gain, particularly in its efforts to name a rival Dalai Lama in the future, a prospect many Tibetans fear and reject.

Dharamshala, July 2: The elderly Dalai Lama assured his followers Wednesday that upon his death he would be reincarnated as the next spiritual leader of Tibetan Buddhism and spelt out a succession process that sets up a renewed clash with China.

The eagerly awaited statement, made days before the frail Nobel peace laureate turns 90, puts to rest speculation, started by the Dalai Lama himself, that he may be the last of Tibet's spiritual leaders, ending a line that stretches back centuries.



Speaking during a week of celebrations in the northern Indian hill town of Dharamshala to mark his birthday, the Dalai Lama said a non-profit institution he has set up will have the sole authority to identify his reincarnation, countering China's insistence that it will choose his successor.

Beijing reiterated Wednesday that it had to approve the reincarnation and that it had to be done in China through a centuries-old ritual.

Beijing views the Dalai Lama, who fled to India from Tibet in 1959 after a failed uprising against Chinese rule, as a separatist. The Dalai Lama has said his successor will be born outside China and urged his followers to reject anyone chosen by Beijing. In previous years, he had also said it was possible that there might be no successor at all.

"I am affirming that the institution of the Dalai Lama will continue," the Dalai Lama said in a video message, setting off claps and cheers from more than 100 monks in maroon robes who had gathered in a library in Dharamshala.

The event was also attended by journalists from around the world and long-time supporters including Hollywood star Richard Gere, who sat in the audience in a hall that had ornate paintings of the Buddha and photographs of the Dalai Lama on the walls.



Bhubaneswar, July 2: The state government Wednesday formed a four-member team to assist Development Commissioner (DC) Anu Garg to complete an inquiry into the Puri stampede within 30 days. Garg has been asked to con-

duct the administrative inquiry into the death of three persons and the injury to around 50 people in the stampede near Gundicha Temple in Puri during the Rath Yatra festivities June 29.

According to an order issued by the General Administration and Public Grievance (GA&PG) department, four Odisha Administrative Service (OAS) officers have been included in the team.

Joint Director of Estates and GA&PG department's Additional Secretary Manas Ranjan Samal, and Housing and Urban Development department Addi-

June 29, the state government had ordered an administrative inquiry headed by Garg and asked her to complete the probe within 30 days.

Garg had Monday started her investigation into the incident and held discussions with the Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA) Chief Administrator. Puri Collector and SP, besides other officials and temple servitors.

The Development Commissioner said she would find out what led to the stampede situation and identify the people responsible for the incident. "I would also see what more

measures could be taken to avoid such incidents in future,' the Development Commission-

al Secretary Rashmi Ranjan er said. Nayak and Works department Apart from meeting different Additional Secretary Pradip stakeholders, Garg said she would examine all CCTV foot-Of the four OAS officers, age, go through the deployment orders and whether the SOPs were being followed.

Senior IPS officer and ADG Soumendra Priyadarshi has also been given the overall charge of streamlining police arrangements for the Rath Yatra.

Two senior police officers have also been suspended on charges of dereliction of duty.

OED's earliest evidence for juggernaut is from 1638, in writer W Bruton's noted work 'Newes From The East Indies' or 'A Vovage To Bengalla'.

Apart from lending itself to a popular south India food chain, the name was also adopted by publishing house Juggernaut Books.

"When I was thinking of starting up on my own, my husband suggested it to me, as it

was an English word with Indian origins. I loved the sound of it, its playfulness, and also my grandfather had worked in Orissa so it felt like a nice subtle nod to my own family's story," said Chiki Sarkar, founder of Juggernaut Books.

Juggernaut has also been popularised by Marvel Comics with

an eponymous character in 'X-Men' comic books who has superhuman strength and durability.

Then Odisha chief minister Naveen Patnaik called upon investors at the Make in Odisha Conclave December 1, 2022 and said, "Come, join the juggernaut." The word Jagannath has also lent itself to another English word, 'jaconet'.

Jaconet is a lightweight, cotton fabric that originally came from Puri. The word found itself in English vocabulary somewhere around the mid 18th century.

According to the Oxford dictionary, jaconet is a corruption of 'Jagannathi or Jagannathpuri in Cuttack, where it was originally manufactured'.

There are several other words too that trace their origins to Hindi.

The word shampoo goes back to the 18th century. It came from the Hindi word 'champo', which means to press or massage. Dacoit is a rather simple variation of 'dakaiti' in Hindi, which means robbery.

Jodhpurs, named after the city in Rajasthan, allude to trousers meant to be worn for horse riding. Loose around the thighs and ending in a snug cuff, the pants were popularised by prince Pratap Singh of Jodhpur who wore them to polo matches hosted by Queen Victoria in England during her Diamond Jubilee celebrations of 1897.

Similarly, the word khaki, which is a light shade of tan has come to be associated with a wide range of uniforms worn by many armies around the world to provide camouflage in sandy terrain.

Mulligatawny soup, which must have been quite a tongue twister for its early English adapters, originates from Tamil cuisine. The name comes from the Tamil word 'milagu' (black pepper) and 'thanneer' (water) literally meaning pepper water.

In Bhubaneswar, change is taking root at both individual and community levels.

Gyanaranjan Das, Youth for Seva chapter coordinator, Bhubaneswar, underlined the power of small, daily choices. "The first thing we can do is carry our own bags — jute or cloth - whenever we go shopping, whether it's for vegetables, clothes, or groceries. I person-

ally carry my own bag and containers for groceries," he said. "I also collect single-use

plastic wrappers in bulk and hand them over to BMC cleaners during their door-to-door rounds," Das said.

"Our voluntary team take up regular programmes — throwing seed balls in barren land for plantation, cleaning tourist spots like Khandagiri, Udayagiri, and Shanti Stupa, and cre-





and tourists," he added.

Similarly, Akankhya Rout, an active environmental advocate and journalist, highlighted the role of conscious consumption. "I support businesses that use sustainable packaging and eco-friendly materials. For example, I avoid regular sanitary pads that contain micro plastics and instead choose alternatives made from bamboo or banana stems," she said.

Small steps like carrying your own tote bag, avoiding unnecessary shopping, or skipping plastic decorative

items can create a huge impact on the environment,' Rout added.

From academia, Pratibha Biswal, a PhD scholar at Rama Devi Women's University, emphasised the role of community education and said, "I work with the NGO and conduct awareness sessions for students in government schools about the harmful impact of plastic. Personally, I always carry a cloth bag and try to avoid ordering food that generates plastic waste.'

Meghamukta Mohanty, Odia Department, RD Women's University, said "I always carry cotton or jute bags when shopping and encourage my students to do the same. At home, I avoid plastic containers, opting for steel or glass."

Even homemakers are playing a crucial role.


Sunita Rout, a Bhubaneswar resident, shared her simple yet impactful practices, said "As a homemaker. I have stopped using plastic bags completely. I store groceries in steel container rather than fancy plastic boxes and use steel lunch boxes for my children. It feels good to know that these small changes help protect our environ ment and marine life.³

Globally, an estimated 5 trillion plastic bags are produced every year, with nearly 1 million used every minute. A typical plastic bag serves its purpose for just 25 minutes but can linger in the environment for 100 to 500 vears.

The toll on marine ecosystems is catastrophic-plastic bags are responsible for the deaths of about 100,000 marine animals annually, according to a UN Environment report.

Widow brutally killed in Keonjhar; 1 nabbed

Keonjhar, July 2: In a sign of utter lawlessness, a man beheaded a 58-year-old widow with a spade over suspected past enmity at Bhalughera Sahi of Phula Pahadi village under Patana police station in this district early Wednesday morning.

The victim was identified as Tulasi Majhi, 58, wife of late Kade Majhi and the accused as Debadutta Naik, son of Kaibalya Naik of the same village. The accused repeatedly assaulted the woman with a spade and severed her head from the tor-

It is suspected that the accused had harboured grudge over the alleged religious conversion of the victim's family

The victim was identified as Tulasi Majhi, 58, wife of late Kade Majhi and the accused as Debadutta Naik, son of Kaibalya **Naik of Phula** Pahadi village

which might have resulted in the brutal murder of the widow. The incident occurred when

a villager Barial Majhi was going to his farmland passing by the victim's house around 6am Wednesday. Accused Debadutta waylaid him and attacked him with a spade. Barial fled the scene to save his life.

