Mumbai: Kangana Ranaut is known to highlight her views on some social issues and strived for women empowerment.

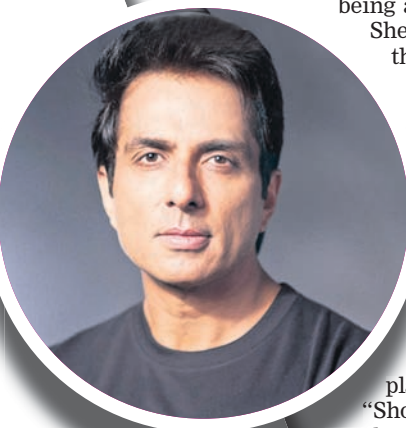

Robust monitoring, evaluation needed for THR scheme: CM

Bhubaneswar, August 16: A robust monitoring and evaluation system is needed to ensure the effective implementation of the Take-Home-Ration (THR) scheme, aimed at preventing malnutrition in the state, Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi said here Saturday.

Reviewing various programmes of the Women and Child Development (W&CD) department at Lok Seva Bhawan, Majhi stressed the need for major improvements in the entire process—from preparation of food to packaging and distribution.

To combat malnutrition, the state is implementing

several initiatives, including the Supplementary Nutrition Programme (SNP), the Adolescent Nutrition Scheme, and the Chief Minister’s Sampurna Pushti Yojana.

Under the THR scheme, chhatua (a fortified food mix) is produced and distributed by 546 self-help groups across Odisha. Currently, 43,92,700 beneficiaries are receiving chhatua and other nutritional supplements under different schemes, an official of W&CD department said.

Highlighting that the health of women and children is crucial for the state’s development, the Chief Minister said these schemes must not be neglected under any circum-

stances.

“In a bid to ensure the effective implementation of the THR scheme in Odisha, a robust monitoring and evaluation system is the need of the hour,” Majhi said.

Majhi further directed officials to ensure the construction of Anganwadi centres in areas where they lack permanent buildings, with land acquisition if necessary.

He also directed to expand the coverage of the Chief Minister’s Sampurna Pushti Yojana, complete 100 per cent construction of Anganwadi centres in DMF districts with necessary funds to be allocated from the respective resources.

CUO-COATS pact to boost tribal research, devpt

Bhubaneswar, August 16: The Central University of Odisha (CUO), Koraput and the Council of Analytical Tribal Studies (COATS) have inked a pact to collaborate on research and development initiatives, and academic exchanges focusing on tribal communities mostly living in state’s schedule areas, particularly the erstwhile Koraput, Bolangir and Kalahandi (KBK) districts, officials said Saturday.

The pact, which will remain effective for the next three years and may be renewed for another three years with mutual consent, was signed by CUO acting VC NC Panda and COATS Director PC Mohapatro here.

Speaking at the event, Panda emphasised the importance of the partnership in advancing social science research with a special focus on tribal studies.

He further highlighted the need to preserve the culture and traditions of tribal communities while working towards improving their economic conditions. “This collaboration aims to foster research that enhances education, economy, and cultural standards among tribal populations. The MoU is timely and essential as it will enable both institutions to jointly contribute to the development and welfare of tribal life and livelihood in the Koraput region,” he said.

The partnership signifies a strong commitment to addressing the challenges faced by marginalised tribal groups through focused research and development efforts, CUO officials said.

Fresh low-pressure area likely around August 18

Bhubaneswar, August 16: A fresh low-pressure area is expected to develop over the northwest and adjoining west-central Bay of Bengal around August 18 and under its influence, heavy to very heavy rainfall, accompanied with thunderstorms and lightning, is very likely in several districts of Odisha August 18 and 19, the India Meteorological Department (IMD) said Saturday.

“Due to the formation of a low-pressure area, there is a possibility of heavy to very heavy rainfall, along with thunderstorms and lightning, in various districts of Odisha between August 18 and 19,” the regional centre of the IMD said.

The existing low-pressure system over south Odisha and adjoining north Andhra Pradesh has now moved to south Chhattisgarh and its neighbourhood. The associated upper-air cyclonic circulation extends up to 7.6km above mean sea level and tilts south-westwards with height, it said.

It is expected to move west-northwestwards, gradually weaken, and reach Gujarat around the morning of August 18 as a remnant cyclonic circulation, the weatherman said.

The IMD has already issued yellow and orange alerts for many districts in Odisha for the five days beginning Saturday.

The sea condition is expected to remain rough to very rough along and off the south Odisha coast, the west-central Bay, and the northwest Bay of Bengal between August 18

RAIN BATTERS LIFE

Normal life was affected in parts of Odisha, particularly in the southern districts of Koraput and Malkangiri, due to low pressure-induced heavy rain leading to landslides and submergence of major roads, officials said Saturday.

Rainwater was flowing around three feet above a bridge on NH 326 in MV-96 village in Malkangiri district, snapping vehicular movement between Malkangiri, Motu, and Jeypore.

Interstate vehicular movement between Odisha, Andhra Pradesh and Chhattisgarh was also severely affected as rainwater was flowing on the NH, a Revenue department official said, adding that trucks carrying

essential items were stranded.

Koraput received 26.7mm of rainfall in the last 24 hours till 8.30am Saturday, triggering landslides on hilly roads. A landslide blocked the Baijaghati-Kerenga hill road, disrupting connectivity between Damanjodi and Narayanpatna areas, officials said.

The landslide occurred early on Saturday and efforts were underway to clear the road, they said. In last 24 hours, Koraput, Nuapada, Jajpur, Kendrapara and Cuttack districts received excess rainfall while more than normal downpour was recorded in Puri, Khurda, Nayagarh and Bolangir districts, they added.

Squally winds with speeds of 40-50 kmph, gusting up to 60 kmph, are likely along and off the

south Odisha coast, the west-central Bay, and the northwest Bay of Bengal.

Heavy rainfall accompanied by thunderstorms, lightning, and gusty surface winds of 30-40 kmph is also likely at one or two places in several districts of the state, the regional centre of the IMD said.

Over 57% Odisha Yatri users women

Bhubaneswar, August 16: Over 57 per cent of Odisha Yatri users between October 2024 and July 2025 were women, reflecting a confidence in Odisha’s public transport ecosystem, official sources said Saturday.

The app, launched by Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi in January 2025, began its pilot operations in October 2024.

According to the data, month-on-month usage trends reveal a steady female preference, peaking at 61.63 per cent in January 2025. Even in the latest data for

July 2025, women accounted for 55.38 per cent of users, significantly surpassing male ridership.

“Of the 2.57 lakh passengers who used the platform between October 2024 and July 2025, more than 1.48 lakh (a little over 57 per cent) were female users—a remarkable indicator of enhanced accessibility, safety, and gender inclusion in the state’s mobility landscape,” according to state government data. Transport officials attribute this shift to a combination of factors, including verified drivers, real-time trip tracking, improved last-mile connectivity, and a robust grievance redressal

system. The app’s integration with enforcement and transport authorities has created a safe and accountable commuting experience, especially for women and other vulnerable groups.

“The data speaks for itself — women are not just participating; they are leading the adoption of Odisha Yatri. This reflects the government’s strong commitment to gender-responsive, inclusive transport,” said Commerce and Transport department Principal Secretary Usha Padhee.

Further strengthening its community-oriented approach, Odisha Yatri, in collaboration with

the State Transport Authority, provided free auto rides to over 30,000 pilgrims during this year’s Rath Yatra in Puri.

Looking ahead, plans are underway to expand Odisha Yatri to more cities across the state and introduce ambulance and boating services under the platform, ensuring wider reach and impact, Transport department sources said.

Notably, Odisha Yatri is a state government-backed, zero-commission ride-hailing app designed to offer affordable and reliable transportation options in Odisha.

‘Aasa School Jiba’ to prevent school dropouts

Bhubaneswar: The School and Mass Education (S&ME) department has launched a state-wide initiative titled ‘Aasa School Jiba’ (Let us go to school) to curb the problem of school dropouts during the 2025-26 academic year. As part of the campaign, special meetings involving parents, teachers, and school management & development committees (SMDCs) were held across the state. The meetings aimed to reintegrate out-of-school children into the mainstream education system, ensure enrolment in age-appropriate classes, and prevent students from discontinuing their studies. Preventive measures to overcome challenges hindering children’s education were also discussed. During the sessions, parents took a ‘group pledge’ to cooperate with schools, ensure that no child is excluded from the education system, and contribute to building a safe, inclusive, and joyful learning environment that upholds every child’s right to education. Senior officials of the S&ME department attended the meetings in various districts, monitoring the process and extending necessary guidance and support.

Phulbani: A former headmaster of a primary school in Kandhamal district has been sentenced to four years of rigorous imprisonment (RI) and fined ₹50,000 for misappropriating government money. The Special Vigilance Judge, Phulbani, Saturday sentenced Subash Chandra Nayak, former headmaster-cum-secretary of Rangapaju UP School under Tumudibandha block in Kandhamal, to undergo four years of rigorous imprisonment and pay a fine of ₹50,000. Nayak was chargedsheeted by Odisha Vigilance under Section 13(2) read with 13(1)(c)(d) of the PC Act, 1988, and Section 409 IPC for misappropriating government funds meant for constructing a classroom in the school. He was taken into judicial custody to serve his sentence. Following the conviction, Odisha Vigilance has announced that it will move the competent authority for Nayak's dismissal from service. The former headmaster had been absconding from the school after committing the offence.

roeconomic frameworks.

The problem is structural. Existing macro-fiscal tools – such as the debt-sustainability frameworks used by the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank, and, by extension, sovereign credit ratings– account for climate- and nature-related risks but do not sufficiently recognize the economic benefits of reducing those risks. Natural disasters – climate-related or otherwise –are (rightly) treated as threats to fiscal stability. But the investments required to mitigate their effects are seen only as adding to the debt burden, rather than as critical for reducing losses or as driving the development of growth-enhancing strategic assets. For example, investments in flood-resilient infrastructure in Vietnam have not only reduced damage costs but also boosted land values, improved public health, and increased worker productivity. And investments in nature-based solutions such as restoring mangroves or wetlands can simultaneously address climate, food, and water challenges, and boost infrastructure performance.

As a result, high-impact interventions such as coastal defenses, underground power

lines, and mangrove restoration are sidelined in favour of more conventional infrastructure projects like roads, bridges, and ports. These perverse incentives are reflected in EMDEs' planning and budgeting processes. The environment ministries that oversee Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs) under the Paris climate agreement tend not to engage systematically with finance ministries, meaning that these resilience strategies are not fully integrated into medium- and long-term national financial planning. That leaves NDCs and NAPs at risk of being aspirational, rather than actionable.

With critical adaptation investments overlooked in budgets, and with insufficient volumes of grant or concessional finance to plug ensuing gaps, many are calling for changes in how debt is treated, including reforms of fiscal frameworks so that investments in climate and nature resilience are treated as productive. A recent paper by the Bridgetown Initiative outlines four steps that governments can take to achieve this goal.

First, EMDEs must quantify acute and chronic climate and nature risks. A better under-

standing of the potential macro-economic effects can help guide assessments of the financing required to reduce those risks. The paper offers a new typology to help categorize investments by risk type and sector, which would streamline the process.

Once policymakers have identified which investments are needed, they must assess their impact on the economy's growth trajectory. Spending on resilience measures can reduce future losses from climate disasters, boost productivity, and raise incomes. These benefits must be incorporated into forecasting models, as is already done for traditional infrastructure investments.

Factoring climate resilience into macroeconomic planning should strengthen, not diminish, a country's growth narrative. When done well, this empowers finance ministries to engage more effectively with donors, credit-rating agencies, markets, and international financial institutions, all of which play a critical direct or indirect role in supporting resilience and adaptation efforts.

With the IMF and the World Bank reviewing their Debt Sustainability Framework for Low-Income Countries, this is an opportune time for EMDEs to update their methodologies to reflect the benefits of adaptation measures. Climate and nature shocks are now an economic reality, not a distant threat. Building resilience to these shocks will form the foundation of sustainable development and fiscal stability for years to come.

A COHESIVE EU IS BETTER POSITIONED TO SAFEGUARD MARITIME ROUTES CRITICAL FOR INDIA'S TRADE AND ENERGY FLOWS

In 2024, global military expenditure surpassed \$2.4 trillion, according to SIPRI (Stockholm International Peace Research Institute), an all-time high. Asia, home to some of the world's fastest-growing economies, also saw defence budgets expand. India, China, Japan, and South Korea have been modernising their armed forces, investing in conventional capabilities alongside cyber, space, and AI-based systems to meet both regional and global challenges.

This surge is driven not only by regional rivalries but also by a shifting global order, with the post-Cold War security architecture under strain. From the Indo-Pacific to Eastern Europe, nations are preparing for a world where deterrence, resilience, and alliances matter more than ever.

While India has strengthened its maritime presence to protect the Indian Ocean sea lanes, Europe faces its largest land war since 1945. Russia's invasion of Ukraine reshaped the EU's security posture – and Poland, on NATO's eastern flank, has emerged as a determined advocate for collective defence and credible deterrence. It did so, while holding the rotating presidency of Council of European Union from January to

June 2025.

Although the presidency's core role is coordinating policy making, Warsaw placed security at the heart of its agenda. Moreso, as its tenure came at a crucial moment: when the Eastern borders remained tense amid Russia's aggression in Ukraine; Hybrid threats, from cyberattacks to disinformation, were intensifying; Transatlantic cohesion faced challenges, while global partners assessed Europe's long-term security commitments.

Given its history, from partitions and invasions to the Cold War, Poland launched its flagship EU presidency initiative: the SAFE (Security and Allied Foreign Engagement)Project –aimed at strengthening Europe's defences while engaging partners beyond the continent.

SAFE, sought to improve the EU's ability to counter emerging threats through four pillars. One, EU–NATO Synergy i.e. aligning the EU's common security and defence policy with NATO planning so that both institutions reinforce each other. Two, Cyber resilience, whereby creating a pan-European cyber shield integrating national CERTs with AI-driven threat detection to counter large-scale attacks in real time. Three, defence industrial boost,

i.e. coordinating investment in Europe's defence manufacturing, from missile systems to drones, to reduce dependence on external suppliers and ensure rapid mobilisation. And four, ensuring global partnerships beyond Europe by expanding security dialogues with strategic partners such as India, Japan, and ASEAN to build collective resilience.

For Indian readers, Europe's security debates may seem distant, yet the dynamics are interconnected. There are shared challenges in hybrid warfare, wherein India and Europe face cyber intrusions, propaganda campaigns, and economic coercion. SAFE's cyber framework could inform Indo-European initiatives to protect democratic institutions and critical infrastructure.