Meanwhile, victim Tulasi was standing in her courtyard and was witnessing the incident. An angry Debadutta barged into her house and assaulted her with the spade and finally beheaded her. Panicked villagers preferred to stay indoors following the incident.

Acting on a complaint by the victim's daughter Duli Majhi, Patana police registered a case (143/25) and launched an investigation with the help of a scientific team. The murder weapon has been seized and sent for forensic examination. said the police.

The cops tried to interrogate the villagers as part of the probe but they chose to maintain mum over the issue. When contacted, Patana IIC Manas Mahakud said the accused has been arrested but

the actual reason behind the murder is yet to be ascertained. Further investigations are underway, he added.

Notably, Tulasi's husband Kade was beaten to death by a group of villagers at a kangaroo court held in the village after he adopted a different religion five years ago.



Tigress Zeenat expects cubs by early Sept

Bhubaneswar, July 2: Tigress Zeenat, which escaped from Similipal National Park and roamed across Odisha, West Bengal, and Jharkhand, is now suspected to be pregnant, and is expected to give birth by August or early September, according to a senior Forest

Captured in Bankura district

According to the official, even during her stay in the enclosure, Zeenat had shown signs of estrus and responded to the presence of a wild melanistic male tiger. T12.



Zeenat, even during her stay in a large enclosure, showed signs of estrus towards a wild male tiger (T12). Taking this opportunity, the tigress was released from the enclosure. Mating with T12 was recorded on thermal cameras installed at Jamuna meadow in the second

week of May, the official said. Since her release, Zeenat has been moving inside the core area of STR and hunting natural prey such as cheetal, sambar, and wild boar. The tigress is being monitored 24 hours by tracking teams. Each team consists of 4 people. It is also being monitored using satellite-based GPS, he said.

She has stopped mating and has isolated herself — both strong indicators of pregnancy. Given that the gestation period in tigers ranges from 105 to 120 days, we expect Zeenat to give birth by August or early September, the official said.

Zeenat was brought to Similipal from Tadoba-Andhari Tiger Reserve (TATR) in Maharashtra as part of tiger supplementation project. She escaped from STR December 7 and roamed around three states before being captured in West Bengal's Bankura after 23 days

According to a research by Uma Ramakrishnan of the **Captured in Bankura** district of West **Bengal after a** dramatic 23-day iourney through three states, Zeenat was brought back to **Similipal in January**

National Centre for Biological Sciences, Bangalore, in 2021, the population of tigers inside Similipal is genetically isolated and inbreeding is taking place within the reserve.

To counter this trend, it was proposed to translocate tigers from the central Indian landscape to STR, the official added.

Although the tiger population in Similipal has been increasing at about 18 per cent annually since 2014, nearly 50 per cent of them display pseudo-melanistic coat colour, indicating high inbreeding, he said.

Malkangiri, July 2: A large number of people, belonging to a minority community, held a protest rally in this district Wednesday, demanding immediate arrest of those involved in an attack on them.

70 stray dog attack cases in a week


Barbil, July 2: More than 70 people have been injured in Barbil area of Keonjhar district in the past week due to stray dog attacks, health officials at Barbil community health centre (CHC) said.

The victims include pedestrians and two-wheeler riders, many of whom have sustained bleeding and injuries after being bitten by roaming dogs. On average, around 10 people are reportedly being attacked daily across Barbil, Joda Municipality and adjoining areas.

Residents say the situation worsens after evening descends, when attacks by stray dogs become more frequent. People in Barbil, Joda, and surrounding rural areas have expressed growing fear and frustration, saying they feel unsafe in their own neighborhoods and step out on road.

Chief medical officer at Barbil CHC Soubhagva Rashmi Ranjan Samal confirmed that the hospital is receiving an average of 10 dog bite cases per day from areas including Jurudi, Joda, and Kiriburu. "Over 70 people have been administered anti-rabies injections in the past week alone," he added.

Monsoon magic at Kanjipani pulls crowd

Keonjhar, July 2: Kanjipani Ghat, one of the most known tourist destinations in Keonjhar district, is captivating nature lovers with its unique charm and breathtaking monsoon scenery

Nestled amidst dense forests and hills, the ghat's allure intensifies particularly during the rainv and winter seasons.

With the onset of this monsoon, floating clouds and gentle rain have transform Kanjipani into a mesmerising landscape, drawing crowds of nature enthusiasts. Thick clouds settle over the forested hills and descend close to the roads, creating an experience reminiscent of hill stations in Himachal Pradesh.

Located approximately 19 km along the Kendujhar-Sambalpur NH-49 route, the spec-



tacular ghat road has emerged as a significant tourist attraction. Travellers often pause at various points along the route to soak in the tranquil and refreshing ambience.

Light showers and mist-covered forests offer breathtaking views that are frequently captured by tourists in photographs. The elevation of the ghat adds to the thrill, with many reporting a tingling sensation as clouds brush against them. Visitors of all ages can be seen strolling along the winding road, capturing selfies

with scenic views and drifting

clouds in the background. Small waterfalls, formed by rainwater cascading down the hills, flow beneath culverts and create miniature streams. These natural features, some forming small surges, further enhance the ghat's appeal.

However, lack of basic infrastructure has led tourists to take photos from unsafe spots along the roadside, and atop damaged guard walls.

Many believe that building proper shelters for rest and rain protection, as well as dedicated viewing points, could significantly improve tourist experience. Cottages at designated locations would allow visitors to stay overnight and witness the sunrise and sunset especially alluring moments in the ghat. Such arrangements would also encourage visitors to explore the nearby Juang tribal villages and experience their unique culture and traditions.

Bimbadhar Behera, a nature lover, suggest that tourism facilities and cottage accommodation would not only boost footfall but also offer a chance to promote tribal heritage.

Assistant Tourism Officer Ramesh Chandra Navak informs that efforts are underway to develop various amenities for tourists at Kanjipani Ghat.

Notably, wild monkeys often wander near the road, attracting curious tourists who feed them — a practice discouraged by experts.

To address the nuisance, locals have proposed planting fruit-bearing trees - such as figs and wild bananas - at strategic spots. This would provide natural food sources for the monkeys, reducing their dependency on visitors and fostering a safer environment for both animals and people. The Forest department is reportedly considering steps in this direction.

Tech Sovereignty

he recent AI agreement between the United States and the United Arab Emirates, which paves the way for the UAE to establish one of the world's largest data campuses, has sparked heated debate in the US. The New York Times questioned whether President Donald Trump was "trading away America's tech future," while Bloomberg warned that "offshoring AI to the Middle East could hand China a win."

At the center of the deal is a commitment to sell the UAE 500,000 of Nvidia's most advanced semiconductors per year (for comparison, 200,000 chips reportedly are used to power Elon Musk's Colossus, believed to be the world's largest AI supercomputer). This is a clear win for the UAE, which aims to position itself as a tech leader. But the agreement also highlights a profound shift in global power dynamics: technological sovereignty is no longer a choice; it has become a strategic imperative.

The economic and geopolitical implications could be far-reaching. As countries compete for dominance in AI, semiconductors, and cloud infrastructure, the real challenge is to achieve technological autonomy without resorting to protectionist policies. That requires striking a delicate balance between international cooperation and addressing national-security risks.

The UAE's push for AI leadership is a prime example. To become a tech powerhouse, it needs to foster

homegrown innovation while navigating an increasingly interdependent digital landscape.

As the race for technological supremacy intensifies, tech sovereignty has become a top priority for governments around the world. The ability to design, build, and maintain critical systems and production capacity independently is now essential to both economic competitiveness and national security, especially as global supply chains realign.

At its core, technological and manufacturing sovereignty is about maintaining control over the foundational tech stacks that underpin modern economies, from semiconductors to 5G networks. Relying on foreign chipmakers or cloud services can lead to delays, shortages, and strategic vulnerabilities. Consequently, economic competitiveness increasingly hinges on the strength of domestic innovation. For developing countries, in particular, bolstering local capacity is a prerequisite for job creation, value generation, and longterm resilience.

The global economic shocks of the past few years, especially Russia's invasion of Ukraine and pandemic-related semiconductor shortages, have underscored the link between national security and technological independence. To shield key sec-

tors like defense, energy, finance, and health from foreign influence, governments require secure communication networks, uncompromised defense systems, and AI solutions based on reliable data.

In the digital age, sovereignty also means protecting citizens' privacy. Control over data governance, encryption, and storage infrastructure is crucial to avoid exposure to foreign surveillance or legislation that undermines national privacy protections and civil liberties.

But tech stacks are not just a combination of hardware and software. They are socio-technical ecosystems that comprise human capital, research institutions, supply chains, intellectual-property frameworks, and the broader policy environment. Achieving technological sovereignty, therefore, requires more than building a fabrication plant or hosting data on a local server. It calls for government, academia, and industry to work together to advance shared objectives.

Governments, in particular, have an important role to play in setting strategic priorities, funding research, regulating platforms, and leveling the playing field for domestic innovators. In addition to investments in education, research and development, and industrial policy, public procurement can help unlock new opportunities for local tech providers. To be sure, innovation cannot be commercialised or scaled without the private sector. From chipmakers to AI startups, industry actors need clear incentives, supportive policy frameworks, and a stable investment climate to grow. Public-private partnerships can help mitigate risks, bridge knowledge gaps, and accelerate the development of frontier technologies. Meanwhile, universities and research labs must continue to serve as talent incubators of innovation engines. By fostering collaboration between academic institutions and private companies, policymakers can ensure a steady flow of skilled professionals and promising ideas into the broader economy. In its efforts to build a thriving innovation ecosystem, then, the UAE must look beyond capital investments in physical infrastructure. Its success will depend on strengthening ties between academic institutions and the private sector while continuously refining its policy frameworks to attract and retain a diverse, highly skilled workforce

HORROR ON CAMPUSES

s India's universities reopen after summer holidays, campuses brim with the energy of returning students and new arrivals carrying dreams of academic achievement. Yet beneath this veneer of renewal festers an old terror: ragging. Countless newcomers face humiliation, violence, and psychological torture at the hands of seniors, their educational promise swiftly curdling into trauma. This systematic abuse shatters confidence, extinguishes futures, and tragically drives some to suicide, leaving families devastated and aspirations unfulfilled. Despite decades of Supreme Court directives, UGC regulations, government pledges, dedicated helplines, anti-ragging cells, and stringent penalties under laws like the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS), the menace persists - a damning indictment of systemic failure.

Legally, ragging is defined with damning clarity: any disorderly conduct causing teasing, hardship, psychological harm, fear, or apprehension. Established by the Supreme Court in 1999 and elaborated in UGC regulations (2009), it explicitly encompasses physical assault, verbal abuse, psychological humiliation, sexual harassment, and financial extortion. This is not benign tradition; it is criminal depravity violating fundamental human dignity. The watershed moment came in 2009 following the horrific ragging death of Aman Kachroo, a medical student in Himachal Pradesh. The Supreme Court's intervention led to the UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging, making it a cognizable offense and placing primary responsibility on higher education institutions (HEIs) for prevention and action.

Yet, the data paints a picture of alarming failure and

May 2025, 3,318 ragging cases were reported, linked directly to 44 student suicides. The true toll is certainly higher, shrouded by fear of retaliation and institutional apathy. A particularly disturbing pattern emerges: medical and engineering colleges are devastating epicenters. Despite medical students constituting only 1.1% of India's higher education enrollment, they accounted for 24% of ragging-related deaths during this period; engineering students accounted for 29%. Collectively, institutions under the National Medical Commission (NMC), All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE), and UGC reported 2,520 cases, accounting for over 74% of the total. This disproportionate impact points to toxic, culturally ingrained hierarchies within these high-pressure environments where notions of 'tradition' brutally over-

ments are severe institutional ly-ranging from suspension, scholarship withdrawal, and rustication to permanent expulsion and deharment from other institutions for up to five years, plus fines up to ₹50,000. Crucially, ragging is a cognizable, non-bailable, non-compoundable offense. HEIs must file FIRs for every incident, invoking stringent BNS sections like 103/104 (Culpable Homicide/ Murder), 106 (Abetment of Suicide), 74 (Sexual Harassment), 125/126 (Causing Hurt/Grievous Hurt), 305 (Criminal Intimidation), 79 (Insulting Modesty), and 3(7) (Group Liability).

However, the chasm between policy and practice remains vast. Enforcement is weak, investigations are often superficial, committees lack independence, and police responses can be indifferent. Eradicating this scourge demands more than punishment; it necessitates a fundamental cultural transformation within campuses. Stricter, consistent enforcement of laws is non-negotiable. Proactive monitoring through CCTVs in hostels and common areas, coupled with accessible, truly anonymous reporting mechanisms, is essential. Robust psychological support must be immediately available for victims. Most critically, continuous, impactful sensitisation programmes for students, faculty, and parents must dismantle the myth of 'harmless tradition,' replacing it with campuses built on empathy, mutual respect, and positive senior-junior interactions. Until this profound shift occurs, the annual reopening of India's universities signifies not just the start of learning. but a grim ritual where countless young lives remain vulnerable to a preventable darkness.

Bigotry & democratic backsliding

he BJP is marking the 50th anniversary of the Emergency, emphasising how power was misused by Indira Gandhi for personal interests without considering the broader national interest. Going into top gear, Union Home Minister Amit Shah highlighted Prime Minister Narendra Modi's "nation first" approach. Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge launched a counter attack stating that an "undeclared emergency" has prevailed for the past 11 years and claimed that Modi is addressing the Emergency issue to divert attention from "governance challenges and institutional control.' The BJP insisted that it's imperative to discuss the sufferings the then government inflicted on people so that it is never repeated. As against this, critics of the NDA government are raising questions about freedom of expression in the country and accusing the government of lacking tolerance and trampling liberty and fraternity. In particular, they allege journalists and student activists are being imprisoned for simply being critical of the government and opposing its policies. A recent study undertaken by the Clooney Foundation for Justice's TrialWatch initiative in partnership with the National Law University, Delhi and Columbia Law School's Human Rights Institute analysed 624 incidents of criminalisation of journalists in relation to their work from 2012 to 2022. The dataset breaks


gency has to be condemned in the strongest possible terms, the Opposition flags the BJP's dislike for civil society. A deeper analysis perhaps may reveal that both the Congress and the BJP have misused the Foreign Contribution (Regulation) Act (FCRA) to target NGOs and civil society, particularly those criticising environmental and human rights issues. This reflects the government's fear of an independent scrutiny. Additionally, there have been attacks on the press, with journalists and activists jailed under the UAPA for criticising government policies and highlighting its failures. The overall hostility towards the civil society and independent thought is common worldwide. Statistics spell out how democracy is increasingly in peril across the globe. The Economist's recent Global Democracy Index (GDI) indicates that just 6.6% of the world's total population, residing in 25 out of the 165 countries assessed, enjoyed full democracy in 2024. The first GDI in 2006 had credited 28 countries covering 13% of the world population with 'Full Democracies'. Ten years later in 2016, it reported a sharp decline with 19 countries and just about 4.5% of the world population in that category. The Economist

distributed its results based on 60 parameters in four categories - 'full democracies', 'flawed democracies', 'hybrid systems' and 'authoritarian regimes'. Over the last two decades, much less than one-fifth of the world's countries have been described as fully democratic. Despite the dilution of its content, democracy is still in circulation in political discourse though they may be practicing 'hybrid systems' or 'flamed democracies'. Some political analysts have observed that despite her dictatorial ways, Indira Gandhi upheld the plural idea of India enshrined in the Constitution. wherein citizenship is not defined in terms of language, religion or ethnicity. However, in the present times, the poison of religious bigotry has pervaded society and brought enmity. jealousy and hatred among communities. This resulted in hate speech among political leaders and a steady loosening of bonding among communities. This bigotry is increasing day by day with the tacit support of political leaders, who are only interested in reaping electoral advantage. If unchecked, this may not just destroy democratic plurality but also the social fabric of the country.