At same time, it involves defence industrial cooperation. Poland's push for a stronger European defence industry aligns with India's Atmanirbhar Bharat vision. Joint ventures could develop drones, missile defence, and AI-based command systems for both continental and maritime applications.

Besides, there is the aspect of geopolitical connectivity. Stability on Europe's eastern flank affects NATO's Indo-Pa-

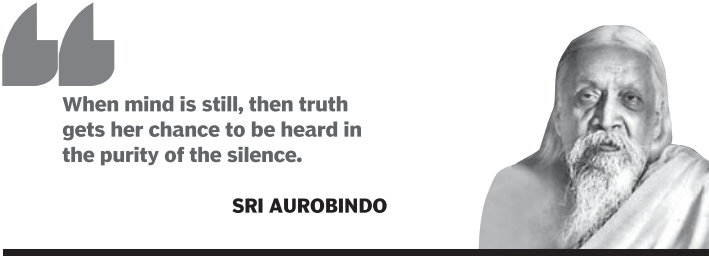
cific posture. A cohesive EU is better positioned to safeguard maritime routes critical for India's trade and energy flows.

Though SAFE is an EU initiative, New Delhi should welcome it as it opens paths for deeper India-Poland cooperation. SAFE is built on the idea that security is indivisible. A crisis in one region inevitably sends ripples worldwide. COVID-19, supply chain disruptions, and Europe's energy crisis after Russia's invasion of Ukraine, all proved the global nature of modern security challenges.

India's ambition to serve as a security provider – from humanitarian aid to maritime policing – aligns with Europe's goal of becoming a more capable strategic actor. SAFE offers both sides a framework to strengthen their own security while contributing to the global commons. In fact, for mid-sized powers like India and Poland, coalition-building is a strategic multiplier. SAFE can unite countries with shared democratic values, complementary economies, and converging priorities.

Freedom Under Siege

We celebrated Independence Day this month, the culmination of our freedom struggle. Independence and freedom from what? From alien rule and from oppressive laws — no matter who imposes them on us? The governor of Maharashtra, CP Radhakrishnan, is currently examining a legislation passed by the state called the 'Maharashtra Special Public Security Bill'.

I have written to the governor, on behalf of Amnesty International India, and asked him to not sign it and instead to deny his assent.

Framed as a countermeasure against those who have come to be called “urban naxals,” the Bill threatens constitutionally and internationally protected human rights. Naxalism is seen as a decades-old rural and communist-inspired movement. “Urban naxalism” in the present discussion presumably refers to alleged support for this movement by intellectuals, academics and others. The term “urban naxalism” has no legal definition in Indian law. With its vague language, discriminatory focus, absence of judicial oversight, and high potential for misuse, the Bill risks criminalizing legitimate dissent in one of our largest states.

The Bill introduces vague, overboard, and ideologically biased provisions that pose an immediate threat to international and constitutionally protected rights and will criminalize dissent in the state.

As may be expected, Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis has asserted that the law will not be used to suppress government critics. However, if the term “urban naxalism” has no legal definition in India, then what is it? It is a rhetorical and politically charged phrase – popularized in media and political discourse, not jurisprudence. Its very vagueness allows it to be weaponized against civil society, often conflating peaceful dissent with sedition or terrorism. There is a troubling precedent. The Bhima Koregaon case, in which 16 activists were arrested under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act UAPA, demonstrates how this label has been used to detain individuals for years without trial. Many of those accused were not linked to any act of violence, but merely to the expression of critical views, advocacy for marginalized communities, or the defense of civil liberties.

Notably, the arrests began in 2018 during Fadnavis' earlier tenure as chief minister. Seven years later, trials have yet to commence, bail remains denied to six of the activists, and one of the accused, Father Stan Swamy, died in custody.

The urban naxal narrative has dangerously blurred the line between non-violent political opposition and violent extremism. Such conflation is not only incompatible with India's constitutional values but also violates its international legal obligations.

The law has other troubling elements, such as discrimination. Its opening paragraphs identify “Left Wing Extremist organizations or similar organizations” as its focus. This singles out ideologies for criminalization and violates Article 26 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, which guarantees equal protection under the law regardless of political opinion, and which India is a signatory to.

Punishing membership to an organization solely based on ideas without proof of incitement of or participation in violence is also violative of Indians' rights.

The law defines “unlawful activity” using imprecise and subjective terms such as “menace to public order” or “tendency to interfere with the administration of law.” These definitions could encompass peaceful protest or civil disobedience, the foundational elements of our freedom struggle.

Section 3 empowers the executive to declare organizations “unlawful,” with no provision for prompt and impartial judicial review. The Advisory Board tasked with reviewing such declarations comprises only government appointees, meaning they will be kangaroo courts.

Sections in the law permitting searches and seizures based on an officer's “opinion” or “personal knowledge” strip away judicial safeguards and open the door to arbitrary action. This violates the rights guaranteeing fair trial and due process in searches, protecting individuals against unlawful interference with one's home, property, and privacy. Section 14 prohibits appeals, while Section 17 provides blanket immunity to government officials, even in cases of abuse. Such clauses eliminate accountability.

As has become the fashion, colonial style oppression on jailing people is present in this law also. Section 15 renders all offences under the Bill non-bailable and cognizable, despite the vagueness of their definitions. This facilitates prolonged pre-trial detention without judicial scrutiny.

On top of everything else, the law isn't needed: India already possesses very restrictive counterterrorism and criminal laws, including the UAPA, MCOCA, and Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, which criminalize the same or similar alleged conduct. The new Bill adds another weapon to suppress dissent, turning the legal process itself into punishment and further eroding civil liberties.

If signed and enforced, the law under the guise of security represents a grave and unnecessary expansion of state power at the cost of fundamental rights. Far from safeguarding Maharashtra, it criminalizes dissent, debate, and accountability. The misuse of vague terms like “urban naxal” has already caused immense harm. Assenting to this Bill would legitimize a framework that enables abuse and impunity over justice.

This is why I have urged the governor, with the utmost respect, to withhold assent to the Bill. The observance of Independence Day should not be restricted to the symbolism of flag raising and saluting and long speeches. What should be observed is our continuing commitment to freedom, the protection of civil liberties, the preservation of human rights and access to justice. This law is a violation of all of these and for this reason one hopes it is not inflicted on Indians.

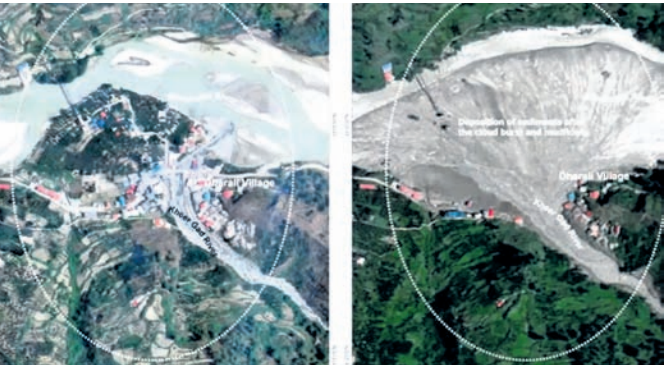
Regional security concerns

Expert team explains formation of lake in Bhagirathi at Dharali

Uttarkashi, August 16: A team of geological experts have explained how a temporary lake was formed in the Bhagirathi river following the recent flash floods in Uttarkashi's Dharali village, which also caused large-scale damage to the neighbouring Harshil town.

Efforts are underway at present to manually puncture the lake to facilitate outflow of water in a phased and controlled manner to prevent flooding downstream.

The team conducted a geological inspection of the disaster-affected areas of both Dharali and Harshil, studied the possible dangers and measures for rescue, an official release here said.

The team observed that a local stream named Telgad in Harshil near the Army camp became active due to heavy rainfall during the August 5 disaster, in which, according to the administration, one person died and 68 others are missing.

The camp bore the brunt of the disaster, which demolished structures besides leaving nine of its personnel missing, including a junior commissioned officer and eight jawans.

A large amount of debris and water came and accumulated in the stream at its point of confluence with the Bhagirathi River and formed a large fan-shaped deposit (alluvial fan) of sediments, the team of experts said.

This fan obstructed the original channel of the Bhagirathi River and formed a temporary lake on the right bank of the river.

The length of the newly formed lake was about 1,500 metres, and its estimated depth was 12 to 15 feet.

The flooding not only submerged a portion of the national highway and a helipad, but

also posed a serious threat to Harshil town.

This event also significantly altered the topography of the Bhagirathi River, as the sand dune located on the right bank was eroded, while fresh sediment was deposited on the left side, exposing the northern part of the town.

The continued bedrock erosion in this area had already caused partial structural damage to the camp, including the loss of a portion of the Garhwal Mandal Vikas Nigam Guest House.

Inspection by the geological team August 12 revealed that the left bank of the Bhagirathi River was blocked by a saturated alluvial fan.

Due to its high moisture content, the fan was weak, which prevented heavy machinery such as JCBs from being deployed — the only equipment available locally.

Based on the field data and available resources, the geologists prepared a plan for debris clearance and partial restoration of water flow.

The plan involved creating small diversion channels of about 9-12 inches deep to gradually release the stagnant water.

During discussions with Uttarkashi District Magistrate Prashant Arya and Inspector General (SDRF) Arun Mohan Joshi, it was emphasised that the lake outflow channels should be opened in three or four stages to avoid sudden flooding downstream.

Work was immediately started by the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF) and the Irrigation Department, Uttarkashi.

Through careful execution of the plan on two successive days, the teams engaged in the exercise were able to facilitate controlled water drainage from the lake.

Nandurbar, August 16: Ganesha Pavara had a challenging task on the eve of Independence Day. Managing with a feeble mobile network in his North Maharashtra hamlet, where electricity is yet to reach, he downloaded a video explaining how to tie a flag to a pole, so that it unfurls without a hitch.

On Friday, leading a group of about 30 children and locals, the 20-something Pavara ensured that his remote Udadya hamlet, nestled in the Satpura range in Nandurbar district, witnessed its maiden flag hoisting.

The hamlet, around 500km from Mumbai and about 50km from the nearest tehsil, has a population of 400, but has no government school. Pavara teaches at an informal

school run by the NGO YUNG Foundation.

"This region is endowed with natural beauty, fertile soil, and the Narmada River flows through it. But being a hilly belt, it is difficult to reach," says Sandeep Deore, founder of the YUNG Foundation.

The foundation, which has been implementing education interventions in the region for three years, decided that the national flag should be hoisted in the hamlets of Udadya, Khaparmaal, Sadri and Manjipada on Independence Day this year.

More than 250 children enrolled in the four schools run by the foundation were present at the flag-hoisting ceremonies Friday, besides local villagers.

There is no government school or a gram panchayat office in these hamlets, hence,



a flag-hoisting never took place in the last seven decades.

The idea was not only to achieve a first but also to educate the local people about their democratic rights, said Deore.

The tribals here live a very independent life, but all of them may not know things like the rights guaranteed by our Constitution, he said.

They often get fleeced or exploited while working as labourers or in day-to-day transactions, Deore pointed out.

reached any of the hamlets, and a majority of households depend on solar panels.

Locals here speak the Pawari dialect, quite different from standard Marathi or Hindi, making it difficult for outsiders to communicate with them.

Deore said it was difficult initially to win the trust of the people, but once they were convinced about the genuineness of the cause, it was easy to secure their cooperation.

The foundation depends on donations to pay its teachers and procure basic infrastructure for its schools. But it cannot implement a mid-day meal scheme, like in government schools, as these are informal schools. The anganwadi workers appointed by the government often stay away from these remote hamlets. There are, however, exceptions like Aajmibai, an anganwadi worker at Khaparmaal, who stays in the village allotted to her and does her job diligently.

Village becomes first to set up local-level human rights panel

Ahilyanagar, August 16: The Soundala gram sabha in Ahilyanagar district has become the first in Maharashtra to establish a human rights protection committee to safeguard and create awareness about human rights at the village level.

The gram sabha resolved to set up a Gramin Manav Adhikar Sanrakshan Samiti (Village Human Rights Protection Committee) during a meeting held August 14.

Village sarpanch Sharad Argade said that the move aligns with the state government's directive to establish such committees in rural areas under the framework of the State Human Rights Commission (SHRC).

According to the resolution, the committee will work in coordination with SHRC officials to address complaints related to human rights violations, spread awareness about rights and duties, and guide citizens on how to seek legal remedies.

The panel comprising 11 members, including elected representatives, social workers, women, teachers and persons with disabilities, will also collaborate with the police and other agencies to address violations and recommend corrective measures.

As per the resolution, Argade will serve as the committee's chairperson, while gram sevak Pratibha Gorakshan Pisote has been named secretary.

The resolution mandates the committee to undertake

training, organise awareness programmes, and coordinate with authorities to ensure effective implementation of human rights protections in the village.

Gram sabhas are grass-roots-level democratic institutions in each village panchayat that ensure the effective functioning of panchayats by promoting transparency and accountability in administration, enhancing people's participation in the planning and implementation of schemes.

Min claims world record as Govindas form 10-layer human pyramid at Thane

When Navi Mumbai villagers shared dry fish with 'Veeru'

Mumbai, August 16: Long before its release on Independence Day in 1975, the cast and crew of Sholay had already enthralled the residents of many Navi Mumbai villages that drew filmmakers for their bucolic settings.

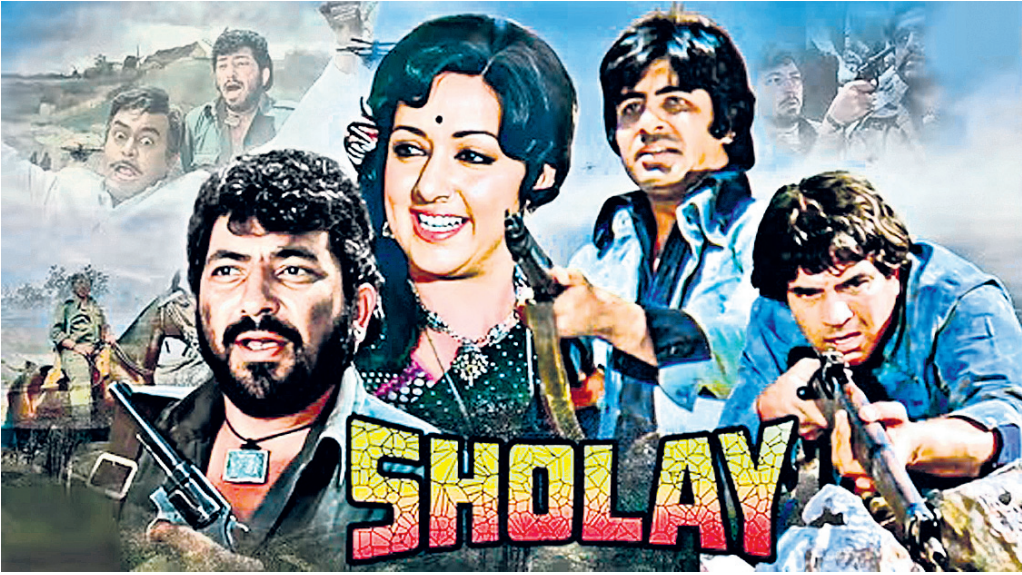
Half a century later, residents of the villages along the Panvel-Uran road still cherish the memories of the shooting of the film, which went on to become a cult classic, even though urbanisation has changed the face of those 'lights, camera, action' sites.