But the quest for tech sovereignty must not veer into digital protectionism. Instead of chasing an unrealistic vision of total self-sufficiency, policymakers should pursue strategic autonomy by setting national tech policies while remaining open to international cooperation.

The European Union offers a useful model. Dozens of European tech companies and organisations have expressed support for the EuroStack initiative, which aims to reduce dependence on foreign infrastructure by developing competitive domestic alternatives in cloud computing, AI, and software. At the same time, the EU aims to curb US firms' market power by enforcing the Digital Markets Act, despite pushback from Big Tech.

Although the US-UAE agreement has attracted significant media attention, little is known about its approach to national-security concerns and geopolitical risks. How these issues are addressed will determine whether the UAE's AI campus becomes a model for strategic international collaboration or a cautionary tale about the dangers of overlooking digital security.

The obstacles to achieving tech sovereignty are significant and multifaceted. The high costs of semiconductor production, the complexity of global supply chains, and the market dominance of major tech firms make it difficult for any single country to secure full sovereignty without trusted international partnerships.

Given this reality, policymakers must integrate sovereignty considerations into trade agreements and data-sharing frameworks. The deepening US-UAE tech partnership, the EU's efforts to balance regulation with competitiveness, and the formidable barriers to semiconductor self-sufficiency all show that strategic collaboration remains vital even in a volatile geopolitical landscape.

At stake is not just who develops the fastest chips and most powerful algorithms, but who writes the rules that govern the digital world. This kind of influence depends on more than technological prowess; it requires balancing national security with economic openness. The countries that manage to enhance domestic resilience while forming international partnerships will be the ones driving global innovation for years to come.

OVER THE LAST TWO DECADES, MUCH LESS THAN ONE-FIFTH OF THE WORLD'S COUNTRIES HAVE BEEN DESCRIBED AS FULLY DEMOCRATIC down 423 criminal cases against 427 journalists across states and Union Territories of the country. Of the arrested reporters, 24% were from metro cities and 58% from small towns and villages. The foundational tenet of regimes endorsing free speech, as was pointed out in a recent talk by one of the country's foremost intellectuals Pratap Bhanu Mehta, has traditionally been rooted in a milieu of trust between the State and citizens. Strategic location

Sir, Pakistan has become a crucial arena in the intensifying strategic rivalry between China and the United States-a modern-day "Great Game" shaped by trade routes, rare minerals, and shifting alliances. Its geographic location at the crossroads of Central Asia, the Middle East, and the Indian Ocean, combined with its nuclear capability and untapped mineral reserves, makes it a strategic asset for competing powers. China's deep involvement through the CPEC —especially its development of Gwadar Port-demonstrates Beijing's ambition to secure direct access to the Arabian Sea and expand its influence via infrastructure investment and non-conditional aid. In response, the US has sought to reinvigorate its military and intelligence partnership with Pakistan, including F-16 upgrades and closer ties with the Pakistani military. Yet, this move comes with diplomatic friction, as Washington tries to balance outreach to Islamabad while deepening its strategic alignment with India-reviving fears in New Delhi of being re-grouped with its historical rival. Pakistan, for its part, is navigating a delicate balancing act. It is trying to extract economic and military benefits from both superpowers without slipping into overdependence on either. But this hedging strategy is risky, particularly in volatile regions like Balochistan-rich in rare earths and marred by instability-where the interests of China and the US subtly collide.

Jaipur, July 2: Concerns over poaching in Rajasthan's Ranthambore Tiger Reserve have intensified after it was found that three tigers killed by an interstate gang of poachers were likely from RTR.

The development follows a joint operation by Madhya Pradesh's State Tiger Strike Force, Rajasthan Forest department, and Sawai Madhopur-based NGO Tiger Watch last month that led to the arrest of six poachers, including three from Rajasthan. Over 225 pieces of big cat bones were seized near Sheopur in Madhya Pradesh June 5, according to an official statement.

Those arrested are Dauji Bheel and Sunita Dauji, residents of Dausa in Rajasthan, and Besta Bheel of Sheopur in Madhya Pradesh with big cat skulls and bones. Madhya Pradesh forest officials picked up Baniram Moghiya and Naresh, both from Shivpuri in the state, and Rajaram Moghiya, a resident of Tonk in Rajasthan.

In an official communication. Madhya Pradesh forest authorities have asked Rajasthan to share DNA profiles from Ranthambore's tiger population to match with the confiscated remains.

"We received the correspondence and a response will be provided after due examination. Our teams are actively pursuing the matter," a senior Rajasthan Forest department official said.

Ranthambore Field Director Anoop K R, in a report sent to Rajasthan's chief wildlife warden, said, "A few bones have been identified as that of a tiger. As part of further investigation to find out the origin of these bones, the joint team of MP and Rajasthan forest departments is working in

coordination."

DNA testing in Madhya Pradesh's Jabalpur confirmed that the seized remains were of three tigers and one leopard. The samples have since been sent to the National Centre for Biological Sciences (NCBS), Bengaluru, for advanced matching with Ranthambore's tiger database. The report is expected in three weeks, forest officials said. According to sources, the

poaching is suspected to have occurred on Rajasthan's side of the Chambal landscape. Investigations revealed that a tiger was killed around six

"Given that only tigers from Rajasthan are known to use the Kuno-Madhav-Ranthambore corridor, these deaths point to a much bigger poaching racket that must be investigated thoroughly," he said. Rajasthan Forest department records show five Ranthambore tigers -- T79, T131, T138, T139, and T2401 -- went missing under suspicious circumstances between June 2022 and May 2024. The missing tigers include two females and three males aged

3 to 12 years. Forest officials said if the DNA tests confirm that the seized remains are of Ranthambore's missing tigers. it will not only highlight the vulnerability of big cats straying beyond protected zones but also the urgent need for tighter interstate anti-poach-

Delhi to Jaipur in 3 hrs; trial run begins

Jaipur, July 2: The trial run on the Bandikui-Jaipur Link Expressway, connecting the Delhi-Mumbai Expressway to Jaipur, started Wednesday. The journey from Jaipur to Delhi will now take just 2.5 to 3 hours, offering a faster and smoother travel experience

The trial run started at 8 am, and no toll will be levied during this trial period of ten days.

The ultramodern expressway is undergoing quality checks and facility testing through the trial runs to identify and rectify any shortcomings before toll collection officially begins in the coming days, said officials, On the first day, the expressway was opened directly for traffic.

Additionally, the Khuri Interchange has been made operational to manage traffic coming from the Manoharpur-Kauthun highway. If all goes smoothly, traffic from other interchanges will also be allowed on the expressway within a day or two. The 67-kilometre-long, four-

lane access-controlled express-



way stretches from Bandikui in Dausa district to Jaipur in Rajasthan and is nearly complete.

Vehicles will be permitted to travel at speeds of up to 120 km/h on this modern roadway. Impressively, construction was completed ahead of schedule.

Once fully operational, the expressway will significantly reduce travel time and will reduce the journey from Bandikui to Jaipur to just 25-30 minutes, compared to the previous duration of over an hour, which will eventually reduce travel time

from Jaipur to Delhi and so on. Furthermore, with its link to the Delhi-Mumbai Expressway, travel time from Gurugram to Bandikui will be reduced to just three hours.

Other tracks which will be connected on the Expressway include Delhi-Mumbai Expressway, Manoharpur-Kauthun Highway (via Khuri Interchange) and additional interchanges which will be opened soon, depending on trial success. "All preparations for toll col-

lection are complete. As soon

as we receive the green signa from higher authorities, tol operations will commence. said BS Joiya, Project Director, NHAI Dausa Unit.

According to officials from the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI), the 66.91-kilometre-long Bandi kui-Jaipur Expressway has been constructed at a cost of ₹1,368 crore.

During the ongoing trial phase, all vehicles except tractors, mo torcycles, and other restricted categories will be allowed to pass without interruption.

Once fully operational, the new expressway is expected to significantly reduce travel time, with the journey from Jaipur to Delhi expected to take just 2.5 to 3 hours.

52 border villages in U'khand to be linked to nat'l power grid

Pithoragarh: Fifty two border villages will soon be linked to the national power grid, a move that would ensure them round-the-clock electricity supply and cut their dependence on solar energy, an official of the Uttarakhand Power Corporation Limited (UPCL) said Wednesday. The project will see 20 villages in Darma Valley, 18 in Vyas Valley and 14 in Johar Valley being linked to the national power grid, said Narendra Singh Tolia, chief engineer, UPCL Rudrapur zone. These villages located on the India-China border have for years been dependent on solar panels or electricity provided through micro-projects run by the Uttarakhand Renewable Electricity Development Agency. Tolia said the Central government has approved ₹131.43 crore for the new project, the tender process for which has been wound up and whose timeline for completion is 18 months. The project will also be highly beneficial for the security forces deployed in border areas, he added.

Eateries on Kanwar Yatra route must display food licenses

New Delhi, July 2: The Uttarakhand government has mandated all food vendors catering to Kanwar Yatra pilgrims to prominently display their photo ID and shop license number, in a bid to ensure food safety and hygiene amid the massive influx of devotees.

This rule applies across the board, from large eateries to roadside stalls

Violators found operating without the required identification risk heavy penalties, with fines reaching up to $\overline{\mathbf{x}}_2$ lakh under the Food Safetv Act.

While the move has been welcomed by many as a necessary step to safeguard public health, it has also triggered political criticism, with opposition leaders calling the penalty excessively harsh, particularly for small-time street vendors.

Former Samajwadi Party MP ST Hasan, expressed his disapproval of the steep fine, stating, "We have no objection to putting up nameplates. Islam teaches us not to deceive anyone in business. But if a fine of ₹2 lakh is imposed on a street vendor, that is excessive. The fine can be of ₹1000-2000, but the said amount is too much."

Countering Hasan's remarks, Mahant Ravindra Puri, President of the Akhil Bharatiya Akhara Parishad, defended the state government's decision and accused critics of selective outrage.

"Hasan did not speak when people were spitting in food or urinating in our juice. The Chief Minister has taken this decision to ensure that our religion is not corrupted. Crores of people from Rajasthan, Delhi, Himachal, etc., come to Uttarakhand for the Kanwar



Yatra," he told. Food Safety Officer Sanjay Kumar Singh clarified the state's position and emphasised that the measure is rooted in law.

"There is a provision for licensing under the Food Safety Act, and individuals involved in food-related businesses are required to obtain licenses. Regarding the ongoing Kanwar Yatra, a video meeting was held

with our Hon'ble Commissioner and district officials to ensure proper food safety measures are in place," he said.

He added that every food business operator along the yatra route -- including small vendors, hawkers, and street food stalls -- must display their license or registration certificate along with a visible photo ID.

Failure to show this iden-

tification will lead to immediate action under the Food Safety Act, resulting in a ₹2 lakh fine.

The administration is actively helping vendors get registered.

'We are ensuring that the street vendors get their licens es on time. We are doing all to ensure that the devotees do not face any problem of unhygienic food during the Yatra. The number of street vendors increases during the Kanwar Yatra, and hence, all the checks will be taken. If any problem is found, samples will be collected and appropriate action will be taken," Singh added.

The directive comes in response to recurring concerns over food adulteration, contamination, and unsanitary practices reported during major religious events.







Mumbai. July 2: A group of senior Air India pilots recreated on simulators some adverse conditions, such as flying with higher weight and temperature, and with landing gear down and retracted wing flaps at 50 feet, with the results showing the Boeing 787-8 aircraft continued flying, sources said Wednesday.

The simulator test was carried out independently by the Air India Boeing 787 aircraft fleet trainers during a simulator training session at the air-

line's Mumbai facility within days of the crash of an Air India Dreamliner in Ahmedabad. sources said. When contacted, Air India said pilots conducted simulator tests on their own, and the airline had no role in that. Among the various theories doing the rounds initially regarding the possible causes of the Air India aircraft crash in Ahmedabad June 12 that killed over 260 people, was that the pilot flew the aircraft with

retracted flaps and gear down. "The pilots simulated AI 171 flight conditions on their own during the training session.



They attempted to create some slightly adverse conditions like with higher weight and higher temperature, while keeping (landing) gear down and retracting (wing) flaps at 50 feet

altitude," said a source.

Flaps are movable panels, located along the trailing edge of an aircraft's wings, which get extended during takeoff and landing to increase the wing's surface area, which provides more 'lift' that keeps the plane flying.

This additional aerodynamic force is crucial during lowspeed flight, like takeoff or landing. Flaps are adjusted manually by either pilot, depending on the situation. In cruise flight, they remain retracted. India's nodal aircraft

launched a probe after the tragedy and constituted a multidisciplinary team June 13. The team includes representatives from the US National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB), an air traffic control officer, and an aviation medicine specialist. Last week, the government

said data is being extracted from black boxes, and analvsis of the cockpit voice recorder and flight data recorder is underway to reconstruct the sequence of events that led to the fatal crash of the Air India plane in Ahmedabad June 12

KOLKATA GANGRAPE Lawyer of accused claims consensual sex

Kolkata, July 2: The counsel of Monojit Mishra, prime accused in the gangrape of a student of a city-based law college, Wednesday claimed that his client had "consensual sex" with the victim and that he was "framed" for a crime of which there are "no vid eo evidence" as being claimed in certain quarters. Advocate Raju Ganguly, who appeared for Mishra in court, maintained that the suspect did not perpe trate any torture on the victim and referred to the presence of "love bites" on his client's body in support of his claim.

"My client has been framed. The two had consensual sex. and there is evidence of that. There are marks of love bites on the left side of Monojit's neck. My client has done nothing wrong," Ganguly said.

Sources at the Alipore court which heard the remand prayer of Mishra and the two co-ac cused, Zaib Ahmed and Pramit Mukheriee Tuesday however told PTI that the defence coun sel made no such submissions before the judge. The court extended the police remand of all three prime accused in the case till July 8 and that of the arrested security guard, Pinaki Bandyopadhyay, till July 4.

"The only two submissions the defence counsel made before the judge were a praver to remain present with his clients during police interrogation and a plea to visit the crime scene in police presence. While the judge rejected the second praver. I am not exactly sure about what he ruled about the first." he added.

The senior advocate said that while he had brought to the attention of the court that the medico-legal test results corroborated the allegations pressed by the victim during the first day of production of the suspects before the judge, he supplemented his submission on the second day by stating that the circumstantial and electronic evidence gathered by the police also corroborated her complaint.

Shimla, July 2: The death toll from cloudbursts and flash flood-related incidents in the Mandi district of Himachal Pradesh has risen to 11 with the recovery of six additional bodies. The search for 34 missing people is underway, officials said on Wednesday.

Meanwhile, the weather department has warned of low to moderate flash-flood risk in parts of five districts of Chamba, Kangra Kullu, Mandi and Shim-

la in the next 24 hours Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu, who visited the disaster-hit Syathi village of Laungani Panchayat in Dharampur, announced a special relief package to assist in rebuilding damaged homes. Additionally, enhanced compensation will be provided for lost livestock and destroyed cow shelters.

The state witnessed **11 cloudburst** incidents, four flash floods and a major landslide Tuesday, most of which occurred in Mandi district, disrupting normal life

Neri-Kotla in Jogindernagar. A total of 245 roads were

closed in the state following heavy rains, and 918 transformers and 683 water schemes were disrupted.

Most of the damage was caused in Mandi, where 151 roads were blocked for vehicular movement and 489 transformers and 465 water schemes were affected as of Wednesday

several INDIA bloc parties met the Election Commission over the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar and raised concerns over its timing, alleging that over two crore voters of the state may be disenfranchised by this mammoth exercise being done just ahead of Assembly elections.

The INDIA bloc parties have been vocal in their opposition to the Special Intensive Revision exercise that has already started in Bihar and is to be carried out in Assam, Kerala, Puducherry, Tamil Nadu and West Bengal which are going to the polls next year. Briefing the media after the meeting, Congress leader Abhishek Singhvi said a minimum of



two crore persons may be disenfranchised in this exercise as many, especially, the SCs, STs, migratory and impoverished, among the nearly eight crore voters in Bihar may not be in a position to present their and their parents' birth certificates to the poll authorities in such a short period. "We asked the EC that the last revision was in 2003, and for 22 vears after 4-5 elections have happened, were all those elections faulty or imperfect or unreliable. The SIR was held one year before general elections and two years before assembly elections," he said. Singhvi said that in a maximum period of one or two months, the EC is holding an electoral revision exercise

of the second most populated state in India, Bihar, which has roughly under eight crore voters. "This disenfranchisement, disempowerment is the worst attack on the basic structure of the Constitution. We gave universal adult suffrage in 1950. when so-called advanced countries like the USA and the UK got it only in 1924 and 1928.