The Agris and Kolis, the dominant communities of the region who then depended on paddy farming and fishing for livelihood, would throng the sets every single day of the shooting, which began in the area around 1972.

"Dharmendra, who played Veeru, at times mingled with the locals and enjoyed 'jawla sukat' (dry fish) and 'tandul bhakri' (rice flour flatbread) shared by the Agri people. Dharmendra would exchange his biryani or the meal specially cooked for him with the locals," recalled Sanjay Shelar (62).

Not just the superstar, the crew members also had their fair share of exchanges with the locals. They would pass on their drinks to the villagers, who got them home-made brew, he said.

Many scenes of the Ramesh



Sippy masterpiece were shot along the Panvel-Uran road, said Shelar. Most of Sholay was, however, filmed in a rocky hill range, about 50 km from Bengaluru.

The film crew, including actors Dharmendra, Sanjeev Kumar, Amitabh Bachchan, Jaya Bachchan and Hema Malini, would stay put at Pravin Hotel in Old Panvel. Space was created behind the hotel to keep the horses, Shelar said.

The scene in which 'Basanti' (Hema Malini) picks up 'Jai' (Amitabh Bachchan) and 'Veeru' from the railway station to take them to Ramgad was shot near Panvel railway station, he said.

Hundreds of youths and children would skip work and school to watch Team Sholay in action, with the 'Dream Girl' (Hema Malini) drawing the maximum attention, Shelar said, recalling that he and his friends would cycle to the shooting sites.

The scene in which Veeru aims at mangoes with a pistol was filmed in the mango grove of Chinchpada. In this scene, Veeru tries to flirt with Basanti under the guise of giving her shooting lessons, prompting Jai, lazing under a tree, to quip "Lag gaya nishana." A vehicle garage has replaced the mango grove today.

The iconic sequence, show-

ing dacoits of Gabbar Singh (Amjad Khan) attempting to rob a moving train, chasing it on horseback, opening fire, and fighting with Jai and Veeru, was filmed entirely on and along the Panvel-Uran railway line near 'Bambavi Pada', commonly known as Bombay Pada, Shelar said.

The exaggerated narration of Soorma Bhopali (Jagdeep) in a sawmill of how he supposedly fought off a group of dacoits was also shot in this area, said Shelar. "The sawmill is operational even today," he added.

Prabhakar Mundkar, a resident of Bambavi Pada, said he used to sell watermelons to the villagers, who would

crowd around the film sets. The high-voltage scene showing the train smashing through a pile of logs on the tracks was shot in their village, he recalled.

That old track is still active today, allowing goods trains to transport containers.

Janardhan Nama Patil, an 82-year-old resident of Bambavi village, vividly remembers the shooting of Sholay in the region. He recalled the filming of the sequence in which horses chase a train, Veeru fights dacoits, and burning coal is hurled onto a wagon, triggering a fire.

Nareish Gaikar (56), who spent his childhood in Uran, said that the producers had created a village near Bambavi Pada, where the shootings used to take place.

"Towards the movie's climax, the Gabbar gang abducts Basanti. A small boy shows Veeru the path taken by the dacoits. That boy was from Owala village in the vicinity," said Chandrakant Patil, another resident of Bambavi village.

The last exchange of fire between Jai and the dacoits on a small wooden bridge was created in this area, he said.

Though the locals continue to cling to those memories, Patil rues that the idyllic surroundings of the 70s are all gone.

"We can proudly say that our villages were so beautiful that producers and directors used to choose them as shooting locations," Patil said.

2 German Shepherds emerge as ray of hope for family of missing

Uttarkashi, August 16: After the devastating flash flood devoured almost half of Dharali village in Uttarkashi district, demolishing buildings in its bustling market area and sweeping away people, 'Phantom' and 'Coco' have emerged as a ray of hope for people eagerly waiting for a clue about their relatives who went missing after the disaster.

Defying heavy rains, cold winds, dangerous paths, rivers and streams, the two trained German Shepherds of the SDRF

keep trying to find life all day in the area where over 60 people are still missing and likely buried under debris.

Using his experience to the fullest, eight-year-old Phantom keeps searching for people under the mounds of debris. Meanwhile, an intensive search is still underway in the area, officials said. NDRF Assistant Commandant RS Dhapola said ground penetrating radar (GPR) is being used to find people who are feared trapped under rubble. He said this electrical detector gives information about any element buried up to 40 metres.

New Delhi, August 16: Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi will pay a two-day visit to India beginning Monday to hold border talks with National Security Advisor (NSA) Ajit Doval, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) announced Saturday. Wang's visit comes days ahead of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's planned trip to China to attend the annual summit of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO). The Chinese foreign minister is visiting India primarily to hold the next round of Special Representatives' (SR) dialogue on the boundary question. Wang and Doval are the designated special representatives for the boundary talks.

"At the invitation of National Security Advisor Ajit Doval, Member of the Politburo of the Communist Party of China and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi will visit India on August 18 and 19," the MEA said in a statement. "During his visit, he will hold the 24th round of the Special Representatives' (SR) talks on the India-China boundary question with India's SR, NSA Doval," it added. External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar will also hold bilateral talks with his Chinese counterpart. Doval travelled to China in December last year and held the SR talks with Wang, weeks after Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping decided to revive various dialogue mechanisms between the two sides at a meeting in the Russian city of Kazan. Modi is expected to travel to China later this month to attend the SCO summit. According to the plan, the prime minister will embark on a visit to Japan around August 29 and after concluding the trip, will travel to the northern Chinese city of Tianjin for the summit to be held August 31 and September 1. Modi's visit to China is being planned amid efforts by the two neighbouring countries to repair their bilateral ties, which came under severe strain following the deadly clashes between Indian and Chinese troops in the Galwan valley in June 2020.

IndiGo's Bangkok-Mumbai flight suffers tail strike

Mumbai, August 16: An IndiGo aircraft operating its Bangkok-Mumbai flight suffered a tail strike while attempting to land at the airport here Saturday, prompting aviation safety regulator DGCA to order a probe into the incident, sources said. Both the pilots of the Airbus A321neo have been derostered pending investigation, they said. "On August 16, an IndiGo Airbus A321 aircraft tail touched the runway while executing a low-altitude go-around due to unfavourable weather conditions in Mumbai," IndiGo spokesperson said in a statement. The airline flight 6E 1060 departed from Bangkok at 12.12 am (local time) against its scheduled departure time of 11.40 pm (local time) and finally landed at the Mumbai airport at 3.04 am against its scheduled arrival time of 2.50 am, as per flight tracking website flightradar24.com.

"Thereafter the aircraft carried out another approach and landed safely," the airline said. "We will be undertaking an investigation on this incident," a senior Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) official told PTI. Heavy downpour pummeled Mumbai and its suburbs, with some parts recording more than 200 mm rainfall in the wee hours of Saturday, inundating low-lying areas and affecting the transport services including movement of local trains and flights. Incessant rain continued to lash parts of the city in the morning with occasional heavy spells. The downpour began around 1 am and continued into the early hours of the day, causing waterlogging in low-lying areas of the western and eastern suburbs. According to the IMD, several parts of Mumbai recorded more than 200 mm of rainfall between 8.30 am Friday and 5.30 am Saturday.

The Congress also dubbed the RSS as "the biggest villain" in the country's history, and said that the coming generations would not forgive them. The Congress said that as a special NCERT module to mark the "Partition Horrors Remembrance Day" held Muhammad Ali Jinnah, the Congress and the then Viceroy Lord Mountbatten responsible

for India's partition. Congress spokesperson and head of party's media and publicity department Pawan Kherra said the book does not mention anything about the Hindu Mahasabha for forming coalition governments with the Muslim League and both propagating, in pre-partition days, that Hindus and Muslims cannot live together in one country. "The partition happened because of the Hindu Mahasabha and Muslim League's 'jugabandi'. If there is anyone which is the biggest villain in history, it is the RSS. Generations will not forgive them for the contribution," Kherra told reporters when asked about the NCERT book. "The manner in which they are trying to interfere in in-



stitutions and are trying to distort the history, we would not sit quiet. Can they remove these pages of 1938, 1940 and of

1942?" he asked. The Congress leader said LK Advani had gone to the Mazar of Mohammad Ali Jinnah to

pay his respects, as the Hindu Mahasabha and the Muslim League were "together in seeking partition". Kherra claimed that in 1938, the Hindu Mahasabha held its annual convention on the banks of Sabarmati in Gujarat, where it was clearly stated that Hindus and Muslims cannot stay together in one country. In 1940, he said, in its Lahore convention, the Muslim League took this forward and repeated this statement, but the NCERT module does not mention about them. "When the Quit India Movement was launched in 1942, Congress leaders resigned from the provincial Assembly and took to the streets. At that time, the Hindu Mahasabha and the Muslim League en-

tered into a coalition and jointly formed governments in NWFP, Bengal and Sindh. Has the NCERT module written this that the Hindu Mahasabha and the Muslim League formed joint coalition governments?" the Congress leader asked. The BJP slammed the Congress for questioning the NCERT's module on the Partition of India and said the opposition party is in pain because the "truth" has been brought out. Calling the Congress the "Rahul-Jinnah party", BJP national spokesperson Gaurav Bhatia took on Rahul Gandhi, the Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha, and alleged that his thinking was similar to that of Muhammad Ali Jinnah, the founder of Pakistan.

Strike grounds Air Canada

Toronto: Air Canada suspended all operations as more than 10,000 Air Canada flight attendants went on strike early Saturday after a deadline to reach a deal passed, leaving travellers around the world stranded and scrambling during the peak summer travel season. Canadian Union of Public Employees spokesman Hugh Pouliot confirmed the strike has started after no deal was reached, and the airline said shortly after that it would halt operations. A bitter contract fight between Canada's largest airline and the union representing 10,000 of its flight attendants escalated Friday as the union turned down the airline's request to enter into government-directed arbitration, which would eliminate its right to strike and allow a third-party mediator to decide the terms of a new contract.

Hurricane Erin intensifies

San Juan: Erin became a Category 3 hurricane in the Caribbean early Saturday and is expected to strengthen further during the day, the National Hurricane Centre reported. The storm is currently 275 kilometres northeast of Anguilla with maximum sustained winds of 195 kph. It is moving west-northwest at 31 kph. It is currently not forecast to hit land, but strong winds are affecting nearby islands, prompting forecasters to warn of possible flooding and landslides. The National Hurricane Centre (NHC) said it currently expected Erin to become a Category 4 storm later Saturday but to eventually swerve away from the continental United States.

The joint statement from leaders including German Chancellor Friedrich Merz, French President Emmanuel Macron, British Prime Minister Keir Starmer and Italian Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni was issued after Trump briefed them on his talks with Putin.

It said the next step must be talks with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, and that they were ready to work with Trump and Zelenskyy towards a three-way summit with European support.

Trump said after his talks with Putin that Ukraine should agree a deal to end the war with Russia.

He said he had agreed with the Russian leader that the best way to do this was to go straight

Israeli settlement plan breaks int'l law: UN

Washington, August 16: The UN human rights office said Friday an Israeli plan to build to build thousands of new homes between an Israeli settlement in the West Bank and near East Jerusalem was illegal under international law, and would put nearby Palestinians at risk of forced eviction, which it described as a war crime.

Israeli far-right Finance Minister Bezalel Smotrich Thursday vowed to press on a long-delayed settlement project, saying the move would "bury" the idea of a Palestinian state.

The UN rights office spokesperson said the plan would break the West Bank into isolated enclaves and that it was "a war crime for an occupying power to transfer its own civilian population into the territory it occupies".

About 700,000 Israeli settlers live among 2.7 million Palestinians in the West Bank and East Jerusalem. Israel annexed East Jerusalem in 1980, a move not recognised by most countries, but has not formally extended sovereignty over the West Bank.

"As long as the killing in Ukraine continues, we stand ready to uphold the pressure on Russia. We will continue to strengthen sanctions and wider economic measures to put pressure on Russia's war economy until there is a just and lasting peace."

Russian politicians hail Alaska summit as victory for Moscow

In the early hours of Saturday morning following a summit in Alaska between the leaders of Russia and the United States, senior politicians in Moscow were quick to trumpet the meeting as a win for Russia and its narrative of the war in Ukraine. "The meeting in Alaska confirmed Russia's desire for peace, long-term and fair," said Andrei Klishas, a senior lawmaker from President Vladimir Putin's United Russia party. He portrayed the summit as a coup for Russia and a loss for Ukraine and its European allies, who have been pushing for an unconditional ceasefire. "The tasks of the SMO will be accomplished either by military or diplomatic means," Klishas wrote, using the acronym for Special Military Operation, the Kremlin's term for the war. "A new architecture for European and international security is on the agenda, and everyone must accept it." The highly-anticipated summit Friday in Anchorage yielded no agreement to resolve or pause the conflict, now in its fourth year, although both Putin and US President Donald Trump described the talks as productive. The two men met for nearly three hours before giving a brief media appearance and boarding separate planes home. Dmitry Medvedev, a former Russian president known for his hawkish views, said the summit proved that it was possible to hold talks without conditions - as Moscow has insisted - while the fighting in Ukraine rages on. Russia's flagship Channel One morning state news bulletin on Saturday stressed the pageantry around the summit, its global profile, and the warm welcome extended to Putin, who had been ostracized by Western leaders since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022. "The Red carpet, handshakes and footage and photographs that are in all global publications and TV channels," it said, saying it was the first time that Trump had met a visiting leader off their plane at the airport. Its correspondent in Alaska said the two leaders had obviously agreed about a lot of things, but did not say what those things were. "The very fact of the meeting in Alaska, its tone, and its outcome represent a significant and joint success for both presidents, each of whom made a tremendous personal contribution to achieving the best possible result at this time," Konstantin Kosachyov, a chair of the foreign affairs committee of Russia's upper house of parliament, wrote on Telegram.

World's first treaty to curb plastic pollution hits wall

Geneva, August 16: Delegates discussing the world's first legally binding treaty to tackle plastic pollution failed to reach consensus, diplomats said Friday, voicing disappointment and even rage that the 10-day talks produced no deal.

Delegates had been seeking a breakthrough in the deadlocked United Nations' talks in Geneva, but states pushing for an ambitious treaty said that the latest text released overnight failed to meet their expectations.