"Today, every vote counts, even if you wrongfully delete or wrongfully add a single voter, it is creating a non-level playing field and that affects elections, that affects democracv. "Elections and democracy are part of the basic structure and it is said that even a constitutional amendment is unconstitutional if it affects the basic structure," he asserted. Singhvi asked, "How do you expect the very diverse voting population of Bihar, the backwards, the flood-affected, the poor and impoverished, the SC/ST, the unempowered or even the migrant to spend the next two months running from pillar to post to get the birth certificate of his own and his father/mother.

Additionally, 148 houses, 104 cattle sheds, 31 vehicles, 14 bridges and several roads were damaged. A total of 162 cattle perished in the events, while 370 people, including 316 in Mandi, were rescued and 11 remain stranded, the SEOC added.

Distraught locals recalled how they narrowly escaped after the entire village was swept away suddenly. They also informed the chief minister that they did not even have land left to pitch tents for shelter.

Sukhu, who also inspected the damage to the Mandi-Kotli road, assured that if any government land is available nearby, it will be allotted to those who lost their homes.

Rlys to prepare charts by 9 pm for early morning trains

New Delhi, July 2: The railways will prepare seat reservation charts at 9 pm for trains starting journeys between 5 am and 2 pm the next day, while for the rest, the list will be prepared eight hours in advance.

Since 2015, the first reservation charts have been prepared at least four hours before the scheduled departure of the train after the Railway Ministry, for the first time, framed norms in this matter.

According to the ministry,

the latest change has been made for passenger convenience.

"For the trains with departure between 0500 hours and 1400 hours, the first reservation chart will be prepared preferably by 21:00 of the previous day," the Railway Board directed all zones in a July 2

circular. For the trains with departure between 14:00 and 23:59 and 00:00 and 5:00, the first reservation chart will be prepared preferably eight hours in advance.



The circular instructed the zones to issue necessary instructions to all concerned accordingly, but did not mention any definite date of its implementation, nor did it mention any change in the preparation of the second reservation chart.

"Once the chart is ready eight hours before the train's departure, if seats/berths still remain vacant, passengers can book these under current booking facilities. The second chart is prepared 30 minutes to five minutes

before the train's departure, and this is mainly for passengers opting for tickets under the current booking," a railway official said.

Prior to 2015, there was no fixed time schedule for chart preparation, and zones were following varying norms. The Railway Board decided to standardise it to facilitate passengers to plan their journey well in time," an official said.

Asked the reason for increasing the time gap between chart preparation and the train's departure, officials said that although there was no feedback from the passengers to enhance the time gap, it was felt by the ministry to provide more time to passengers to plan their journey.

The Railway Board had also run a pilot project in the Bikaner Rail Division for preparing a reservation chart 24 hours in advance, and based on that experience, an eight-hour gap was finalised.

"If you know eight hours before whether your ticket is confirmed or not, it will remove uncertainty and help you plan your travel properly," officials said, adding that once a ticket is confirmed, passengers will lose a substantial chunk of the ticket amount as a penalty in case of cancellation.

According to the cancel lation policy, if a confirmed ticket is cancelled between 48 and 12 hours before departure. passengers will get back 25 per cent of the ticket amount.

"Seats or berths falling va cant due to cancellation will be filled up through the current booking system," an official said.











New Delhi, July 2: Water levels at 11 river monitoring stations across India have breached the warning level, but none have reached the danger or extreme flood thresholds, the Central Water Commission (CWC) said Wednesday.

This alert is part of the commission's daily flood bulletin released by the Central Flood Control Room. The bulletin indicates there are currently no sites in the "severe" or "extreme" flood situation categories, meaning that no location has reached or surpassed its danger mark or highest historical flood level.

However, 12 sites in Assam, Bihar, Odisha, Tamil Nadu, and Uttar Pradesh were flagged for "above-normal" flood situations, where water levels have crossed the warning threshold but remain below danger levels. In Assam, the Kushiyara Riv-

er in Karimganj and the Brahmaputra at Neamatighat in Jorhat are among those nearing concern levels. Bihar remains under observation, with elevated water levels in the Kosi at Baltara, Bagmati at Benibad, and Gandak at Dumariaghat.

Uttar Pradesh is closely monitoring four sites, including the Ganga at Fatehgarh and Kachhla Bridge, Ghagra

Centre launches unified flood forecasting system

New Delhi: Union Jal Shakti Minister C R Patil Wednesday launched C-FLOOD, a web-based flood forecasting system, designed to sound an alarm at the village level up to two days in advance. The system has been developed by the Central Water Commission (CWC), the Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC), and the National Remote Sensing Centre (NRSC). It has been made operational under the National Supercomputing Mission (NSM), jointly steered by the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY) and the Department of

Bridge and Rajghat on the Subarnarekha, both in Baleshwar district. In Tamil Nadu, water levels at Musiri on the Cauvery River also crossed the warning level. In terms of reservoir and barrage inflows, the

CWC issued inflow forecasts for 23 sites across 10 states, including Andhra Pradesh, Jharkhand, Karnataka, Odisha, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, and West Bengal. The majority of Karnataka's major reservoirs, including Almatti, Narayanapur, and Tungabhadra, are experiencing rising or steady trends with high inflow volumes

Bangalore/Chikkaballapura, July 2: Siddaramaiah Wednesday asserted that he will be the Chief Minister of Karnataka for a full five-year term, following which a reconciled D K Shivakumar, said he will support him as he has "no option", indicating a truce between the two for the time being.

Shivakumar also said he will fulfill the directions of the Congress high command. The remarks by both the leaders came even as Congress General Secretary in-charge of Karnataka, Randeep Singh Surjewala, continued his one-on-one meetings with the party MLAs for the third consecutive day in the wake of internal bickering in the party's state unit over the Chief Minister's position.

Responding to a question about whether Surjewala's meetings will bring down disgruntlement

in the party, Shivakumar said: "There is no disgruntlement in the party. He (Surjewala) is fixing accountability on matters related to the party and the organisation and how to prepare for elections from now itself." Earlier in Chikkaballapura, Siddaramaiah said the Congress party was united and the party's government will be in power "solid as a rock" for five years. "Yes, I will be. Why do you have doubts?" Siddaramaiah said in response to a question by reporters whether he will be the chief minister for five years. Asked about



the chief minister's statement, Shivakumar responded: "What option do I have? I have to stand by him, support him (Siddaramaiah). I don't have any objection to it. Whatever the party high command tells and whatever it desires, it will be fulfilled." There has been speculation within political circles, especially within the ruling Congress, about the Chief Minister change later this year, with some of the Shivakumar supporters pushing for his elevation, citing a power-sharing agreement involving Siddara-

maiah and Shivakumar. There was stiff competition between Siddaramaiah and Shivakumar for the Chief Minister's post after the declaration of Assembly election results in May 2023, and the Congress had managed to convince the latter and made him the Deputy CM. There were some reports at the time that a compromise

had been reached based on a "rotational chief minister formula," according to which Shivakumar will become the chief minister after two-and-a-half years, but there was no official confirmation by the party.



PARL SECURITY BREACH HC grants bail to Neelam Azad, **Mahesh Kumawat**

New Delhi, July 2: The Delhi High Court Wednesday granted bail to two accused in the 2023 Parliament security breach case, saying their protest was not a terrorist act as it was more symbolic and an act of "political dissent".

A bench of Justices Subramonium Prasad and Harish Vaidyanathan Shankar granted the reprieve to Neelam Azad and Mahesh Kumawat on a personal bond of ₹50.000 each and two sureties, while forbidding them from talking about the incident to the press or on social media.

The bench also noted that while Kumawat was not in Delhi at the time of the offence. Azad was not inside the Parliament building. The bench passed the order while noting that Azad and some other accused chose the Parliament to raise their voice.