The chair of the negotiations Ecuador's Luis Vayas Valdivieso adjourned the session with a



pledge to resume talks at an undetermined later date, drawing weak applause from exhausted delegates who had worked into the early hours.

French ecology minister Agnes Pannier-Runacher told the meeting's closing session that she was "enraged because de-

327 die after flash floods in Pakistan

Peshawar/Islamabad, August 16: The death toll from the flash floods in Pakistan's Khyber Pakhtunkhwa rose to 327, including over a dozen children, over the last 48 hours, provincial authorities said Saturday.

Across Pakistan, over the last 24 hours, 151 people have died, including 144 in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KPK) province and seven in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK), according to the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA).

Since June 26, when the monsoon rains began, 645 people have been killed across the country with more than 50 per cent from the majorly hilly KPK province, the NDMA data said.

Torrential rains, which triggered flash floods in various districts of the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province since Thursday, are expected to continue intermittently until August 21, according to the Provincial Disaster Management Authority (PDMA).

PDMA Spokesman Faizi said that in the past 48 hours, 327 people were killed by the devastating rains, cloud bursts and flash floods in the province.



China hands over third Hangor-class sub to Pak

Beijing, August 16: China has delivered the third of the eight new "advanced" Hangor-class submarines to Pakistan as part of Beijing's efforts to upgrade Islamabad's naval strength to support its growing presence in the Indian Ocean, India's backyard.

The launching ceremony of the third Hangor-class submarine was held in Wuhan, Central China's Hubei province, Thursday, the state-run Global Times reported Saturday.

The second of the eight submarines China is building for Pakistan was handed over in March this year.

This is in addition to four modern naval frigates that China supplied to Pakistan in the last few years as part of its efforts to boost Pakistan's naval strength amid the Chinese navy's steady expansion in the Arabian Sea, where it is developing the Gwadar port in Balochistan, as well as in the Indian Ocean.

Speaking at the launch of the third submarine, Pakistan's Deputy Chief of Naval Staff Project-2 Vice Admiral Abdul Samad said the Hangor-class submarine's cutting-edge

weaponry and advanced sensors would be instrumental in sustaining regional power equilibrium and ensuring maritime stability, the daily quoted a Pakistan defence statement as saying.

According to a recent report by the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute (SIPRI), China supplied over 81 per cent of Pakistan's military hardware.

Some of Pakistan's key orders in the past five years include the country's first spy ship, the Rizwan; more than 600 VT-4 battle tanks, and 36 J-10CE 4.5-generation fighters, according to the SIPRI database.

China supplied the first delivery of multi-role J-10CE fighter jets to the Pakistan Air Force in 2022, adding to its JF-17 fighters jointly manufactured by both countries. Pakistan used these fighter jets in the recent conflict with India.

Zhang Junshe, a Chinese military affairs expert, told the Global Times that the Hangor-class submarine is characterised by its strong underwater combat capabilities, including comprehensive sensor systems, excellent stealth characteristics, high mobility, long endurance and formidable firepower.



No Chhetri in Jamil's 35

Indian star striker missing in list of 35 probables named by new coach Jamil for CAFA Nations Cup

New Delhi, August 16: Talismanic striker Sunil Chhetri has been left out of the 35 probables named by newly-appointed Indian football team head coach Khalid Jamil for the upcoming CAFA Nations Cup in Tajikistan and Uzbekistan.

It's unlikely that he was dropped on the basis of his form in the four matches he played after coming back from his international retirement.

However, it's also not known whether Chhetri himself requested not to consider him for the tournament, to be held later this month, or if he was rested as his Indian Super League (ISL) side Bengaluru FC is yet to start pre-season training.

Bengaluru FC recently suspended salaries for its first-team players and staff, including that of Chhetri, due to uncertainty surrounding the ISL's future.

However, Jamil's list of probables includes other Bengaluru FC players like goalkeeper Gurpreet Singh Sandhu, defenders Chinglensana Singh, Rahul Bheke, Roshan Singh Naorem, and midfielder Suresh Singh.



All India Football Federation (AIFF) officials are not willing to comment on the matter, saying "the question should be asked to the head coach".

CSK defends Brevis signing after R Ashwin's 'extra fee' claims

Brevis' signing was in compliance with rules: CSK clarify after Ashwin's remarks spark controversy

Chennai, August 16: Chennai Super Kings Saturday issued clarification regarding the signing of Dewald Brevis midway through the IPL 2025 season, saying the signing process of the South African batter was in "complete compliance with the rules and regulations" of the league.

A raging controversy was sparked as former India spinner Ravichandran Ashwin, currently in the CSK roster, hinted in his YouTube channel that the five-time IPL champions were willing to pay "extra" to avail Brevis' services.

"Chennai Super Kings categorically clarifies that all actions taken by the franchise during the signing process of Dewald Brevis as a Replacement Player during TATA Indian Pre-



mier League (IPL) 2025 were in complete compliance with the rules and regulations of IPL," the CSK said in a statement.

"In April, 2025, Dewald Brevis was signed for a league fee of INR 2.2 Cr as a replacement player for the injured Gurjagneet Singh, who was picked up at the IPL 2025 Player Auction held at Abadi AI Johar Arena, Jeddah, Saudi Arabia for a price of INR 2.2 Cr," the statement further added.

The IPL rules in vogue state that the signing of a replacement player should not exceed the price of the player he will be replacing on the roll.

In that scenario, the originally unsold Brevis was paid Rs 2.2

crore by CSK, over and above his base price of Rs 75 lakh, to sign him April 18.

The controversy broke out when Ashwin said the CSK was ready to pay more to sign Brevis, who had cracked a brilliant hundred against Australia in a T20I match earlier this week after a few other IPL teams talks with the SA batter were hindered by the price.

"I will tell you something about Brevis. He had a great time last IPL. A few teams left him because of the price. When he was supposed to be signed as a replacement, he was supposed to be signed at the base price.

"But what happens is you talk to the agents and the player will say, if you give me X amount extra, I will come," Ashwin said on his YouTube channel. "... And CSK were ready to pay him, hence he came. In the back half, the CSK combination was strong. They will go with Rs 30 crore in IPL 2026 mini auction," Ashwin added.

It may be recalled that Ashwin is reportedly in talks with the Super Kings about his future in the franchise.

But Antoine Semenyo, who was the target of racist abuse in the first half that led to a pause in the game, pulled one back for the visitors in the 64th minute and completed a double 12 minutes later to rock Liverpool and shock the home fans.

However, Chiesa came off the bench and sent the Anfield faithful away happy with an 88th-minute strike after goalkeeper Djordje Petrovic swatted away a ball into the box by Salah, who scored himself deep into added time to wrap up the three points.

"Fantastic," Liverpool boss Arne Slot said of Italian forward Chiesa's goal. "He came in in the end because we needed a goal. For him then to score in such a moment is special.

"It's even more special because the fans have supported him. It's nice he gives them

something in return with a great goal."

With Liverpool ahead again, Salah chased the ball past the defence before cutting inside and firing into the bottom corner with a 94th-minute goal that put the Egyptian joint-fourth with Andy Cole on the all-time Premier League scorers' list with 187.

An emotional Salah pointed to the heavens and flapped two hands to mimic Jota's shark goal celebration.

He headed for The Kop stand after the final whistle, and wiped away tears while applauding the fans who were singing their Jota song to the

tune of "Bad Moon Rising."

The night started with an emotional minute's silence for Jota and his brother Andre Silva, who died in a car crash. Fans fought back tears as they sang "You'll Never Walk Alone."

Ekitike, who has joined from Eintracht Frankfurt, was the most impressive of Slot's close-season signings in a spending spree topping 300 million pounds (\$406.53 million). The game was halted for several minutes after Bournemouth's Ghana international Semenyo reported the racist abuse.

"It's totally unacceptable," Bournemouth captain Adam Smith said. "Kind of in shock to be honest that it happened. In this day and age it shouldn't be happening.

"I don't know how Ant's played on to be honest and come up with those goals ... Something has to be done. We'll support him in there and hopefully he'll be ok."

BCCI brings like-for-like injury replacement rule in domestic cricket

New Delhi, August 16: The BCCI has amended its playing conditions, introducing a provision for "serious injury replacements" in multi-day domestic tournaments for the upcoming season.

The move comes in the wake of injuries to Rishabh Pant and Chris Woakes during the recently-concluded Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy Test series between India and England that ended 2-2.

"If a player sustains a serious injury during the course of the relevant match, a Serious Injury Replacement may be permitted in the following circumstances," stated the newly-introduced rule communicated to the state associations.

It further adds: "The serious injury must have been sustained during play and within the playing area described in clause 1.2.5.2.

Pant sustained a foot fracture in the fourth Test in Manchester after attempting a reverse sweep, while Woakes dislocated his shoulder in the series-decider at The Oval.

The incident reignited a debate on whether replacements should be allowed when players suffer serious injuries. While India head coach Gautam Gambhir was in favour of it, England captain Ben Stokes wasn't for it.

Top seed Hemanth lifts Saipan International badminton crown

New Delhi, August 16: Top seeded Indian Tanya Hemanth capped off a strong run at the Saipan International 2025 with a straight-game win over Japan's Kanae Sakai in the women's singles final Saturday.

The 21-year-old, ranked 86th in the world, defeated the unseeded Sakai 15-10, 15-8 at the Oleai Sports Complex in Northern Mariana Islands to secure her fourth international series title.

The Saipan International is part of the Badminton World Federation's trial events for the experimental 3x15 scoring system, where each game is played to 15 points instead of

the conventional 21.

Hemanth, who had earlier triumphed at the India International (2022), Iran Fajr International (2023) and Bendigo International (2024), added another feather to her cap with Saturday's victory.

She had also finished runner-up at the Azerbaijan International last year, losing to compatriot Malvika Bansod in the final.

En route to the title in Saipan, Hemanth overcame Japan's Ririna Hiramoto in the semi-finals, Singapore's Lee Xin Yi Megan in the quarter-finals, beat Japanese player Nodoka Sunakawa in the round of 16. She had received a bye in the opening round.

Boral's incredible feat

Veteran two-wheeler driver becomes first man to conquer highest motorable roads in India on a moped

Kolkata, August 16: Veteran motorcyclist and Guinness World Record holder Subrata Boral has become the first Indian rider to conquer the highest motorable passes in the country on a moped, the TVS XL 100.

This is the first example of the highest motorable passes being reached on a 100cc two-wheeler. Boral, has recently completed the feat and returned to Kolkata.

He achieved this incredible feat without any back-up. In the process, the highest motorable roads that he reached were Umling La (19,024 ft), which incidentally is the highest motorable road in the world. Among the other highest motorable roads that he conquered were Marsimik La (18,313 ft), Chang La (17,586 ft), Khardung La (17,582 ft), Norbu La (17,132 ft), Rezag La (16,420 ft), Tsaga La (15,260 ft), Sapi La (14,426 ft),



Photu La (13,479 ft) and Namik La (12,139 ft).

Overall, he travelled on the TVS XL 100 for 2,758 kilometres in a journey which started July 15 and lasted 21 days. The veteran 55-year-old rider started his expedition from the Khyber Himalayan Resort in Gulmarg, Jammu & Kashmir.

Marking 40 incredible years on two wheels, Boral began his motorcycling journey in 1985 on a classic VIP Majestic Moped and officially earned his license in 1989 at the age of 19. Since then, he has logged several lakh kilometres across the diverse landscapes of India and beyond.

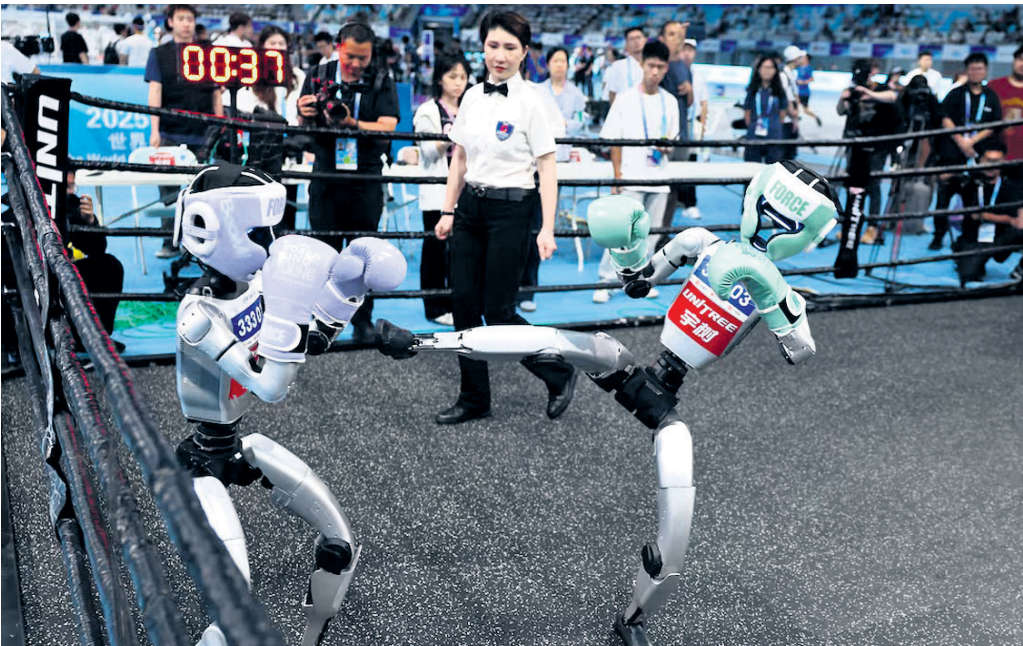

Beijing, August 16: China kicked off the three-day long World Humanoid Robot Games Friday, looking to showcase its advances in artificial intelligence and robotics with 280 teams from 16 countries.

Robots competed in sports such as track and field, and table tennis, as well as tackled robot-specific challenges from sorting medicines and handling materials to cleaning services.

Teams came from countries including the United States, Germany and Brazil, with 192 representing universities and 88 from private enterprises such as China's Unitree and Fourier Intelligence. Competing teams used robots from Chinese manufacturers such as Booster Robotics.



"We come here to play and to win. But we are also interested in research," said Max Polter, a member of HTWK Robots football team from Germany, affiliated with Leipzig University of Applied Sciences.

"You can test a lot of interesting new and exciting approaches in this contest. If we try

something and it doesn't work, we lose the game. That's sad but it is better than investing a lot of money into a product which failed."

At the robot games in Beijing, which charged 128 to 580 yuan (\$17.83-\$80.77) for tickets, humanoids crashed into each other and toppled over repeat-

edly during football matches, while others collapsed mid-sprint during running events.

During one football match, four robots crashed into each other and fell in a tangled heap. In the 1500-metre running event, one robot suddenly collapsed while running at full speed, drawing gasps and