"The Parliament represents the very basis of our Democracy. It cannot be said that what the accused have done is a legit imate form of protest or demonstration. At the same time, the Appellants have not propagated any movement which can be said to be against the interest of the nation. The activities of the appellants are of the nature of propagation of ideological messages and in the opinion of this court prima facie do not constitute a terrorist act," the bench said.

It further said that the protest was "more symbolic rather than giving apprehension of substantial threat or having been done with terrorist intent. This case at this juncture appears to be a case of protest and political dissent. Even though the choice and the place of the protest is highly deprecable, it cannot be said that ingredients of UAPA are attracted while considering the issue of grant of bail".

The bench also said that had the smoke canisters, used by the accused, generated any substance which can cause death or serious injury, they would not be freely available in the market.

"This court can take judi cial notice that such canisters are used in IPL games, cricket matches, and in various events and festivals like weddings. parties, Holi etc. The use of canisters which emitted yellow smoke alone does not raise a prima facie case against the appellants and as to whether those

canisters could have acted as

According to police, the incident occurred on Monday morning when the woman noticed a suspicious reflection and movement from an adjacent cubicle while using the washroom. Moments later, she alleged that Mali was standing on a commode in the next cubicle, filming her with his mobile phone, in her complaint. Shocked, she rushed out screaming and alerted her colleagues. The accused, who tried to flee, was caught by HR staff. On checking his phone, HR personnel found a video of the victim and another secretly recorded video of a different woman employee.

T'gana pharma plant explosion: Toll rises to 38, govt says still 11 missing

Hyderabad: The death toll from the explosion at the Sigachi Industries' plant in Pashamylaram has risen to 38 on Wednesday even as the company announced a ₹1 crore compensation amid allegation of usage of outdated machinery in the unit. State Health Minister C Damodar Rajanarasimha, who has been supervising rescue operations at the accident site, said that 11 people were still missing. Although most of the debris has been cleared, no human remains have been found, the minister further said. Sangareddy District Superintendent of Police Paritosh Pankaj told PTI that the toll rose to 38. In a regulatory filing with bourses, Sigachi said the deadly explosion in its plant has killed 40 persons. However hours after the filing, Amit Raj Sinha, Managing Director & CEO of Sigachi told media persons "there seems to be some over calculation. I believe right now the death toll is at 38".

New Delhi, July 2: In the wake of Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah linking heart-related deaths in Hassan district to Covid vaccine, the Union Health Ministry Wednesday said extensive studies by IC-MR and AIIMS have conclusively established no linkages between coronavirus vaccines and sudden deaths.

Siddaramaiah had Tuesdav said "hasty approval and distribution" of the Covid vaccine to the public could also be a reason for these deaths.

He urged everyone to visit the nearest health centre immediately for a check-up if they

have symptoms such as chest pain or difficulty breathing, and not to ignore these signs.

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The ministry said the matter of sudden unexplained deaths has been investigated through several agencies in the country and these studies have conclusively established that there is no direct link between COVID-19 vaccination and reports of sudden deaths. Studies by the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) and National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) affirm that COVID-19 vaccines in India are safe and effective, with extremely rare instances of serious side effects, it said.

Sudden cardiac deaths can



result from a wide range of factors, including genetics, lifestyle, pre-existing conditions, and post-Covid complications,

sudden unexplained deaths, especially in young adults between the ages of 18 and 45 years. To explore this, two complementary studies were undertaken using different research approaches -- one based on past data and another involving real-time investigation.

The first study conducted by ICMR's National Institute of Epidemiology (NIE) was titled 'Factors associated with unexplained sudden deaths among adults aged 18-45 years in India a multi-centric matched case control study.

This study was carried out from May to August 2023 across 47 tertiary care hospitals in 19 states and Union territories, the

statement said. It looked at individuals who appeared to be healthy but died suddenly between October 2021 and March 2023. The findings have conclusively showed that COVID-19 vaccination does not increase the risk of unex plained sudden deaths in young adults. The second study titled "Establishing the cause in sudden unexplained deaths in voung" is currently being con ducted by the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) New Delhi with funding and in collaboration with ICMR This is a prospective study aimed at determining the common causes of sudden deaths in young adults.

Cairo, July 2: Word from US President Donald Trump that Israel has agreed to the conditions needed to finalise a 60-day ceasefire in Gaza raised hopes Wednesday in the enclave, where health officials said at least 20 people had been killed in Israeli attacks.

A "final" proposal would be delivered by the mediators, Qatar and Egypt, to Hamas, Trump said in a social media post Tuesday, after what he described as a "long and productive" meeting between his representatives and Israeli officials.

Gazans said even a temporary pause would bring relief. "I hope it would work this time, even if for two months, it would save thousands of innocent lives," Kamal, a resident of Gaza City, said by phone.

Israeli Foreign Minister Gideon Saar wrote on X Wednesday that a majority within the coalition government would back an agreement that would see the release of the remaining hostages held by Hamas militants in Gaza.

"If there is an opportunity to essary conditions to finalize do so - we must not miss it!", he the 60 Day CEASEFIRE, during wrote on X. Of 50 hostages still which time we will work with held, around 20 are believed to all parties to end the War,"

The US president appeared to be seeking to use any momentum from US and Israeli strikes on nuclear sites in Iran and a recently agreed ceasefire in that conflict to put pressure on Hamas, which is backed by Tehran. Israeli leaders also be lieve that, with Iran weakened by last month's 12-day war, other countries in the region have an opportunity to forge ties with Israel.

A Hamas official declined immediate comment on Trump's statement. A source close to the group said leaders of the Islamist faction were expected to debate the proposal and seek clarifications from mediators before giving an official response.

At the end of May, Hamas had said it was seeking amendments to a US-backed ceasefire proposal, which Trump's envoy Steve Witkoff said was "totally unacceptable.

That proposal had involved a 60-day ceasefire and the release of half the hostages held by Hamas in exchange for Palestinian prisoners and the remains of other Palestinians; Hamas would release the remaining hostages as part of a deal that guarantees the end of the war.

The war began when Hamas fighters stormed into Israel October 7, 2023, killed 1,200 people, most of them civilians, and took 251 hostages back to Gaza in a surprise attack that led to Israel's single deadliest day

Israel's subsequent military assault has killed more than 56,000 Palestinians, most of them civilians, according to the Gaza health ministry, displaced almost the whole 2.3 million population and plunged the enclave into a humanitarian crisis.

Iran suspends cooperation with IAEA

Dubai, July 2: Iran's president Wednesday ordered the country to suspend its cooperation with the International Atomic Energy Agency after American and Israeli airstrikes hit its most-important nuclear facilities, likely further limiting inspectors' ability to track Tehran's programme that had been enriching uranium to near weapons-grade levels. The order by President Masoud Pezeshkian included no timetables or details about what that suspension would entail. Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi signalled in a CBS News interview that Tehran still would be willing to continue negotiations with the United States. "I don't think negotiations will restart as quickly as that." Araghchi said, referring to Trump's comments that talks could start as early as this week. However, he added: "The doors of diploma-

"This is a complete renunciation of all its international nuclear obligations and nuclear deal with world powers if one of its Western parties de clares the Islamic Republic is out of compliance with it.

Israel is widely believed to be the only nuclear-armed state in the Middle East, and the IAEA doesn't have access to its weap ons-related facilities.

Iran's move so far stops short of what experts feared the most. They had been concerned that Tehran, in response to the war could decide to fully end its co operation with the IAEA, aban don the Nuclear Nonprolifera tion Treaty and rush toward a bomb. That treaty has countries agree not to build or obtain nu clear weapons and allows the IAEA to conduct inspections to verify that countries correctly declared their programmes.



This move brings relief to bike taxi operators like Rapido and Uber. Uber lauded the guidelines as a "forwardlooking step toward fostering innovation and regulatory clarity." Rapido specifically welcomed the operationalisation of Clause 23 of the MVAG 2025. This clause permits the aggregation of non-transport motorcycles for passenger journeys, a move Rapido described as a "milestone in India's journey towards a Viksit Bharat".

Mumbai, July 2: India's HDB Financial Services jumped more than 13% in its trading debut Wednesday, notching the non-bank lender a valuation of \$8.2 billion at day's high, as investors bet on long-term growth prospects in the world's most populous country.

HDB's \$1.5 billion IPO is the largest in India this year so far and also the biggest ever by a non-bank lender. The stock rose to as much as 849.85 rupees in Mumbai compared with its offer price of 740 rupees. The shares were last trading at 833.55 rupees while India's benchmark Nifty 50 index was marginally down.

The firm, a unit of India's top private lender HDFC Bank

gives out personal, home, vehicle and gold loans, among other offerings. It had targeted a valuation of \$7.1 billion. Demand at the IPO was boosted by qualified institutional buvers such not exceeding Rs 100, shall be imposed on the driver, if the cancellation is made without a reason identified as valid by the aggregator.

The guidelines said the Central government shall develop and designate a portal to enable for single-window clearance of application for licence as aggregator. Aggregators have been mandated to ensure that drivers have health and term insurance of at least Rs 5 lakh and Rs 10 lakh respectively

The guidelines also specified that a Grievance Officer shall be appointed by the aggregator.

"An aggregator shall not onboard vehicles which have been registered for more than a period of eight years from the date of initial registration of the vehicle and shall ensure that all vehicles onboarded by it should not have exceeded eight years since the date of initial registration of the vehicle," as per the guidelines.

New Delhi, July 2: State Bank of India has decided to classify the loan account of beleaguered telecom firm Reliance Communications as "fraud" and to report the name of its erstwhile director -- Anil Ambani to the Reserve Bank of India (RBI). according to a regulatory filing. **Reliance** Communications in a regulatory filing said that it has received a letter dated June

23, 2025 from the State Bank of India (SBI) to this effect. According to the filing, Reliance Communications (RCom) and its subsidiaries received

a total loan of Rs 31,580 crore from banks. The Fraud Identification Committee of the bank has found deviation in utilization of the loans involving complex web of fund movements across multiple group entities.

The letter marked to Reliance Communications and its erstwhile director Anil Ambani stated that SBI has decided to report the loan account of the company as "fraud" and to report the name of Anil Ambani to the RBI, as per the extant RBI guidelines, the filing said.

RCom is at present going through a liquidation process. The committee found that out of the total loan. Rs 13.667.73 crore, about 44 per cent, was utilized for the repayment of loans and other obligations.

An amount of Rs 12,692.31 crore, 41 per cent of total loan, was utilized to pay connected parties.

53% of Indian firms' paid ransom to recover data from cyberattacks

New Delhi, July 2: UK-based cybersecurity firm Sophos Wednesday claimed that 53 per cent of Indian companies that faced ransomware attacks in 2024 paid the hackers to get their data back.

According to the State of Ransomware in India 2025 report. the median payout towards ransom was \$481,636 (about Rs 4 crore), down 79 per cent from the previous year.

The findings are based on a survey commissioned by Sophos and conducted during January-March 2025. As many as 378 Indian IT and cybersecurity firms affected by a ransomware attack were part of the study. However, the survey did not

name any companies which fell prey to cyberattacks and paid



the ransom for recovery of data.

"The median ransom demand fell by 52 per cent, from \$2 million to \$961,289, while the median payment dropped even more sharply by 79 per cent to \$481,636," the report said.

Even though companies are paying less ransom, they spend a lot of money fixing the damage caused by these attacks. On average, Indian companies spend about \$1.01 million on recovery costs, excluding the ransom money, the report said.

The most common technical causes of ransomware attacks were exploited vulnerabilities (29 per cent), compromised credentials (22 per cent), and malicious emails (21 per cent).

Operational challenges such as lack of skilled personnel, poor-quality protection, and insufficient cybersecurity products were cited by around 40 per cent of respondents as contributing factors to ransomware victimization.

India's tyre export rises

New Delhi, July 2: Tyre exports from India grew 9 per cent year-on-year to Rs 25,051 crore in FY25 despite head winds, including trade policy uncertainties and global sup ply chain disruptions, the Au tomotive Tyre Manufacturers Association said Wednesday

With nearly 40 per cent of the industry's natural rubber (NR) requirement met through imports due to limit ed domestic availability, the Automotive Tyre Manufactur ers Association (ATMA) said there is an urgent need to ac celerate domestic production through focused interventions to meet rising demand.

India's tyre exports in 2024-25 increased by 9 per cent year-on-year, reaching Rs 25,051 crore compared to Rs 23,073 crore in the previous fiscal, ATMA said, citing data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

With an estimated annual turnover of Rs 1 lakh crore and exports exceeding Rs 25,000 crore, the Indian tyre industry stands out as one of the few manufacturing sectors in the country with a high export-to-turnover ratio it added.

'The tyre industry has exhibited remarkable resilience and growth post the COVID-19 downturn. Over the past 3-4 years, tyre manufacturers have invested approximately Rs 27,000 crore across green field and brownfield projects, underscoring their strong be lief in India's economic trajec-tory," ATMA Chairman Arun Mammen said.







Gill's hard-fought ton

Birmingham, July 2: Shubman Gill was at his determined best to hit a hardfought seventh Test hundred - his second as India's captain - as the visitors' reached 310/5 in 85 overs at stumps on day one of second Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy Test against England at Edgbaston Wednesday. Under sunny blue sky,

Gill, coming after making 147 in Headingley, showed immense responsibility as well as patience and played like someone ex-

tremely determined to grind it out to be unbeaten on 114 off 216 deliveries, laced with 12 boundaries. During his unbeaten

knock, which is his fourth Test hundred against England, Gill has become just the second Indian captain af-

ter Mohammad Azharuddin to score hundreds in consecutive Tests in England.

He is also the third India captain with hundreds in consecutive Tests against England, after Azharuddin (Lord's and Old Trafford in 1990) and Vijay Hazare (Delhi and Brabourne in 1951/52). After Yashasvi Jaiswal hit an enterprising 87, Gill and Ravindra Jadeja, who ended the day

on 41 not out, shared an unbroken 99-run stand for the sixth wicket and helped India recover well from 211/5.

Brydon Carse, Ben Stokes and Shoaib Bashir all claimed one apiece. The final session began sedately, before a ball change was made due to it being stuck in the gauge. Gill then used his feet nicely to take a four each off Woakes and Bashir – second of which got him his fifty in 125 balls.

While Jadeja took boundaries off Bashir and Tongue, Gill cut off the pacer for four, before sweeping on consecutive deliveries off Joe Root to bring up his seventh Test hundred off 199 deliveries, with a trademark roar and gentle bow. After the second new ball was taken, Gill and Jadeia got a boundary each before a solid day of Test cricket came to an end.

Alcaraz ends Tarvet's adventure, Sabalenka avoids upset

London, July 2: Carlos Alcaraz spoiled Oliver Tarvet's Wimbledon adventure as the defending champion moved into the third round with a 6-1, 6-4, 6-4 win over the British amateur Wednesday after Arvna Sabalenka stemmed the tide of shock exits.

A record-breaking number of seeds crashed out at the All England Club in the first round, but Alcaraz and women's world number one Sabalenka avoided seismic shocks on Centre Court. Second-seeded Alcaraz needed two hours and 17 minutes to subdue world number 733 Tarvet, who produced flashes of his emerging talent to delight the partisan crowd.

"First of all I have to give big praise to Oliver. In his second match on the tour. I just loved his game to be honest," Alcaraz said. "I knew I had to play my best tennis. I was really happy with my performance but big praise to him as well." Alcaraz has won his



past 20 matches since losing to Holger Rune in the Barcelona final in April, a blistering streak that has brought him titles at the Rome Masters, the French Open and Queen's Club.

The 22-year-old Spaniard, who fought back from two sets down to beat Jannik Sinner on clav in an epic final at Roland Garros last month, has won 31 of his 34 Tour-level matches on grass.

His last defeat at Wimbledon came against Sinner in the fourth round in 2022.

Having vanquished Novak Djokovic in the past two Wimbledon finals, Alcaraz is looking to join an elite group of Wimbledon icons.

The world number two hopes to become the fifth man in the Open Era to win at least three consecutive Wimbledon titles after seven-time champion Djokovic, Bjorn Borg, Roger Federer and Pete Sampras.
